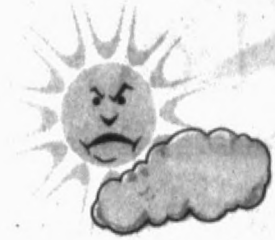

## Pilot had used drugs, alcohol before crash

WASHINGTON (AP) - Small amounts of cocaine and alcohol were found in the body of a despondent truck driver who crashed his small plane on the White House grounds, the Secret Service said, reporting preliminary autopsy results.

And in a troubling miscue, Frank Corder's plane appeared on radar at the nearby National Airport but operators did not notice until after the crash. "It was ... missed," Secret Service spokesman Dave Adams said Tuesday.

The developments should help investigators determine how a novice pilot in a tiny Cessna 150 managed to come so close to hurting the first family, but the news did little to explain why Corder took to the air in the first place. Was it suicide, a bungled prank or - less likely - an assassination attempt?

Adams said an autopsy showed that Corder's blood-alcohol content was 0.045 percent, slightly above the 0.04 percent legal limit for pilots. The legal limit for driving a car in most states is 0.10 percent.

Relying on an initial test tainted by blood-clotting, the Secret Service first reported the blood-alcohol content at 0.32 percent. The agency later supplied the 0.045 results of a second test but said even that exam is preliminary.

Adams said the autopsy found "trace amounts of cocaine in his

system," but complete results will not be available until tissue samples are examined in the next few days.

In what could become an embarrassing lapse, Adams said radar at National Airport picked up the plane shortly before the crash, but the operators failed to spot it.

The Federal Aviation Administration keeps recorded images of everything operators see on the radar. A review of the tapes showed the plane was visible, Adams said.

"They did not see the aircraft on the radar screen. After reviewing the tapes... they did see it on the image," he said.

As a result, Secret Service agents at the White House did not know the plane had invaded restricted airspace until it was spotted by guards just seconds before the crash. Adams said he did not know how much time elapsed between the time the plane was recorded on radar and the crash, shortly before 2 a.m.

Explaining how the lapse could have occurred, a government official familiar with the inquiry said operators don't constantly monitor the radar in the wee hours of the morning, because there is so little traffic. Many see their main responsibility as directing planes headed to National Airport - usually after pilots radio for help.

The development could increase concern over the president's security. Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., who

chairs a Senate panel that oversees the Secret Service, said he was considering public hearings on the matter.

Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen and Transportation Secretary Federico Pena met Tuesday to discuss an internal inquiry in the crash, and the possibility of buying a radar system designed to ferret out intruders.

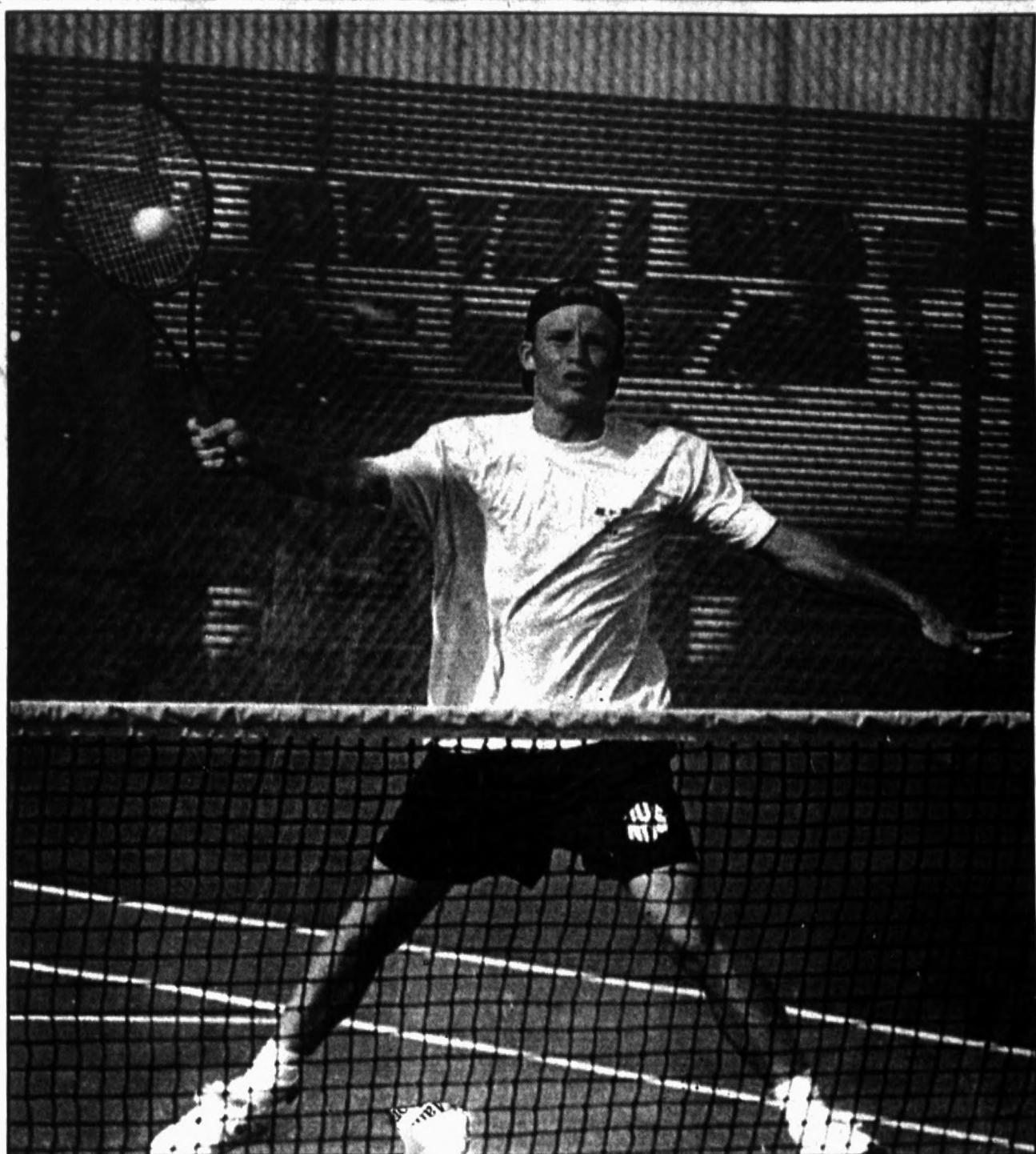
Investigators still don't know why Corder undertook the flight, although preliminary findings indicate he did not intend to hurt the president or his family.

Corder's relatives said the self-employed truck driver was despondent over the break up of his marriage and his father's death and he had a history of drug and alcohol problems. They said he was suicidal.

But at least one relative raised the possibility that Corder's flight was a publicity prank.

Some of the last people who saw Corder alive said he was holed up in a hotel drinking beer and contemplating the tragic flight.

Jackie Keyser, owner of Keyser's Motel in Aberdeen, Md., where Corder checked in Friday, said she last saw him about nine hours before the wreck, walking in the motel parking lot where he had been drinking. She said that he turned to one woman and said, "See you later. I'm going to fly my plane," she said.

## Retail sales remain steady after increasing in August

WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail sales rose 0.8 percent in August after remaining unchanged the previous month, the government said today.

The advance, in line with analysts' expectations, was spurred by a recovery in automobile sales and higher sales of other durable goods. The August showing may have been helped as well by back-to-school shopping, analysts said.

The Commerce Department said all sales totaled a seasonally adjusted \$186.6 billion, up from a revised \$185.1 billion in July. The July figure originally was estimated to be \$184.8 billion.

Retail sales posted a 0.9 percent increase in June after holding steady in May and falling 1 percent in April. The August gain was anticipated as car sales rebounded from a decline blamed on low supplies of popular models.

Still, consumer spending has weakened in recent months as interest rates have climbed. After rising at a 4.7 percent annual rate in the first quarter, spending advanced at just a 1.2 percent rate in the next three months. Retail sales represent about half of consumer expenditures.

Sales of durable goods, items expected to last more than three years, climbed 1.3 percent in August following a 0.6 percent decline.

Dealers said automobile sales rose 1.2 percent after a 1.6 percent drop in July. Excluding autos, sales were up 0.7 percent.

Other durable goods sectors also posted gains. Sales of building materials, hardware and garden supplies were up 2.2 percent after slipping 0.2 percent in July. Sales of furniture and other home furnishings rose 1.7 percent, after remaining unchanged the previous month.

Nondurable goods such as groceries and gasoline were up 0.4 percent following July's 0.5 percent rise.

## County to get new fire truck from Texas Forest Service

## September tax rebates up for Hereford, county

The City of Hereford and Deaf Smith County have received their September sales tax rebate checks from State Comptroller John Sharp's office.

Sharp announced on Monday that \$128.3 million had been mailed out to cities and counties around Texas.

The City of Hereford -- which currently collects a 1 percent sales tax -- received \$54,380.96, which was an increase of 4.36 percent over the amount received in September 1993.

That month, the city received \$52,107.16.

For the year to date, the city has received sales tax funds amounting to \$516,263.20, or 1.5 percent more than the \$508,593.51 received through the first nine months of 1993.

Deaf Smith County collects a

one-half percent sales tax on county sales. That tax yielded \$29,966.28 for September, up 13.32 percent from the \$26,441.83 received in September last year.

So far this year, the county has received \$265,453.26, up 1.59 over the \$261,288.92 a year ago.

The tax figures do not include a half-percent sales tax for economic development approved last month by voters.

That tax will not begin being collected until January 1995.

The report on sales tax disbursements included figures on area city and county collections as well. Only Castro County collects a separate county sales tax, also one-half percent.

## Psychological battle for Haiti under way with leaflets, ships

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) - A U.S. warship steamed within sight of the capital today and planes dropped propaganda leaflets before dawn, the latest moves in a campaign of psychological warfare aimed at Haiti's military rulers.

The American planes flew low over the Port-au-Prince area at about 2:45 a.m. dropping the Creole-language fliers, which show a picture of elected President Jean-Bertrand Aristide and announce that he is returning soon.

In one area, a plane flew so low it shook houses and threw people into a panic. Leaflets also were dropped

on La Plaine, north of the capital. Pro-army militiamen roughed up people trying to pick up the leaflets in the Delmas section of the capital, local radio reported.

Offshore from Port-au-Prince, a gray U.S.-flagged cutter was visible, heading rapidly northward in the Caribbean.

"The sound of invasion is already in our ears," said ultranationalist politician Vladimir Jeanty, who heard the planes fly over his roof in Delmas.

He said the Haitian people should "sharpen their ears," and predicted that 300,000 will die if the United States invades. Jeanty said U.S. soldiers will not distinguish between

soldiers and civilians when they attack.

The United States has intensified its psychological warfare in recent weeks. Washington has warned the military to get out and moved several warships ominously close to Haiti's shores.

The White House said Tuesday that military action could come "very soon."

"The intervention has already taken place. They just haven't begun to shoot at people yet," Evans Paul, the capital's elected mayor in hiding, told The Associated Press on Tuesday.

National sovereignty, which the ruling army claims to be defending in its standoff with the United States, has been reduced to nothing since the coup three years ago because the international community has largely controlled Haiti, Paul said.

"Our city is besieged, and the besieger has allowed our leaders no way out," said Carl Denis, a senior aide to the military-installed government. "We have no option but resistance."

Fifteen U.S. warships are patrolling offshore and Pentagon officials are sending in two aircraft carriers to join them.

The incident occurred on May 6. Testimony was continuing Wednesday morning with testimony for the prosecution. The defense expected to present testimony later in the day.

**UNDATED** - In the year's busiest primary day, voters went to the polls in nine states and the nation's capital to choose nominees for eight gubernatorial elections and Senate races and 73 House seats.

**CORAOPOLIS** - The thrust reverser theory has been all but thrown out, and it appears the engine didn't break loose, either. Investigators searching for the cause of the crash of USAir Flight 427 are back at square one - and they aren't ruling out anything.

**WASHINGTON** - Trial lawyers have emerged as one of the most potent sources of campaign money for state candidates, the American Tort Reform Association says in a new study examining contributions in Texas and two other states.

**DALLAS** - Homosexual rights leaders say a recent string of slayings of gay men underscores the need for tougher hate crime laws in Texas. "There's a long history in Texas of not valuing lesbian and gay lives and therefore giving lighter sentences to those who murder lesbians and gays," said Dianne Hardy-Garcia, executive director of the Lesbian-Gay Rights Lobby.

**WASHINGTON** - Supporters of an agreement allowing Vermont to ship their low-level radioactive waste to West Texas and the pact is necessary to ensure Texas isn't flooded with waste from any other states.

**DALLAS** - Dow Corning Corp., which faces thousands of lawsuits from women claiming silicone breast implants cause health problems, has won a case against a woman who said implants delayed discovery of a cancerous tumor.

**AUSTIN** - Former U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese III is campaigning for Republican comptroller candidate Teresa Doggett, calling her run against Democratic incumbent John Sharp one of the most important elections in the country.

**SPACE CENTER, Houston** - A \$14 million satellite released from the space shuttle Discovery focused at the sun's searing corona today to help unlock mysteries about solar winds.

**HOUSTON** - The Upjohn Co. has waged an expensive and persistent battle against those who complained about the dangers of Halcion, according to a copyright story in the Houston Chronicle.

**WASHINGTON** - The battle between Sen. Phil Gramm and Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez over Texas' 19th century-era ban on most home equity lending has ended - for now - with Gramm blinking first.

**DALLAS** - Two utilities say they are still working toward a merger, but Central and South West Corp. has said its \$2.2 billion deal with El Paso Electric Co. is in "severe jeopardy." The merger is key to El Paso Electric's plan to emerge from Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection. The utility in January 1992 became only the second to fail since the great depression.

**WASHINGTON** - The V-22 Osprey tilt-rotor aircraft has passed a key test, getting the go-ahead from a panel of military leaders to move from its experimental phase to limited production.

# Clinton bucks tide on Haiti invasion

**WASHINGTON (AP)** - Against a tide of congressional opposition, President Clinton is building momentum for an invasion of Haiti on two fronts - amassing warships in the Caribbean and appealing to public opinion at home.

Clinton scheduled a Thursday evening television address to try to convince the American people that the restoration of democracy in Haiti, by force if necessary, was a vital U.S. interest.

The administration says an invasion can be averted only if Army chief Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras and his cohorts give up power and allow the return of the democratically elected President Jean-Bertrand Aristide, who was overthrown in a military coup

three years ago.

The aircraft carrier USS America left the naval base at Norfolk, Va., Tuesday, and another carrier, the USS Eisenhower sets sail today, presumably for waters off Haiti. The carriers are to provide a launch platform for special force troops and Marines who would lead the takeover of Haiti's capital of Port-au-Prince.

Defense Secretary William Perry was heading to Norfolk to talk with military leaders aboard the Eisenhower and the USS Whitney, which would serve as the command ship for military operations in Haiti.

Lawmakers indicated that the invasion was still not inevitable. "There's a lot going on right now," said Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., a

member of the Senate Intelligence Committee, when asked if there was movement toward surrender by Cedras and the others.

House Minority Leader Robert Michel, R-Ill., said Haiti's three top military leaders must go and "there's still considerable amount of pressure being brought to bear to bring that about short of having to follow through with military action."

Lawmakers from both parties on Tuesday urged the president to seek congressional approval before committing any troops to Haiti.

The failure of the president to let Congress express itself, said Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., "reduces us to a state of evisceration. We are potted plants."

Adding to the near unanimous opposition of Republicans to an invasion was growing dismay among Democrats about the course the president was taking.

Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn., said that among his fellow Democrats there were "very, very profound concerns about the wisdom of invading Haiti."

Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., usually a staunch ally of the president, said it was "wrong constitutionally, and wrong politically," to invade the Caribbean nation without coming first to Congress.

Both House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, urged Clinton to come to Congress before launching military action, although Mitchell acknowledged that "no president in my lifetime has agreed" that congressional approval is necessary for military action.

In the House, Mississippi Democratic Rep. Gene Taylor used a parliamentary procedure to try to force a vote on Haiti before the end of the week.

House Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., predicted as many as 350 of the House's 435 members would support a nonbinding resolution against invading Haiti. Speaking on National Empowerment Television, Gingrich predicted the House would vote on the question early next week.

Presidents have consistently questioned the constitutionality of the 1973 War Powers Act that gives Congress the authority to end an overseas military operation. President Bush in 1991 reluctantly asked Congress to endorse the offensive against Iraq in the Persian Gulf War, but he did not seek congressional approval before invading Panama, nor did President Reagan when he sent troops to Grenada.

But congressional opponents of invasion said the administration had failed to show that Haiti poses a national security threat that must be met by military force. Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole scoffed at administration arguments that U.S. credibility is at stake in driving Haiti's military leaders from power.

"They brought it on themselves," Dole, R-Kan., said. "Now they have to say, 'Our credibility is at stake so we have to invade because we made all these mistakes in the first place.'"

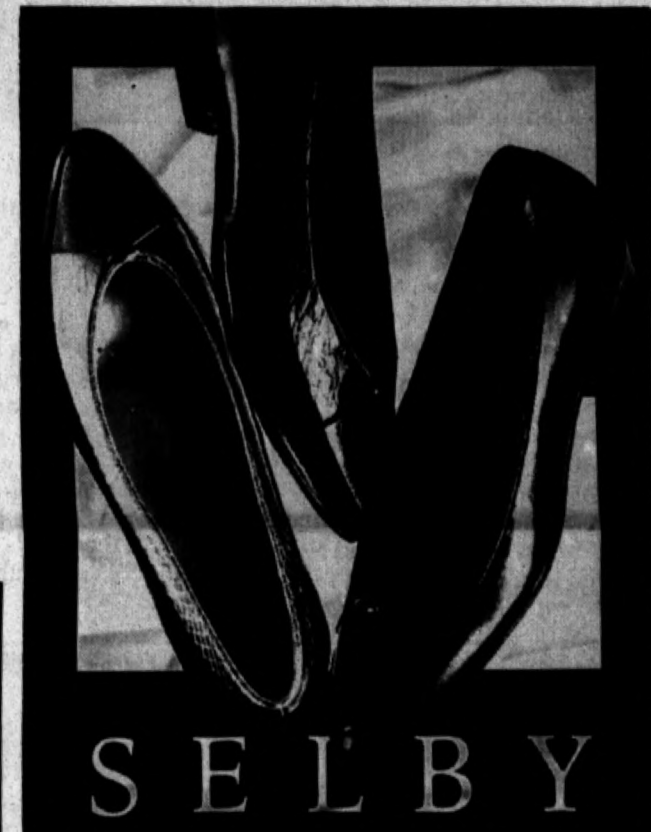

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# Burkeville RB shakes way to 356 rushing yards

DALLAS (AP) - When an opponent tries stopping Burkeville's Jeff Spikes, he better be ready for "The Shake."

That's the hip-swiveling, direction-changing juke that the senior uses to allow his quickness to make up for whatever breakaway speed he lacks.

It worked last year as Spikes gained a state-best 3,051 yards, and it did the trick again last Friday night as Spikes needed only 15 carries to run for 356 yards and four touchdowns.

The four-touchdown performance in a 45-3 victory over Merryville, La., ranks among the top 20 ever in Class 1A and has earned Spikes top billing on this week's Associated Press Honor Roll.

"He made a lot of moves that were unbelievable," Burkeville coach Roy Harper said. "A lot of guys took looks at him and got solid blows, but he didn't go down."

It had to be "The Shake."  
"He makes a move to the left, shakes and goes right without losing any speed," Harper said. "He can accelerate from a dead stop probably better than any kid I've ever had here."

If Spikes really is the best, that would make him tops in a family that holds a special place in the hearts of members of an East Texas town just inside the Louisiana border.

The Spikes clan became household names in 1986 when nearly a dozen of Jeff's cousins and brothers helped Burkeville to their first and only Class A title.

Jeff was in fourth grade then and not allowed to play with his relatives because he suffered from asthma. He finally got in uniform for one game in the eighth grade, then began playing regularly as a freshman at Burkeville.

Spikes, at 5-foot-7 and 165 pounds, plays running back and linebacker. Harper has limited him

mostly to offense early this season to make sure he's fresh on offense so the humidity won't cause an asthma flareup.

There was little fear of that last weekend considering Burkeville was never on the field very long. Spikes usually got them into the end zone quickly; he ran for touchdowns of 6, 75, 65 and 35 yards.

But it could be hard for Spikes to repeat last year's record season, the fifth best rushing total ever in Class A and the ninth highest all-time for any class.

The problem isn't with Spikes; it's the schedule. Three teams backed out of games, leaving Burkeville scrambling to find replacements. This weekend, Burkeville - the sixth-ranked team in Class A - had to settle for the Tacogoches junior varsity.

On the other side of the state last weekend, another running back had a performance comparable to Spikes.

The less-likely outburst came from Midland's Roy Coats, who ran for 337 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries as the Bulldogs beat El Paso Bel Air 31-14 for their first victory since the final game of the 1992 season.

Coats already was the team's featured runner, but he practically became Midland's only ballcarrier Friday night when three other running backs were hurt and a fourth was left behind with a grade problem.

He responded with a city-record effort and the 16th best game in Class 5A history.

"I figured I had a few (yards) with the long runs and the way our offensive line was dominating the game, but I had no idea I had over 300 yards," said Coats, who topped the local mark of 313 set in 1989 by Midland Lee's Farris Strambler.

Coats, who ran for 170 yards in Midland's opener against Frenship, had that beat by halftime of the Bel Air game with 172 yards. He got a big chunk of it on a 92-yard TD run and a 36-yard burst that set up another score.

His second touchdown came on a 55-yard run in the third quarter and he added a 2-yarder in the fourth.

"He just had one of those career nights," Midland coach Ronnie Reeger said. "Hopefully, he has more in him."

Coats, a 5-foot-11, 190-pound senior, ran for 963 yards last year on a team that went 0-10 in District 4-5A, which year-in, year-out is arguably the state's toughest.

While the huge game helped Coats make a name for himself, he'll soon have to back it up in district play against the likes of No. 3 Abilene Cooper, Odessa Permian and other area powers.

"I think he can average 100-plus yards," Reeger said. "He has that capability and we give him the ball enough. We need that sort of production out of him."

In other outstanding Week Two performances:

-Gainesville's Brandon Harrison and Julius Jackson were the stars of the No. 5 Leopards' 43-21 victory over Southlake Carroll that ended the Dragons' 72-game regular-season winning streak.

Harrison ran for 238 yards and two touchdowns on 23 carries, and returned a kickoff 80 yards to set up another score. Jackson had 145 yards and two touchdowns on eight carries, plus another TD on an interception return.

- In the other surprise of last weekend, A&M Consolidated quarterback Anthony Hensley ran for 72 yards and a touchdown and threw for 108 yards, and Troy Walters had seven catches for 119 yards in the Tigers' 23-3 victory over then-No. 8 Odessa Permian.

-Texarkana Liberty-Eylau junior Cedrick Hamilton gets the do-everything award for his performance in a 42-8 victory over Atlanta. Hamilton scored four TDs, kicked two PATs, scored a two-point conversion, caught a 40-yard pass and had two sacks.

-Deshone Bowler scored five touchdowns in No. 4 Sweeny's 71-12

victory over Columbia. Bowler ran for 187 yards, including TD runs of 4, 36, 17 and 50. His other score came on a 95-yard kickoff return.

-Shaylor Hart's 5-yard touchdown run with 22 seconds left allowed Garland to knock off Class 4A's then-No. 3 Sherman 28-25.

- Union Hill quarterback Randy Boren and receiver Chris Styles keyed the game-winning rally in a 19-17 victory over Union Hill by connecting on a 30-yard pass, then a 43-yard TD pass with 18 seconds left.

- Ansel Carter of Converse Judson scored twice in the final nine seconds of the first half of the No. 6 Rockets' 62-7 victory over Corpus Christi Carroll. After returning a punt 27 yards for a touchdown, he returned an interception 63 yards on the first play after the kickoff.

- Corsicana's Ketric Sanford ran for 256 yards on 32 carries in a 16-12 victory over Belton. Teammate Malik Ledbetter had two interceptions in the game, the second of which ended Belton's last drive.

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## Capriati plans return to pro tennis

CLEVELAND (AP) - Jennifer Capriati plans to focus on fun and not let the pressure overwhelm her as she makes her professional tennis comeback.

Capriati, who left the women's tour last year and was later arrested on drug charges, plans to return to the game in early October.

"It's going to be different this time," Capriati said Tuesday. "I'm not going to put a lot of pressure on myself. I just want to play again, have fun and see how it goes."

The International Management Group, an agency representing Capriati, said Tuesday the 18-year-old has requested wild-card entries

to the Barilla Indoors tournament in Zurich, Switzerland, and the Porsche Tennis Grand Prix in Filderstadt, Germany. The requests are certain to be accepted.

The Zurich tournament will be held Oct. 3-9 and the Filderstadt tournament Oct. 10-16.

Capriati has been practicing at her family's new home in Palm Desert, Calif. She moved there a few weeks ago from Boca Raton, Fla. Her parents, who had been living in the Tampa, Fla., area, also moved to Palm Desert.

The Times said Capriati's father, with whom she has had a tempestuous relationship, has become her

courtside adviser. Capriati told the paper she isn't interested in hiring a coach until she decides whether she wants to play full-time again.

"It may seem like a sudden decision to some people, but I've wanted to play for some time and I've thought it out and figure, why not, that I'm mentally ready to play," Capriati told The New York Times.

"It's great news," tennis commentator Mary Carillo said from Naples, Fla. "That's sooner than I thought she'd be back."

Carillo said she could not predict how long it would be before Capriati returns to her old form.

Capriati, who earned nearly \$1.5

million during her career, stopped playing tennis last year after losing in the first round of the U.S. Open.

After leaving the tour, Capriati was arrested May 16 at a motel in Coral Gables, Fla., and charged with marijuana possession after a weekend allegedly spent partying with friends.

# Sanders brings back memories for Switzer

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Barry Switzer can recall the moment he first saw Barry Sanders run.

"I remember watching film when I was at Oklahoma getting ready to play Oklahoma State," Switzer said Tuesday. "I saw this back run a kickoff back 100 yards. Then, a little

while later, he did it again. "I walked over to our coaches in another room and I told them 'you better hope Thurman Thomas doesn't get hurt. Look at this freshman cat run.'"

Switzer added, "Barry Sanders is the best back I saw out of the Big

Eight Conference in the last 30 years." Sanders and the Detroit Lions take on Switzer's Dallas Cowboys Monday night in Texas Stadium, home of the NFL's top running back, Emmitt Smith.

"Both are great players," Switzer said. "Barry doesn't get to touch the

ball like Emmitt does. If Barry did, his stats would be better. Barry always makes things happen. His supporting cast isn't as great as Emmitt's.

"All great backs look the same when they have no place to run." Switzer recalled Sanders always gave Oklahoma trouble.

"His teams had trouble winning because the defense wasn't good enough," Switzer said. "But he would scare you."

Switzer said Oklahoma State got Sanders locked up before he knew about him.

"Nobody had a chance to get him," Switzer said. "Oklahoma State

got a film of Barry out of a Wichita high school from the coach. I think they destroyed the film after they saw what a great player he was. Nobody saw him."

Sanders, who gained only 16 yards last week in a 10-3 loss to Minnesota, needs 75 yards against Dallas to reach 7,000 career rushing yards.

"Mitchell is a big strong guy, but he can't run like Bucky," Switzer said. "He's not a threat to scramble like Bucky did. It's a great dimension to have in a quarterback."

Richardson burned the Dallas defense with seven scrambles for 37 yards.

"We were worried about Bucky even on fourth and nine," Switzer said. "Mitchell has a strong arm with great velocity."

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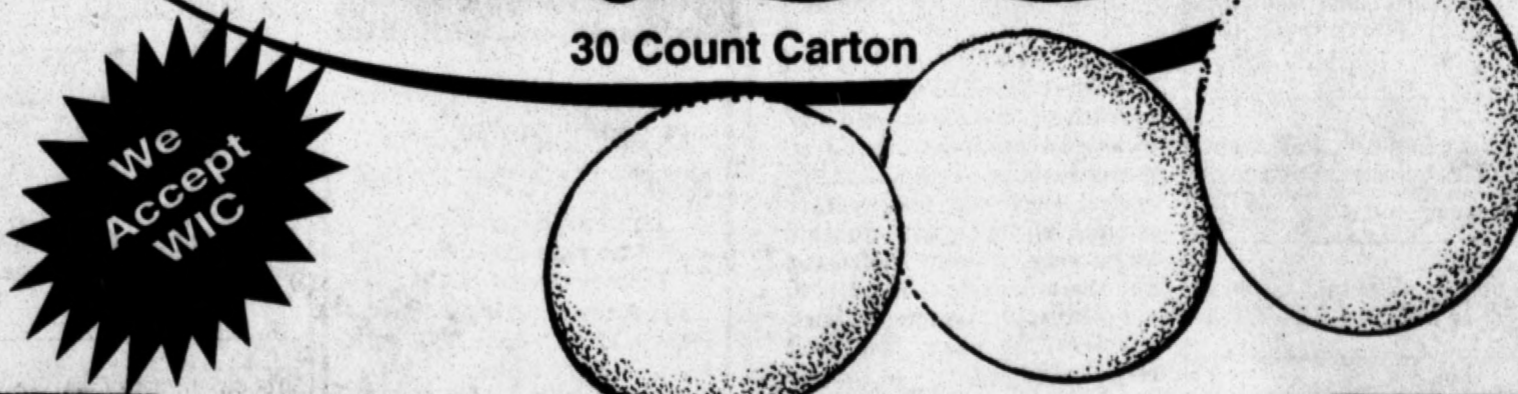

Dear Heloise: My family loves croutons on fresh green salads. Is there an easy way for me to make them myself? Thanks in advance. — Minnie R., Minneapolis, Minn.

Yes, and this is a good way to save money by using day-old (or older) bread.

Cut the bread into cubes and brush lightly with vegetable oil or melted butter. Then put the cubes in a shallow baking pan and bake at 300 degrees F for 20-25 minutes; stir once halfway through the cooking process.

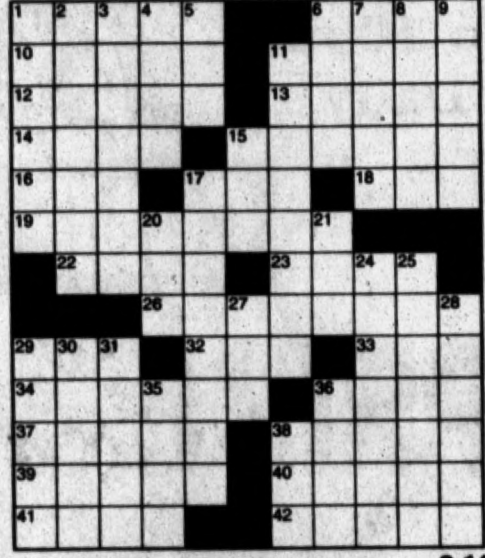

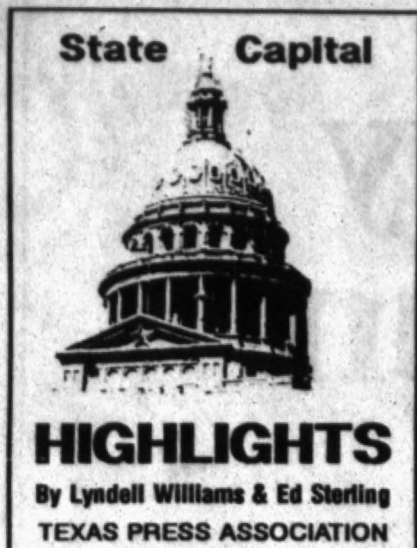

**AUSTIN —** GOP gubernatorial nominee George W. Bush has agreed to debate incumbent Democratic Gov. Ann Richards in Dallas on Oct. 21, but that's a long wait for Texas voters who had hoped to see campaign coals turn cherry red from frequent debates.

The Richards-Bush confrontation — only 18 days before election day — will be piggybacked with a separate debate between Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison and her Democratic opponent, Richard Fisher.

According to a report in *The Dallas Morning News*, the two debates will be fueled by selected residents and reporters who will ask questions of the candidates. The debates will be broadcast across Texas on television and radio stations.

The Hutchison-Fisher debate will take place in the first hour and the Richards-Bush debate will take up the second hour of the forum that is billed as "The Texas Debates: The People's Agenda."

According to the *Morning News* report, Richards was the first to agree to participate in the Dallas debate. She made her intentions known last month, saying, "The format allows regular folks to ask questions directly of the candidates."

Richards also has agreed to debate Bush on Sept. 22 on CNN's "Larry King Live" television show. Bush has not decided whether to do the Larry King show.

**Bush Blasts New Penal Code**  
 From the office of Travis County Sheriff Terry Keel, a Republican, Bush accepted the terms of the Oct. 21 debate forum while calling the new state penal code "misguided public policy."

Bush said he is looking forward "to looking Ann Richards right in the eye," and pointing out what he considers faults in the penal code that went into effect Sept. 1, such as automatic probation for first-time nonviolent offenders.

Redrawing boundaries for the 18th and 29th districts in Houston and the 30th in Dallas could affect as many as half of the state's 30 congressional districts.

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales said the "court acted properly in not disenfranchising the voters, and in not disrupting the coming elections."

**Former SA Man Indicted**  
 A former San Antonio man is free on a \$50,000 bond after being charged in a federal indictment with funneling \$11,000 in illegal contributions to 10 current or former congressmen, including seven from Texas.

The 10-count indictment handed down by a San Antonio grand jury accused Leslie Alfred Tabor, 62, now of Georgetown, Tenn., the former president of Sherwood Van Lines of "causing the concealment by scheme and device."

Citing the Federal Election Code, the indictment alleged that Tabor disguised political contributions during the 1990 campaign to hide the fact that the money came from Sherwood Van Lines.

The indictment said Tabor used his wife, Ilene Tabor, "as a conduit" to funnel Sherwood money to the political campaigns of the 10 House Democrats, including former Rep. Albert Bustamante of San Antonio.

The other Texas lawmakers mentioned in the indictment were Reps. Greg Laughlin of West Columbia, Chet Edwards of Waco, Charles Wilson of Lufkin, Bill Sarpalis of Amarillo, Pete Geren of Fort Worth and Jim Chapman of Sulphur Springs.

An insurance industry group proposed a 17.7 percent increase in the standard rates for automobile coverage and Farmers Insurance Group recommended an average 12.5 percent rate boost. The proposals by the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office and Farmers were the only rate recommendations filed by the industry before the Sept. 27 public hearing on auto insurance rates.

Former base closure chairman Jim Courter turned down a \$75,000 offer to help protect San Antonio's five military installations during the next round of cutbacks. J. Tullos Wells, incoming chairman of the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, said Courter was fearful such a deal would be improper, considering his previous service as head of the federal commission studying base closures.
