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## Getting ready for concrete

Michael Carrillo, a city employee working on the new city aquatic center, cleans dirt from a trench where reinforcing metal rebar will be placed. Carrillo on Tuesday was working in what will be the new outdoor leisure pool. Pouring of concrete is expected to begin on that pool soon, with concrete on the new main pool about a week behind. At Tuesday's school board meeting, Trustee Joe Flood -- who represents the board in discussions on the pool and new city parks and recreation department -- said the pool has been reconfigured somewhat, changing from a pool that would be 4-1/2 feet to 13 feet deep, to one that is 4 feet to 6 feet deep, with a separate diving well. The pool will still be acceptable for UIL competition. In the next few weeks, concrete for the pools, bath house and pump house will be poured. After lights arrive, the jogging track around the center will be poured.

## Newest gubernatorial ads attack records, campaigns

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican candidate George W. Bush's campaign says Gov. Ann Richards' attack on his business record is "Texas politics at its mudslinging worst." Richards' camp says the Bush record is fair - if not flattering - game.

In a new television commercial, Richards on Tuesday accused Bush of being a bad businessman who was an official of companies that lost more than \$371 million.

Bush immediately released a television commercial in which he says issues "should be the focus of the campaign, not personal attacks."

Richards, who opinion polls indicate is in a near dead heat with Bush, criticized his business background with a television commercial and mailings to news media outlets across the state.

"For most Texans, there is one standard of success in business: profit. There is one standard for failure: loss. That's the bottom line," said Richards spokesman Chuck McDonald.

"This (\$371 million in losses) is Mr. Bush's business record, which he says is his qualification to be

governor. We think the people of Texas will think otherwise," McDonald said.

Bush spokeswoman Karen Hughes said that contrary to the Richards' claims, Bush's record is one of business success.

"It is the height of irresponsibility for the governor of the state of Texas to take to the airwaves and allege that three viable Texas companies which employ Texans and are worth a combined total of \$400 million are somehow failures," she said.

In offering its analysis of Bush's business background, Richards' staff said they didn't include the Texas Rangers baseball team. That's because Bush, the managing general partner, owns only 1.8 percent of the team, McDonald said.

They did examine Securities and Exchange Commission documents, stockholder reports and records of the other companies during the time Bush was affiliated with them, offering this assessment:

Most losses came from the Maryland-based Caterair International, an airline food business, which lost \$285 million in 1990-1994, the Richards campaign charged.

Harken Energy lost \$64.9 million in 1986-1993, Tom Brown Inc. has lost \$18.6 million since 1989, and Arbusto Energy-Bush Exploration lost \$3.1 million in 1979-1984, the campaign said.

Bush served on the Caterair board, merged his own company with Harken and served on its board, sits on the Tom Brown board, and began his career when he incorporated Arbusto-Bush in the 1970s.

Richards distributed an inch-thick report on Bush's business dealings entitled "The Bottom Line." The report said, "George W. Bush cannot claim innocence in the loss of millions of dollars in stockholders' funds for these companies. His titles varied from chief executive officer to president to member of the board of directors."

Ms. Hughes said Tom Brown and Harken are publicly traded companies with a current market value of about \$320 million. The Rangers are worth an estimated \$100 million.

"Ann Richards may not think \$400 million is a lot of money. I do," she said.

Bush was one of a number of Caterair directors, she said, and Richards is off-base to blame Bush for the company's problems.

"The entire airline business is being transformed from serving hot meals to, literally, serving peanuts. The company is restructuring. It's ludicrous to say that one member of one board of directors is responsible," she said.

Ms. Hughes called the Richards attack a gamble taken because the governor has been slipping in the polls.

"The people of Texas will see through this new ad for what it is - a desperate attempt at political survival by an incumbent who sees her numbers dropping," the Bush spokeswoman said.

McDonald denied that. "It is time that Mr. Bush's public record be examined," he said, contending that Bush used "negative" campaigning first.

"We wanted to run our campaign ... on the issues that we believe are important to this state," McDonald said. "Ann Richards' record has been subject to six weeks of paid television distortion. From the first ad that Mr. Bush put up to this present ad they have been negative, distorting reality, distorting her record."

## Trustees turn down language plan, pass purchase of new van

Hereford school trustees on Tuesday turned down a language development program and debated a state law that requires school buses be used on trips instead of vans.

The board's regular monthly meeting lasted more than four hours and included a lengthy debate on a proposal by the administration for a plan that would have all students learning Spanish and English.

Trustees were given initial plans on the "Language Development Program" during the summer and had asked for a statement emphasizing English as a primary language.

Assistant Superintendent Corky Lockmiller presented the board with eight concept statements for a language development program that, had they passed, would have given administrators the go-ahead to begin planning a program and curriculum.

However, the six trustees present split on support for the plan, with a final vote of 3-3 not enough to allow its implementation.

Assistant Superintendent Don Cumpton brought the board two bids for a 15-passenger van, but brought up a state law that disallows use of vans to transport children.

Cumpton said the law has been on the books for some time, but it has not been enforced. The statute says districts may not transport children in any vehicle that is not an officially marked and inspected school bus.

Two fatal accidents involving school children riding on vans leads the Texas Education Agency to believe the legislature will order enforcement of the law next year, Cumpton said.

Cumpton presented trustees with information about small school buses that would transport 15 passengers.

However, cost for those buses equipped with air conditioning ranges from \$31,000 to \$39,000.

The low bid for the 15-passenger van presented Tuesday was \$21,129.50 from Hereford Auto Center.

Cumpton said that he was told that drivers traveling near school buses tend to be more careful, and bus drivers are more careful also.

## Wage hike won't hurt economy

DALLAS (AP) - An increase in the minimum wage of as much as \$1.50 per hour won't hurt the economy, Labor Secretary Robert Reich says.

In an interview with The Dallas Morning News Tuesday, Reich stopped short of saying the Clinton administration was ready to propose such a change.

A consensus of American researchers has concluded that the minimum wage could be increased between 80 cents and \$1.50 per hour without negative effects on the economy, Reich said.

Reich noted that the \$4.25 minimum wage is lower than it was in the 1970s when adjusted for inflation.

"I don't think there's any question that we'll be proposing it at some point," he said. "The question is, when is the best time?"

An increase probably won't be proposed until next year, said Reich who was in Dallas to speak at a National Alliance of Business conference.

He said a major factor that would determine when an increase would be proposed is whether employment growth continues at a healthy pace. In the past year 3 million jobs have been created, although the pace at the beginning of the year, 293,000 jobs per month, has slowed recently because of the effects of higher interest rates.

Not everyone agrees with the researchers who concluded that the minimum wage could be increased without ill effects.

District bus drivers must hold federal commercial drivers licenses and be certified to drive a bus; teachers and administrators may drive vans without special licenses.

The prohibition on the use of vehicles other than school buses would affect several groups, Cumpton said, including small sports teams, agriculture outings and club trips.

Trustee Ron Weishaar suggested the district continue using the vans, but with a disclaimer on the vehicle about their use, in an effort at reducing liability.

However, Trustee Jim Marsh said he didn't think a disclaimer would reduce liability if the law already says vans cannot be used.

Cumpton said the district's insurance carrier insures the vans, but some carriers are refusing to do so.

"I prefer the van myself, but we have to look at the liability," Marsh said.

Weishaar suggested the board look at buying some small buses for routes with few students, then use those for extracurricular activities.

Cumpton agreed that the district could buy a few little buses and still get by. HISD currently runs 25 regular bus routes and four special education routes.

In the end, trustees voted to accept the Hereford Auto Center bid for the

new van.

Cumpton said he will appear before the board in February 1995 to present the 1995-96 bus replacement bids. At that time, he said, he will have information on routes, the numbers of kids who ride them and a recommendation on moving buying small vans.

In other action Tuesday: -- Trustees postponed action on bids for a new roof and heating/air conditioning system at Shirley School.

Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt said that the bids will be opened Oct. 4. A special meeting will be set to consider the bids.

-- Trustees approved a motion designating the three county extension agents as adjunct staff members.

Greenawalt said giving them that status would enable the district to count 4-H members on the Average Daily Attendance while they are on 4-H events.

He said TEA in June approved the move. In the past, the district had allowed excused absences for 4-H members on approved activities, but could not count them toward the ADA.

The state uses the ADA to determine district funding.

### Neighbors harvest grieving family's crop

That's what friends are for. Steve and Jane Meiwes, who farm in the Dodd community in Castro County, were the recipients of the loving concern of friends and neighbors Tuesday as members from 11 families banded together to harvest the Meiwes corn crop.

The Meiwes family has just started harvesting the corn when their daughter, Yvonne, 18, was killed in a head-on collision Saturday. Neighbors knew the food corn was under contract and needed to be harvested, said Donald Templeton, who coordinated the effort along with neighbor Brent Been and Mike Meiwes.

"A lot of times, this is the only way to show how much you really care," said Templeton.

Mrs. Meiwes said the family was in such shock, the crop was not on their minds. "But our neighbors were thinking about us...they've taken it out of our hands."

Mrs. Meiwes said the family was "overwhelmed by how generous and concerned everyone has been...it's a real Christian community."

Fourteen trucks were hauling the corn to Frito-Lay in Hereford Tuesday, and the group hoped to finish the job today. Three combines cut through the 500-plus acres of corn Tuesday and more were scheduled Friday.

Frito-Lay helped with the special effort by agreeing to bypass the truck allotment, allowing all the trucks coming out of the fields to get in line and dump. Messer Industries of Hereford provided several trucks to haul the corn, allowing the combines to keep moving, Templeton reported.

## Colorado man will get his day in court

Deaf Smith County Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine will give a Colorado man his day in court so he can fight paying a fine for failure to wear a seat belt.

Judge Turrentine said Rodney Berg, 39, of Salida, Colo., was cited for the offense by a Department of Public Safety trooper on U.S. 385 on Aug. 27.

Since receiving the ticket, Judge Turrentine said Berg has called her office on almost a daily basis to protest the ticket, claiming buckling up with a seat belt violates his Constitutional rights.

"I told him 'It's the law' in Texas, and he told me he would fight it all the way to the Supreme Court," said Turrentine. When he demanded a trial by jury, the justice of the peace asked for an appearance bond of \$200, which he supplied, and set his court date, Oct. 28.

On several occasions, Turrentine said, Berg has harangued her and her office staff for an hour, or more, at a time.

"One day he talked to Eileen (Behunin) for more than an hour. She turned him over to me and he continued for another half-hour," said the justice of the peace. Others on her staff have taken his calls, also.

Turrentine said Berg has called the office of Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul as well as news media in the area.

The justice of the peace said she will not back down and Berg would have been better off, financially, if he had paid the fine.

"He's spent a lot more on phone calls than the fine which is \$60," she added.

## Mixed reaction greets new word on 'critical habitat'

**AUSTIN (AP)** - Word that federal officials will back off possible designation of parts of 33 Central Texas counties as "critical habitat" for an endangered songbird is drawing a mixed reaction.

Some agricultural and landowner groups said it was good news. Some Republican politicians suggested it was an election-eve move to appease the growing property rights movement. Some environmentalists said they were disappointed.

Gov. Ann Richards said Tuesday that Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt assured her the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service would turn its attention to other conservation measures for protection of the golden-cheeked warbler.

"Secretary Babbitt has ... agreed with our recommendations and has decided that conservation planning is a better approach than critical habitat designation," she said.

In making the announcement, the Democratic governor moved to defuse one of this election year's most explosive issues.

Farmers, ranchers, landowners and others have bitterly complained that too-strict federal environmental rules were stripping them of the use and value of their land.

Richards' Republican challenger,

George W. Bush, also opposed the habitat designation, and his campaign said he should get some of the credit for the change of heart.

"I trust the secretary's letter included an important postscript: this decision was made thanks to the leadership of George Bush," said spokeswoman Karen Hughes. "The property rights rebellion in Texas threatens to make extinct politicians who invite federal control of private property."

The Fish and Wildlife Service, which is overseen by the Interior Department, announced this summer that it was considering whether to propose the designation of areas in the 33 counties as critical habitat to further protect the warbler.

The songbird, which already is listed as an endangered species, nests in some 800,000 acres of those counties.

In a strongly worded letter two weeks ago, Richards told Babbitt that the habitat designation was a bad idea and urged his agency to abandon it.

Tuesday, she said she was pleased Washington got the message.

"I think Washington got so far away from us, so far afield, that they forgot there was a constituency out here," Richards said.

"Whatever policy it is, whatever

law it is, you're not going to be able to make it work, to enforce it, unless everybody is involved. They haven't done that in a long time."

In a letter to Richards, Babbitt said the federal government "too often has failed to pursue creative conservation solutions with landowners" and that "normal agricultural and ranching activities in Texas have little impact on golden-cheeked warblers."

Charles Carter, executive director of the Independent Cattlemen's Association, said his group hopes the announcement is more than election-eve politics.

"We're excited about the news. We welcome it. It (the habitat controversy) is affecting landowners. We're talking about some of our members' livelihood here," he said.

Tom Smith, head of the watchdog group Public Citizen's Texas office, said Richards is alienating environmentalists.

"She's trading votes for birds and bugs," Smith said. "There's an old saying - dance with the one that brought ya - and she's forgetting that. She's assuming that environmental voters will vote for her no matter what."

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry and U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio, both voiced skepticism about the timing of the announcement.

"The Governor's Mansion is currently critical habitat for Ann Richards, and her friends in the Clinton administration are hurrying to help her feather her nest for four more years," Perry said.

## Hearing produces conflict in views

**AUSTIN (AP)** - A public hearing on automobile insurance rates is under way with consumers and insurance companies on opposite sides.

The Office of Public Insurance Counsel wants a 5.7 percent decrease in the benchmark auto rate, while insurers have asked for increases ranging from 9.8 percent to 15.7 percent.

The hearing, which started Tuesday, is expected to last several days. The hearing examiners will make a recommendation to Insurance Commissioner Robert Hunter.

Hunter will make a final decision on the benchmark auto rates.

Under the flexible rating system, companies can price auto policies as much as 30 percent below and 30 percent above the benchmark without state approval.

Under the current benchmark rate, a male driver 25 or older in Travis County who drives a 1993 Ford Taurus pays \$550 a year for a standard insurance policy, according to the Texas Department of Insurance. Rates vary among the 52 rating territories statewide.

Under the OPIC recommendation, that benchmark rate would drop to \$518.65. The insurers' recommendations would raise the premiums to a range of \$603.90 to \$636.35 per year.

"With every percentage point increase in rates, Texas consumers pay an additional \$47 million in insurance premiums," said OPIC's Mark Kincaid.

"Before they are allowed to take this money out of consumers' pockets, insurers must be able to prove that an increase is justified. They won't be able to do it at this hearing," he said.

Consumers said a decrease is warranted because of Commissioner Hunter's instructions to insurers to base expenses on the experience of the most efficient insurer.

"Texans should not have to pay for insurance operations that are inefficient," said Robert Schneider, attorney for Consumers Union. Schneider said insurance companies ignored this instruction from Hunter.

Richard Geiger, an attorney representing the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office, said Hunter's directive was impractical and not in compliance with state insurance law.

"It is irrelevant to consider using the experience of an individual insurer as a determining factor for the benchmark rate decision," he said.

"It is not possible for all companies to operate in the same way." TAISO, which represents small- and medium-sized insurance companies, has requested a 15.7 percent increase.

Mark Toohy, a spokesman for Farmers Insurance Group of Companies, said the benchmark hasn't moved in three years, while medical costs have risen.

"If you look at the costs of the goods and services that auto insurance pays for, you will find that they have increased dramatically in recent years," Toohy said. "But the premiums collected by insurance companies have fallen far short of those increased costs," he said.

The group discussed selling pecans, one of their money-making projects.

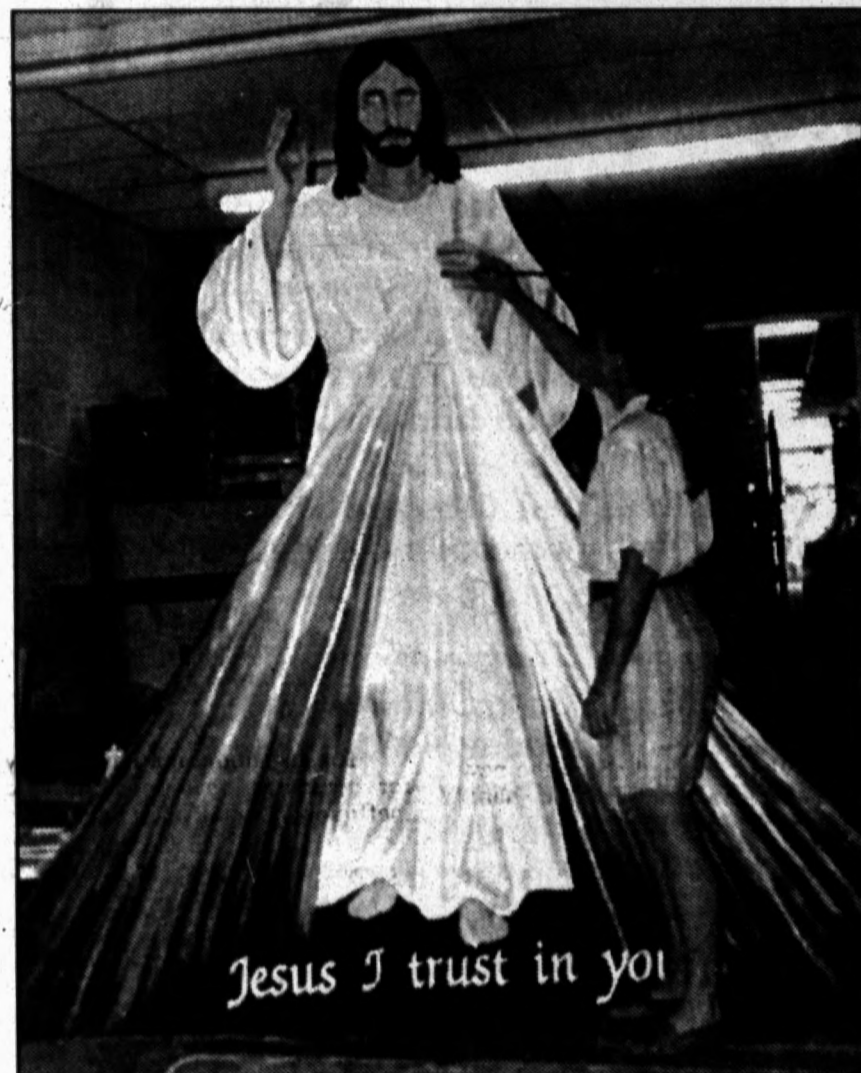

### Baylor recruit got free rent

DALLAS (AP)—A former Baylor University basketball recruit says he was provided a rent-free apartment in Waco in the summer of 1993 and that head coach Darrel Johnson was aware of it.

Jason Ervin was one of four junior college transfers whom Baylor was required to hold out of competition last year after their transcripts were called into question.

Ervin told Southwest Conference investigators about the apartment after receiving immunity from eligibility sanctions, The Dallas Morning News reported today.

Johnson has denied any direct involvement in NCAA infractions. He was out of town Tuesday on a recruiting trip, and unavailable for comment, said Tommy Newsom, assistant sports information director at Baylor.

But Johnson is under instructions from university officials not to comment on any aspect of the ongoing NCAA investigation into academic fraud and improper extra benefits within his program, Newsom said.

Ervin said when he transferred to Baylor from State Fair Community College in Sedalia, Mo., he was set up in an apartment near the Baylor campus without paying the usual deposit. Two weeks into his summer stay in Waco, he still had not paid anything for rent or utilities, he said.

Ervin said he understood he was not going to be asked to pay rent, but said he couldn't recall who on Johnson's staff made the arrangement.

Ervin said he began working at the Dr Pepper plant in Waco, where numerous Baylor athletes are employed during summers. He said he worked every day for his first two weeks, but could not recall how much he was supposed to be paid.

Nothing was said about any rent payment until he decided for personal reasons to leave Waco for Kansas City, Ervin said.

Johnson angrily told Ervin that he would have to pay the rent on the apartment, the player said.

Ervin said Johnson instructed him to change for his Dr Pepper paycheck to be delivered directly to the head coach's office.

Hereford, as John Paul Cardenas scored touchdowns three different ways. He returned a kickoff 73 yards for one score, ran 45 yards for another and caught a 42 yard TD pass from Matt Lusk. On the one touchdown he didn't score—L.J. Vallejo ran 23 yards for a score—Cardenas ran for the two-point conversion.

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# Cowboys get WR Williams back in practice

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Help has arrived for the Dallas Cowboys sputtering offense.

Speedy Kevin Williams, who is used as a third-down receiver besides being one of the best kick returners, is practicing after missing a game with a sprained knee.

"Troy Aikman has a lot of confidence in Kevin on third downs and it has got to help us to have him back," coach Barry Switzer said.

"The knee is feeling pretty good," Williams said. "I think I'll be able to go all out."

Deep passes have been almost

non-existent in the Cowboys offense.

"We were trying to take what the defense gave us," said offensive coordinator Ernie Zampese. "They were doubling our wide receivers. You have to go to your running game and your tight end. That means you have to handle the ball a lot of times without turnovers. We lost three fumbles. That killed us."

Zampese has come under heat because the man he replaced, Norv Turner, was the offensive coordinator for two Super Bowl championships. Zampese trades wits with Turner this

week when the Cowboys travel to Washington.

"We'd like to get the ball to the wide receivers more but teams are taking them away from us," Zampese said. "Maybe we need to start throwing deep anyway to loosen things up."

Three games into the season tight end Jay Novacek leads the team in catches with 15.

Of the top four receivers on the team, only one is a wide out, Michael Irvin, who has 14 catches.

Running back Emmitt Smith is next with 13 and fullback Daryl Johnston is right behind with nine catches. Wide receiver Alvin Harper is fifth with six receptions.

The stumbling offense has caused shouting matches between players

and Smith to throw his helmet.

But a week off has restored some calm to Valley Ranch.

"We're going to be OK," Irvin said. "Everyone is together on this team."

Irvin joked he went to Las Vegas during the off-week "to get all the losing out of my system."


Coach Barry Switzer had a long off week to examine his team.

"It's been a little frustrating but we have our focus back," Switzer said. "We need to start doing the little things. We've got to catch the ball and not jump off sides. We have to play up to our ability. If we do that we'll be OK."

The Cowboys (2-1) are ranked fifth in the NFL in total offense and first in rushing offense.

"We're still not doing things the way we know how," Smith said. "We're still not there yet."

Smith spent the off-week nursing a turf toe and was expected to be fine by Sunday.

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WASHINGTON (AP) - Lawmakers in both the House and Senate are expected to take up legislation on baseball's antitrust exemption today as they attempt to push owners and players to end the strike.

Sen. Howard Metzenbaum said he will attempt to attach a repeal of the antitrust exemption concerning labor matters to an appropriations bill for the Labor and Health departments, legislation scheduled for debate on the Senate floor.

"I hope to be able to force it to a vote," Metzenbaum said after the Senate recessed Tuesday night.

Metzenbaum at first thought of proposing the amendment Tuesday, then decided to wait a day.

"I will do everything I can to oppose this," said Sen. J. James Exon, D-Neb., who earlier this month blocked Metzenbaum's bill from coming to the Senate floor.

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said he would support Metzenbaum's effort. Earlier this year in the Judiciary Committee, Hatch voted against Metzenbaum's bill for a complete repeal of the exemption. The latest effort would eliminate the exemption if owners unilaterally impose work rules, such as a salary cap.

"All the distinguished senator from Ohio and I are trying to do is say to the owners of those teams: You can unilaterally impose, if you want to, any unilateral conditions under the law, but if you do you lose the antitrust exemption until after the matter is resolved," Hatch said.

In the House, the Judiciary Committee's subcommittee on economic and commercial law is scheduled to take up Rep. Mike Synar's bill, congressional staff said.

The full committee may vote on the bill Thursday, but the legislation is unlikely to pass Congress before adjournment next month.

Synar, D-Okla., wants to allow the players' union to file an antitrust suit against owners if management unilaterally implements a salary cap. His bill also would stop a salary cap from taking effect until after all lawsuits are decided.

Union head Donald Fehr said the strike would end if the bill, in its current form, became law. However, a congressional staff member and several baseball officials said Tuesday the bill's language may change to provisions less favorable to the union.

Eugene Orza, the union's No. 2 official, said the provision stopping a salary cap until after lawsuits was necessary for the strike to stop.

Management negotiator Richard Ravitch said he was told the provisions that the union said were vital would be removed.

Ravitch is scheduled to testify Thursday before the subcommittee on labor-management relations, which is considering a bill by Rep. Pat Williams, D-Mont., that would impose binding arbitration if players and owners don't agree by Feb. 1. The arbitrator, much in the manner of a salary arbitrator, would select the final offer of one side. His decision would be issued by March 15.

The antitrust exemption, created by a 1922 U.S. Supreme Court decision that said baseball was not interstate commerce, gives owners a legal monopoly.

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# FW receiver hauls in 354 yards worth of passes

DALLAS (AP) - Fort Worth Paschal receiver Stanley Johnson had to think he might be in for a big night when he realized Crowley was not double-teaming him. Single coverage at least meant he'd get more passes thrown his way.

Johnson ended up with 11 receptions, but it's what he did after the catches that made his night so memorable.

He turned three of them into touchdowns of 70, 63 and 58 yards and overall gained 354 yards in a 43-19 Paschal victory.

His yardage is the best ever in Class 5A and the second-best in Texas football history. According to national record books, only four high school receivers have gained more through the air in one game.

"He's always been a big playmaker," Paschal coach Steve Chevreux said. "He's capable of lighting up the scoreboard any time."

Crowley found out the hard way. Without extra defensive backs on Johnson, the speedy senior was virtually unstoppable as he easily ran to the top of this week's Associated Press honor roll.

"One of our first goals every game is to see how they're covering Stanley," Chevreux said. "Sometimes, they double- and triple-cover him and he doesn't catch much."

But, against Crowley, "the coverage wasn't too hot and we kept going to him," Chevreux said.

Johnson's record night smashed the previous 5A mark of 310 by Ken Smith of Nacogdoches against Marshall in 1983.

He was only three yards shy of the state mark of 357 by Chillicothe's Randy Boone, who set the record on 14 catches in a 1984 game against

Aspermont, according to Bill McMurray's Texas High School All-Time Sports Record Book.

The 1994 National High School Sports Record Book lists Boone and three others as the only players to have ever caught passes for more yards in one game than Johnson. The record of 386 yards was set in 1985 by Richard Williams of New Orleans Carver.

"Hopefully, if it's possible, I can have an even better game," Johnson said.

It's hard to imagine that he could, since the attention his feat has generated is sure to attract tougher defenses the rest of this season.

"I know I would put everyone on the bench on him," Chevreux said.

In four games this year, Johnson has 22 receptions for 533 yards and six touchdowns. One of those games was played in such a heavy rain that Chevreux said the football had the consistency of a wet sponge.

The key to Johnson's success is his ability to make the most out of being only 5-foot-5. Having 4.4 speed in the 40 and the leaping ability to dunk a basketball also helps.

"Sometimes, they can't see me and I can sneak to certain spots," Johnson said. "Every time I catch the ball, I look for the end zone. If the defense makes a mistake, I try and take advantage of it."

Quite often, Johnson forces the mistake. His low center of gravity and his burst of speed often make defenses whiff when trying to tackle him.

"He's quick and elusive," Crowley coach Robert Woods said.

"He made us miss."

Chevreux said that's a common complaint of opposing coaches.

"We have on film where one time last year he caught the ball near the sideline cornered by four guys - and they haven't touched him yet," Chevreux said.

-Jefferson receiver Tim Holt had 410 all-purpose yards and five touchdowns in a 57-21 victory over Gilmer. He scored twice on reverses of 51 and 9 yards, caught TD passes of 46 and 59 yards, and he returned a kickoff 102 yards for another score.

-Bridge City's Jay Carpenter ran 28 times for 308 yards and six touchdowns in a 63-41 victory over 3A Corrigan-Camden. For the losers, Ray Garrett ran 14 times for 252 yards with touchdown runs of 67, 75 and 60 yards, and teammate Jonathan Jolly caught three passes for 153 yards and TD catches of 75 and 40 yards.

-Darrell Bush of Jersey Village ran for 334 yards on 40 carries and scored three times in a 31-17 victory over Houston Cypress Falls.

-Clarendon junior Lorenzo Moore rushed 23 times for 332 yards in a 40-20 victory over White Deer.

-Burkeville's Jeff Spikes still can't be stopped. In a 45-0 victory over the Nacogdoches junior varsity, Spikes had a 52-yard TD on his first carry, an 80-yard TD on his second try and later added a 73-yard score. He finished with 255 yards on eight carries.

-Michael Kelley of Spur rushed 24 times for 293 yards and four touchdowns in a 59-22 victory over Knox City.

-Willie Carroll returned from being academically ineligible to rush for 302 yards and two TDs on 18 carries as Navasota defeated Bastrop

27-21.

-Willie Bookman and Kevin Isaac combined to rush for 468 yards and seven TDs on 31 carries as Iola crushed Houston Northwest Academy 68-0.

-Ballinger got 233 yards rushing from Wesley Jennings and another 200 from Dominic Reyes in a 44-14 victory over Coleman. The duo combined for five TDs.

-Jeff Freeman ran for 290 yards and three TDs in Kemp's 32-20 victory over Brownsboro. He scored on runs of 43, 36 and 34 yards, and had two receptions for 33 yards.

## Activist group encourages attention to board election

AUSTIN (AP) - Texas voters need to pay attention to State Board of Education races for the sake of their children, says the People for the American Way Action Fund.

The group - which describes itself as a non-partisan, non-profit group promoting tolerance and civic participation - is launching a project to urge citizens to be informed and vote in November.

"What is at risk is the future of Texas' next generation of school children," said Mike Hudson, general counsel and vice president of the group.

Seven of the 15 Education Board seats are up this year, including six contested races. Incumbent Monte Hasie of Lubbock, a Republican, has no challenger.

The Education Board helps shape state education policy and decides which textbooks can be purchased with state money by school districts. It currently includes 10 Democrats and five Republicans.

People for the American Way in the 1980s fought for such reforms as getting rid of rules that had restricted coverage of evolution in science textbooks.

Hudson also cited more recent controversies, such as this year's board vote to require changes, including deletion of some explicit illustrations and abortion procedures information, in health textbooks; and a furor over development of optional, state-developed education materials on acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

If people don't pay attention to the election, Hudson's group said, "'stealth' candidates with controversial positions on important education policy issues" may be elected "not with the support of the general community, but through energized religious right activity."

The group said a "new religious right political action committee" called the Committee for the Advancement of Responsible Education, or CARE, has launched a \$300,000 campaign to elect its slate of candidates to the board.

Todd Kent, campaign coordinator for the six Republicans in contested Education Board races and assistant treasurer of CARE, said it's not specifically a religious right group. Instead, he said, the movement

People for the American Way Action Fund said it is sending information to more than 250 statewide organizations and asking that it be made available to members in contested board districts.

The group said it also is preparing thousands of nonpartisan postcard

"alerts" urging citizens to vote.

## Area parole violater identified after story printed in newspaper

STINNETT, Texas (AP) - The four-week-old Stinnett Journal has been closed after the editor and publisher was arrested on charges of parole violation.

Steve Ramos was arrested at the newspaper office Tuesday.

A Texas Ranger from Dumas called Stinnett Police Chief Randy Hooks and told him he recognized Ramos as a fugitive after seeing his picture in Tuesday's Amarillo Globe-News, Hooks said.

The Amarillo newspaper had written a story about the budding weekly newspaper, Stinnett's only medium.

"He contacted my department and wanted to know if (Ramos) was still in the area," Hooks said. "The agency advised me to check his record, and it was determined he was wanted for parole violation."

Ramos was on parole for theft charges that originated in Moore County, Hooks said.

The police chief said that in 1993, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's Pardons and Parole Division in Austin issued a warrant for his arrest for violating that parole, Hooks said.

Local authorities do not know what parole terms the 36-year-old Amarillo man is accused of violating, Hooks said.

Efforts to contact the TDCJ's Pardons and Parole Division in Austin were not successful Tuesday night, the Amarillo newspaper reported.

Moore County Chief Deputy Bo DeArmond said Ramos has a history of theft convictions and parole violations in Texas.

"Since 1985 we have had extensive contacts with this person, some of them being felony charges," DeArmond said. "He has been handled numerous times for felony theft charges."

Julia Fay Barker, a volunteer staff member, said the newspaper is defunct because of Ramos' arrest.

"It's out of business," she said. "He has the copyrights and everything, and you can't use someone else's copyrights. He didn't want to transfer them."

Ramos earlier told the Amarillo newspaper he implemented the paper in Stinnett because he "needed something to do" and because the people of the town "truly really, really wanted a paper."

The arrest came as a surprise, Ms. Barker said.

"It's awful, it really is," she said. "He didn't mention anything. Everyone that met him thought a lot of him."

There are no known plans to revive the newspaper, Ms. Barker said.

"The whole town is just sorry this happened because we desperately needed a way of corresponding here in town and the paper's the only way we had," she said. "The whole town

is hurt by it."

Ramos was denied bond and remained in the Hutchinson County Jail in Stinnett Tuesday night, a spokesman said. The spokesman said jail policy prohibited the Amarillo newspaper from speaking with Ramos by telephone Tuesday night.

Stinnett has a population of 1,900 and is located about 60 miles northeast of Amarillo in the Texas Panhandle.

## Texas GOP endorses platform on term limits vote, tax cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) - A national Republican platform pledging speedy House votes on term limits, tax cuts and congressional reform is one way of promising Americans actions - not rhetoric, Texas Republicans say.

Seventeen Texas GOP congressional challengers were among more than 300 candidates who endorsed the 10-point "Contract With America" at a rally in front of the Capitol on Tuesday.

"We are showing people in writing what we will do once we are elected and inviting them to throw us out if we don't keep our word," said Mac Thornberry, a GOP candidate opposing Democratic incumbent Bill

Sarpalius in the Panhandle's 13th District.

The manifesto calls for a balanced budget amendment, welfare reform, crime-fighting measures and several tax cuts that Republicans will seek votes on within the first 100 days of the new Congress if the GOP regains control of the House.

Republicans would have to gain 40 seats to wrest control of the House from Democrats, who have held the majority since 1954.

Democrats denounced the plan as a costly gimmick, saying it smacks of "warmed-over Reaganism."

But Republicans contended that the contract is a way of proving their

commitment to the American people.

"I think it's the first time political candidates have said 'Hold us accountable,'" said Donna Peterson, who is making her third bid against Lufkin Democratic incumbent Charlie Wilson. "I have asked the people of East Texas to use this contract as a report card on my performance and if I fail ... I won't run again."

Said Ernest Anderson, who is running against Democratic incumbent Pete Geren of Fort Worth: "When was the last time you got to look at a candidate before you elected him?"

"This is the best thing that's come down the pike since butter on bread," Anderson added.
