



### **Eradicate Rats** Daniel News to Curb Typhus Hun

Fever" continues to make its ap-pearance in various counties in Texas. Like typhoid, most of the cases occur in the hot months of ummer and early fall, according to records of the State Health De-

"The symptoms of typhus fever are similar to those of typhoid fever, except the course of typhus is generally two weeks, while typhoid may extend over several weeks," said Dr. John W. Brown, state health officer.

"Although there are two types of typhus fever, it is the endemic type (known as Brill's Disease) which presents itself in Texas.

"The onset of typhus fever is usually sudden and accompanied by chills, fever, headache and general body pains. Nausea and vomiting may be present. Headache is an outstanding symptom, and often persists to such a degree that it does not readily yield to drugs or local applications. OF ANIMAL'S TRUE VALUE?

"The fever rises rapidly, often reaching a maximum of 105 degrees in the fifth to eighth day, and generally declining about the tenth to fourteenth day. Be It Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding there to immediately after Section 48, a section to be known. section to be known as a

48a, and to read as follows:

"Section 48a: In addition to the powers given to the Legislature, under Section 48 of Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement Fund for persons employed in public schools, colleges and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State: providing that the amount contributed by the State to such Retirement Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum of the compensation paid to each

pensation of said persons, or by the State of Texas, for such Retire as, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of agency of the United States Gov guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate pay-ment of the amounts that may become due each year under such retirement plan as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Tex-as, unless such retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."



### A NEW SOIL CONSERVATION PROGRAM

Four counties in the Panhandle-Hall, Collingsworth, Donley and Childress-have planned a new type of soil conservation set-up, an association of farmers, land-owners and tenants for the purpose of promoting better farming practices and the conservation of soil and water. Here is a new conservation program that should meet with the approval of and receive the assistance of the SCS, as it undoubtedly will.

A meeting of all land-owners and land workers in the four counties is to be held August 1 to work out plans for the new association. It is to be a voluntary organization with seven fundamental purpose, which are:

1. To acquire and disseminate facts and information con cerning the character of soil erosion by wind and water, the effects of such erosion, including rainfall runoff, floods, reser voir silting and soil blowing, and the characters of the pre-

ventive and control measures. 2. To promote the cooperation of all residents, operators farmers, land owners and land occupiers in the geographical area covered by the association, in a concerted and intelligent effort to prevent and control soil erosion, and the wastage of soil and moisture.

3. To bring about widespread adoption of proven erosion control and erosion prevention practices.

4. To promote individual and community protection and management of pasture lands, grazing lands and wood-






