Precipitation chances continue into weekend

Rainfall chances have improved for the weekend, with thunderstorms tracking into the Texas Panhandle from northern New Mexico, according to The Associated Press.

A second group of storms moved into the El Paso area early Friday from Mexico.

Early-morning temperatures ranged from the 70s in the north to 80s in the southwest, around Fort Stockton. It was 64 degrees at Lufkin and 84 at Del Rio.

Also, it was 72 degrees at Port Arthur, Conroe and Victoria. Amarillo and Dalhart had 68 degrees, with 82 at Odessa.

Prevailing winds were mostly southerly and southeasterly at 5 to 20 mph, decreasing to 5 to 10 mph-overnight.

A slight chance of showers or thunderstorms was forecast over the Coastal Plains and along the Red River by Saturday. Showers and thunderstorms were expected in the Panhandle.

Daytime highs should range from the 80s in the Southwest Texas mountains to 90s to lower 100s in South Central Texas and the South Texas Plains. It should be around 105 degrees along the Rio Grande.

Lows overnight will be in the 60s and 70s, with some mid- to upper 50s possible in the far north and over the Guadalupe Mountains.

Thursday's high for Texas was 103 degrees at Cotulla.

HEDC TALKS: Directors give Cumpton go-ahead to negotiate contract with dairy

If everything works out during contract negotiations between the 'Hereford Economic Development Corp. and the owners of Hafliger Dairies, a new agriculture-based com-

pany will be setting up shop in Deaf

Smith County.

After a 45-minute, closed-door session Thursday afternoon, the HEDC directors authorized executive director Don Cumpton to begin contract negotiations with John Hafliger.

Hafliger, a former Hereford resident who now lives in Canyon, has been involved in the dairy industry for several years, operating dairies in Artesia, N.M., and a small one near Canyon. He also owns a small facility in the area that is leased to

an operator.

Cumpton stressed this is only a beginning point for the negotiations. Initial proposals called for the HEDC to guarantee a possible \$3 million loan for a 2,500-head dairy cow facility.

"None of the details are worked out," Cumpton said. "Before final approval, it would have to go to the city commission and others

before we could approve the deal."

Cumpton said the dairy would add about \$3 million to the county's tax base, bring in 18-25 jobs and possibly open the door for more dairies and support industries to move to the

Hereford area.

It was hoped the funding for the venture would be provided by local banks and would not necessarily be capped at \$3 million. Money would be used to purchase up to 640 acres for the dairy, construction of the complex to handle a herd of approximately 2,500 head of cattle, and to cover costs of applying for, processing and acquiring all the necessary state

and federal permits, which would allow the dairy to begin operations.

The cost of the dairy herd, feed or

The cost of the dairy herd, feed or any moveable inventory or equipment is not covered under this agreement.

Hafliger will be responsible for submitting plans and specifications to the HEDC and all governing authorities. The agreement calls for all contract, sub-contract, vendors and materials to come from Deaf Smith County businesses.

Negotiations have not included a possible location.

HEDC director Jerry Stevens said the construction of the dairy would probably take a year from the date contracts are signed to opening of the facility.

"This isn't something that's going to happen overnight, it's going to take time," Stevens said this morning. "Through this process, we're saying this a viable plan and we're

Ag panel continues its review

WASHINGTON, DC — Members of the House Agriculture Committee heard from representatives of unique producer groups Thursday as it continues its review of federal farm policy.

The hearing, which was the 15th conducted by the panel, focused on producers who confront issues unique to their industries, according to a

statement from the office of committee Chairman Larry Combest, R-Lubbock.

"Agricultural producers of all types face unique and severe operating risks. Finding ways to help producers manage these risks is one of the chief goals of this committee," Combest said. "After passage of legislation improving crop insurance, we now have the

the opportunity to focus on the economic side of the safety net."



"We now have

opportunity to focus on the economic side of the safety net. This will ultimately lead us to a farm policy that provides comprehensive risk protection for our nation's producers as they bring quality food and fiber to people worldwide."

The panel of witnesses, which included ranchers, beekeepers, fruit, sugar and sheep growers, represents several sectors of agriculture with a somewhat different perspective than row crop producers. For them, farm policy involves many different factors, as compared to other witnesses the committee has hosted.

While all agricultural producers contend with the weather, the groups represented Thursday also face different economic conditions than other producers.

Poll shows Bush with big lead

PHILADELPHIA— George W. Bush and running mate Dick Cheney have opened an 11-point lead over Al Gore in a poll of likely voters released just days before the start of the Republican National Convention.

The CNN-USA Today-Gallup poll released Thursday showed Bush at 50 percent and Gore at 39 percent, with Green Party candidate Ralph Nader at 4 percent and Reform Party contender Pat Buchanan at 1 percent. Gore had closed the gap with Bush just a week ago in the same poll.

Candidates often get a boost during their party's convention, and even before it starts. The four-day Republican convention opens here on

The poll of 632 likely voters was taken Tuesday and Wednesday and has an error margin of plus or minus 4 percentage points. Bush named Cheney to the Republican ticket on Tuesday.

Bush was given an advantage on several issues including world af-

fairs, taxes, the budget surplus and the economy. Gore, the Democratic vice president, had an edge on health care and the environment. They were about even on Social Security and education.

Those surveyed said by a 2-to-1 margin that Bush has the personal qualities needed in a president. People were evenly split on whether

Gore had them.

A separate poll of registered vot-

ers, taken before Cheney's selection, showed the race about even. The survey, by the Pew Research Center for the People and the Press, released Thursday had Bush at 48 percent and Gore at 46 percent in a head-to-head matchup.

Bush was ahead among independents, 52 percent to 41 percent. The top two were virtually tied in a four-way matchup as well: Bush 42 percent, Gore 41, Nader 6 and Buchanan 2.

The Pew survey of 918 registered voters was conducted July 19 through Sunday and has an error margin of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

The Pew poll also examined how the two candidates are viewed per-

Gore is "scandal-tainted," according to about one-quarter of the registered voters surveyed, while more than half say Bush has relied on family connections to get ahead.

■ Lieutenant governor's aide defending fund-raising missive, which has lobbyists, consumer groups both raising eyebrows

AUSTIN (AP) — Lt. Gov. Rick Perry's fund-raising letter asking lobbyists and their clients for campaign contributions is raising eyebrows among lobbyists and drawing criticism from consumer groups.

A Perry aide said nothing is wrong with the missive, which asks lobbyists to pledge not only their own contributions but also specific amounts for each of their clients — including corporations and associa-

The letter promotes a fund-raising reception for the Republican on Sept. 7 in Austin, seeking individual commitments of up to \$25,000. Tickets to the event are \$1,000 per person.

The letter is unusual because it seeks detailed information on each lobbyist's contribution. The second page of the letter lists each of the lobbyist's clients, followed by a dollar sign and a blank for each donation.

Political watchdog groups say it's a flagrant attempt to squeeze money from corporations and groups that the lieutenant governor can help or hurt in next year's legislative session. The letter also irritates some lobbyists, who in the past have made contributions to candidates but did not have to identify the source of the funds among their various clients.

"Because of the second page it is obvious that he is making a list and checking it twice. He's going to find out who's naughty or nice," said Suzy Woodford, executive director of Common Cause of Texas, a consumer educacy group.

"Basically what I as a lobbyist am being asked to do, if I had multiple clients, would be to collect checks, you know, bundle," she said Thursday. "Is it going to be the lobbyist who is the most successful bundler?"

Superfund blaze continues

KARNACK, Texas (AP) — An abandoned building at a closed ammunition factory that is targeted in a chemical cleanup continued to burn early Friday after Northeast Texas firefighters contained a blaze during a six-hour battle.

Firefighters from the communities of Karnack and Uncer-'tain were monitoring as flames continued in the partially demolished building at the old Longhorn Army Ammunition Plant, said Deidre Evans, Harrison County assistant fire marshal.

The building was in a remote part of the old ammo dump and there was no danger of flames spreading.

Board considers release gu

AUSTIN (AP) — Revised parole guidelines could result in more non-violent, low-risk offenders being released from prison early, the chairman of the state Board of Pardons and Paroles said Thursday.

The board has contracted with a private consultant to consider drafting new guidelines, which haven't been updated since 1987, as the state faces another possible crunch on prison space.

"I don't want to falsely raise expectations, but I will say I'm cautiously optimistic about the impact of this and all the other things we're doing," said board chairman Gerald Garrett. "The low-risk offender will have the opportunity to return to the community under certain conditions, that hopefully will better his or her chance for success. If that's the end result, then we're all winners."

The board met Thursday with consultants Security Response Technologies, Inc. and could start testing new parole

guidelines by next year.

A June report by the state Criminal Justice Policy Council said Texas will need more than 14,600 additional prison beds by August 2005. The cost of such a build-up could be avoided in part by reducing the time served by nonviolent offenders and new probation programs, the report said.

The parole board is responsible for determining which inmates will be released on parole and the conditions of their release. The board can adopt its own guidelines with-

out legislative approval. In fiscal year 1999, Texas released 18.2 percent of prisoners up for parole, according to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. That percentage has risen steadily in 2000 and hit as high as 26 percent in May. Garrett has said new programs, such as treatment for sexual offenders, and the rising age of the inmate population, have been factors in the higher release rate.

Although the release rate has increased, it remains much lower than the early 1990s, when parole rates skyrocketed to nearly 80 percent before a prison expansion program was completed.

"Parole guidelines are not a panacea. It's not going to result in the answer to the prison crowding problem, but it is very timely what we are doing," said Garrett, who said any changes aren't likely to have a significant statistical

impact for a couple of years. Some have overstated that this will solve the prison crowding problem. No one event or one thing is going to that," Garrett said

Critics have said the current parole guidelines are out-dated and lead to inconsistent results. If the inmates believe the system will give them realistic hopes for parole, they are more likely to work toward their release from prison, said Gary Cohen, an Austin defense attorney who represents inmates before the pa-

role board.

"You've got to give them something they believe in to give them a reason to behave," Cohen said.

New guidelines should help, said Jim Austin, a research and sociology professor at George Washington University who also works with the private consultants.

"Guidelines are designed to keep the bad people in and help the good risks get out," Austin said.

In drafting new guidelines, parole board members told the consultants they will likely want to consider elements of the initial crime; prior crimi-nal and parole history; an inmates' age and education and employment history; and input from the crime among other factors.

AG targets filthy warehouse

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A Chinese food supplier has continued shipping orders to grocers and restaurants in Texas and four other states, despite being targeted by inspectors for unsanitary conditions at its warehouses.

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn filed a lawsuit against Dallas-based Formosa Foods Wednesday, alleging the Dallas-based company failed three times to correct numerous health code violations in its warehouses.

Formosa officials did not return a telephone call Friday for comment.

The company has 20 days to respond to the lawsuit and Cornyn has yet to file an injunction to prevent the com-pany from shipping the poten-tially tainted food.

"Temporary restraining orders are usually reserved for very unusual cases," said An-drea Horton, a spokeswoman for the attorney general's of-

Horton said Cornyn would push for a permanent injunction to shut down the company if they do not reply to the lawsuit within the 20-day deadline.



Japanese players added for exhibition g

■ Kawaguchi, Itai join Cowboys for Tokyo game

WICHITA FALLS; Texas (AP) — Masufumi Kawaguchi wants more than a feel-good appearance in his homeland for the Dallas Cowboys. The linebacker from Japan wants to get noticed by the NFL even though he knows how difficult it could be.

"That's why I came here," Kawaguchi, 27, said Thursday after his first workout with the Cowboys. "If I get beat up so bad here then I will realize I must retire, but not right

Kawaguchi and receiver Masato Itai, two Japanese players who have played in NFL

Europe, both have joined the Cowboys for what is supposed to be only a one-game stint. The two will be in uniform,

and could play, when the Cowboys take on Atlanta in the American Bowl in Tokyo on Aug. 5. Their appearance on the roster is part of the deal for the overseas game, Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said.

At 5-foot-11, 180 pounds, Kawaguchi isn't a prototype linebacker, but wants at least a chance to make an NFL practice squad after four years

with the Admirals in NFL Europe: He knows he might have to make his impression on special teams.

Maybe I've never played football that much intense which I will be on game day if they put me on special teams,"
Kawaguchi said. "It would be
a lot better if they put me in
as linebacker. If they put me
in on a kickoff, I will play real

This will actually be Kawaguchi's second NFL game. He played for the Green Bay Packers against Kansas City in the 1998 American

Itai was the first Japanese

player to catch a touchdown pass in NFL Europe when he caught a 12-yard TD pass from Admirals quarterback Jim Kubiak in week 9 of the 2000 season. On Thursday, he was taking passes from Troy Aikman and Randall Cunningham.

"It was a very good experi-ence. The only difference is the speed. I missed some balls," said the 29-year-old Itai, whose goal is to have a catch in the American Bowl.

Cowboys coach Dave Campo said the two players have distinguished themselves in NFL Europe. But to what extent they will play for the Cowboys in the American Bowl can't yet be determined.

"It's a little difficult from the standpoint of not having a lot of practice time, the number of snaps they get is diffi-cult," Campo said. "We'll try to get them used to a couple of things they feel comfortable with, like routes that the re-ceiver would feel comfortable

This is not the first time the Cowboys have added an international player.

"One year when we played in Mexico we had a Mexican player play with us, a re-ceiver," Jones said. "This is good. There is a pretty active American football participation in Japan."

The Cowboys only practiced once Thursday. That is the

result of a fast tempo evident throughout camp so far. "We want to give them the feeling that we are a speed team and we want to do things in a fast way," coach Dave Campo said. RB Emmitt Smith (strained left big toe), DB George Teague (strained glute) and TE David LaFleur (strained groin) were held out of practice again Thursday. The Cowboys will honor the late coach Tom Landry this season by wearing an image of his famous fedora hat on their jerseys. "We thought it would be very ap-propriate. He didn't need a name, he didn't need any initials. The hat says it all," Cowboys owner Jerry Jones

Albright, North Korean talk

BANGKOK, Thailand-Secretary of State Madeleine Albright met North Korea's foreign minister Friday, the highest-level meeting in half a century of hostility between the two countries.

Albright shook hands with Paek Nam Sun at the start of the meeting. She is expected to seek curbs on North Korea's missiles, and North Korea is expected to renew demands for an end to economic sanctions.

The secretary of state likely will press Pack for details on the North's recent offer to turn its efforts to develop ballistic missiles into a program focused on the peaceful launch of satellites.

The State Department described the talks as introductory, and said no major deals

were expected. Upon her arrival, Albright paid a courtesy call on Thai Prime Minister Chuan Leekpai and headed to the riverside hotel where Asian foreign ministers have been meeting all week to discuss security.

FTC backs off on

'Net privacy laws
WASHINGTON— Reversing
its previous call for legislation to protect consumers' online privacy, the government has agreed to a self-regulatory

plan submitted by advertisers but criticized by privacy advo-

After hearing promises by the Network Advertising Initiative, a consortium of major Internet companies, that the industry would protect consumers' privacy, the Federal Trade Commission on Thursday approved a resolution allowing Internet companies to regulate themselves.

Last May, the FTC said Congress should pass privacy laws, saying self-regulation should "play an essential role."

The agency's latest report changes those priorities, making legislation a backstop to the industry's agreement.

Privacy groups called that decision a mistake.

House OK's repeal of '93 tax increase

WASHINGTON- House Republicans headed to their presidential convention with another tax cut in their pocket — the repeal of a 1993 measure that has meant higher taxes for millions of Social Security recipients.

The legislation, passed 265-159 Thursday with the help of 52 Democrats, was the last major bill the House finished before Congress adjourned for the summer and the two national presidential nominating conventions. Republicans meet in Philadelphia next week; Democrats convene next

month in Los Angeles.
The Social Security tax break came on the heels of a series of GOP-led initiatives to cut inheritance taxes, taxes on some married couples, a phone tax and taxes affecting health care and business.

President Clinton, as he has with the inheritance and mar-riage tax bills, said Thursday he would veto the Social Security measure because it undermines fiscal discipline and takes away resources needed for education and other priori-

"They have passed reckless tax cut after reckless tax cut after reckless tax cut, to drain away our hard-earned surplus and put us back in the red." he said in remarks in the Rose Garden.

GOP playing up 'progressive' side

PHILADELPHIA— Playing "progressive" side, Republicans are adopting a more conciliatory tone toward government while hewing closely in substance to their conservative fundamentals on taxes, abortion, defense and more.

The GOP's platform committee begins work Friday on a draft that drops the party's call for making English the official language and proposes a stronger federal role in education and the environment than Republican policy has favored.

"Government does have a role to play, but as a partner, not a rival, to the armies of compassion," states the draft.

A document of the party, not the presidential candidate, it is infused nonetheless with the optimistic bearing of

George W. Bush. On the other hand, the draft leaves unchanged the party's uncompromising stand against abortion rights. It also maintains the position that homosexuality is incompatible with military service.
