## New store set to open next month

Work crews have descended on the old Winn's store here and are about two weeks away from opening it as the newest location of Family Dollar.

Family Dollar, a variety store chain based in North Carolina, had been rumored to be taking over the Winn's lease after that chain vacated the building on July 21.

Winn's had operated here nine years before closing as part of a corporate cut-back.

Family Dollar manager John Pope, who helped open the company's Plainview store in July, has been working all week, transforming 27,000-square-foot retail space into a 10,000-square-foot store and storage area.

Pope said most Family Dollar outlets are about 6,000 square feet.

A high display rack has been erected in the middle of the store, defining the west wall of the retail sales floor.

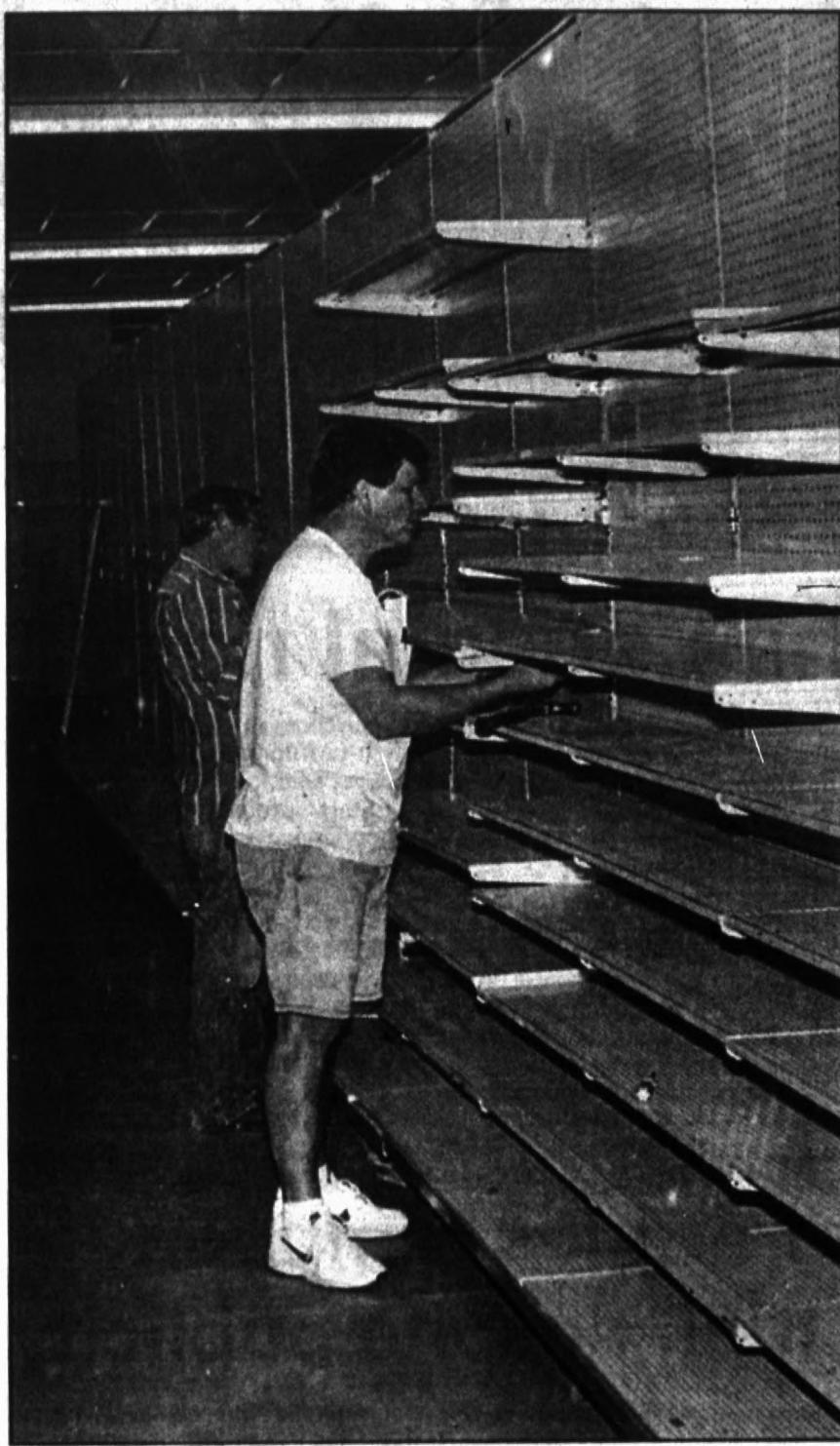
Pope said the remainder of the store area will be closed to the public and will be used for storage.

Pope said he hopes to open the new Family Dollar on Sept. 14. The grand opening is scheduled for Sept. 15.

"A good way to describe (the store) is a small Wall-Mart or small K Mart," he said, noting that the store will stock a variety of merchandise.

"We're an alternative shopping center to the big ones," he said.

In town to assist with the transformation from Winn's to Family Dollar is Jamie Foreman, a corporate employee whose job it is to travel to new stores and get them ready to open.

## Grade plan put on hold

A plan to change first grade scoring from a number system to one using letters has been shelved for the time being after the teachers decided to study the issue.

The issue had been scheduled to be heard by the HISD board of trustees at a special meeting on Tuesday night, but Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt said the teachers had decided to wait.

"They'll spend the year studying it," he said, and return to the board next year with a recommendation.

The teachers had asked that they be allowed to change from a grading system to one with letters -- E for Excellent, S for Satisfactory, I for Improvement Needed and U for Unsatisfactory -- because it would better communicate student progress and show parents where their students are with class work.

Greenawalt said the teachers were not in agreement about what needed to be done or on what they hoped to accomplish with the change.

After the report on the scoring system, trustees returned to work on their strategic planning, which they have been doing over the course of several meetings.

The planning is designed to let trustees present suggestions for the district and develop a direction for the board.

Trustees were scheduled to meet again at noon today to hold a public hearing on the 1994-95 school district budget and to amend the 1993-94 budget, pass the 1994-95 budget and set the tax rate.

## Voter signup cutoff noted

Prospective voters who do not hold current registration certificates have until Oct. 9 to become eligible to cast ballots in the Nov. 8 general election.

Deaf Smith County Clerk David Ruland, who also serves as voter registrar, reminded that application for registration may be made in his office on the second floor in the Deaf Smith County Courthouse.

The current registration certificate is yellow. Persons who have lost or misplaced their cards may obtain copies in Ruland's office.

Several state and county political races will be decided in the November election.

Approximately 8,000 persons currently are eligible to vote.

## Robinson selected as new HRMC head

James Michael Robinson Sr. was named Tuesday night as the new chief executive officer of Hereford Regional Medical Center, according to Mal Manchee, board president of Deaf Smith County Hospital District.

Robinson, 53, who has served as an interim administrator since July 19, accepted the position and will assume duties Sept. 1. He is from Fort Worth.

"Jim's leadership through these last few weeks convinced the board that he is the kind of administrator we desire for our hospital district," Manchee said.

The board held a special meeting Tuesday night and went into executive session to interview two finalists--Robinson and Michael Reppart, a vice president for University Medical Center in Lubbock. Jim Wurts, vice president of regional services for Lubbock Methodist Hospital, coordinated the search for the district.

The search for a new CEO started after May 9 when Ron Rives resigned the position. Mike Maloy served as interim administrator for two months before being relieved by Robinson.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to continue my work in Hereford," Robinson said this morning. "There is great potential for continued growth and innovation at this hospital district. In the few weeks I've been here, I've been impressed with the dedication and professionalism of the staff."

Robinson served nine years as the assistant region 7 director of the American Hospital Association. In that capacity, his duties included lobbying efforts among member hospitals, working on member recruitment and retention, and keeping member hospitals abreast of relevant state and federal health care issues.

Robinson also worked in several capacities in hospitals. At St. Joseph Hospital in Fort Worth, he was

associate administrator, director of outreach programs, and foundation vice president for 14 years.

He worked two years as executive director of St. Joseph Hospital and Health Care Foundation in Albuquerque, N.M. He also worked as an administrative assistant with Queen of Angels Hospital in Los Angeles.

The new administrator graduated Cum Laude with a BS in business administration from Youngstown University, and he has a master's degree in hospital administration from St. Louis University. He is a fellow in the American College of Healthcare Executives, and a member of several professional hospital groups.

Robinson has been active in his community, serving on the school board in Keller, the chamber of commerce, the Tarrant County/Fort Worth Civil Defense, and the Tarrant County United Way. He has also

served on the Eastside YMCA board in Fort Worth. He is married and has two grown children.

## Church to receive grant for building

San Jose Catholic Church will receive a \$75,000 grant from the Meadows Foundation of Dallas to help in the construction of a \$380,000 Hispanic Community Center, it was announced Tuesday afternoon by Father Darryl Birkenfeld, pastor.

San Jose has planned construction of the center in order to house a number of programs directed at meeting the needs of Hereford's Hispanic community, said Fr. Birkenfeld.

Construction of the 11,665 square-foot center is scheduled to begin in March, 1995, with the facility to be ready for use by the fall of the year. Plans for the center include adult literacy and continuing education, educational programs for pregnant teenagers who wish to continue their high school classes, health screening programs, recreation programs for children and teens to supplement the YMCA efforts, and continuation of the existing San Jose early childhood development program.

Parishioners at San Jose Catholic Church intend for the center and the programs to address a number of critical needs for the Hispanic community. Examples include high rates for both school drop-outs and teen pregnancies. Fr. Birkenfeld noted the teen pregnancy rate is among the highest in the state.

"Not only will this center provide important intervention for individuals, but it also builds the

framework necessary to ensure that poverty, poor educational expectations, and high crime rates do not continue to plague Hereford's Hispanic community in decades to come," stated San Jose's request for the Meadows' grant.

San Jose has successfully solicited commitments for almost three-fourths of the \$380,000 required to build the proposed center. A capital campaign continues to obtain the remaining funds necessary for successful completion of the project, said Fr. Birkenfeld.

The Meadows Foundation was created in 1948 by Algor and Virginia Meadows to benefit the people of Texas in health, education, arts and culture, social services and civic endeavors. Through January, 1993, more than \$250 million in grants and charitable expenditures had been made.

Meadows built General American Oil Co. of Texas into one of the nation's most successful independent oil companies. He established the foundation so that his philanthropy would continue after his death. With assets of more than \$500 million, the Meadows Foundation is one of the largest private foundations in Texas.

## Poll shows governor's race dead heat; Hutchison leads

AUSTIN (AP) - A new poll that shows the governor's race may be a dead heat will be used by both Democratic Gov. Ann Richards and Republican challenger George W. Bush to drum up funds and support, political observers say.

"They can both use this poll to their advantage," longtime political consultant George Christian said Tuesday.

Richards leads Bush 47 percent to 43 percent, according to the poll. The telephone survey of 757 likely voters was conducted Aug. 18-27. Ten percent said they were undecided, and less than 1 percent said they plan to vote for someone other than Richards or Bush.

The poll's margin of error is plus or minus 4 percentage points, meaning each candidate's support could go up or down by that much.

Candace Windel, the poll director, says the survey shows the race can be considered a dead heat 10 weeks before the Nov. 8 election and just days before the traditional Labor Day turn when the campaigns sense the finish line.

"It is technically within the margin of error of being a tie," she said.

In other results, the poll showed Republican U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison leads Democrat Richard Fisher, 49 percent to 30 percent. Nineteen percent were undecided. Mrs. Hutchison led Fisher in every region of the state.

Christian said Richards' campaign will use the poll to show her re-election is not guaranteed.

"It's going to take a big get-out-the-vote effort and a lot of advertising to pull Ann through," he said.

Christian said the Bush campaign will appeal to contributors, saying, "We're within range of winning this race with an extra push."

Bill Miller, a political consultant who has worked for candidates in

both parties but is not involved in the governor's race, said both campaigns will go to their known sources of funding.

"If I were a big contributor, I would be asking, 'Have they called yet?'" Miller said.

Bush's climb over the past 10 months from 39 percent support to 43 percent support may be negligible considering the margin of error. But Ms. Windel said, "Clearly the gap has narrowed."

"He is more well known than before and more people say they are going to vote for him," she said.

Ms. Windel said that during the first days of telephone interviews for the poll, Richards enjoyed much more support. She said Bush closed in during the last days of the survey.

"Something has to be driving that," she said. "My guess is that it's television (advertising)."

Fisher said he was not disillusioned by the latest poll.

**MONTE CRISTI, Dominican Republic** - The Clinton administration keeps saying its patience in the Haiti crisis has nearly run out, that it is almost time to force an end to the long-running drama. But from here, near the Haiti border, it looks and sounds as though an American invasion is anything but imminent.

**WASHINGTON** - Just before it fired Benjamin Chavis for secretly settling a former worker's sex discrimination claim, the NAACP quietly resolved a similar lawsuit by another female employee against a member of its board of directors.

**BELFAST, Northern Ireland** - Amid expectations of an IRA cease-fire announcement, its leading political ally demands immediate steps by the British government to move the peace process forward.

**BERLIN** - Russia officially ends a half-century military presence today in former East Germany and the Baltics, the last European bastions for former Red Army forces of the Cold War era.

Her look of despair, so deep everything is gray, is the same look that flattens the faces of the young and hopeless in poor, violent neighborhoods everywhere. Neighborhoods where criminals fear their friends and neighbors more than the police.

**HOUSTON** - Six Cuban refugees seated in a conference room learn that all the rules change in their new life in this country. Unlike those who followed them after President Clinton's Aug. 19 decision to stop welcoming Cubans on U.S. shores, these six don't have to go to a camp at the U.S. Navy base at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

**HARLINGEN** - A South Texas environmental group has voted to join a National Audubon Society lawsuit that would seek an end to open-bay dumping of dredged sediment in the Laguna Madre.

# Counsel has special needs

WASHINGTON (AP) - Kenneth Starr, the recently appointed White House independent counsel, is seeking a high-profile deputy with no ties to Republican politics - someone whose credentials will blunt criticisms.

While widely respected as a lawyer, Starr has no experience actually prosecuting cases.

And he has been sharply criticized by Democrats for his ties to the GOP. A Republican-appointed appellate judge who later represented the Bush administration before the Supreme

Court as solicitor general, Starr had discussed seeking the Republican nomination for the Senate from Virginia and was listed as co-chairman for a GOP House candidate's campaign.

So he has been quietly soliciting names of seasoned prosecutors who rose through the career ranks or are Democratic appointees now in private practice, said several lawyers familiar with Starr's thinking, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

"I'm not necessarily certain this person will be perceived so much as a Democrat as just a non-Republican, someone who has had a great deal of

experience in prosecuting cases, high-profile and tough cases," one lawyer said.

Starr probably hasn't begun interviewing possible candidates yet, the lawyers said.

But among the candidates who have been suggested or would fit the bill, they said, were Peter Vaira and Tom Puccio, prosecutors of Abscam, where several politicians were convicted of accepting bribes from a phony Arab sheik in the late 1970s.

Also suggested was Jeremiah O'Sullivan, chief during the 1980s of the Justice Department's organized crime strike force in New England.

# Media lawyer argues Simpson can get fair trial, despite publicity

LOS ANGELES (AP) - If Charles Manson, Sirhan Sirhan and the Watergate conspirators could get fair trials despite massive publicity, so can O.J. Simpson, said a media lawyer arguing against a proposed gag order.

Judge Lance Ito, who has suggested muzzling lawyers in the case, agreed to hear arguments today from the media, the American Civil Liberties Union and others. Ito already has ordered all filed documents to be sealed until they are discussed in court.

In cases such as the Robert F. Kennedy assassination, the Manson murders and Watergate, "The reviewing courts nonetheless found that an impartial jury was selected and a fair trial conducted," lawyer Kelli Sager wrote in a motion suggesting that the proposed gag order and the sealing of documents are unconstitutional.

"Certainly there has been

widespread media attention to this case, but it is hardly unprecedented," Sager wrote.

The motion was filed on behalf of the Los Angeles Times, The Associated Press, The Copley Press, Copley News Service, CNN, CBS and NBC.

Simpson, 47, has pleaded innocent to murdering Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman. Jury selection is to begin Sept. 19.

On Tuesday, Simpson's lawyers lost their bid to examine a police detective's Marine Corps records. Ito ruled that the records had no bearing on defense suggestions that Detective Mark Fuhrman is a racist and a liar.

"The court reviewed the military file and found no reports or other information relevant to the issues in this case," Ito wrote.

Fuhrman is a key witness against Simpson. He testified at the preliminary hearing that he found a bloody glove outside Simpson's mansion the

morning after Simpson's ex-wife and her friend were killed, and that the glove appeared to match one found near the bodies.

Anonymous defense sources have said they are considering a trial strategy portraying Fuhrman, who is white, as a racist who could have planted evidence to incriminate Simpson, who is black.

According to documents from Fuhrman's 1983 lawsuit seeking a police disability pension from the city, he told a psychiatrist that he left the Marines in 1975 and joined the police force because he "got tired of having a bunch of Mexicans and niggers that should be in prison telling me they weren't going to do something."

Ito said he would seal the military file and place it in the court record so it would be available only for appellate review. The judge did not rule on the defense's request to review Fuhrman's police records.

Fuhrman has been placed on indefinite vacation leave, said police Cmdr. David Gascon.

Other developments:  
- Lawyer Brent Merritt told KCAL-TV he represented a man who was at the crime scene on June 12, the night of the slayings. "All I can do is present my witness, my client, to them and they can either use his testimony or not use his testimony," Merritt said. He would not elaborate.

- The judge was considering whether to release to prosecutors the most tantalizing piece of defense evidence, a mysterious sealed envelope containing unspecified items. He has said it may be time to open the envelope, but the disclosure could be to prosecutors alone.

# Bubba's luck changes but he says he won't

AUSTIN (AP) - Edgar J. "Bubba" Groce's luck may have changed, but he doesn't intend to. Groce, who twice lost bids for Congress, is one of three winners splitting Saturday's \$58.4 million lotto jackpot.

He and his wife, Bettie, haven't yet decided what they'll do with the winnings.

But they both plan to continue working. He's the owner of a greenhouse manufacturing business, and she's business manager for the Cleveland school district in Southeast Texas.

"When you quit work, you quit seeing people, and I love people. I want to be out there. I want to be alive," Groce said. "Everybody that I know that's quit work sort of dwindled away."

Mrs. Groce added, "We're still going to stay with our same lifestyle."

U.S. Rep. Charles Wilson, whose seat Groce sought, said he wouldn't mind trading places with him.

"I wish he had won the election and I'd won the lottery," Wilson, D-Lufkin, said Tuesday, the same day Groce got a check representing the first installment of his winnings.

Garland engineer Ralph Townsend claimed his share Monday. A Laredo man called to say he had the third winning ticket and was on his way to Austin to stake his claim, said lottery spokesman Steve Levine.

Groce was presented with an oversize check showing his total

winnings at an Austin news conference.

His first installment was \$974,819.94 - but he got \$701,870.36 after taxes. Like the other winners, Groce will get installments of \$700,560 after taxes every Aug. 15 for the next 19 years.

Asked whether he wishes he could trade his windfall for the congressional seat, Groce didn't have to think too long.

"No sir. I'd like both," Groce said. "I'd just rather keep my money and let the people decide whether they're going to put me in Congress."

Groce got 13.2 percent of the Democratic primary vote when he ran against Wilson in 1992, and 32.3 percent this year, according to figures from the state Democratic Party.

He said he hasn't ruled out running again. But he doesn't plan to use his lotto winnings to bankroll another try.

"I don't think that spending my own money would be the answer to it. I mean, (unsuccessful presidential candidate) Ross Perot spent how many million dollars of his?" Groce said.

Groce said he wanted to be elected to Congress "to cut out some of the mismanagement and save us a lot of tax dollars and everything. We can do more with less."

Wilson, in a telephone interview, said, "I'd trade places." "I think Bubba's a super good guy. I wish him well," Wilson said. "I'm happy for him."

# Evidence indicates economy is slowing

WASHINGTON (AP) - Orders to U.S. factories fell 2.3 percent in July and a broader gauge of future activity stood still after months of modest improvement, the government said today, furnishing new evidence of a slowing economy.

The drop in factory orders was the first in five months and the biggest in 2-1/2 years, the Commerce Department said. The other report, the index of Leading Economic Indicators, was unchanged in July after rising 0.2 percent in June and 0.1 percent in May.

The leading indicators performance is slightly stronger than anticipated by analysts, who said in advance of the report they expected a small decline consistent with other evidence that economic expansion is continuing, but at a reduced pace.

"It's pretty much what everyone predicted," said Kermit Baker of Cahners Economics, a Newton, Mass., forecasting service. "I think we're going to see flat numbers for the rest of the year. It's enough to keep the Federal Reserve off our backs but not enough to get business-ess too excited."

The gauge remains at 101.5, its all-time high since the government initiated the measurement in 1948. It has now risen in 10 of the last 12 months.

Three of the 11 components of the index advanced, led by higher raw material prices. Also, building permits were up and there were fewer weekly initial claims for unemployment insurance.

Six of the components retreated. They were fewer factory orders for consumer goods, a decline in consumer expectations, faster business delivery times that usually are a sign of decreasing orders, a shorter average work week, fewer unfilled orders for durable goods and lower stock prices.

The Commerce Department said the money supply increased slightly and business orders for plant and equipment decreased slightly, but their contributions to the index canceled each other out.

Today's report appears to support other recent data that suggest the economy is expanding at a moderate pace. Analysts said if the trend holds, it could forestall for months any further increases in interest rates by the Federal Reserve.

"The expansion has surely lost a lot of steam," said economist Robert Dederick of the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago. "The question is, is it transitory or fundamental. I think it's a little of both."

The Fed last boosted interest rates on Aug. 16, and analysts said they expect the central bank to remain on the sidelines until November or later to judge the impact of tighter credit.

The Chamber of Commerce said its survey of more than 8,000 business leaders showed a sharp drop in business confidence in August. Its index, which measures optimism on the economy, sales and employment prospects over the next six months, dropped 6.5 points to 49.9.

Nearly 70 percent of those questioned said the five interest rate increases by the Federal Reserve since February have hurt business.

The Index of Leading Economic Indicators is aimed at predicting activity six to nine months down the road. Three straight moves by the index in the same direction are considered a good gauge of where the economy is headed.

The Commerce Department said last week that in the second quarter the economy expanded at a 3.8 percent annual rate. Most analysts expect the rate to slow to 2.5 percent or less this quarter, which ends Sept. 30.

Despite all the good news, the Federal Reserve has said there are disturbing signs of possible future inflation, particularly higher commodity prices and growing employment that may mean the economy is nearing capacity.

Something special must have happened to the Hereford High School football team this past off-season.

The team's worked hard from the start of spring practice through pre-season practice. Now, the captains for 1994 aren't shy about setting high goals for the season, which starts with Tascosa Thursday in Amarillo.

"Undefeated," said quarterback Michael Brown. "State championship," said offensive guard Josh Gamboa.

The other Hereford captains are linebacker Jacob Lopez, offensive lineman Joe De La Cruz, receiver Marc Haney and defensive lineman Mark Blea. They lead the Herd into Dick Bivins Stadium Thursday for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

"Undefeated" and "state championship" are lofty goals, but Brown, who started at safety for last year's 4-6 Whitefaces, justifies them.

"If you shoot for the moon, you may not hit the moon, but you'll still hit high," he said. "You might as well go for the best. If you go for district, that's all you'll settle for."

One reason for the optimism is a great turnout during the off-season. "We put too much into the off-season not to aim high," De La Cruz said.

"We had a good work ethic, and had good attendance," Gamboa said. "It shows that (the players) don't mind getting after it. In the past, we had worse attendance. People would find it easy to just go home than to

come up here and lift weights and run."

"Everybody stayed out here and took the extra hour or two hours it took to get it done," Brown said.

They were motivated by the Herd's 4-6 record; the first losing record since 1978.

"Our theme for the off-season was 'Bring it Back,'" Gamboa said. "We want to bring pride and tradition back to Hereford football. When you mention Hereford to people from out of town, they automatically think about football."

A good start to "Bring it Back" would be to beat a Tascosa team that beat Hereford 21-20 last year, but had to forfeit the win for using an ineligible player.

Tascosa may be vulnerable, since the Rebels got a new coach in Doug McCutchen and return only four starters on each side of the ball. Hereford coach Danny Haney said that at least Tascosa's defense is ready for the opener.

"Watching Tascosa in the scrimmage with Pampa, they've got

## Rumors fly about strike talks

**NEW YORK (AP)** - With both sides seemingly entrenched, there were a few distant rumblings in the stalled baseball talks.

The sides were to meet separately with mediators today, the 20th day of the strike. There has been no movement at the bargaining table for months, but away from the table there were rumors Tuesday night of talk.

Management has talked directly with the union outside the formal bargaining process but the contact did not lead to any progress, a source speaking on the condition he not be identified told The Associated Press.

Colorado Rockies chairman Jerry McMorris and Toronto Blue Jays president Paul Beeston spoke with the union in recent days, the source said. Eugene Orza, the union's No. 2 official, said the source was inaccurate.

ESPN reported that people representing the sides talked secretly by telephone in recent days. Richard Ravitch, the owners' negotiator, called the report "non-sense."

Meanwhile, owners canceled a quarterly meeting set for next week and the sides reached one small

agreement - to postpone the Aug. 31 deadline for postseason rosters. The deadline for the rosters will be set within 48 hours of any settlement.

Boston Red Sox chief executive officer John Harrington said he hoped the separate meetings today would spark a resumption of the negotiations that broke off last Thursday.

"Hopefully, that will lead to a joint meeting later in the week," he said.

Harrington and Philadelphia Phillies executive vice president David Montgomery will join Ravitch and management lawyers when they meet with the mediators. Players' association officials will meet with the mediators later in the day.

But owners won't be meeting in Detroit, as had been scheduled for Sept. 7-9.

"As long as the players are on strike, the clubs will devote all their efforts to resolving the dispute," acting commissioner Bud Selig said. "Many owners are involved in the negotiations and everybody agrees it would serve no useful purpose to spend a couple of days in meetings and divert attention from the compelling task at hand."

Ravitch denied the meeting was

called off in an effort to deny a forum to owners who dissent from management's bargaining position.

"In the conference call today, there was not one owner who suggested that meeting go forward," Ravitch said. "No one objected, so it can't be a move to stifle dissent."

Selig, in a telephone interview after a conference call with about 18 clubs, said there was no desire to go ahead with the meeting but that it would be held in Detroit before the end of the year.

"This was one time I was willing to let the minority rule if a fair number of clubs wanted a meeting," he said. "There was just frankly no desire."

Baltimore Orioles owner Peter Angelos, the most outspoken opponent of management's demand for a salary cap, declined comment but lamented the lack of bargaining. "There nothing going on at all," he said.

Owners have not met since June 9 in Cincinnati. They also canceled meetings during the early part of the 1981 strike and during the middle of the 1990 lockout.

"It sounds like somebody doesn't want to have a meeting," union head Donald Fehr said.

## Rangers: baseball probably over

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Tom Schieffer, president of the Texas Rangers, says it appears unlikely that major league baseball will resume this season.

Kevin Brown, the club's player representative, said if the owners continue to insist on imposing a salary cap, Schieffer will be proved correct.

The Major League Players Association went on strike Aug. 12 because of the owners' threat to implement a salary cap. Until that threat is removed, Brown said Tuesday, there will be no baseball.

"We'll carry it right on into next season and see if they get serious about this. There are no ifs, ands or

butts about it. Salary cap is not an option this year, next year or in 1996," Brown said.

"It's pretty obvious when players in both sports (the NBA and NFL) that have a salary cap tell us how bad it is and leading economists tell us how bad it is."

Brown said the players' union has made a number of proposals the owners refuse to consider unless the players consider a salary cap.

Negotiating sessions have not resumed since breaking off last week. Federal mediators are expected to meet with both sides separately today.

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# Cowboys' opener revives rivalry

PITTSBURGH (AP) - It's been ignored for years, packed away like a long-forgotten medal or trophy. Now, the Dallas Cowboys and Pittsburgh Steelers will wipe away the dust and polish off one of the NFL's best rivalries.

Cowboys vs. Steelers, four-time Super Bowl champion vs. four-time Super Bowl champion. It's Sunday, and neither team can wait.

"You always want to play against the best," the Steelers' Greg Lloyd said. "They're the best, and we want to be the best."

Right now, the Cowboys clearly are the NFL's best team, one dead-set on becoming the first to win three consecutive Super Bowls. The coach, Barry Switzer, is new, but the

pedal-to-the-metal, full-tilt-boogie mentality isn't.

"We have to accept the challenge and play in a frenzy," Switzer said.

Dallas vs. Pittsburgh once was a game so big and so special they played it not once but twice in Super Bowls. Those players have retired, yet Hall of Famer Tony Dorsett will roam the Cowboys sideline as he returns to be honored by alma mater Pitt.

It's the biggest season opener in Pittsburgh in years, and even usually conservative, play-'em-one-game-a-time Steelers coach Bill Cowher admittedly is caught up in the hype and excitement. His Steelers are, too.

"I can't wait for this game," All-Pro cornerback Rod Woodson said. "I've been waiting all year for this game."

Cowher echoed those words Tuesday, quickly dispelling the myths that this is just another game, just one-sixteenth of a season, just another Sunday.

"You can never really eliminate the (Cowboys-Steelers) rivalry," said Cowher, a Pittsburgh high school linebacker in the 1970s. "It's a big challenge that the defending Super Bowl champions are coming into our place. The fact is it is a big game, and I'm looking forward to it."

"The first game is always special. It's not just another game. It's a special opener."

Cowher realizes this is a game that could set the tone for an entire season. The Steelers bolted to a 3-0 start in his rookie season in 1992, and they finished 11-5. Last year, they started 0-2 and labored to a 9-7 finish.

"You can't control the talk, so you tell your players that our job is to go out and perform ... and respect all that goes with success," Cowher said.

"You've got to take a deep breath and get ready to jump back on the roller coaster again. They're a championship team and we want to be a championship team."

To be just that, Cowher felt he had to upgrade his wide receivers. Dissatisfied with Jeff Graham, Ernie Mills and Dwight Stone, the Steelers spent the off-season pursuing free agent Alvin Harper, who finally re-signed with Dallas. The Steelers promptly made Colorado receiver Charles Johnson their first-round draft pick.

Johnson all but became a starter in his first day in camp, making three tough catches in traffic only a few hours after stepping off a plane. Second-year receiver Andre Hastings, no longer a confused, pass-dropping rookie who left college football a year early, seized the other starting job.

"We did upgrade the position," Cowher said. "Everybody has stepped it up."

The Steelers will find out if they can do exactly against football's best team.

"They have the title," Lloyd said. "And we want it."

# Steelers' game plan is no secret

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Pittsburgh Steelers might as well fax their game plan to the Dallas Cowboys offices.

The Cowboys believe the Steelers will try to grind them down on Sunday in their NFL opener.

"It will be a north-south hammer offense," rookie coach Barry Switzer said. "It will be (middle linebacker) Robert Jones' true test, and we'll see if he can handle it," Switzer said. "We have to accept the challenge and play in a frenzy."

The Cowboys lost defensive tackle Tony Casillas to free agency in the off-season. Casillas refused to report to Kansas City and gave his bonus back, but he's unlikely to surface with Dallas because of the salary cap.

It will be Tony Tolbert and Charles Haley at the ends and Leon Lett and Russell Maryland at the tackles against the Steelers at 3 p.m. Sunday in Three Rivers Stadium. Chad

Hennings will be the first sub off the bench.

The starting linebackers will be Jones, Dixon Edwards and Godfrey Myles. Ken Norton, the starting middle linebacker on the Super Bowl champions, took the free agent road to San Francisco.

"The Steelers can bring it with Barry Foster and that Bam Morris, who also is very impressive," Switzer said. "I wish I had more depth at tackle like the team did last year, but we don't have that luxury."

Switzer said he hopes his offense can keep his defense off the field.

"Every coach wants to dominate the clock," Switzer said. "I like seeing the offense in charge, making those 70 and 80 yard drives. I want to look around and see Russell Maryland and Charles Haley and all those guys on the sidelines with me."

Switzer said he believes Jones, who has been inconsistent in the past, is ready to step it up a notch.

"I believe he can be a good

linebacker," Switzer said. "He has matured. He doesn't have to be a Dick Butkus out there. He's got some other great players around him."

Switzer attended the Cowboys' annual kickoff luncheon Tuesday with his players and owner Jerry Jones.

"We know the business at hand," Switzer said. "One more in '94. We want to do something hundreds of thousands of players have never had the chance to do and that's win a third consecutive Super Bowl. The next five months, we are going to make a commitment to winning and bringing about a lifetime of memories."

Owner Jones said his nerves are getting jumpy thinking about the first game of the regular season.

"I'm as nervous as I've ever been, and that includes all the Super Bowls," Jones said. "We want to get off to a good start. And we know Pittsburgh is going to run right at us. The good news is, we are healthy."

# Huskers move up to No. 2

Many teams don't like to play in the Kickoff Classic because it makes the season too long. For Nebraska, though, playing in this year's game turned out to be a good decision.

Last year, the Cornhuskers didn't climb to No. 2 in The Associated Press college football poll until they had won 10 games. This year, with a boost from the Kickoff Classic, they reached that level after one victory.

Nebraska jumped from No. 4 to No. 2 after beating West Virginia 31-0 Sunday in the opening game of the season. The Cornhuskers trail top-ranked Florida by only seven points in the nationwide media poll.

"In some ways, No. 2 right now is better than No. 1 because No. 1 seems to draw a certain amount of attention from the media," Nebraska coach Tom Osborne said. "It just seems to wear on you and there are more distractions."

Osborne has no second thoughts about going to the Kickoff Classic, even though it means the Cornhuskers will end up playing 13 games this

season if they go to a bowl.

"I think it makes for a longer year, but if you come out of it without any injuries I don't think it's a big problem, and that is what we were fortunate enough to do," he said.

Nebraska got nine more first-place votes than Florida (23-14), but the Gators finished with seven more points (1,456-1,449). Teams get anywhere from 25 points for a first-place vote to one point for a 25th-place vote.

Florida opens its season Saturday against New Mexico State.

Notre Dame, which trailed Florida by only two points in the preseason poll, fell one notch to No. 3. The Fighting Irish, who play Northwestern on Saturday, got 12 first-place votes and 1,417 points.

Florida State, the defending national champion, dropped from No. 3 to No. 4. The Seminoles, who open this weekend against Virginia, received eight first-place votes and 1,352 points.

The rest of the Top 10 stayed the

same. Michigan is No. 5, followed by Miami, Arizona, Colorado, Penn State and Wisconsin.

Rounding out the Top 25 are Alabama, Auburn, Tennessee, UCLA, Texas A&M, Oklahoma, Southern Cal, North Carolina, Texas, Ohio State, Virginia Tech, Illinois, Washington, Clemson and Stanford.

Arizona received two first-place votes and Michigan, Miami and Alabama each got one.

Ohio State remained No. 20 after defeating Fresno State 34-10 Monday in the Pigskin Classic. The Pigskin and Kickoff Classics were the only games played during the opening week.

West Virginia, No. 24 in the preseason, dropped out of the Top 25 after being shut out for the first time since 1986.

Stanford, which opens against Northwestern on Sept. 10, moved into the rankings at No. 25. The Cardinal, 4-7 last season, has 19 starters back, including record-setting quarterback Steve Stenstrom.

a very good defense, and they're still trying to put together their offense, with that (University of) Houston veer," Haney said.

The veer is something brought in by McCutchen, who came to Amarillo from Duncanville. He changed the offense but will keep the Rebels' defense in the 5-2 alignment.

Gonzales suffered a concussion in a car accident Wednesday, but Haney said he'll probably be back for the season's second game: next Thursday in Amarillo against Palo Duro.

Hereford leads the series with Tascosa 10-2, including Tascosa's forfeit last year. Hereford's last win on the field in the series came in 1991, when the Herd won the season-opener 20-7 in Hereford.

BOSTON (AP) - A statue of a great baseball pitcher on a college campus? That's what they have on the grounds of Northeastern University.

The statue is of Cy Young, who won 511 major league games, the most for any pitcher.

It commemorates the first World Series game, which was played in 1903 between Boston and Pittsburgh. It was played at the Huntington Avenue Baseball Grounds, the current site of Northeastern.

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# Courier rediscovers fire, whips Krickstein

NEW YORK (AP) - Now that Jim Courier has rediscovered the fire in his game, hobbling Pete Sampras will begin defense of his U.S. Open title.

In mid-August, Courier, appearing tired and bored, announced he was leaving tennis indefinitely.

"There is a problem inside, and I'm not really sure what it is," Courier said at the time. "And the only way to figure it out is to just take a step away and come back when I'm ready."

Against Aaron Krickstein on Tuesday night at the National Tennis Center, Courier was ready.

"I didn't have the fire in Indianapolis. That's what I went searching for," Courier said after defeating Krickstein 6-3, 6-4, 6-4 in a 2-hour, 3-minute match. "It's there. It was

just hiding. That was one thing I was looking for, win or lose."

Sampras, who has played only Davis Cup matches since winning his second consecutive Wimbledon title in July, plays his opening-round match against Kevin Ullyett of South Africa today, following a match between 14th-seeded Yevgeny Kafelnikov of Russia and Jacco Eltingh of the Netherlands on center court.

Also, eighth-seeded Andrei Medvedev of Ukraine will face Austria's Gilbert Schaller in a first-round match. All of the other seeds play second-round matches today.

In the women's draw, it was second-seeded Arantxa Sanchez Vicario against Nathalie Tauziat of France, No. 8 Gabriela Sabatini against Nicole Arendt, No. 9 Mary

Joe Fernandez against Patty Fendick, No. 14 Anke Huber against Leila Meskhi of Georgia and No. 16 Amy Frazier against Natalia Medvedeva, Medvedev's sister.

Monday's opening-day of the year's final Grand Slam tournament saw former champion Boris Becker and second-seeded Goran Ivanisevic bounced from the field. On Tuesday, only one seeded player, No. 13 Lori McNeil, was beaten, falling to Israel's Anna Smashnova 6-2, 6-4.

The winners included top-seeded and defending women's champion Steffi Graf, No. 5 Kimiko Date, No. 6 Lindsay Davenport, No. 7 Jana Novotna, Sabatini, No. 10 Jana Garrison Jackson, No. 11 Amanda Coetzer, Huber and No. 15 Magdalena Maleeva.

Advancing to the second round in the men's draw were No. 4 Michael

Stich, No. 5 Stefan Edberg, No. 9 Todd Martin and No. 15 Marc Rosset.

In beating Krickstein, Courier appeared in control if not on top of his game. His groundstrokes were heavy, his court coverage more than adequate and his forehand booming.

Krickstein, who has played some of his best tennis in the Open, almost matched Courier stroke for stroke. But there was always one ball too many for Krickstein to stay even.

"That was a perfect first-round match for me," Courier said. "It's a match I could have lost. Aaron's got a great five-set record, so I knew I'd have to fight all the way.

"I was happy when I saw the draw. This was the type of match I needed so I could see where I am."

Courier had more unforced errors (28) than Krickstein (21), but also had more winners (51-21).

"If it wasn't a Grand Slam, I might have taken this week off," Courier said. "But the reason I play the game is to play in the big tournaments. If I can play here and if I'm hungry enough and if I'm healthy, I want to be here.

"I haven't won this tournament yet. I'd like to win it on my mantle one of these days."

## Robinson likes new Spurs' coach

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - David Robinson likes what he hears from new San Antonio Spurs head coach Bob Hill, who wants to speed up the Spurs offense and beef up the defense.

"I've got a good feeling," Robinson said. "I'm a defensive person. I like to generate things off of defense."

But you can't blame Robinson for sounding a bit cautious, too. After all, as he enters his sixth year in the league, Robinson will be playing with several newly acquired players and for his fifth coach.

It's a scenario the All-Star center has seen before.

Robinson met with Hill, who was

hired Monday, during one of Hill's interview trips to San Antonio. Robinson said he had known little about Hill.

"I was impressed," Robinson said. "He's an intelligent basketball guy with a lot of experience."

Hill coached the New York Knicks the 1986-87 season and the Indiana Pacers from 1990-93. His record as an NBA head coach is 133-154.

"This is the best opportunity I have had in my career and my life," Hill said.

But Robinson warned the new coach has a tough road ahead.

"Bob is going to have to fit it. It's not an easy job," Robinson said. "He's got to get to know the guys. You've got to get a feel for attitudes, mentalities. It takes a while to get to

know guys on that level."

Robinson didn't mention any player by name, but one of the remaining Spurs is Dennis Rodman, the fiery forward and league-leading rebounder whose behavior last season at times led to ejections and suspensions.

Like Robinson, Rodman has remained silent during most of the team's off-season tumult. Rodman did speak out in May, saying he wanted John Lucas to continue as coach. Lucas resigned June 9 and signed on with Philadelphia as head coach and general manager.

Hill said Spurs vice president Gregg Popovich will deal with Rodman if his behavior again becomes a problem.

## Start with chili peppers to make rolled enchiladas from scratch

Throughout the Southwest, there are numerous versions of red enchiladas: stacked or rolled, with red chili sauce or chili gravy, with or without meat, baked or served from the skillet.

The following recipe from "Southwest the Beautiful Cookbook" by Barbara Pool Fenzl (Collins Publishers) calls for filling the tortillas with red chili sauce, cheese and onions, then rolling them into cylinders and baking them until the cheese melts.

Vegetable Tamales, also featured in "Southwest the Beautiful," can be served as an appetizer or side dish. They are the inspiration of John Sedlar, author of "Modern Southwest Cuisine."

**Red Enchiladas**  
Vegetable oil for frying  
12 corn tortillas (6 inches in diameter)  
2 cups Red Chili Sauce (recipe below)  
2 cups grated Cheddar cheese  
1 cup finely chopped onions  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Oil a 9- by 12-inch casserole dish.  
Pour oil into a skillet to a depth of

1/2 in. Heat over medium-high heat to 375 degrees F or until a bread cube browns in 60 seconds. Dip the tortillas, one at a time, in the hot oil, about 5 seconds per side; drain on paper towels.

Place about 1 cup of the red chili sauce in a shallow dish. Dip each tortilla into the sauce. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the Cheddar cheese, 1 tablespoon of the chopped onion and 1 tablespoon of the remaining sauce on each coated tortilla. Roll up and place seam side down in the prepared dish. Repeat with the remaining tortillas. Cover with the remaining sauce, onions and cheese; bake in a 350-degree F oven for 30 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 12 servings.

**Red Chili Sauce**  
10 whole dried New Mexico chilies

1 tablespoon olive oil  
1 cup finely chopped onions  
2 garlic cloves, minced  
About 2 cups chicken stock  
2 tablespoons lard or vegetable oil  
Salt to taste  
Preheat oven to 250 degrees F. Place the chilies in a heavy skillet and roast them dry in the 250-degree F oven for 3 to 4 minutes, being careful not to let them burn.

Fill a pot just large enough to hold the chilies with water; bring the water to a boil and remove the pot from heat. Add the roasted chilies to the hot water and, using a weight such as a pot lid, keep them submerged until they are soft, about 20 or 30 minutes. Remove the chilies from the water; stem, seed and tear them into strips.

Heat the 1 tablespoon olive oil in a medium skillet over low heat; add the chopped onion, saute until browned, about 5 minutes.

Put the chili strips, sauteed onion, garlic and 1 cup of the chicken stock into a food processor or a blender; puree until smooth; strain.

Heat the 2 tablespoons lard or vegetable oil in a heavy skillet over medium heat. Add the chili mixture to the hot oil and cook, stirring, about 5 minutes. Add the remaining chicken stock until the sauce is the desired consistency. Add salt to taste. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use. Keeps two to three days refrigerated. Makes about 2 cups.

**Vegetable Tamales**  
For the masa:  
2 cups masa harina  
1-1/4 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/3 cup lard, vegetable shortening (vegetable lard) or softened butter  
1 cup lukewarm water

**For the filling:**  
2 cups mixed, diced zucchini, potato and yellow squash  
1 tablespoon vegetable oil  
1/4 cup jalapeno chilies, diced and roasted  
1 teaspoon chili powder  
Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste  
2 tablespoons minced fresh epazote

1 package dried corn husks (about 20 husks), soaked in warm water for 30 minutes

**For the sauce:**  
Juice of 10 carrots (about 2 cups)  
1/2 cup olive oil  
Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

**For garnish:**  
Corn husks, cooked baby vegetables and fresh cilantro (coriander)

To make the masa: In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat together the masa harina, baking powder and salt. Gradually add about one-fourth of the masa mixture into the lard, shortening or butter, then add 2 tablespoons of the water. Continue adding the masa mixture alternately with the water until they are fully blended and the mixture is smooth and light. Cover and chill until ready to use.

To make the filling: Blanch the vegetables in boiling water for 3 to 5 minutes; drain. In a large skillet, heat the oil over medium heat and add the vegetables and chilies. Add the chili powder, salt, pepper and epazote. Cook, stirring, for about 5 minutes, or until the vegetables are tender.

Drain the soaked corn husks. Spread 1/4 cup masa over half the surface of each husk, beginning at the large end. Put 2 tablespoons vegetable filling in the center of the husk and fold the sides of the husk toward the center, one side at a time. Fold the bottom of the husk up and the top down, tying with a strip of soaked corn husk. Cook the tamales until firm and heated through, about 15 to 20 minutes.

To make the sauce, in a large saucepan over high heat, cook the carrot juice to reduce it to about 2 cups. Remove from heat and transfer to a blender. Blend the reduced juice with the olive oil; add salt and pepper.

Place two clean, unsoaked corn husks in the center of each of 10 plates. Place an unwrapped tamale on the top of the corn husks. Spoon 2 tablespoons sauce over each tamale. Garnish with baby vegetables and cilantro. Makes 10 servings.

Let me say right here that I've never eaten in Davis's Grocery and Gas before, but I stopped in around noon for a Coke and inquired about bathrooms.

"You can use ours," the nice lady at the check-out counter said, giving me instructions to go through a door with a pink sign, turn right and turn right again.

See? That's the difference between big cities and small towns. You think they'd treat you that way in Houston? But back to the story.

On the way to the restroom, I passed by the meat counter where Tim Bosworth and Butch were slicing up beef and sausage for sandwiches and plates.

So I bought one. A sliced barbecue sausage sandwich. Large. With regular - not jalapeno - sauce. \$3.

"To go," I explained.

I need to add right here that you can eat in the store, if you like.

Though it's a regular supermarket-style grocery store, Butch's has a picnic table in front of the check-out counter where folks can sit and eat and sip coffee and visit.

You probably can't get that in Houston, either.

By the time Tim sacked up my sandwich, the above-mentioned thunderstorm was dumping dogs and cats all over town.

"Better stay here and eat with us," Butch said.

I should have listened to Butch.

After all, everyone from Willie Nelson to the Harlem Globetrotters have stopped in to eat Butch's

barbecue. He said there are even four Texas Tech professors who drive down from Lubbock every couple of months to order barbecue.

Butch and his wife, Carolyn (who teaches fourth grade in Robert Lee), have worked hard to create a laid-back atmosphere in the store.

It's a pleasant place. But I have a real problem eating sliced barbecue sausage sandwiches in public: the sausage slices tend to fall out and onto my lap.

And I figured I'd be much better off eating in the car on the drive back to Angelo. After all, I was in the newspaper's cop car, the one our hard-boiled police reporters use for covering crime. If I slopped barbecue sauce over the seat covers, I reasoned, the cop reporters would figure it was only blood and shrug it off.

So I bid farewell to the grocery store crew - Tim, Butch, Garland Davis, Angela Minjarez and Christi Smith - and sloshed off into the rain, clutching my sandwich sack.

And, friends, when I say rain, I mean it was coming down in sheets. And blankets. And down-filled comforters.

Then the hail started.

Rain! Hail! Thunder! Zero visibility!

And I was driving through a white cloud down what I hoped was the highway to Angelo, munching my sliced barbecue sausage sandwich, wondering how things could possibly get any worse when the worst happened. The worst! The very worst.

That's right. The sausage in my sliced barbecue sausage sandwich from Davis Grocery and Gas squirted out of my sandwich, slid down the front of my shirt and landed in the floorboard.

You ever see the floorboard of a car that's driven by men who cover crime for a living?

My sliced barbecue sausage sank without a trace.

And because I was fishing around for the sandwich in the middle of the worst hail-and-rainstorm I've experienced in 10 years, I almost drove right off the right side of the road and into history.

Later, I called Butch to tell him of my near-brush with disaster.

"That's terrible!" he said.

"Come back, and we'll give you another sandwich."

## Lawyers ask limited use of Cisneros' taped calls

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Attorneys have asked for restricted distribution of 40 hours of taped telephone calls between U.S. Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros and his former mistress.

Attorneys for Linda Medlar filed a protective-order motion Tuesday claiming the tapes represent monetary potential for Ms. Medlar, who they say has no income.

Furthermore, according to the motion, "indiscriminate dissemination of either the transcripts or the tapes themselves might well expose innocent and private third parties to embarrassment or publication of private information."

Ms. Medlar sued Cisneros in July, alleging the former San Antonio mayor committed fraud and breach of contract by reneging on a verbal agreement to pay her \$4,000 a month until her teen-ager daughter graduated from college. The Lubbock woman claims Cisneros owes her money for destroying her reputation, career and marriage by discussing their romantic relationship with the media.

Cisneros has denied that a contract existed; he has said he gave her some money out of compassion - not legal obligation. A filing by Cisneros asked that the lawsuit be dismissed.

Tuesday's motion said Ms. Medlar taped the telephone conversations to "assure accuracy" of their agreement.

Attorney Bruce Magness said the conversations occurred from early 1990 until December 1993 - about the time his client claims she received her last payment from Cisneros.

Magness said the tapes are stored in a bank vault.

The defense may transcribe the tapes under supervision of Ms. Medlar's representatives, the motion said.

"We want to work something out with them ... so that they're (the tapes) not just published," Magness said.

Cisneros' attorney, Seagal Wheatley of San Antonio, was not at his office. His home telephone number is unlisted.

A hearing is set for Sept. 9.

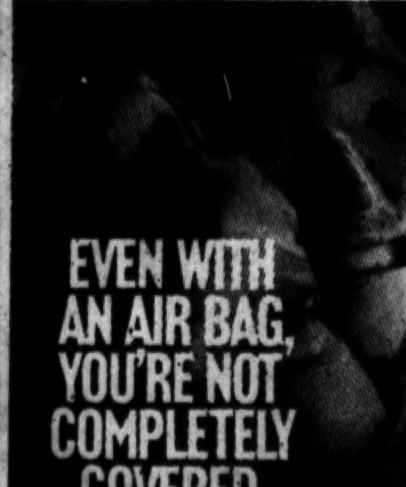

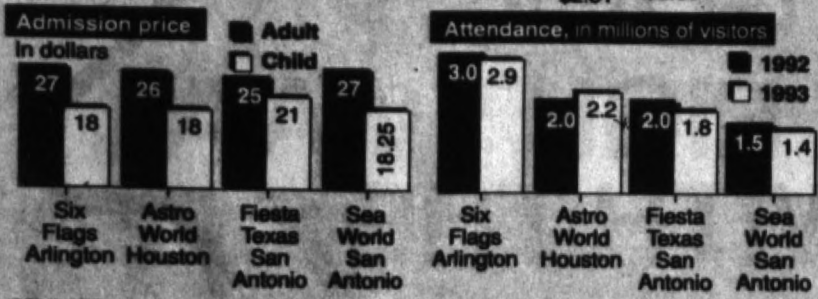

**AUSTIN**—Proponents of casino gambling got a setback last week when Texas Attorney General Dan Morales ruled that a constitutional amendment is needed to legalize such activity.

For casino gambling to become legal, a two-thirds majority vote of the state Legislature would be required to put the issue before voters, who would have the final say in whether to amend the state constitution.

Had Morales ruled that a constitutional amendment was not necessary, a simple majority vote of the Legislature and the governor's signature would have legalized casino gambling.

Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said Morales' decision was reasonable and that it would save time if casino gambling is addressed in the next legislative session.

**100 House Votes Needed**  
Lloyd Criss of La Marque, who is chairman of the Texas Riverboat Association and a former state representative, noted that Morales' ruling would make it harder to legalize casino gambling because 100 votes would be needed in the House for a clear (two-thirds) majority, rather than 76 votes for a simple majority, had the attorney general decided a constitutional amendment vote was unnecessary.

"Absolutely it makes our job more difficult...I'm really surprised the attorney general would rule in this manner," Criss told the *Austin American-Statesman*.

Tom Pauken, chairman of the Texas Republican Party, said he feels voters don't want casino gambling, and casino gambling interests will have a hard time getting even a simple majority in the House when it comes to a vote. Morales' Republican opponent in the Nov. 8 election, state District Judge Don Wittig of Houston, criticized the incumbent for accepting \$75,000 in donations from Rob "Mattress Mac" McIngvale of Houston, who had expressed interest in opening a casino gambling establishment.

But Morales said the money was a show of support for other interests as well, such as his anti-crime initiatives. Morales, however, returned \$2,500 in donations from a casino gambling political action committee.

**Boot for Unruly Students**  
The 17-member Select Committee of the Texas Education Agency on Aug. 22 adopted a proposal that would allow public school teachers to remove students from the classroom for unruly behavior.

The "zero tolerance" proposal also calls for unruly students to be placed in alternative classes or, if necessary, refer them to juvenile authorities.

According to *The Dallas Morning News*, the select committee, which is chaired by Sen. Bill Ratliff, R-Mount Pleasant, has been working several months on recommendations to revise state education requirements and to revamp the Texas Education Agency. Ratliff also is chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

**Haley Leaves State Senate**  
State Sen. Bill Haley, D-Center, resigned last week to take a position as executive director of the Texas Motor Transportation Association, a group representing more than 1,100 trucking firms in the state.

Haley's departure means the Democratic party must hurry to fill his spot on the Nov. 8 election ballot. In order to be replaced on the ballot, state law requires that Haley first be declared ineligible to serve. That could be accomplished if Haley establishes residence outside his district.

Haley's East Texas district includes the counties of Angelina, Nacogdoches, Cherokee, Hardin, Henderson, Jasper, Newton, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto and Tyler and parts of Smith and Montgomery counties.

A former school teacher, Haley served 11 years in the House and six years in the Senate. He came to be regarded as the father of House Bill 72, the sweeping education reform package that became law in 1984.

**Low-performing Schools**  
About 100 more public schools would have been ranked low-performing if the state had used last year's rating system, according to figures released last week by the Texas Education Agency.

The apparent reason is a law requiring more grades to be tested on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills.

This year's figure was based on scores from tests in grades three through eight and 10. Last year's figure was based just on grades four, eight and 10.

TEA announced earlier that the number of schools ranked low-performing had dropped from 336 last year to 55.

**Other Highlights**  
Texas led the nation in total jobs created during June, according to *Blue Chip Job Growth Update*, published by Arizona State University's Economic Outlook Center. Texas added 223,500 new jobs, up 2.98 percent, which ranked the state ninth in percentage gain since June 1993.

Texas high school seniors average math scores rose two points, to 474, on the Scholastic Assessment Test this year, while verbal scores slipped one point, falling to 412. The national average for math was 479 and the average for verbal was 423.

# Hot summer coming to end with some record harvests

**COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP)** - As hot, summer weather slowly comes to an end in Texas, production is up from last year with record yields for a number of crops, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Jose Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde, said production across the state is up this year for sorghum, rice, peanuts and soybeans. Statewide, cotton is expected to yield around 5.1 million bales, which is about the same as last year's harvest.

"Peanuts have shown a 19 percent increase, sorghum is 7 percent higher than last year, rice has increased by 16 percent, and soybeans are up a record 44 percent," Pena said.

Dr. Mark Black, Extension plant pathologist in Uvalde, said the corn harvest is almost complete for the southwest regions of Texas, and shows record yields for 1994.

"Our yields are up 30 to 35 bushels per acre above the year's long-term average record," Black said.

"Even though the weather has been hot and dry, it seems to finally be in our favor," he said. "A little rain would be nice after all the corn and cotton is in."

Pena said corn yields all across Texas also are expected to rise 20 to 25 percent from last year.

"Many producers are seeing 90 bushels per acre," he said. "So far everything has hit just right."

While some crops in Texas are prospering under ideal harvesting conditions, areas of the South Central Plains aren't faring as well.

Kater Hake, Extension agronomist in Lubbock, said cotton in the Texas Panhandle has dropped in production and yields because of the drought conditions experienced throughout the summer.

"Harvest is expected to be better than we thought it would, but we do need rain," Hake said. "The dryland cotton looks bad, so we hope the irrigated cotton will pull us through."

Hake said this has been an expensive year for cotton production because of all the irrigating farmers have had to do.

"Many had to irrigate their fields to make up for the drought, but irrigating alone can't make all the difference," he said. "If we would just get one week of good rain, everyone could breathe a little easier."

Billy Warrick, Extension agronomist in San Angelo, said producers there have seen more insect problems in their irrigated cotton.

"Insects can sense a healthy plant from a dying plant because of its brown coloration," Warrick said.

"These pests thrive on the tender, green plants which is hurting our cotton," he said. "We have the problem under control, but it's just another detrimental thing producers are experiencing."

Jon Zeitler, meteorologist at the National Weather Service Agricultural Service Center in College Station, said a cool front will move into North Texas Thursday.

"It will bring showers for the Panhandle, Rolling Plains, North Texas and eastern parts of the state," Zeitler said. "The only areas not receiving rain are the Trans-Pecos region and areas around the Edwards Plateau."

Zeitler said the front will be gone Friday, leaving Texas with slightly cooler weather for the weekend.

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by district Extension directors:

**PANHANDLE:** Soil moisture adequate to short. Pastures, ranges need moisture. Harvesting silage, corn, carrots. Irrigated sorghum turning color. Pests damaging cotton. Cattle in good condition.

**SOUTH PLAINS:** Soil moisture short. Hot, dry weather damaging pastures, ranges. Corn maturing; harvest beginning soon. Cotton opening bolls. Sorghum turning color.

**ROLLING PLAINS:** Soil moisture very short to short. Pastures, ranges dry; high potential fire hazard. Cotton in fair to poor condition. Preparing fields for wheat planting. Livestock supplemental feeding continues.

**NORTH TEXAS:** Soil moisture very short to adequate. Pastures, ranges need

rain. Baling hay. Harvesting sweet potatoes, corn, sorghum, soybeans. Cotton setting bolls. Spraying for pecan pests.

**EAST TEXAS:** Soil moisture adequate. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Corn, sorghum, hay harvest near completion. Cotton opening bolls. Livestock in good condition.

**FAR WEST TEXAS:** Soil moisture very short to adequate. Pastures, ranges in fair condition. Hot, dry weather deteriorating cotton. Sorghum needs rain. Peach harvest completed. Apples progressing.

**WEST CENTRAL TEXAS:** Soil moisture very short to short. Pastures, ranges need rain. Cotton throwing off fruit; problem with pests. Peanuts progressing. Preparing fields for fall gardens. Shearing goats.

**CENTRAL TEXAS:** Soil moisture very short to short. Pastures, ranges showing drought-stress. Harvesting cotton, hay, corn, milo. Planting fall gardens. Pests damaging pecans. Livestock supplemental feeding continues.

**SOUTHEAST TEXAS:** Soil moisture adequate. Pastures, ranges benefiting from rain. Harvesting cotton, corn, rice, sorghum. Insect, disease problems damaging pecans. Cattle in fair condition.

**SOUTHWEST TEXAS:** Soil moisture short. Pastures, ranges need rain. Harvesting cotton. Cabbage, cucumbers, sesame, peanuts progressing. Fall sorghum planted. Preparing fields for vegetable planting.

**COASTAL BEND:** Soil moisture short to adequate. Pastures, ranges improving with rain. Cotton harvest near completion. Harvesting rice. Preparing fields for winter pastures. Planting fall gardens.

**SOUTH TEXAS:** Soil moisture short. Cattle being fed. Poor range conditions, lack of moisture necessitating active selling of cattle. Cotton harvest complete; near average yields. Active planting, irrigation of sugar cane.

## Hedgehogs new 'pet of the future'

CLYDE, Texas - Picking up a hedgehog is kinda like grabbing a barrel cactus.

OK, so I may be exaggerating. But not much. The point is that this is not your typical cuddly pet. Nevertheless, more and more people are becoming stuck on the spiny little critters.

"They're something different. They're being called the pet of the '90s, the pet of the future," says hedgehog breeder Clarence Milliorn.

Milliorn and his wife, Sue, are among the largest breeders of hedgehogs in Texas and the nation. They have between 500 and 600 African pygmy hedgehogs at their facility in Clyde.

"The oddity of hedgehogs is what people like," he says. Instead of a hamster or a guinea pig, why not have a hedgehog? They're easy to care for. They can be kept in a cage or empty aquarium. And all you need to feed them is dry cat food.

"They don't make any racket - that's a big plus," he adds. Milliorn, 52, began breeding hedgehogs a year ago after getting out of the ostrich- and emu-raising business. Hedgehogs fit right in with the other small animals he sells, including rabbits and ferrets. He also raises parakeets and worms. Plus, he and his daughter breed small dogs. At one time or another, he raised sheep and mules, too.

Milliorn was born and reared at Eula. He's raised parakeets and rabbits pretty much all his life. "Mom and dad raised parakeets back in 1950. Dad in those days, Clyde was one of the centers of parakeet production in this part of the country."

Older residents used to raise parakeets to supplement their incomes, Milliorn says, adding he can point out several huts around Clyde once used for raising birds.

Of all the animals Milliorn raises, his favorites are the rabbits. He enjoys the competition of showing them, and has raised several state champions. He is a director of the Texas New Zealand Rabbit Club and the California Rabbit Club of Texas. He will be superintendent of the rabbit show for the West Texas Fair and plans to compete in the National Rabbit Show in November in Tulsa.

Milliorn moved to Clyde 10 months ago, and is consolidating his breeding operations here. He sells his hedgehogs to a broker, and most of them wind up going to New York or Florida.

Until now most hedgehogs have been sold as breeding stock, but the pet market is opening up, he says. Once a hedgehog gets used to you, he relaxes his quills, Milliorn says.

You can stroke them. They'll crawl on your arm and shoulder. Pet fads come and go, so Milliorn is always looking for new trends.

This fall, he is considering adding chinchillas. Who knows? The furry rodent might succeed hedgehogs as the next pet of the '90s. You can't tell what people might want for pets. (My son, for example, wants an iguana and my daughter wants a horse.)

"How in the world can you convince a person to have a pot-bellied pig for a pet?" Milliorn adds. "Or, why would anyone want a snake?"

"It's just to have something different." And, that's the point of having a hedgehog for a pet.
