Hereford is not Candidate for College but Wants to Join | In Movement Celebrating Securing of Great Institution. Will Take Part in Parade at Amarillo in Afternoon

Automobiles and band boys to assemble on Main street, in block between First National Bank and Star Theatre at 8:30 sharp, Wed-

All Hereford people in Amarillo to gather on vacant lot opposite the High School, on Polk street, at 10:30 o'clock and up to noon as they arrive, where cars will be placarded and individual ribbons issued to those who come late.

Parade in Amarillo at 1:00 p. m., and every citizen of Hereford there is expected to get into it incars behind the Hereford Band.

Hereford is going to the West Texas Tech Jubilee, to be held at Amarillo dnesday, en masse, according to a decision made at the luncheon of the Williams, A. Lowther, Mesdames

Chamber of Commerce Monday at noon The Hereford Band will be sent to lead the Hereford section in the big Parade to be staged in Amarillo at 1:00 p. m., and every man, woman and child in this community is to be arged to take a day off and go to Amarillo in a body Wednesday.

It was agreed to ask all car owners to meet promptly at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning on Main Street in the block between the First National Bank and the Star Theatre and there receive ribbons and car placards, with the word "Hereford" prominently displayed thereon. It is desired that cars all leave together and invade Amarillo together.

Committees were appointed Monday to secure cars in which to carry the band boys and other cars loaded with Hereford people who will go to Amarillo and help make the trip worth while. Anybody who will have a spare seat in their car will be conferring a distinct public favor by carrying one or more of the band boys. Arrangements were being made Tuesday to secure a big truck to be sent to Amarillo on which the band may ride while playing in the parade. Suitable signs will be prepared to tell the world that Hereford is there.

This action was taken Monday by the business men after a discussion of the entire project. Hereford is not a candidate for the Tech school, and has no axe to grind Wednesday, but is going to Amarillo solely for the purpose of aiding in making the celebration a success and to let the people know that Hereford is on the map and still "earrying on."




