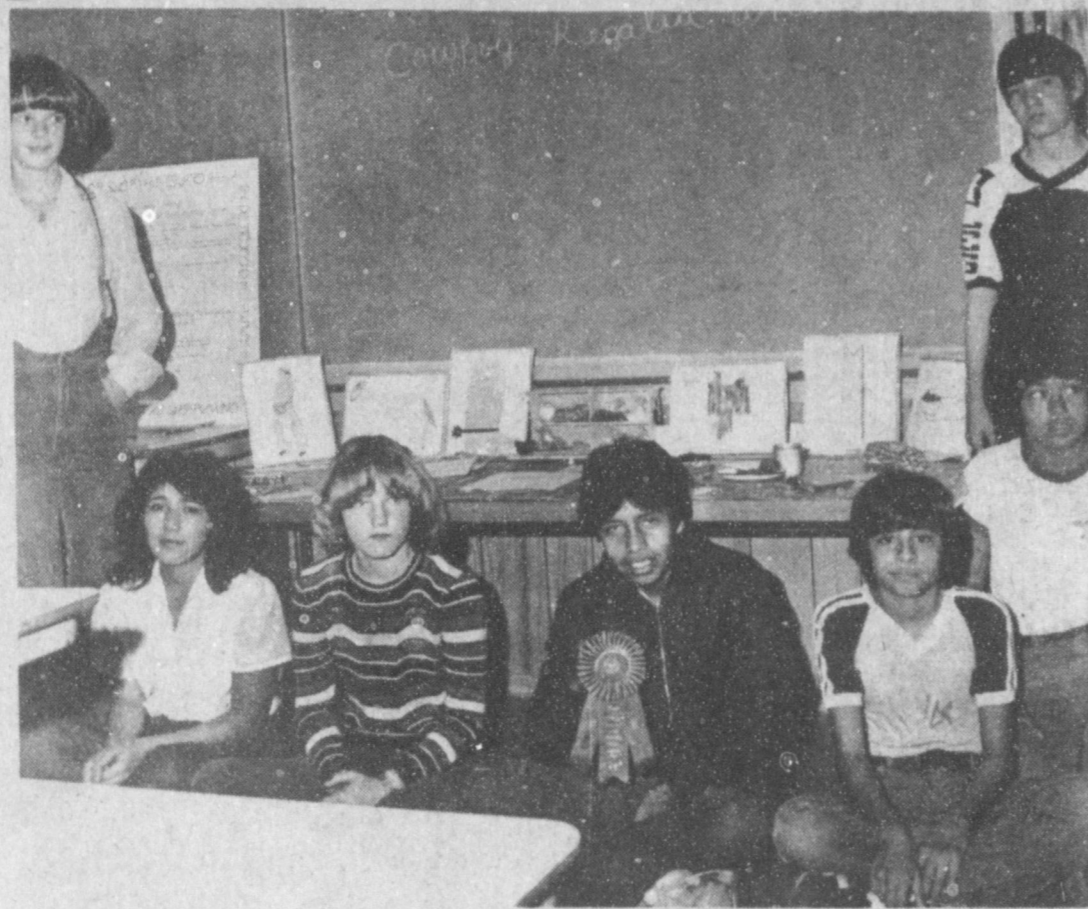

April 16 Sign Up Deadline For 1982 Farm Program

Bailey County producers who want to participate in the 1982 farm program must sign up their intentions by April 16, 1982, according to Rusty Williamson, Bailey County ASCS Director. Other guidelines that must be followed include the certification of crops, accurately, by certification date

deadlines. According to Williamson, 1982 base acreage must be reduced by the following percentages: 10 percent grain sorghum/corn; 10 percent barley/oats; 15 percent cotton and 15 percent wheat. These set aside acreages must be devoted to conservation uses.

Williamson says that "each farm and commodity will stand on its own. Corn and grain sorghum acres are interchangeable, as well as barley and oats. Cotton acres, however, cannot be substituted and wheat acres cannot be substituted. Skip rows may count as set aside, provided the skips equal at least four normal planted rows."

New Marketing Program Can Raise Grain Prices

A national marketing program is being developed that will raise grain prices one dollar per hundred pounds (56 cents per bushel) in a very short period of time, according to Elbert Harp, Executive Director of Grain Sorghum Producers Association. The 20-10-20 Orderly Marketing Plan, designed by Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-Texas), has been endorsed by GSPA.

Under the 20-10-20 Plan, farmers would place at least 20 percent of their supply and production in the farmer-held reserve and use the Government Loan Program for the balance where financing is needed. Other provisions of the plan are:

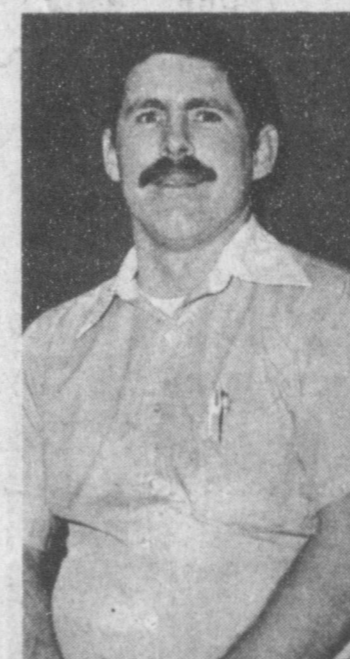
- 1. Farmers would sell no grain until the price reaches the reserve "trigger" price which currently is \$3.00 per bushel (\$5.36 per cwt.) on sorghum and \$3.15 (\$5.62 cwt.) on corn.
- 2. After market prices reach the trigger, farmers

would sell only 10 percent of their remaining stocks in any 30 day period during the first three months. This action will keep pressure on the market to raise prices.

3. After the first three month sales period, each farmer could sell 20 percent of his remaining stock during a 30-day period.

4. Minimum sales prices will move up throughout the year as storage and interest costs are added to the Reserve trigger price.

"This program will work," Harp said, "if it is coordinated with reduced Con't page 6 col. 2

FmHA Loan Offices Remain Backlogged

According to reports from Congressman Kent Hance's office, Friday, Agriculture Secretary John Block has yet to put his signature to the paperwork that would set in motion the \$600 million in Economic Emergency Loans from the FmHA. Sources have charged that the paperwork is on his desk, but he has refused to commit himself to sign it as yet. Block stated at his Lubbock Town Hall meeting that the implementation of these funds would be made within a week or ten days. A promise that he has failed to fulfill.

An aide in Hance's Lubbock office stated to *The Journal* Friday, that the money has already been appropriated, all that is

needed is for the USDA to write the checks. Hance and several other Congressmen are pushing this release heavily. Seemingly, however, Block has yet to realize the acute necessity of this money.

Information revealed to *The Journal* in a conversation with FmHA District Director, Don Perry, indicates that quite a number of farmers who may not be able to qualify under the present operating loan program could definitely be able to receive financing under the EE loan. Perry said, "We are no closer now than we were several weeks ago in knowing when the money will be, or if it will be available. We realize that the farmers are in great need of having something substantial to go on." According to the District director, "Somewhat rigid requirements that were first outlined for loans have been relaxed to a certain extent. We are trying to help all that we can."

A conversation with Clinton Kennedy, Bailey County FmHA director, indicated a sizeable backlog of work. Kennedy stated Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

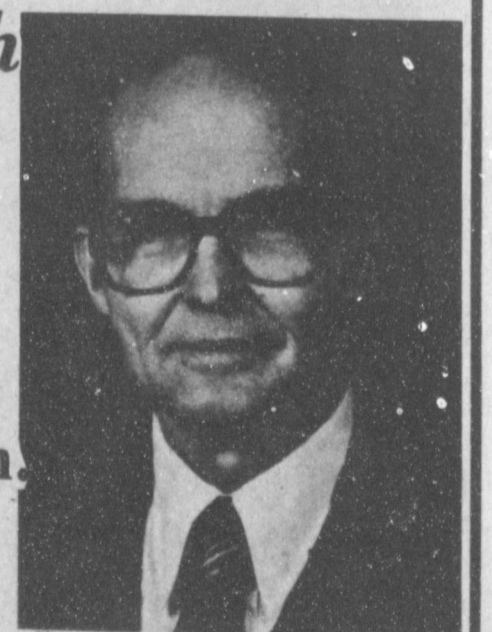

that within the county, approximately 123 loans have been processed, some 38 loans remain to be processed, either approved or denied, and about eight new applications awaiting a yes or no, pending financing of present farmers. Kennedy stated also that some of the loans were being made through subordination with local banks.

In nearby Parmer County, FmHA Director Bowling told *The Journal* that they (his office) had processed one hundred loans and had 113 loans still awaiting their money. They also have some new farmers, fifteen in number, in line for funds should there be any left. About fifteen more established farmers loans are still left to be processed. The Parmer County office, however, has two men besides the director, as well as two clerks. The staff in this office is substantially larger than the one in Bailey County. Bowling estimated that about \$4,471,000 had already been loaned through his office, and expects another million before they finish.

District Director Perry told *The Journal* Thursday that he expected to send another man into the Bailey County office by the first part of next week in an effort to speed up processing so that farmers can begin getting their land and finances shaped up for another year.

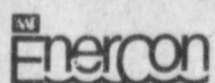

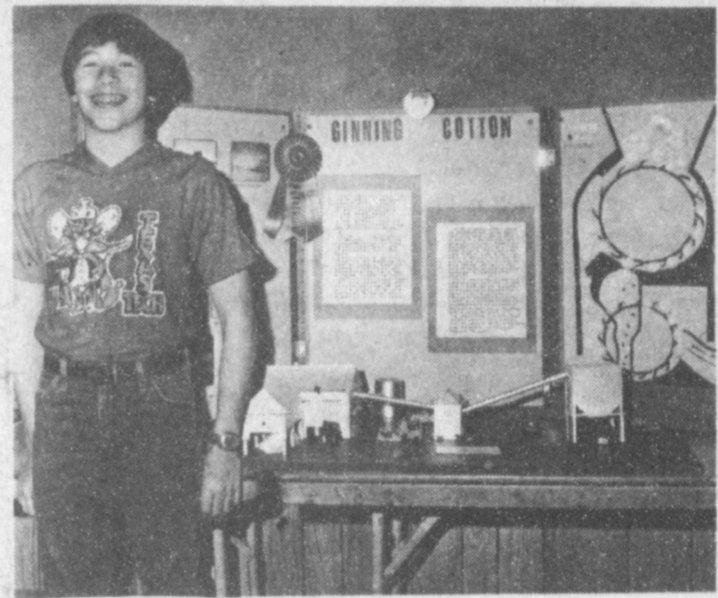

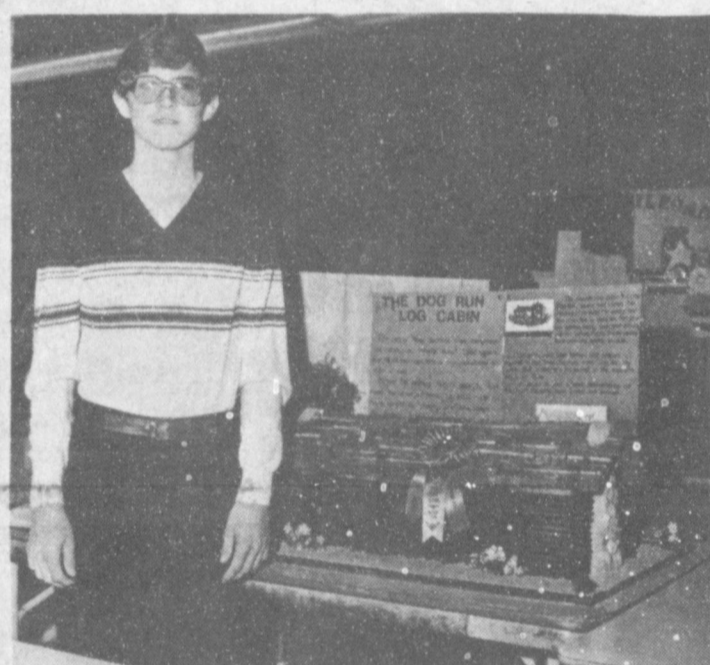

The question is as old as wheat farming: Has a yield plateau been reached in wheat production? This question was recently raised at an international symposium on wheat yields. General opinion of most plant scientists was: The potential for further genetic improvement in wheat does exist. With that possibility is the definite probability of continued yield increases. Many scientists pointed out although the process of refinement and, therefore, yield increases is quite slow and tedious, the increases will be a vast improvement over the varieties of 10 - 15 years ago. On the very near horizon, for example, are the highly refined techniques of single cell culture and gene surgery. Both of these look extremely promising, though still in their technological infancies. There has been no plateau in technology and what follows technology more closely than yield?

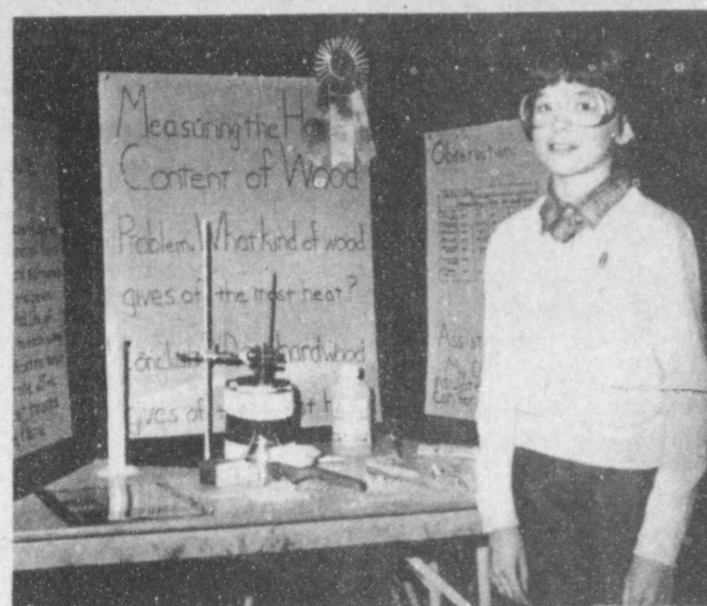
