Fireworks to cap off night

Just imagine the scene -- families spread out across the grass, some with picnic baskets and blankets, others with lawn chairs and coolers of cold drinks.

At one edge, a group plays volleyball, while elsewhere children run and play, laughing and shouting with their friends.

Nearby, the smells of cooking hamburgers fill the air.

Then comes the music, as local performers take to the stage to display their talents.

This does not have to be imagination.

It will be reality on Monday as the annual Fourth of July Celebration officially kicks off in Veterans Park.

The day is seen as a family activity and everyone is invited out to spend as much time as they want, doing whatever they want.

Residents are invited to pack a picnic lunch and head to the park anytime during the day, then enjoy the evening that culminates in the annual fireworks display.

Or, if you prefer, several local non-profit groups will have food booths set up to sell such things as hamburgers and brisket burritos, brownies, cold drinks and homemade ice cream.

Official activities begin at 7 p.m., when County Judge Tom Simons goes to the microphone as master of ceremonies for the music program.

The Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce will host a free watermelon feeding beginning at 6:30 p.m.

County Commissioner Troy Don Moore and others will step up to serve the watermelon.

Finally, as the sun sets the celebration will close with the annual 30-minute fireworks display presented by Western Enterprises of Carrier, Okla.

This year's spectacular will end with a large American flag fireworks display at the park.

The fireworks will begin sometime around 9:30 p.m. to 9:45 p.m.

The event is funded in large part through private donations that help cover the \$9,000 cost of putting on the spectacular.

Clinton committee wins tempered by major loss

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton is finding out that what one congressional committee can give on health reform, another can take away.

After winning bills from three separate committees patterned largely on his own proposal, Clinton is about to get a Senate Finance Committee product that's smaller in scope, potentially leaving millions of Americans without insurance.

The panel arranged to meet today to complete work on its version of the legislation, which sets a goal of 95 percent coverage by Jan. 1, 2002 and calls for a national commission to recommend steps to reach that level if it hasn't been achieved.

Both houses are expected to vote in August on health reform, a few months before congressional elections, on an issue that has evoked sharp partisan differences in both the House and Senate.

In his weekly radio address, Clinton provided fresh evidence of those differences when he renewed

his attack on a plan backed by Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas and most other Senate Republicans.

"It will help you a little bit if you're poor; it won't affect you if you're wealthy," Clinton said. "But if you're in the middle, you can still lose your health insurance."

Dole opposes Clinton's approach to health reform, saying it relies on higher taxes and gives government too large a say over the health care system. He favors a more modest plan based on subsidies and tax breaks to expand coverage.

Within the Senate Finance Committee, a bipartisan majority was assembling a smaller plan than Clinton envisions, although not as limited as Dole wants. Allies of both will try to change it when the entire Senate debates the bill, and one approved earlier by the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, next month.

On an 11-9 vote Friday night, the Finance Committee stripped a 1 percent payroll tax from the bill that would have fallen on companies with

500 or more employees. The result will be an estimated \$50 billion less over five years to finance the reforms Clinton and his congressional allies want.

The committee also staged a series of close votes on abortion, and Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., cautioned that the "whole enterprise (of health reform) could founder on this subject."

The committee voted 12-8 to permit individuals or insurance companies invoking "moral conviction" to exclude abortion from their plans. And it agreed by 11-9 to acquiesce in "constitutionally permissible" state restrictions on abortion.

But on an 11-9 vote, it refused to strip abortion services from standard benefits that women would otherwise be entitled to under the bill.

The votes were the first victories for anti-abortion forces in any of the committees to act on health reform thus far, although the National Right to Life Committee said the results were mixed, at best.

White House hails vote on embargo against Bosnians

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House is declaring victory over a cliffhanger Senate vote that upheld the administration's policy of sticking with the U.N. arms embargo against Bosnia.

Senators voted 50-50 Friday on a measure by Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., that would have forced President Clinton to end U.S. participation in the embargo and to allow weapons to begin flowing to the embattled Balkan nation. A majority is needed for legislation to pass.

Dole sought to include the end to the embargo in a defense budget bill that cleared the Senate late Friday night.

Earlier, lawmakers voted 52-48 to support continuing the U.N. sanctions, for now. But the measure

also urged Clinton to consult with U.S. allies about lifting the embargo if the Serbs attack Bosnian safe areas or don't negotiate for peace.

White House press secretary Dee Myers called the vote "a confirmation of the president's Bosnia policy." She said Clinton believed that "it would interfere with the peace process" to lift the embargo now.

Senators voted as Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott promised that the United States would ask the U.N. Security Council to halt the embargo if the Bosnian Serbs don't move toward a peace agreement.

If the Security Council does not vote to end the embargo, the administration would consult with lawmakers about "possible further action, including unilateral termina-

tion of the arms embargo," Talbott said in a letter to senators.

Even Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., who led the efforts supporting the embargo's continuation, said the Clinton administration should understand that Senators overwhelmingly feel the embargo is counterproductive.

The embargo was imposed in 1991 on the former Yugoslavia as factions began warring with each other. Since then, the heavily armed Serbs have gained the upper hand, and many argue that continuing the ban mainly hurts the Bosnians.

The vote carried high stakes for Clinton because just three weeks ago, the House voted to require a unilateral American lifting of the embargo. Had the Senate voted similarly, Clinton might have been faced with casting his first veto.

Gunmen kill soccer player in Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) - Gunmen on Saturday killed the player who contributed to Colombia's World Cup elimination by inadvertently scoring a goal against his own team.

Andres Escobar, 27, was shot 12 times in a parking lot before dawn, according to radio reports quoting police.

"Thanks for the auto-goal," one of the gunmen said before shooting Escobar, an unidentified witness told a radio reporter.

Escobar had returned with his defeated team from the United States on Wednesday after being eliminated in the first round. Colombia had been a favorite to win the world championship.

After the team was eliminated, anonymous threats against the players and their coach began arriving at TV and radio stations.

Escobar had left a bar on the outskirts of Medellin, Colombia's second-largest city, and had gotten into his car when he was surrounded by three people, police said.

The three people began haranguing Escobar for his generally lackluster World Cup performance and for scoring a goal against his own team that led to Colombia's 2-1 defeat against the United States.

Escobar was then shot, police said. He was taken to a local hospital where he was pronounced dead.

Escobar was a highly regarded player, renowned for his clean and elegant style.

Medellin has been plagued by drug-related violence for years. Escobar was not related to Pablo Escobar, the kingpin of the Medellin cocaine cartel, who was killed by police last year.

Simpson hearing adjourns for weekend with mystery

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The whodunit became a whatist as attention in the O.J. Simpson murder case shifted to a mysterious sealed envelope turned over by defense lawyers.

Does the envelope contain the knife used to kill Simpson's ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman? Police have yet to find the murder weapon.

Legal experts had no clue why the defense felt compelled to hand over the envelope during Simpson's preliminary hearing Friday.

"I'm baffled," said Erwin Chemerinsky, a University of Southern California law professor. "If it is the knife, why wouldn't the defense want to disclose it? It would be a major embarrassment for the prosecution."

Defense lawyer Robert Shapiro laughed when asked, and said he wasn't going to reveal its contents.

Municipal Judge Kathleen

Kennedy-Powell ordered both sides to submit briefs on how they think the evidence should be handled, leaving the mystery unsolved until at least next week.

Gerald Chaleff, president of the Los Angeles County Bar, said if the envelope contains evidence exonerating Simpson, there would be no advantage for the defense to turn it over now.

"I'd take it over to a bank and put it in a safety deposit box for future use," Chaleff said. He said such evidence would be more useful at trial than at the preliminary hearing.

Simpson, 46, is charged with two counts of murder in the June 12 stabbing deaths. A preliminary hearing, which will determine whether prosecutors have enough evidence to put him on trial, began Thursday.

The hearing was abruptly recessed early Friday so prosecutors could listen to tape recordings of defense interviews with two key prosecution

witnesses - Simpson's house guest and a limousine driver - who may testify about Simpson's whereabouts around the time of the slayings.

The hearing will resume Tuesday after the holiday weekend.

The envelope mystery interrupted testimony from Ms. Simpson's neighbors about a dog's sorrowful wail and its bloody paws. Prosecutors used the testimony to attack Simpson's alibi and prove he had time to kill his ex-wife and Goldman and still catch a plane to Chicago.

Simpson's lawyers have said he was at home two miles away around 11 p.m., waiting for a limousine to the airport. The exact time of the killings has never been established publicly by authorities.

A photograph of the crime scene was shown to witnesses by Deputy District Attorney Marcia Clark, who first motioned to Ms. Simpson's relatives in the courtroom to bow their heads and avert their eyes.

Simpson blinked and took deep breaths as the photograph of his ex-wife's body, clad in a black halter dress, was displayed.

INS official accused of selling visas

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A top immigration official was accused of making as much as \$1 million by selling green cards for illegal immigrants.

Justice Department investigators said William Malcolm Tait bypassed normal Immigration and Naturalization Service controls since 1983 to

help a man obtain 15 of the residency visas to sell.

That man is now cooperating with authorities, the San Francisco Examiner reported Friday.

Tait allegedly made from \$300,000 to \$1 million in the scheme since 1983, the newspaper said.

Tait, 45, a deputy director at the INS office in San Francisco, was arrested Thursday in Dallas, where he was on temporary assignment.

Focus on Your City

At our next regularly scheduled City Commission meeting on July 11, one of the items on the agenda will be the approval of a new concept as far as Hereford is concerned.

"Neighborhood Planning for Parks" is a concept based on the assumption that parks, except for major parks, such as Dameron and Veterans, are utilized primarily by the residents of neighborhoods in which the parks are located.

Who better to decide how they would like the park to look and what equipment they would like in the park than the people who utilize the park on a regular basis?

One of the recurring problems that Hereford has suffered in recent years has been vandalism in our parks. I have made the statement publicly, with City Commission support, that we will not allow a few people to destroy the use of parks by the many.

While I'm on the subject of vandalism, I can't understand what enjoyment someone can get out of spreading graffiti, destroying playground equipment and throwing trash all over a park area.

For those who think this is a responsible way to act, they should step back a bit and take a real look at what they are doing, not only to their own self esteem but to the public in general.

Who can you be hurting but yourself and those around you who are your friends, neighbors and fellow citizens? It certainly doesn't make

you any bigger in the eyes of your friends and neighbors to be destructive and it can only lessen your own self esteem and value.

Enough about vandalism! Let's get on a more positive note. We need you help as we develop this neighborhood parks concept. In our planning session on July 13, which begins at 5 p.m. at City Hall, one of the items on the agenda will be to set the plan in motion for neighborhood involvement in the parks.

Let me encourage any and all of you who might have an interest in making our parks more beautiful or usable and in improving the quality of life of Hereford citizens to attend this planning session.

Our probable game plan will be to target the neighbors around a specific park and notify those people about a neighborhood meeting to gather input. We will do this park-by-park, or perhaps two parks are fairly close, we may do a couple at a time. We ask for and truly want your input.

I don't know how many of you have taken time to take a hard look at our parks, but I know some of you have for I have received several comments from citizens about how much improvements parks are showing and how much more attractive they are for Hereford.

If you haven't taken time to drive around and look at parks, let me suggest you do so, for what you will find is a lot of hard work by our park employees to put our parks into better shape for you.

While we still have a long way to go in facilities and improvements, we are slowly making progress.

Moving to another subject, which certainly deserves a lot of accolades and appreciation -- Hereford Beautification Alliance is to be commended for the job members have done on Main Street and other areas of the city and, as usual, the Black House grounds are being kept in top shape by a Deaf Smith County committee.

These groups and individuals are helping make Hereford a more beautiful and quality place to live. You folks are really making a difference in our city, and I want you to know how much I appreciate

Reno recommends court appointment for special counsel

WASHINGTON (AP) - Whitewater special counsel Robert B. Fiske Jr. should be given a court appointment to increase his independence from the executive branch as he continues his investigation of President Clinton, says Attorney General Janet Reno.

Reno on Friday urged a special panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit to reappoint Fiske under a new law that revived the position of independent counsel.

She had named Fiske in January as a special counsel in the Justice

Department to investigate the failed Little Rock, Ark.-based Madison Guaranty Savings & Loan, the Whitewater Development Corp. and related investments of the president and his wife, Hillary, when Clinton was governor of Arkansas.

She acknowledged at the time that

the independence of anyone she appointed would be questioned because she is a part of the administration. However, the authority for the courts to appoint an independent counsel or prosecutor had expired in December 1992 because of Republican discontent with the prolonged investigation of the Iran-Contra affair.

Reno relented after Clinton urged appointment of a special counsel amid growing congressional demands for a public investigation of Whitewater.

Meantime, Congress renewed the

independent prosecutor law, and the president signed it on Thursday.

The new independent counsel statute provides only for criminal jurisdiction. Reno's appointment gave Fiske civil jurisdiction as well, and she said this status should continue.

Reno's letter was criticized by Sen. Lauch Faircloth, R-N.C., who said Fiske, a Republican former prosecutor from New York, too closely tied to present and former administration officials to be independent.

Fiske issued his first findings on Thursday, reaffirming that the death

of deputy White House counsel Vincent Foster was a suicide not connected to the Whitewater case.

Talk show fans get 24-hour cable channel just for them

FORT LEE, N.J. (AP) - The American fascination with television talk shows reaches its logical culmination on the Fourth of July, when America's Talking, a 24-hour all-talk, cable TV network, opens for business.

"Three months ago, there was literally nothing here," said Beth Tilson, the network's senior programmer. She held a picture of a vast, dark, gutted interior space with GE, NBC and CNBC executives in the foreground.

Today, that space has become two sleek, fully equipped television studios, waiting only for the cameras, technicians and studio audiences to inhabit them.

That happens at 7 a.m. EDT on Independence Day, when America's Talking goes live, beaming its shows into roughly 10 million cable homes nationwide.

"At-a.m.," the in-house name for the morning show that changes its name every day, will begin life as "America's Talking: July 4, 1994," with hosts Steve Doocy (former host of syndication's "House Party") and Kai Kim, formerly of WTNH in New Haven, Conn.

There's other, less conventional talk fare:

-- The charmingly titled "Am I Nuts?," which features psychologists helping ordinary people cope with the extraordinary stresses of everyday life.

-- Fledgling talk show host Bill McCuddy, who won a nationwide talent search, who will open his celebrity-driven "Break A Leg" show at 2 p.m. daily.

-- E. Jean Carroll, an Elle magazine columnist and Hunter Thompson biographer, who'll offer "Ask E. Jean," an advice show about love and life in the '90s.

-- "Pork," a show about how government performs, ingeniously named by CNBC President Roger Ailes, the Republican political operative and, most recently, executive producer of "The Rush Limbaugh Show." Ailes is host of his own prime-time, one-on-one interview show, "Straight Forward."

-- Brian O'Connor, better known for his role as Schemer on PBS' "Shining Time Station," who will host "Bugged," a forum for audience members and viewers to sound off.

Repeats air from 11 p.m. until 3

a.m., when infomercials take over. Tilson said America's Talking has solved the logistical problem of getting live audiences out into the wilds of Fort Lee.

America's Talking already is boasting that it is "the first real two-way talk television network" because of its deal with Prodigy, the on-line computer service, for a significant "interactive" component.

All 12 America's Talking shows will incorporate on-line bulletin boards, electronic mail, polling and "chat" features later this summer.

In fact, America's Talking shows will have the use of a "Prodigy vehicle," a sleek, fire-engine red 1957 Chevrolet convertible with a computer terminal instead of a steering wheel.

The Prodigy vehicle will roll from show to show and, in its "chat" mode, will allow "real time" communication between on-line viewers and America's Talking.

So what will America's Talking have to say?

"We're standing away from the dysfunctional," Tilson said.

WHAT'S A FAIR PRICE

Most sellers want to get the most they can when selling their property, and most buyers want to buy for as little as possible. 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

U.S. last refuge... for homosexuals

The Clinton Administration last week set a new immigration policy allowing preferential political asylum in the United States of immigrants claiming to be homosexuals persecuted in their countries. I strongly oppose this new policy based entirely on sexual preference. Carving out new legal rights for homosexuals under the guise of political asylum puts anyone claiming to be homosexual in line ahead of the 130,000 refugees squeezing into America each year.

U.S. Attorney Janet Reno said there are several cases now pending before immigration judges claiming political asylum for homosexuals. Asylum requests have been filed with U.S. officials by homosexuals from China, Romania, Columbia, Peru, Nicaragua and Pakistan.

I have previously expressed a great deal of concern over the abuse of political asylum by illegal immigrants to delay deportation hearings. In our region, border patrol agents tell me how groups of illegals they arrest actually have claims for asylum already in hand--often identical written photocopies.

Anyone who cannot find any other way to leave a country can now weigh the stigma of claiming they are homosexual against the fact that they are leaving their country anyway with a virtual guarantee they can stay in the U.S.

The United States has long recognized asylum based on religious persecution. Now, the Clinton Administration's attorney general has set a new U.S. policy based on homosexual preference. In her policy order, Reno reasoned that homosexuals are persecuted, "because of membership in a social group."

After now ruling that homosexuals are a protected social group in immigration law, is the Clinton Administration moving closer to formally including sexual preference as a protected civil right? It is certainly a new direction to classify sexual preference as a social status.

With slaughter in Bosnia, massacres in Rwanda, and tired and poor huddled masses worldwide, the Clinton Administration's special policy for homosexuals will displace refugees in the already crowded rickety refugee boats seeking the protection of American shores.

Once again, in another questionable foreign policy area, the Clinton Ship of State has sprung another leak.

Tactics, not views, hurt abortion foes

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court majority that upheld protective buffer zones around abortion clinics said the case had nothing to do with the views of anti-abortion protesters. It was their tactics that did them in.

The ruling Thursday deflated the anti-abortion movement's chief argument against curbs on its protests and also against a new law that makes it a federal crime to block access to abortion clinics.

In a 6-3 decision, the high court said it was constitutional for authorities to enforce a 36-foot buffer zone around a Melbourne, Fla., clinic to protect patients and staff from threats, noise, physical interference and other forms of harassment.

"There is no suggestion in this record that Florida law would not equally restrain similar conduct directed at a target having nothing to do with abortion; none of the restrictions imposed by the court were directed at the contents of petitioner's message," said Chief Justice William Rehnquist, writing for the majority.

Abortion opponents have used tactics ranging from bombing and arson to kidnapping, death threats and assaults. One doctor who performed abortions, David Gunn, was killed by an anti-abortion protester.

Yet some in the anti-abortion movement continue to maintain they are being victimized for their views rather than their tactics.

As the ruling was released Thursday, on the last day of the court's term, the anti-abortion American Life League was appealing a federal judge's decision that the clinic-access act was unconstitutional.

League president Judie Brown said the law was not viewpoint-neutral, as the judge ruled, but intended "solely to prevent pro-life activities near

The men who signed the Declara-

tion of Independence were not afraid to get involved. They literally put their lives on the line for what they believed in -- literally that God had given them certain rights and they were going to make sure they had those rights at any cost.

Today we give our rights over to the government and follow every dictate and mandate like a bunch of sheep, assuming that, if the government says to do it, it must be right.

There were 56 men who signed the Declaration of Independence. Of those signers, seven died before the end of the Revolutionary War that was fought to bring about their dream.

Among the dead was Thomas Lynch Jr., who died at sea in 1779. He was the second youngest of the signers, being only 30 when he died.

Seems like that is a level of commitment to a cause that we no longer have in this country -- one that needs to be resurrected if we are ever to regain the greatness we once had.

Unfortunately in this age of materialism and self-centeredness, I don't know if we can reclaim that selflessness.

And if we don't, I don't know what future our country has.

Morales files suit against firm doing mobile mammograms

AUSTIN (AP) - Attorney General Dan Morales has filed a lawsuit alleging that thousands of women were subjected to improper and illegal mammograms at a mobile service that operated in Texas and New Mexico.

The suit filed Friday in a Travis County District Court accuses Midland-based Transamerican Diagnostic Services of allowing unqualified people perform X-ray screenings, according to a news release from the attorney general's office.

The lawsuit also cites safety standard violations that could have resulted in "dangerous and uncontrolled exposure to ionizing radiation of patients and employees of Transamerican," the release said.

"We are concerned about the improper diagnosis of breast cancer and the absence of diagnosis in thousands of women across Texas and New Mexico," Morales said.

Transamerican traveled across Texas and New Mexico from 1991 to 1993 providing diagnostic mammography services in parking lots of hospitals and businesses, the AG's office said.

Transamerican's chief executive officer and radiation safety officer, Rick Fleetwood, refuted the state's allegations.

"It's the big boy after the little boy is all it amounts to," he said Friday. "Everything they said, there is no substantiation to that whatsoever."

Fleetwood, a defendant in the suit, said that women who were tested "absolutely" got quality service.

The health department's Bureau

of Radiation Control determined that Transamerican did not have a physician interpreting mammographic films after Oct. 26, 1993, according to the news release.

But they do agree that more corporate advertising money is aimed at luring Hispanic business.

First named storm of year heading north

MIAMI (AP) - Tropical Storm Alberto churned in the Gulf of Mexico Saturday and headed toward Louisiana, where forecasters worried it could land during the busy Fourth of July holiday.

"There's going to be a lot of people going to the coast," said Max Mayfield of the National Hurricane Center. "By Saturday night and Sunday morning, people are going to have to pay real close attention in the Gulf of Mexico."

A tropical storm watch was in effect today for the Gulf Coast from Sabine Pass, Texas, to Pensacola, Fla.

Alberto, the first named storm of the hurricane season, began as a tropical depression that dumped 10 inches of rain Thursday on Cuba.

By 5 a.m. EDT today, it was centered at 24.8 north latitude, 87.6 west longitude, about 390 miles south-southeast of New Orleans, and was moving north-northwest at around 8 mph.

The storm carried winds of about 40 mph - just 1 mph above the threshold where a tropical depression becomes a named tropical storm.

It would become a hurricane if sustained winds reached 74 mph. But forecasters said it was too early to tell if that would happen.

"It could gain some strength," said Lixion Avila of the National Hurricane Center.

A's pull into third place with win over Red Sox

Look who's in third place! It's the once-dreadful, now-fearsome Oakland Athletics.

A full 67 days after they dropped into last place, the A's pulled themselves out of the AL West cellar Friday night with their eighth straight victory, 6-3 over the Boston Red Sox.

"We had dug ourselves into such a hole that we had to play for two months before we could get out of it," Oakland manager Tony La Russa said.

"We just want to keep creeping. We want to keep winning our games."

Now, only four games separate the first-place Texas Rangers and the A's, who have won 14 of 16 since June 13, when their record was 19-43 and they were 13 games out of first place.

Boston, meanwhile, has lost 20 of 27.

The visiting A's got eight strong innings from Ron Darling (6-9) on Friday and scored five runs in the first inning against Tim VanEgmond (0-2).

After the game, the Red Sox traded slumping reliever Jeff Russell to Cleveland for pitchers Chris Nabholz and Steve Farr.

In other games, Baltimore outslugged California 14-7, Seattle edged New York 4-3, Cleveland beat Minnesota 6-1, Chicago blanked Milwaukee 8-0, Kansas City defeated Toronto 4-3 in 12 innings and Texas swept a doubleheader from Detroit, 10-6 and 8-6.

Orioles 14, Angels 7

At Baltimore, the two teams tied a major-league record by combining

for 11 home runs.

"That was a very poorly pitched game," California manager Marcel Lachemann said. "You've got 3-0 counts, 2-0 counts, deep counts. When that happens, you're going to get whacked."

Jeffrey Hammonds hit two homers for Baltimore and Mike Mussina (12-4) got the victory despite giving up five home runs in five innings.

"That was probably Jay's best catch ever," said Griffey, who went 2-for-5.

Astros' GM sets cancer surgery

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston Astros general manager Bob Watson announced Friday that he has prostate cancer and will have the gland removed next Wednesday in St. Louis.

Watson, 48, said the cancer was discovered following a prostate specific antigen blood test by his personal physician, Dr. Michael Feltovich.

"It's not all bad news," Watson said at a news conference just before the Astros played the Cubs Friday night. "I feel very, very blessed that it was found early in a routine exam."

Watson will have the surgery performed by Dr. William Catalona in St. Louis. He will remain hospitalized for about five days and then return to Houston and recuperate for another five days.

Watson will resume a limited work schedule after that with a recovery period estimated at 30 days.

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Williams hits 30th homer to lead Giants over Expos

While the baseball world has been watching Ken Griffey Jr. rack up home runs for most of the season, Matt Williams is starting to open some eyes himself.

The San Francisco third baseman became the first National League batter to reach the 30-home run plateau this year with a blast that helped the Giants beat Montreal 14-7 Friday night.

That gave Williams seven home runs in 10 games and put him on pace to tie Roger Maris' season record of 61. Williams, who broke the NL mark for most home runs before July with 29, is now second in the majors to Griffey's 32 with Seattle.

Griffey, meanwhile, has cooled off lately. He is homerless in six straight games and hasn't hit one out since June 24.

Williams wasn't impressed with his own accomplishments.

"Really, as far as I'm concerned, 30 homers doesn't mean a thing at this point, because we aren't in first place," he said.

Elsewhere in the NL, it was Cincinnati 4, Pittsburgh 2; Florida 4, Atlanta 3 in 11 innings; Chicago 3, Houston 2; St. Louis 11, Colorado 4; New York 10, San Diego 7; and Philadelphia 3, Los Angeles 0.

Williams had three other hits along with his 30th homer and knocked in

five runs as the Giants used a seven-run second to beat the Expos. Williams did his damage in the first six innings before leaving with a minor hip strain.

"It was a big night for Matt, and an even bigger night for John Patterson," Giants manager Dusty Baker said.

Patterson, a reserve second baseman, went 4-for-5 with two doubles, three runs scored and three RBIs. His only out would have been a home run, if not for left fielder Lou Frazier's fence-scaling catch of his first-inning fly ball.

Rich Monteleone (2-2) pitched four innings of scoreless middle relief to get the victory. Gil Heredia (4-3) was the loser.

Reds 4, Pirates 2

John Roper remained unbeaten this season, stopping Pittsburgh's eight-game home winning streak by pitching out of early trouble for Cincinnati.

Roper (5-0) pitched out of jams in the first two innings, then settled down to allow only solo homers by Orlando Merced and Andy Van Slyke as the Reds won for the ninth time in his 10 appearances. Jeff Brantley got two outs for his ninth save.

Thomas Howard's run-scoring double and Hal Morris' RBI single keyed a two-run fifth inning against Paul Wagner (5-6) as the Reds twice

Cubs 3, Astros 2

Rookie Steve Trachsel allowed six hits in 8 1-3 innings and kept his perfect road record intact for Chicago at Houston.

Trachsel (7-5) improved his road record to 6-0, striking out six and walking two. Trachsel got one-out relief help in the ninth from Randy Myers, who finished for his 17th save despite giving up an RBI double to Luis Gonzalez. Myers stranded runners at second and third with two outs as the Cubs won for the eighth time in 12 games.

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
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
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Locksmith comes to rescue of Ranger fans

ARLINGTON, Texas - The good news at The Ballpark in Arlington is that there is someone who comes through in a pinch every game.

Unfortunately, he doesn't come out of the bullpen, but out of Section 138 of the Texas Rangers' stadium. That's where the ballpark's locksmith sits, ready to rescue any fan who is too concerned about ERAs and RBIs to remember the K-E-Y-S.

"At the old stadium, we were getting all sorts of people who were locking their keys in their cars," said Jay Miller, the Texas Rangers' director of customer relations.

"We didn't feel good that they went to the fan relations office at the stadium, and we couldn't do anything for them."

The Rangers had a security guard at Arlington Stadium who was handy with a "slim jim" - a device used to open locked cars. But newer cars are more difficult to open unless you're a professional, and Rangers' officials didn't want the guard to mar people's cars.

So at the beginning of this season, Miller phoned Arlington locksmith Zack Whitley to see whether he would attend all of the games. In exchange for being at the beck-and-call of the absent-minded, Whitley received two season tickets

and a parking pass.

"I told them I was interested, but that I couldn't make all the games," said Whitley, owner of Whitley Key & Lock. "But I told them I'd work something out."

Whitley called fellow locksmith Michael Lemmon to help cover the season's 81 home games. The two plus four others from Lemmon's shop, Michael's Keys, rotate the games. They are at the ballpark before the first pitch and stay for about an hour after the last out.

"I think the most one of the guys has done at one game is three cars," Whitley said. "Michael did one game when he didn't open any."

Robert Schrubb, the locksmith on duty for a recent game between the Rangers and the New York Yankees, wasn't so lucky. When he arrived at the fan relations office, two people were already waiting for him.

Schrubb got a description, license plate number and location for each vehicle. He sometimes asks the car owner to ride along. But if he has a couple of jobs, he'll unlock the car by himself and bring the keys back to the office.

Tuesday, Schrubb drove first to a parking lot to unlock a Dodge Shadow. Within a minute, he was in the car.

While he waited for the owner to arrive, the crowd began to roar.

"Am I going to miss a good game?" he asked.

Kevin Skipper showed up a short time later to get the keys and write a check to Schrubb. The fee was \$25, about \$10 to \$20 less than the locksmith company usually charges.

"I figured since I was in the season coupon lot, they'd call a locksmith for me," Skipper said. "I was surprised they had one working here. Good thinking on the club's part."

Skipper also gave a scoring update: 2-2 in the first inning. Just then there's another roar. "I'm missing a good game," Schrubb said sadly.

He then pointed his Honda to a business office parking lot southeast of the ballpark. Schrubb quickly located a Pontiac Sunbird with the keys dangling from the ignition. Just as he finished saying, "This isn't going to be as easy," Schrubb unlocked the door.

When Schrubb tried to get back into his original parking lot, he was told it was now full. But the parking lot attendant recognized him.

"You're the locksmith guy," she said.

He was directed to another parking lot and walked back to the fan relations office. From the office radio, Mark Holtz reported the

Rangers were ahead, 6-2, in the second inning.

He left the Pontiac's keys at the office. But before he could sit down, he was asked to unlock a security guard's car. By the time Schrubb got to his seat to enjoy a hot dog and a Coke, it was the bottom of the third inning and the score was 8-2.

In the meantime, James Weston, who owns the Pontiac, retrieved his keys.

"I thought I'd have to wait 'til midnight for a locksmith," said Weston of nearby Haltom City, Texas. "This makes the ballpark all the better to come to."

Most of the services needed at the ballpark such as plumbing and electrical work are handled by staff members. The park also has folks who fix elevators and escalators under a service contract, but they don't get season tickets.

A group of four doctors received free season tickets to help out in case of a medical emergency. But as Mar Stolley, director of ballpark operations, pointed out, the locksmith is more vital.

"The nurses who work here handle most of the medical cases, and if we made an announcement for a doctor, we'd have more than enough doctors," Stolley said.

"Is there a locksmith in the house?"

Austin police check for protective orders against gun buyers

AUSTIN AP - Austin police have expanded the federally mandated background checks on handgun purchasers to include additional checking to see whether would-be gun purchasers are bound by protective orders.

Protective orders are common in domestic violence cases to bar an abusive spouse from having contact with his or her victim. A violation can result in jail time and/or a fine.

The federal Brady law requires local law enforcement officials to do background checks on people who want to purchase a handgun. If a person wanting to purchase a handgun has a criminal history, the gun store owner is prohibited from making the sale.

Police Chief Elizabeth Watson said Friday that Austin police conducting those checks also will look to see whether a would-be buyer is restricted by a protective order. That information will then be passed on to the gun store owners.

Gun shop owners can still legally make the sale, but those contacted Friday by the Austin American-Statesman said they would not.

"I have no problem with that," said Jim Kent, owner of Cost Plus 10 Gun Shop. "We're not here to sell something to someone who might hurt somebody."

Another owner, Joe McBride of McBride's, also said he would likely refuse sale of a gun to someone bound by a protective order.

"At that point, it would put the monkey squarely on our backs," he said. "That puts us in a hard position. An individual is qualified (to purchase a gun) under the law, but we're having to make that determination."

McBride said the prospect of civil liability of such a sale would weigh heavily.

Travis County Constable Bruce Elfant said he asked the Austin chief to include protective orders as part of the Brady law checks after learning about a case involving a University of Texas assistant professor placed under a protective order after his wife accused him of threatening her.

The assistant professor attempted to purchase a gun after the order had been issued, Elfant said.

The gun store employees completed the Brady law checks, found no criminal history and called the assistant professor's house to tell him he could come by the store and pick up the weapon.

The man's wife answered the telephone and was able to persuade the store not to sell the man a gun,

Elfant said.

"That was a situation where knowing about the protective order in advance would have helped the gun store owner," the constable said. "I think we'll probably save some lives with this. It's one small way we can make a difference."

Diane Rhodes, shelter director for the Battered Women's Center in Austin, praised the change.

"I think it will certainly give (victims) some peace of mind," Rhodes said. "Often we have clients who feel a protective order is just a piece of paper. This is something that should improve their confidence level."

Opposition to the additional checking came from the National Rifle Association and the local chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

ACLU staff attorney Deborah Gilman said she is concerned that Watson may be overstepping her boundaries as a police officer by providing the additional information and urging gun store owners to deny applications on the grounds of a protective order.

"She has no legislative powers," Ms. Gilman said. Store owners may feel pressured to follow the Police Department's wishes, she said.

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


Hutchison, Gramm plan state base tour

WASHINGTON (AP) - Their attention already fixed on next year's round of base closings, Texas Sens. Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison will tour some of the state's biggest military installations next week.

Mrs. Hutchison announced the tour Friday during a breakfast session with Texas reporters. The two Republicans will take advantage of Congress' week-long Fourth of July recess to make a two-day whirlwind tour of 10 installations.

They will meet with base commanders to discuss each facility's functions as well as the competition that might be faced during the next round of base closings.

"The base closing commission will come knocking on the front door of all these bases in 1995 asking 'What is your mission and why is it valuable?'" said Gramm's press secretary, Larry Neal. "We are really trying to think ahead and evaluate the missions and facilities and personnel

on the bases so we can make the best case possible when the knock on the door comes."

Texas emerged largely unscathed from the 1993 round, but early on found itself in a defensive position when several bases were placed on the list for closure consideration by the independent Base Closure and Realignment Commission.

Gramm and Mrs. Hutchison, who serves on the Senate Armed Services Committee, met last week with then-commission chairman James Courter to discuss his views of the Texas bases. Courter has since resigned as chairman.

"The Texas bases are very well-positioned because we are efficient, we have unique functions," Mrs. Hutchison said. "I think we're going to be in good shape."

While she expects several Texas defense installations will be placed on the potential closure list next year, she predicted that they would survive the commission's intense scrutiny. "I think there's a chance we wouldn't lose any or that the losses would be very slight."

Mrs. Hutchison declined to name any bases that are potentially in trouble. But she said that Fort Bliss in El Paso and Fort Hood in Killeen are "so strong and so unique that they would never be on anybody's list."

On Wednesday, Gramm and Mrs. Hutchison will visit Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, Dyess AFB in Abilene, Reese AFB in Lubbock, Laughlin AFB in Del Rio and Fort Bliss.

The next day, they start at Randolph AFB in San Antonio, where they will meet with the commanders of all the military installations in that city and also visit Fort Sam Houston and Kelly AFB. Then, it's on to Fort Hood. The tour ends at the Corpus Christi Naval Air Station, where the senators will also meet with the commanders of the Corpus Christi Army Depot, Naval Station Ingleside and Kingsville Naval Air Station.

Before starting the trip with Mrs. Hutchison, Gramm will visit Goodfellow AFB in San Angelo on Tuesday. Friday, he will tour the Red River Army Depot near Texarkana.

Fisher issues debate challenge to Hutchison at press meeting

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - Democratic Senate candidate Richard Fisher on Friday denied Republican allegations that he tried to get around federal campaign contribution limits and challenged opponent Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison to eight debates.

Fisher, a Dallas businessman, told the Texas Press Association convention the contribution complaint was "pure politics" and "character assassination."

"This past week, Kay Hutchison and her cronies have renewed their attempts to ruin my campaign, to ruin my fundraising efforts and discourage my race against the status quo that is in place in Washington," Fisher said.

"We're not discussing issues. She won't talk about her own vision. We don't have a productive dialogue because all they're doing is lobbing grenades, and I think it's time that we stopped," he said.

Fisher called for eight or more debates in big and small cities around the state, beginning as soon as possible, because he said Mrs. Hutchison was avoiding him.

Mrs. Hutchison had been scheduled to appear with him at the press convention, Fisher said, but he learned last week that the schedule was changed because she had a conflict.

Mrs. Hutchison is scheduled to address the press group Saturday.

"Texas needs a dialogue, a discussion on the issues between the candidates for the Senate, and I'm here to tell you I think it's time Kay stopped hiding behind her handlers and her henchmen and her manipulators," Fisher said.

Mrs. Hutchison spokesman David Beckwith said the candidate already has set aside Oct. 21 and Oct. 27 to debate Fisher.

"You can tell when a candidate believes he's hopelessly behind. He invariably starts demanding a whole bunch of debates," Beckwith said.

"Challenging your opponent to debate is the cry of the loser. There will be debates, but on a mutually agreed-upon timetable, and not because he challenges us."

On Wednesday, the National Republican Senatorial Committee filed a complaint with the FEC charging that Fisher is seeking to bypass the \$1,000 limit on individual contributions per election by soliciting contributions for past campaign debts. The complaint is based on a Wednesday fund-raiser in Dallas for Fisher.

Fisher said Friday that he had broken no rules.

"That very committee, by the way, has been found guilty of the things they're accusing me of doing in the past, of bundling money and so on. We are not doing that. We're following FEC guidelines," Fisher said.

"Remember, this is raw politics, this is avoiding a discussion of the issues, this is character assassination," he said.

Spokesmen for the National Republican Senatorial Committee did not immediately return a telephone call from The Associated Press.

Fisher also urged those attending the convention to force the Senate race onto a higher plane by making the candidates stick to the issues.

"We have so many problems we must address in our society. Please hold my feet and my opponent's feet to the fire. Make us discuss the issues. Force us to deal with what concerns you and your communities," he said.




Gardening at the Gazebo

By CARMEN FLOOD

So many of you ask those of us who work at the Black House Gardens about our roses and how we treat them, we decided to devote an entire column of "GARDENING AT THE GAZEBO" to an explanation of our Roses and the care they receive.

Rose-growers have a phenomenal treasure at their disposal. The genus Rosa includes about one hundred and fifty wild species, and cultivars which go back so far that their classification is impossible to ascertain exactly. The garden rose in Europe and America is young beside the forms of Asia, where roses were cultivated at least five thousand years ago.

Of the different types of rose available in this country, nearly all can be grown in this area. Whether it be Hybrid Tea which generally produces large flowers with high centers on long stems. Grandifloras which are large and showy. Floribundas, offering many small roses in clusters, and on to miniature roses, climbing and shrub roses, varieties of each type may

happily find a home in any garden in this area. It was thought for many years that roses needed to be planted in beds by themselves, away from other perennials, but today, we realize that they may be beautifully set off when surrounded by other plants, though you must find ones with compatible needs. For instance, roses must have at least 4 to 6 hours of sun daily if they are to bloom and do well, so that eliminates companion plants that are happier in the shade. They also require a rich soil where the drainage is excellent and space to breath, as they are threatened by powdery mildew if air circulation is inadequate.

In a past article, we explained the process of properly pruning roses in the early spring, so today, we will deal with the correct care and feeding of roses in summer. Kathryn Ruga is our designated rose care person, and we present to you her feed and spray program.

Roses do need to be fed on a regular schedule to replace the nutrients they take from the soil. There

are many products on the market for this, and currently we are using Fertiloma Rose Food with systemic insecticide. Kathryn recommends following the directions on the container for the amount to be used and the application method of sprinkling around the base of each plant and working it into the soil lightly. At this time about 1/4 cup of iron is also applied and worked in. Then all is watered well. This is done once a month, beginning when new growth appears in the spring and continuing through the summer. Stop feeding in late August to prevent new growth which might not be able to harden off before early frosts.

Though most of the gardening books claim that black spot fungus is only a problem in humid areas, we experience it here as well, so Kathryn sprays the roses every two weeks in summer as a preventive measure. Currently she is using Ortho insect and disease control Formula III the first spraying each month and two weeks later she uses Fertiloma fungicide with Benomyl, alternating the two every two weeks through the summer. Hose end sprayers that deliver a fine mist are used, carefully following the directions on the packages. Both upper and lower leaf surfaces are covered as well as the soil surrounding the plant. Kathryn cautions, "PLEASE, PLEASE remember that if not used properly and in accordance with the package directions, these chemicals can be hazardous to people, animals and to the environment." It is of utmost concern that these and all chemicals be used and disposed of correctly. Lovely roses should be enjoyed in good health.

So now all that remains is to cut and enjoy roses in your home. Always cut roses in early morning when the moisture level is the highest. Use a sharp pruner or knife to make the cut, leaving at least two sets of five leaflets on the stem so that new flowers will develop. Remove any leaves or thorns that will be below the water level in the vase, and a floral preservative may be added if you wish to make the blooms last longer.

The rose is, more than any other, the flower of romance. The combination of beauty and fragrance acts irresistibly upon our sentiments to weave a spell to which countless rose gardens large and small in all parts of the world attest. Whether they be modern hybrids of astounding beauty or old varieties recovered from abandoned homesteads whose durability and heady fragrance enchant the heart of the gardener, we know with doubt that the rose and its cultivation is part of the future of the Black House Gardens, our own individual gardens, and we hope, your garden as well.

How your lawn helps you

-Produces oxygen. A lawn measuring 50 feet by 50 feet creates enough oxygen to meet the breathing need of a family of four.

-Reduces allergic reactions and cuts down on insect bites.

-Has a cooling effect. When street and sidewalk temperatures exceed 100 degrees F., the surface of the lawn remains a cool 75 degrees F.

-Increases your property value. A well-managed landscape can boost the selling price of a home by as much as 15 percent, realtors believe.

-Provides erosion control. A healthy root system and a thick, absorbent blanket of grass reduce run-off.

-Offers a place for family recreation, and a refuge for fun and relaxation.

Here are some hints to help you get that perfect lawn:

1. Mow at the proper height for the type of turfgrass you have.

2. Water properly. Experts recommend watering heavily once or twice a week which helps grass develop a strong deep root system to resist stress. Water in the morning so the grass can dry throughout the day. This helps prevent fungus infestations.

3. Keep insect damage under control. Inspect the lawn for pests often. Look out for brown patchy spots, or root systems so weak you can tug out the turfgrass easily.

4. Watch out for weeds. To keep crabgrass and other grassy weeds from wreaking your lawn, use a weed prevention product containing a pre-emergent herbicide. One simple springtime application prevents grassy weeds from coming up all summer. Because you apply only once, it's less expensive and time-consuming than battling weeds after they appear with post-emergent products

Getting in the swim of things? A pool or spa can mean hours of enjoyment shared with friends and family members if you use your safety sense, say experts at the National Swimming Pool Safety Committee (NSPCS).

The old adage, "look before you leap," is as valid as ever. Many recreational swimmers are seriously injured each year as a result of diving into shallow areas of lakes, ponds, streams or swimming pools. The typical victim of a diving accident is a young male, between the ages of 13-33.

Here are some safety tips that can help you stay in the swim of things safely, from NSPCS's "Operation Water Watch" national education program to prevent diving accidents:

- Never dive into the shallow end of a pool or into an above-ground pool.

- Do not drink and dive. Statistically, more than 50 percent of all diving accidents involve alcohol.

- Check the depth of the water before you dive.

- Steer your body up when entering the water.

- Always check the water for submerged objects.

Learning how to dive properly is as important as learning how to swim. For proper diving instruction, contact your local YMCA, Red Cross or area schools.

First thing first...A zillion thanks to all those who helped out with the Summer Reading Program this past Tuesday. We had a bunch of kids and a particularly challenging project (and the project leader was called out of town suddenly), but, thanks to the help of parents, day-care leaders, other adults, and older kids, we got through it!

Cowboys and Indians! What an image that stirs in our mind, I'm mostly created by Hollywood, I'm afraid, but this week is cowboy and Indian week on the new book shelf.

Leading the list is *Children of the First Man* by James Alexander Thom.

Thom's novel about Chief Tecumseh, *Panther in the Sky*, won awards, but he is best remembered (at this library anyway) for *Follow The River*, a novel based on the true story of a woman captured by the Shawnee. His current release intertwines history and legend to recreate the 700-year journey of the mysterious white Indian tribe through the American continent. If this lives up to what Thom has produced in the past, this book will be in demand.

Another popular western author is Dana Fuller Ross, the pseudonym of a prolific writer who has written hundreds of works-fiction, non-fiction, adult and juvenile--under a hateful of names. *Westward!* is the first of "The Frontier Trilogy" and relates the "incredible beginning of America's favorite pioneer saga." The Holts are drawn into a blood feud and forced to strike out into territory seen by few white men. Using their fighting

prowess, they survive to found an American dynasty.

While the fiction shelf offers a few titles, this weeks non-fiction shelf is dominated by the American West. Along with the "common" works detailing the opening of the West, or Native American are a few "uncommon" books.

Owning Western History is a guide to collecting rare documents, letters, and autographs from the Old West.

The Last Cowboy reports the "twilight era of the horseback cowhand" circa 1900-1940.

And there are a couple dealing with clothes. *100 Years of Western Wear* is an interesting book to look at--lots of color pictures. The author starts out talking about "authentic" cowboy wear, but most of the copy is about the Wild West Show/Hollywood type. Some of these outfits would make Roy and Dale look like "American Gothic."

Authentic Costumes and Characters of the Wild West portrays the clothing of everyone from Indians to prospectors to ladies of ill repute. The book reflects thorough research and would be an invaluable guide to anyone interested in period clothing.

Also of interest, but not of the Western type, is *The Agenda* by Bob Woodward. Subtitled "Inside the Clinton White House," the book reflects a side of the President and First Family not frequently seen by the public.

- unconsciousness or cardiac arrest



Consumers should be very aware of food safety precautions during the summer when outdoor activities such as picnics, campouts and cookouts are popular.

Often these activities involve food. Unfortunately, the incidence of foodborne illness also seems to rise during these months. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best at warm weather temperatures, specifically at "danger zone temperatures" between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

Foods that are most perishable are called "red flag" foods. They are moist protein-containing foods such as poultry, meats, eggs, milk products, seafood, cream pies and custards. Red flag items also include such foods as fried chicken and hard-cooked or deviled eggs — foods that are sometimes misunderstood as being non-perishable.

It's important to follow the "hot food-cold food rule" for perishable foods. "Keep hot foods hot (over 140 degrees) and cold foods cold (below 40 degrees)." The combination of these foods plus temperatures in the danger zone spell trouble.

Prevention of foodborne illness starts with the planning of the menu. Do not include "red flag" foods unless you can keep them either "hot" or "cold." If refrigeration is needed, but

not available, foods can be packed in an ice chest. It's important not to pack the ice chest too full and use adequate ice or ice packs to keep the foods at 40 degrees. Use shallow containers so food will stay chilled throughout. Also, keep the ice chest in the shade.

Some foods do not require refrigeration until opened and may be better items to take on a picnic. These include canned meats, peanut butter and jelly, breads, crackers, cereal and nut mixes. Dried and fresh fruits are another option.

Plan to eat as soon as possible after you arrive at the picnic site. Store any leftovers promptly and properly, or throw them away. It is best to carry only what you plan to eat. Don't leave foods out for more than two hours. In hot summer temperatures, one hour is a better rule to follow.

If you pick up deli or fast food items, either pick them up immediately before the event and eat as soon as you

arrive, or buy them the night before and refrigerate.

Cleanliness is very important to prevent the spread of bacteria. Avoid handling foods more than necessary. Never handle raw foods and cooked foods together. Do not reuse any utensils that touched raw food without washing them.

Spread a clean tablecloth on the table before serving the food. Use disposables since adequate hand-washing or dish-washing facilities may not be available. Use these items only once, then throw them away.


The bed rooms comprise the remainder of this one story plan. There are two nice bed rooms on





Worldwide cotton production drops

WASHINGTON (AP) - World production of cotton in the 1993-94 season is estimated at 76 million bales, 6.8 million less than in the previous season and 8 million below estimated consumption.

A new report by the Agriculture Department's Foreign Agriculture Service also said the U.S. share of world cotton trade had risen slightly, inching up from 19.6 percent in 1992-93 to an estimated 21 percent this season. The cotton marketing year runs from August through July.

Lower global production figures reflect losses of a quarter-million bales due to bollworm infestation in China and Paraguay and overly high production estimates for Iran, the report said. Crop estimates increased

in Australia, Turkey and Benin to reflect better harvesting conditions.

World cotton prices continue to rise dramatically. The so-called Cotlook A Index averaged 86 cents per pound during May, compared with 58 cents in June 1993.

The 1993-94 forecast for domestic consumption is 10.3 million bales, with exports forecast at 7 million bales and domestic ending stocks estimated to be 3.6 million bales, the report said.

The U.S. share of world trade was 26 percent during calendar 1993, rising 35 percent from 1992 figures to 7 million bales more than any other cotton-producing country. U.S. exports this season have been boosted by production declines in several

major producing countries.

But world cotton trade overall may expand this season because of increased consumption in areas in the former Soviet Union, and in parts of Asia, principally South Korea, Japan and China.

"Anticipated cotton shortages in major cotton-producing countries, such as China, India and Pakistan are expected for the 1994-95 crop year," the report said.

The United States has exported more than 442,000 bales of cotton to China this season, accounting for a projected 75 percent of that country's cotton consumption. The report attributed the U.S. market share in China to reduced cotton availabilities from India and Pakistan.

"The outlook for U.S. cotton exports to China next year is promising as China will likely need to import significant amounts of cotton in the next few years to make up for an imbalance between cotton supply and demand," said the report.

World cotton production for 1994-95 is forecast up 10 percent from this year's estimate, at 84 million bales. The United States' cotton production is expected to increase by 1.55 million bales to 17.7 million bales, a growth of 9.6 percent.

The report forecast domestic consumption in calendar 1994 at 10.5 million bales, exports at 7 million bales and ending stocks at 3.9 million bales.

Feedyard honored at meeting

A Guymon, Okla., feedyard manager, Dee Follis, has been recognized by the Texas Cattle Feeders Association with the first TCFA Environmental Stewardship Award.

The award was announced at the association's summer meeting in Ruidoso, N.M.

Follis is manager of Texas County Feed Yard, Inc., at Guymon.

Among environmental stewardship practices in place at the feedyard are vegetative filter strips, installed shortly after the facility was built in 1965.

"These filter strips provide wildlife habitat for pheasants, quail, ducks and song birds," Follis said, "and they prevent erosion while filtering the water that drains into our retention facility."

Migrating waterfowl stop at a fresh water fish pond, as well as six retention ponds. As much as possible, the retention water is recycled as irrigation water.

To conserve energy, the feedyard conducts annual maintenance on steam boilers in the feedmill, resulting in a 20 percent reduction in natural gas consumption.

Hereford youth to exhibit animals at Angus show

A trio of youth from Hereford will exhibit cattle at the 1994 National Junior Angus Show in Des Moines, Iowa, July 12-16.

Moriah Olson, Joanna Olson and Sy Olson are among more than 600 young Angus breeders from 33 states entering the show. A total of 1,288 animals will be judged.

Sy Olson also has entered cattle in the Junior Angus Show carcass

contest. Premiums worth more than \$4,000 will be awarded winners chosen from a field of 52 animals, entered by 45 young Angus breeders.

The Olsons are junior members of the American Angus Association, headquartered in St. Joseph, Mo.

The '94 junior show will be held at the Iowa State Fairgrounds. A beef cookoff, public speaking contest and other contests are planned, also.

Whoopi's wake-up call launches ABC's AIDS special



Barbara Walters is host of "In a New Light," an ABC special on Saturday. The two-hour program, which includes a statement from President Clinton, is the focal point of the unprecedented "A National Night Against AIDS" highlighted by viewing parties in cities across the nation.

Just moments after ABC's "In a New Light" opens, actress Whoopi Goldberg throws everything she has into a wake-up call for parents across America.

"Many of you have no idea, but there is a major catastrophe already heading our way. Worldwide, half of all new HIV infections are in people ages 15-24. Do you know what that means?" she asks with an angry little chuckle.

"Hundreds of thousands of teenagers alive today may never live to see 30. This is not fiction. This is fact, and it's told to us by people who know about these things."

"Do you want to see the year 2000?" she asks rhetorically. "You want your kids to see the year 2000? Talk to them about AIDS. You'd BETTER tell them how to protect themselves, and you'd better do it now. 'Cause, honey, tomorrow is too late."

As host Barbara Walters points out in the third annual special, which airs Saturday, July 9, "We are now living in the future that was predicted for us over 10 years ago, when researchers and activists begged for attention to be brought to AIDS."

The bureaucratic lack of response to those pleas has cost a high price for the young participants in Youthwave, peers who travel into the nation's schools to relate how they themselves were infected with HIV as teenagers. The same refrain — "I was sure it couldn't happen to me" — runs throughout their stories.

"Maybe we need to re-evaluate what's cool and what isn't cool," says an 18-year-old, who contracted the virus at 13 during his very first sexual experience. "For me, I don't think it's cool that I have to sit in here and talk about what it's like for me to live with a life-threatening disease."

"The thing that is most important," adds a 22-year-old diagnosed with HIV when she was 16, "is to be able to give something to young people so that they can make the best possible decision."

That decision for some people involves sexual abstinence, says Dr. Ruth Westheimer, familiar to millions of radio and TV audiences as sex expert "Dr. Ruth." Westheimer says since she believes each person has to be responsible for his or her own sexual behavior, she wants them to have complete information so they can make intelligent choices.

Part of that common goal to share information is behind "A National Night Against AIDS," which will include viewing parties in many cities around the nation Saturday night. While the parties can be organized anywhere there is a television and space for an audience to gather, the sponsors of the project, a loose coalition of AIDS organizations, urge the participants to "register" their parties with local AIDS agencies to make sure each party receives supplementary materials and community support.

Hard Rock Cafes will serve as national "flagship parties" as well, serving as fund-raisers for local chapters of the Design Industries Foundation Fighting AIDS (DIFFA).

ABC's special ends with a plea from Walters for audiences to shake off boredom and apathy about HIV disease. "AIDS is not a fad," she says. "It is not the disease of the year. It's the disease of the century and, for the most part, preventable. If each and every one of us doesn't face the facts head on, we will have lost millions more men and women tragically — and, even worse, unnecessarily."



Wondering about 'Tales of the City' brouhaha?
Get the videotapes and judge for yourself

When the TV adaptation of Armistead Maupin's "Tales of the City" aired in England last year, high-school students were assigned to watch it and senior citizens stopped its cast members in the street to compliment them.

When it aired in the United States last January on PBS, several affiliates refused to air it at all; others carried only a "pixelated" version that blocked out the brief nudity, and some members of Congress screamed long and loud that punitive measures should be taken against the network.

Now, thanks to the recent video release by Polygram Video, viewers who either missed the miniseries, or saw only the "visually impaired" version, have a chance to see the production as its creative team intended. And, except for the chronically uptight, "Tales" is an unalloyed delight.

For those unfamiliar with Maupin's addictive series of books, "Tales of the City" follows Mary Ann Singleton (Laura Linney) through the San

Francisco of the 1970s. Newly relocated from Cleveland, Mary Ann swiftly meets colorful characters such as her pot-growing landlady, Anna Madrigal (Olympia Dukakis); neighbor Mona Ramsey (Chloe Webb from "China Beach") and her gay roommate, Michael Tolliver (English actor Marcus D'Amico); and handsome ne'er-do-well Brian Hawkins (Paul Gross, recently seen in "Due South"). Since it's a period piece set before AIDS and political correctness, the storyline includes sex and drug use in purely recreational contexts, yet never gratuitously. Most poignantly, the principal love story involves two senior citizens: Mrs. Madrigal and Edgar Halcyon (Donald Moffat), Mary Ann's boss who is secretly dying.

The six-hour miniseries is on three videocassettes, available separately for less than \$20 each. After renting it, be prepared to ponder making the purchase: The rich performances and ebullient tone of "Tales" are just about irresistible. Treat yourself.






After college, Cousins packed his bags and moved to Mexico to try his hand at painting. After eight months he decided that maybe acting wasn't so bad after all and headed for New York.
