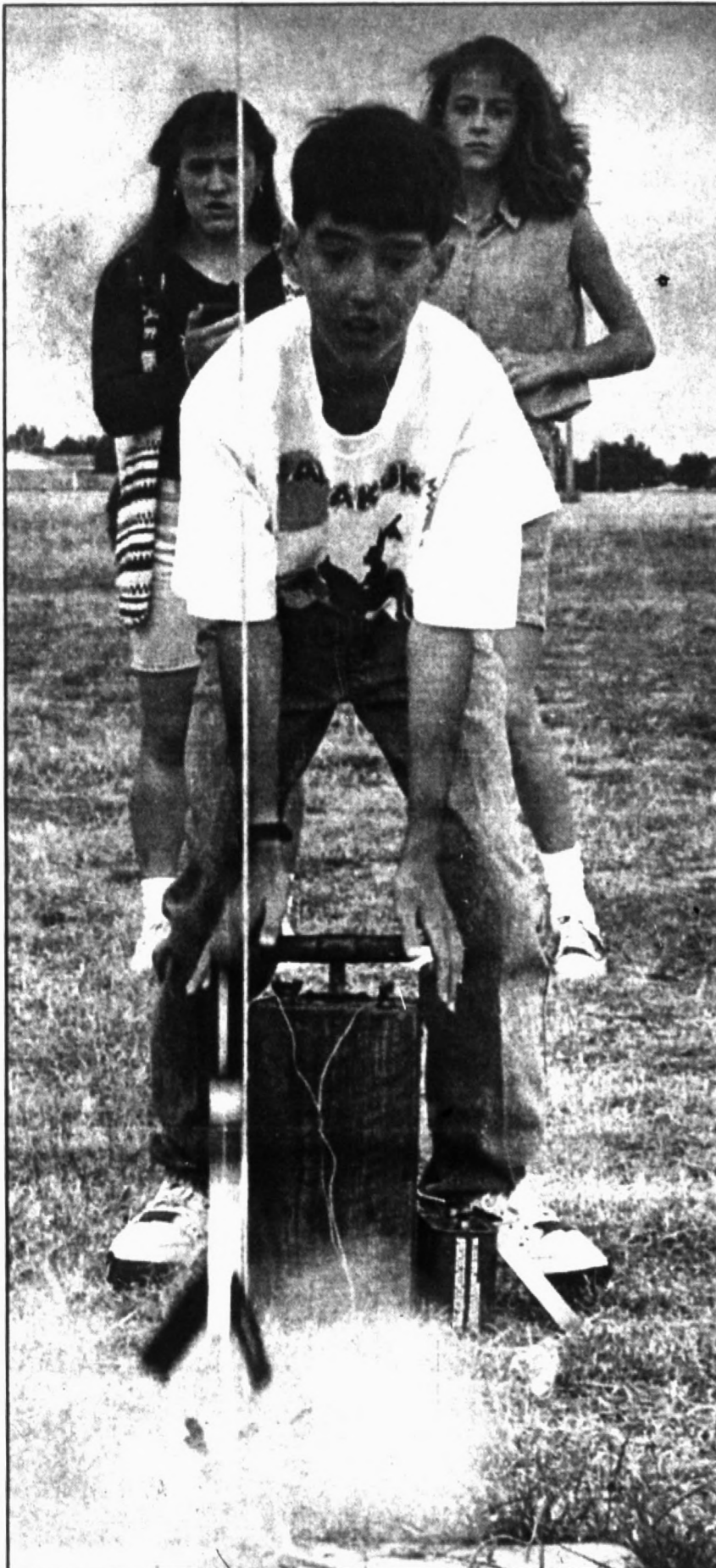

## School project goes off with a real bang

Sixth grade students at Nazarene Christian Academy on Friday got a chance to see their science projects go up in a cloud of smoke. Then they got to watch them come down again. The students had created homemade rockets as part of a lesson on space exploration and travel. At the same time, eighth-graders studying the same thing were assigned to build clinometers, devices that measure the altitude the rockets reach and the speeds they attain. The dual lessons came to fruition on Friday afternoon when, watched by the rest of the school and interested parents, the students took turns firing their rockets into the air. Each student made two rockets, but only got to fire one. The rockets were placed on the launch pad by a teacher, who attached the ignitor's wires to wires attached to a 6 volt battery connected to an antique (See SCHOOL, Page 2A)

## County health spending up; reform will affect local area

Few topics have generated more discussion this year than proposals for health care reform. With Congress debating the issue, it appears likely that some changes will eventually be made, and it is also likely that these changes will have a substantial impact in Deaf Smith County.

The Clinton administration has made health care reform an important priority and has pushed for universal coverage. Most government officials are concerned about health care because those costs have been absorbing an increasingly large amount of federal resources.

Federal, state and local payments for health care expenses—mostly spent through the Medicare and Medicaid programs—increased from \$134.9 billion in 1987 to \$256 billion in 1992, or by 90 percent.

In Deaf Smith County, those federal, state and local expenditures for health care had increased from \$5.9 million in 1987 to \$15.3 million by 1992. This represents an increase of 129.6 percent.

Several plans have been proposed to Congress. These vary from a proposal that would have all health care expenses provided by the federal government to plans that would make health insurance more readily available.

Medicare and Medicaid are absorbing an increasing share of the federal budget. Most state governments are also finding an increasing amount of their revenue absorbed by matching funds for Medicaid and other indigent health care programs.

These increases have taken place in spite of Medicare and Medicaid caps on physician and hospital fees. As a result of these caps, an increasing number of doctors across the nation simply refuse to accept Medicaid patients. Additionally, some physicians are beginning to refuse to accept Medicare patients unless they agree to pay fees in excess of those covered through Medicare.

While government health care expenses are increasing sharply, there is evidence that health care costs are growing nearly as rapidly in the private sector.

Part of this is a reaction by hospitals and physicians to Medicaid and Medicare caps. To make up the difference between regular charges for service and what the government pays for services, private patients are often subject to higher than regular charges.

Health care services have become a major component in the national economy. They are also one of the fastest growing components of the national economy in terms of personal income.

Personal income of providers of health care services, including physicians, nurses, hospital employees, nursing home employees and all others employed in various aspects of health care, increased from \$196 billion in 1987 to \$327 billion in 1992, or by 65.2 percent.

This trend was apparent in Texas. Personal income of these providers rose from \$11.8 billion in 1987 to \$19.9 billion in 1992. This represented an increase of 68.9 percent.

This increase was not nearly as much in Deaf Smith County. Personal income of these providers increased from \$3.7 million in 1987 to \$4.7 million in 1992, or by 26.5 percent.

Health care has become the nation's largest single industry. It has also been the nation's fastest growing industry for most of the last decade. So, it's no surprise that so much discussion has been generated over this topic.

Changes have taken place in health care in Hereford and Deaf Smith County, and any future changes will have a great impact on local residents, as well as those across the state and nation.

## Politics heading into stretch run

AUSTIN (AP) - While most Texans will spend the holiday relaxing, politicians will be busy shaking hands and making speeches Labor Day, which marks the unofficial start of the campaign.

Candidates have spent the summer "fund-raising and jockeying," George Christian, a Democratic political consultant, said. "There hasn't been much to attract the public's attention."

But now with most vacations over and children back in school, politicians believe that voters are ready to pay attention to the campaigns.

After Labor Day, there are 64 more days until Election Day, Nov. 8, and only 44 more days until the start of early voting, Oct. 19.

But some races have jumped the starting gate.

In the governor's race, "the horses are already at the first turn," Maxwell McCombs, a UT professor who specializes in politics, said.

Both Gov. Ann Richards and Republican challenger George W. Bush started running television and radio ads in August.

"When politicians start bombarding people with ads, that's when people start paying attention," McCombs said.

"In the Bush campaign they have to build an image for his candidacy and make sure people know it's not his father who's running," he said.

"For a lot of people, the election is a referendum on Ann Richards. She's a known quantity to people," he said.

McCombs said most voters already know who they are going to support, and the candidates are fighting for those who are undecided or wavering.

The governor's race - a statistical dead heat according to last week's Texas Poll - has drawn the most interest despite the fact that the U.S. Senate election is at the top of the ballot.

In that race, Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, a Republican, is seeking election to a full six-year term. She faces Democratic challenger Richard Fisher.

The Texas Poll showed Mrs. Hutchison leading Fisher by 19 percentage points.

Nick Voinis, a spokesman for Mrs. Hutchison, said the Republican posted the big poll lead because voters like the job she is doing.

Robin Rorapugh, a spokesman for Fisher, said the poll numbers at this point are unimportant. "Two and a half months out from the Democratic primary, we were at 8 percent." Fisher finished second in the primary but then won the runoff.

Voters will decide numerous executive races, and congressional, judicial and legislative contests.

## Keeper of city's water has eye on system, summer H2O consumption

When nature combines high temperatures with limited rainfall, a City of Hereford employee can be forgiven if he starts biting his fingernails.

Ted Coleman, water production superintendent for the city, had some days like that earlier this summer.

"In June, we had only 1.2-inches of rain and eight or nine days of temperatures of 100 degrees or more," he pointed out.

Needless to say, water taps were turned on for an average of 5,093,839 gallons daily. Given the conditions for that month, Coleman said the consumption figure was not unusual. Coleman is the keeper of records related to the city's water supply. He also is a worrier.

"Some of the wells are pretty old," he observed. The oldest in the system has supplied city water since 1940.

When the City Commission voted to sell revenue bonds to finance a water improvement program, the plan was to drill three wells into the Santa Rosa formation and nine into the Ogallala.

A new Santa Rosa at 15th and Progressive Road proved to be a winner.

"It's the best quality water we have from the Santa Rosa," declared Coleman. "And, it's pumping about 680 gallons per minute."

A new Ogallala well in Dameron Park has not lived up to expectations and Coleman reported that a Santa Rosa well in the Buena Vista area may not be as productive as hoped.

Rainfall measured by Coleman in his gauges so far this year adds up to about 12 and 1/2 inches. The Texas Almanac annual rain average for Deaf Smith County is 16 inches.

Low rainfall amounts produce higher consumption by citizens, especially during summer months when yards are thirsty.

The city is almost in a no-win situation. If water use spurts upward, revenues increase, but a strain is put on the wells to provide the water.

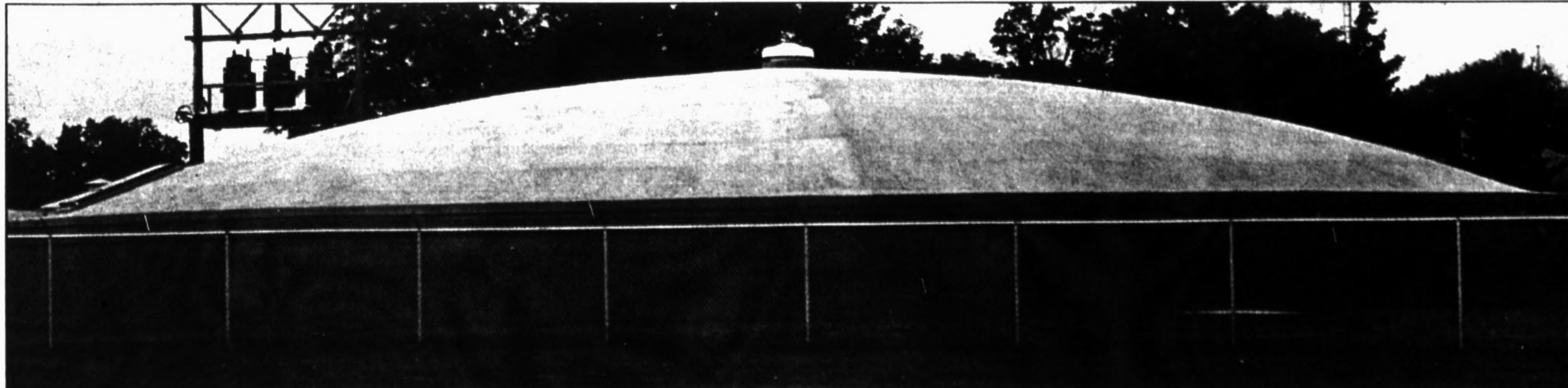
Storage capacity for the city's water supply got a million-gallon boost in the water improvement plan. A new storage tank was constructed at the Avenue C station, matching a tank already in place there.

With the new tank, the city now has ground storage for 5 million gallons of water. Elevated storage tanks on Moorman, 400,000 gallons, and F Street, 240,000, add to the total capacity.

In an emergency that might cause shutdown of wells, Coleman said, the supply from all storage would last about two days.

Before the new concrete tank was put on line in July, its twin had to be drained so valves to connect the two could be installed.

"The first one was built in 1957 and valves weren't put on it," remarked Coleman. To make the two (See WATER, Page 2A)

interchangeable, two 20-inch valves and two 18-inch valves were installed.

"We were lucky that we had a big rain in early July and we could take the Avenue C station out of service long enough to do the work," said Coleman.

The interior of the new tank was sterilized by the contractor but certain measurements were needed for installing the water level transmitter.

"I had a little raft at home so I had it sterilized and paddled around in the tank to get the measurements," laughed Coleman.

He expects to get the exterior of the new tank painted next month and also to have some landscaping work done.

Although Coleman said the high consumption daily average in June is not unusual, the five-million gallon average that month is higher than any month in 1993.

However, June last year was the month with highest average daily usage, 4,562,161 gallons.

On the heels of the high consumption in June this year came July with an average of 4,031,226 gallons used daily.

Since Coleman started keeping a averages on an annual basis, the highest consumption was an average of 4,066,337 gallons daily, in 1984.

At the other end of the scale, the lowest average daily consumption came in 1987 when he recorded 2,653,512 gallons sent through the city's water lines.

In 1984, the total water consumption was 1,484,213,000 gallons. High usage years, also, were 1983, with 1,389,093,000 gallons; 1985, with 1,246,302,000 gallons, and 1990, with 1,208,314,000.

Low water marks were in 1987, with 968,532,000 gallons, and 1992, 996,536,000 gallons.

In 1993, Hereford residents drew 1,118,304,000 gallons of water from their taps.

Since the first of the 1994, water customers have used 713,654,000 gallons. At that rate, the total by the end of the year may be ahead of last year, but certainly no record.

The city continues to search for drilling sites and the production superintendent hopes for good wells to maintain the quality of water that Hereford is accustomed to having.

## Corvette fanciers flock to museum

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. (AP) -- They came in twos across the country, lured to the rolling hills of western Kentucky by a common affection. Their destination: the National Corvette Museum, a \$15 million shrine to 41 years of a sports car.

A caravan of Corvettes covering 1953 to 1994 -- which state police estimated at 3,500 cars stretched over nearly 70 miles -- converged on the museum Friday for its opening. It took more than two hours for them to exit the interstate.

"This is a one-time happening on planet Earth," Jim Perkins, general manager of Chevrolet, told nearly 10,000 people in the museum parking lot. "I don't think we'll ever see this collection of Corvette lovers again."

"Wow," uttered museum president Dan Gale, who lives outside Boston but has spent 28 months in Bowling Green. "This looks like Woodstock, kind of."

Run by a non-profit foundation, the 68,000-square-foot museum holds more than 50 Corvettes that include one-of-a-kind prototypes worth up to \$500,000 each. It is across the road from the General Motors Corp. plant where Corvettes have been made since 1981.

Owners who completed the pilgrimage Friday said they were drawn more by their fellow enthusiasts than the Fiberglas, steel and rubber that is the American-built two-seater.

"Corvette crazy, I guess you'd call it," said Wendell Hill, 49, of Louisville, polishing the hood of his 1991 red convertible. "You hate to say it to somebody who's never owned one, but it just doesn't seem like it's real life without a Corvette."

"You'd stand there and you'd see a little guy, a big guy, an old guy, a younger-like guy. You know, there's no pattern. It's just the way this car does people. Regardless of what year you're driving or what you've got, everybody is just all so eager to talk to you, help you. It's great."

Lt. Gov. Paul Patton commissioned Gale an honorary Kentucky

colonel, the highest state award given to civilians. And Patton recalled how he first became acquainted with Corvettes.

He said his daughter had returned from college on academic probation.

"She looked me in the eye and said, 'Dad, if I make the dean's list this semester, will you buy me a Corvette?' I agreed real rapidly because I knew she couldn't make the dean's list and because I didn't know how much a Corvette costs," Patton said. "Needless to say, she's got a Corvette."

The highlight of the museum opening was the endless caravan, which converged at Bowling Green from Louisville and Nashville, Tenn., after collecting drivers from 100 cities nationwide.

At one point, the line of Corvettes in every imaginable color stretched 49 miles to the north and 20 miles to the south along Interstate 65.

Organizers asked drivers to park at the sprawling Corvette plant nearby. Steve Sokoloff of Philadelphia waited at the museum early Friday for his wife to arrive driving the couple's 1953 Corvette in the caravan. He also was watching his other '53 convertible, the sixth one ever manufactured out of only 300 produced that year. He pulled it to Kentucky on a trailer.

"The caravan has been really exciting, to go down the road and it's just 'vette after 'vette after 'vette,'" Sokoloff said. "We talk Corvettes. We talk our passion, our love. We're just happy to all be together on a great day. There's nothing a Corvette owner likes to do better than drive his car."

Nearby, a funeral director from San Antonio, Texas, was detailing his 1994 white convertible. Dick Dixon drove to the opening with his wife, Elsie, who boasted that she once raced the car 153 mph on a West Texas highway.

"It's just been a fantastic experience," Dixon said. "It's nice to see so much enthusiasm for the museum. That's why we're here."

The Dixons described buying their Corvette as a lifelong dream, a sentiment reflected in their Texas license tag: "AT LAST."

# 1996 presidential hopefuls use PACs to raise campaign funds

WASHINGTON (AP) -- As political committees go, Leadership for America had a sluggish first year, raising a paltry \$18,570. But since 1993 gave way to 1994, things have gotten a bit busier, to the tune of \$125,000.

After all, Sen. Phil Gramm may well run for president.

The Texas Republican's name doesn't appear on organizational documents filed by Leadership for America. Nor, for that matter, does former Defense Secretary Dick Cheney's name appear on reports filed by an outfit called Alliance for American Leadership.

But Gramm and Cheney are using the organizations to help lay the foundation for likely 1996 runs, taking advantage of campaign-finance regulations that allow them to raise and spend money that does not count against the limits on declared presidential candidates.

Leadership for America and Alliance for American Leadership are among dozens of so-called "leadership PACs" registered with the Federal Election Commission.

Such committees are used by prominent politicians to support their campaign travels, to keep key advisers employed between elections and to make friends by donating to candidates for Congress, governor and other offices.

Another potential 1996 GOP contender, Sen. Bob Dole of Kansas, for years has financed his political activities through a PAC called

Campaign America, and this year it raised \$6.5 million through the end of July.

So Dole had no hesitation in being generous to Republican candidates, giving \$178,000 to 62 House and Senate contenders. He also gave more than \$100,000 to state-level GOP candidates.

Ironically, Dole's PAC received \$10,000 from the Republican Fund for the '90s, the political committee of another 1996 GOP prospect, former Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander.

In Gramm's case, Leadership for America has received little scrutiny because it was virtually dormant for its first year, revving up its fundraising just recently.

Its reports show funds used for several Gramm trips to Iowa, which holds the kickoff caucuses of the 1996 campaign. So far, however, Gramm hasn't been in any rush to contribute to other Republicans.

Leadership for America records show only two candidate contributions: \$500 to Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad and \$1,000 to George W. Bush, the Republican gubernatorial nominee in Texas. "This is obviously not meant to be an enormous operation," said Gramm spokesman Larry Neal.

Likewise, Alexander has mostly paid for travel with his federal PAC, which reported raising \$250,000 and spending \$230,000 through June 30. It has contributed a total of \$2,500 to three GOP congressional candidates. Alexander also has a state PAC for contributions to state-level candi-

dates.

Cheney's Alliance For American Leadership has raised \$830,000 since being established six months ago and contributed nearly \$150,000 to Republican candidates: \$52,000 to gubernatorial hopefuls, \$72,000 to Senate contenders and \$23,000 to House candidates.

"Needless to say, you build good will by donating" to fellow Republicans, said David Addington, who is running Cheney's political shop.

Beneficiaries of Cheney's good will include virtually every Republican gubernatorial candidate. And by using their PACs, Cheney, Dole and the others can contribute more to House and Senate candidates than they could as individuals.

Individuals are limited to \$2,000 in an election cycle; PACs, however, can give \$5,000 for a primary and another \$5,000 for the general election.

Among the candidates who have benefited from that rule are Rep. Rick Santorum and Oliver North, the GOP Senate nominees in Pennsylvania and Virginia, respectively. Cheney, through Alliance for American Leadership, contributed \$5,000 to each of them in June. Dole's Campaign America

has donated \$5,000 or more to 21 GOP candidates.

In addition to being able to give more to candidates than they could as individuals, having such committees allows their sponsors to raise more money from loyal patrons. An individual, for example, could give a maximum of \$2,000 to Gramm's Senate campaign fund. But that same person could also give \$5,000 to Gramm's PAC.

Records show most Leadership for America donors also have contributed to Gramm's Senate committees. Also, five of the six political action committees that have made contributions to Leadership for America gave to Gramm's Senate fund.

Ogden Allsbrook Jr., a University of Georgia economics professor, for example, last June contributed the maximum \$2,000 to Gramm's Senate committee. This May, Allsbrook gave \$5,000 to Leadership for America.

Another Gramm campaign contributor, Colorado businessman Philip Anschutz, also contributed \$1,000 to Leadership for America. But Gramm may not be Anschutz' first choice for president: he has given nearly \$7,000 to Dole's PAC in the past 18 months.

## Conspiracy allegation denied by Whitehead

LONGVIEW, Texas (AP) -- The mayor of Longview has accused his predecessor, State Treasurer Martha Whitehead, of aiding a hospital she had worked for by opposing better vehicular access to another institution.

Mayor I.J. Patterson contended that Mrs. Whitehead plotted with former city manager Jim Baugh to benefit Good Shepherd Medical Center, where she was vice president for resource development, the Longview News-Journal says in its Saturday editions.

But Mrs. Whitehead, a Democrat, called the report "irrational." She was mayor from May 1991 to June 1993 before she accepted Gov. Ann Richards' appointment as state treasurer.

"He (Patterson) is trying to discredit me to further the political

goals of my opponent," she said. "I think it is a very, very serious allegation to allege a conspiracy between the city manager and me to prohibit such a project moving forward."

Patterson, a Republican, denied he is attempting to aid David Hartman, Republican candidate for state treasurer. He said he was only pointing out the type of administrator Baugh was.

The News-Journal said it could find no documents to support Patterson's claim and says it couldn't find any former or present council members or staff to back his charge.

Mrs. Whitehead said she has no recollection of opposing the widening of Hollybrook Drive in Longview near Longview Regional Hospital.

# Small dealers being squeezed out as Levi Strauss sets buying limit

MACOMB, Ill. (AP) - About 40 years ago, Nelson's clothing and tailor shop on the town square introduced an exclusive line of jeans - Levi's.

The loyalty of small shops across America like Nelson's helped San Francisco-based Levi Strauss & Co. grow from a provider of working men's dungarees into a \$6 billion fashion industry colossus.

Now, Levi's is cutting off the small retailers.

The company has told Nelson's and hundreds of shops nationwide that they will lose their Levi's franchises unless orders for 1994 reach \$10,000 by Nov. 27. Levi's officials say it's just not profitable to service such small accounts anymore.

Red Nelson says Levi's is just greedy.

At least one regular customer says he'll switch brands rather than go to a bigger store.

"There are those of us who prefer the personalized service Nelson's provides. And now they're out of luck," said Dick Spencer, a college teacher.

Tom Fano, Levi's vice president for customer relations, said purging small accounts will allow Levi's to better serve its larger outlets, which handle more sizes, colors and styles.

"This was a very difficult thing for us to do," Fano said. "We are trying to be as fair as possible. But we have to be concerned about the long-term viability of the company."

He noted other companies, such as Nike, Timberland and Levi's competitor Lee Apparel, which makes Lee and Wrangler jeans, have minimum-purchase agreements.

But store owners say Levi's is different, because of its long association with the small shops.

They say Levi's has forgotten its roots and is betraying the shops that nurtured what the company describes as a transformation of its riveted denim "waist overalls" from gold miner's work clothes into the "uniform of a generation."

"Levi's wants volume," said Mike Tatz, whose grandfather started selling Levi's 80 years ago at Zoot's in Chicago. Zoot's specializes in big and tall sizes for blue-collar workers,

who were once Levi's customer base.

"From a moral standpoint, yes they owe our store. From a business standpoint, I guess not," Tatz said.

Fano said the affected stores represent less than 3 percent of the independent clothiers selling Levi's and less than one-fourth of 1 percent of all Levi's outlets.

That doesn't help customers in South Carolina's Dorchester County. They would face a 100-mile round trip into Charleston to buy Levi's if they lose their county's only outlet, Warshaw's in Walterboro.

And owners like Tatz question where Levi's will achieve any savings.

About five years ago, Levi's eliminated the expense of providing sales representatives for the small stores. Instead, small customers order by phone toll-free from catalogs, an arrangement Fano said will remain, and may be expanded. He would not offer specific areas where savings will occur.

"Levi's is discarding a lot of business," Tatz said.

## Man charged with homicide in deaths of Amarillo pair

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Authorities charged a 23-year-old Amarillo man with murder Friday after two teen-agers were shot in the face outside his home.

A Potter County jailer said bond was set at \$150,000 for Reginald Dewayne Brown.

Stacy Morgan, 19, and Reginald Simmons, 17, both died of gunshot wounds outside Brown's home late Thursday, said police Sgt. Gerald Bailey.

Morgan's body was found in the front passenger seat of a car parked on the curb, Bailey said. Simmons' body was in the street, he said.

"The report sounds like some type of feud's been going on for a while," Bailey said.

The suspect called 911 after the shooting, he said.

The homicides were Amarillo's third and fourth this week.

"We're having a bad week," Bailey said.

## Friend's persistence pays off after 50 years

TEXARKANA, Texas (AP) - A Texarkana fighter pilot who crashed to his death half a century ago is

finally returning home, ending years of searching by friends and family.

the remains back to Hawaii for testing.

Two years later, Robert Bowden, one of Bennett's high school buddies who happened to be stationed on the island, tried searching for his friend but was restricted.

Wayland Bennett will be brought back to Texarkana on Sept. 16, which is MIA Observance Day. Family members will be joined by government and military officials at a 2 p.m. ceremony.

Bennett's remains were recovered by U.S. Army officials earlier this year and were held at the Central Identification Laboratory in Hawaii for extensive analysis. Family members were notified Aug. 25.

Bennett, who flew with the famed Black Sheep Squadron, was barely 20 when his plane went down Oct. 22, 1943, on a training run. The right wing of his Corsair folded and he plunged into dense jungle on Espiritu Santo, an island 1,200 miles northeast

of Australia.

In 1949, the military deemed the remains unrecoverable. But Bowden never gave up.

In 1988, Bowden talked with a local pilot about his missing friend. Dan Bookout joined in the search for Bennett, setting up communication networks with natives of Espiritu Santo.

The search effort, which was financed by many Texarkana businesses and residents, was rewarded when natives reported a new crash site last fall to established checkpoints on the island.

A team of Army specialists excavated the site in April and flew

Bought a pair of blue jeans the other day for the first time in years. You see, I decided at some time that I was too old and plump (translate fat) to wear jeans and besides I never found them very comfortable. Anyhow, the pair I took home was too long. In the days when I was a teenager, too long didn't matter because we rolled up the pants legs. Remember? Saddle oxfords, bobby sox and jeans rolled up to mid-shin. Girls in my high school wore their jeans in that style while the guys simply turned up the hem slightly. Back to the current jeans. The occasion was vacation and there was the chance I would walk in some rough country (didn't happen) and jeans seemed a good buy.

So, I rolled the pants legs up a dab, but not enough to cause my fashion-conscious daughter embarrassment, and found jeans more comfortable than I'd remembered. Comfort may be defined as too big. Then, I got to thinking about some of the styles in jeans, and other clothing, through the years. Hip-huggers, bell-bottoms, frayed hems I associate with the '70s. There were times when I felt some of these items weren't too clean but I never had to worry about my daughters. They'd change clothes 10 times a day to stay clean. You know, squeaky clean. The only deterrent was they had to do the ironing.

Teenage clothing fads are with us always. Besides jeans (putting blue in front of jeans only became necessary when jeans came out in all kinds of colors), a very necessary article of clothing when I was in high school was a pair of riding pants. Not jodphurs (in rural West Texas not many people could pronounce that correctly, let alone spell it) but riding pants. The legs were tapered from the hips to the ankles and looked quite fetching on must young girls.

Buying a pair was a major investment for that day and age. Imagine spending \$20 or \$25 on a pair of girl's pants! Usually they were wool and only comfortable for wearing during cold weather. While some places in those days didn't allow girls to wear slacks to school, there was no such ban in my school.

Maybe the reason was so many students rode big yellow buses to school in all kinds of weather. Not only was this mode of transportation rough and slow but almost devoid of heating. Pants weren't a luxury, they were a necessity.

But, the clothing fad that stays with me best created a near disaster

in my family and sent me the closest I ever came to running away from home.

My best friend -- from the first grade on -- was an only child whose parents owned a drygoods store. Buying trips always produced neat new clothes for her. (Never satisfied, though, she often complained that her mother couldn't sew her things like mine did. My cross complaint was I never got to buy anything in a store.)

For some reason, one spring's buying trip brought a supply of white coveralls to the store. Probably purchased in a moment of extreme fatigue, my friend's parents then faced the need to clear out this inventory.

Cynically, I might think now that they sent their daughter to school in white coveralls to start a fad. Truthfully, I don't think so because they were the next thing to another set of parents for me.

Anyhow, my friend wore white coveralls to school and a mini-run started on the store, by boys and girls, both sexes wanting a pair of the new item. If memory serves, a pair cost about \$15 (remember this is in the post-World War II era) and I didn't have \$15, but I had a strong yen for white coveralls.

Parents, even after hours of railing, whining, crying and begging, would not relent. No way would I have white coveralls. "You won't wear them but once." "Why would you want those ugly coveralls?" "No, no, no."

Where could I turn next? My grandfather had no truck with girls wearing men's clothing so he would not be willing to float me a loan. But, what about my grandmother? She could be a soft touch.

At first I thought my parents had beaten me to her because she said she didn't think I needed that particular item of attire. "But, everyone has some," was not an argument that swayed her.

This round-and-round battle went on for days. Finally, maybe to shut me up, my grandmother forked over the money.

Boy, did I feel great when I showed up at school in white coveralls! I didn't feel so good when I saw how dirty they got so quickly. And I felt even worse when I found the coveralls washed and laying on my bed.

The message from my mother was clear: you wanted them, you take care of them.

White coveralls never were so great, again, after that first ironing.

## Like in war, there is a cost to peace

WASHINGTON (AP) - Peace costs money. Whether it's in the Middle East, the Balkans or Northern Ireland, every peace plan comes with a hefty price tag. But the money isn't always easy to find. Palestinians have seen very little of the more than \$2 billion the world promised to provide over five years. Billions were promised to the states that emerged from the rubble of the Soviet Union. There's no clear accounting of how much got there and what happened to the money that did. Now there's promise of a cease-fire in Northern Ireland and talk of finding money to make it stick. Down the road is the likelihood of action to oust the military leaders of Haiti. The restoration of democracy to the island nation is certain to require action to create a viable economy. Foreign aid has taken a far

different tack in the 1990s. There once was a time when the best road to financial stability for a nation seemed to be to declare war on the United States. The best examples were Germany and Japan, which received billions in U.S. help to rebuild their economies after World War II. Then came the Cold War when a pledge of anti-communism would unleash a flow of dollars, sometimes to regimes with no more fondness for democracy than the Kremlin. In today's world, if old enemies are willing to shake hands and lay down their guns, the United States and its allies are ready to pledge their help for economic development. The Clinton administration greeted the news of a cease-fire in Northern Ireland this week with a promise to look at ways to "facilitate and encourage the peace process ... including facilitating economic development."

No specific pledges were made, but the impression was, particularly in Ireland, that dollars would be available. The same was true a year ago when Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization signed a peace agreement. Within days nations pledged to provide more than \$2 billion over five years to help the Palestinians. Nine months later, the Palestinians had seen only a trickle of that money. Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., chairman of the Senate subcommittee that would deal with any request for additional funds for Northern Ireland, said Thursday there was no chance Congress would act this year.

"There's money already in the pipeline," said Leahy. "There's no urgency." He pointed out that the United States already is the largest contributor at nearly \$20 million annually to the International Fund for Ireland. Leahy said that after a rocky start the international fund was doing effective work providing jobs and opportunities. "Before any more money could go to Ireland, we'd have to determine what other part of the world we'd cut it out of," he said. EDITOR'S NOTE - Donald M. # Indian teens face tribal justice, not court sentence

KLAWOCK, Alaska (AP) - There were no lawyers, no oaths, no objections. The 12 judges drank the juice of a thorny plant, wore deerskin tunics and had the courtroom cleansed of evil spirits.  
This was justice, Tlingit style.

Two Klawock teen-agers who robbed and severely beat a pizza deliveryman in Everett, Wash., a year ago stood before the Kuye'di Kuiu Kwaan Tribal Court on Thursday.

The court could decide to banish Adrian Guthrie and Simon Roberts, both 17, to separate, uninhabited

islands as punishment. They would live off the land, purify themselves and reflect on the shame they brought to their people.

Last month, a Washington state judge postponed sentencing the pair to see if Tlingit (pronounced CLINK-ut) justice would work better than prison.

The hearing was being held in a faded, wooden, single-story hall used primarily for twice-weekly bingo games.

Before the two youths were brought in through the "entrance of shame," the Tlingits took 45 minutes to cleanse the hall of evil spirits.

Klawock elder Theodore Roberts, a frail man with a baseball cap proclaiming him a "Super Tlingit," flailed vigorously at the walls with a branch of devil's club, a thorny plant common in the region.

"Ha KEEN ah! Ha KEEN ah!" he shouted in Tlingit, exhorting the spirits to depart.

A procession of women walked slowly toward the hall's entrance, led by a woman beating slowly on a drum.

Then the judges entered, dressed in Tlingit regalia. Byron Skinna Sr. wore a large, round hat made of wood, which included a carving and salmon designs with abalone inlays. Most judges wore red and black ceremonial blankets studded with dozens of white buttons.

The eldest elder, 92-year-old George Jim of Angoon, urged the Indians in Tlingit to preserve their culture and legal traditions.

"He says that for too long now, white people have trampled down on our words, our culture, our tradition," translated elder Richard Dalton Sr. "We must reactivate the Tlingit tribal courts, the tradition and culture. We must move together forward as brothers and sisters ... that way we will not fall apart."

Everyone entering the room was purified by being brushed with a cedar bough and wiping their feet at the door. Just before the boys began to testify, the judges drank devil's club juice - another purification ritual.

The baby-faced defendants wore their tribal garments inside out to

signify the shame they have brought on their tribe.

The youths testified they had gotten drunk on rum at a party the night of the attack. Guthrie said they got the idea from another boy who bragged that he had mugged pizza deliverymen "to make quick cash."

They admitted ordering a pizza from a phone booth and giving a false address, then ambushing the deliveryman as he returned to his car. Roberts said he struck Tim Whittlesey two or three times in the head with a baseball bat.

Whittlesey, 25, said outside the hall that he can no longer hear through his right ear and has lost half the hearing in his left ear. The beating also worsened a previous eye injury and impaired his vision.

Whittlesey attended the hearing with his wife, father and uncle. They sat in the back of the hall as the boys expressed remorse.

"I feel sorry what happened to him, the victim, and the shame I've put my family through and having to be here today," Roberts said.

# Birth of white buffalo sacred sign, focus of pilgrimages by Indians

JANESVILLE, Wis. (AP) - News of the birth of a rare white buffalo is spreading among American Indians, inspiring pilgrimages to what many tribes believe is a sacred, apocalyptic animal.

"This is like the second coming of Christ on this island of North America," said Floyd Hand, a Sioux medicine man from Pine Ridge, S.D. "The legend is she would return and

unify the nations of the four colors - the black, red, yellow and white."

The white calf named Miracle was born two weeks ago at the southern Wisconsin farm where Dave Heider raises a herd of 14 buffalo and other animals. He plans to have it tested to see if it is a true albino.

The white buffalo is particularly sacred to the Cheyenne, Sioux and other nomadic tribes of the Northern Plains that once relied on the buffalo

for subsistence, said Matthew Snipp, a University of Wisconsin sociology and Indian studies professor.

The white buffalo's spiritual significance stems from its rarity. In the 1800s, when up to 80 million of the huge animals roamed the Plains, the odds against having an albino calf were estimated at one in 10 million, according to the National Buffalo Association. Relentless hunting reduced the buffalo population to about 500 in the late 1800s; there are about 130,000 today.

"The impact of this and enormity of it to the Red Nation is immense," said Harry Brown Bear of Wisconsin's Oneida tribe. "This was meant to be because the teachings of our people and elders say there would be a time the Anglo nation and American Indian would come together in goodness."

As of Wednesday, about 30 people from the Oneida, Cherokee, Sioux and a half dozen other tribes had visited the calf, Heider said.

"One woman flew in from Arizona, paid her respects, and then she was gone," he said.

Visitors have held ceremonies involving prayers, burning incense or smoking a ceremonial pipe. To help protect the calf, they have left medicine bags, turquoise, alabaster and a medicine ring made of sage and red, yellow, blue and green ribbons.

The items hang from a small tree at the edge of a field where Heider's

buffalo graze. Like most newborns, the white calf stays close to her 1,100-pound mother and spends much of her time feeding.

Brown Bear, keeper of the sacred pipe for his tribe, said a prayer when he visited the farm last weekend. He also loaded the pipe with tobacco, then took it home to De Pere to be shared with other tribal members.

A delegation from the Oglala Lakota Sioux will visit the farm this month with spiritual food and other gifts for the calf and the Heiders, Hand said in a telephone interview.

Sue Wittig, a Chippewa from Milwaukee, has set up a trust fund at a Janesville bank for donations to help Heider care for the calf.

"They are sacred to all tribes. She is important to all Native American people," Wittig said. "It's been predicted that it would be born again. I look at it as a chance for peace, an opportunity for healing."

Heider said Miracle has brown eyes and is probably not a pure albino, characterized by pinkish skin and eyes. He said there was a chance she would grow a dark or reddish-brown coat after shedding her first coat.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Genevieve Bujold is going where no woman has gone before: to the helm of a "Star Trek" series.

"Star Trek: Voyager" follows "Star Trek: The Next Generation," which concluded its seven-year syndicated run in May, and "Star

Trek: Deep Space Nine," which continues in syndication.

The United-Paramount network, operated by Paramount Television Group and BHC Communications Inc., has signed 41 affiliates so far for its January launch.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Nirvana has postponed plans to release a compilation of live recordings because the band is still dealing with Kurt Cobain's suicide.

The compilation, announced just this month, was to have been half of a double album released this fall.

"I first entered this project with an air of optimism and an overall good vibe, knowing that releasing the music would be the ultimate tribute to Kurt," bassist Krist Novoselic said in a statement Tuesday.

"The live record is going to happen, but not now."

## Several ranked schools struggle in season debuts

The top 10 high school football teams in Class 5A didn't exactly tear through the opposition on opening night.

Four of them started the season with losses, and a fifth began with a tie.

No. 1 Aldine MacArthur wasn't among them, however, as the Generals held No. 2 Fort Bend Willowridge to 98 yards Friday night in a 16-3 victory.

"We were real inconsistent on offense, and that's because Willowridge has such a great team defensively," said MacArthur coach Bob Alpert, whose Generals gained 229 yards against a Willowridge squad that allowed about 130 yards per game last season.

"On a normal team, we probably would have scored four or five more times," Alpert said.

Willowridge took a 3-0 lead, then MacArthur junior quarterback Odell James took over, gaining 112 yards on 20 carries with touchdown runs of 15 yards and 1 yard.

The MacArthur defense, which returned just three starters from last

season's 12-4 Class 5A Division II state runner-up, forced five fumbles and picked off a pass.

"We're still No. 1," Alpert proclaimed.

Defending 5A Division II champions and preseason No. 3 Lewisville lost to unranked Plano, 10-7.

No. 7 Alief Elsik was shut out by unranked La Porte, 9-0; Richardson Lake Highlands lost to Irving Nimitz, 25-16; and No. 4 Converse Judson (0-0-1) tied San Angelo Central, 14-14.

Those upsets could mean a move up in the rankings for Abilene Cooper, which pounded Brownwood, 54-0. No. 9 Euless Trinity beat Arlington Bowie 28-17, and No. 6 Spring Westfield beat Temple, 38-17.

Upsets weren't so common in the other four classes, where the top-ranked teams in The Associated Press preseason poll won by a combined score of 164-38.

In 4A, Torio Kelly scored on runs of 5 and 45 yards and rushed for 121 yards as No. 1 Sulphur Springs beat Carthage, 36-7. The Wildcats scored 22 first-quarter points, including two

## Rossley brought SMU back to respectability

DALLAS (AP) - Southern Methodist University's bad luck has changed. By all rights Tom Rossley should have been on down the road by now.

Someone as talented as Rossley usually doesn't have to suffer long in a rebuilding program. Larger schools with bigger paydays make it tempting to pack and leave.

Don't pay the ransom. Rossley didn't escape.

"I was worried about losing him," admitted interim athletic director Bill Lively on the day the school offered and Rossley accepted a contract extension to 1998. "It doesn't happen everyday somebody gets a contract extension with a losing record."

In three years Rossley had produced an 8-23-2 football miracle at the NCAA probation-devastated school. Last year was the first year the Mustangs could even redshirt most of their freshmen class like other schools do. Previously, Rossley had to hurl his young men into the fight, ready or not.

SMU needs Rossley worse than he needs the Mustangs. The school will change to the Western Athletic Conference in two years. The Mustangs need to hit the ground running to keep their credibility factor high.

The challenge is formidable. But Rossley gives it a hard fish-eye look.

"I believe within the period of my contract we can produce a championship team at SMU," Rossley said.

Bold words.

Major changes have to happen at SMU both on and off the field.

"We need to become Dallas' collegiate football team," Rossley said. "We've had some great days at Ownby Stadium and that time period when we came off probation drew us closer to the student body. Now, we have to look to a bigger tomorrow. We need to take the next step."

The next step is moving out of Ownby and going back to either the Cotton Bowl or Texas Stadium. Crowds have been less than what a good high school playoff game averages.

There will be stiff political infighting among the SMU alumni and city fathers. Texas Stadium is the place they should go but there is sentiment for the Cotton Bowl from a civic pride standpoint.

The benefits of Texas Stadium are obvious. Besides being a newer stadium, better parking, and better location, it's a recruiting bonanza.

Suppose you are a hot schoolboy running back in Texas and Rossley

tells you there's a locker in Texas Stadium with your number on it, No. 22.

It would be mighty tempting to hang your shoulder pads where Emmitt Smith hangs his.

Rossley tries to be diplomatic about the upcoming debate over SMU's new home. But he admits: "Texas Stadium would be hard to pass up."

That's off the field.

On the field, Rossley feels he has his best team.

One of the big reasons is what he calls "the 20 mules we redshirted plus Chris Bordano, who played as a freshman."

Now, the Mustangs have freshmen backing up positions. In the past, the freshmen were the frontline.

"We're bigger, faster, more mature overall," Rossley said. "That means a lot to a football team."

"I see movement into a new era. There's a big light coming on brightening things up."

It's not a mirage in the desert this time. That light out there could be the real thing.

Linebacker Dick Butkus of the Chicago Bears was an All-Pro in seven of his nine seasons.

# Fox, two-point conversions, Switzer change face of NFL

For those out of touch with football since January when the Dallas Cowboys won their second straight Super Bowl by beating Buffalo 30-13, tuning in to the first NFL game on Sunday will be something of a shock:

- The game isn't on CBS like it should be. It's on Fox, putting it up there around Channel 73 someplace.
- The chubby guy with the hairspray isn't coaching the Cowboys anymore. What's Barry Switzer doing there? And why is their owner whispering the plays in Troy Aikman's ear?
- Hold on. Now they're lining up after a touchdown and going for two points.
- What are Buddy Ryan, Seth Joyner and Clyde Simmons doing with the Arizona Cardinals?
- Where's Phil Simms? In a broadcast booth? And who is that guy named Dave Brown playing quarterback for the Giants?

Say this about the NFL: It certainly stirred things up for its 75th season. Not only will it be hard to tell the players without a scoreboard, it'll be equally tough to know the rules and the TV channel.

Jimmy Johnson is gone after coaching Dallas to two straight Super Bowl victories after finding that he and old pal, Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, couldn't fit both their egos into Texas Stadium, even with that big hole in the roof. Switzer, who hasn't coached since leaving Oklahoma five years ago, is the new guy, leaving things pretty much alone and allowing Emmitt Smith, Troy Aikman and Michael Irvin to do their stuff.

CBS is gone after 40 years because Rupert Murdoch and Fox paid the NFL \$1.58 billion, or about \$400 million more than CBS offered. Fox took along John Madden and Pat Summerall, too, meaning it will look and sound a lot like CBS - except for a score and time box in the upper left-hand corner.

Then there's this two-point conversion stuff, part of an attempt to get more offense in the game after a season of 12-9 and 9-6 yawners.

So far it's been used a lot in exhibitions, but will be used a lot less in regular season, except perhaps by Tampa's Sam Wyche, who isn't called "Wacky" for nothing.

But more scoring is likely to come from more subtle changes involving the kicking game and pass defense. Besides, Denver has put together a team that seems made for 45-42 games.

There are five new coaches,

including Switzer and Ryan, resurrected with the Cardinals, now finally identified by the state of Arizona instead of the city of Phoenix. The others: June Jones in Atlanta, Norv Turner in Washington and Pete Carroll with the New York Jets.

Don Shula, the winningest coach in NFL history, will mark another milestone on Oct. 2 when the Dolphins play Dave Shula's Cincinnati Bengals - the first time father-and-son head coaches have faced each other.

The biggest impact on the NFL this year comes from the new salary cap, which limits each team to spending \$34.6 million on salaries. That has cost high-spending teams like the Giants and the Bills and is supposed to help the Bucs and Bengals by forcing them to spend at least \$30 million.

"You never replace the players you lose," says coach Marv Levy of Buffalo, which will be trying to get the Bills back to a record fifth straight Super Bowl after losing the last four. "Even when you bring in a player of equal ability you lose because he has to learn your system before he's as effective as the guy who left."

Levy lost two key starters: offensive tackle Howard Ballard and cornerback Nate Odomes.

And a lot of other name players have moved or no longer have jobs.

Phil Simms, Karl Mecklenburg, Dennis Smith and Charles Mann, to name four veterans, are no longer playing, and the depth of even the best teams is suspect. Even on the Cowboys, at many positions, the player behind the stars is a marginal or inexperienced guy making the minimum \$162,500.

"It could all go up in smoke very quickly," says Carmen Policy, president of the San Francisco 49ers, now a Super Bowl favorite because of the way they manipulated the salary cap.

"High-priced players are out there with targets on their backs. They'd better perform or their gone," says Giants general manager George Young. The Giants took the opposite route: cleaning out older, pricey players and rebuilding with youth, led by Brown, a third-year player who could be one of the NFL's few rising young quarterbacks.

To the NFL, the emphasis is on offense - particularly touchdowns - after a season in which games averaged only 37.4 points, three points less than in 1990, and in which field goal kickers made more than 70 percent of their attempts.

So the NFL moved kickoffs back

five yards to the 30-yard-line, and lowered tees, a move that in preseason has improved offensive field position by 10 to 15 yards.

It also ordered officials to enforce more stringently the rule against chucking by defensive backs five yards beyond the line of scrimmage. And it approved the use of radios that will allow coaches to whisper plays to quarterbacks rather than wig-wag them from the sideline.

But perhaps the biggest change is one that places the ball on failed field-goal attempts at the spot from which it's kicked, instead of the line of scrimmage - 7 or 8 yards further up the field. In exhibitions, many teams have passed up long field goals and gone for first downs on fourth down.

What the league can't do, of course, is improve the quarterbacking.

Of the NFL's top quarterbacks last season, only Troy Aikman of Dallas was under 30 and of the six quarterbacks voted to the Pro Bowl, three were 37 or older - Simms, Warren Moon and Joe Montana.

Moon and Montana are back, but Moon is in Minnesota instead of Houston, traded because the Oilers have Cody Carlson, their new starter. "I'd have liked to have stayed where I was," Moon says, "but that's what happens in the cap era."

Two of last season's casualties, Miami's Dan Marino and Philadelphia's Randall Cunningham are back from injuries. And for the first time since 1987, there were two rookie quarterbacks who lived up to their billing: Seattle's Rick Mirer and New England's Drew Bledsoe.

Brown, who threw just 10 passes in his first two seasons with the Giants, could be this year's star young QB.

Another could be Detroit's Scott Mitchell, who was impressive for five games replacing Marino in Miami last year until he separated a shoulder. Those five games were enough to earn him an \$11 million, three-year deal with the Lions. The Dolphins could not afford both Mitchell and Marino.

With all that, the favorites for this year remain the teams that won last year, with a few additions - like Ryan's Arizona team.

The NFL's luck looks like it may be good. Scoring is up in exhibitions and major injuries seem down. It already has the spotlight because of the baseball strike.

Now, if people would just stop griping about the salary cap.

# Fox doesn't want to look bad in 1st year broadcasting NFL

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Executive producer Ed Goren particularly likes this saying they have at Fox: "If you can dream it, it can happen."

As the 8-year-old network begins its first NFL season, there is another catch phrase bouncing around the Fox lot that, in so many words, goes: "Don't screw up."

On Sunday, another NFL season starts and, like so many before it, three broadcast networks will share the biggest part of the league's TV assets. Unlike 38 previous seasons, however, the NFL's original network, CBS, is out, and Fox is in.

And while Fox eventually would like to stamp a younger, hipper image and its "Don't have a cow" attitude on coverage, its first order of business is to put football on TV without looking bad.

"We have talked about it and talked about it, and we're going to get it right," said Goren, who won 10 Emmys in his 28 years at CBS.

In a season of big change in the NFL itself, television coverage of the league also is undergoing a major shakeup, and it could stimulate some interesting competition among networks.

"CBS had been there all those years, and we knew what they had," NBC Sports executive producer Tommy Roy said. "We're always looking for a better way, but with Fox there, it's made us look at some new things."

At ABC, they're celebrating the 25th anniversary of "Monday Night Football" by going back to their Hank Williams opening and bringing in Brent Musburger to host a halftime show heavily laced with Sunday replays, like the good old days.

At Michaels, Frank Gifford and Dan Dierdorf begin their eighth season together in the Monday night broadcast booth.

The Monday night schedule starts Sept. 5 with the L.A. Raiders at San Francisco, a game many believe is a preview of the Super Bowl, which ABC also has this season.

The big change at NBC is in the pregame show.

Greg Gumbel, late of CBS, replaces Jim Lampley as host of "NFL Live," just one year after Lampley replaced Bob Costas. Also missing, for obvious reasons, will be O.J. Simpson.

Gumbel will be joined on "NFL Live" by Will McDonough, Ahmad Rashad, former CBS reporter Jim Gray, and former coaches Mike Ditka and Joe Gibbs.

The question for Gumbel is: How can he recreate the chemistry he enjoyed with Terry Bradshaw for so many years on "NFL Today" at CBS?

The answer, he says, is simple. "I'm convinced you can't manufacture that," Gumbel said. "It either comes or it doesn't. A lot of people used to come up to me and say, 'You know, that relationship you have with Terry looks genuine.' C'mon, you can't fake that."

"I'm not saying you have to be good friends to make a good show together, but the interplay has to be genuine."

During Gumbel's time at CBS, the network first lost the NBA, then baseball, then the NFL to Fox last December for a staggering bid of \$1.58 billion over four years. That made Gumbel's decision to leave CBS almost automatic.

"I'm not a golf or tennis announcer," he said.

In this sea of change, Sunday night cable coverage will remain a constant beacon. TNT has the first half of the season, starting with San Diego at Denver, and ESPN takes over on Nov. 6 with the Raiders at Kansas City.

Gumbel and Goren were only part of the CBS exodus.

After he left, Goren brought with him Bradshaw and the entire CBS A-Team of announcers John Madden and Pat Summerall, producer Bob Stenner and director Sandy Grossman. For Madden alone, Fox paid a reported \$32 million for four years, more than any player in the NFL.

"I'd have kept everybody together if I could," Goren said. "I would have sent a relief plane into Lillehammer and flown them all to safety, if I could. That's what we're doing after all - flying people to safety."

# Rangers turn bad shortstop into pitching prospect

TULSA, Okla. - Julio Santana hails from the City of Shortstops - San Pedro de Marcoris in the Dominican Republic, famed for producing major-league players such as Tony Fernandez, Manuel Lee, Alfredo Griffin and Mariano Duncan.

The Texas Rangers hoped Santana would continue that legacy when they signed him four years ago at age 17.

Instead, Santana has emerged as the Rangers' top minor-league pitching prospect, quite an achievement for a player who despised the position while growing up.

"I didn't like pitching," Santana said. "But my family and friends would always tell me, 'You should be a pitcher, you have a great arm.' I said, 'Don't talk to me about that, I don't like that.' But I did like it when I realized I couldn't hit."

After signing with the Rangers, Santana started adding pounds to his 6-foot frame and his batting average dropped. The weight took away his agility at shortstop and he hit just .247 with 14 extra-base hits in 243 at-bats during three seasons on the Rangers' summer Dominican Republic team.

"He wasn't hitting with any power," Rangers scouting director Sandy Johnson said. "He didn't have any bat speed. That's what you're looking for and he didn't have it."

That's when the Rangers, knowing he had a strong arm, decided to try him as a pitcher. They found no resistance from Santana.

"I couldn't hit," Santana said.

## Two-point tries won't be seen in regular season

NEW YORK (AP) - The two-point conversion is the NFL rule change that is getting the most attention. But it's likely to have less effect on the sport's attempt to increase touchdowns than several more subtle moves made in the offseason.

Despite the fact that two-point conversions were tried after more than a quarter of the touchdowns in the first few weeks of the exhibition season, that percentage is unlikely to hold when play starts for real.

More significant will be the change requiring that after a missed field goal, the ball is placed at the spot of the kick rather than the line of scrimmage.

"Strategically, the new rule forced us to go for it," San Diego coach Bobby Ross said after passing up a 46-yard field goal attempt and going for a first down during the an exhibition game with the New York Giants. The gamble resulted in a touchdown three plays later for the Chargers, who last year had 31 field goals and just 33 touchdowns.

"We'll do that more during the course of the season," Ross says. "I'm not going to back away from that. I think it's a legitimate gamble."

In addition to the new rules on field-goal placement rule and two-point conversion, others are designed to upgrade offenses.

One moves kickoffs back, from the 35 to the 30, and lowers the kicking tee from two or three inches to one. That's resulted in field position improving markedly in exhibitions from the 20 or inside to out around the 30 or 35 yard lines.

Another directs officials to enforce more closely the rule that forbids defensive backs to chuck wide receivers more than five yards from the line of scrimmage.

The most arcane rule gives offensive tackles an extra half-step back to line up, giving them a slight break against pass rushers.

But the sexiest change involves the two-point conversion, although it probably will be used only when absolutely necessary - when a team behind by eight or 15 points scores late in a game or gets behind early by a large margin.

In the first two weeks of exhibitions, 35 two-pointers were tried - after 26 percent of the 133 touchdowns. Eleven of the 35 attempts were successful. That percentage is liable to change when the regular season starts - exhibitions are perfect for practicing two-point plays.

In an informal survey of coaches taken immediately after the rule was changed, only Tampa Bay's Sam Wyche said he would consider going for two to win a game in the final minutes, rather than take the game into overtime.

"Without question, it will open the door for second-guessing," says Jimmy Johnson, the former Dallas coach taking a hiatus in television. "It will depend on the mindset of the coach, but when somebody scores a touchdown late, if they're in the race, they're gonna take the one point and take their chances in overtime."

Baseball Hall of Famer Roy Campanella played the game on a grown-up team at age 12.

laughing and shaking his head. "I couldn't hit at all. I was a power hitter, but my average killed me. I just wanted to be in baseball; I didn't care what position I played. All my life I wanted to play baseball. I don't know what I would be doing if I wasn't playing baseball."

Rangers manager Kevin Kennedy, trying to keep occupied while the players' strike drags on, joined 10,548 fans at Drillers Stadium on a recent Friday night to watch Santana pitch for the Rangers' Double-A Tulsa farm team against the Jackson Generals.

The strike is wearing on Kennedy, but the trip to Tulsa put some sunshine in his dreary no-baseball existence. Santana, in the Drillers' 3-1 victory, lived up to the scouting reports that have been crossing Kennedy's desk during the season.

"This was well worth the trip," Kennedy said. "I saw what I hoped I would see."

Kennedy saw Santana limit the Generals to one unearned run on six hits and two walks while striking out six. Only two of the six hits were hit hard. There were three infield hits and a routine fly ball that center fielder Terrell Lowery lost in the early twilight sky, allowing the Generals' only run to score.

"He had a nice fluid delivery, he threw some good curveballs and changed speeds well," Kennedy said. "He showed pretty good composure out there and handled himself with men on base. He showed some good athletic ability on some balls hit to him. I like what I saw."

In the Drillers' clubhouse, Santana smiled when informed of the big-league manager's compliments.

"It wasn't a good, good game," Santana said. "It was an OK game. I was trying to give my best, for him, for myself and for my teammates. I like it when people come to see me pitch so I can show them what I can do."

Santana has had quite an audience this season. Kennedy is only the latest in a procession of Rangers officials who have traveled to Tulsa just to watch him.

Farm director Marty Scott was there the first night when Santana was promoted from Class-A Charleston and beat Arkansas with a complete game. Assistant general manager Wayne Krivsky, scouting director Johnson and general manager Tom Grieve have followed him. Rangers major-league scout Larry Hardy and third-base coach Dave Oliver joined Kennedy.

That Aug. 26 victory raised

Santana's record to 7-2 with a 2.90 earned-run average. He was 6-7 with a 2.46 ERA at Charleston before the promotion.

"He's come a long way and he's still feeling his way out there," Johnson said. "He has a very good baseball aptitude. From Day 1, he hasn't really struggled with anything that he's been taught. He seems to grasp things like a sponge. He's come a lot faster than we thought. We didn't think he'd be in Double A this quick."

Santana's story is not the usual Latin American rags-to-potential riches tale. He was not a child born in abject poverty who had to fight his way out of the San Pedro ghettos. He came to America with more than the shirt on his back.

Santana's father is an architect in San Pedro de Marcoris and Julio led a normal middle class life with a good upbringing and a good education. He has learned English almost as quickly as he's learned pitching and, with an ever-present smile, has adjusted easier to his teammates and the United States than most players who come out of Latin America.

"It's amazing how well he's fit right in," Tulsa manager Stan Cliburn said. "He has a positive happy-go-lucky attitude. He already looks like a big leaguer. He has great work habits, he does all the running program and the

preparation for the game and he's always concentrating on the game, even when he's not pitching."

Santana's first challenge was overcoming his early aversion to pitching. He never pitched growing up in San Pedro de Marcoris, even though his favorite player was Roger Clemens.

A .229 batting average in the 1992 Dominican League convinced Santana that he should try pitching. He made four appearances there and went to spring training the next year as a full-time pitcher.

Santana stayed in extended spring training where Tom House, the Rangers' roving instructor, taught him a changeup to go with his fastball. Armed with two pitches, Santana was an immediate success with the Gulf Coast Rookie League Rangers. He was the team's closer, going 4-1 with a 1.38 ERA and 50 strikeouts in 39 innings.

He was so impressive the Rangers felt compelled to add him to their 40-man roster, an extraordinary move for a player who had played only one year in the short-season Rookie League.

The move also gave Santana a chance to come to spring training with the big-league team, where he learned to throw a curve under the tutelage of pitching coach Claude Osteen and special adviser Sandy Koufax.

"It's a good pitch for him," Kennedy says. "I wanted him to throw more curveballs and that's what he did tonight. When he does that, he's very effective."

The product remains unfinished. The Rangers might promote Santana if the strike is settled, but don't look for an immediate savior to the club's pitching woes. He's walking an average of more than five batters per nine innings, a result of his tendency to overthrow, and he's learning the art of setting up hitters.

"Sometimes he'll rear back and try to throw his fastball 96 miles per hour rather than just staying smooth and easy and throwing it 93 or 94," Cliburn said. "He gets himself into jams, but he always finds a way to get out of it."

If Santana is called up, Johnson said the ideal situation would be to use him in no-pressure middle relief just to get him some big-league experience. He will also pitch in winter ball, although the Rangers don't want him overdoing it because he has already pitched 162 2/3 innings this season.

If all goes well in winter ball, Santana is expected to go to spring training and compete for a job with the big-league club next year.

### NUTRITION EMERGENCY KITS

Even the consumers who plan to eat a healthful lunch, may find themselves wrapped up in work until well past lunch time. By then, hunger hits and all the food in sight looks good.

There's a better way to settle those hunger pains than going to the nearest vending machines, according to Colleen Pierre, an ambassador for the American Dietetic Association. Pierre's solution is to keep two "Nutrition Emergency Kits"—one in your briefcase and another in your desk drawer or glove compartment.

A nutrition kit should contain foods that are close to a meal without much fat, calories or sodium. It should have protein, vitamins, minerals and fiber.

The Food Pyramid can be used as a guide to find out the number of

servings. In some cases, a rough count of the calories and grams of fat can be done to see if your emergency nutrition kit meets your needs.

Read the nutrition information on the labels. Remember to count 4 grams of fat as a teaspoon if you are counting your fats by teaspoons. Also, keep in mind that there are no "junk" foods. You can include most any food in moderation as long as you plan or allow for it in the total food you have within that day or the next two or three days. Forgetting to adjust for them is what gets us into trouble with those extra pounds that seem to come from nowhere.

Pierre's two quick lunches are part of the 1,800 calories a day for women and 2,800 calories a day for men. She allows 30 percent of the calories to come from fat and for 2400 mg. of sodium a day. Each food must be individually wrapped for freshness and safe at warm temperatures. The kits are short on fruits and vegetables so add them later.

# Ostriches provide fashion decoration

PARIS (AP) - The haughty ostrich looks like a fashion victim: bugging eyes over a rounded beak, stretch neck and skinny legs, and a luxuriously feathered body in between.

But this ornithological oddity provides top couture fillips. The largest living bird and a survivor from prehistory, it also is a fashion must, both for those feathers and its skin.

How do you dress with panache, that certain air of swagger? Add ostrich feathers. Remember Cyrano doffing his hat. Panache means a feather decoration in French, and classy bravado by extension.

A lot of the clothes shown in recent collections quiver with panache. The elegant swirl of ostrich feathers is a luxury plus, whether swung around the shoulders like a boa at Scherrer or flowing on the edge of an ice-blue stretch mini at Herve Leger. Ungaro does a musketeer's hat to go with his jet-beaded fitted suit. Sonia Rykiel sees a silk chiffon wedding dress in hot red with feathers all the way from skirt to train.

"Feathers are divinely sensual and feminine," says Erik Mortensen, couturier at Jean-Louis Scherrer. "They aren't particularly expensive compared to things like jewel embroidery, and they're so versatile - for hems, headdresses, even giving feathery movement to tweeds," he says.

A couture ostrich jacket would be expensive, well up to many thousands of dollars, but South African cooperative factories sell pure ostrich boas starting at 90 rand (about \$25). Specialists painstakingly curl, oil, and dye the feathers, sometimes weaving sprigs into fabrics - a fine art that has developed apace since the 1930s.

Newer in prestige is handsome ostrich skin, a hardy leather with a distinctive dotted surface.

Used in Europe since about the 1930s, it is highly esteemed right now for everything from bags and belts to whole outfits. Since ostriches are being farmed, harvesting their hides does not endanger the species.

At Hermes, they've revived a classic - the Bugatti 27 bag, in ostrich leather - prices beginning about \$3,500.

This comical, loping bird has been around about 800 million years. It has been domesticated since 360 B.C., when Egyptians incubated ostrich eggs in wood-fueled ovens. Babylonian royalty harnessed the ostrich to pull carriages. And ostriches are still raced today.

In the boom years around 1900, ostriches were commercially raised in several countries from the United States to New Zealand and Italy.

They have recently been introduced in England, where they furnish gourmet smoked meat as well as feathers.

The largest commercial operations are based in South Africa, whose breeders banded together around 1950 for better farming and marketing. They today produce 90 percent of ostrich products.

Despite their appearance, ostriches have always been respected. The feathers were a symbol of justice in Egypt. Moses forbade eating ostrich meat - to save the birds for their feathers.

Throughout history, men flaunted status-symbol ostrich feathers as a badge of macho power. From crusaders to musketeers and beyond, ostrich feathers were reserved for royalty and aristocracy.

Since the 14th century, the Prince of Wales's coat of arms has borne three big feathers (emulating the Black Prince who grabbed his defeated foe's feathers and put them on his own hat at Crecy in 1346).

Women wanted to grab some of this panache, too. Marie-Antoinette's couturiere, Rose Bertin, used them in abundance.

The fad grew to such proportions that women in feathered headdresses got turned away from the opera. Those who gained entry were sometimes attacked by other spectators with scissors.

The feathers rose and fell in favor - down during the French Revolution, up again a century later. Toulouse-Lautrec's dance-hall artists, courtesans who swept into Maxim's, and even great ladies were never without their fine feathered fans, boas, hats and cuffs.

Ostrich feathers wilted briefly after both world wars but managed to survive through the flappers and Josephine Baker. Today they are a bigger fashion feature than ever.

However, ostriches are not chickens. "It is a very difficult bird to farm," says A.J. Coetzee, a manager of Klein Karoo Agricultural Cooperative - South Africa's largest association of ostrich farmers.

This giant bird - up to 8 feet tall and 270 pounds - can turn mean. Bigger than ponies, they're not amenable to house-training. Their cloven feet pack a deadly punch.

"They are not suitable as pets," says Coetzee.

Ostriches thrive in near-desert conditions, on tacky soil, and favor fruit, seeds and nuts, plus lizards and turtles when they can get them. Toothless, they often swallow pebbles to help them digest.

Ostrich fodder these days also includes alfalfa, corn and fast-food nutritive pellets.

## Reduce calories in potato salad

A shoo-in at any picnic, the quintessential potato salad has slimmed up for summer without losing the rich flavor. Replacing the classic high-fat dressing is a robust yogurt and nonfat mayonnaise combo. And, instead of hard-cooked whole eggs, this recipe calls for egg whites only. Without the egg yolks, this salad has a lot less dietary cholesterol than the old-fashioned kind. Per serving, you'll save 22 grams of fat and 150 milligrams of cholesterol.

- It's-No-Yolk Potato Salad**  
1/3 cup nonfat mayonnaise or salad dressing  
1/3 cup plain low-fat yogurt  
2 teaspoons Dijon-style or prepared mustard  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/8 teaspoon pepper  
3 hard-cooked eggs  
2-1/2 cups peeled, cubed and cooked potatoes (3 medium)  
1 stalk celery, thinly sliced  
1/4 cup sliced green onion

For dressing, in a large mixing bowl stir together mayonnaise or salad dressing, yogurt, mustard, salt and pepper.

Remove the shells and the yolks from eggs; wrap and refrigerate the yolks for another use. Discard the egg shells. Chop the egg whites.

To the dressing, add chopped egg whites; potatoes, celery and green onion. Toss gently to coat all of the ingredients. Cover and chill for 6 to 24 hours. Makes 6 side-dish servings.

## News about warts

Common and plantar warts are widespread, contagious, and a nuisance, but they are not dangerous. Caused by a virus, they cannot be caught from animals. So much for the stories about frogs and toads. They can, however, be spread from one area of the body to another and from person to person. Common and plantar warts, which are considered harmless, should not be confused with genital warts, which derive from a different virus.

Common warts are often found on the hands and fingers. They are not painful, but rather unattractive. Common warts begin as small, flesh-colored bumps with a rough surface. Plantar warts, which grow on the sole of the foot, generally are larger and flatter than common warts, due to the pressure of standing and walking, and may be mistaken for a callus. Plantar warts can be painful.

supplying medication to the wart, liquids and plasters can irritate the skin around the wart. In addition, liquids and plasters don't keep the wart moist, so daily soaking is required.

"My gut reaction was, nobody leaves this band, except in a coffin," Richards said while answering questions by computer on the Prodigy network.

Original Stones guitarist Brian Jones drowned in a swimming pool in 1969. Wyman's departure in January 1993 left Richards, Mick Jagger and Charlie Watts as the remaining original Stones.

The trio have become like war buddies after three decades together. "It's your battalion, like you've been through something, there are those who are left and you have your battle scars," Richards said. "The intensity is such that it's like a furnace sometimes."

# Cook sees world while fixing food

The McKinney Courier-Gazette MCKINNEY, Texas - Clarence Johnson cracks two eggs and slides the bodies onto the sizzling grill at Bill's Cafe.

His career as an international chef, fry cook, short order cook and finally as a food service manager began there with a healthy curiosity that has shaped his life.

"Experience is the best teacher," says Johnson, who returned from Moscow this spring after four years at the United States embassy. "Lots of chefs can't turn an egg. I taught myself how to be a cook, and I learned all parts of doing it."

When Johnson, 47, came to McKinney via Louisiana in 1970, he got a job at Bill's Cafe. But he had an ambition to see the world.

"Anytime I see an airplane in the sky, I wish I were on it," he says.

He took a job through Greenville-based E-Systems cooking for contract personnel working in Egypt's Sinai Desert, living in crowded barracks and working six eight-hour shifts a week.

"For living in the desert, we had great conditions," Johnson said. "There was a brand new kitchen, and we could cook all day and never break a sweat."

Workers had one week off for every three weeks on, and Johnson traveled the region.

In 1983, Johnson came back to McKinney, opening his own business in 1986.

"I opened a small Mexican food counter at the North Hills Mall in Fort Worth," Johnson said. "It was a tough go because the mall was so small. It was fun, but I closed down after about a year."

Johnson applied for an opening at the U.S. embassy in Moscow, passed an extensive background check and training in Washington.

On March 14, 1990, he boarded a plane for Moscow, ready for duty as a chef in the largest American embassy in the world.

Johnson said all staffers had been given explicit instructions about fraternization. They were told that anybody who spoke to them could be affiliated with the KGB.

But it was the long lines in Moscow that got Johnson's attention. When McDonald's opened in Moscow, Johnson said the wait was usually a minimum of two hours.

"At first," he said, "I refused to stand in a line that long. But after a while, the idea of McDonald's sounded too good for me to stay away. For two hours and 15 minutes, I stood in line the first time I went."

"The Russians have amazing patience. They put up with things Americans would never even consider."

"I was in Moscow when everything went down," Johnson said, referring to the political battles that fragmented the Soviet Republic. "I remember the plane landing in Russia and thinking, 'Wow, I'm in enemy territory.'"

In August 1991, President Mikhail Gorbachev was arrested by a group of high-ranking conservatives, who were seeking control of the government.

"I was living in the embassy, looking out the window when I saw soldiers blocking off roads. There were people, hundreds of them, milling around outside what was called the White House, where the government officials had their offices. It got very quiet, and all of a sudden tanks came rolling down the street."

"The people stood in front of the tanks, blocking them. A guy popped out of the lead tank and warned the group to get out of the way, and they didn't move. I thought I was going to see a massacre, but the tanks turned around."

History knows that Gorbachev survived the attempted takeover, but was eventually stripped of power by Boris Yeltsin, president of the Russian republic.

Soon after Yeltsin's rise to power, hard line communists attempted to

usurp him, a violent time Johnson remembers well.

"I was living away from the embassy at the time, and I got a call telling me not to come to work," Johnson recalled. "I turned television to CNN and found out a coup was under way. Tanks were blasting away at the White House, and I couldn't get in to work for three days, so I was giving cooking instructions over the phone."

Johnson's observations of Russia as a beaten down republic still stand out in his mind. Alcoholism and crime still prevail in a socialist country, where food and other staples of life are continually in short supply, he says.

"I had to fight my way out of two attempted robberies," said Johnson. "It was always by a group of people. They see Americans and know they have money. One time I was attacked outside of an art theater downtown,

four or five guys came up while I was sitting on a bench."

Still, Johnson praises the mass transit system in Moscow as the best he's ever seen and the city was a cheap place to live.

He returned home in April - glad to be back in familiar surroundings, but still pining for another adventure.

He has resumed out, but he thinks he will continue to feed the morning rush at Bill's Cafe until an offer beckons him. He is happy to be home for now.

"I just feel happy to be an American, especially after seeing how people have to live in other countries. It's really something to hear our national anthem when I'm in another country. I know that this is the greatest country in the world."

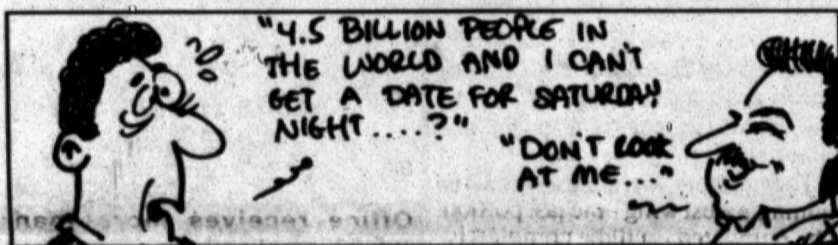

## November elections okay, but districts change in 1995

**HOUSTON (AP)** - The November elections in Texas can proceed under the current congressional district plan but the Texas Legislature must redraw three districts next year that were ruled unconstitutional, a federal court panel said Friday.

In a brief order, the three-judge panel said legislators must complete the new boundaries for the 18th, 29th and 30th congressional districts by March 15, 1995 and then submit the new plan to the judges for approval.

The ruling today stems from a decision last month when the same three judges found the three districts - two in Houston and one in Dallas - were drawn to boost minority representation and thus were unconstitutional.

U.S. District Judges David Hitner and Melinda Harmon and 5th U.S. Circuit of Appeals Judge Edith Jones said in their ruling that the new district plan will be developed during the legislature's regular session, which begins Jan. 10, 1995.

Last week, the Texas attorney general's office had asked the judges let the election proceed under the current lines and allow the Legislature to redraw them next year.

The attorney general's office argued that ordering new elections "would be a wrenching effort which would work great upheaval and harm to the democratic process."

But the plaintiffs in the case had wanted the lines redrawn before Nov. 8 in a special legislative session.

The plaintiffs last week submitted revised district maps for the three districts ruled unconstitutional by the judges.

Plaintiffs attorney Paul Hurd said the new maps necessarily affected 12 surrounding districts, so new elections would be needed in 15 total districts.

Hurd has said the proposed districts are more compact while

maintaining high minority representation where it now exists.

In its 100-page decision last month, the panel ruled the 18th and 29th Districts in Houston and the 30th District in Dallas were drawn improperly.

The judges said they resolved the case by deciding if the district lines in question could be explained by any criteria other than race. In the three districts, they could find no such

criteria. Plaintiffs filed their lawsuit in January, claiming the district lines amount to "racial gerrymandering" and objecting to the oddly drawn districts designed under the U.S. Voting Rights Act to unite residents of a single ethnic group.

Democrats, minority groups and the attorney general's office rejected the allegations, saying politics, not race, were behind the district boundaries set in 1991.

## How to make moving better: move into the State Capitol

AUSTIN - Moving day, according to folks who know about these things, is right up there with death, divorce and joblessness in the stress hall of fame. But moving isn't half bad when your new home is a four-story domed, granite palace with 20-foot ceilings and the sheen of a \$70 million makeover.

"Back in the Texas Capitol ... this is really special," Margie McAllister said Monday, gazing upward past the jumble of boxes, picture frames and unconnected equipment at ground level to marvel at her new office's ornate woodwork and view of the Capitol's shady south lawn. "Look at the cornices. This is really great."

McAllister is press secretary for state Sen. J.E. "Buster" Brown, R-Lake Jackson, among the last of 20 senators who have been moving back into the restored Capitol's east wing over the past few days. The other 11 senators, those with less seniority, will have to settle for the Capitol Extension, the underground office building beneath the Capitol's north lawn.

The senators, along with Senate staffers and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, spent most of the past three years in temporary quarters at One Capitol Square, a state office building at 15th and Lavaca streets. Now, with the four-year Capitol renovation and expansion project nearing its end, the repopulation of the 106-year-old edifice is picking up speed.

The secretary of state, Legislative

Council, Legislative Reference Library and now the senators are back, with Bullock, Gov. Ann Richards and 50 senior House members to follow this fall. The remaining 100 House members will be in the Capitol Extension.

There have been more than a few glitches - an overloaded elevator that broke down, warmish offices, water service interrupted in the east wing. But Dealey Herndon, executive director of the State Preservation Board, which is overseeing the project, said the seemingly premature move-in was a purposeful nudge to the contractor to finish the east wing and move reinforcements to the west wing.

"You got to bite the bullet and say, 'Let's go do it,'" Herndon said. "The last three or four days have been stressful for everyone. But if we had waited another week, the same thing would have happened."

Fortunately for those who have been curious about what the newly old Capitol looks like inside, the

presence of the people's elected representatives in the building means that the people themselves can venture inside the building to visit them - at least on a limited basis.

"Until the main building gets open to the public, we'll be letting constituents go in and do business under a controlled atmosphere," said Sgt. Ed Stapp with the Capitol police detail.

A state trooper, already stationed at the east entrance, will limit public access to people who have business with the secretary of state or the senators.

Then, in mid-October, all but the building's west wing - the last portion to be renovated - will be completely open to the public. The entire project, \$187 million-worth counting the extension, should be down to the finishing touches by the time the Legislature convenes Jan. 10, Herndon said.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## INCREASING OUR VALUE

The recent baseball strike caused me to start thinking about what our labor is actually worth. As I pondered the salary of a \$5 million per year baseball star, I began to calculate just how much that really is.

For example, a \$5 million player who plays every game will earn more than \$30,000 per day. That's good money if you can get it.

Some of us who earn considerably less might be quick to judge these salaries as excessive because of the large sums involved. The point of this column is not to condemn those who have great earning power. I'm glad they have it, and I'm not

jealous of it. Well, maybe I'm just a little jealous.

When you look at the big picture, how much we earn is only a partial indicator of our value to others. There are folks at the bottom of the wage scale who are grossly over paid. Some minimum-wage earners are worth less proportionately than million dollar ball players.

The focus and thrust of this column is to help us make sure we don't fall into the "worth less than we're paid category." My personal goals are to be worth more than I'm paid, and to be paid very well.

### Add Value To Your Work

I've found in examining the lives of successful people that they all work hard to increase their value to others, ultimately increasing the amount they are paid. Here are a few of their secrets:

- Become a "go to" person. In sports there is usually a player who the manager or coach wants in control of critical situations. In baseball, it's a hard-throwing relief pitcher or a clutch hitter who can get on base. In basketball, it's the person you want to take the last shot. In football, it's the back who will always get the two yards needed or the receiver who can stay inbounds and pick up the first down.

You can increase your value as you build a reputation of getting the job done. Become your organizations "go to" person. Concentrate on accomplishing the work, not on finding reasons it can't be done.

- Say "I don't know," if you don't know. However, never say "I don't know," without following up with, "but I'll find out."

When you have the answers, you can help solve the

problem. More importantly you'll acquire additional knowledge, and knowledge will increase your value to others.

- Value other people's time. Don't call unnecessary meetings. Keep appointments on time. Don't waste an associates time by discussing last night's television reruns. Work hard to keep all discussions on track.

- Look for work that needs to be done. Most jobs have some slow times. Instead of coasting, use these opportunities to increase your value.

When you see something that needs doing, write yourself a reminder note - even if you don't have time to do it then. When a slow time comes you'll have something to do. It's a great way to increase your job security.

- Capitalize on your mistakes. If you do anything at all, you will make mistakes. However, we should remember that mistakes are the building blocks of experience and experience is the foundation of success.

Therefore, don't focus on the mistakes you've made. Instead, learn from them, harness their power and use the experience to increase your value. Mistakes can teach you what you need to learn.

- Keep your integrity. Honesty is still the only policy. Your personal value is not tied to the integrity of our nation's leaders. Our superiors will judge us on our own merits.

You'll never lose value by being honest. You'll find that honesty builds trust and trust adds value and satisfaction.

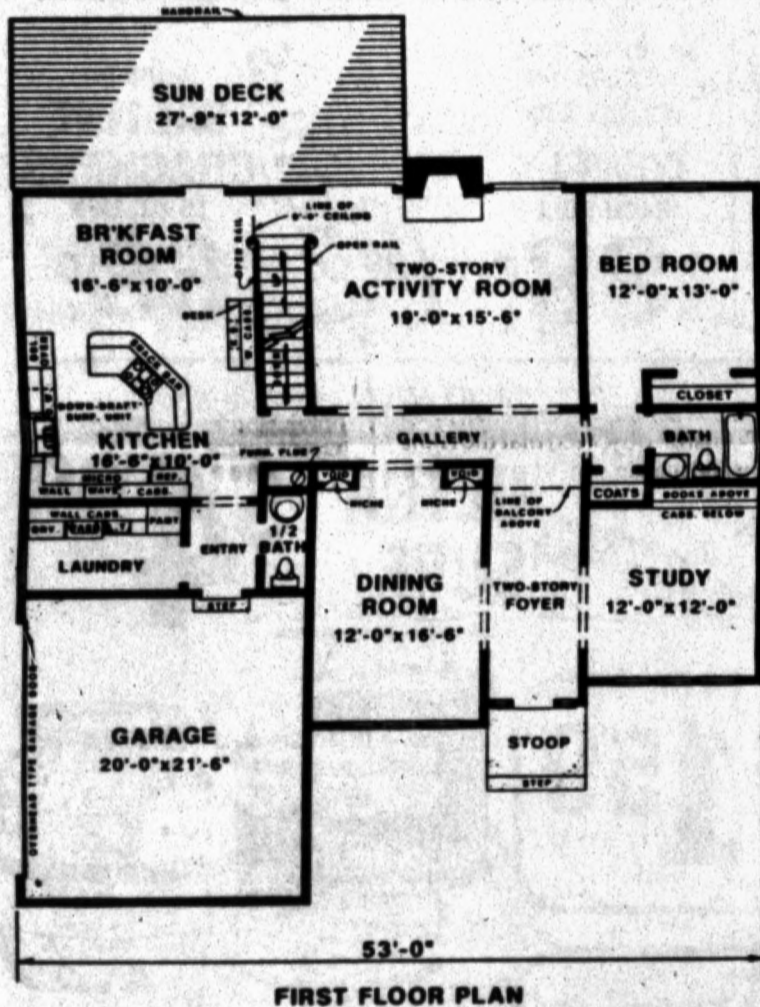

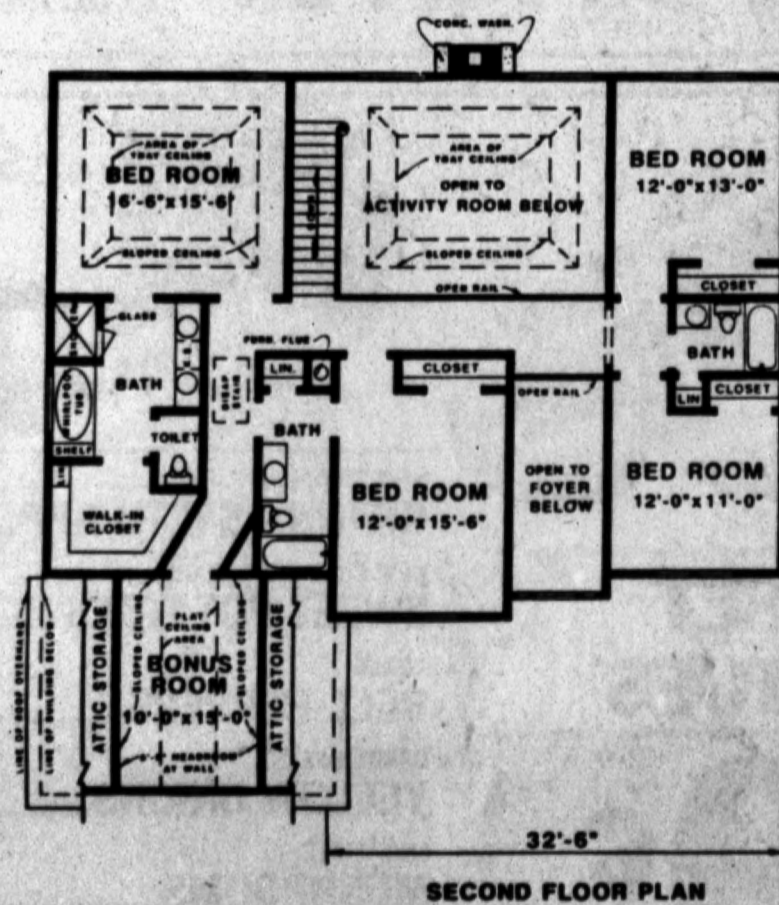

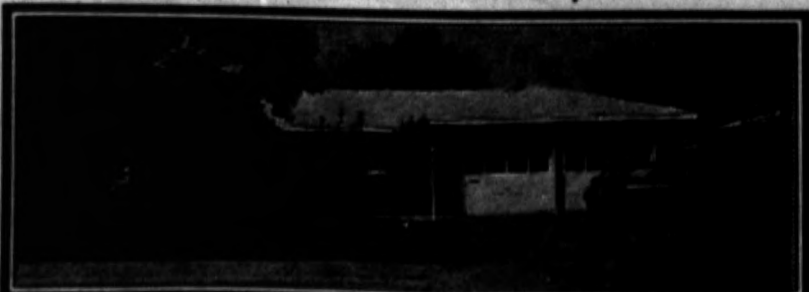

## Question/Answer

**Q:** The concrete steps leading to our front door have settled so that the threshold is now dangerously high. What are the alternatives for resolving this problem?

**A:** You have two: You can resurface the steps, or you can jack them up. If you plan to resurface, the overlay on each tread must be at least 1 inch thick. Build a form so that riser heights will all be equal and so there's a slight but uniform tilt toward the front to provide proper drainage. Sand the bonding surfaces with

coarse emery cloth to create a "tooth" for the new material. Use sand-cement mix with a liquid bonding agent or an epoxy patching mix.

To raise the present stair system back to its original position, dig down underneath it and use hydraulic jacks to lift the steps. Once the steps have been raised, pour a new footing in the cavity below using a concrete mix with coarse aggregate. The base of the footing must extend at least 6 inches below the frost line.

## 4-H enrollment set Tuesday

Enrollment for Deaf Smith County 4-H will be conducted Tuesday, from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. in the Hereford Community Center.

All youth interested in becoming involved in 4-H as well as returning members must enroll each year. Youth planning to take part in livestock projects must have Social Security numbers.

Although no enrollment fee is charged, there is an insurance fee of \$2 for all 4-Hers participating in the horse project group and \$1 for other youth.

Parents are encouraged to accompany their children to enrollment day to meet leaders and agents and assist their children in decided projects they wish to join.

Enrollment in 4-H is required each year. Those who are unable to register Tuesday are asked to stop by the Deaf Smith County Extension office in the courthouse by Friday to complete enrollment forms.

Clubs are open to youth from third grade up, or age nine to 19. All third graders are eligible regardless of whether they are nine years old.

In addition monthly club programs which offer educational and leadership development opportunities, 4-Hers may choose from a variety of project interest groups, including horticulture, woodworking, shooting sports, nutrition, public speaking or aerospace.

There are a number of animal project areas, also, that will interest young persons.

Leaders and agents will be on hand Tuesday afternoon to explain the program as youth enroll.

All 4-H activities are open to youth of eligible age regardless of socioeconomic background, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

## Seven percent drop recorded for year in ag trade surplus

WASHINGTON (AP) - Falling to the lowest point so far this year, the June agricultural trade surplus totaled \$1.1 billion, the Agriculture Department says. However, the month's surplus still outpaced June 1993 by \$10 million.

The cumulative surplus so far for fiscal 1994, which began in October, was \$13.5 billion, down 7 percent from the same period the year before.

Exports for the month fell \$254 million from May to \$3.3 billion, a 5 percent increase from the previous year. For the October-June period, exports accounted for \$33.3 billion, a scant \$54 million below a year earlier.

Due to increased demand in Asian countries, beef exports for the fiscal year so far are up 7 percent, even though the value of June shipments decreased from the previous month.

With June shipments soaring a full 70 percent over the previous year, the sales value of poultry exports topped \$1 billion for the year so far, a 41 percent increase over 1993. Poultry continues to find a lucrative sales outlet in the former Soviet Union, with a total of 245,000 tons shipped to the region during the fiscal year through June.

## Cattle numbers higher in July than year ago

WASHINGTON (AP) - The number of cattle and calves as of July 1 totaled 112.5 million head, a gain of 2 percent from the previous year and 3 percent from July 1992, the Agriculture Department says.

Cows and heifers that had calved increased by 2 percent from 1993 to 45.9 million head. While beef cows were up 3 percent to 36.3 million, milk cows marked a 2 percent decline, falling to 9.6 million.

The total number of heifers weighing more than 500 pounds rose to 17.3 million head, an increase of 1 percent. Beef replacement heifers climbed 3 percent to 6 million, as milk replacement heifers were unchanged at 4.1 million. Other heifers fell 1 percent to 7.2 million.

Steers over 500 pounds reached 15.4 million, up 1 percent. The number of bulls over 500 pounds rose 5 percent to 2.3 million head.

Calves weighing less than 500 pounds rose 3 percent to 31.6 million.

Shipments of wheat in June fell to 2 million tons, which was 260,000 tons below May and down 343,000 tons from the previous year, as exports continue to suffer due to the poor 1993-1994 crop. Egypt and Japan were top buyers for the month. The total of 23 million tons sold so far this fiscal year marks a 16 percent drop from 1993.

Corn, however, climbed to 2.2 million tons during the month, a 362,000-ton rise over May. At 25 million tons, the total for fiscal 1994 lags behind the previous year by 26 percent. Although Japan bought 783,000 tons, this was the lowest level of purchase for that country since 1986. Other major importers included Taiwan and Mexico.

Agricultural imports for June remained steady, increasing only a slight \$12 million over the previous month. Imports for the fiscal year to date were worth a total of \$19.8 billion, which was unchanged from the previous year.

Outdoor exhibits highlight the Texas Tech University's Ranching Heritage Center. A special exhibit will demonstrate what happens in a pickup crash when occupants fail to wear seatbelts.

The special Info Plaza has been set aside for area universities as well as agricultural agencies to update citizens on latest research and helpful services.

Outdoor displays and performances by cowboy poets also have been scheduled, said Dr. Bob Robinson district director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service who is plaza coordinator.

Landscaped features in the area include a pond, solar-powered geyser and waterfall, trees, low-maintenance plants suitable for area homes and places spectators can relax. Texas

Tech's food tent and dining area are in Info Plaza this year.

Exhibits will be clustered by themes and are designed to interest urban visitors as well as agricultural producers.

One tent will feature water quality and environment while another will show how modern, lean animals support modern lifestyles.

Agricultural competitiveness is the theme for another tent and life quality, health and well-being are accentuated in a tent.

Opportunities and services of area universities and agricultural agencies are spotlighted in another exhibit tent. Conservation of natural resources is the focus in the sixth tent.

Info Plaza will be adjacent to plots showing the latest crop irrigation and production practices. Demonstrations in those plots will be conducted by the Soil Conservation Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Tech, Texas Agricultural Extension Services, High Plains Undergrround water Conservation District and Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board.

## Texas farmers, ranchers vow at meeting to 'take Texas back'

SAN ANTONIO - The annual convention of the Independent Cattlemen's Association held in San Antonio recently brought together hundreds of farmers and ranchers vowing to "take Texas back."

The cause of their determination is what they see as a struggle to preserve their rights to manage their own property.

ICA directors have voted to join Farmers and Ranchers for Property Rights, an Austin-based group of nearly 30 agricultural associations and organizations.

High on the list of complaints about government interference in land matters is the announcement some weeks ago that the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is proposing strict mandates in 33 Central Texas counties for protection of the golden-cheeked warbler.

Speaking to the ICA meeting, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry declared, "We've managed to co-exist on the land for generations," referring to property owners and wildlife.

"But now some folks, usually from

Washington, D.C., want to come tell us how to manage our land. Our private property rights don't belong in the hands of EPA or Fish and Wildlife Service -- they belong in the hands of Texans. We must continue to say that loud and often.

"We've had enough. We're fixin' to take Texas back!"

Dr. Floy Lilley, a University of Texas expert on property rights, in a seminar discussion, said that the Endangered Species Act of 1973 has fallen far short.

She said her research has found only one species that was "recovered" as a result of the act, "an obscure plant in Iowa."

Dr. Lilley, who holds the Clint W. Murchison Sr. chair of free enterprise at UT-Austin, observed that the right to own and manage property "is where the line is drawn. This is the battlefield."

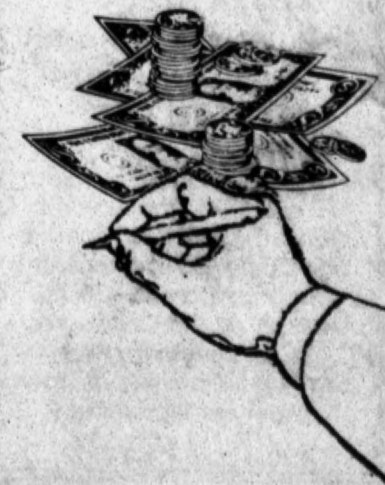

# Amarillo man turns Christmas hassle into new device to keep track of tape

AMARILLO, Texas - The Amarillo area is known in trading circles as a producer of wheat, cattle, oil and gas, and now, plastic tape dispensers that fit on the back of your hand.

Troy Waddell, an Amarillo inventor, came up with the idea almost 20 years ago on a hectic Christmas Eve when the tape kept disappearing during a feverish gift-wrapping session. After getting the right patents and lining up the right people, he began marketing the dispenser about two years ago.

dispenser, but it has a loop attached to the bottom that fits around the back of the user's hand, making it hard to misplace and easier to wrap gifts.

Indispensable Marketing has the dispensers made in Arkansas, but the products are shipped to a warehouse on Northwest First Avenue in Amarillo where a staff of 15 mostly blind workers packs them with tape and packages the products for shipment.

From this warehouse, Indispensable Marketing can prepare 25,000 dispensers a day for shipment. Those numbers are important to meet, because the company gets orders for 200,000 to 500,000 dispensers a month, Waddell said.

Total sales to date are just short of a million units, and will exceed 2.5 million units before the end of the year, Gordon said.

Waddell and Gordon made the contact with Tesa, but it was another Amarillo man, Mike Bahn, owner of ABC Blueprint, who got Indispensable Marketing hooked up with Import-Export Services of Dallas, which has opened markets in other countries for the company.

Tesa Tape is a subsidiary of Frankfurt, Germany-based Beiersdorf, a company that invented adhesive tape 70 years ago, Waddell said.

The tape, however, is made in the United States, he said.

Waddell explained that, in Europe, Beiersdorf is comparable to America's 3M, the maker of Scotch Tape. Tesa already sells industrial tapes in the United States, but it wants to get into the household tape market. To do that, Tesa needs to set itself apart from the competition. The Handsfree dispenser is the something different it needs, Waddell said.

"They felt like it would give them a niche to get into the market over here," he said.

Tesa has an exclusive right to sell the Handsfree dispenser in the United States, Canada and Mexico. But Import-Export Services has lined up deals for Indispensable Marketing to sell the Handsfree dispenser in England, Japan, Hong Kong, Australia and Israel, Waddell said.

"We're now exporting our products to Japan and Hong Kong of all places, and they're just going nuts," he said.

Already, 60,000 units have been sent to Australia, and England has committed for 150,000 units, Waddell said.

Waddell and Gordon are proud of their product, but they're equally as proud of the work force that puts everything together. The men got the idea to hire blind workers after they made a trip to the Lighthouse for the Blind to check out that group's boxing machine. It was there they learned blind workers don't have enough work to keep busy, and they got the idea to use blind labor.

"They can do just about anything here except drive a forklift," Waddell said. "They are the most dependable people in the world and they are thrilled to death because they have a job."

In addition to the 15 full-time workers at the warehouse, Indispensable Marketing employs two more at a corporate office on West Sixth Avenue.

## Air pollution getting worse in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) - Air pollution appears to be getting worse over some parts of Houston after three years of consistent improvement, and state air quality officials said they are not sure why.

The smog appears to be worst in areas west of the city, they said.

"We suspect it's weather-related," said Doyle Pendleton, director of air monitoring at the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

"We have no reason to believe there's been an increase in emissions," he added. "Really, the only thing we can say for sure is that we're

kind of starting to have a bad year."

The eight-county Houston-Galveston region has the worst air pollution in Texas and the second worst in the nation.

However, Pendleton says his concern stems from readings at monitoring stations in Aldine and northwest Harris County.

Smog levels exceeded the federal air pollution standards on 11 days in Aldine and 12 days in northwest Harris County, according to state records. Those are the most violations recorded at the stations since 1990.

However, state and local officials say they still are encouraged.

Houston has improved consistently since 1990, with excessive-smog days decreasing from about 15 to five at monitoring stations in the city.

"What we have today is super compared to what we used to have," said Gene McMullen, the city's assistant chief of air quality control.

Officials blame a lack of wind for the problem.

Air pollution from the Houston Ship Channel probably is blown westward by prevailing winds, where it reacts with sunlight to become smog, McMullen said.

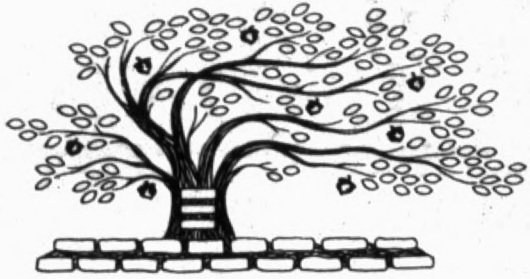
Our generation is squandering the earth's resources. We are consuming the energy and polluting the environment; so what legacy are we to leave our descendants if not the capability of having decent health care.

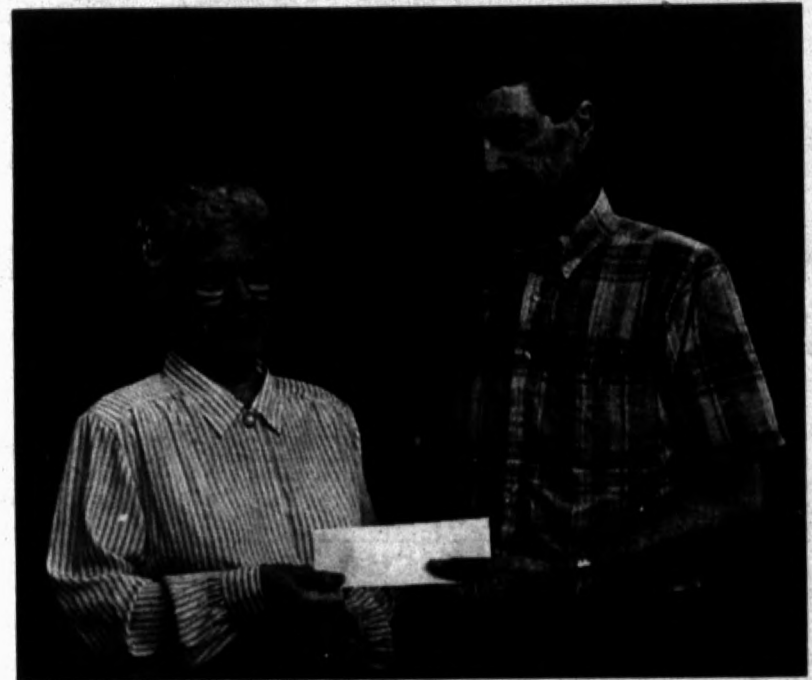

## 'Fortune Hunter' reveals a kinder, gentler superspy



Mark Frankel stars as superspy Carlton Dial, a free-lance secret agent who finds himself surrounded by attractive women, intrigue and plenty of criminals, in Fox's "Fortune Hunter." The action-adventure series premieres Sunday.

The name is Dial, Carlton Dial, and it doesn't take a superspy to uncover the James Bond influence in Fox's "Fortune Hunter," premiering Sunday, Sept. 4.

The pilot bears more than just a casual resemblance to 1962's "Dr. No," the first movie adaptation of Ian Fleming's novels. As Dial, Mark Frankel's appearance, mannerisms and facial expressions are reminiscent of the young Sean Connery who began his stint as Bond in that film.

"I was brought up on Bond movies," Frankel says. "So, I guess that was part of my childhood, and it definitely had an influence on me."

While Connery appears to be Frankel's inspiration, the writers seem to be mimicking the campiness of Roger Moore's 007. The dialogue is filled with one-liners, many bordering on outright silliness.

The story opens with the theft of a top-secret (what else?) weapon system from a Seattle laboratory. A dumbfounded U.S. intelligence community calls on Intercept, a "free enterprise" recovery service, for help in finding Frostfire, a supercooled gun that vaporizes its victims.

Intercept assigns its best operative, British agent-turned-free-lancer Dial, to the case. Joining forces with a beautiful Russian agent, Dial jaunts from one exotic location to another until he comes face to face with the maniacal, wealthy industrialist who plans to mass produce and sell Frostfire.

Sounds a lot like a Bond movie, eh? There are, however, some noticeable differences between Dial and Bond.

Dial carries a tranquilizer gun, rather than a Walther PPK. While 007 faced peril for queen and country, Dial reluctantly takes the assignment for three times his usual commission.

In lieu of high-tech weapons and vehicles, Dial is paired, via listening and visual devices, with Harry Flack, a computer geek who observes the mission and assists from the home office in San Francisco.

Played by John Robert Hoffman, Flack is much like the AI character from "Quantum Leap," providing information and unsolicited comments.

Hoffman, who plays the Mad Hatter on Disney's "Adventures in Wonderland," says his character will appeal to younger viewers.

"Obviously, the humor is sort of along the lines of — well, it's also adult, but there is a 'preteen' quality about it," Hoffman says.

"Fortune Hunter" also avoids gratuitous sex and violence.

"We're going to have beautiful women on the show on a regular basis," Carlton Cuse, executive producer, says. "But I think we're approaching it from ... a less-explicit angle."

"I think what the show is going to entail is more action, more derring-do, things like that," Frank Lupu, executive producer, says. "I don't think we're going to be into violence — as you see the Dial character does not carry a gun that fires bullets."

The overall effect is sort of a kinder, gentler Bond, more like television's Simon Templar ("The Saint") than Hollywood's 007. The villains are bland compared with the colorful Bond bad guys; the action and suspense also pale in comparison.

Fox is strategically placing this series after NFL football, hoping much of that audience will remain tuned in.

Bond fans, especially those who prefer Connery's incarnation, may find this action-adventure series leaves them "shaken, not stirred."

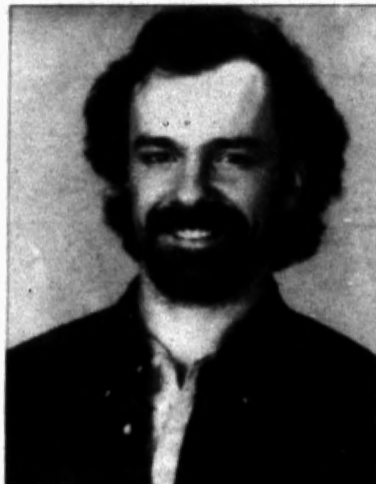

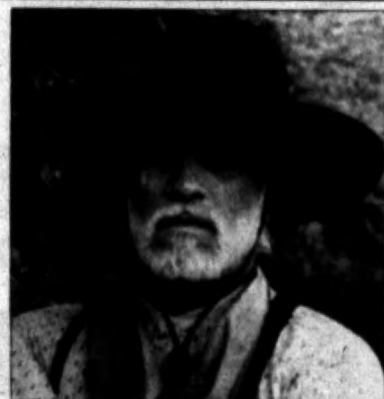

Jaglom's quirky, insightful 'Eating' offers real food for thought

Viewers who find their home video fare not worth watching unless it contains gunfire, car chases, graphic love-play or evil entities from outer space should pass right by Henry Jaglom's "Eating," an overlooked gem from 1990. But for those with more subtle cinematic palates, the independent writer/director's talky exploration of women and their relationship with food, weight, dieting and self-image is a genuine feast.

The premise is simple, as it should be; this is not a film about plot. A Los Angeles housewife, Elaine, (Lisa Richards) is turning 40 and has decided to throw herself a big party in the afternoon. In part, the event is designed to distract the honoree while she waits for her husband to return from a business trip, but she can't help anticipating their romantic reunion scheduled for later that night.

At first, the guests arrive slowly, but soon the sunny, spacious house is filled with women. Some head straight

for the pool and patio area, while others find comfortable chairs, sofas, pillows or even perch on the staircase. But wherever they sit, a strange, hilarious sameness becomes apparent in their many conversations; wherever they are, whatever their occupation or circumstance, the talk centers on food. What they like, why they like it, what they avoid, what they eat that they know they shouldn't. Other issues are raised, of course, but the talk keeps coming back to food, diet, consumption, denial and, inevitably, self-definition. Much of the talk is delivered straight to the camera, in the guise of footage shot by a French documentarian (Nelly Alard) visiting the States and staying with her friend, the birthday girl. (Contrived, yes, but it works.)

Jaglom's film wouldn't work, of course, without a talented ensemble to pull it off. Besides Richards and Alard, standouts in the cast include Gwen Welles, Daphne Kastner and Frances Bergen (Candice's mom) as Elaine's elegant, rather bewildered mother.

**New documentary by acclaimed filmmaker sends PBS viewers back to school in 'High School II'**

As times change, the educational needs of young people advance, as do the methods by which they are taught. Acclaimed documentary director Frederick Wiseman proved that in 1968, and he shows further advancements in "High School II," airing on PBS Wednesday, Sept. 7 (check local listings).

teachers. The documentary shows in great detail how the attitudes of both educator and student lead to greater understanding. What it doesn't reveal, however, is the reason behind the success.

Twenty-five years ago, in "High School," Wiseman took viewers into a Philadelphia institution that was considered "good." What he uncovered was authoritarian teachers and rigid methods allowing for no individual thought.

Because the film lacks interviews and narration, the viewer never learns what makes the people in this school different from so many others. It is obvious those involved care a great deal about each other, but one must wonder what can be done to improve relationships in other less successful institutions.

In making "High School II," Wiseman explored Central Park East Secondary School in New York City's East Harlem. This institution has a 5 percent dropout rate in a city where 40 percent is the norm. Also, nearly 90 percent of graduates go on to four-year colleges.

Wiseman says after he made "High School," he was appalled at how many people compared that school to their own. With his latest effort, viewers may find themselves wishing their school was like Central Park East. Unfortunately, since teachers don't share their philosophies and objectives, people may not be able to do anything except wish.

The stunning success of the New York City school is attributed to the caring nature of both the students and their
