Demos hope for vote on modified crime bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - Democrats hope they are a whisker away from a deal with moderate Republicans to shrink President Clinton's crime-fighting bill by one-tenth and finally move the stalled package through the House.

Meeting behind closed doors throughout the Capitol, bargainers from the two sides labored past midnight Friday over details of a compromise that would trim the measure's funds for crime prevention, police and prisons to \$30 billion from \$33.5 billion.

Democrats were resisting GOP efforts to target the bulk of the cuts at prevention programs such as midnight basketball and job training. The two sides also were trying to reach final handshakes on provisions dealing with an automatic weapons ban, trials of repeat rape offenders and the tracking of sexual offenders.

Lawmakers hoped for a quick agreement that would let the House approve the election-year legislation as early as Saturday. The Senate would debate it next week. At a news conference Friday, Clinton supported the budding compromise and prodded Congress to pass it "without delay."

"We owe it to the American people that do the work and pay the bills in this country to make sure that people who commit crime get caught, that those who are guilty get convicted, and those who are convicted serve their time," he said. "We also owe it to them to do whatever we can to prevent crime in the first place."

The White House and its Democratic allies were thirsting for a victory to produce something tangible to show the voters before Election Day, and to ignite a winning streak for the next big fight, Clinton's health-care plan. They were humiliated last week when the Democratic-run House turned aside a \$33.5 billion version of the bill by a 225-210 vote.

With the public identifying crime as its biggest concern in poll after poll, about 40 moderate Republicans led by freshman Rep. Michael Castle of Delaware also hoped the bargaining would produce a package they could support.


"It's key for all of us here to see a crime bill passed this year," said Rep. Peter Torkildsen, R-Mass. "We agree on that."

Conservative Republicans, led by Minority Whip Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., said they would probably oppose the final product, even though Gingrich said he supported the moderates' effort to revamp the legislation.

"It will be a better bill than it was when the Democrats wrote the bill," he said.

Besides the spending, the legislation would ban 19 kinds of assault-style weapons; allow capital punishment for more than 60 additional federal crimes including murder for hire; require lifetime imprisonment for many three-time violent offenders; allow 13-year-olds to be tried as adults for many violent federal crimes; and make it a federal offense to cross state lines to injure a spouse or domestic partner.

Senate receives new health plan from bipartisan group

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate appears to be getting serious about health reform that is more incremental than fundamental, setting off storms of denunciations among liberal groups and displeasing some conservatives as well.

The trigger was the long-awaited release Friday of a bipartisan "mainstream" plan that focuses on market-based insurance reforms and does not require that employers pay for their workers' insurance.

It promises subsidies for low-income families to buy insurance, and \$100 billion in deficit reduction over 10 years. Members of the Senate group - which numbered 20 at points this week - said they would aim to cover 95 percent of Americans soon after the turn of the century.

"This is not a Neiman-Marcus plan," said Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn. "It is a Price Club plan. You get what you need, at a price you can afford."

The bipartisan blueprint is expected to be highly influential as the stalled Senate health-reform debate enters its final days. Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, whose own health reform bill is pending on the floor, said he planned to discuss it with senators throughout the weekend.

Advocates of President Clinton's original plans for universal insurance coverage, generous benefits and stringent government cost control said they would fight the moderate alternative.

"For mainstream Americans who want good benefits and coverage like Congress has, this proposal prescribes little more than a dose of cold water," said the Health Care Reform

Project, a coalition of organizations with a combined 65 million members.

Liberals cited several serious problems - among them "failsafe" deficit reduction triggering subsidies if overall costs got out of hand.

Subsidies would be financed through \$400 billion in Medicaid and Medicare savings and a 45-cent-a-pack increase in cigarette taxes.

To contain costs, the group proposed a new limit on employer deductibility of health insurance premiums. In addition, employers would lose tax breaks if they offered free medical benefits, and workers would have to pay income taxes on the value of such benefits.

The reliance on market mechanisms drew scorn from liberals.

Jerry Shea, an AFL-CIO health official, called the cap on employer deductibility "fool's gold. It's a cruel hoax."

Mitchell called the proposal "a step toward getting final action on a bill."

"The known effective methods for controlling costs - premium caps, budgets and set rates - are nowhere in sight," said Sen. Paul Wellstone, D-Minn. "This proposal is likely to make health care less affordable and less accessible for the majority of people."

Reaction was equally sharp among a group of conservative Republican senators who are not anxious to pass health reform anytime soon.

"I intend to fight them just as hard as I fought Bill Clinton," Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said of the moderates.

"They've worked hard and certainly produced what I think is a good effort," said Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan.

Mitchell called the proposal "a step toward getting final action on a bill."

In a presentation to the City Commission last Monday, Chief Wagner reported a steady rise in offenses by juveniles in Hereford.

Highlights of the report are:

-- Total crimes committed by juveniles and investigated by Hereford police have climbed from 181 in 1991 to 369 in the first seven months of 1994. There were 284 in 1992 and 262 in 1993.

-- Juvenile suspects handled by the police department this year are outdistancing all previous years with 549 listed through July. In 1993, there were 473 while 469 were handled in 1992. The 1991 number was 364. Low points were '90, with 227, and 1989, with 205.

-- Critical hours for juvenile activities are from 10 p.m. to 3 a.m. Police department statistics indicate that from September 1993 to August 1994, the greatest number of juvenile suspects handled came between 11 p.m. and 12 midnight, when 47 were recorded. From 10 p.m. to 11 p.m., the number was 28. During the hour ending at 1 p.m., there were 17 and in the next two hours, there were 16 and 19 respectively. From 3 a.m. to 6 a.m., there were seven, three and eight.

-- The number of felony crimes by juveniles in the first seven months this year is 66, compared with 103 total in 1993, 73 in 1992 and 23 in 1991.

-- Misdemeanors this year, through July, stand at 153. In 1993, there were 168 and the 1992 total was 211. The '91 total was 159.

-- Acts of vandalism (criminal mischief) by juvenile suspects, age 16 and under, climbed from 19 in 1989 to 30 in 1990, 32 in 1991 and 64 in 1992, then dropped to 41 last year. But, the total so far in 1994 is 59, with five months still to go.

-- Thefts by juvenile suspects, age 16 and under, this year appear slightly below the pace of 1993. Thirty-seven have been investigated through July, compared with 73 in 1993, a peak year in a six-year span. Forty were recorded in 1989, 18 in 1990, 41 in 1991 and 60 in 1992.

father returned to the Duluth.

Another moment of excitement came on the fourth day out, when underwater welders on the Duluth were summoned by helicopter to the U.S.S. Frederick, which had sprung an 8-inch hole in its bottom that needed repairs.

"They had an air show for us. They had Hammer jets flying," Tohm said, and Apache jets firing rounds into the ocean about a quarter-mile in front of the Duluth.

The "Tigers," as tour participants were called, also saw the two large Gatling guns on the front of the vessel, which Tohm said, "could shoot 150 rounds in three seconds."

On the sixth day out, a fuel tanker from San Diego intercepted the Duluth and the other ships with which it traveled. The fuel tanker pulled up next to the Duluth for refueling, while another ship narrowed the standard 100-foot gap between ships and refueled on the other side.

At another time, Tohm said, he was given the chance to steer the ship, taking the controls for a few minutes from the captain.

In addition to its calls to duty to fly sick bays and welders, the ship's flight deck was pressed into service for a more social reason during the trip.

A barbecue was held for the Tigers on the flight deck, which Tohm described as large enough that "you could land two of the big double-bladed helicopters on it" and have room left over.

No area of the ship was off limits to the Tigers, Tohm said.

"I got to go everywhere in the ship," he said, recalling the computer room, where "they had a screen that showed every ship in the ocean -- even the Russian ones."

All too soon the trip ended and Tohm, the other Tigers and the Marines disembarked at Camp Delmar.

Tohm said the voyage taught him quite a bit about the shipboard duties of his son.

"I'd definitely do it again," he said.

Club ranked 4th in world, to observe special week

Hereford Toastmasters, Club No. 275, joins Toastmasters International Aug. 21-27 in observing the 70th anniversary of the organization, and Mayor Bob Josserand has proclaimed Aug. 21-27 as Toastmasters Week.

Friday night, District Gov. Jigger Rowland of Hereford was in Louisville, KY., to pick up the President's Distinguished Club award, ranking it as the fourth best in the world in its size category.

Only one other club in this district has won the president's award, according to Robert Barnhill, international vice president. Recognition is based on points earned by increasing membership and reaching educational and leadership goals.

Hereford is in District 44 of Toastmasters, which is celebrating its 40th anniversary. Rowland currently serves as district governor, while other Hereford members serving as district officers include Dee Hamilton, secretary; Linda Minchew, treasurer; and Joe Weaver, bulletin editor. Rick Jackson, immediate past

president of the local club, is also governor of Area III, a subdivision of the district. He was recently named outstanding club president in the district.

Dr. Milton Adams, 76, of Hereford was the first district governor, and he is a charter member and longest-standing member of the Hereford club. He is also a past international director. Organized here in 1950, the club ceased functioning in the 1970s. The club reorganized in 1977 and now boasts 38 members.

Toastmasters was first organized by Dr. Ralph C. Smedley at Santa Ana, CA., on Oct. 22, 1924. There are now more than 190,000 members in 8,000 clubs in 52 countries.

Mayor Bob Josserand this week proclaimed the week of Aug. 21-27 as Toastmasters Week in Hereford, encouraging citizens "to recognize the many accomplishments and opportu-

nities in communications and public speaking available through the local outstanding organization."

Toastmasters welcomes people at all stages of speaking ability and from all walks of life. The local club membership features farmers, mechanics, supervisors, sales personnel, politicians, teachers, bookkeepers, office managers, an optometrist, a CPA, and even a tax collector.

Typical meetings begin with an invocation or inspirational reading, and the pledge of allegiance. Prepared speeches follow and each presentation is evaluated by another member who highlights merits and offers suggestions for improvement. Table topics, speeches and evaluations are timed. A reading and usually a joke round out the meeting, which lasts about an hour.

Local club members also have the opportunity to compete in district, division and international speech contests.

The mission statement of the club is to "provide a mutually supportive and positive learning environment in which every member has the opportunity to develop communication and leadership skills, which in turn foster self-confidence and personal growth."

The local club meets for early risers at 6:30 a.m. on Thursdays at the Ranch House, and at 7 p.m. at the Sirloin Stockade for those who prefer a later time. Visitors are welcome at either meeting. Toastmaster dues are \$56 a year, with a \$16 initiation fee for new-member material.

Hereford voters gave approval in last Saturday's election to a 1/2-cent dedicated sales tax for economic development, and we believe it's a decision that could make a big difference in the community's future.

As we've written before, there are no guarantees with this action, but it sure gives us a better opportunity to land new industry and expand existing businesses.

The five people appointed to an economic development commission have a tough job ahead of them. It will be thankless task and probably one that will draw criticism. Some folks will expect overnight success and it just doesn't happen that way.

But the majority of citizens have indicated they are ready to try something to get things moving. They are willing to invest a few dollars a week in attempting to attract new business, more jobs and, ultimately, a broader tax base and more progressive community.

No free lunch?

There's no such thing as a free lunch. I've heard that all my life. In today's society, however, many folks think the old adage is not necessarily true.

Easy money appeals to growing circles of people and millions are getting as much as they can from the source of least resistance—government payments.

But it's still not free. In an opinion written by James Cook, a Minnesota market analyst, the cost of the free lunch is the erosion of both the work ethic and good character.

Government subsidies encourage the worse aspects of human nature. Once people become dependent on the money, the end justifies the means. It's difficult for people to distinguish between the rights and wrongs of something that benefits them.

Money dispersed without any requirement to earn it seems to set off a defensive reaction. Many recipients claim a right to the money almost like it's a pension, or a person who has purchased an annuity, writes Cook.

A Boston newspaper reported earlier this year that a woman and her extended family receive government assistance totaling almost \$1 million a year. The mother, who has been on public assistance for 26 years, has 14 children on welfare, 74 grandchildren, and 15 great-grandchildren on relief.

The newspaper says she lives in a six-bedroom, three-story apartment in a gated Boston community called Harbor Point. The welfare mother is defensive. "I'm sick of people acting like I'm some crook. We've got a lot of kids to feed."

We sure do!

Granted, many of the welfare claims and government subsidies are for legitimate reasons. But government giveaway programs encourage every imaginable sort of cheating and dishonesty among the recipients. The point is that generous payments will always create abuses.

America made it through the Great Depression of the 1930s and emerged stronger. Now, each recession finds millions more hooked on welfare. Instead of meeting financial problems with hard work and adaptability, many welfare recipients tend to give up the struggle. For them, weakness replaces strength; fear overcomes faith, Cook states.

Social benefits carry benefits that spread the problem. Payments to those who can't find work will snare many who could find work. Payments to alleviate poverty have a way of spreading poverty.

Something for nothing is contrary to nature. There is a price to pay for government giveaways. We can see some of the results in the explosion of crime and our shrinking national wealth. These are early warning signs for a nation that has set itself on a course of self-destruction.

William Bennett tells us in the "Devaluing of America," that "those whose beliefs govern our institutions will in large measure win the battle for the culture." He adds that liberals understood far better than did their conservative opponents that a culture war is a war to the death. And, "it's not so much a battle over policy but rather a battle about matters of the spirit."

Bennett continues, "Reclaiming our institutions is less a political opportunity than a civic obligation. It involves hard work, but it is work of immense importance. At the end of the day, somebody's values will prevail."

Smoking: involuntary disability?

If you don't smoke, you may want to start.

We've got it figured out that smoking can mean cash money in your pocket--money from the federal treasury.

A federal advisory panel has ruled that nicotine is an addictive drug and if the Food and Drug Administration adopts the panel's recommendation, could declare that nicotine poses the same sort of danger to health as heroin or cocaine.

And that's where the money is.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development(HUD) and the federal courts have defined drug addiction and alcoholism, as well as AIDS and mental illness, as "federally protected involuntary disabilities."

And that makes drunks and addicts eligible for SSI.

And what is SSI? It is U.S. Treasury Supplemental Security Income and is one of the nation's largest and fastest-growing cash welfare programs.

SSI was established by Congress in 1974 to assist low-income Americans who were elderly, blind or otherwise unable to work. This year, six million recipients will pocket \$25 billion in SSI benefits--up from 4.8 million recipients and \$16 billion just four years ago.

It's our fastest-growing cash benefit now because under the program's "federally protected involuntary disability," habitual drunks and junkies qualify to receive benefits from taxpayers.

An estimated 250,000 alcoholics and drug addicts receive almost \$1.5 billion a year from SSI and its companion program, Social Security Disability Insurance(SSDI). And because of their involuntary

disability, the same people can also qualify for Medicaid and food stamps and other federal benefits.

"Taxpayer dollars are used directly to subsidize and perpetuate drug and alcohol abuse," according to a minority staff report earlier this year by the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging.

Seems to me that stores ought to have one simple policy -- no matter how much money a juvenile has, he cannot buy cigarettes, even if they are allegedly for mom or dad.


I know that won't stop teen

Herd looks to keep 1993 momentum going

Since Oct. 15, 1993, the Hereford High School football program has been on a roll, and head coach Danny Haney would like to keep rolling through the 1994 schedule.

Last year's Hereford football team finished with a 4-6 record; it was the first losing record for a Herd team since 1978. The season started with six straight losses, but three of those were by a field goal or less. (Tascosa later had to forfeit its season-opening

victory over the Herd.)

On Oct. 15, though, Hereford broke the slide with a win over rival Randall. Hereford finished the season by winning three out of four and was even in the playoff hunt until the end.

That finish was what this year's players remembered during spring workouts, Haney said, and the good attitude has carried over into the first practices of this season.

"Every year is a separate year, but you carry tradition over," he said. "Last year's team left a mark for this

team, finishing the way it did."

"Our emphasis every year is to get in the playoffs and to do everything we can do to win the state championship. As a continuation of the offseason—a great offseason—two-a-days were upbeat. The athletes were really focused on the things we're trying to do."

Some of that showed in the scrimmage with Plainview Friday night in Whiteface Stadium. Hereford got the ball in the end zone two times during the 3 1/2 hour, rainsoaked

scrimmage. Plainview scored seven times, though most of those came late in the session.

When Hereford's more-or-less first team offense went against Plainview's first team defense, Hereford scored once. When Plainview's first offense went against Hereford's top defenders, Plainview scored once, capping off a sustained drive with a one-yard TD run.

Hereford's score was set up when fullback Armando Zambrano caught a short pass from Michael Brown and turned it into a 45-yard gain. Later, on fourth-and-three, Brown found tight end Scott Parker for a first down at the five-yard line. Brown then hit Ronald Torres with a touchdown pass.

"We were able to run a balanced attack with running and passing," Haney said. "We got it down the field and got it in the end zone with a nice play from Michael to Ronald. The execution level was very good in the first series."

Earlier, on the fifth play of the night, Michael Brown scrambled and sidestepped several would-be tacklers for an apparent 70-yard scoring run, but it was called back because of a clipping penalty.

Much later in the scrimmage, Hereford got its second score when Brown found Jeb Skiles for a three-yard touchdown pass.

Several of Plainview's scores were on big plays, and two of them came

The key to all of this is the offensive line, and Haney likes his.

"The offensive line has worked extremely hard developing their strength and quickness," Haney said. "We're as big and strong as we've ever been."

Haney offered as examples Michael Medina and Josh Gamboa, both of which are about 6 feet, 2 inches tall and weigh 260 pounds. Two other top candidates are 200-pounders Joe De La Cruz, a starter last year, and Terance High, the Herd's placekicker last year.

At center, there's a good battle among Gabriel Guerrero, Keith Flood and Samuel Berryman, Haney said.

Candidates for fullback are Zambrano, Josh Urbanczyk and John Emerson.

Rounding out the offense, Hereford has some experienced receivers coming back. Tight end Scott Parker and receivers Marc Haney and Homer Hamilton represent one-fourth of the Herd's total of 12 returning lettermen. Haney was one of the Herd's leading receivers with 15 catches for 230 yards and three touchdowns.

Other tight ends are Raymond Gonzales and J.P. Villarreal. Other receivers include Wade Backus, Johnny Garza and Ronald Torres.

The Herd defense returns four players who earned starting jobs by the end of the year: tackle Shawn Malone, end Richard Hicks, linebacker Jacob Lopez and cornerback Michael Marquez. End David Hicks also earned a letter.

Michael Brown was the starting safety last year, but probably will stay

at quarterback this year.

"We're looking to our defense, particularly the forcing unit, to be a strong point," Haney said. "Our secondary has to develop. They've got to come on."

The top candidates at the defensive positions, besides the returning lettermen, include:

Tackle: Michael Kriegshauser, Dion Reyna and Mark Blea.
End: Michael Hund, Hector Rodriguez and Ralph Morales.

Linebacker: Armando Zambrano, Martin Martinez, George Cox and Moses Ruiz.

Cornerback: Tanner Murphy, Jeb Skiles, Steven Wright, Josh Bullard and Jacob Moreno.

Safeties: David Vermillion, Hugo Reyes, T.J. Robbins and Homer Hamilton. Marquise Brown also is a possibility.

District 1-4A should see another tight race for the two playoff positions available, and Haney sees his team in the thick of it.

"I don't see any favorites," he said.

"Four teams in this district can win it, and it's real even."

Haney's four teams are Hereford, Randall, Pampa and Borger.

"The toughest team is Pampa," he said. "They're returning most of their defense and they have a tough defense. They've got a good running back in Matt Garvin back. This'll be his fourth year with them."

Randall and Borger return skill position players--Borger tailback Cornell Jones had an even better sophomore year than Marquise Brown--but both have questions in the offensive and defensive lines.

Dumas, Caprock and Canyon round out the district. Haney calls Dumas an "unknown" because of heavy graduation losses, but he says Caprock will be "much improved from what they were last year," when Hereford barely beat the Longhorns in a blizzard in Amarillo.

"I think they're a team we'll have to deal with," Haney said.

Canyon moves into 1-4A after eight years in Class 3A. The adjustment will be difficult for the Eagles, and they may not challenge for a playoff berth, but Haney likes the return of the rivalry Hereford had with Canyon.

"This does bring back a nice rivalry," Haney said. "We're looking forward to it."

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
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
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True Value

Minor league umpires don't have easy life

MIDLAND, Texas - A wizened fan is perched six rows behind home plate at Christensen Stadium, spitting tobacco juice into a plastic cup.

In between spits, the elderly fan carries on an animated conversation about baseball history with a young boy, who seems more interested in his new pack of trading cards than his grandfather's recollections about Ted Williams and Joe DiMaggio.

The arrival of two men in pressed shirts, slacks, turf shoes and battered protective gear ends the family's discussions and rivets their attention toward home plate.

"Kill the umpire," the older fan yells, repeating a line heard across baseball fields everywhere. "I'll get a few right tonight for a change."

Insults like those are echoed all over baseball parks. Umpires say they get used to it on a nightly basis, and in fact, almost would be surprised if they didn't hear such greetings.

"Sure, we can hear them," Texas League umpire Doug Eddings said. "But it doesn't bother us. If it does, you'll be in for a long career."

"If they say anything differently, I might stop and laugh," said Kraig Sanders, Eddings' umpiring partner. "You basically hear the same thing over and over."

A recent road trip with Eddings and Sanders provided a glimpse of the nomadic lifestyle of minor-league umpires. While calling balls and strikes, safes and outs 136 games a season, the umps endure abusive fans and managers, long drives, low pay and a lot of greasy fast-food meals along the way.

"There are days when this job is tough, but the thing I like about it is that it changes from day to day," Sanders said. "I love the opportunity to meet people and go to the different cities and work the games."

Even if it means putting up with overbearing managers, nasty foul tips and a few thousand deep knee bends during the course of the season.

Umpires like Eddings and Sanders look at the game differently than baseball fans. They scan box scores from bottom to the top, pausing to check the umps first, rather than pitching matchups or final scores. They can identify home-plate umpires by sight on television games, merely by checking an umpire's style.

"I personally think that umpires are born and not raised," Eddings said. "You have to have the instincts. But I love what I'm doing, even with everything that goes with it."

The ultimate step in the development of the umpire is a chance to work the major leagues. But making "the show" often takes more than just hanging around the minor leagues for a few years for that opportunity.

With just 60 umpires and little turnover in the big leagues--most umps remain at their jobs 20 years--luck plays a part in getting to the majors.

Competition is fierce for the chance to move up. The odds on making the jump for an umpire are much less than that for players, managers or coaches.

"It's almost like winning the lottery," said Ed Lawrence, executive director of Major League Development in St. Petersburg, Fla. "When you're ready, there has to be an opening. Realistically, we have a lot of people capable of working the big leagues, but there's no spots available."

Industry officials have estimated that a rookie umpire has approximately a 2 percent chance of making the

big leagues. There are about 200 minor-league umpires and hundreds more training at umpiring schools.

Each move in the majors triggers another move that reaches throughout the minor leagues. There are several callups a year because of promotions, injuries, retirements or firings.

"There might be four or five movements in a year," Eddings said. "You see somebody else was picked and you wonder why that is. But you just have to keep going out and doing your job."

"All I want to do is move to Triple-A. I figure if I get a look at that level, I might get a chance in the big leagues."

Eddings, 25, has been umpiring since 1989. He worked two years in the Eastern League before moving to the Texas League this season.

Sanders, 28, took a different route to umpiring. He graduated from college and started a sales job with a trucking company in Memphis, Tenn., for two years before he decided to go to umpire school.

Texas League umpires make about \$2,500 a month, along with \$16 a day meal money and 25 cents per mile travel money. Most of their mileage pays for rented cars.

The seasonal work forces most umps to work a second job during the off-season. Sanders, who will be married later this year, is employed as a temporary worker at his home in Little Rock, Ark.

The starting annual salary for major league umps is \$60,000 and after 20 years they will make \$175,000. They also get the meal money and first-class hotels that umps like Eddings and Sanders dream about.

Trips from El Paso and eastward to Jackson, Miss., and the north-to-south run from Wichita to San Antonio make the Texas League the most nomadic of any of the minor leagues where umps travel by car.

One of the shortest jaunts is the Midland-San Antonio route, which Eddings and Sanders made last weekend. Getting to their hotel before 4:30 a.m. was almost a luxury, considering most of their other trips.

The Texas League maintains four two-man umpiring crews, which travel more than 11,000 miles during the season dispensing baseball justice on a nightly basis.

This year is the first for two-man umpiring crews after many years with three-man teams.

The commissioner's office opted to trim a man from Double-A crews as a cost-cutting measure. They also eliminated vans for umps, who now must provide their own transportation between stops.

The budgetary move trimmed about \$500,000 per year for baseball, a sum of about \$18,000 per major league team.

"It has made it tougher for us, no doubt," Eddings said. "One of the guys on the crew used to be able to sleep in the back while the others drove. It's a lot more difficult with just two of us."

The elimination of the extra umpire didn't cause any job cutbacks, but has affected how the two-man crews work their games.

"It's a lot more difficult working with two umps because we have more area to cover, but we have to do the best we can," Sanders said. "What's particularly tough for us are the balls out of the infield down the lines and the balls hit deep because of the double-decked outfield fences."

The 320-mile trip from San Antonio to Midland is relatively minor in a league where journeys of more than 12 hours are endured.

Within 30 minutes of the end of the Missions' game, the crew was packed and ready to leave Municipal Stadium. After saying brief goodbyes to several local fans, Sanders and Eddings were on the road to Midland for the next night's game.

An unexpected stop along the way came near Comfort, where a Texas Department of Public Safety trooper pulled over Sanders for going 77 mph in a 65-mph zone. It was his second speeding ticket in less than three weeks, despite an impassioned plea that brought up Sanders' future work and the long trip ahead.

"He didn't seem to have any concern about what my future occupational plans were," Sanders said glumly. The ticket will be shared by both members of the crew.

The group finally arrived in Midland about 4 a.m., just in time for a heavy rainstorm that made loading their luggage into the motel a damp experience. Neither Sanders nor Eddings could fall asleep once they arrived, and both stayed awake until well after 6 a.m. while watching reruns of "The Andy Griffith Show."

After sleeping well into the afternoon and a short workout at a nearby health club, the duo was ready to start the first of a five-game series between Midland and Wichita.

"The down time during the day before the game is the hardest thing," Sanders said. "You see the same motel rooms and try to keep from going crazy. I like to get up early in the day and do something away from the hotel, but the travel days make it hard. It takes a couple of days to

bounce back from that."

A variety of electronic gadgets makes their shared motel room feel more like home. A portable phone, answering machine, universal remote control switch and Sega Genesis game system bring all of the comforts on the road with them. When they remain in a city for an extended time, the umps often rent a video cassette recorder and bring compact discs for entertainment.

"The tough thing for us is that all of our games are on the road," Eddings said. "The players will have the chance to spend about half their time at home, where they have friends and things to do. That's not the case for us."

The Texas League strives to keep its umps apart from the players, putting them in separate hotels and steering them to different hotels and restaurants on the road. But in smaller towns like Midland, some confrontations are unavoidable.

After one of the games in Midland, the crew unexpectedly ran into an entourage led by Wichita manager Keith Champion and his coaching staff. Brief pleasantries were exchanged, but the umps made sure they kept their distance from the team.

"You find out where the players go to in town and you try and avoid those places," Eddings said. "But if you run into them, you've got to be civil. But it's not a good idea to be out with them."

Whether they are friendly with the players or not, umps are required to make snap judgments as a matter

of instinct.

During a three-game swing last week, Eddings and Sanders had no controversial calls to make. Other than some harping over balls and strikes, nothing eventful happened during the games.

"Typically, most of our games are pretty quiet," Sanders said. "There really isn't much going on during about 75 percent of the games. But when things happen, they always seem to come at the same time."

Both remember an El Paso-San Antonio series in late June, when El Paso manager Tim Ireland was ejected two consecutive games when Eddings was working behind the plate.

"Tim is just a fiery guy who sticks up for his team and wants to win very bad," Eddings said. "It was nothing personal between him and me."

"I don't mind the controversy, because those are situations I can handle. I would rather have a game like that any day than one where I get hit by a foul ball."

After one game in Midland, Eddings was hit on the right arm by a foul tip

and a picked up a nasty bruise. Similar bumps are part of the price of working behind the plate.


Sanders remembers an incident earlier this season when his parents watched one of his games in Little Rock.

"That was the first time they had ever watched me call a game," Sanders said. "I told them to watch the game and not say anything about me working to anybody around them."


"As invariably happens with my mom, she started talking with another lady, whose son was playing in the game. By the time the game was over they got to be pretty good friends. But the other lady told my mom she didn't realize umps had families, too."

The closest person to an umpire during the season is their partner. Umpires joke that their relationship with their partners makes them "brothers for a summer."

"People just think we just pop up from the ground," Sanders said. "They don't realize all that goes into getting us into this situation."



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Mystery surrounds unusual Texas Centennial china set

AUSTIN - A set of unusual Texas Centennial china has become the centerpiece of a historical mystery. The dishes, on display at a Round Rock antique mall, are drawing attention for their intricate hand-painted bluebonnets and wildflowers.

But no one seems to know exactly where the historic Lone Star dishes came from - or where they might end up. State officials hope somebody will buy them and donate them to the state so they can be showcased in the Capitol.

On the back of the Wedgwood plates, the inscription reads: "Texas Centennial 1936. This design was inspired by the wild flowers of Texas."

Constance Crow of Crow's Nest Antiques said she acquired the dishes from an older Texas couple who had little information about them.

"The persons who had them had inherited them, and their relatives had purchased them at a Texas Centennial function back in 1936," Crow said.

"We haven't found anybody who can say they've ever seen them before," she said. "We've even contacted the Wedgwood (Collectors') Society back East and they can't give us any information on it. They don't know anything."

"They said that Wedgwood was notorious for doing special things for department stores and everything, but they wouldn't put them in their books, about how much they made or where it went," she said. "We don't even know who they were specially consigned for."

Dealey Herndon, executive director of the State Preservation Board, said the board's collection review committee is studying the china to determine its historical value.

If the five-member committee approves, the preservation board plans to try to find a donor to pay the \$8,500 price for the 53 pieces.

"We have to have private funds," Herndon said. "It's obviously not a state purchase. We would have to identify a donor."

"They're gorgeous, and very unique. We would hate to lose them to some collector."

If the state acquired the dishes, they would be displayed in the public reception room of the lieutenant governor's office, Herndon said.

Bill Bain of Houston, a long-time collector of Texas Centennial memorabilia, said he was surprised to learn of the dishes.

"I would certainly think they are a scarcity, a hard-to-find item," he said. "I've been collecting Texas Centennial items since 1970, and I've

never seen that particular design and have never heard of it.

"Somebody, probably a jewelry store or a department store or it could have been a fund-raising group, probably got a commission from the Texas Centennial to have these plates made."

The 12 place settings include a dinner plate, bread plate, cup and saucer. There is also a serving platter, a cream and sugar set and two additional plates.

Each dinner plate has three bluebonnets painted in its center and a thick border of other wildflowers. At first glance, each plate looks identical, but closer inspection reveals subtle differences.

"Everyone who sees it goes crazy," Crow said.

Crow said she received the dishes a few months ago and thought she was acquiring a different line of Centennial china that is not rare.

"When I got it, I was in complete shock," she said. "It was like a Christmas present you get. I opened up the box and said, 'Oh my God. What have I got?'"

The china is on display at Crow's booth at the Antique Mall of Texas on Interstate 35 in Round Rock.

"We would like to see it sold to someone who would put it on display for the public," Crow said.

New Parenting Bible helps with advice on raising kids

Sick of your kids fighting over who got more when you handed out the snacks?

Take a tip from the Book of Acts and let the injured parties do it themselves next time.

At a loss for what to say when your son or daughter encounters prejudice?

The answer for Christian families might lie in re-reading the Gospel of Mark with eyes on the loving attitude Jesus showed to tax collectors and sinners.

Even with the bookstores' sagging shelves of parenting tomes, the ultimate self-help book for mothers and fathers might be the Bible, according to "The Parenting Bible."

The new book, published by Zondervan, of Grand Rapids, Mich., integrates parenting advice, timeless words of wisdom from other sources and family fun activities with the New International Version of the Bible to show how biblical teachings can be applied to contemporary parenting issues.

"One of the things you find about parents these days is that parents are scared about the task of parenting," Larry Richards, author of the notes and articles in "The Parenting Bible," said in an interview. "We try to take some of the scariness out of it."

Richards says it is unrealistic today, when two parents work in many families and kids tend to have full schedules of activities, to expect the average family to read the Bible together daily.

His more modest goal in the new Bible is to have families do one activity a week that makes a biblical point about family life in a manner everyone can appreciate.

"A lot of that depends not on the traditional devotional-type activities, but on family fun that builds relationships," said Richards, himself.

a grandparent who also worked on "The Adventure Bible" for children.

For example, in an exercise that develops self-esteem and helps children understand the passages in Genesis that explain human beings were created in the image and likeness of God, the new Bible suggests parents spend a week keeping a diary recording the "special" things their children do. At supper one evening, parents are encouraged to share their diary entries and give their kids aluminum-foil crowns.

Fifty districts file suit over state funding

HOUSTON (AP) - More than 50 Texas school districts have sued the state, saying inflated property tax estimates since 1985 improperly stripped them of entitled shares of education money.

The 54 districts, who filed suit this month, say if they prevail and recalculations are done, millions will be rerouted their way, The Houston Post reported Friday.

"They raise some legitimate points," said Greg Hartman, executive assistant to State Comptroller John Sharp. "If they're right, it's something we have to take a look at. We just need to fix if it's wrong. We're glad somebody pointed it out."

At issue is anywhere from \$40 million to \$80 million in back aid.

Under state law, a poorer district is entitled to more state aid, while wealthier districts receive less money.

On Aug. 4, Bridge City Independent School District and 46 others, including Dallas and Austin ISD, filed suit in Travis County. Houston, Lubbock and five other districts filed a separate suit in Travis County last Friday.

Every year, the comptroller's office calculates the value of property on school district tax rolls. Those calculations are used to determine a district's taxable wealth.

Both suits say state officials never enforced a 1985 amendment to the state law effectively requiring the state to take into account homestead property tax exemptions granted by district to homeowners over 65.

The state does not consider the exemptions in determining districts' taxable property wealth, which would increase the state aid they receive. The plaintiffs say they should.

Both lawsuits seek a change in interpretation of the law by next year.

In addition, the Aug. 4 lawsuit filed by Austin lawyer Buck Wood, seeks "relief for all prior years where the erroneous calculation was utilized."

"We feel we have a very good case," said Wood, declining further comment.

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Clinton drops 30-year-old policy on refugees leaving Cuba for US

He called the sudden surge in the flow of refugees from Cuba to Florida "a cold-blooded attempt to maintain the Castro grip on Cuba."

The president said Cubans who reached the United States "will be apprehended and treated like others." It was a dramatic shift from U.S. policy of the past 30 years under which Cubans have had special status.


The president remained firm in his support of the U.S. economic embargo against Cuba. Cuban President Fidel Castro has blamed the

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
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



The First Day of School

Starting school is difficult for many children and even harder for some parents.

Parents worry about the safety and reaction of children. They wonder how their child will feel. They feel sad, anxious, lonely and--maybe--just a little bit old.

Feelings of sadness and worry during your child's first days of school are common, but these suggestions can help you get through those first days of separation.

*Talk to a friend. It may help to discuss your feelings with friends or other parents who have a child in school. talk about how they felt when their children went to school for the first time. Ask how they have adjusted to the school routine.

*Plan busy days. Time drags if it is not filled up. Plan chores to occupy your time while your child is at school the first few days. Think about all the tasks you have been wanting to do but haven't had the time. Make a list. If you are at work, try to plan a day that will keep your mind occupied and away from reminders of your child. If you keep a photograph of your child on your office desk, for example, plan meetings to keep you out of your office.

*Make sure you can be reached. Be sure you have provided phone numbers

where you can be reached in an emergency in case the school needs to call you for some reason. That way you can rest assured that you will know about any problems if they arise. If you don't hear from the school, it means your child is getting along just fine.

*Plan a special treat for your child's return. When your child returns at the end of the day, you will want to spend time with him or her. Plan a special treat based on your child's interest. It might be a cookies-and-milk break, a walk outside or a time to sing and read together. Just remember that your child will be tired and excited after the first days of school, so don't plan anything too demanding.

*Give yourself permission to care. Don't tell yourself you "shouldn't" feel the way you do. Let yourself worry a little and feel sad. Missing your child and worrying about him or her shows you care.

Today of course, I'd be known as a horizontally challenged, financially disadvantaged, non-color, agri-American from a dysfunctional single-parent family. You never stop learning.

Early Lessons

- From my mother I learned the importance of love and honesty. The love she showed by example was unselfish and sacrificial. From her personal integrity I learned there is no right way to do a wrong thing.

- From my first dog, Buster, I learned about loyalty. For 18 years Buster was faithful, willing-to-do-anything, willing-to-go-anywhere friend. I never heard him growl a harsh bark. He appreciated any small service rendered and was always grateful for any food item I shared with him.

- From my older brother, Jerrold, (notice that he ranks right after my dog) I learned that might is not always right. However, that knowledge won't keep your nose from bleeding. I also learned that hard work, practiced diligently, will carry you above the circumstances of poverty.

- From Arnold Rosenboom, my junior boys Sunday School teacher and later business partner, I learned that when God is first priority in your life everything else works out fine. He also taught me that we are in control of our own attitudes. When the going got pretty tough in his personal life, he never lost his good attitude and sunny disposition.

- From Sue, my bride of 24 years, I'm learning about abiding love and trust. I'm also learning that for any partnership to work each partner must build the other up. In marriage it simply means staying focused on the positive. There is enough good in the worst of us to keep love in full bloom if we focus on it.

- From my uncle, Robert Wetter, I've learned the value of consistent living. Uncle "Ribs," as we've always called him, was the first to take me on a roller coaster and to a professional baseball game. Those are memorable thrills, but what I remember most is his example of solid, dependable, Christian living. He has always been a man you can count on.

- From my daughter, Christi, I'm learning the joy and pride of fatherhood and I'm learning the art of parenting. I've still got a lot to learn.

Question/Answer

Q: Several years ago, I paneled three rooms with a dark shade, low-priced paneling. Now, I would like to paint the paneling a lighter color to brighten the rooms. Will this require a special paint? What treatment, if any, should I give the paneling prior to painting? Should I use a brush or a roller?

A: Prior to painting, the walls should be cleaned thoroughly. If these are kitchen or bathroom walls they may have become grease or scum coated. Wash them down with a detergent solution on a nearly dry cloth to remove the coating without delaminating the paneling. If the walls are dry, make sure they are dust-free to avoid lumps in the paint job. They should then be covered with an oil-base paint primer - one that will not allow the stain on the

panels to bleed through. Some stains contain a dye that can be dissolved by paint or primer and dark stains like yours can show through the primer coat. Before priming, try out a small, obscure area to see if the stain bleeds through. If it doesn't, then prime all the walls using either brush or roller. Let the primer coat dry completely before applying the finish coat because even slightly damp primer cannot seal properly. Once the walls are sealed with primer, put on the finish coat of your choice.

If the stain does bleed through the primer, you will have to use a stain-suppressing primer. There are several brands of these. One such primer is called Under Cover, manufactured by Parks Corp. (1-800-225-8543). It costs about \$17 per gallon.

Options for CRP land use to be explored at meetings

Landowners whose Conservation Reserve Program contracts will expire next year are being encouraged by the Soil Conservation Service to start making plans for use of those acres.

To assist in planning wildlife and other options will be discussed at meetings in Amarillo on Tuesday and in Lubbock on Thursday.

Congress established CRP in the 1985 Farm Bill to take marginal cropland out of production and, most often, plant it to grass.

Texas landowners traded four million acres of cropland production for 10 years of annual rental payments. Eighty percent lies in a 55-county area of the Panhandle and Southern High Plains area.

Charles Coffman, Soil Conservation Service resource conservationist in Lubbock said landowners shouldn't overlook the wildlife options available to them on CRP acres.

"We have developed a management note that outlines options to consider when planning the future of CRP acres," said Coffman. "Wildlife habitat options are important whether you plan to leave the acres in grass

or return them to crop production."

The management note is targeted for the High Plains and Panhandle, offering four basic options:

- Managing the total grass acreage for wildlife habitat.

- Managing the grass acreage for grazing livestock and wildlife habitat.

- Returning part of the acreage to crop production and managing the remaining grass for wildlife habitat.

- Returning the total acreage to crop production and managing for wildlife habitat.

The management note is another in a series developed by Texas Tech University, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Agricultural Extension Service and SCS assisted in the development. Additional financial support was

provided by the High Plains Chapter of Quail Unlimited and Pheasants Forever.

CRP contract holders may obtain a management note from any of the participating agencies or at the meetings in Amarillo and Lubbock.

"Income from wildlife is untapped in this area," said Coffman. "Many landholders don't charge a lease fee for hunting on their property. There is a potential for this because of the increased number of wildlife on CRP acres."

The meeting in Amarillo Tuesday will be held in the Sunset Convention Center, beginning at 9 a.m. The Lubbock meeting also will begin at 9 a.m., in the Civic Center Auditorium.

Farm worker numbers fall by 800,000 in year

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farm workers numbered 3.50 million during the week of July 10-16, down from 3.58 million in the corresponding week a year earlier, the Agriculture Department says.

Of this total, 557,000 workers were unpaid, down slightly from the previous year. The number of self-employed farmers dropped to 1.56 million, while 1.05 million workers were hired by farm operators. The remaining 341,000 people were agricultural service employees.

Placements of cattle - animals put into feedlots - fell 12 percent in the April-June quarter from a year earlier. The 4.67 million animals placed also represented an 11 percent decline from 1992.

Cattle shipped from feedlots to slaughterhouses, or marketed during the quarter rose 2 percent from 1993 to 5.95 million head. This was 5 percent over two years ago.

The inventory estimates are based on quarterly reports done by 13 states.

Perry asks U.S. agency change in plans for swift fox protection

AUSTIN -- The Texas land commissioner has called on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to consider options instead of listing the swift fox as an endangered species in the Panhandle and West Texas.

Rick Perry, in a letter to the federal agency, suggested that options, such as developing habitat enhancement guidelines for voluntary use by landowners, should be explored.

U.S. Fish and Wildlife is considering a petition to place the swift fox on the endangered species list, which could restrict farming, ranching and oil field activities in its habitat.

Swift fox habitat in Texas is roughly the western portion of the Panhandle, from the Oklahoma state line south to Upton County.

Perry argues that the species is not facing extinction in Texas, and the population appears to be healthy in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

"Substantial numbers of this small fox occur on private lands in these states," Perry said in a letter to Elizabeth McPhillips, supervisor of ecological services with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

"In fact, this species is numerous enough in Kansas that...the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks indicated a desire to provide surplus animals for restocking in South Dakota," the letter continued.

Swift fox populations appear to be low in the northern Great Plains portion of the habitat, and the petitioner has requested that the swift fox be listed as an endangered species in South and North Dakota, Nebraska and Montana.

However, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service stated in initial findings that "substantial information exists to support a decision that listing of the fox may be warranted throughout its entire range."

Along with the Texas Department

of Agriculture, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department does not agree with this federal opinion.

"As they typically tend to do, U.S.

Fish and Wildlife is taking a broad-brush approach and considering impacting at the swift fox's entire Great Plains habitat whether populations are threatened or not," said Perry.

Vehicle traffic kills of the fox may be having a much greater impact on the animal's population than farming and ranching activities because the fox frequents highway rights-of-way, said the agriculture commissioner.

Perry offered four proposals for the federal agency to consider to protect the fox, instead of a restricted endanger species listing. The proposals are:

- Develop swift fox management plans for all suitable U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service-managed property





'My So-Called Life' captures pain, joy, uncertainty of youth

"Your hearts must be clearly labeled," says the high-school biology teacher at the end of a dissection exercise, "before returning them to the cart. Don't drip," she adds.

At the moment, 15-year-old Angela Chase's heart reads "Jordan Catalano," and staring at the valves and ventricles of a pig's vital organs doesn't seem to make anything clearer. Dark-eyed and dangerous, Jordan is the most mysterious and fascinating form of life Angela knows.

These familiar ironies of adolescence are the currency of "My So-Called Life," a dramatic series premiering Thursday, Aug. 25, on ABC. Marshall Herskovitz and Edward Zwick ("thirtysomething") are its executive producers.

Fifteen-year-old Claire Danes stars as Angela. Bess Armstrong and Tom Irwin play her parents, with Lisa Wilhoit as her 10-year-old sister Danielle. Armstrong's character, worried and overburdened, sets the moral standard for her family. "She's the one who has to fight the big fights," says Armstrong. Irwin's laissez-faire dad, meanwhile, tries to keep out of the fray.

Also starring are Devon Gummersall as Brian Krakow, Angela's childhood friend, who seems like so much wallpaper next to Jordan (Jared Leto). Ditto her former best friend, Sharon Cherski (Devon Odessa), whom Angela has thrown over for daring and worldly-wise Rayanne Graff (A.J. Langer). Rayanne's friend Rickie Vasquez, rather coyly identified as "somewhat androgynous" in press materials, is compellingly played by Wilson Cruz. Rickie comes into his own in episode three, "Guns and Gossip."

The fall series is getting an early launch "to get it some exposure while

there aren't a lot of originals" crowding the airwaves, according to ABC entertainment chief Ted Harbert.

"I love this show," says Harbert. "It is one of my personal favorite shows that we've had on the network in a long time. That, of course, means nothing as to how the audience will respond."

Audience response to "My So-Called Life" is a key question. Previews drew love-it-or-hate-it reactions from critics, who responded to the series' visceral approach to teen angst. For some, the subject matter seemed too raw for polite company.

But "it would be disingenuous to talk about adolescence and not allow for that color," Zwick insists.

Danes confirms, for those who have forgotten, that adolescence is "not a fun time." The show, she says, "mirrors what I'm going through. I think it's very real."

Reality begins with the scripts, by series creator Winnie Holzman, who seems to excel at everything — dialogue, plot, issues and character.

"My So-Called Life" should appeal both to teens and their parents, since all of the characters are fully developed and sympathetic.

To achieve that balance, the producers hoped to have the show air in the middle hour of prime time. The first hour, where it is currently scheduled, is often reserved for lighter and more juvenile fare. Too late an hour, on the other hand, might cost the show its teen audience.

"I think we will know once it's on the air whether it's going to have an audience," says Herskovitz, but he remains philosophical.

"This is a show that will either find its audience or it won't, no matter what time it goes on the air."





Rediscovering 'Midnight Cowboy'; Seagal digs a hole 'On Deadly Ground'

One of the best new releases on home video may be the winner of the best picture Oscar of 1969. Released in a deluxe 25th anniversary edition, "Midnight Cowboy" remains one of the most engaging and moving films ever made.

Jon Voight plays handsome, dim-witted Joe Buck, a randy Texas boy who moves to New York City, convinced he can find the high life as a high-priced stud. Soon, he's penniless and living in an abandoned building with the only friend he's made in the Rotten Apple, one "Ratso" Rizzo, a surly, self-pitying chain-smoker played to perfection by Dustin Hoffman. What develops between these two outcasts is surely one of the most genuine friendships ever depicted in the movies.

Other Oscars went to Waldo Salt for his biting yet sweet screenplay and John Schlesinger for his matchless, fluid direction. The film is also graced with a fine supporting cast including

Sylvia Miles, John McGiver, Brenda Vaccaro, Barnard Hughes and Bob Balaban.

This new edition includes a behind-the-scenes documentary, interviews with the cast and the original trailer for the film. The soundtrack, featuring Harry Nilsson's fine "Everybody's Talkin,'" sounds terrific in newly processed Dolby stereo.

One of the most tedious new releases on video vendor shelves has to be "On Deadly Ground," starring Steven Seagal. Supposedly, the film's strident environmental message is close to the actor's heart, and that's commendable. What is not commendable, however, is the length and self-importance of this tiresome movie, culminating in Seagal's nearly 10-minute speechifying over footage of oil spills, dead sea birds, etc. Despoiling the environment is terrible, a thing to be discouraged. No one disputes that. But so are movies like this one.

And as for "Car 54, Where Are You?" ... well, no one cares to know.
