## Personal income on increase here

\$17,910 per capita on last report

Per capita income in Deaf Smith County has increased by 46.5 percent--from \$12,226 to \$17,910--in the last five-year reporting period, according to figures released by the Department of Commerce.

The rise in income from 1987 to 1992 was at a greater rate than that of per capita income for Texas and the nation. This is a bright note since Deaf Smith County has been historically lower than the state and national figures.

During this same period, per capita income in Texas increased by 32.1 percent to \$18,437, while the nationwide rate was 28.6 percent or \$20,105.

Total personal income in the county was \$236,986,000 in 1987, and had increased to \$336,146,000 by 1992. That represented a 41.8 percent increase, compared to 40.6 percent for Texas and 35.3 percent for the U.S.

## Morales calls on foe to resign judge's post

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas Attorney General Dan Morales says Republican challenger Don Wittig, a state judge, has received more than half his political donations from lawyers with cases pending in his Houston court.

The Democratic incumbent said in a Friday interview with The Associated Press that if Wittig wants to stay in the race, he should resign his judicial post.

Wittig called the idea "ridiculous."

"I don't think it's appropriate for a judge to take money from lawyers who have cases in his court when he's trying to run for something else," Morales said. "I think that what the public sees is a judge shaking down the lawyers in his courtroom, and I really don't believe that Texans like that sort of thing going on."

"I believe that the judicial code of ethics require that Judge Wittig resign if he wants to continue this campaign," he said.

Wittig said he has violated no ethical rules.

"I have never received one dollar of contributions when I had a decision pending," Wittig said. He said he didn't know the "exact figures" on his contributions from lawyers who practice before his court.

Wittig added that he got lawyers' approval as the preferred candidate in a Houston bar poll.

"I think this is the cry of a scared professional politician," Wittig said. "I think it's shameless of him."

He also criticized Morales, saying the incumbent has received contributions from law firms that receive money from the state for assisting on cases.

Morales' campaign spokesman Mary Elizabeth Jackson said those law firms generally are chosen by state agencies, although Morales' office approves them. She also said their selection has nothing to do with any donations.



## HJH students learn of news industry, write paper in new journalism class

Earlier this month, students at Hereford Junior High had the opportunity to plunk down 15 cents and pick up the city's latest journalistic effort, thanks to a new class being offered this year for the first time.

Suzanne Allen took on responsibility for a new journalism class at the junior high this year, shepherding 14 eighth graders through the beginning intricacies of writing, ethics, avoiding libel, page layout and other things.

Allen, who has been at HJH since she moved from Stanton Junior High seven years ago when the school merged with La Plata Junior High, said she was asked to take the class by principal Marilyn Leisure.

"I didn't have to go and recruit" students to enroll in the third period class, she said.

When the school year began, Allen looked at one way to teach the elements of journalism that are required by the state.

"I thought a school paper would be fun," she said, and it would help teach such things as editing copy, gathering information, understanding the elements of news, identifying types of audiences, distinguishing fact from opinion and principles of balancing contrast and variety in layout.

Those items are taken directly from the Texas Essential Elements for the course.

Armed with a textbook and computer program, Allen and her charges compiled information for their first issue of HJH Bull '94 hit the stands on Sept. 16.

It featured a cover story by Jessica Ramey on the city's new aquatic

center and one by Eileen Castilla on homework.

Inside, Mickey Briones contributed a piece on the school's Junior Historians club. In addition, there were junior high football schedules, lunch menus and profiles of teachers and staff members.

Allen said the addition of the journalism class and other junior high elective courses is a function of the school's transition to academic teaming, in which core courses -- English, science, math and history -- are connected by "teams" of teachers who teach their own courses to the same groups of students.

Having more electives from which to choose, she said, is "a good opportunity for the students to experience different things, more diverse opportunities than they would

have had."

Terry Stephens is one of the students in the class.

He said he signed up for journalism because "I'm interested in it."

Allen said the school's gifted and talented class put together a newspaper a couple of years ago, but it was not continued. This year's offering is the first time that the junior high has had a newspaper actually written by a journalism class.

"I really hope by the end of the year when we compare their first paper with their last paper, there'll be a great deal of difference," she said.

Allen said she would like to continue teaching journalism to the junior high students.

"I don't see why we couldn't," she said, as long as there is student interest in the program.

## Houston nurse says she won record Lotto

HOUSTON (AP) - A 64-year-old registered nurse says she's holding the only winning ticket from Wednesday's \$41.7 million Texas Lotto drawing.

Lottery officials wouldn't confirm Friday that Jean Graham of Houston was the big winner.

But she says she picked the winning numbers - 7, 10, 16, 17, 23 and 47 - in Wednesday's drawing by picking family members' birthdays and the number of years she has been

Information regarding transfer payments is obtained from interagency government reports. According to the Department of Commerce, 75 percent of information regarding transfer payments on a local level come from direct reports while the remainder is estimated on what it refers to as "indirect, but generally reliable data."

married, minus one. Mrs. Graham says she isn't too worried about how to spend her loot. She's more concerned about collecting it.

"I'm thinking, 'Am I going to live to collect? I am so excited!'" she said.

If she does have the winning numbers, Mrs. Graham's \$41.7 million would be the largest amount for one person since the game began nearly two years ago. The previous record was \$41.5 million, paid to Houston bus driver Wanda Wilson after the Feb. 23 drawing.

But lottery officials must first confirm that Mrs. Graham purchased the winning ticket, which must be brought to the Austin Lotto office before officials will verify the winner's identity.

Lottery spokesman Keith Elkins said Friday that someone in Houston passed preliminary procedures for ticket verification, but wouldn't identify the person.

If she is the big winner, Mrs. Graham might be the luckiest Lotto player yet. She says she also picked five of six numbers correctly on a second ticket. That ticket, along with 300 others purchased for the drawing, is worth \$1,722.

The grandmother of five said she plans to split her winnings with her daughter from Houston and a son in Minnesota. The three had a previous agreement that they would split the money evenly if any ever won.

"We can still count on winning the Minnesota lottery," Mrs. Graham said.

### LOS ANGELES (AP)

It was a news conference from the bench as Judge Lance Ito hurled legal thunderbolts in the form of threats to blind TV's courtroom eye on the eve of the most-watched murder trial in American history.

Ito spoke scathingly Friday of a TV news report on the O.J. Simpson case that he said was flat-out wrong and irresponsible.

"I am contemplating terminating the media coverage in this case," said Ito, who put media lawyers on notice that he will hold a hearing on the matter next week. He has the authority to bar broadcasts from his courtroom.

Ito also ruled that the prosecution can use most of the evidence seized in a search of Simpson's car and mansion, including videos and a note from ex-wife Nicole Brown Simpson breaking off nearly all contact.

That was a blow to the defense, which wanted the evidence thrown out on the grounds it was beyond the scope of the search warrant.

Ito's ire was directed at all broadcasters, not just KNBC-TV, court spokeswoman Marcia Skolnick said later. NBC's Los Angeles affiliate reported Wednesday that DNA testing found Ms. Simpson's blood on socks at Simpson's mansion.

Simpson, 47, is charged with murder in the June 12 stabbing death of Ms. Simpson and her friend,

The department also said that all documents from outside laboratories conducting tests will now be sent directly to Ito, and Ito alone will decide who sees them.

The world was already watching as Ito voiced his displeasure. All open court proceedings in the case have been broadcast live across the country. In the past, Ito has mentioned the possibility of imposing a gag order on everyone involved in the case.

"The judge has the ultimate pulpit to send his message," said Douglas Mirell, an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer. "He's trying to use this as a sword to remedy an out-of-court problem."

## Cattle spill in Dallas creates unique chase

DALLAS (AP) - About 100 head of cattle spilled from an overturned truck won't rank among the stampedes of Texas legend.

However, the early morning spill on a downtown expressway Friday probably entered the oral traditions of thousands of Dallas rush-hour motorists.

A mounted sheriff's posse, armed with lassos instead of guns, rode through yards, streets and parking lots in and near downtown throughout the morning in an urban cattle roundup rare for Dallas.

The cattle truck went out of control and overturned about 4 a.m. near the merge of Interstate 35 and Interstate 30, said Sgt. Jeff Teurman of the Dallas County Sheriff's Department.

Driver Dallas Farrar, 25, of Mounds, Okla., apparently maneuvered into the wrong lane at the intersection, then lost control by overcompensating when he tried to change lanes, Teurman said.

"He didn't slow down. And traveling about 55 mph, the load shifted and the weight of the load

simply caused the trailer to overturn," said Sgt. Jim Chandler, Dallas police spokesman, told The Dallas Morning News.

The vehicle toppled, sending 110 cattle sprawling into the highway. Sixteen cattle were killed in the truck, another two were hit by cars, and the rest escaped, Teurman said. The driver was not injured.

Authorities had captured all but about 14 cattle by Friday night, a sheriff's dispatcher said. Farrar was treated at the scene for minor injuries, Chandler said.

Rush-hour traffic was snarled as authorities closed off eastbound Interstate 30 for about half a mile from 4 a.m. until noon.

The livestock roamed miles from the accident scene. Some were spotted near a downtown hospital. Others wandered into Fair Park, home of the State Fair of Texas.

Sheriff's deputies cornered one animal at the Music Hall at Fair Park. The frightened beast crashed through an 8-by-6-foot plate glass window, skittered through the building, then jumped through another window before authorities lassoed it to the ground.

"As they were about to apprehend the cow, the cow started running left and then right real fast and hit his nose up against the glass, then took a few steps back and just dove through," said Tony Jackson, chief of security for the music hall, who was standing inside the building when the frightened animal made its entry.

"She came through the window just leaped right through it and then ran all the way through the music hall to the other entrance," said Jack Moore, music hall chef. "The first thing I thought was, I can see it on my buffet table."

"Only in Texas," said John O'Brien, chief engineer at the Music Hall.

The captured cattle were penned at a sheriff's station while an insurance agent for MTB Trucking Lines inspected them. The surviving cattle would be released to continue their journey from Toyavale, in southwest Texas, to Ashdown, Ark., Teurman said.

The cattle spill was the second in two months in Dallas. On Aug. 11, a trailer carrying 75 cattle overturned during rush hour on a highway north of the city. Eleven of the animals died; the others were captured.

## Ito denies defense motions, threatens to cut off cameras

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The judge in the O.J. Simpson case Friday angrily threatened to pull the plug on TV coverage of the trial, complaining of what he called erroneous news leaks.

Superior Court Judge Lance Ito said he would allow most of the evidence seized in a search of Simpson's car and mansion, including videos and note from his ex-wife breaking off nearly all contact with him.

The hearing began with Ito rebuking KNBC-TV for what he and the prosecution called an inaccurate report that DNA testing found Nicole Brown Simpson's blood on socks at Simpson's house.

"I am contemplating terminating the media coverage in this case," Ito said.

Later, court spokeswoman Marcia Skolnick said his remarks were directed at all broadcast media. The judge has the authority to ban television in his courtroom.

Ito scheduled a hearing for next week to decide on a broadcast ban.

The said the KNBC report could "pollute" the pool of prospective jurors.

"It is detrimental to Mr. Simpson's right to a fair trial and it is fundamentally unfair," he said. He said the report hurt the prosecution, too, because it may raise expectations

among prospective jurors that can't be met at trial:

The report was first broadcast on Wednesday and was repeated on Thursday after the judge first rebuked the station. KNBC said in a statement Friday that it would take up the issue directly with the judge, adding, "We share Judge Ito's concern that the facts of this case be reported accurately."

Deputy District Attorney Marcia Clark denied the prosecution was responsible for the leak and said she shared Ito's outrage.

Simpson's lawyers suggested the Police Department was the source of what defense attorney Robert Shapiro called "a deliberate, calculated and manipulated" effort to deprive Simpson of a fair trial. Police refused to comment.

The trial begins Monday with jury selection. Opening statements probably won't begin until November.

Simpson, 47, is charged with murder in the June 12 stabbing deaths of Ms. Simpson and her friend Ronald Goldman.

"Choking media coverage at this point will not end the flood of leaked information landing in the laps of reporters," said Reginald Stuart, president of the Society of Professional Journalists. "It would only hurt public confidence in the judicial

process in general and this highly visible case specifically."

Prosecutors won access to virtually everything they wanted, including a video of "Frogmen," a never-aired TV movie in which Simpson stars as a former Navy SEAL who turns to private security work.

Police said they seized the movie because they believed Simpson prepared for the role by learning how to kill with a knife.

The judge also allowed caps, shirts and photographs found in Simpson's bedroom as well as a note Ms. Simpson had given Simpson along with videos of their wedding and of the birth of their daughter.

Police said the note offered a possible motive for the slaying.

Ito also upheld the seizure of Simpson's Ford Bronco from a street outside his home. He has yet to rule on a challenge to later searches of the vehicle. The hearing on evidence is to resume Wednesday.

The only items Ito threw out from the June 28 search were Simpson's divorce papers, a notepad containing phone numbers and a video called "Ode to O.J." on Simpson's football career.

Defense attorney Gerald Uelman had claimed the search was overly broad, and therefore the evidence should not be allowed at trial. Ito said the seizure of the items was justified by officers' knowledge of details of the case.

## SEC to start 'T+3' trading in '95

A new Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) ruling scheduled to take effect June 1, 1995, could dramatically impact the way individual investors conduct their securities transactions.

Specifically, investors will have three business days, rather than the current five, to pay for securities purchases or to deliver certificates after a transaction. The rule is commonly referred to as "T+3," which stands for "trade date plus three days."

Ike Stevens, Hereford representative for Edward D. Jones & Co., says "T plus 3 is designed to help curb the risk in the securities market. Over the past 20 years, we've seen an incredible increase in the use of computerized trading as well as growth in the sheer volume on the New York Stock Exchange; yet, the business of paying for all those securities has remained basically the same."

Stevens adds that most other nations have already reduced their settlement periods to three days or

less. This new initiative will enable the U.S. to keep pace with technology, with the volume of trading and with other world markets.

The new ruling also means that investors will receive the proceeds from selling securities two days earlier. "Reinvestment dollars will be put to work more quickly than in the past," said Stevens.



While The Brand has made use of "spot" color for many years, the production of 4-color pictures is much more complicated. Color "separations" are required for the four colors, and the number of pages coming off the press is reduced for each color used.

Previously, it was necessary to send color photos to Amarillo for processing and for separations. Now we have a new electronic halftone computer that can produce the separations.

This new computer also prints our black-and-white photos direct from the negatives. A few readers have noticed the difference in our daily



photos, which we believe have generally improved.

While the 4-color photo is still expensive and has to be planned several days in advance, we are continuing to seek ways to better improve our product.

### Why not term limits?

Polls consistently show that more than 70 percent of the people of the United States favor limiting the terms of their elected officials. Thousands of individuals have worked tirelessly in their states to circulate petitions to place the measure on the ballot.

In 14 states, that effort has been successful. In each, voters have approved limiting terms of both their state and federal elected representatives. There is a good reason to limit terms. You need to look no further than the deeply entrenched members of Congress, some who were first elected when Harry Truman was President.

Those long-time office holders are a poison that is killing Congress. They have chaired certain House committees for so long that they have come to think of them as their own personal fiefdoms.

The American people rightly recognize that term limits is the antidote to that poison. It would clear the deadwood out of Congress and open the body to new ideas and actions. Many that battled in the term limit trenches knew that the professional politicians would resist every attempt to limit their stay in Washington. Those professional politicians now have a new ally.

Last week, President Clinton directed his solicitor general to file suit in his home state of Arkansas to have the term limit plan declared unconstitutional for U.S. senators and representatives. The argument is that the Constitution sets the requirements for serving in Congress and that a Constitutional Amendment is needed to change those requirements.

Of course, Clinton and the rest of the professional politicians know that such an amendment would never see the light of day on the floor of either the House or Senate, because both are controlled by the professional politicians who the measure tries to remove. It is an insult to the citizens of those states who have voted for term limits to have their own tax dollars turned against them in this way.

Next, the people in favor of term limits should use their other option. At the ballot box this November, they should exercise their power to immediately end the term of all the professional politicians who oppose term limits.

Have a good week and, remember, Election Day 1996 is less than 26 months away!

(P.S. Today (Sept. 25) is my mother's birthday. Happy Birthday Mom!)

Growing up in West Texas in the late '30s and early '40s was a bittersweet experience. In the years before World War II, there was no money, to speak of. Then, when the war came, people had money but there was a dearth of things to buy.

Our cars were held together with baling wire and the gas tanks rarely were full, especially with only an "A" ration sticker during "the war."

Because of the gasoline shortage, my parents moved the family (my younger sister and me) to the farm during the summertime. There was nothing about living on the farm that was fun or entertaining.

From my vantage point, it was a gross embarrassment even to think about inviting friends to spend a night. The necessary plumbing was about 50 feet from the house and the water faucet was about 75 yards from the back door.

Such primitive living conditions were the norm when my grandparents moved off the farm into town in the early '30s. But for their granddaughter a few years later, it was a choking experience.

The icebox -- requiring a 50-lb. chunk of ice -- was a curiosity to city-dwellers and the cookstove required coal to build up the required temperature for baking or cooking.

Kerosene lamps didn't put out much light for reading so we went to bed and got up with the sun. The most entertainment was putting old records on the Victrola and cranking it enough to play one at a time.

At least one summer, my father stayed in town during the week because he worked at a war plant under construction. My mother was left with watching the cattle and gardening, not to mention listening to her daughters' constant complaints.

Now, with the scene set, I must say that my mother grew up on that very farm, learned to cook on the stove and was co-opted often to help her father and brothers with cattle chores, some of which she could do better than anyone else.

By the time the war came along, though, one brother was in the service and another was employed in an airplane plant in California.

So, my mother would load us into the car nearly every morning and we

would check the cattle in the pastures, looking for signs of trouble. The worst thing that could happen was for a pink eye epidemic to get loose. That's what we watched for.

She could tell at a glance if a calf had pink eye. And, she kept her supply of medicinal powder handy. We sometimes caught a calf in the pasture and sometimes drove a cow and calf to the corral. Then, my mother filled a plain soda straw with the pink eye medicine and blew it into the eye.

My sister and I sat on the animal to hold it down. It was not comfortable, nor easy. But, I couldn't estimate how many calves we may have saved that summer.

Animals could be a trial.

Never seemed to fail that a special cow would drop a calf at the height of a blizzard.

The most vivid example of my mother's attention to the farm animals was not witnessed by me. I was off at college and my younger sisters (a second one had appeared on the scene by then) were still at home. The family was living on the farm, again, but in more modern circumstances.

A blizzard, preceded by one of those blue northerns, swooped down on the Texas Panhandle. A near white-out obscured vision for little more than a few yards.

My mother knew there was a cow in the herd whose calf could arrive at any minute. She bundled up and drove off -- for anyone else, it would have been a foolhardy mission -- in search of the cow and calf. Sure enough, she found the herd up against the fence and the cow in question standing over an inert form.

The cow didn't like it much, but my mother picked up the calf, barely alive, deposited it in the trunk of the car and began the drive -- only a couple miles -- back to the house but in weather that made the trip grueling.

The family legend is that the calf spent the next several days in the only bathtub in the house, my mother feeding the animal with a bottle and my sisters adopting a new pet.

Suffice to say, I never asked who cleaned up after the calf. All I ever needed to know was that it lived.

Emmitt would end that season by being named "Rookie of the Year." After being voted "Most Valuable Player" by the NFL, Emmitt still feels "There's so much more I need to accomplish. If you're satisfied, you're finished." With candor, detail and honesty, Emmitt discusses his famous

contract dispute with Jerry Jones and the transformation of the Cowboys into the two time Super Bowl champs. Emmitt also tells about Jimmy Johnson and his fellow team mates, and a few of his opponents around the league. You also get a look at Emmitt Smith off the football field and how he tried to give something back to the fans by helping those in need through the Emmitt Smith charities, which works to promote and aid programs striving to foster the development of children.



## Congressmen get earful from TSCRA spokesman

During a Congressional field hearing recently in Cleburne, Chaunce Thompson of Breckenridge, first vice president of TSCRA, testified at a hearing chaired by Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford, chairman of an agricultural subcommittee.

Also sitting in on the hearing were Reps. Pete Geren of Fort Worth, Chet Edwards of Waco and Joe Barton of Ennis, as well as several state officials.

## Teacher nominated for high FFA honor

Bob Wood of Adrian has been nominated to receive the Honorary American FFA Degree. He is the agricultural instructor and FFA adviser for Adrian High School.

Wood was nominated for the degree by the Texas FFA Association, and the nomination was approved by the National FFA board of directors at a recent meeting in Alexandria, Va.

The Honorary American FFA Degree is the highest honorary award presented by the FFA. Wood has been an agricultural education teacher in Adrian for 29 years.

Wood will attend the 67th National FFA Convention in Kansas City Nov. 10 through Nov. 12 to receive the degree, pending final approval by the student FFA delegates.

## Plainview man receives TAMU Agriculture Award

COLLEGE STATION - A Plainview man has been recognized for his role in the first Texas Agricultural Summit held last October at Texas A&M University.

John Anderson of Plainview is one of the first recipients of the Friend of Texas A&M Agriculture Award. He was chairman of the summit that drew more than 400 representatives from government, business, agricultural producers and other groups.

"We're pleased to recognize John as one of our first recipients," said Dr. Ed Hiler, vice chancellor and dean of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences. "His work in helping organize the summit means Texas agriculture and its leaders are better prepared to meet the food and fiber needs of the future."

The award was presented at the board meeting of High Plains Research Foundation recently in Lubbock. Anderson is vice chairman of the foundation.

Purpose of the hearing was to learn how the endangered species law is impacting farmers and ranchers in Texas and how the federal Department of Agriculture may be involved.

Thompson told the panel that TSCRA believes "the protection of endangered species is a legitimate and worthwhile function of society which can be achieved without driving Texas cattle producers out of business."

He said "things are going to get worse for ranchers, not better, unless something is done by Congress."

A issue currently is the U.S. Fish and Wildlife proposal that "critical habitat" be designated in 33 Central Texas counties to protect further the

golden-cheeked warbler under the endangered species law.

Thompson claimed that landowners in these counties already have been harmed financially since the warbler was declared endangered in 1990.

Under the law, federal agencies may deny access to federal programs if USF&W determines such activities might harm species and their habitat.

Include in criteria for warbler habitat is presence of Ashe juniper, also called cedar, with sloughing bark.

Thompson testified that ranchers must manage cedar to prevent fires that could threaten human beings, livestock, property, wildlife and other resources.

Because of recent listings of the jaguar, swift fox and Arkansas River shiner as species for federal protection, Thompson said many Texans are convinced that "the federal government is going for a big land grab in Texas."

The TSCRA officer asked for an amendment from Congress on the endangered species law, and he offered suggestions for improvements.

## Researcher studies beet diseases

Research at the Bushland Texas Agricultural Experiment Station may lead the way to better control of beet diseases and improvement of irrigation efficiency.

Dr. Charlie Rush, TAES plant pathologist, has reported that a new cultivar-irrigation study shows clearly which varieties are more disease tolerant.

Studies on two separate fields also show that excessive irrigation often will promote disease infestations that can hamper yields and quality.

Rush plans to harvest the two fields about Oct. 1. He has invited growers to visit the research station prior to harvest to look at the difference in growth among the various plots.

In the irrigation portion of the test, Rush said the research indicated more disease development with increased irrigation.

"We're trying to determine the optimum level of irrigation, the point at which loss from reduced tons is offset by better disease control," said Rush.

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## Rains prompt pecan producers to mount lookout for crop pests

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP)

- As rain continues across parts of Texas, pecan producers are on the lookout for detrimental pests, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Dr. George McEachern, Extension horticulturist at Texas A&M, said rain is a high-pressure time for producers because moisture increases the number of pecan pests.

"As the rain stops, so does the potential for pest problems," McEachern said. "Late August and September are considered to be rainy months, so the potential for damage is higher."

Dr. Thomas Fuchs, Extension entomologist in San Angelo, said in West Central Texas the hickory shuckworm and the pecan weevil have caused most of the pecan problems.

"When we don't get rain for a while, these pests get trapped under the soil because the ground is too hard for them to move around,"

Fuchs said. "However, when it starts to rain the soil gets moist and the insects quickly move out of the ground and into our pecans."

Fuchs said while most pecan producers know that September can be a difficult month for pests, many feel spraying with an insecticide isn't always the answer.

"This is not an unusual situation for pecan producers," he said. "Every year around this time it rains, and some producers prefer to just wait the weather out and hope for the best."

"We begin harvesting pecans in early November so we still have time," Fuchs said.

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by district Extension directors:

**PANHANDLE:** Soil moisture adequate to short. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Cotton maturing. Preparing land for fall planting. Irrigating cantaloupes. Cutting, baling hay. Spraying for pecan pests.

maturing. Baling hay. Cotton opening bolls.

**SOUTH PLAINS:** Soil moisture short to adequate. Pastures, ranges need moisture. Harvesting corn, peppers, cucumbers. Planting wheat. Sorghum maturing. Cotton opening bolls.

**ROLLING PLAINS:** Soil moisture short to adequate. Pastures, ranges in fair to good condition. Defoliating cotton. Planting wheat. Livestock in good condition; supplemental feeding continues.

**NORTH TEXAS:** Soil moisture surplus to short. Pastures, ranges in good condition. Harvesting corn, soybeans, cotton, peanuts, sorghum. Planting fall gardens, wheat, oats. Cutting hay.

**FAR WEST TEXAS:** Soil moisture short to adequate. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Cotton maturing. Preparing land for fall planting. Irrigating cantaloupes. Cutting, baling hay. Spraying for pecan pests.

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

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


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

**ORDINANCE NO. 1327**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, PROVIDING THAT THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, BE AMENDED BY ADDING SECTION 62-3 TO ARTICLE I, CHAPTER 62 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES AND ESTABLISHING "CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS"; DEFINING TERMS; CREATING OFFENSES FOR MINORS, PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF MINORS, AND BUSINESS ESTABLISHMENTS VIOLATING CURFEW REGULATIONS; PROVIDING DEFENSES; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT BY THE POLICE DEPARTMENT; PROVIDING FOR WAIVER BY THE MUNICIPAL COURT OF JURISDICTION OVER A MINOR WHEN REQUIRED UNDER THE TEXAS FAMILY CODE; PROVIDING FOR A REVIEW OF THIS ORDINANCE BY THE CITY MANAGER; PROVIDING A PENALTY NOT TO EXCEED \$500.00; PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE; PROVIDING A SEVERABILITY CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Hereford, Texas, has determined that there has been an increase in juvenile violence, juvenile gang activity, and crime by persons under the age of 17 years in the City of Hereford; and,

WHEREAS, persons under the age of 17 years are particularly susceptible by their lack of maturity and experience to participate in unlawful and gang related activities and to be victims of older perpetrators of crime; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Hereford has an obligation to provide for protection of minors from each other and from other persons, for the enforcement of parental control over and responsibility for children, for the protection of the general public, and for the reduction of the incidence of juvenile criminal activities; and,

WHEREAS, a curfew for those under the age of 17 years will be in the interest of the public health, safety, and general welfare and will help to attain the foregoing objectives and to diminish the undesirable impact of such conduct on the citizens of the City of Hereford;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

**Section 1: That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Hereford,**

Texas, is hereby amended by adding Section 62-3 to Article I, Chapter 62, which Section reads as follows:

**SEC. 62-3. CURFEW HOURS FOR MINORS.**

(a) **Definitions.** In this section:

(1) **CURFEW HOURS** means:

(A) 11:00 p.m. on any Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday until 6:00 a.m. of the following day; and

(B) 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m. on any Saturday or Sunday.

(2) **EMERGENCY** means an unforeseen combination of circumstances or the resulting state that calls for immediate action. The term includes, but is not limited to, a fire, a natural disaster, an automobile accident, or any situation requiring immediate action to prevent serious bodily injury or loss of life.

(3) **ESTABLISHMENT** means any privately owned place of business operated for a profit to which the public is invited, including but not limited to any place of amusement or entertainment.

(4) **GUARDIAN** means:

(A) a person who, under court order, is the guardian of the person of a minor; or

(B) a public or private agency with whom a minor has been placed by a court.

(5) **MINOR** means any person under 17 years of age.

(6) **OPERATOR** means any individual, firm, association, partnership, or corporation operating, managing, or conducting any establishment. The term includes the members or partners of an association or partnership and the officers of a corporation.

(7) **PARENT** means a person who is:

(A) a natural parent, adoptive parent, or step-parent of another person; or

(B) at least 18 years of age and authorized by a parent or guardian to have the care and custody of a minor.

(8) **PUBLIC PLACE** means any place to which the public or a substantial group of the public has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, and the common areas of schools, hospitals, apartment houses, office buildings, transport facilities, and shops.

(9) **REMAIN** means to:

(A) linger or stay; or

(B) fail to leave premises when requested to do so by a police officer or the owner, operator, or other person in control of the premises.

(10) **SERIOUS BODILY INJURY** means bodily injury that creates a substantial risk of death or that causes death, serious permanent disfigurement, or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

(b) **Offenses.**

(1) A minor commits an offense if he remains in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city during curfew hours.

(2) A parent or guardian of a minor commits an offense if he knowingly permits, or by insufficient control allows, the minor to remain in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city during curfew hours.

(3) The owner, operator, or any employee of an establishment commits an offense if he knowingly allows a minor to remain upon the premises of the establishment during curfew hours.

(c) **Defenses.**

(1) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (b) that the minor was:

(A) accompanied by the minor's parent or guardian;

(B) on an errand at the direction of the minor's parent or guardian, without any detour or stop;

(C) in a motor vehicle involved in interstate travel;

(D) engaged in an employment activity, or going to or returning home from an employment activity, without any detour or stop;

(E) involved in an emergency;

(F) on the sidewalk abutting the minor's residence or abutting the residence of a next door neighbor if the neighbor did not complain to the police department about the minor's presence;

(G) attending an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the city of Hereford, civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor, or going to or returning home from, without any detour or stop, an official school, religious, or other recreational activity supervised by adults and sponsored by the city of Hereford, a civic organization, or another similar entity that takes responsibility for the minor;

(H) exercising First Amendment rights protected by the United States Constitution, such as the free exercise of religion, freedom of speech, and the right of assembly; or

(I) married or had been married or had disabilities of minority removed in accordance with Chapter 31 of the Texas Family Code.

(2) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsection (b)(3) that the owner, operator, or employee of an establishment promptly notified the police department that a minor was present on the premises of the establishment during curfew hours and refused to leave.

(d) **Enforcement.**

Before taking any enforcement action under this section, a police officer shall ask the apparent offender's age and reason for being in the public place. The officer shall not issue a citation or make an arrest under this section unless the officer reasonably believes that an offense has occurred and that, based on any response and other circumstances, no defense in Subsection (c) is present.

(e) **Penalties.**

(1) A person who violates a provision of this chapter is guilty of a separate offense for each day

or part of a day during which the violation is committed, continued, or permitted. Each offense, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.

(2) When required by Section 51.08 of the Texas Family Code, as amended, the municipal court shall waive original jurisdiction over a minor who violates Subsection (b)(1) of this section and shall refer the minor to Deaf Smith County Juvenile Court.

**Section 2.** That within one year after the initial enforcement of this

Ordinance, the City Manager shall review this Ordinance and report and make recommendations to the City Commission concerning the effectiveness of and the continuing need for the Ordinance. The City Manager's report shall specifically include the following information:

(A) the practicality of enforcing the Ordinance and any problems with enforcement identified by the police department;

(B) the impact of the Ordinance on crime statistics;

(C) the number of persons successfully prosecuted for a violation of the Ordinance; and,

(D) the City's net cost of enforcing the Ordinance.

**Section 3.** The provisions of this Ordinance are intended to be severable. Should any phrase, clause, sentence, subsection or section hereof be found to be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such portion shall be severed without effect on the remainder of this Ordinance.

**Section 4.** That this Ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage and publication in accordance with the Charter of the City of Hereford, Texas.

The above and foregoing Ordinance was duly introduced on the motion of Commissioner

Griego, seconded by Commissioner Juarez, and was duly PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED by the City Commission on the 19th day of September, 1994.

# Cowboy tradition is brought out in poetry

ODESSA, Texas - The clink of metal spurs against a concrete floor provides an appropriate rhythm section for the poetry readings in Barn D at the Permian Basin Fair and Exposition this week.

Propped up on a wooden stool surrounded by haystacks, saddles and cowhides, Leon Autrey solemnly professes his love for his home in New Mexico, blue skies, an illegitimate child and the streets of Laredo.

"I think it's a calling," remarked Bettye Martin-McRae, clad in star-spangled western wear behind the Cowboy Poetry Association's booth. "The cowboy poet is the tradition of the cowboy brought out through poetry, singing and story."

The names of Autrey, Gil Prather, Curt Brummett, Jean Beth Prescott and Gary Prescott, who are scheduled for performances at the fair, won't be found on the heavy-play list of local country radio stations. But in the last 10 years, the poets and others like them have organized and are making appearances at fairs, speaking at banquets and even holding their own gatherings, such as the Cowboy Symposium in Lubbock last week and an annual gathering in Alpine.

"There's a movement moving across the land and across the world," said Martin-McRae, a Sweetwater storyteller with books about growing up on a ranch. "It's enjoying its highest popularity ever." Some of the stories are true, she said, and some sound true, with a slight twist - like the time Martin-McRae's father let a horse into the family's living room.

"Some of these old cowboys do some funny things," she said. "Being my daddy's girl and all, I try not to let the truth get in the way of a good story."

The crowd milling about the Cowboy Symposium exhibition is admittedly a "hard sell," she said, with fair visitors wandering in and out, sitting down to take a load off their feet before moving on to the midway outside.

"We find that some come back the next day," she said.

Brummett, symposium emcee, used to have a radio show in Maljamar, N.M., which featured many of the cowboy performers at the Permian Fair.

"It's not Hollywood. It's not Hee-Haw. And it's not the Grand Ole Opry," said Brummett, a storyteller wearing loafers instead of the traditional boots. "We write about real events, real horses and real women."

The majority of poets have rural backgrounds, he said, although in recent years there has been "a double handful of townfolks infiltrating the purists."

Each state appears to have its own style of poet depending on the culture, he explained. Nevada cowboys show more of the Basque influence, and those from California lean toward the vaquero style, he said. Colorado cowboys tuck their pants in their knee-high boots for the flashy "buckaroo look."

"I've worn my boots like that when I work," Brummett said. "But I don't wear 'em like that in town."

Brummett is one of the few poets who has gone "professional" - it pays a way yonder better than cowboyboying," he says.

He hollers up to the stage to see if Autrey wants a break yet. He lumbers up to the microphone and begins a tale about some bulls.

"Big Earl" Adams beckons a visitor over to where he has displayed T-shirts, books and cassettes featuring the Jose Brothers, aka Prather and fellow poet Clay Lindley.

Adams, who said he's the agent for three of the performers, said he jumped on the cowboy poetry bandwagon three years ago.

"I just want to be a part of the American cowboy scene," said Adams, who said he has a background in the country music business.

A woman sits down at his table and Autrey, resting after his performance, stands and removes his hat, igniting a smile of delight on Adams' face.

"This is a place where you can get hooked on that," he said.

Authentic cowboys are in demand, Adams said. Recently, Lindley appeared in the new Tommy Lee Jones western movie filmed near Alpine. Prather reportedly is working with author Robert James Waller on a new book of poetry.

Adams predicts the music eventually will be sold in record stores, and not during the symposiums as a way to pay for gas money.

"In 10 years, it's not going to be the best kept secret in the world," he said.

## Hereford rally falls short against Frenship

Though Frenship's offense came to Hereford with much fanfare, it was the Frenship defense that made two big fourth-quarter plays to preserve a 28-27 win over the Herd Friday night in Whiteface Stadium.

Hereford fell to 2-2 on the season, concluding the non-district portion of the schedule. Randall, which went to 4-0, with an 18-12 win over Levelland Friday, comes to Hereford for the District 1-4A opener Friday.

Frenship remains perfect at 4-0.

The first big defensive play came on a two-point conversion attempt by Hereford that would have put the Herd ahead with six minutes left in the game. After Hereford quarterback Michael Brown hit Ronald Torres for a 52-yard touchdown pass to pull within one point, the Tiger defense stuffed tailback Marquise Brown on a try for two points.

The second big play was Donnie Hart's interception of a Michael Brown pass with less than two minutes left in the game. Frenship converted two first downs, and Herd didn't get the ball back.

Frenship showed off its offensive prowess early, rolling up 206 yards on the way to a 21-6 lead at halftime. The Tiger defense wasn't bad either, holding the Herd to 96 yards in the half.

"When we came out, everybody thought we were intense, but we sagged off and stopped executing," said Michael Brown, the senior quarterback.

"We knew what to do," senior linebacker Jacob Lopez said, "and the

coaches did a good job of telling what to do. We just didn't execute, and it cost us those three TD's in the first half."

On their first possession, the Tigers went 50 yards in 12 plays, scoring on a four-yard pass to Brandon Mitchell from quarterback Chad Reynolds--the first of four TD passes for Reynolds.

On their second possession, the Tigers went 60 yards in only five plays. Reynolds found fullback Aaron Johnson wide open in the flat, and Johnson raced 31 yards for the score--the first of three TD catches for him. Eric Serna kicked all four of Frenship's extra points in the game.

The Tiger defense limited Hereford to six plays in its first two possessions. The sixth play was a spectacular interception by safety Ben Heller, who was beaten by Herd wideout Marc Haney but made a leaping, one-handed pick of Michael Brown's pass.

Hereford answered Frenship's 14-0 lead with its third possession. Haney slipped behind the coverage again, and this time the Tiger safety jumped early and missed. Haney caught the ball inside the Tiger five-yard line but slipped while trying to make a cut past the last man between him and the end zone.

The slip didn't matter. On the next play, Marquise Brown took a pitch and fell into the end zone. Terance High's extra point kick was blocked, leaving Frenship with a 14-6 lead with 10:51 left in the half.

Frenship came right back and went 73 yards in nine plays. Both big plays were Reynolds-to-Johnson passes: a 22-yarder to the Hereford 34, and a 16-yarder for the score.

That closed the first half scoring with 6:39 left, and Frenship went to the lockerroom with a 21-6 lead. The Herd came out of its lockerroom with a new attitude, but not a new strategy.

"We did a couple of things different, but not much," head coach Danny Haney said. "Essentially, our team responded to a gut-check."

Josh Gamboa, a senior offensive guard, echoed those words.

"We called a gut-check," Gamboa said. "You can't put your head down because you're down at the half. You don't put your head down 'til the game's over." Til the fourth quarter's over, we never quit. We just put our heads in the game. We made up our minds that if we don't play hard, we're not going to win this game."

The Whitefaces simply improved "their level of play, how they played, the things they did," Haney said. "We tried to stay with the game plan we started with, and it worked... We came back in the second half and executed and played hard, and we were able to shut them down."

Frenship took the second half kickoff, ran three plays, then punted. The Herd took over at its own 24, ran six plays and scored. After getting only four first downs in the entire first half, the Herd got first downs on four straight plays: a 29-yard run by Michael Brown, 12-yard pass from Brown to tight end Scott Parker, a 20-yard run by Marquise Brown and an eight-yard touchdown run by Marquise Brown.

Michael Brown found backup tight end Raymond Gonzales wide open in the end zone for a two-point conversion,

making it 21-14 with 8:09 left in the third quarter.

Frenship drove into Hereford territory, but Herd linebacker Armando Zambrano picked off Reynolds' pass at the Hereford 40. It was Reynolds' first interception in 75 passes this season.

Michael Brown got loose for a 24-yard run, and a 15-yard facemasking penalty was tacked onto the end, setting up Hereford at the Frenship 21. Three plays later, Marquise Brown had his third touchdown of the game on an 11-yard run. Terance High's kick tied the game, 21-21, with 4:37 left in the third quarter.

Frenship took the lead back early in the fourth quarter, going 63 yards in six plays. A 26-yard pass reception by Matt Davis on third down and 10 kept the drive alive for Johnson, who caught a 20-yard pass for the TD. The kick made it 28-21 with 9:02 to go.

The Herd answered by going 79 yards in six plays, most coming on the 52-yard touchdown catch-and-run by Torres. Michael Brown, rolling out to his left and under pressure, spotted Torres behind the Frenship defense and let go a slightly underthrown pass.

Torres danced along the sideline before and after the ball arrived, but he never stepped on the line. With the ball, he turned, cut around a Tiger safety and raced the final 25 yards into the end zone.

"I was keeping an eye on it (the sideline), making sure I stayed in," Torres said, adding that the man covering him bit on a fake, letting him behind the defense.

"I backpedaled. I was hoping Michael saw me. (After catching the ball) I saw the safety come along, so I cut it back, and I ran upfield."

Brown was decked on the play, long after he released the pass. The roughing-the-passer penalty was enforced on the extra point, helping Haney with his decision to go for the tie or the lead--with still 6:25 left in the game.

"I thought about kicking it," Haney said, "but when we got the penalty, roughing-the-passer, they put the ball on the yard-and-a-half line. When we got that, I said, 'We're going for it.'"

Marquise Brown took a pitch to the right but was met and tackled in the backfield by four Tiger defenders. Frenship held the lead at 28-27.

Hereford forced a Frenship punt with 5:21 left, but then was forced to punt with 3:55 left. Hereford stopped Frenship, which punted again, and the Herd took over at its own 22 with 1:59 left.

Michael Brown tried to find Torres deep again--it had worked earlier, and it had worked for the game-winner in the last game against Coronado--but Tiger safety Donnie Hart intercepted an underthrown pass at the Frenship 45-yard line.

"I saw Ronald," Michael Brown said. "Ronald had a step on his man. I tried to throw it up, but I lost all control on the ball. I threw up a duck and they got it."

Frenship ran for two first downs, then ran the clock out.

With the improvement in the second half, the Herd defense held Frenship to 378 total yards on offense--well below its average of 445 yards per game. Reynolds had averaged 220 yards passing per game, but he had 165 Friday. Hart came in

with 19 receptions for 428 yards and five touchdowns; he was virtually shut out with two catches for 20 yards (though Johnson took up the slack).

Randall, another pretty good offensive team, comes to Hereford Friday to start District 1-4A play. The

bad start against Frenship may help the Herd be ready for the Raiders, Gamboa said.

"If we're a really good team, we're going to learn from this experience. We'll learn from it," Gamboa said. "I don't think Frenship was a better

team than we were. We just came out half-cocked in the first half."

Michael Brown added that he sees the key to being good.

"If we execute, there's not a team we can't beat," he said. "When we get, I don't see anybody stopping us."



## Permian continues 30-year domination of Odessa High

*Moj DB: 'Stand back, nonbelievers'*

The first weekend of district play restored some normalcy to the high school football season. Most ranked teams avoided upsets and Odessa Permian extended its unbeaten streak over crosstown rival Odessa to 30 straight.

The weirdest game was one that wasn't even played. Class 5A's top-ranked Aldine MacArthur had to postpone until Saturday its district opener against Aldine Nimitz because of a power outage at Thorne Stadium.

Permian's Mike Nichols, who had two first-half interceptions and a 37-yard touchdown pass off a fake field goal.

Permian (2-2) remains unbeaten against OHS (4-1) since a 14-0 Bronchos victory 30 years ago.

The Panthers won on the field for the 14th straight time since a 1980 tie. OHS won on paper last year because Permian had to forfeit all district games for using an ineligible player.

Neither team could do much during a scoreless first quarter Friday night.

The second TD was the most devastating. It came with one second left in the half on a fake 54-yard field goal try when Nichols, the holder, threw a bomb to Shaggy Dewberry.

Permian's defense, which starts a sophomore and two juniors, held the Bronchos to 237 total yards.

"This was the most superior defensive effort I've seen in my nine years at Permian," said Randy Mayes, a longtime Permian assistant in his first year as the head coach.

The biggest 5A upset was No. 5 Irving Nimitz falling 33-14 to Arlington. The Colts capitalized on

four Nimitz fumbles and Ricky Brown's 128 rushing yards and two touchdowns.

"Everybody had written us off before the season had begun and I think our kids took exception to that," second-year Arlington coach Bill Keith said. "We've got a bunch of little kids that don't quit."

Another shocker was No. 8 Spring Westfield falling to 2-2 by losing 13-7 to Humble. Cobbe Davis ran for 190 yards on 22 carries and he scored on an 82-yard run.

Other, more predictable 5A teams included No. 2 Abilene Cooper rolling past Abilene 50-22, No. 3 Austin Westlake pounding Leander 49-7, No. 4 Deer Park defeating Conroe 14-12 and No. 6 Converse Judson downing San Marcos 38-9.

Also, No. 7 Mesquite blanked Garland Naaman Forest 44-0, No. 9 Grapevine beat Denton Ryan 21-12 and No. 10 Plano East got past Richardson Lake Highlands 21-17.

The only ranked 4A team to lose

was No. 9 Highland Park. Matt Rosamond ran for 182 yards and two touchdowns to lead No. 4 Sulphur Springs past the Scots 24-14.

Sixth-ranked Austin Reagan tied New Braunfels Canyon 14-14.

Top-ranked Stephenville blew past Dallas Jesuit 47-15, No. 2 Waxahachie crushed Wilmer-Hutchins 65-6 and No. 3 La Marque continued its blanket defense by silencing Nacogdoches 25-0.

All nine ranked teams in Class 3A that were in action Friday night won. Top-ranked Cuero was the lone exception as the Gobblers were to meet Marble Falls on Saturday.

Second-ranked Sealy was impressive with a 49-0 victory over Brookshire-Royal.

## Switzer answers questions about Cowboys' struggles

IRVING, Texas (AP) - It was a day Barry Switzer knew was coming.

He had been in enough collegiate football wars to know that no matter how good you are, mistakes can bring down a talented team.

"Humility is only seven days away," Switzer said.

So he sat there the day after his first NFL loss, ready for the storm. He was casually dressed in a golf shirt and slacks, and loafers with tassels. No socks.

The snipers started firing. The Dallas Cowboys hadn't lost a game since last Thanksgiving. They are two-time defending world champions. When you lose games in Dallas, people want to know why and you'd better have a good explanation.

Sorry doesn't get it.

Switzer explained that the 20-17 overtime loss to Detroit, which dropped Dallas to a 2-1 record, was pretty simple.

"We have the better team, but sometimes mistakes can even all that out," Switzer said.

Switzer mentioned three turnovers killed the team, which it did. But questioners wanted to know what had happened to the offense, which was struggling to score points.

He tried to defuse the situation with a little sidestep.

"Well, we need to score more touchdowns," Switzer said. "Maybe we need to get in the wishbone."

Laughs, but still not good enough.

Aren't you concerned?

"Yes, I'm concerned," Switzer said. "We need to get the ball downfield to our receivers. But my major concern is the mistakes we are making on offense."

Then Switzer was grilled about his time management and why the Cowboys let precious seconds drift away at the end of the first half.

The honeymoon is over in Dallas for Switzer. It took just one loss for strong questioning to begin of owner Jerry Jones' hand-picked replacement for Jimmy Johnson, who brought the team two Super Bowl rings.

After the grilling, Switzer was asked if professional football seemed like a good idea after five years retirement from his Oklahoma days.

"I'm still having fun," he said. "We're going to win a lot of games. We're in hell of a lot better shape than they were here last year at this time."

The Cowboys started 1-2 last year when Jones miscalculated in his contract dealings with Emmitt Smith. After two losses, Jones caved in and gave Smith what he wanted.

But Switzer's style and substance still draws close scrutiny.

## Oilers facing crisis once more

HOUSTON (AP) - It's finally beginning to sound and look like the Houston Oilers again.

Their pre-season was uncharacteristically harmonious and all it got them was an 0-3 start going into Sunday's game in the Astrodome against the Cincinnati Bengals, also 0-3.

Now the old crisis-driven Oilers are back.

The assistant head coach and defensive coordinators have had words, the defense is accusing the offense of non-support and there is general unrest on a team that last year won 11 games in a row calling itself "Team Turmoil."

"This is the most important game in the history of the Houston Oilers," excitable cornerback Cris Dishman said. "Because of where this team is, it's bigger than the AFL title game of 1960 (won by the Oilers)."

Winning has often followed their most distracting incidents. The Oilers can't explain it, but they seem to thrive on distractions.

"Sometimes this team seems to play better with controversy," wide receiver Ernest Givins said. "Well, if controversy will bring us together and get us going, then I'm ready for some controversy."

Givins got his wish.

Although not as publicized as last season, when former defensive coordinator Buddy Ryan punched offensive coordinator Kevin Gilbride on the sidelines, Gilbride and new defensive coordinator Jeff Fisher also had a halftime verbal skirmish during the game against the Dallas Cowboys.

The coaches admitted there was talk about why the Oilers offense didn't run out the final seconds of the clock - the same type of incident that inspired Ryan to go after Gilbride last year.

Both coaches admitted they discussed the situation, but declined to elaborate.

The offense vs. defense battle continued after the Oilers forced Buffalo to win last week with five field goals, 15-7. Then the defenders attacked the offense for its futility.

Dishman started an emotional postgame assault of the offense, which has had problems scoring points with backup quarterback Bucky Richardson subbing for injured Cody Carlson.

Gilbride, the assistant head coach in charge of offense, has been getting heat this season because of the sluggish start; for trying to include a tight end; for occasional two-back sets; and for keeping the basic run-and-shoot alignment.

"We're in a growth process with a lot of new players in key spots, including a young, developing quarterback who started the last two games," Gilbride said.

Owner Bud Adams wondered why the Oilers' No. 1 draft choices of the past two seasons weren't contributing more.

"Last week we played well against the run," Shula said. "Unfortunately, they were able to throw the ball for over 300 yards. So, we're plugging holes, but we still have others that are leaking."

The Bengals are the only team in the NFL without a sack this season.

Cincinnati coach Dave Shula is wary of the Oilers' apparent disorganization.

The Oilers were 1-4 when they defeated New England last year to break a three-game losing streak. Their second victim was Cincinnati.

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# Ex-Permian players look back on 'Lights' book

 ODESSA, Texas - Jerrod McDougal woke up one morning recently and knew two-a-days had arrived.

He could smell it.

It was the crisp smell of fresh grass being pounded by local 17-year-olds as they began practices for the high school football season.

It's been six years since McDougal, Brian Chavez, Ivory Christian and several dozen other high school athletes took to the field in black and white. Like always, they wanted to win state and beat Midland Lee. But Permian football was marked by something else that year.

The book.

"That damn book," as it is not-so-fondly referred to by many Odessans, has been blamed for everything from Permian High School's disqualification from the playoffs in 1990 to the downturn of the local economy.

But for most of the players on the team H.G. "Buzz" Bissinger profiled in "Friday Night Lights," the 1990 book was a fairly accurate portrayal of their final year as Permian Panthers.

"It was about my senior year, my friends, the Permian system," said Chavez, who played on the 1988 team. "He wrote it well and expressed our experience better than anyone could have."

Bissinger spent a year in Odessa following the 1988 Permian football team. Although the team advanced to the semifinals before losing to the eventual state champions Dallas Carter, many fans were disappointed with the season. Carter's eventual disqualification from the playoffs did little to appease the Odessans who felt they had been robbed of the state title.

Bissinger captured most of the action from the eyes of a team member. The writer was in the locker room with the coaches, on the sidelines with the players and even went to parties with students.

But when the book was released two years later, it was met with loud local criticism. It didn't help that the book's release coincided with Permian's ban from the state football playoffs for starting practice a week early.

The outcry over the book surprised Chavez, who felt the story was fair and accurate. "I guess I was naive not to think people would get mad," he said. "I didn't expect it."

Even those who liked the book suddenly found themselves being held accountable for comments they had

made in the heat of a game.

Right after Carter knocked Permian out of the playoffs, center Clint Duncan was asked how he knew the game was over. The 17-year-old used a racial slur in his reply.

Although he didn't deny making the comment, Duncan said he wished he hadn't been quoted. "I've never used that word that way," he said. "That's not something I normally said."

Others were angry with what the book didn't include. "It just highlighted the problems and left out the good kids," said Martha Crump, whose son played on the 1987 and '88 teams.

Bill Steen, a former player who later graduated from the University of Texas with a degree in chemical engineering, concurred. "He made it sound like Chavez was the only one who got out of Odessa," he said.

"Friday Night Lights" was the story of the 1988 Permian football team. It described how Odessans glorified team members and the pressure the players felt. It also told of how certain players, such as Boobie Miles, were tossed aside when they were injured.

Several members of the team have since gone on to larger schools. Crump's son, Todd, is studying pharmacology at the University of Texas, and former Panther Jamie Jones graduated from the University of Pennsylvania and is going to UT's business school.

Although some of the former players felt Bissinger was implying that Chavez was the only player to achieve success after high school, Chavez didn't agree. He felt each player Bissinger focused on represented a different group in the school.

"He picked six players, all were different," Chavez said. "As football players go, it may be kind of labeling, but most aren't that intelligent and aspire to go to college. If (Bissinger) wrote about three guys who sat the bench and then went to Princeton, the book wouldn't have much to do with football."

Of the six players Bissinger profiled, two - Chavez and Don Billingsley - have graduated from college. Mike Winchell and Ivory Christian are working toward degrees in Odessa, while McDougal and James "Boobie" Miles have pursued other interests.

"I had a lot of opportunities to go to different places and do different things," McDougal said. For now, though, he's back in Crane working in his family business and helping care for his ailing grandparents.

Miles is part of a rap group in Dallas, Chavez said.

No matter where former team members go, they are reminded of the book and their roles on the team. Questions are asked on a routine basis.

Notoriety, however, does have its positive points.

Stein credits the book for helping him get his first job out of college. His prospective employer had heard of the book and was interested in hearing some of the background.

Todd Crump had a similar experience when he went to interview for medical school. "We spent five minutes talking about the school and another hour on Permian football," he said.

It wasn't the only potentially profitable experience borne from his relationship to the team. "I was in a 7-Eleven in Austin, and a guy offered me \$20 for my Permian shirt," Crump said.

The interest in the book hasn't been limited to Texas.

Billingsley remembers random phone calls from people who had read the book. "A lot of people have read it and can really relate it to their own high schools and towns," he said. "I've had people I didn't know from Adam call me and say they had read it and it touched them."

Billingsley remembers one particular call while he was studying at East Central University in Ada, Okla.

"A couple of guys who owned a bar and had a bet on a ball game called and wanted me to do a MOJO chant for them," he said.

When the book was initially released in 1990, a reporter from the Boston Globe reviewed it and interviewed Chavez. During the interview, Chavez compared the football program at Harvard, his alma mater, to the one at an Odessa junior high school.

The comments created resentment among the Ivy League ball club.

"Some of the players were mad at me for several years," Chavez said.

Looking back, Chavez says he views the book differently than when it first hit bookshelves. "When you're going through it, you don't realize things," he said.

"Some of the racism stuff, I guess I noticed it was there. When you go back and read it, it gives you a different perspective...you're taken aback."

Still, there are some local residents who have never read the book. Shaggy Dewberry, Boobie's cousin and a tailback for Permian, says he hasn't ever read the story that featured his relative.

But Dewberry says he remembers watching his cousin play ball. "It was very exciting," he said. "He's a big guy and an exciting runner to look at."

Dewberry said he tried to get his cousin's football number, but it had already been taken. He said he may have read the book someday. Getting through the book was an emotionally trying experience for McDougal. "I would read a little bit, start crying and have to put it down," he said.

McDougal seemed to take the season's end harder than any of the players. "I was childish about it," he said. "I tried to make the ride last as long as I could."

Part of the sadness came from an overwhelming sense of failure he felt by the team's loss in the semifinals. In the past few years, McDougal felt he and his teammates had let himself and Permian fans down by not winning the state title.

But in the past month or so, McDougal noticed things had begun to look a little brighter, and he was beginning to think the feelings of shame might subside.

The realization hit him one morning recently as he headed for

work. As he walked out the door that morning, he was hit by the usual scent of the gas plants located near his house. But then he noticed something else, the clear smell of two-a-days.

As always, the scent brought back memories of all the work on the football field, it brought back the pressure of playing at Ratcliff Stadium and the sadness associated with growing up and leaving the sport.

But this year, it also brought

something else - a feeling of relief.

"It was the first time I knew I was going to be OK, and it felt good," McDougal said.

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

Reading passages from the Bible were Susan Rohrbach and Anna Rohrbach.





## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### Relationship Marketing

I'd like to offer an exciting and perhaps new concept for all small businesses. What if we started focusing on how we can best satisfy customer needs instead of just selling our products and services? What if we became obsessed with taking such good care of our customers that they become our personal friends? What if we worked so hard to satisfy our customers that they wouldn't dare stop doing business with us?

Many business owners are using this strategy to win customer's loyalty and to increase sales. I believe these two factors - customer loyalty and increased sales - go hand-in-hand. I know some of you are thinking, "What is customer loyalty? We used to

have it, but it doesn't exist anymore!"

Though some experts suggest that customer loyalty is gone forever, I disagree. I see many small businesses who are growing and prospering by taking good care of their customers. They continue every day - rain or shine - to build long-lasting associations with their customers. They are practicing relationship marketing.

#### Taken for granted

One of the reasons customer loyalty diminished in the first place may have been that businesses started taking their customers for granted. The level of care started to slip, the company began to focus on internal needs and they assumed that the customer would always be there. However, as in any other personal relationship, you're in trouble when you start to assume.

I often hear business owners and managers lament that the customer should stand by them. They tell me that they support their communities and believe their customers should support them.

However, the customer sees it from a different perspective. They feel that better selections, cleaner floors, newer styles and lower prices await them elsewhere. They know the business is not giving them the personal service it once did. To the customer, it is a personal issue, not a community issue.

A New England bookstore owner told me about this true incident recently. He said he met a regular customer at a community meeting and chided him in a friendly way for not coming in the store as frequently as in the past. The customer responded seriously that he had been in the bookstore several times lately, but had not seen the owner there at all. He suggested that he - the customer - was spending more time in the bookstore than the owner was. The owner realized

he needed to spend more time working the sales floor meeting customers.

#### Building relationships

Here are five tips for building lasting relationships with customers.

- 1) Remember that all business is personal. People like to do business with people. In fact, most folks won't do business with companies where there is little personal contact.
- 2) Know your customers and stay in touch with them. Talk to them and listen to what they have to say. It is difficult to establish a relationship with someone you don't know much about. The more you know about your customers, the better you can serve them.
- 3) Do whatever it takes to satisfy the customer. Doing little things that customers like strengthens the relationship. Even if it means doing something you don't like to do, do it if it pleases the customer. Satisfied customers tell others. Just ask any Lexus owner.

4) Promise a pound, deliver a ton. Go beyond what the customer expects. Exceed their expectations. Deliver more than you promised.

5) Stay focused on providing value. No one buys the lowest price every time. We all make decisions based on value, not just the lowest cost. Add value to your products and save your customer's time. You'll see sales soar.

Relationships marketing is a one-to-one strategy. It will help you win customers for life.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** I was both amazed and angered by Dr. David Satcher's response in your column to the question "How reliable are condoms?" This man is head of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, a very prestigious position.

First, both Dr. Satcher and you say that abstinence is the only sure guarantee against unwanted pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Then, with Dr. Satcher's backing, you give the deadly advice that "for some, abstinence is not a realistic alternative, and for those, I recommend condoms."

Here is a product made by the same kind of labor that can't even make a \$110 radial tire perfectly round. A condom sells for 50 cents in a truck-stop vending machine, is carried around in a billfold or purse where it can be sat on or pricked with a fingernail file, and is then hurriedly put on in the dark during a passionate moment. This is what we are trusting to save someone's life?

Using Dr. Satcher's logic, if all cars had air bags and were inspected and found to be free of mechanical problems and if all drivers were licensed and used their seat belts and no one ever drove intoxicated or above the speed limit, we could then conclude that automobiles would be 99 percent safe.

The problem is that people do get in a hurry, they do drive under the influence, they don't always use safety precautions, they are prone to errors in judgment and they do have wrecks and get killed.

While condoms are certainly not fail-safe, they are a lot better than nothing.

## Unique potato salad boasts fresh flavor

Potato salad breaks out of its creamy mold with this garden-fresh version. It takes after German-style potato salad, served warm with a tangy vinaigrette. New potatoes, tomatoes and dill add a just-picked flavor. Best of all, it goes together in just 15 minutes.

### Warm Dilled Potato Salad

1 pound whole tiny new potatoes, quartered

2 cups fresh brussels sprouts (about 8 ounces), halved, or 10-ounce package frozen brussels sprouts, thawed and halved

1 cup cherry tomatoes, halved  
2 tablespoons sliced green onion  
1/4 cup white-wine vinegar  
1 tablespoon olive oil or salad oil


1 teaspoon snipped fresh dill or 1/4 teaspoon dried dillweed  
1/2 teaspoon sugar  
1/8 teaspoon salt

In a large saucepan, cook new potatoes and fresh brussels sprouts, covered, in a small amount of boiling water about 12 minutes (if using thawed brussels sprouts, add them the last 5 minutes of cooking) or until potatoes are tender. Drain potatoes and sprouts; transfer to a medium serving bowl. Add tomatoes and green onion.

Meanwhile, for dressing, in a screw-top jar combine vinegar, olive oil, dill, sugar and salt. Cover and shake well to mix. Add to potato mixture; toss gently to coat. Serve warm or cold. Makes 8 side-dish servings.

## Nutrition, fitness important to a healthful lifestyle

Americans can benefit from the relationship between good nutrition and getting or staying fit, regardless of age or individual ability. What's more, says The American Dietetic Association (ADA), radical lifestyle changes are not required to improve one's level of fitness; there are many small steps that can contribute to better health.

"There are a great many benefits to be gained from being fit. Fitness means that you are following a healthful lifestyle, which can reduce your risk of developing heart disease, obesity and other chronic diseases," said Nancy Schwartz, PhD, RD. "Smart eating and regular physical activity help you stay fit throughout your lifetime."

Another important aspect of fitness is keeping a healthy body weight. According to Schwartz, "People at a healthy weight can improve their health and reduce their risk for chronic health problems." She added that stepping on the scale is not a good way to determine healthy weight and advises that "healthy weight is determined by how much of your weight is fat, where your fat is

located and whether you have a weight-related medical problem." In general, weight carried above the waist poses more risks for weight-related health problems.

Regardless of age, physical activity is the key to help control body fat, aid sleep, regulate appetite and promote general well-being. It's not necessary to huff and puff or do vigorous exercise to reap the benefits of physical activity. Just make it your goal to get at least 30 minutes of a activity every day.

Here are a few tips for a healthful exercise plan:

-Gradually build up activity by adding a few minutes of extra activity daily, such as walking.

-Choose activities that you enjoy doing alone or with your family and friends.

-Be consistent. Make an effort to include activity in your daily routine.

-Choose "energy spenders" instead of "energy savers." For example, take stairs rather than the elevator.

By following these tips and eating well, one can be on his or her way to a more healthful lifestyle. Also, the Food Guide Pyramid, which

recommends how much food to eat every day from each of the five food groups, is a good way to plan one's diet.

## Nutrition Notes

### "Resetting The American Table"

"In matters of taste, consider nutrition and in matters of nutrition consider taste. In all cases, consider individual needs and preferences." This is the philosophy and doctrine of The American Institute of Wine and Food and illustrates the desire of health care professionals to help consumers rediscover the joys of eating within a healthy diet. Several other values noted are: (1) appreciation for psychological, physiological, cultural and economic influences on food preferences; (2) recognition that all foods fit in a healthful diet that should be balanced over several days; (3) belief that dietary recommendations should respect culinary traditions while advocating nutritional adequacy.

Considering these values as challenges we, the consumers, need to take a perspective look at the practices that the Food Guide Pyramid, the official food guide for the United States, which was released in 1992 have outlined and distributed. This guide is the only one recognized by federal agencies or departments and the one used by nutrition and dietetics practitioners to teach clients basic nutrition and life style of healthy eating.

In this article let us conduct an evaluation of this important food guideline and consider some ideas, activities, and explanations of the changes embodied in the program's conception.

For almost forty years (40), nutrition educators relied heavily on the four (1) or five food group (2) approach to teach nutrition to children and adults. In 1985 the Human

Nutrition Information Service developed an updated Food Wheel to illustrate the Dietary guidelines. This format did not catch on and was only a reference material. The Food Guide Pyramid, in essence, replaces both the basic four or five food groups, the Food Wheel. This program in focus, content, and philosophy is a unique entity altogether.

First, the Food Guide Pyramid teaches the total diet instead of the foundation diet represented by the basic four or five food groups. The four food groups were designed to teach nutrient adequacy and to guard against nutrient deficiencies. Based on health concerns that are at least partially the result of nutrient excesses, the Food Group Pyramid addresses overnutrition as well as undernutrition. This approach should be less confusing as it notes a guide for the total diet, not just parts of it.

Second, the Food Guide Pyramid was based on consumer research. Evaluation of the 1985 and 1990 versions documented that these two did not help the consumers understand the Dietary Guidelines. The research effort to identify an image that was memorable and understandable by a variety of audiences. The result was simple easily recognized figure that was developed to ensure the public to remember the concepts of the Pyramid which was designed to help them remember food for healthy living.

Third, the Food Guide Pyramid illustrates the three principles of variety, moderation, and proportionality.

Variety is defined as eating a wide selection of foods within and among the major food groups. In other words, no one major food group is more or

less important than any other food group. Also, it is important to eat a variety of foods within each food group. Moderation is defined by two components: (a) eating portions especially those high in fat and/or added sugars, in recommended serving sizes, and (b) eating fats, oils, and sweets sparingly. Proportionality is defined as eating relatively more foods from the larger food groups and fewer foods from the smaller food groups.

The Food Guide Pyramid illustrates some of the Dietary Guidelines: "Eat a variety of foods"; "Choose a diet low in fat, saturated fat and cholesterol"; "Choose a diet with plenty of vegetables, fruits and grain products"; and "Use sugar only in moderation." The Food Guide Pyramid does not illustrate three other important Dietary Guidelines: "Maintain healthy weight"; "Use salt and sodium only in moderation"; "If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation." These last three guidelines are important and should not be left out of educational efforts just because they are not included on the Food Guide Pyramid.

The key changes in the content of the Food Guide Pyramid are as follows:

Dietary advice has shifted from a foundation diet to the total diet.

The number of food groups has changed to five major food groups.

Each group provided some, but not all of the nutrients needed for good health, and no one group is more important than another. The tip of the Pyramid (i.e., the fats, oils, and sweets group) does not count as a major food group, therefore, no foods are pictorially depicted. Foods in the tip provide energy and little else nutritionally.

The names of the food groups have changed. The names of the Food Guide Pyramid food groups are:

- bread, cereal, rice and pasta groups;
- the vegetable group
- the fruit group

-the milk, yogurt, and cheese group

-the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs, and nut group. The names are longer and more unwieldy, but their purpose is to clarify composition of each food group. The public will discover these name groups do not match any other names in other guides.

"Fruits are now separated from vegetables. The bigger size of the spacing of the vegetable than the fruit groups indicates that more servings are needed from the large vegetable group. Vegetables are emphasized on the Pyramid because they contribute notable amounts of minerals and vitamins, whereas fruits contribute mainly vitamins.

"The number of servings per group have changed. The number of servings for each food group must match the recommended serving sizes.

"The tip of the Pyramid is now called the fats, oils, and sweet group. The rationale for what does or does not go in the tip is based on the function or use of the food.

"Serving sizes have changed for some foods and food groups. The Pyramid's serving sizes are the recommended amounts; the new label's standardized serving sizes are the amounts that most Americans currently consume.

"Protein equivalents have changed; ie 1 egg equals 1 oz. lean meat; 2 lbs. peanut butter equal 1 oz. lean meat; or

1/2 cup cooked dry beans equals 1 oz. lean meat.

"Symbols for fat and sugar have been added. The circles on the Pyramid signify added or naturally occurring fat; the inverted triangles signify added, but not naturally occurring sugar. The purpose of the symbols is to teach that fat and sugar are found in all food

groups, not just in the tip.

In the November Nutrition Update we will consider some new ideas in teaching the Food Guide Pyramid so to facilitate the plans and give greater understanding to this tool which can be used to enhance the total nutrition intake and health of each individual consumer.

## SOCIAL SECURITY *Jim Talbot*

### SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**Q:** I'm 60 years old and my husband recently passed away. Am I eligible for any Social Security benefits?

**A:** If your husband died fully insured for Social Security benefits, you may be eligible for a reduced widow's benefit at age 60. If you wait until you are 65 to begin collecting benefits, you will be eligible for a full benefit. You should also know that you can switch to your own retirement benefit (assuming you're eligible and your retirement rate is higher than your widow's rate) as early as age 62. In many cases, a widow(er) can begin receiving one benefit at an unreduced rate at age 65. The rules are complicated and vary depending on your situation, so you should talk to a Social Security representative about the options available to you. Please contact the Amarillo Social Security office at 376-2241 or the toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213.

**Q:** I'm 62-years-old and receiving widow's benefits. I'm planning on remarrying in December. Will my widow's benefits be discontinued?

**A:** Since your remarriage will have occurred after you reached age 60, your benefits will continue. Also, since you are 62, you may get a higher benefit on your new husband's record. Contact this office to discuss the options available to you.

**Q:** I'm going to get a pneumonia vaccine this fall. Will Medicare pay for the vaccine? Do I have to pay the \$100 annual deductible first?

**A:** If the medical provider, usually your doctor, giving the vaccine accepts assignment (accepts the Medicare approved amount as payment in full), then there will be no charge to you. If the provider does not accept assignment, then you may have to pay charges in addition to the Medicare approved amount. Neither the \$100 annual medical insurance deductible nor the 20 percent coinsurance payment applies to this service.

**Q:** I'm a 66-year-old woman. My only income is my \$342 Social Security retirement check. I've been able to supplement my check with my savings account so I can pay bills. But I've exhausted my savings account and I can't make ends meet. What can I do?

**A:** Contact us right away. You may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits as well as your Social Security benefit. SSI pays benefits to people who are age 65 or older, or blind, or have a disability and who don't own much or have a lot of income. If you qualify for SSI, you may also get Medicaid, which can help supplement your Medicare coverage. Even if you don't qualify for Medicaid, you may be able to get help with your Medicare coinsurance and deductibles. For this assistance, contact the Texas Department of Human Resources.

**Q:** I'm 65 years old. Is it true I can continue to work full-time and receive Social Security benefits at the same time?

**A:** Possibly. Partial benefits may be payable when you're employed and eligible for retirement benefits (the earliest age is 62). Since you're 65 years old, you can earn up to \$11,160 with no reduction in your Social Security benefits. If you earn more than that, \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$3 you earn over \$11,160. If you want to find out more about working and collecting benefits at the same time, call us and talk to a Social Security representative or ask for the leaflet, "How Work Affects Your Social Security Benefits."




## Medical Rehab At A Glance

(NAPS)—Medical rehabilitation is the science and art of helping people who survive traumatic injury and potentially disabling disease to lead functional and productive lives.

treated by rehab, and most stroke victims range from 31 to 71 years of age.



Most medical rehabilitation hospital stays are about 57 to 70 days long.



Nationally, Medicare days account for over 60 percent of total days in rehabilitation facilities.



As of 1994, there are about 1,200 medical rehabilitation facilities in the U.S.

# Waiting at pharmacy is time well spent

When you aren't feeling well, the 15 minutes you spend waiting at the pharmacy counter for your medication may seem like an eternity.

You realize that the pharmacist is busy—you can see him or her counseling other patients and dispensing medicine. Then the pharmacist stops to make a phone call, and you wonder why he or she is on the phone when you're in such a hurry to get home.

But wait. That phone call may save your life!

Your independent pharmacist performs a number of professional services on your behalf of which you may not be aware, according to NARD, the national association representing independent retail pharmacy. Each time you bring a prescription to your pharmacist, he or she completes a six-step process.

First, your pharmacist will double-check the prescription your physician has written. Your pharmacist will make sure that the prescription is the correct drug to treat your condition, that the dose, strength and quantity are adequate, and that the form of the medication is the best form for you.

Then, the pharmacist reviews your medical history and looks for allergies and interactions in your computer file. If you are cared for by more than one physician or you are taking more than one medication, your pharmacist will check for a possible overlap in treatment.

If the pharmacist decides there is a potential problem, he or she will take whatever action is necessary to

resolve that problem. For example, if your doctor prescribes penicillin and you are allergic to it, your pharmacist will call your physician to discuss using another antibiotic.

The next step your pharmacist takes is to dispense your medication. If you have arthritis, your pharmacist will use an easy-to-open container, or if there are young children in the house, a childproof one. Your pharmacist will also attach information about your prescription to the vial. There may be brightly colored stickers to remind you of important facts about your medicine—that it causes drowsiness or should be taken on a full stomach, for example.

The fifth step is essential in making sure you understand why and how you are to take the medication that has been prescribed. During the counseling session, your pharmacist will give you verbal, and often written, instructions on taking your medication. It may be important for you to take your medication at mealtime or with a glass of water.

Finally, if you are refilling a prescription, your pharmacist will monitor your progress by asking about side effects. It is important to continue taking all medication until your physician determines that it is appropriate to stop treatment or begin another medication.

So, if it's taking a little longer than you expected to get your prescription filled, remember that it's time well spent. The higher quality of health care you're getting is worth the wait.

## Treatment can silence the 'silent killer'

You may have high blood pressure and not even know it. You feel fine. You look fine. You act fine.

But high blood pressure often has no symptoms. It can go undetected for years and can strike without warning. That's why it's called the "silent killer."

A podiatrist is often the first physician to note signs of arthritis, diabetes or poor circulation.

In fact, you can celebrate this month by getting your blood pressure checked and treated, if necessary.

Your doctor records two figures when checking your pressure. The systolic pressure is when your heart pumps blood into your arteries. The diastolic pressure is when your heart rests and fills with blood for the next beat. You have high blood pressure, or hypertension, when you get a series of readings that exceed the normal range for adults of 140/90.

Doctors don't know the cause of 90 to 95 percent of high blood pressure cases. They do know factors that can increase your chance of developing high blood pressure. Factors you can't control are heredity, sex, age and race. Those you can control are obesity, sodium and alcohol intake, oral contraceptives and physical activity.

Moreover, though doctors don't have a cure for high blood pressure, they do know you can control it if you:

- Lose weight (if you're overweight).
- Reduce alcohol and salt intake.
- Exercise regularly.
- Take medicine if prescribed by your doctor.

## Know about your arteries

A condition affecting the arteries you probably never heard of may make the difference between a long life and an early death.

Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD), studies show, is a high risk factor for death from cardiovascular disease. In fact, PAD can increase the risk of heart disease five times for people over 60. A study in the New England Journal of Medicine recently proved that PAD screening is more important than cholesterol testing for seniors. What's more, doctors estimate 12 percent of the population over the age of 66 has PAD. That comes to about four million people in the U.S.

Indications of PAD include:  
-Over 60.  
-A history of smoking.

-A personal or family history of cardiovascular disease, diabetes, hypertension, obesity or hyperlipidemia.

Fortunately, recent research reveals, non-invasive testing—it's as easy as having your blood pressure checked—can detect the presence of PAD more precisely than previous assessment methods physicians had to rely on until now.

Once the condition is confirmed, doctors often recommend a multi-factor program for managing the disease, including smoking cessation; hyperlipidemia treatment; hypertension, diabetes and obesity control; and an exercise program. More advanced cases may require surgery or drug therapy.

Recently, the motion picture, TV and radio star, Martha Raye, lost a leg to PAD. She has joined forces with the Association for Cost Effective Cardiovascular Technology (ACCT), founded by Imex Medical Systems, to raise awareness of the dangers of PAD. Says Raye: "PAD is a real health problem with the elderly. It is as bad or in some cases worse than high cholesterol. Luckily, patients and doctors can fight PAD with early detection."

This recipe is intended to be part of an overall healthful eating plan. Total fat intake should be less than 30 percent of your total calories for a day—not for each food or recipe.

### Hearty Baked Macaroni

Vegetable oil spray*	1/2 teaspoon onion powder
1 16-ounce can tomato puree	1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
1 cup water	1 8-ounce package elbow macaroni, uncooked
2 teaspoons Italian herb seasoning	4 ounces part-skim mozzarella cheese, sliced
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder	
1 1/2 pounds low-fat cottage cheese	

Preheat oven to 350° F. Lightly spray a 9-x-9-x-2-inch casserole with vegetable oil.

In a small bowl combine tomato puree, water, Italian seasoning and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder. In another bowl, combine cottage cheese, onion powder and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder.

Spoon one-third of tomato mixture into prepared casserole. In order, layer half of macaroni, all of cottage cheese mixture and one-third of tomato mixture on top. Add remaining macaroni and cover with remaining tomato mixture.

Cover and bake 1 hour. Uncover casserole and top with mozzarella cheese. Return it to the oven, uncovered, for 5 minutes, or until cheese is melted. Let stand for 10 minutes.

## Facts about less sleep

Sleep is an essential biological need and is necessary in order to maintain good physical and mental health.

A range of sleep disorders and disturbances affects as many as one-third of all American adults.

A substantial number of Americans, perhaps the majority are functionally handicapped by sleep deprivation on any given day. Most Americans consider the impaired judgement that accompanies sleepiness a normal and unavoidable part of everyday life.

Over the past century we have reduced our nightly sleep time by 20 percent.

Sleep loss accumulates from one night to the next as a "sleep debt." A modest loss on a single night may produce a serious sleep debt when sustained over several nights.

Because individuals often do not recognize that they are sleepy, they seldom guard against inappropriate sleep episodes, such as falling asleep at the wheel, or at work.

The costs of a sleepy society include lost lives, lost income, disability, lost educational opportunities, accidents and family dysfunction. The effects on quality of life for millions of individuals and families are incalculable.

The Commission estimates that in 1990, sleep disorders and sleepiness cost the United States a minimum of \$15.9 billion in direct costs alone.

## There's hope for people who have arthritis

"Small joint reconstruction surgery gave me back my life," says Cele Kennedy, a woman from Phoenix, Ariz., who after living with arthritis for more than 25 years, had surgery in her right and left hands.

"Before I had my finger joints reconstructed, I could barely do daily activities that other people take for granted without severe pain. Surgery has helped my hands feel and look 100 times better," explained Kennedy.

Many patients with severe arthritis who have undergone small joint reconstruction surgery have similar stories. Small joint reconstruction, or arthroplasty, is a surgical procedure in which deteriorated joints in the hands and feet are remodeled or replaced. The procedure is intended to greatly reduce or even eliminate the chronic or constant pain people with severe arthritis experience, as well as increase mobility.

According to small joint reconstruction pioneer, Alfred B. Swanson, M.D., professor of surgery at Michigan State University, and both director of orthopaedic surgery and director of the Hand Surgery Fellowship at Blodgett Memorial Medical Center in Grand Rapids, Mich., "Many patients who suffer with severe arthritis are unaware of the potential benefits of small joint reconstruction and continue to be treated with medications. However, once patients reach the point that medications are no longer effective in their pain management, surgery needs to be considered to alleviate discomfort."

Patients undergo small joint reconstruction for three primary reasons:

-Relief of pain--At severe stages of the disease, the joints have deteriorated and traditional pain management methods are no longer effective.

-Increased mobility--The effects of arthritis may drastically limit the range of motion of the foot or hand, restricting normal joint function. Surgery does not cure arthritis, but many patients experience increased mobility in the hands.

-Deceased deformity--Chronic swelling and joint deterioration lead to distortion of the diseased knuckles and joints. The deformity results in severe pain and limited function.

The decision to have surgery should be based upon fully informed discussions about the risks and benefits with a family physician or rheumatologist, surgeon and physical therapist.

Following surgery, for several months patients will need to undergo therapy on a daily basis. Motivation and participation are vital to the success of rehabilitation. Many patients who follow a stringent rehabilitation program are able to return to activities that they were forced to abandon due to the disabling effects of arthritis. Patients often regain small hand and foot movements required in leisure activities, such as painting, needlepoint, cooking, playing cards, walking and exercising.

## To Your Good Health

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My wife has osteoporosis and has suffered three compression fractures in the lumbar spine area. The doctors made this determination. Since this seemed to develop after X-rays and bone scans, I wonder if they might have contributed. We will appreciate your opinion. — H.K.

**ANSWER:** You cannot blame X-rays or bone scans.

Osteoporosis occurred from your wife's normal decline in estrogen production — which comes with menopause. Estrogen seems to exert a general protective effect on bones.

You also can blame a low calcium intake through life, if that applies.


Filling out the typical osteoporosis profile is a small frame and to some extent skin tone. Light-skinned women are more likely to suffer os-

teoporosis than their darker-skinned sisters. I don't know why.

Compression fractures occur when weakened spine bones cannot support the person's weight. The bones collapse and compress. The lower spine is the key target, so lower-back pain becomes a chief symptom.

## Fitness for those over 60

Talk about the graying of America. Beginning in 1996, four million people will turn 60. So, if you haven't developed the exercise habit yet, now is the time to get started.

Look at it this way: Exercise can help prevent heart disease and some of the other illnesses that come with advancing age. It improves cardiovascular health, lowers cholesterol and can reduce or reverse the bone mineral loss that occurs with aging.

And because exercise builds muscular strength it can help you maintain your independence longer.

If you're 60 or older, the American Council on Exercise (ACE) suggests consulting your doctor before starting an exercise program. Then, begin with a low-intensity, short-duration program, like walking for five or 10 minutes every day.

Your goal, ACE says, should be a comprehensive program that includes a warm-up, aerobic activity, muscle toning and stretching exercises. Gauge the intensity of your program by monitoring both your heart rate and your perception of exertion.

In other words, your level should feel comfortable.

If you think you lack the motivation to follow through with your program, joining an exercise class can help. ACE suggests choosing a low-intensity class or one designed specifically for you. A personal trainer can also help you design a program and stay motivated.

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## BALANCED DIET CAN BOOST HEALTH

(NAPS)—An apple a day keeps the doctor away...right? Well, while fruits in general are excellent sources of many vitamins and nutrients needed to stay well, they can't prevent all illnesses. The good news, though, according to The American Dietetic Association's (ADA) National Center for Nutrition and Dietetics (NCND), is that many foods can help reduce the risk of developing a number of diseases and other health problems.

"One of the keys to good health," said Nancy Schwartz, PhD, RD (registered dietitian), director of the NCND, "is to build a balanced diet with moderate amounts of a variety of foods."

"The new food label is an excellent tool to help consumers select many different foods that provide a variety of nutrients that can help prevent many illnesses."

The ADA encourages consumers to follow the guidelines of the USDA Food Guide Pyramid, which recommends six to 11 servings a day of grains, three to five servings of fruits, two to four servings of vegetables, two to three servings of dairy products, two to three servings of meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts and minimal use of fats, oils and sweets.

"Using information on food labels to make food choices for a Pyramid-based diet is an important way to maintain or improve anyone's health," said Schwartz.



Breathtaking Pacific Northwest beauty and touching family drama punctuate Chad Everett's return to series television in *McKenna*.

The hour-long drama, which casts Everett as the patriarch of a troubled Oregon clan, airs Thursdays on ABC.

"We've got the greatest backdrop going for us," the actor says. "We've got nature. We've got man against God, man against nature, man against man, man against himself. We've got four of the most interesting conflicts you can have."

"And anybody that comes up and mingles with us has an effect on our family, and our family has an effect on them. It's just a natural — and a very exciting — place to be."

Everett plays veteran outdoorsman Jack McKenna, the proprietor of McKenna Wilderness Outfitters who has made a career of guiding vacationers through the wilderness near Bend, Ore. (where the show is filmed). Before the action of the series begins, however, Jack has suffered the devastating loss of his favorite son, Guy, who was killed in a tour accident.

The dwindling business is salvaged by the return of prodigal son Brick (Eric Close), who joins Guy's widow, Leigh (Shawn Huff), in trying to keep the family's heads above water. He also tries to make peace with his stubborn father.

These tense family dynamics are played out against the parade of guests to the wilderness park, although the balance may change from week to week, says creator and executive producer Gil Grant.

"I think you have two different worlds to play," he says. "You have the family drama of our regular characters, and all that goes with that. But you also have, you know, the guests

that come in every week and what their story is, and how their story affects our family, and vice versa.

"I think we probably will (bring back) some along the way if we find somebody we are in love with. But generally speaking, there will be a 'guest of the week.'"

Co-stars Huff and Close say they feel *McKenna* is timely and reflects a more pensive mood in the United States at the moment.

"I think that now that we're in the '90s, everyone is sort of re-evaluating their lives and how they lead their lives," Huff says. "And health, and the outdoors, and ... all the environmental issues have changed everyone's way of thinking."

"This show is so important for TV right now, I think, because we don't have enough really family shows that are beautifully shot and (have) great stories, and all of this that sort of incorporates everything: outdoors, and family, and drama, the whole human nature of the whole thing."

"In the '80s it became 'let's get rich now and retire by the time I'm 30 years old,'" says Close, who shares his character's passion for the outdoors. "But what happened was people forgot to live, and all they spent their time doing was trying to make their million dollars."

"And they forgot about going on vacation. They forgot about their children at home, and their wives, and their families, and vice versa."

"And the families deteriorated and people forgot how to have a good time, and they (need to) go out and to experience what God has given us to experience: beautiful rivers, beautiful mountains. And to share that with people that you love and care about."
