## Damage done to volleyball nets makes officials angry

Hereford Mayor Bob Josserrand and members of the City Commission are mad... but vandals who tried to destroy volleyball facilities in Dameron Park will not deter the city from providing "quality" park facilities.

City workers discovered Friday morning that vandals went to Dameron Park sometime the previous night, apparently with one thing in mind, because they must have had the tool to do the deed.

The plastic-covered wire cables holding two volleyball nets to poles had been cut, one net carried off and the other left laying on the ground.

"Whoever did it had to have a cable cutter to do it," declared

Josserrand.

He said Friday that the City Commission "is committed to providing quality recreational facilities to citizens."

He described the vandalism as "senseless" and questioned how "anyone can get satisfaction in destroying things that have brought enjoyment to so many."

Since early summer, the two volleyball courts in Dameron Park have attracted all ages. The first court had been filled with sand and the city plans to run a concrete curb around it. The second court also will be curbed and filled with sand.

The City Commission just last week concluded a project to involve citizens of Hereford in park improvements. Neighborhood park meetings

were held to collect input from residents on needs of each park in the city.

With the success of the volleyball courts in Dameron Park, several other neighborhoods had requested similar facilities.

Cost of a cotton cord net for a court is \$51.50. Although officials have considered installing metal nets, the expense is greater.

"A metal net is about three times the cost of the cotton," reported City Manager Chester Nolen.

City Park Superintendent Johnny Carr and his crew were putting the volleyball courts back in order Friday afternoon.

A half-inch steel cable was

## Goal-setting sessions lead to HISD priorities

Earlier this year, HISD trustees -- faced with a variety of needed building renovations, a technology plan and other decisions -- embarked on a path that would give direction to the future of the district.

That process has resulted in trustees setting 10 major goals that address buildings, curriculum, discipline and technology.

"I think any organization... needs a vision, needs a direction and certainly the people that are in charge of taking care of an organization... need to know" what the board wants, said Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt.

Using the Dupont system for developing goals and strategies, said

board president Steve Wright, trustees and Greenawalt, working together as a team, began talking about what they thought was important for the district's future.

"The board and superintendent works together as a team of eight," Greenawalt said, "to provide the best educational program we can."

Assistant superintendents Nena Veazey and Corky Lockmiller, both of whom are trained facilitators in the Dupont method, led trustees in

several hours of strategic planning over numerous meetings held in the board room at the HISD administration building.

By law, the meetings of the panel had to be open to the public, but the purpose of the sessions was not to get public input, but to allow trustees to speak their minds about the district's needs.

"What we did -- and this is part of the Dupont method -- all eight of us, (See GOALS, Page 2A)

## Curfew discussion set at Commission meeting

A juvenile curfew ordinance for the City of Hereford will be considered by the City Commission Monday evening.

Action on the issue is scheduled as the last item on the commission's regular meeting which begins at 7:30 p.m.

Interested citizens on Aug. 1 delivered petitions to the commission asking for the curfew. Later a public meeting drew approximately 100 persons to discuss the possibility of a curfew.

On a show of hands, asked by Mayor Bob Josserrand, there was overwhelming support for a curfew.

Josserrand has encouraged citizens to attend the Monday evening meeting to voice their opinions on the issue.

The commission's agenda also includes consideration and adoption of a budget for the year beginning Oct. 1, consideration of small increases in city water and garbage rates, receiving quotes on health insurance for city workers and approval of documents related to the Hereford Economic Development Corporation.

## Lawmakers want minnow hearing held

AMARILLO -- Panhandle legislators have called on the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to conduct public hearings on plans to designate the Arkansas River shiner as an endangered species.

The shiner is a 2-inch minnow found in the Canadian River in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma, and in the Cimarron River in Kansas and Oklahoma.

"We are very concerned that the listing of the Arkansas River shiner as an endangered species would have a tremendous negative impact on our region of the state," said Sen. Teel Bivins and Reps. David Swinford, John Smithee and Warren Chisum in a letter to the federal agency.

The lawmakers asserted that the Panhandle's "economic, social and recreational resources should not be devalued, nor our citizens have to suffer these losses because the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service feels the need to save this shiner in the Canadian River."

They questioned the listing of the minnow considering the exact species flourishes in the Pecos River in New Mexico. The wildlife service did not include that population in its endangered species designation.

## HHS band invited to play at WTAMU football game

The Mighty Maroon Band of Hereford High School has been invited to perform at a West Texas A&M University football game, director Don Summersgill announced Friday.

Summersgill said the band will be featured at the Sept. 24 game between the WTAMU Buffaloes and New Mexico Highlands University.

The game will kick off at 2 p.m. in Canyon.

"We'll stay for the whole game," Summersgill said, and will perform a half-time routine.

He said the school asks a high school band each year to play at a game, and this is the year Hereford was chosen.

## Bites of local food to be served at Taste of Southwest Annual Cancer Society fundraiser to be opened to public for first time

Last year, those who attended the fifth annual Taste got the opportunity to sample the wares of some 20 local firms.

Mrs. Wuerflein said this year's Taste should attract just as many companies -- including numerous local restaurants, as well as caterers and retail establishments that offer food items for sale.

While patrons wander the aisles, tasting some of the city's best food, they can bid on some of the 28 silent auction items that have been donated by companies that do not sell food goods.

Dempsey Alexander has solicited those donations and they will be placed on tables down the center of the large banquet hall in the

Community Center.

At one end, Mrs. Gililland said, will be a stage where entertainment will be provided by Texas Country.

Also at that end will be a style show featuring clothing items from local stores.

And through it all, the money that is raised will go to the Cancer Society to help in finding a cure for cancer.

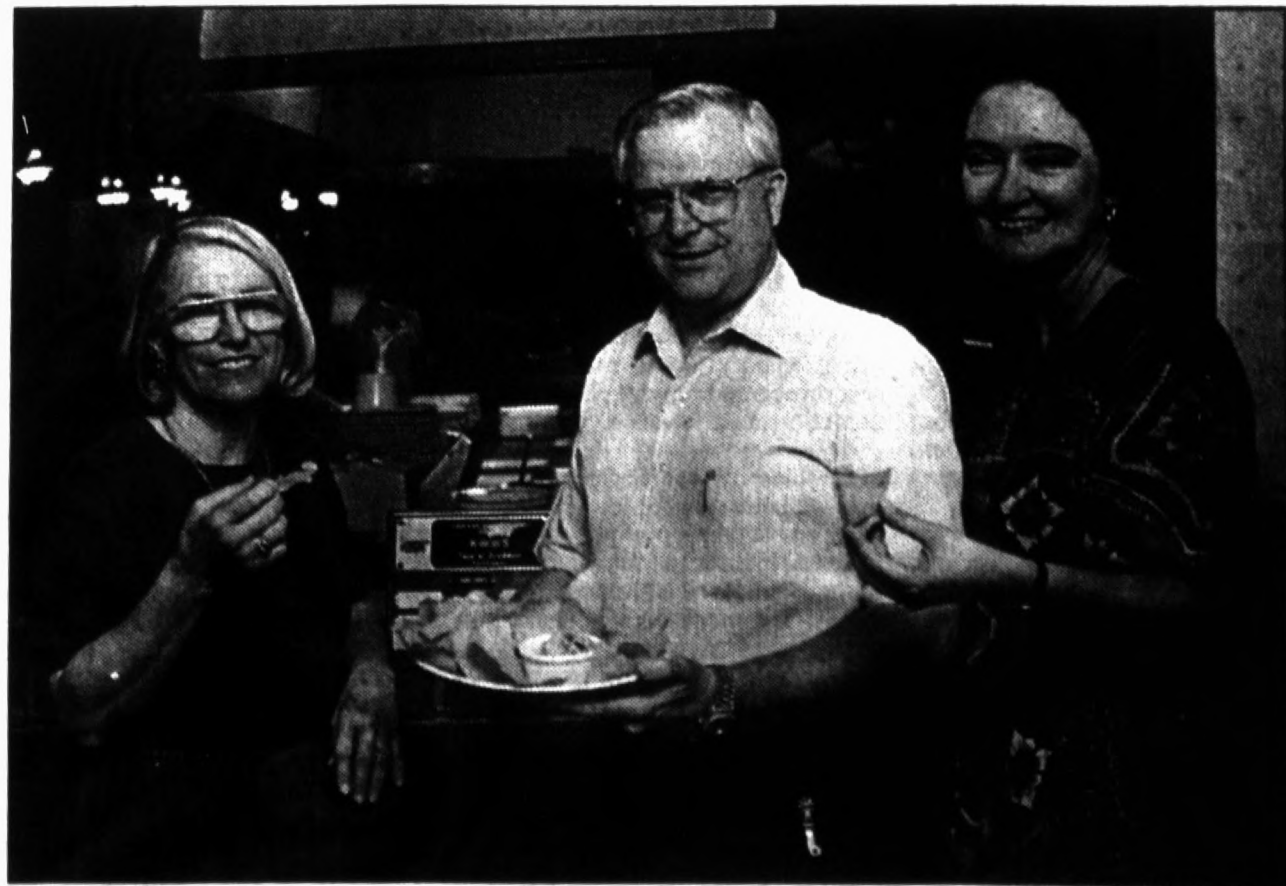
"Every dollar that we raise in Texas, we get like \$1.13 back," Mrs. Gililland said, because of the tremendous amount of cancer research going on in the Lone Star State.

"Here in Deaf Smith County there is no administrative costs," she said, so all funds raised will go to research and other society activities.

"The best we've done I think has been about \$4,500 to \$5,000" through previous Tastes of the Southwest. With the entire community invited to this year's event, she said, "I'd like to raise \$6,000."

Tickets for the Andrew Wilks sculpture are available before the Taste.

Dear Editor:

Officials of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proposed in the Aug. 3 Federal Register that the Arkansas River shiner (supposedly found in the Canadian River drainage of the Texas Panhandle) be listed as an endangered species.

The agency claims that the shiner is threatened by habitat loss caused by "diversion of surface water and excessive groundwater pumping," among other factors.

A F&WS spokesman said that one of the main areas of concern is the pumping of groundwater from the Ogallala Aquifer.

This proposal to list the Arkansas River shiner as endangered is suspiciously similar in nature to the Fish & Wildlife Service's endangered species designation of the Fountain Darter. That designation ultimately resulted in the virtual takeover of the

Edwards Aquifer of South Texas, and the stripping of private property rights from landowners in the Uvalde area who pumped water from the Edwards Aquifer on their crops.

I have long suspected that some federal agencies have designs on controlling the Ogallala Aquifer of the High Plains, and this proposal to designate an obscure minnow as an endangered species does little to allay my concern.

So far as pumping from the Ogallala having an impact on flow of the Canadian River, I know of no Ogallala-fed springs supplying the Canadian River that would be impacted by pumping. I think the Fish & Wildlife Service's claim that shiner habitat is threatened by habitat loss caused by excessive groundwater pumping is far-fetched at the very least. Maybe they should work on getting it to rain more often along the watershed.

Even the Internal Revenue Service recognizes waters of the Ogallala Aquifer lying under a person's land as being under the ownership of that landowner, and provides for a water depletion tax allowance.

It seems to me that a designation of the shiner as an endangered species may well be a simple ploy -- a means to the end of taking over private lands in Texas. If feds can control pumping of the Ogallala, the lifeblood of the Plains, the means are at hand to control a vast area of private land.

As usual, when a major issue such as this come up, there is very little time to respond. The deadline for comments on this proposal is Oct. 3, and the deadline for requests for a public hearing has supposedly already passed.

Contacting our congressional representatives immediately about this matter would also be a wise move. We should also insist on public hearings to be held here in the High Plains.

anything and everything that had any level of importance to us was written down," Wright said. No suggestion was considered to outrageous or insignificant to consider.

"There were no limitations on what we would like to see accomplished," Wright continued. "Everything I've had on my mind" was included, "also needs to wish list."

Eventually, trustees had compiled a list of 67 things they felt were important to the district.

From there, Wright explained, each of the trustees and Greenawalt wrote down their top five priorities from that list, ranking them from most important to least among those five.

Greenawalt said his desire for a board strategic plan was to make sure his desires and priorities for the district were in line with what trustees wanted to accomplish.

"What we have found in this thing is there is no difference," he said. "Their priority list falls right in with mine."

What trustees determined in creating their top five priorities was that they are most concerned with building improvements.

Later, trustees decided to expand the scope of their project to include 10 projects rather than five.

The following are the top 10 priority projects developed by the board and Greenawalt:

1. Building improvements.
2. Design a curriculum to be more appropriate for real world expectations.
3. Develop a cost effective transition plan for a high tech curriculum.
4. Teach values and morals, K-12.
5. Consider a pilot phonics program.
6. Examine teacher attendance/incentive programs.
7. Kill/build extra-curricular activities.
8. Corporal punishment issues.

9. HISD as an academic leader.

10. Choir program.

Wright said he would like to have the priorities addressed within two to three years, although trustees are focusing their efforts on the first three right now.

To date, they have written goal statements for the first two goals and have developed a plan of action to address those plans, including timelines and identification of the person responsible for each task.

For Goal No. 1, the goal statement is: "To generate/make available funds necessary to accomplish a prioritized list of building improvements within a two-three year period with consensus from the board, community and staff."

For Goal No. 2, the goal statement is: "To develop an academic program which will motivate and support students in identifying and achieving their highest potential, so that students will be equipped to meet 'real world' expectations with the involvement of parents, community, business and higher education."

"We're by no means finished," Greenawalt said. "This may be an ongoing thing you never finish with."

For the long term, Wright said, "We see this as our effort also as a part of economic development, because we want to see the district as such that people want their children going here."

Greenawalt echoed that, noting that quality of schools is often a criteria used when selecting where a family should move.

Having a priority plan in place, the superintendent also noted, gives trustees a way to evaluate their performance and that of the district staff, and to determine what they are doing to help the children of the district.

Much work has already been done on district facilities, Wright noted, with air conditioning installed at the high school and a new roof put up over part of that building, and a new roof installed at the Stanton Special

Populations Center.

With a new roof and air conditioning system being planned for Shirley School this year, Greenawalt said, the district's capital improvement budget has been pretty much taken care of until next September.

However, Wright said, that may be a benefit, as trustees will have time to gather information about ways to fund future improvements.

So far, Greenawalt said, the district has had a "pay-as-you-go" philosophy on capital improvements.

An upcoming state school board convention will give trustees an opportunity to explore ways to fund improvements at a faster rate than could be done one year at a time, which is one step in the process of meeting Goal No. 1.

The two men said that, as they work on the first three objectives, they may find that their answers fit needs elsewhere on the list, enabling them to address several priorities at once.

Also, the goals tend to overlap somewhat, meaning answers in one area will address another area as well.

Goals four through 10, Greenawalt said, "will tie into numbers 1, 2 and 3."

Because this is an ongoing plan, it will continue beyond the terms of the trustees currently on the board.

"This is an HISD board of trustees plan, not a Steve Wright plan or a Charles Greenawalt plan," the superintendent said.

As new trustees join the board and new officers are elected, Wright said, the plan will continue and be evaluated and updated.

"The system should perpetuate itself."



# Constitution celebration set at school

Bluebonnet Intermediate School will celebrate the 207th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution during a ceremonial Constitution signing that will include a representative of the office of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas.

The ceremony will be at 1:30 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 21, in the school, 221 16th Street.

Jennifer Crabtree, regional director of Gramm's office in Lubbock, will lead the signing ceremony and deliver remarks on the significance of Constitution Week, which is observed Sept. 17-23.

"On Sept. 17, 1787, 39 delegates participating in the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia signed a document establishing the American system of government and identifying its powers. In so doing, our founding fathers provided a free and independent people a national framework of self-rule unparalleled in history," said Gramm.

"The United States Constitution set out in clear terms how the American government was to operate. Since its adoption, we have amended the Constitution only 27 times. That is a testament to the remarkable vision of America's founding fathers," he continued.

"This extraordinary document guarantees Americans something that few people in other countries enjoy. It guarantees our freedom. I ask you, as we celebrate this momentous day 207 years ago, to commit to the preservation of our democracy, securing America's future."

Gramm invited Hereford residents to attend the Wednesday signing at Bluebonnet and establish a new American tradition and pay tribute to the authors and signatories of the Constitution.

# Focus on Your City

Several important meetings are coming up with your City Commission. I would like to give you a little background on them and then encourage you to attend.

The first critical meeting is Monday (Sept. 19) at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall. Two very important items are on the agenda.

The 1994-1995 city budget will be adopted by the commission. The budget, effective from Oct. 1 through Sept. 30, 1995, calls for no new tax increases as far as property taxes go but does call for very small increases in water fees and solid waste fees.

Your City Commission is attempting to get both of these items realistically priced but still keep them affordable and, quite frankly, under the rates charged by many of our surrounding communities.

What I can say about the budget is that, given the many activities we are instituting for your benefit, we are proud of the fact that property taxes will not have to be increased and that we are basically holding the course with regard to employees and other expenditures.

Another item coming before the City Commission Monday night is the request by a large number of citizens for a juvenile curfew. At least in my

case, I have only received one true complaint about instigating a curfew and a large number of positive voices for the curfew.

As I have mentioned to many of you, I think it is a rotten shame that the moral fiber of this country has deteriorated to the extent that citizens must ask a governmental entity to legislate parental responsibility.

I also feel quite strongly that we are just chipping away some more at all of our freedoms when we take this action. Until we as a populace and individuals in particular assume our rightful responsibility, I suppose we have no choice but to ask for government help.

Because of the Texas Family Code and the laws that have been passed by the State of Texas, our local law enforcement officials have absolutely no authority and/or opportunity to help control the juvenile situation unless we do provide them with this particular tool, the juvenile curfew, to help and protect our youth. I encourage all of you to come and express your opinions, pro and con, on this matter, since I feel the Commission will take some action at the meeting.

On a happier and much brighter note, we will meet in a planning session at 5 p.m. on Oct. 10, a Monday, to discuss assigning

priorities to all of the various park projects suggested by our neighborhood park meetings.

For those of you who have been unable to attend the neighborhood meetings, let me share with you what a heart-warming experience the meetings have been. It indeed gives me faith that we as citizens of Hereford, Texas, are beginning to have an interest in Hereford and the wonderful opportunities we have.

A little bit more about the Oct. 10 meeting: Having completed the park meetings and received all the various ideas, we have asked the city staff to make a preliminary cost on each recommended improvement. At the planning meeting, we will attempt to assign priorities for completion of the projects, not only this coming year, but in the years ahead.

It would be my hope that over a three-year period most, if not all, of the suggested improvements can be accomplished with the voluntary park assessment on your water bill. Let me suggest that you be present on Oct. 10 to help us make the decision on which projects come first so that we may all truly enjoy our neighborhood parks.

Speaking of park improvements, let me invite those of you who have not continued to fund the voluntary park assessment on your water bill to

reconsider seriously and ask for the \$1 assessment to be placed on your water bill.

I can assure you that through the use of the voluntary assessment, we can truly make our parks more beautiful and useful for all of us. Please think seriously about it if you haven't considered the voluntary assessment, and let us know.

Again, three very important subjects are coming before your City Commission. You need to have your voice heard. One of the things that I'm most proud of in our Commission is the open-mindedness and ability to listen to all sides. Please join us Monday night and again on Oct. 10.

## OUT OF THE BLUE

For a long time I have been meaning to write a column on the U.S. Constitution and now, thanks to the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I can do just that.

Sept. 17-23 marks the celebration of Constitution Week in the United States and a local woman (I'm sorry I didn't get her name, so I could give her credit here) provided me with the information about the Constitution. I think a lot of our country's problems stem from the fact that our leaders have gone away from the Constitution and Bill of Rights.

So, I want to look at the Constitution, inasmuch as I can in this space. First off, I've never read the whole thing through (and I'm sure most of you haven't either), much less studied it, so I cannot be considered any type of expert on the subject.

But I do think there are some conclusions we can draw based on what we see in the Constitution.

There are 27 Amendments to the Constitution, from the first 10, called the Bill of Rights, to the 27th Amendment, passed in 1992.

Let's look at some Amendments: Amendment 1: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the

free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition to Government for a redress of grievances."

Boy, what a place to start. This one is full of guarantees.

One interesting point, though. Nowhere in this Amendment appear the words "separation," "church" or "state."

The term "separation of church and state" was coined years later by Thomas Jefferson in a private letter.

The intent here was not to protect government from religion, but to keep the state from imposing its own ideas of religion on the people. These people had just come from England, which had the Church of England, the only church sanctioned by the government and forced on the people.

As a result, the Founding Fathers made sure in the Constitution that such a thing would not happen here.

Sure that guarantee means we have to put up with Jim Jones, David Koresh and the like, but the alternative is to lose that guaranteed freedom and risk establishment of a state religion or, worse, the outlawing of particular belief systems.

Likewise with the "freedom of speech" clause.

I think a law like the "Access to Clinics" law violates this amendment, because it restricts where citizens are allowed to speak, thus hindering their freedom of speech.

It also violates the free assembly clause, because protesters are not allowed in a particular place.

And if those freedoms are taken away from one group (abortion protesters), who's next?

Amendment 2: "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed."

Again we have a situation like that in the First Amendment. I'm sure the Founding Fathers never knew about assault rifles and the like, but banning them is addressing the right of the people to keep and bear arms. After all, if the government decides we are not responsible enough (or "good" enough) to have automatic weapons, when will they decide we shouldn't have pistols and rifles, either?

And once we give up our right to keep and bear arms, we give up the right and ability to defend ourselves if that government decides to throw out the Constitution and revoke our Constitutionally-guaranteed rights.

Amendment 9: This simply says, "The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

As I understand it, this simply means that we have other rights than those stated in the Constitution.

In other words, just because it isn't mentioned in the Constitution doesn't mean that those rights don't exist.

I would guess that this amendment was included to keep Congress from amending the Constitution every time something came up that affected the rights of the American people.

For example, the right to lay around in your underwear on Sunday and watch football is not specified in the Constitution, but it's still a right.

Amendment 10: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people."

Maybe this is why the Constitution never addressed public education, AIDS (or other disease) research and treatment, health care, or whatever—because those are things that fall to the states and individuals under the very Constitution that created this country.

You see, the Founding Fathers were not stupid. They realized that government could never—and should never—have ultimate control over the lives of the American people.

The men who wrote the Constitution came out of a system of repressive, domineering government that ruled (See BLUE, Page 5A)

The Holy Roman Empire went out of existence in 1806 as Emperor Francis I abdicated.

When Eisenhower was president and the country moseyed along between wars, a Fort Worth newspaper boasting the largest circulation in Texas introduced a writer to a vast audience in West Texas.

But before he began writing a column, "This is West Texas," George Dolan was a city news reporter and desk man. His high-pitched laugh penetrated the very walls of the newspaper's huge city room.

Dolan complained, as most of us did, about low salaries. We all talked about looking for other jobs and, to our surprise, Dolan did.

Furthermore, he was hired, an even bigger surprise to management.

He left Fort Worth full of high hopes and great expectations. He was employed as managing editor of a daily newspaper in a city of about 35,000 population, give or take a few people.

What Dolan didn't realize -- nor did anyone else -- was he was a writer, not an editor. The master of the one-sentence paragraph found his creativity snuffed.

And, the joy of telling others what to do never materialized.

Within just a few months (less than six), he made a quick trip back to Fort Worth to ask for his old job back.

In any business, a man who quits and wants to return rarely cuts a better deal. In most instances, it seems, you've got to start at the bottom again and work up.

Not in this case. George Dolan, I believe, worked the best con I ever knew about.

He was re-hired, at a pay increase, and given the opportunity to set his own hours and work schedule. He traveled that wide area from Fort Worth to the New Mexico state line.

The newspaper of choice in West Texas for many years, it was feeling the effects of television and transportation problems. The idea was that a column directed specifically at the area would beef up the appeal.

Dolan wrote about the people and

events of West Texas, initially. Later, his column title was altered slightly, but it was the West Texas flavor that made it what it was.

Real-life characters were the grist for his word mill. He even was accused -- rightly or wrongly, I don't know -- of being responsible for a statue of a mule that was erected in a town.

He once wrote about a "girl reporter" at the newspaper who never answered the telephone early in the morning with "hello." He claimed she "reversed the syllables."

During his city reporting days, Dolan took on the zoo "beat." New animals and improved quarters were frequent. His hardest story probably came after the city's children had collected money to buy a giraffe.

A young giraffe was located and the money put down. However, a disaster occurred. The animal was being transported to Fort Worth in a trailer, became over-excited and died.

Dolan was assigned the task of writing an obit for a giraffe.

Dramatizations of life in the newsroom of a metropolitan daily have often been so trite, with cub reporters wearing a press card in their handbags and oldtimers nipping from a bottle in the bottom desk drawer, that the real thing paled by comparison.

When people said "Oh, that must be exciting work," the obvious response was "yeah, right."

Once, though, George Dolan brought real-life excitement to the city room. And I happened to be a witness although nearly everyone else had gone to lunch.

A late-breaking story was phoned in by a reporter. Dolan took the notes and wrote the story, in almost record time.

He whispered to the city editor, "I've always wanted to do this."

The city editor nodded. Dolan stood up on the city desk and shouted:

"Stop the presses."  
Now that's real newspapering.

## Mexican chef cooks for school

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - If public school students never have to choke down another slab of gravy-coated Salisbury steak for lunch again, they may have some Philadelphia high-schoolers to thank.

Twenty students from Olney High School sampled authentic Mexican cuisine this week in a government taste-testing experiment aimed at improving the quality and diversity of school lunches.

The verdict? Mystery meat is out, Mexican is in.

That could mean a welcome change for 25 million pupils at 92,000

schools across America.

In its search for interesting, healthy new menu items for public school lunches, the U.S. Department of Agriculture flew in one of Mexico's leading chefs to prepare six meals for the group of honors English students.

The food that replaced the hamburgers, pizza and Tater Tots wasn't nachos, tacos or chimichangas. And salsa, guacamole and sour cream didn't drown the food the way ketchup, mustard and mayonnaise sometimes do.

These were authentic Mexican dishes prepared by Arnulfo Luengas, executive chef of Banamex, Mexico's national bank. Turkey enchiladas, chicken with green sauce, rice and spinach, rice pudding and baked bananas were a few of the taste treats.

It may have been the first time cilantro ever spiced up a school lunch.

Students rated each dish, and additional comments were encouraged.

"I think we were all expecting Taco Bell, but we weren't disappointed," said Tyressa Oglesby, an 18-year-old senior. "I get tired of eating the same boring lunches week after week."

Amber Then, a 15-year-old junior, was pleasantly surprised.

"I thought it was going to be really hot and spicy," she said. "But I was able to try everything. I enjoyed every bite."

Each dish conformed to recent Clinton administration proposals to limit fat, sodium and cholesterol in school lunches by increasing vegetables, fruits and grains.

## Computers present new challenges

# Panel calls for changes in Texas Open Records Act

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Open Records Act needs to be updated to keep pace with the computer age, a panel of open government advocates said Friday.

Speaking at the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas state conference, panel members said the increased use of computers presents new opportunities and challenges in getting government records.

One of those challenges, is retrieving state agency records that are stored on computer, said Madeleine Johnson, an assistant U.S. attorney in Dallas and former chairwoman of the opinions committee in the Texas attorney general's office.

She said some agencies claim that

certain requested information is technologically impossible to retrieve.

Ms. Johnson said she expected a proposal during the legislative session that starts in January to designate a state agency to settle such disputes. That agency would determine if the records can be retrieved.

Another question is the cost of obtaining records that are stored on computer.

A person used to be able to get dozens of pages from the government at little or no cost. Now the cost to retrieve those records can vary widely because of programming and computer time being charged for compiling information.


Rep. Scott Hochberg, D-Houston, said his goal in the Legislature is to make all state records available on Internet, a network that can be tapped with a personal computer.

But Hochberg said such a move will be resisted by bureaucrats and private businesses that make money by compiling government records.

Tony Pederson, managing editor of the Houston Chronicle and chairman of the group Texas Media, said one proposal that won't be before the Legislature next year is a "shield law" for reporters.

But, he said, without agreement from all the major media, it would be useless to ask lawmakers to pass it.

## Hail Mary pass gives Herd win over CHS

Forget Doug Flutie's Hail Mary pass, Franco Harris' immaculate reception and the Cal Bears' kickoff return through the Stanford band--here's your miracle.

Hereford claimed a 24-21 win over Coronado Friday at Whiteface Stadium when Ronald Torres hauled in a Hail Mary touchdown pass from Michael Brown.

The play came on fourth down at the Coronado 36-yard line, with 32 yards to go for a first down and 21 seconds left in the game.

It was set up by a Coronado fumble, forced by Herd safety David Vermillion and covered by Shawn Malone at the CHS 37-yard line with less than five minutes to go.

It capped a game that saw Hereford take a 17-0 halftime lead on the favored Class 5A Mustangs, only to lose the lead when a Coronado touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter made the score 21-17 for the Lubbock team.

Hereford improved to 2-1, while Coronado dropped to 1-2.

Maybe it wasn't a proper miracle, but to Torres, the pass certainly looked like a gift from Heaven.

"I was running with my head down, and I looked up and couldn't

find the ball," Torres said. "(The defender) had his hands up and it fell between his hands. I put my hands up and it fell into my hands."

The Whitefaces had to convert two big plays on the drive before it could even throw the Hail Mary: tailback Marquise Brown ran for three yards on fourth-and-1 at the 28-yard line,

then Michael Brown hit Wade Backus for a 12-yard gain on third-and-11 at the 26.

Hereford then lost yardage on three consecutive plays, setting up the fourth-and-32 situation. The big loss was a 16-yard sack of Michael Brown on third-and-16. The wise move would have been to throw the ball

away; he was instructed that he should not be sacked on the Herd's last chance.

"Coach (Danny) Hancy just told me to get the pass off," Brown said. "The play before I didn't get the pass off, and he got real upset."

He got the pass off but didn't see it caught, because a Coronado

defender flattened him as he released the ball.

"I just heard everybody go, 'Yecccccaah,'" Brown said.

There was a lot of that in the first half, as Hereford just manhandled the Mustangs. Herd tailback Marquise Brown ran 28 times for 151 yards in his return to the lineup after spraining

his ankle on the first play of the season. His first carry of the game was a 16-yarder that followed a 11-yard run by Michael Brown.

Two plays later, Michael Brown dropped back to pass and scrambled, following his blockers 39 yards to the end zone.

"Every time I saw somebody about to tackle me...one of my guys came out of nowhere and made the block," Brown said. "There were a lot of great blocks on that play."

Terance High kicked the extra point for a 7-0 Hereford lead with 9:28 left in the first quarter.

The Hereford defense held Coronado to 93 yards and four first downs in the first half. The running back tandem of Yabrodrick Ward and Inyang Udo Ema was limited to 33 yards on 10 carries in the half.

Coronado's only productive possession of the half was its third, but the Herd defense halted the Mustangs at the 19-yard line, stopping a trick play for six yards on fourth-and-8.

Hereford took over and drove as far as the Coronado 21, when an apparent touchdown pass to tight end Scott Parker was called back because

with under a minute to play he eluded a swarm of would-be tacklers and ran 14 yards for his third TD and a 30-27 victory.

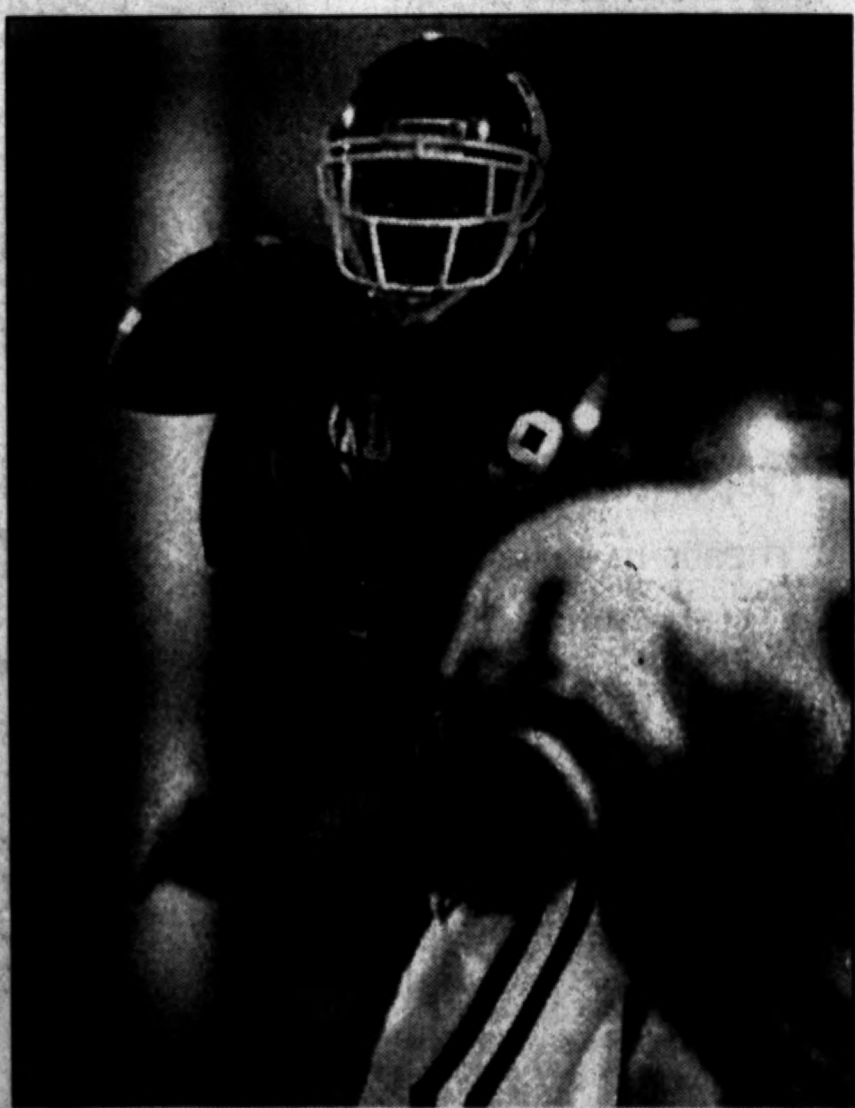
"I don't know what happened," A&M coach Ross Rogers said. "Three guys were on him. I thought he was down."

# Cowboys hope 1960 uniforms aren't jinxed

IRVING, Texas (AP) - If you can judge the quality of a team by the uniforms they wear, then bet the Detroit Lions in their Monday night game against the Dallas Cowboys.

The NFL is having a "throwback" weekend and teams will be wearing jerseys and pants of yesteryear in commemoration of the league's 75th anniversary.

There's not just a whole lot of nostalgia about the 1960 expansion Dallas Cowboys who lost every game they played except one, a tie with the New York Giants, in coach Tom Landry's debut as a NFL head coach.

The Lions will be decked out in their 1935 uniforms, dark blue

jerseys, numbers on the front and back only with no numbers on the sleeves. The pants will be solid silver. Helmets are plain. No Lion.

In 1935, the Lions were NFL champions in the second year of their existence with a 7-3-2 record and a 26-7 victory over the New York Giants in the championship game.

The Cowboys of 1960 wore a gaudy star on the shoulder. Eddie LeBaron was the quarterback. Not much good happened.

Modern players from the two-time defending Super Bowl champion Cowboys aren't worried about the replica garments being a jinx.

"They should throw those jerseys away forever if they never won a game in them," said Dallas safety

Darren Woodson. "I wasn't even born in 1960 anyway. It's not going to bother us one way or the other. I just hope the jerseys fit."

Fullback Daryl Johnston wondered if he had to wear an old helmet, too.

"That was back in the leather headgear days wasn't it?" Johnston quipped. "I bet they didn't have face masks either. I'm wondering how we'll look in those things. All I know is I would have liked to play back in the days when they didn't have artificial turf."

Veteran Bill Bates said he kind of liked the idea.

"Heck I'm a throwback to the 1960s myself," Bates said. "Those jerseys will fit me. I'm small and

slow like they were in those days. I think it's going to be kind of fun."

Cornerback Larry Brown was worried the Cowboys might have to wear old jerseys that had been stored in mothballs.

"These things aren't dirty and old are they?" Brown asked. "Shoot, we can't worry what happened to the Cowboys in the '60s. This is the '90s."

Safety James Washington liked the idea.

"I'm a throwback," Washington said. "Some people think I take cheap shots and hit too hard."

Coach Barry Switzer said he recalls the old Dallas uniforms.

"I can remember visiting their training camp back in the 1960s,"

Switzer said. "It doesn't worry me they couldn't win a game in them. We all know it's not the clothes you wear but what you do when you're in them."

Quarterback Troy Aikman said it's going to be strange the first time he looks downfield and tries to find Michael Irvin.

"I'll have to train my mind to throw to a different colored jersey," Aikman said. "That causes a little concern."

Equipment manager Mike McCord

said "it could have been worse."

"We're one of the new kids on the block whereas some teams are going back to the 1930s," McCord said. "Some of them are going to have some wild looks."

The Cowboys come into the game with a 2-0 record as they shoot for a record third consecutive Super Bowl. Detroit is 1-1.

Barry Sanders needs 75 yards to reach 7,000 career yards for Detroit. Emmitt Smith needs 40 yards to reach 6,000 career yards for the Cowboys.

HOUSTON (AP) - Why have the Buffalo Bills been to four straight Super Bowls?

One reason could be that Marv Levy makes the coaching cliché about forgetting past defeats sound innovative.

"As bitter as defeat is for a short time after it occurs, after a few weeks pass, it's over," Levy explains. "I really think our mental attitude would be the same whether we'd won or lost the Super Bowl last year or any of the others."

The Houston Oilers would like to trade miseries with the Bills. The Oilers are 0-2 with a recent legacy of being embarrassed by the Bills. They hope for a trend reversal in their home opener in the Astrodome.

But it apparently will be too late to catch Buffalo napping. They defeated New England 38-35 last week and will hit the Oilers at full speed for the noon CDT.

"In the longer term we have motivated players with lot of pride," Levy said. "Many people are defeated by disappointment. These guys are motivated by it to do better to reach their potential."

All of the Buffalo weapons so familiar to the Oilers were firing at the Patriots last week.

Jim Kelly threw four touchdown passes and drove the Bills to the

winning field goal by Steve Christie. Thurman Thomas rushed for 106 yards and Andre Reed caught 7 passes for 142 yards and a touchdown.

Buffalo has trampled regularly over the Oilers en route to the last two Super Bowls.

There was the famous 41-38 overtime victory after trailing by 32 points two years ago in the playoffs for the greatest comeback victory ever in the playoffs. There was also a 35-7 victory last October, leaving the Oilers a need to find their own resiliency.

The Bills have had their way, even in preseason. Christie repeated his playoff kick by beating the Oilers in the Alamodome with a field goal as time expired.

Houston and Buffalo started the season in slow-motion, although the Oilers had the most glaring pratfall, losing to Indianapolis 45-21. They played better but still lost last week to Dallas, 20-17.

"There's a parallel between us," Levy said. "We didn't play well in our season opener and played better

our second time out. We came out with a 3-point win and the Oilers came out with a 3-point loss to the Super Bowl champions."

The Oilers and Bills are both experimenting with their offensive lines.

The Oilers moved All-Pro center Bruce Matthews to left tackle to shore up the Oilers' pass blocking. Bills left tackle John Fina is out with an injury and will be replaced by Glenn Parker.

"Glenn has played every line position except center so far and he's got the temperament for it," Levy said. "It's an amazing quality to have, that allows him to adapt."

Matthews, who has started at every offensive line position, was a regular left tackle in 1986, playing against Buffalo defensive end Bruce Smith. Now, he's had one week to get ready for a battle of Pro Bowlers.

"I might as well find out where I stand right off the bat," Matthews said. "At least now I have a built-in excuse if he has a good game. But I can't allow myself to get beat before I even play him. I can't put myself in a position where I panic if something goes wrong."

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Consolidated appeared ready for 5A last weekend when it held off then-No. 8 Permian in an impressive showing. The Tigers kept it going by leading 13-0 Friday night, then saw the game slip away.

Second-ranked Spring Westfield didn't even have that luxury in a 13-0 loss to Klein Forest. The Mustangs were down only 7-0 at halftime, yet couldn't pull themselves out of it.

"We hadn't been behind before, and we didn't know how to take it," first-year coach Pat Culpepper said.


Westfield came into the game averaging more than 310 yards per game rushing. They wound up with only 134 yards rushing and 1 yard passing.

"Our defense played super," Klein Forest coach Al Barnes said. "We knew the plays they were going to run. They didn't do anything different than what we prepared for."

A wacky ending cost No. 4 Plano as Mesquite kicked a long last-second field goal to knock off the Wildcats 13-10.

Possibly the most embarrassing of the 5A defeats was No. 9 Lewisville's 24-12 loss to Carthage, an unranked 4A school.

Carthage got all the right bounces from the beginning as defensive back M.C. Walker grabbed a fumble on Lewisville's first possession and returned it 23 yards for a touchdown. The Farmers lost three more fumbles.

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# Odessa man playing key role in post-Gulf War era

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - Victor Silvester's role in the Persian Gulf War played out from his kitchen dinette set.

It was there that Silvester began collecting newspaper articles and videotapes of CNN reports. He got his hands on every document he could find tied to the Middle East conflict. And it was Silvester's kitchen telephone that began ringing in 1991 with calls from veterans who were coming home sick and didn't know why.

The 52-year-old former trucker took detailed notes of the unexplained symptoms: chronic fatigue, head-

aches, sensitive eyes, rashes, abdominal pains. More than 2,500 people sought his advice on treatment.

"The biggest range of emotion is fear, fear of the unknown," Silvester said. "If you have the flu, you ... know what you're fighting. These people don't know what they're fighting. They have no idea."

Silvester - data hound, advocate and father of a sick Persian Gulf soldier - continues his pursuit of answers.

On a recent summer evening, he and son James recounted how the Operation Desert Storm/Desert Shield Association evolved from Silvester passing out his phone number to other

veterans' parents on a bus from Ft. Eustis, Va. Silvester remains president of the national organization.

As they talked, a printer spat out page after page of research into subjects like lethal mustard gas and depleted uranium.

Their back yard overlooks a field of pump jacks - ironic, as 23-year-old James Silvester showed off snapshots he took of burning oil fields in Kuwait.

He served about nine months overseas and thinks the Kuwaiti smoke might be to blame for his blinding headaches, rashes and forgetfulness. Doctors at the VA Medical Center in Big Spring told him nothing's wrong, he said.

Now the former National Honor Society student has no plans for his life.

"Right now, just survive," James Silvester said. "Since we don't know what caused it, I can't make long-range plans."

The Pentagon has said it can't pinpoint one cause for the problems many Persian Gulf veterans are suffering.

Victor Silvester's suspicions include radiation, chemical exposure and parasitic infection.

He has surveyed thousands of sick veterans to learn their symptoms and what their duties involved.

Eighty percent of Silvester's contacts, for instance, told him they entered enemy vehicles. Eighty-seven

percent breathed the oil-fire smoke, while 62 percent came under Iraqi artillery fire, his survey found.

Silvester said he ran up an \$8,000 phone bill talking to veterans around the country.

"He's a man who did everything out of his pocket - it wasn't fame, it wasn't glory, he just kind of had a feeling that something was going to happen," explained Georgina Brown of New Waterford, Ohio, after meeting Silvester on a computer bulletin board. Mrs. Brown's husband is sick.

"It started out as a father's love," she said. "He's just got a heart that's too big, he's just adopted all of us." Silvester even took his findings to Congress.

In testimony before a U.S. House subcommittee of the Committee on Veterans Affairs in June 1993, Silvester said his support group kept hearing the same complaint: The mysterious ailments weren't stirring any urgency in government.

"Day after day we receive calls from veterans and veteran family members seeking answers, looking for assistance with their health problems or just needing somebody to talk to," he testified. "The majority of sickness calls reflect the same symptoms, the same domestic situations and the same frustrations with the bureaucratic system."

Officials did not expect the vast data-gathering power muscled by his organization's 26 regional groups, Silvester said.

Meanwhile, the Department of Veterans Affairs insists its response has been aggressive. A news release says the agency initiated studies into the sicknesses, set up three referral centers and began tracking claims filed by veterans who relate their maladies

to environmental hazards in the Persian Gulf.

Silvester and 25 others demanded greater results, though, when they filed a class-action lawsuit seeking more than \$2 billion for disabilities allegedly caused by exposure to chemical and biological agents.

The lawsuit, filed this year in Brazoria County, accuses 11 U.S. companies of co-conspiracy in the development and use of certain products by Iraq.

Silvester remains patriotic despite some bitterness.

He wore a ball cap emblazoned with a flag and a message: "These Colors Don't Run." He doesn't regret that his son served in the war.

But he reiterates his belief that America owes medical treatment to military personnel hurt during duty.

"Would I talk a young man into joining the service? No, because the Department of Defense does not stand by its word," Silvester said.

"I did not want my son to go through what my friends went through with Agent Orange (in Vietnam). And the United States government needs to live up to its promises. ... They promised to take care of him."

# Home visits help teacher get parents more interested in education of kids

McALLEN, Texas - Teacher Eduardo Reyna has found that visiting his students at home encourages parents to be interested in their children's schooling. That interest, experts say, is critical to academic success.

The start of school for Reyna means long evenings roaming southwest McAllen neighborhoods with a cellular phone.

He drives through La Balboa and La Idela neighborhoods, searching for the homes of his sixth-grade Brown Middle School students.

His goal is to learn more about the preteens he is charged with educating. For 17 years, Reyna has ushered in the school year by visiting students and parents on their own ground.

"There is something almost sacred

about walking into one's home," Reyna, 43, said.

Norma Woolsey, a parent-training specialist employed by the McAllen school district, said studies prove that when parents are active, their children's grades and performance go up, and behavior improves, because they believe their parents care.

"It makes a world of difference," Woolsey said.

Teachers who visit students' homes are able to determine which students need special attention because of an inadequate home environment, she said.

A boy who would never do homework inspired Reyna to begin making home visits.

Reyna called the boy's father to tell him the boy had failed to turn in assignments. The father, who was

frequently drunk, punished the boy by beating his shins black and blue with a broomstick.

When he learned what had happened, Reyna said, he began to doubt himself as a teacher.

"What am I doing in the classroom?" Reyna said, recalling his thoughts at the time of the incident. "I don't know who these kids are. I stand in the classroom and throw information at them, but I don't know who they are."

"That little boy changed my philosophy of education," Reyna said.

The first five of the 55 home visits Reyna hopes to make this fall were scheduled for one recent evening.

About 7 p.m., 11-year-old Diana Villarreal emerged from her home to greet her teacher after he called on the car phone for directions.

"You weren't that lost," the sixth-grader said with a big smile. Diana's mother, Delfina Villarreal, welcomed the teacher into their living room with an enthusiastic "Pasele" (come in).

Mrs. Villarreal told Reyna she was relieved to learn all the horror stories she had heard about violence and unruliness at middle schools did not exist at Brown.

Reyna teaches Diana math, reading and composition through the district's Challenge program for gifted and talented students.

"We have never had a teacher come to our home," Mrs. Villarreal

said in Spanish. "There have been many positive things coming to us at school, but nobody has ever come to my house. I like it."

"It makes us feel like you have a real interest in our student," she told Reyna. "That the three of us - the parent, the teacher and the student - will be working together."

At another home, Reyna learned that one of his sixth-graders is 13 - old for his grade - because he started school in Reynosa, Mexico. McAllen school officials required the child to repeat the first grade when he moved to Texas from Mexico.

Nineteen-year-old George Lopez, a 1992 McAllen High School graduate who is a Stanford University junior, said he still recalls the evening nine years ago when Reyna came to meet Lopez's mother and grandmother.

"It opened the way for communication, because he showed an interest in our lives besides that of the regular role of a teacher that we're accustomed to," Lopez said. "I see it as a very positive way to bridge the gap between the school and the home."

# Loophole allowing lottery sales by computer closed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congress didn't anticipate the wonders of the electronic age when in 1940 it enacted a law banning the sale of lottery tickets across state lines.

That ban was effective for decades until private dealers set up computer networks that enabled customers living in one state to buy chances on big state lottery jackpots elsewhere in the country.

The business began in Pennsylvania and spread to several other states, including Texas, after a federal judge invalidated an attempt by Pennsylvania legislators to stop it. The judge held that the Pennsylvania law violated the Constitution's provision that only the federal government could regulate interstate commerce.

But anti-crime legislation President Clinton signed into law Tuesday will shut down the interstate electronic network by closing a loophole in the 54-year-old federal law.

"These people built their business on a very technical loophole," said William Bergman, executive director of the North American Association of State and Provincial Lotteries. "I think they should be shut down."

The anti-crime statute changes the lottery law to cover sales of chances, shares and interests in addition to the tickets.

Through a network of agents, Pic-A-State Pa. Inc. of Lakewood, N.J., and Fortune U.S.A. of Pittsburgh have been selling shares in chances of out-of-state lotteries within Pennsylvania.

Agents held the tickets in the state that ran the lottery and the dealers gave receipts to customers.

Under that arrangement, a person could play the Florida lottery by going to a vendor in Pennsylvania. The dealer would transmit a computer order to an agent in Florida, who would purchase the ticket and hold it for the customer, who would get a receipt.

The agent in Florida would forward winning tickets to lottery officials in that state, instructing them to either send the prize directly to the customer or hold it for the customer to pick up.

The Pennsylvania Legislature last year tried to ban such sales, but a federal judge in Harrisburg struck down the state law, holding it was an unconstitutional restraint on interstate commerce.

Lottery officials said they feared the court ruling would only encourage

the practice to spread to other states. Since the decision, similar companies have sprung up in Ohio, West Virginia and Texas, Bergman said.

The crime bill's lottery provision, sponsored by Sens. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., and Harris Wofford, D-Pa., is seen largely as an attempt to nullify that ruling.

Pic-A-State had challenged the Pennsylvania law on ground that the state was trying to protect a \$1.5 billion-a-year lottery monopoly.

The company argued it was only providing a service for people who want to try their luck on bigger jackpots in other states' lotteries.

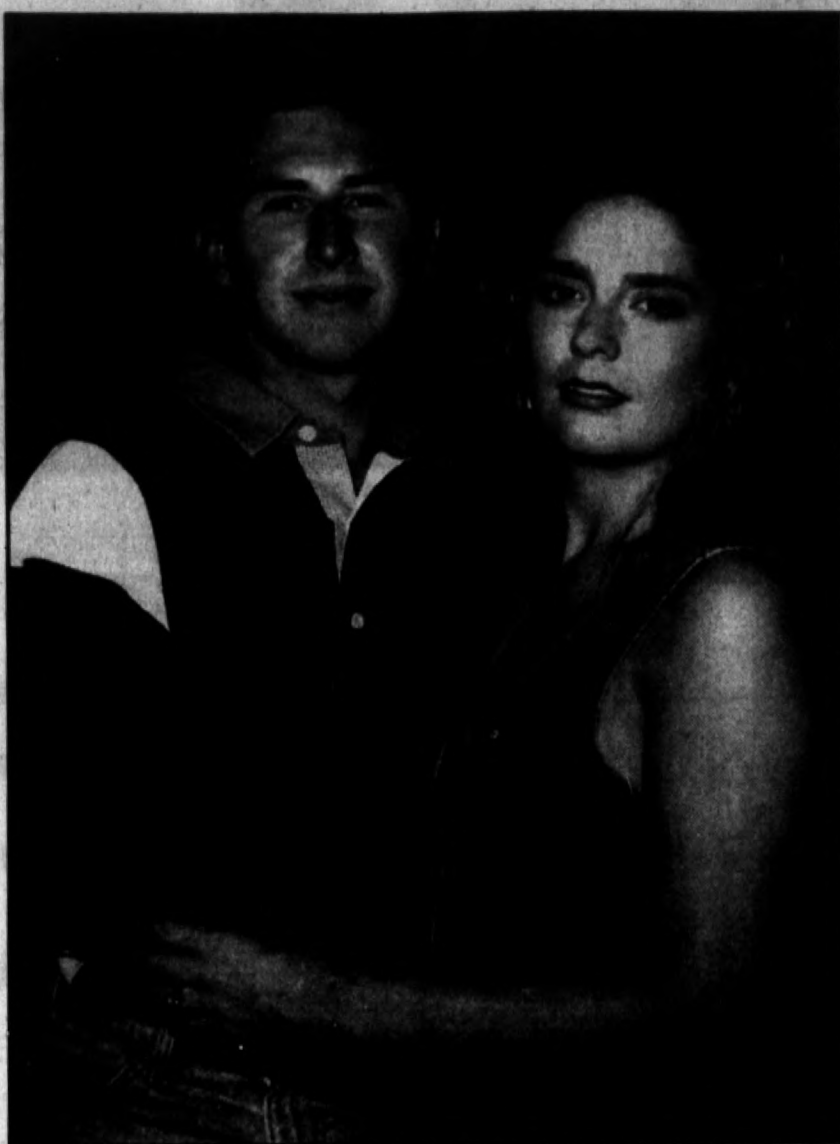

With the full cooperation of those involved in the case, Leonard Sanders has rendered a compassionate, nuanced, and compelling portrait of an idyllic town's initiation into America's spreading scourge of crime."

On the lighter-or at least happier-side, there is *Barns of Yesteryears*, a collection of photographs and accompanying text about old barns. In all candor, this is not one of those slick glossy coffee-table books with a color

picture on every page. As a matter of fact, the only color pictures are on the cover (inside they're all black and white), but it's fun to see the designs of these old barns. (Does the word "yesteryears" bother you? It doesn't seem to me that it should be plural).

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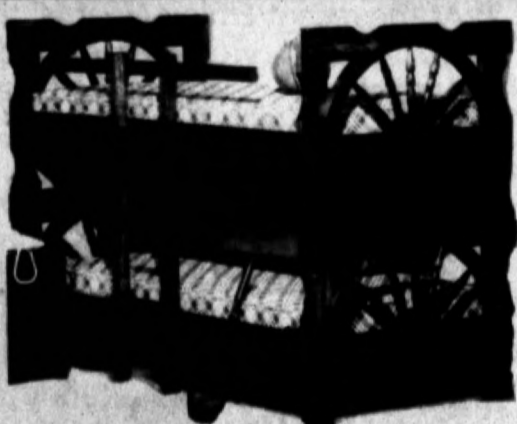

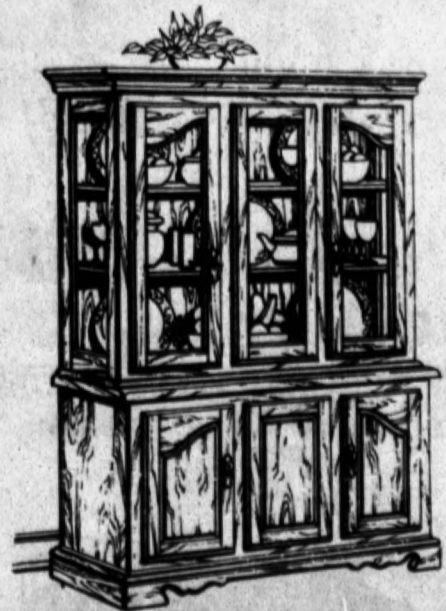
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## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### A GOOD SIGN

If you are the typical small business owner, you probably feel that it would be nice to have more help. Would you like to hire a sales associate who would work hard for several days for 50 cents or less?

Would you be interested in a worker who demands no benefits package, won't call in sick, doesn't ask for vacation during your busy season and will accept abrupt termination without recourse or hurt feelings? The worker I'm speaking of is a good sign.

Signs can help you increase sales. Research indicates that in some cases point-of-purchase sales increased by as much as 24 percent with a good sign. The research also shows that signs that

point out product benefits generate even more sales. Good signs will help your customers reach a buying decision. They will help your customers select the correct model, the right size or specific features they desire in a product. Signs also help customers compare prices, while giving you the added advantage of explaining hidden benefits.

Signs are also a good way to drive your megastore competitors crazy. You can change prices in minutes by putting up a new sign, while many discounters are tied to regional or national promotions.

Good signs help you build your customers' perception of value. Professional signs add to your quality image, while hand written signs look cheap.

You can use a computer, word processor or custom sign making machine to make your own signs in-house. There are also any businesses who specialize in quick, custom-made signs.

#### Sign tips

Here are several tips for creating good signs:

- Be specific in the wording you use on your signs. Say "Steel Leaf Rakes - Flexible tines - \$4.99," not "Rakes - \$4.99."
- Make pricing and quantities easy to understand. "Large Paper Clips - 50 for 49¢" not just "Clips - 49¢." Point out value - "Less than 1¢ each."
- Sell the sizzle - Why is this product unique? Identify the special benefits, such as "Locally grown" or "Made in Texas" then sign them.
- Give your customers plain, simple facts, not hype. If you claim that your product is "improved," "fresher," "better," etc., prove your claims with facts.
- Use signs to explain what isn't obvious. "Keyless Door Lock - just

enter your 3-digit code to unlock the door."

• Help the customer find the best value with the features they want. Show additional features as the price goes up. For example, on "good, better, best," models, show two, four and six features, respectively.

• Offer additional items. If you're selling paint, suggest brushes, masking tape, a drop cloth and razor blades.

• Don't waste space by pointing out the obvious. Don't say "Assorted Colors" if you can see the assortment.

• Keep your signs positive and friendly. Don't use "don't." Say "Thank you for not Smoking," not "Don't Smoke." Say "Shirt and Shoes required by State law," not "No Shirt, No Shoes, No Service."

• Listen to customer's questions. If several customers ask the same question, you may need a sign.

• Listen to your customers praise. When customers say, "We really like...because..." the "because" is a benefit and should be signed.

• Use a sign to reinforce your advertising. Say "As Advertised." If something is important enough to advertise, it deserves a sign. We now one merchant who watches his competitors' ads and matches the price with an "As advertised" sign. He doesn't say who advertised it.

Move your business image up a notch with good signs. Signs are a low-cost way to increase sales and serve your customers more effectively.

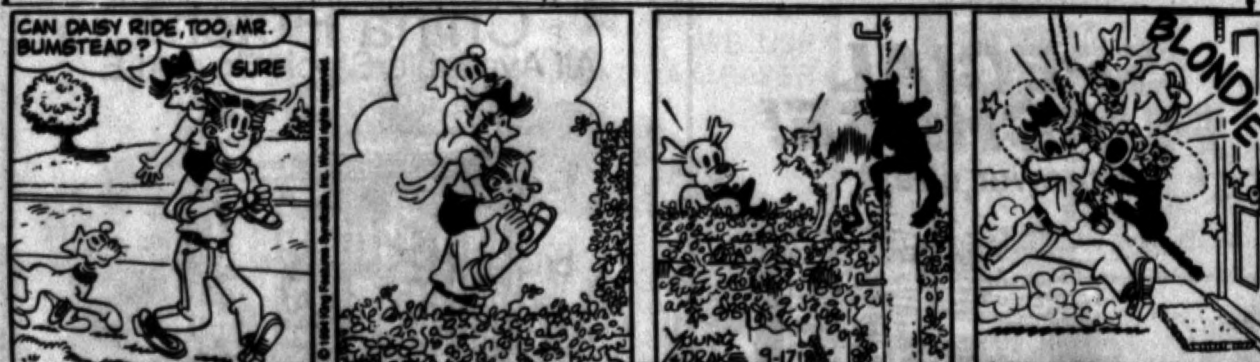

## Extension News

WAX ON PRODUCE

Some consumers may wonder why fresh produce is covered with wax. Waxes are used to help retain the product's moisture during shipping and marketing.

Most produce is 80 to 95 percent moisture. Many fruits and vegetables manufacture their own natural waxy coating (called cuticle) to help retain moisture. However, after harvest, the natural wax substances are removed when the produce is washed before packing, therefore, waxes are applied to some commodities to replace natural ones that are lost.

Waxes are also used to help inhibit mold growth, to protect fruits and vegetables from bruising and to prevent other physical damage, disease, and pathogens. By protecting against moisture loss and fungus and bacterial contamination, wax coatings help fresh fruits and vegetables retain the wholesome, healthy appearance that consumers demand. Waxing does

not improve the quality of any inferior fruits or vegetables, but it is a beneficial adjunct to good handling.

Waxes are used only in minuscule amounts. In fact, one pound of wax will cover an average of 160,000 pieces of fruits or vegetables. The waxes may be mixed with water and emulsifying and wetting agents to ensure that a thin, continuous coating is applied to the product.

Waxes, without exception, come from natural sources. Commercial waxes generally are formulated from plant petroleum sources and usually consist of a combination of carnauba wax (from the leaves of Brazilian palm), food-grade shellac (from an insect) polyethylene, or paraffin-type boxes. These waxes are also commonly used as food additives for candy and pastries.

## Family doctors have changed

Helping Americans stay healthier: that's the role family doctors have played for decades. The practice has changed a great deal over the years, however, as can be seen by looking at the differences in the medical specialty of Family Practice, the second largest in the US.

Here, in question-and-answer form, are the facts about the changing face of Family Practice, from the American Board of Family Practice's (ABFP) executive director, Dr. Paul R. Young. The ABFP, which just celebrated its 25th anniversary, oversees the development and dispensation of annual certification and recertification exams. Its board is composed of Diplomates from the specialty of Family Practice, as well as the specialties of Internal Medicine, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Pediatrics, Psychiatry, and Surgery.

Q. In what ways has Family Practice changed in the last 25 years?

A. The average age of the family physician (FP) is now markedly lower than it was 25 years ago. Then, it was 55; today the average age of an FP is 40 to 41. In addition, the number of doctors in family practice has been on the rise with many more women becoming doctors, and family doctors in particular.

Q. Have patients changed in the same period?

A. Yes, and the most significant change is reflected in the family structure and its function. The family as a unit is less cohesive than it was 25 years ago, with members no longer having as strong an influence on one another. And, young people now separate from the family core at early ages. These social changes require different strategies for a family physician. One positive, however, is that people have become more aware of their bodies and their health and they seem to be mindful of the consequences of their lifestyles.

Q. Are there innovations, other than recertification every six to seven years, that the ABFP is responsible for?

A. Most medical boards use hospital records to assess the quality of a doctor's performance. Since family practice takes place in the office, and not in a hospital environment, the ABFP uses office records as a means of assessing the doctor's practice. We believe it is a more representative review and better gauges performance.

Q. Could you project what's in the future for primary care?

A. We suspect that family practice will be at the core of medical care. However, the number of family physicians will be limited for some time. This is because medical education is organized to produce other specialists and we do not have enough family practice training programs. This, in turn, will result in more collaborative practices with nurse practitioners and physician's assistants. These outcomes may very well be guided by the managed care system as it looks to the economics of providing healthy care.

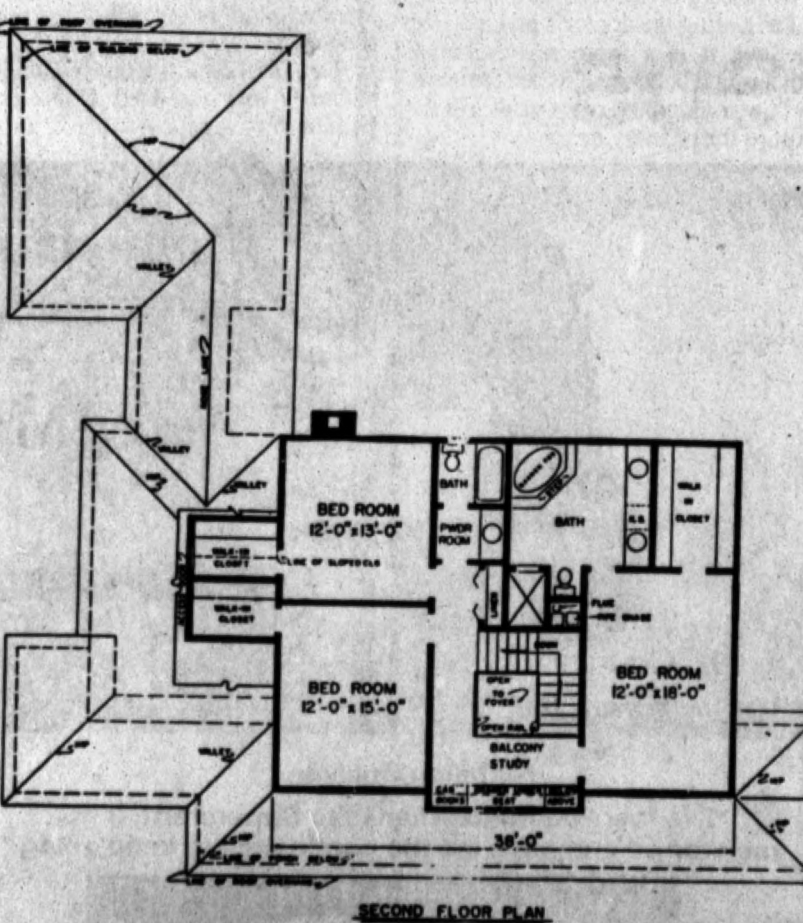
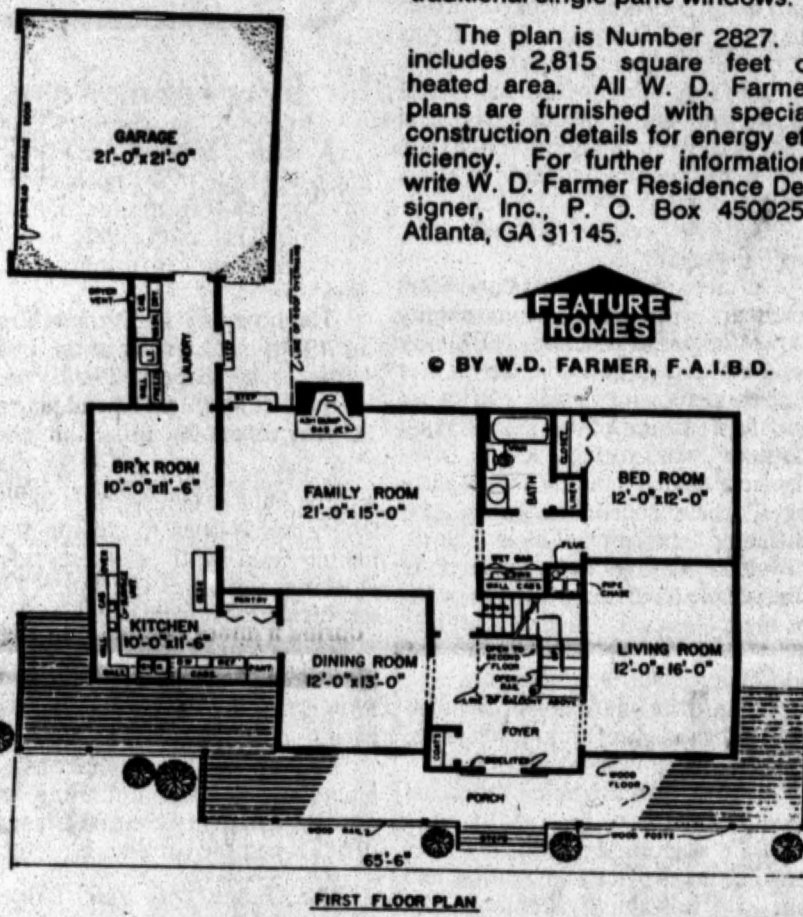

## Question/Answer

**Q:** Our freezer door appears to be sagging and does not close and seal as tightly as it once did. I've also noticed that the door gasket seems to be wearing unevenly. What would cause this, and how can I correct this problem?

**A:** Over time a freezer door will sag. The weight of the door hanging on the hinge above it, and the action of opening and closing the door loosens the hinge fasteners. A sagging freezer door forms a poor seal with the door gasket, and this wastes energy and wears the door gasket unevenly.

To gain access to the bolt or screws, first remove the plastic or metal decorative hinge cover. Pry the cover off the hinge with a straight-blade screwdriver or a putty knife. Next, use either a screwdriver, nut driver or a socket wrench, and loosen the hex-head bolt, Phillips or Torx screws on the hinge. Lift the door by pulling up on the door handle until the door fits squarely over the opening. Hold the door in place, and tighten the fasteners. Open and close the door several times to be sure it seals properly. The top of the freezer door should line up with the top of the refrigerator cabinet.

## USDA grant will fund survey to determine goat meat potential

AUSTIN (AP) - A survey to determine the potential demand for goat meat in the United States is among Texas projects receiving funding from the U.S. Department of Agriculture, state Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry says.

The Texas Department of Agriculture was awarded a \$109,000 USDA grant and \$38,300 from the state Office of State-Federal Relations for the survey to determine the potential for a goat meat market, Perry said Thursday.

## Comment asked on wool, mohair

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department is seeking public comment on 1995 support prices for pulled wool and mohair.

A two-year phaseout of wool and mohair programs begun under the amended National Wool Act of 1954 is slated to begin this year, to end government subsidies by December 31, 1995.

Comments on the proposed regulation should be sent by Oct. 17, in care of Director, Fibers and Rice Analysis Division, Room 3760-S, USDA-ASCS, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013-2415.

The department will contract with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to survey wholesalers, retailers, restaurants and consumers.

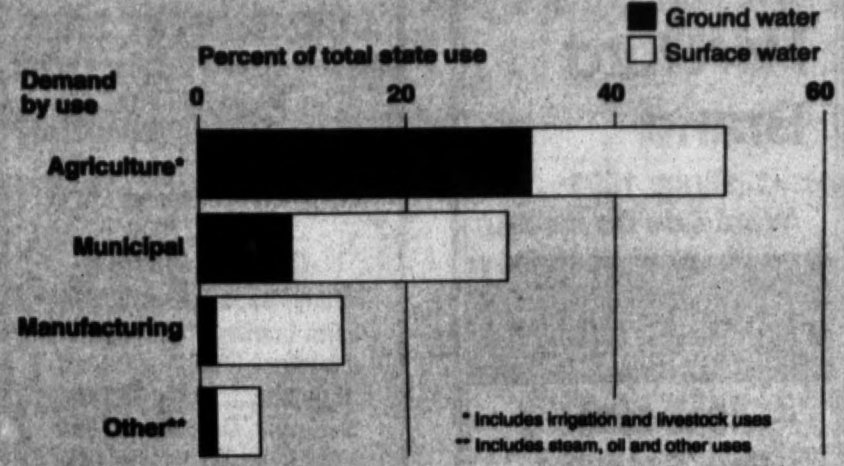
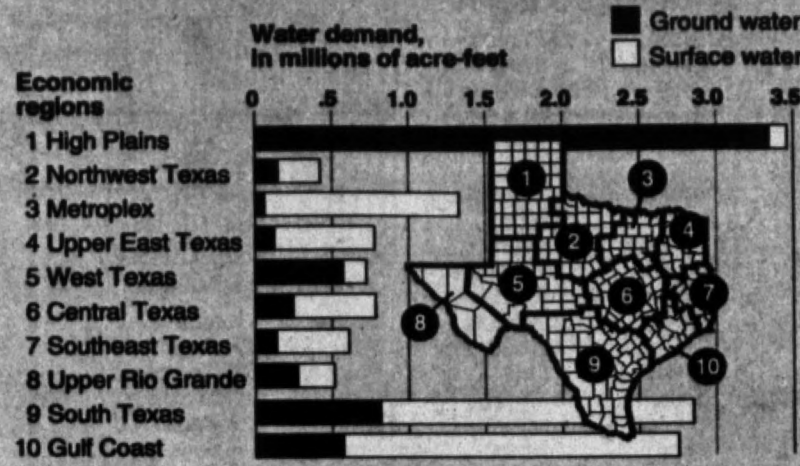
Other grants to the Texas agency include:

- \$40,000 to develop a computerized system to evaluate and approve of materials such as fertilizers that can be certified for use on organic farms. The agency will contract with Organic Agsystems Consulting of Cottage Grove, Ore., to develop the computer program.
- \$40,000 to evaluate the competitive position of U.S. and Mexican dairy industries under the North American Free Trade Agreement. The agency will contract with the Agricultural Experiment Station to conduct the second part of a two-year research project.
- \$35,000 to determine if there's consumer demand for fruits and vegetables that are certified to be produced through integrated pest management, a farming system that controls pests with such practices as biological pest controls, pest-resistant crop plants and limited pesticide use.

The agency will contract for the survey with the University of Texas at Austin.

## Water needed in 2000 for agriculture, manufacturing and municipal systems

An estimated 14.2 million acre-feet of water will be needed in the state in the year 2000 for agriculture, manufacturing and municipal systems. Ground water, from aquifers beneath the ground, is expected to supply 6.3 million acre-feet, or 44 percent of the need. Surface water, from rivers and lakes, is expected to supply 8 million acre-feet, or 56 percent of the demand.

The demand for ground water in 2000 is expected to be 6.3 million acre-feet, 2.6 million acre-feet less than the demand in 1990, but an estimated one-million acre-feet more than is replenished yearly by rainfall and runoff.

## Several demonstrations slated at show

LUBBOCK - On an 800-acre site just outside Lubbock, this year's Farmer-Stockman Show will focus on a real farm environment with field demonstrations.

Combines will harvest corn and sorghum crops. Cotton harvesters will move through a field.

And, a variety of tillage equipment will be shown at work.

The show will run for three days, beginning Oct. 11, at the Lubbock

City Farms, located 1 1/2 miles east of Loop 289 on FM 835.

At the center of the show will be a 56-acre tent city where commercial and education exhibits will be set up.

Surrounding the core will be 500 acres of cotton, corn, sorghum and hay. Equipment used in harvesting these crops will be the latest available from manufacturers.

Three to five combines are expected to work in each of the small

grain crops. Several cotton harvesters also are being readied for the show.

Tillage equipment at work will include disks, chisels, paratills, high residue tools and others. On the list of specialty equipment are guidance systems and spray equipment, to name a few.

The field demonstrations have been laid out to minimize walking. Shuttles will provide transportation from the exhibit field to the demon-

stration site.

Demonstrations begin at 10 a.m. each day and continue until 5:30 p.m. A master schedule will be posted each day at the show headquarters.

Hours each day are 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. Admission will be \$3 for adults. Persons under age 18 will be admitted free.

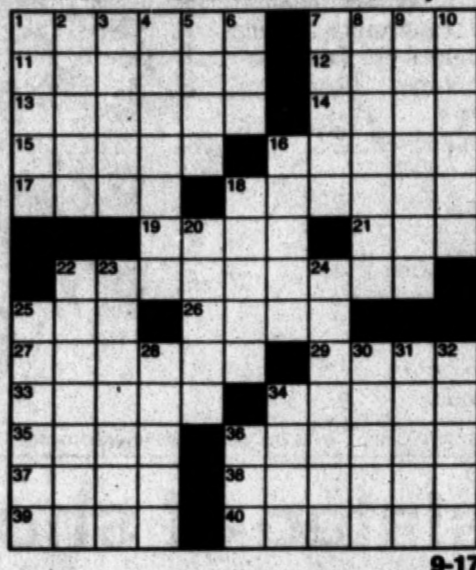

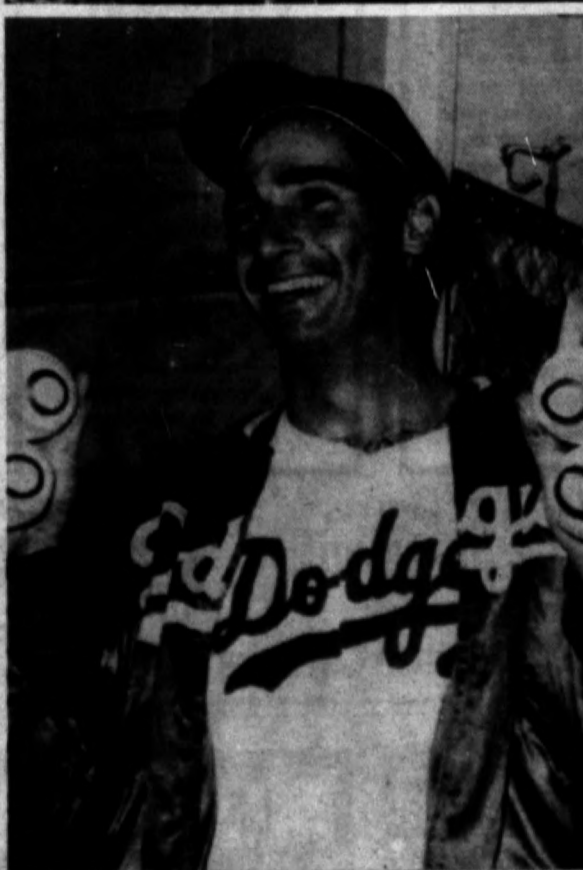
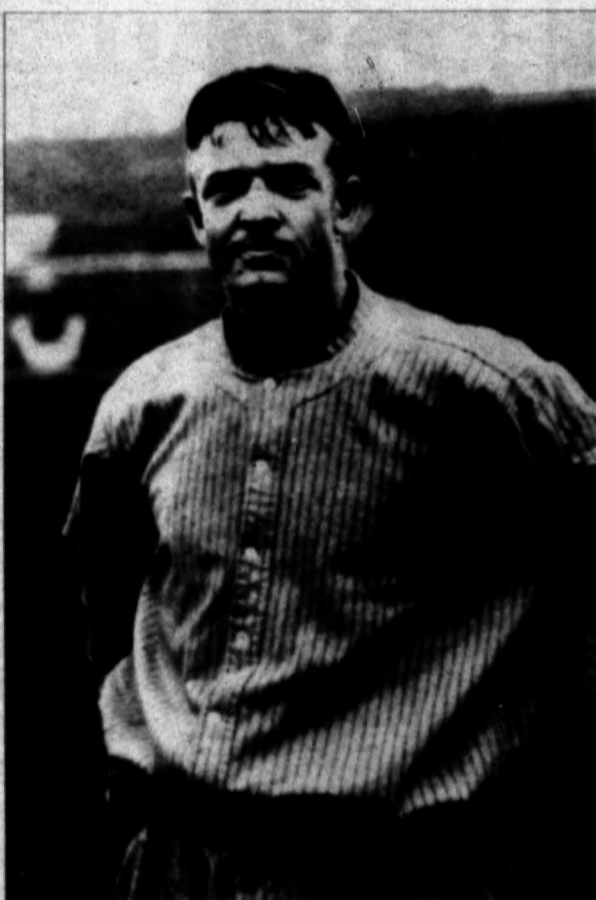

## Burns' Baseball a nostalgic look at history of America

Fans of the national pastime who can't seem to lose that bad taste in their mouths caused by the major league strike receive some major mouthwash in the form of Ken Burns' epic documentary, *Baseball*, beginning Sunday, Sept. 18, on PBS (check local listings).

Airing in nine episodes, or "innings," *Baseball* takes a comprehensive look at the history of the game, as well as the impact the sport has had on American society as a whole.

"This is the story of immigration and assimilation," Burns says, "of the tension between labor and management, of the rise of popular media through newspaper, radio and television."

"This is the story of the growth and decay of cities. And most of all, this is the story of America's past time," Burns says with emphasis, "the story of remarkable human beings, heroic figures, villainous figures and foolish figures."

Innings one through five air Sunday through Thursday, Sept. 22. After two "travel days," the series resumes play on Sunday, Sept. 25, through Wednesday, Sept. 28, for innings six through nine.

In addition, *Baseball* will be distributed to middle schools, high schools and colleges nationwide.

It will also be released in a Spanish-language version, a descriptive video version for the blind and visually impaired and in a special computer-interactive version through PBS Online.

Each inning focuses on a different era of history, and, by extension, a different issue that affected that era.

Sunday's episode, "Our Game," looks at the origins of baseball and refutes the myth that Abner Doubleday

invented the game, citing records of a game called Base played by soldiers at Valley Forge.

Innings two through four take viewers through the 1920s, focusing on the days of Ty Cobb and Honus Wagner, the infamous Black Sox scandal and the emergence of the game's first mega-star, George Herman "Babe" Ruth.

This week's final inning, "Shadow Ball," tells the story of the Negro Leagues of the 1930s. The title refers to the common pregame warm-up in which players staged a mock game with an imaginary ball in a pantomime so realistic it became at least as popular as the games themselves.

Next week's episodes begin with the 1940s, the sport's most glorious era. Featured are: Joe DiMaggio's celebrated hitting streak; the awe-inspiring performance of Ted Williams; and what Burns calls "baseball's finest moment" — the debut of Jackie Robinson, who broke the color barrier as a member of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947.

A microcosm of society, *Baseball* gives credence to the adage that history repeats itself.

"Joe DiMaggio held out for more money. Ted Williams was booed," co-producer Lynn Novick says. "There are wonderful moments. There are also complicated, dark moments, and we're not trying to say that it was great in the old days and terrible today."

Looking specifically on the problems plaguing the game today, Burns adds:

"There is a sense that the repetitions of history just keep going on and on, particularly in baseball. But I do worry that the kind of distance between the owners and the players now might have a profound effect on what we know of the professional game now."

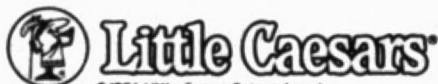

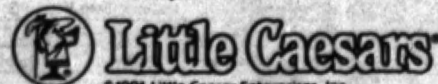

**Q:** When I was a child, I saw a program on Canadian TV, and I would like a copy of it. I think it aired under the *Peanuts and Popcorn* children's program, and it was called *Three Nuts for Cinderella*. Can you help me? --Kim Thornhill, St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada.

**A:** I've gotten an awful lot of mail on this program, but I never have been able to locate it on video. Sorry.

**Q:** Besides *Goonies* and *Rudy*, what other movies has Sean Astin been in? What was the movie he was in that was set in a military school? Is there some publication out there that has the addresses of non-network stars and shows? --N.M.N., Hartford, Mich.

**A:** You're thinking of *Toy Soldiers*. Astin's other movies include *Encino Man*; *Like Father, Like Son*; *Memphis Belle*; *Staying Together*; *The War of the Roses*; *Where the Day Takes You*; *White Water Summer*; and *The Willies*, and are all on video. Sorry, there isn't a single source for addresses. Try taking note of addresses for syndication companies as they appear in this column and watching the end credits of your favorite shows to identify their source.

**Q:** I am a big fan of *Highlander*, both the movies and the syndicated series. Where can I write to TV's Adrian Paul? --Rosalyn Scruton, Streetsboro, Ohio.

**A:** You are thinking of *Being There*, in which Sellers becomes a presidential adviser, not the commander in chief.

**Q:** Can you please tell me who the main characters were in *Duffy's Tavern*? I have written NBC and CBS with no response. --Frank J. LaBarbera, Nacogdoches, Texas.

**A:** There is no mention of *Duffy's* in my TV reference books, but it is well remembered by those who had sets in the '50s. It was adapted, of course, from radio, where the main characters were Archie the manager (producer Ed Gardner), Clifton Finnegan (Charlie Cantor), Eddie the waiter (Eddie Green) and Miss Duffy, played by several actresses, including Shirley Booth. Other characters included Wilfred, Clifton's kid brother; Clancy the cop; and Dolly Snaffle. (Tavern owner Duffy, you remember, was never there.) A movie version appeared in 1945, but it isn't in video release. In 1949 Gardner moved the radio show to Puerto Rico for tax purposes.

And here's a piece of *Duffy's* trivia: Director James Burrows, part of the team that created *Cheers*, also a show set in a bar, is the son of *Duffy's* writer Abe Burrows. James' middle name is Ed, after Gardner. When *Cheers* first aired and another Hollywood writer wanted to sue, claiming that he had originated the idea, Jim Burrows quipped, "If anybody should be suing, it's my father."

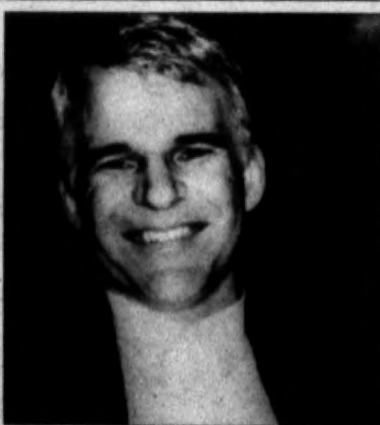
## Martin's impossible mission; White plays Tyson ... any way he wants to

Tom Cruise may be set to film *Mission Impossible* this fall, but he has nothing on Steve Martin, who will begin work next month on two movies: *Sgt. Bilko* and *Father of the Bride 2*. At least they are both being shot in Los Angeles.

After an exhaustive search, HBO has selected Michael Jai White to star in its upcoming drama *Tyson*, about the life of former heavyweight boxing champ Mike Tyson. Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., White is six feet tall and weighs 205 pounds. He holds black belts in five martial arts. Production on the film begins this month.

True Blue: Fox's *Cops* is nearing the end of a six-week assignment with the New York Police Department. Crews from the Saturday night reality series have been riding with the NYPD since mid-August. "We are especially pleased to be the first show allowed to film the NYPD at work," says executive producer John Langley. The shows should air later this fall.

The performances will be both acoustic and electric. Taping is being done in a London studio and locations in Morocco and Wales.
