### Portales Killing.

The Herald gives the following account of the killing which occurred in that city last week

On last Wednesday between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock, noon, A M. Boykin shot and killed Henry F. Stoldt. Three shots were fixed by Boykin, the first one entering the left breast just over the nipple, which caused instant death. After Stoldt had fallen, apparently dead, Boykin advanced to his side and shot him twice more as he lay. One bullet entered behind the left ear and came out over the right eye, the other entered at the right of themouth. Either\shot would have been fatal.

The only witness so far as is known was Jim Boykin, a brother of the party who did the shooting, and he tells the following story: He says that Stoldt came to his mother's house shortly after noon and asked if his brother was in the house. He replied that he was, whereupon Stoldt advanced to the door, drew his gun and told Boykin to come out. Instead of coming out Boykin. drew his gun and killed him.

Not much credence is placed in this version of the affair, as Stoldt had no gun with him, his being at home in his trunk, besides, Stoldt's experience as a deputy, sheriff . has made him very rapid with a revolver, to beat him to the first shot under the circumstances stated. The weapon used was a 44 caliber

Boykin made no effort to get away but stayed at the house until Claude Lawrence notified Sheriff Odom who came immediately and took him into

Boykin was so close to deceased that the first shot, set his clothing afire, which lawrence who happened there just at this time, put out.

### A Fine Record.

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 28 .- O. B. Burnett, who lives near Memphis in the Panhandle section of this state along the line of the Denver road, made a fine record on his cotton farm this year. On eighty-five acres of land with no use of fertilizer. he made seventy-three bales, which he marketed early in the season and for which he received 10c per pound, This land was worth before he planted it about \$6 per acre. You could not buy it at that price now.

Mr. Burnett also kept a close account of the cost of producing the crop and figures it out, including his labor and the labor of his family together with the hired help, and the cost of gathering at 3c per pound. The crop netted Mr. Burnett 70 per pound. Averaging the bales at 450 pounds Mr. Burnett cleared \$2,299.50 on his investment. This was in a section of the state heretofore considered useless for any other purpose except cattle raising.

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### JAPANESE VICTORY.

### The Little Band of Russians at Port Arthur Succumb to Starvation and Continued Fighting.

The Russian forces at Port Arthur, after having been besieged for about eight months by the superior Japanese forces, surrendered the fort January 2. Worn out by continued attacks from General Nogi's forces, the Russian General Stoessel at about 9 o'clock p. m. of the day above mentioned sent General Nogi a note asking him to arrange the terms of the capitulation. The following is a brief summary of the terms of surrender as signed by both generals:

The text of articles of capitulation of the Port Arthur garrison, signed by the commissioners representing Gen. Stoessel and Gen. Nogi, has been made public. All Russian soldiers, marines and civil officials of the garrison and harbor are made prisoners; all forts, batteries, vessels, munitions, etc., are transferred P. F.
