New gins are being built all over the range country, and every year the cotton patch is pushed further westward. Some of the leading cattlemen of the west are not only engaging in the production of cotton, but are also engaged in preparing to handle it. Julian Bassett, a big Crosby county ranchman, is building a \$7,500 gin in his county, located about six miles from the little town of Emma.

All over the plains country the culture of cotton has extended this year, and wherever there has been fairly good rainfall the prospect for a crop is reported very fine. People are flocking into that section from the boll weevil districts, and next year the acreage devoted to cotton will be more than doubled. With the prices now being paid for cotton W. B. 

New Jail.

Commissioners' Court met special session last Saturday and came to a decision on a matter of vital importance to the public-the building of a new jail for Deaf Smith county. The plans and specifications are being drawn up by Snyder & Lacey and bids will be called for as soon as they are completed. It is the intention of the court to erect a brick structure-one that will serve for all time to come. It will be fire proof and of dimensions 36 feet by 40 feet, which will give ample room for the occupancy of the sheriff or his deputy.

We believe this news will be cheerfully received by all our citizens, for it is a recognized fact that our present building is entirely inadequate sor the purposes for which it is being used. The county is not only likely to have a damage suit on her hands by confining prisoners in the cold, comfortless hut, but there is no assurance, when the prison doors are locked at night, that the prisoner will be there the next morning. Our county is in as good condition financially as any county in the state, and there will be no occasion for issuing or selling bonds as the jail fund is already almost sufficient.

Public Park.
