county officials on a salary basis and empower commissioners to fix the compensation. The fifth proposal would give the legislature power to erase or create county lines. Home rule cities, under the sixth amendment offered, would have the power to amend, alter or repeal their charters once per year. The next would allow officials in these cities to hold office up to four years.
The eighth would remove the tax exemption of University lands for county and district school purposes.
Connally Heads List.
Tom Connally, U. S. Senator, heads the list of Democratic nominees on the ballot. Marvin Jones' name comes next. James V. Tax Amendment

be cut down to the point where schools and highways would be crippled, causing the burden of support to be thrown back on local units. The Democratic convention adopted a resolution opposing it. Governor-elect James V. Allred is against it. The Texas Teachers Association is fighting it. The Texas Good Roads Association is battling for its defeat. To vote against it one merely has to scratch the fifth paragraph at the bottom of the ballot. It reads as follows: "For the amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."
The next amendment abolishes the fee system of compensating county officials where the population is more than 20,000 and gives the commissioners the right to fix compensation in counties of less population and to do away with the fee system. This amendment has probably more support than any other on the list.
Another long felt need is provided for in the next amendment which gives the Legislature the right to create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties. This will provide for consolidation of counties in instances where economies can be effected thereby.
The sixth amendment would allow home rule cities to amend or repeal charters every 12 months. Cities coming under this classification should have this right and this is a provision that was overlooked when the home rule amendment was adopted.
The seventh amendment is closely related to the sixth and provides that home rule cities may amend their charters to allow officials to hold office not to exceed four years.
The final amendment is designed to aid schools in counties where there is State University land. It provides that these lands, now exempt from taxation, may be taxed for the county and district school purposes. There is no denying that schools in these counties have been handicapped by the exemption, and this amendment will aid them considerably. The lands will remain exempt from taxation for other purposes.
