## Changes recorded in Festival tree bids

The Hereford Senior Citizens Center's annual Festival of Trees continued its four-day run on Friday as local school children passed through the center on their annual trip to the festival.

Students from throughout the city walked past the brightly decorated Christmas trees, dropping slips of paper into jars at each tree, voting for their favorite one of all.


Seven schools decorated trees sold at the annual auction Thursday, so those entries got the most votes from students at those schools.

However, colored papers also appeared as some children let their hearts overrule their school spirit in selecting a favorite tree.

As the festivities continued, center director Margie Daniels announced Friday that a change was made in the auction results for three trees -- including the one that sold for the highest price on Thursday.

In a development Friday, the \$2,325 bid made Thursday for the tree "Della Robbia Angels" decorated by Terry's Floral and Design was upped to \$2,500.

Mrs. Daniels said the new purchasers are: \$1,000. from Owl Feedyard and \$1,500 from Wall and Sons Drilling Inc. as a memorial to (See FESTIVAL, Page 2A)

## Cooperation mark of approach taken in handling of teen gangs in Hereford

When the Hereford Police Department received intelligence recently about a change in a local gang's "colors," officials called the Hereford Independent School District and alerted administrators to the situation.

On Friday, when a small number of students reacted in anger to a prohibition on clothing and hats in the style of that gang's colors, Hereford police were on hand with administrators to make sure the situation did not get out of control.

It is that cooperation between the HISD and the Hereford Police Department that exemplifies the fight against gangs and gang activities in Hereford.

HISD Superintendent Charles W. Greenawalt, Police Chief David Wagner and high school principal Terry Russell agree that it is this cooperation that has aided in defusing possibly serious gang problems and allowed a coordinated effort to reduce those problems.

"Almost every day you can drive by the junior high or high school and see a police car out front," Greenawalt said, noting that people are used to seeing officers on campus.

Bringing police onto campus, the

men said, is designed to breed familiarity among the officers, school teachers and students.

Local law enforcement officers, Greenawalt said, have a standing invitation to enjoy a free meal at any school cafeteria in Hereford -- and many take advantage of that perk, Russell noted.

In addition, DARE Officer Terry Brown routinely travels to all the intermediate school campuses, while School Resource Officer Randy Stirling patrols the junior high and high school.

Gangs and gang activities came to the forefront of the minds of HHS students this past week when school officials prohibited students from wearing clothing and accessories bearing the logo and colors of the University of Texas Longhorns.

Wagner said officers learned that a local gang had adopted the UT items as their gang "colors," which they wore to identify themselves as members of the gang.

"The intelligence we were getting," Wagner said, was that "they were going to have an all-out war against other gangs."

Three guns -- two of them used in recent shooting incidents here -- were recovered by police and officials were concerned for the safety of students

at the high school.

"This (the clothing ban) was mainly for the safety of those other kids" not in the gang, Wagner said of the ban, which caused a surge of emotion from students upset at being told that they could not wear UT items to school.

The chief noted that there have been instances in Hereford of young people assaulted by gang members because they unknowingly wore clothing that was the "colors" of a gang at the time.

About 30 students walked off the HHS campus on Friday in protest of the move, despite a statement broadcast that morning by student council president Bree Perrin.

In her statement, Miss Perrin reminded students that the school's student handbook contains a clause that says the district can ban clothing if the students' safety comes into question.

All students and their parents or guardians signed the school code of conduct at the beginning of the year, she said, agreeing to those terms, among others.

She also noted that the walkout was illegal.

Greenawalt said students who left campus were declared truant and absences were unexcused.

Russell said many of those students were back a short time later, returned to school by their parents, which he noted showed a support for school policy over the students' walkout.

Greenawalt said the clothing ban was an example of the cooperation between the departments.

He said the police department did not have to alert the school about the use of UT colors by the gang, but they did.

Wagner said gangs in Hereford are a problem, and that membership in them fluctuates, and names and colors change periodically.

"Members come, members go, gang names change," he said.

Greenawalt said he relies on Wagner and his department to keep the schools informed about gang colors being worn during the school year.

And, he noted, it will probably be okay to wear UT clothing in the near future, once the gang in question changes its colors.

In the future, however, other clothing may be prohibited if items are chosen as gang "colors."

While the ban on clothing is the most public activity on the gang front, the police department and school district are both doing much more to combat

## Clouds, fog blanket Texas

Fog was reported across Texas on Saturday, and the National Weather Service said some snow might fall in portions of the Panhandle by Sunday.

Skies were cloudy Saturday morning in West Texas as scattered showers and a few thunderstorms brewed on the South Plains.

Visibility was one-fourth mile at 5 a.m. at both Lubbock and Marfa because of the fog.

With a warm front stretched across the Edwards Plateau and the Concho Valley, temperatures Saturday morning ranged from 41 at Amarillo to 68 at San Angelo. Winds were general east to southeast at 5 to 15 mph, with gusty conditions across the Permian Basin.

The weather service said showers and thunderstorms, some severe, were

likely across West Texas on Saturday, with any snow coming in Saturday night.

However, sunny skies are expected across West Texas on Sunday, with highs ranging from the 50s north to the 70s south.

High pressure to the east and northeast of Texas resulted in moisture being pumped in from the Gulf of Mexico, which was expected to fuel late-afternoon and evening thunderstorms.


Morning temperatures over North Texas were in the 50s and 60s, slightly cooler than in South Texas.

In South Texas, early morning temperatures were in the 60s and 70s on Saturday.

The weather service said showers and thunderstorms were likely in South Texas.

## Letter to the Editor

### Dear Editor:

The newly elected Congress is seeking ways to reduce the national debt. One of their solutions is to eliminate the Internal Revenue Service. Let's take a look at how they propose to do it and some pros and cons of the process.

One of their ideas is proposing a national sales tax requiring all to pay the same rate. Not a bad solution except for the fact that such a measure would require lower income people who pay no income tax to be affected the same as those who pay a goodly sum.

Such a drastic step would eliminate the possibility of the very wealthy multi-millionaire or multi-billionaire companies finding loop holes in the tax laws which exempt such companies from paying their fair share of taxes. On the other hand, such a measure assures that those companies pay taxes.

This solution calls for the elimination of Federal Income Tax being withheld from pay checks, leaving more of the earned wages available to the employee, which would result in an automatic raise for the worker and at the same time eliminate the possibility of those people who are not exactly honest when filing their income tax reports.

Elimination of an expensive bureaucratic division of the government--think of the savings on paper work, computer-related expenses and pensions of over-paid agents and

offices of the IRS. Just the cost of printing all of the different forms could run into millions of dollars.

No more expensive IRS investigations of people suspected of tax evasion and those caught and convicted who serve costly prison terms paid for by the people.

Mandatory quarterly tax returns would be no more, leaving a large sum of money in the hands of those who have earned it. People would be naturally more conscious of spending because of the required sales tax they could not escape.

Completely eliminating the paper work and man hours related in refunds of excessive income tax paid to the government in advance, which earns no interest and results in an interest-free loan to the government.

Of course, the politicians have made no mention of what they intend to sacrifice. Will they do away with perks? How about the forgiveness of debts, huge sums of money owed by foreign nations to the U.S.? Will they reduce foreign aid and stop trying to become the policemen of the world?

Will they be willing to take a cut in salary? What are they willing to sacrifice? Or will they want the American people to do all of the sacrificing?

## New governors get help from established peers

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W.Va. (AP) - When one of a nation's new governors runs into trouble, help is only a telephone call away, from a big brother colleague who knows what it's like to be new on the job.

At the three-day school for governors-elect, winding up today, the National Governors Association assigned each of the 18 freshmen a mentor governor who can offer advice - on anything from organizing a transition to coping with intricate legislative issues.

Or handling the headaches that can go with moving young children into the governor's mansion.

"You are somebody who can kind of be his dictionary until he gets settled in," said Gov. Gaston Caperton of West Virginia, who tutored Democratic Gov. Parris Glendening of Maryland.

"I could be a pretty good resource," said Caperton, a Democrat. "If it's not me that's a resource, I can recommend the best person to call."

Glendening said he expects to make good use of the program.

First United Bank of Dimmitt and Frontier Capital of Dimmitt were not left empty-handed because of the development, however.

## Trading smoking for Lotto profitable move for winner

AUSTIN (AP) - Quitting smoking has paid off for 62-year-old Joe Jones of Mansfield.

When Jones, a service station owner, quit puffing in December 1992, he started using the money he spent on cigarettes to buy Lotto Texas tickets.

On Friday, Jones became the state's single largest Lotto winner and the nation's fourth largest single lottery winner by claiming the \$53.9 million jackpot drawn on Wednesday

night.

"I'm never pumping another gallon of gasoline," said Jones, announcing that he will end a 34-year career in the service station business. "In fact, when I buy gasoline from now on, I am going to pull into the full service area."

Jones, who plays the same 20 sets of numbers in drawings twice a week, collected a check on Friday for \$2,698,459.20. He will receive checks for \$2,698,000 every Nov. 15 for the next 19 years.

Jones and his wife, Joyce, said they haven't even begun to fathom what the money can buy.

"It's hard to comprehend that much money," Jones said. "I need a car. I guess that will be the first thing I get."

Mrs. Jones said some of the money would go to pay for their two children's college educations.

"A lot of good will come out of this," she said.

Mrs. Jones said the couple hasn't been able to sleep since winning the money.

"We were tossing and turning and tossing and turning," she said. "I said, 'Do you realize you are in bed with a millionaire?' and he said, 'So are you.'"

Like a good neighbor, State Farm is there.

BERLIN (AP) - It took 10 years to make, and flickered into existence for less than a thousandth of a second. As yet nameless, element 110 supplies another clue to the world's creation.

An international team at the Heavy Ion Research Center at Darmstadt in southern Germany said it created the first atom of the element by bombarding lead atoms with nickel atoms in the center's accelerator.

Scientists once thought uranium-No. 92 - was the last of the elements. But in the last half century, researchers equipped with nuclear theories and technology have succeeded in detecting 18 more, each heavier than the last.

What they now want to know is whether there's a limit and if so, where? "It concerns how the world was made," team leader Peter Armbruster said Friday.

What does the discovery mean to the average person? For now, a new addition to the periodic table in textbooks around the world. Element 110 has an atomic weight of 269 - the heaviest ever produced.

Most matter is found in mixtures but elements are substances that cannot be separated into other substances by ordinary chemical or physical means.

Alchemists, for example, could transmute many things, but never succeeded in turning base metals, copper and lead, into more precious elements of silver and gold.

Scientists believed the element 110 could exist. But they had to create the

ideal conditions for its birth and a means of detecting its short life. For 10 years, researchers around the world raced to do just that.

Scientists from the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California, working with Russian colleagues at a research center in Dubna, Russia, started before the Darmstadt team, but were using a different technique.

"That's why we are sending in our paper so rapidly, because we could expect the same announcement any day from the other group," Armbruster, a German, said in a telephone interview.

The team, which dashed off an article Nov. 14 describing the work, said it first detected the element on Nov. 9 at 4:39 p.m. It went public with the find late Thursday after producing four more atoms.

Each time the element disappeared in less than a thousandth of a second. But scientists knew it was there because they detected a helium nucleus it emitted as it decayed.

## Out of the Blue

Congress is expected to return to a lame-duck session later this month to vote on the world free-trade agreement popularly known as GATT.

I'm sure that much is well known. But is this really something that is good for America?

That, I would hazard a guess, is not so well known.

I admit I'm not very familiar with all the ins and outs of GATT, except what I've read and heard on the radio.

On the one side we have the "Pro-GATTers" who are saying GATT would improve the American economy, create more jobs and stimulate production, while at the same time lowering the trade deficit.

On the other side are the "Anti-GATTers" who say the creation of a World Trade Organization to oversee the various provisions of GATT is unconstitutional, that it gives governments inimical to the United States too much power over our trade.

It is that provision that gives me some concern, if it should prove to be true.

After all, do we want a world organization in which Haiti, Cuba, Iraq, Iran and other "unfriendly" have the same number of votes as the U.S. to be the arbiter of world trade decisions?

Do we want our trading practices tied to the whims of countries that just might see the WTO as a chance to "get back" at the "Great Satan"?

As I said, this seems to me to be too important an issue to decide in a quick lame-duck session before the end of the year.

Besides which, many of the congressmen who will vote on GATT in December will not be in office

come January, so they can vote however they want, secure in the knowledge that their decision is a "safe" one, free from any political fallout or loss of trust from their constituents.

Maybe President Clinton wants this vote because he is afraid a Republican Congress in January would vote against it.

Whatever the reason, I for one feel like the GATT vote should be postponed until January, then debated in an open forum and decided on by those who will have to stand for their decisions in 1996.

I got a story over the Associated Press wire last week that disturbs me and I would hope disturbs you as well.

A survey was conducted recently among 3,000 teens listed by Who's Who Among American High School Students.

The students were asked if they would consider having sex with a stranger if there was a "reward" involved.

Consider that this is a survey of some of the "top" students in America, most of them white, college-bound young people who attend public schools.

It said that 43 percent of the males and 25 percent of the females admitted they would have sex with a "reasonably attractive" stranger for \$1 million.

By the way, among these students who were already sexually active, nearly 35 percent said they would not worry if a condom was not available before engaging in sex with a total stranger.

For a car, the percentages were

more than 25 percent for males and 8 percent for females, and for a job, it was the same for boys and 9 percent for girls.

For college admission, 23 percent of males and 6 percent of females would have sex.

Used to be that young people who were sexually active were considered "loose" or without morals by their peers.

Today it seems like it's just the opposite, that young people are openly willing to prostitute themselves for personal gain.

I just wonder what's ahead for us.

Finally, the ACLU is upset at the mayors of some Texas towns.

Seems the mayors of McAllen, Weslaco and Edinburg all endorsed proclamations urging citizens to read the Bible.

That, the ACLU says, is violation of the "separation of church and state" and is WRONG.

The proclamation was distributed by the Layman's National Bible

Association and recognizes Nov. 20-27 as Bible Week.

While I obviously disagree with the ACLU's position in the first place, I think their argument of the "separation of church and state" is missing the point in the case especially.

The proclamations are to encourage people to read the Bible. It does not address a particular translation of the Bible, a particular denomination, or even a particular passage.

Many different religions use the Bible - or parts of it - in their worship, including Christians, Jews, Muslims and Mormons.

In fact, I would dare say that most American people would not object to being encouraged to read the Bible.

I really think the ACLU slipped on this one.

Well, that's it for this week.

Have a good week and, remember to have a good Thanksgiving. Enjoy the football, turkey and other goodies, but let's not forget to give thanks for all the blessings we enjoy.

Rain is a wonderful thing. Especially in areas that don't get much.

In Dust Bowl days, a sprinkle could be a major event. Today a good shower is cause for celebration.

Back when few rural roads were paved, though, a rain could be a real problem. Mud that globbed up on tires brought a vehicle to a stop.

My family had a saying that a puddle was all that was needed for my grandfather to get stuck. He'd drive across pasture dry enough for spontaneous combustion and find mud.

When everyone thought the pastures and fields had dried up after a rain, he would prove them wrong.

Once, he drove his car into a bog in a field. After an hour of rocking back and forth and burning the tread off his tires, he gave up, walked to the barn and got a pickup to pull the car from the mudhole.

Need I report that he also stuck the pickup? Then, when my father learned of the latest difficulty, he drove a tractor to the site and extricated both car and pickup. We never let my grandpa forget it.

Unpaved roads were the bane of all rural families. Since there were few state asphalt farm-to-market roads, farmers were in the habit of pulling cars out of ditches and ruts.

At a fairly young age, I recall, I went from town to the farm after a rain, because of some particular need. No one lived on the farm so I can't imagine why my father, grandmother and I set out to drive 16 miles on an unpaved road after a real rain.

Because we got stuck every mile or so, the trip took all morning and there was work to do. We couldn't leave immediately to return to town. And, we had not taken food with us.

After I carried on at length about being hungry, I was directed to walk the mile, or more, to an uncle's house to beg something to eat. I was so mad, I vowed my dad and grandmother could stay hungry.

Slogging through the muddy fields, I felt very put-upon. But on arrival at my uncle's home, my bad humor was dispelled. My aunt was a cook par excellence and the leftovers from their lunch were outstanding.

My family lived at the intersection. Since entertainment was at a premium, my sister and I looked for any kind of distraction. The dip in the highway in front of our house was a source of considerable merriment, for us, if not as prevalent.

This low spot in the road was not readily apparent to motorists. Cars arriving at the intersection unaware of the foot-deep dip in the road often traveled at too high speed to slow down through the water.

Drivers and passengers were forced to get out of the car, wade through knee-high water and push the vehicle to higher ground to dry off the parts that got too wet.

My sister and I would double over with laughter as we saw car after car "drowned out" at the corner.

That was the best thing about rain for us.

Congress should compromise with the president."

Perhaps so. But compromise has something in common with the tango: It takes two.

In his afternoon-after concession remarks a week ago, Clinton said he would take his share of the blame for the Republican landslide. He then went on to list the achievements of his battered administration - lowered deficits, trimmed federal payroll, improving economy - and to say that he'd been too busy passing bills to get across to the American people how much the Democrats were achieving for them.

But he'd said all that in his futile campaigning.

"We're not going to surrender the things that we were elected to do," said Patrick J. Griffin, the president's chief lobbyist. But they certainly will have to temper them, and more than had already been yielded.

On health care reform, for example, when Clinton conceded his own program was a goner, in an effort to get something in its place, he'd said the new version was less bureaucratic, more workable, less intrusive - which added up to saying that he'd proposed a lousy bill in the first place.

Defining the message in detailed terms depends on your viewpoint.

From that of Rep. Newt Gingrich, who will be the speaker of the Republican House, it's perfectly clear, and addressed to Clinton:

"The country's decided that it wants the president to compromise with Congress. It does not mean the

Congressional Democrats haven't found their voices yet, let alone their strategy. They're competing to determine who takes over the Democratic shambles as leaders of the sudden minority.

But they are not without weapons.

The Senate rules that frustrated the Clinton program this year still apply. In the minority, Griffin said, it may be easier to galvanize Democrats than when their perennial majorities were sometimes split.

"I think on contested issues, it would not be surprising if the minority used the tools available to it," Griffin said. In other words, Democrats can filibuster too, although they say it won't be as routine for them as Republicans made it.

"They have 53 votes, so they have to pick up seven to pass anything major," said Clinton adviser George Stephanopoulos.

In the House, Republican plans are even more ambitious: action on a package of GOP proposals including tax cuts, term limits and welfare reforms, and all by mid-April. The first hundred days hasn't really delivered a major harvest of legislation for a president since Franklin D. Roosevelt, and it usually takes that long just to get started in Congress. Clinton had promised to have his health care proposal to Congress in his first 100 days, and didn't come close.

There's risk in over-reaching, over-reading a mandate. Round-the-clock sessions on the Republicans' bills wouldn't look all that different from the marathons of 1994, when GOP tactics barred Democratic measures.

To Rep. Robert Michel, the retiring Republican leader, the message is simpler: "I said during the campaign and I still think the best thing we had going for us was the president." He said Clinton's own failure to perform as a centrist New Democrat, as promised, made the president the issue.

No, said Harold Ickes, Clinton's deputy chief of staff, it was a message of frustration with ineffective government. Or try Hillary Rodham Clinton's translation:

"I don't think anybody can say exactly what it means."

# Armey, Kasich, DeLay and Walker at Gingrich's right hand

WASHINGTON (AP) - Dick Armey, John Kasich, Tom DeLay and Bob Walker may not be household names - but just wait.

They are the brain trust for Newt Gingrich, a cadre of House lawmakers who stand at the speaker-to-be's right hand as the Republicans prepare to take control.

These four men - combative, conservative, middle-aged, white - are at the core of the tough-talking, hard-ball strategy that helped put the GOP in the driver's seat.

Armey will be the House majority leader. Walker and DeLay, currently competing for the majority whip position, also are sure to get top leadership positions.

Together, Gingrich's lieutenants are working out a strategy for the transition to power - from deciding which Capitol staff members will get the ax to setting the legislative agenda.

**RICHARD ARMEY**

When it comes to playing hardball, the 54-year-old Armey is a master. The former economics professor parlayed his conservative teachings at a Texas university into a political career after getting hooked on Congress by watching C-SPAN.

Elected in 1984 to represent the Dallas-Fort Worth suburbs, he has been outspoken from the start - sometimes hurling vicious verbal barbs. During the debate on the crime bill last summer, he infuriated Democratic colleagues with the line, "Your president is just not important to us."

When Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy announced his resignation under pressure, Armey quipped, "This is just the tip of the sleazeburg."

At a health reform hearing, he argued against including abortion as a guaranteed health insurance benefit, saying, "Are we going to be so fem-centric that we're going to condone the self-indulgent conduct of the body of a woman who has already demonstrated in most cases (she was) damned careless with it in the first place?"

An architect of the GOP "Contract with America," Armey is sure to push his causes as majority leader, although chances are he'll tone down his rhetoric.

He is an ardent supporter of

free-market policies and is pushing a 17 percent flat tax - under which many tax loopholes would be eliminated but everyone, rich and poor, would pay the same percentage income tax. In favor of reining in the size and scope of government, Armey has also fought in the past to eliminate farm subsidies.

**ROBERT WALKER**

Walker, 51, of Pennsylvania, was elected to Congress in 1976 and has worked closely with Gingrich for the past decade. Like the House speaker-to-be, he is a familiar gadfly, known for going to excruciating lengths to get in the way of the Democrats.

In the mid-1980s, he was part of Gingrich's Conservative Opportunity Society, whose young members masterfully capitalized on House parliamentary procedures to spread their conservative message.

Day after day, they attacked the Democrats and called for a new order in after-hours speeches delivered on the House floor. The speeches - called "special orders" - often are delivered to an empty House chamber, but they are broadcast across the country on C-SPAN, and the conservative Republicans were the first to recognize the enormous potential of that forum.

When Gingrich was elected House minority whip in 1989, he brought Walker with him as a deputy. Walker became the chief deputy whip in 1993.

Walker is known for his bulldog tactics and sometimes inflammatory rhetoric - such as comparing Republicans under Democrats to the Jews under Nazi rule.

Concerned about the growing deficit, he is the author of the Taxpayer Debt Buydown Act, by which citizens would be allowed to designate up to 10 percent of the taxes they owe to deficit reduction and Congress would match those contributions.

In line to become chairman of the House Science, Space and Technology Committee, he has been a big advocate of major space programs and wants to see a Cabinet-level post overseeing the same areas as the committee. He also has pushed for research into hydrogen as an alternative fuel source.

**TOM DELAY**

DeLay, 47, of Texas, came to

Congress from the Texas House in 1985, already angling for a leadership role. In 1987, he got a place on the Appropriations Committee, and by the 101st Congress, he was a deputy whip.

But he lost that job in 1989, when Gingrich came to power. DeLay backed the wrong horse, campaigning for Gingrich's opponent, Edward Madigan of Illinois. When Gingrich won, DeLay quickly saw where the wind was blowing and repositioned himself accordingly.

In the 102nd Congress, he became chairman of the House Republican Study Group, a party policy organization. At the start of the current 103rd Congress, he moved up to secretary of the House Republican Conference, with Armey, his Texas friend, as chairman.

Once the owner and operator of a pest control business, DeLay is a staunchly pro-business and anti-government regulation. He opposed the Family and Medical Leave Act, for instance, as a burden on business. He was one of the authors of the Job Creation and Wage Enhance Act within the Republican "Contract with America," which seeks regulatory relief for small business and a cut in the capital gains tax to help stimulate business growth. He also is active in Republican plans for revamping the welfare system to put those on welfare to work and to make welfare temporary, rather than a way of life.

Despite his conservative views, DeLay prides himself as a deal maker, which could sometimes work for the Democrats.

His Houston district includes many employees of the Johnson Space Center, and he is a big supporter of space programs.

**JOHN KASICH**

Kasich, 42, of Ohio, was elected to the Ohio Senate at the age of 26 and still possesses seemingly limitless amounts of boyish energy. He has been in the House since 1983.

In line to become the chairman of the House Budget Committee, Kasich is an aggressive fiscal conservative

but not always an ideologue. He has worked with Republicans and Democrats alike in sponsoring fiscally conservative legislation, but has used his spot as ranking Republican on the Budget committee as a platform to attack Clinton's economic policies and present Republican alternatives.

While Kasich defends most defense spending, he spoke out in the 101st Congress in favor of eliminating the B-2 bomber. He also serves on the House Armed Services Committee and won a fight to stop a \$110 million building expansion for the Pentagon - but on matters that don't rouse his fiscal concerns, he votes conservatively.

In the last Congress, he joined with Democrats like Charles Stenholm of Texas and Tim Penny of Minnesota to push for several measures designed to control spending.


One of the Republicans who voted for the crime bill that became law this year, Kasich is considered potentially more conciliatory than the rest of the Republican inner circle.



## Board bans tobacco use in state prisons

AUSTIN (AP) - Officials voted Friday to prohibit tobacco products in state prisons.

Carol Vance of Houston, chairman of the Texas Board of Criminal Justice, said this may be the first total ban of tobacco products by a state prison system.

Vance, who proposed the measure in September, said it will affect some 33,000 employees and 100,000 inmates in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Tobacco use will be prohibited in the prisons, recreation yards, parking lots, and any other property owned or leased by the prison agency.

Board member Allan Polunsky of San Antonio, said the prisoners may not like it, but that's tough.

"We're not operating the Ritz Carlton. These people lost their privileges when they arrived in TDCJ. They'll have to abide by the rules, and that's it," he said.

The board, meeting in San Antonio, adopted the ban 9-0. It is aimed primarily at cigarettes, but also applies to items such as chewing tobacco.

It will take effect March 1, 1995. Board members said they would decide later whether to phase-in or implement it "cold turkey."

The American Lung Association and other groups said they will work with inmates and prison employees to help ease the transition to a smoke-free environment.

Although banning tobacco might make some inmates irritable, James Collins, director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, said that shouldn't matter.

"Trouble is a potential every given

day," he said. "But I am not going to make decisions, and I would hope the board would never make decisions, based on some potential threat by people who have broken the law."

Larry Todd, a spokesman for the prison system, said smoking among inmates has dropped in recent years because of the health hazard, and the fact that many inmates don't have money to buy cigarettes.

Tobacco sales through commissaries amounts to about \$1 million annually, a prison spokesman said.

"We would like our inmates to be healthy. That saves taxpayer money when we have fewer medical problems," Todd said.

Todd said several states have instituted smoking bans, but he doesn't know of any that have knocked out all tobacco products.


"There's going to be a lot of unhappy inmates," said John Fleming, another spokesman with the prison system. "I used to be a smoker and I can sympathize with these guys. When you're in prison you have to make so many adjustments, and now you'll have to quit smoking," he said.

He said he expects the new rule to be challenged in court by an inmate.

# Cowboys, 'Skins fired up despite opposite records

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Cowboys vs. Redskins. Forget the records.

"In this series it doesn't matter if a team is on the top or the bottom," said Dallas defensive star Bill Bates. "Everybody still gets fired up. You can just throw the records aside."

Dallas is 8-2 and the Redskins, who enjoyed a needed week off, are just the opposite.

Dallas beat Washington 34-7 on Oct. 2 and could sweep the Redskins for the first time since 1985 with a victory in Texas Stadium on Sunday. The Cowboys were early 15-point favorites to do so.

Washington catches the Cowboys coming off a hard 21-14 loss to the San Francisco 49ers.

It will be a homecoming of sorts for Washington coach Norv Turner, who helped the Cowboys win two Super Bowls as the offensive coordinator.

"I'm looking forward to coming back to Texas Stadium," Turner said. "Those were some great days for me. I also look forward to another time when we can come in a better team."

Once again the game will feature a duel of wits between Turner and Dallas offensive coordinator Ernie Zampese, who taught Turner the trade.

"They still look like the same old Cowboys to me," Turner said. "I know they are hurt some in the offensive line with the loss of Erik Williams (to a car accident) and Kevin Gogan to free agency. I don't see anything wrong with them."

Turner said this is a business trip so he and Zampese will exchange only brief pleasantries.

"I'll let him buy me dinner in

February at one of the combines," Turner said.

Rookie Gus Frerotte, a seventh-round pick from Tulsa, will make his fourth consecutive start for Turner. His 583 yards passing and five touchdown passes are the best numbers ever by a Redskins rookie after three starts. Frerotte took Washington to a win at Indianapolis but lost his last two games, to Philadelphia and San Francisco.

"I was impressed with Frerotte when I saw him in college," said Dallas coach Barry Switzer. "I was up in the press box and asked a scout from Kansas City who he was there to see, and he said Frerotte. I thought he had a strong arm and a great delivery."

Turner said Frerotte has looked good replacing the injured Heath Shuler.

"He's a good young prospect," Turner said. "He has an excellent arm and a quick release. He's a very talented guy. He could be a very good quarterback in this league at some point. He's got pretty good accuracy and vision."

Turner said he knows how much this game means to the cities involved.

"There's a lot of pride and respect based on what I've been reading we have no chance in this game," Turner said. "In the earlier loss we didn't give it our best effort. It was disappointing. It was the only time this year that we looked like we weren't prepared to play."

## Extension News

FIRST THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving Day will happen this month, and many of us will have the holidays to spend with our family. Most of us have definite plans. These may include watching television, cleaning around the house, garden maintenance, or just plain relaxing. Regardless of preconceived plans-of-action, there is one Thanksgiving event in which the majority of Americans unanimously participate--eating. After all, it's Thanksgiving complete without steaming fowl astride the family serving platter surrounded by gourmet delights?

Of course, we know how all of this eating got started. The English colony of Plymouth, Massachusetts, decided to give thanks for their first successful year in America and gave a luncheon.

Being the thing to do in Plymouth in the 1620's, neighboring Indians were invited. It was a pot luck affair. In fact, if the Indians had not come, the meal would have been a snack instead of a luncheon!

That brings us to the point of menu. We all know that American tradition dictates for us a menu of turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce, gravy and potatoes, bread and a desert of pumpkin pie. The first Thanksgiving may have had a similar menu. Corn, pumpkin and squash, beans, sunflower and Jerusalem artichoke are true native American vegetables. The field peas, cowpeas, watermelons, cantaloupes and peppers being grown by Indians when the colonists arrived were picked up from Spanish gardens in Florida and the Southwest.

Indians taught the pilgrims sound horticulture practices which enabled the immigrants to survive those first

struggling years in the frontier wilderness. Lacking iron tools, Indians could not turn heavy sod or cut down trees. Instead, they sought our clearings created by forest burns and river bottoms where flooding prevented forest growth, or they girdled forest trees to kill them in place. After burning weeds and brush, the Indian farmers planted pumpkins to smother weeds and later interplanted beans, field peas, and pumpkins among corn rows. Out in the center of the corn patch, they would hide a small plot of melons or sweet corn. When pilgrims arrived, they copied Indian farming methods and stole seed supplies. Without the Indian's hard-earned expertise and carefully-selected seed varieties, our first settlers could not have survived.

As we enjoy Thanksgiving let's not forget those "first" farmers and let's express our THANKS to the 3% of our total population who feed us with their agricultural expertise. Happy Thanksgiving.



GARDENING AND THE  
FIRST THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving Day will happen this month, and many of us will have the holidays to spend with our family. Most of us have definite plans. These may include watching television, cleaning around the house, garden maintenance, or just plain relaxing. Regardless of preconceived plans-of-action, there is one Thanksgiving event in which the majority of Americans unanimously participate--eating. After all, it is Thanksgiving complete without steaming fowl astride the family serving platter surrounded by gourmet delights?

Of course, we know how all of this eating got started. The English colony of Plymouth, Massachusetts, decided to give thanks for their first successful year in America and gave a luncheon.

Being the thing to do in Plymouth in the 1620's, neighboring Indians were invited. It was a pot luck affair. In fact, if the Indians had not come, the meal would have been a snack instead of a luncheon!

That brings us to the point of menu. We all know that American tradition dictates for us a menu of turkey, dressing, cranberry sauce, gravy and potatoes, bread and a desert of pumpkin pie. The first Thanksgiving may have had a similar menu. Corn, pumpkin and squash, beans, sunflower and Jerusalem artichoke are true native American vegetables. The field peas, cowpeas, watermelons, cantaloupes and peppers being grown by Indians when the colonists arrived were picked up from Spanish gardens in Florida and the Southwest.

Indians taught the pilgrims sound horticulture practices which enabled the immigrants to survive those first

struggling years in the frontier wilderness. Lacking iron tools, Indians could not turn heavy sod or cut down trees. Instead, they sought our clearings created by forest burns and river bottoms where flooding prevented forest growth, or they girdled forest trees to kill them in place. After burning weeds and brush, the Indian farmers planted pumpkins to smother weeds and later interplanted beans, field peas, and pumpkins among corn rows. Out in the center of the corn patch, they would hide a small plot of melons or sweet corn. When pilgrims arrived, they copied Indian farming methods and stole seed supplies. Without the Indian's hard-earned expertise and carefully-selected seed varieties, our first settlers could not have survived.

So, as you can see, if all in attendance at the first Thanksgiving luncheon were good horticulturists, a possible menu could have been:

Salad: Poke, purslane, lamb's

quarters, dock or pigweed greens. Main course: deer, wild turkey, rabbit, quail or duck served with succotash from roasted green corn and mixed with green beans, hominy from dried field corn soaked in lye; bread from ground dried corn or mashed hominy mixed with acorns, Jerusalem artichokes, peas, watermelons, cantaloupes, and peppers.

Dessert: bread from buckwheat or rye served with pumpkin molasses, honey, pumpkin custard or pumpkin pie.

As we enjoy Thanksgiving let's not forget those "first" farmers and let's express our THANKS to the 3% of our total population who feed us with their agricultural expertise. Happy Thanksgiving.



**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** You missed the point when you responded to the grandfather who asked how honorable, decent men can protect themselves in the face of increasing claims of sexual harassment.

It seems that while his 9-year-old granddaughter was sitting on his lap, she said, "You are touching me in the wrong place." Instead of appreciating her sensitivity, he told her, "Get the hell of my lap. You're watching too much TV."

It is difficult these days for children to make the fine distinctions between what is acceptable touching and what is not. If that child is criticized for expressing her feelings, she will learn that it is safer to keep quiet. The next time she feels that she has been touched "in the wrong place," she may remain silent -- and this time, it may be authentic abuse.

It is understandable that an adult might be alarmed to hear accusations from his own blood relative, but if a child tells you to stop touching him or her "in the wrong place," please pay attention. Children should never be discouraged from expressing their feelings. To do so is to deprive them of their power.

We must help children understand what IS and is NOT appropriate

touching. This is by no means an easy process, but the more children are encouraged to express their feelings, both positive and negative, the better adjusted they will be. And safer, too. -Evanston, Ill.

**DEAR EVANSTON:** You have written a letter that I hope will be the basis for discussion in many kindergartens and first-grade classrooms.

So many youngsters have been brought up to believe that whatever adults do is OK and that children must never question them. They must learn early that they, too, have rights and to trust their instincts. I wholeheartedly agree that we must teach children the difference between what is "OK" touching" and what is not.

Thanks for an opportunity to get this information out.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** I have lived with "Herman" for 14 years. We have a teen-age son. We were never married because his wife refused to give him a divorce.

Herman's wife died six months ago. At her funeral, the oldest of his three daughters begged him not to marry me for at least a year "out of respect" for her mother.

Here's the problem. Herman and I are both in failing health. Our son does not know we aren't legally married. I don't want to wait another six months, but Herman insists. I've had major surgery twice, and Herman has a heart condition. I am 39, and he is 70. I'm beginning to think Herman doesn't really want to marry me after all.

Tell me, Ann, does his daughter have the right to ask her father to do this? They hardly had much of a relationship when his wife was alive, and they don't have much of one now. She does not consider my son to be her brother. If Herman has so much "respect" for his late wife, why did he live with me for 14 years while she was alive? I really need your counsel, Ann. --Major Quandary in N.Y.

**DEAR N.Y.:** Herman owes you a lot more than he owes his daughter. Enlist the help of both your physician and Herman's to move up the wedding date. Good luck.

Some of the new books to choose from this week include *The Lottery Winner* by Mary Higgins Clark. This is a collection of short stories about Alvira and Willy Meehan. For those of you with great memories, Alvira was first introduced in "Weep No More My Lady" where she worked as a cleaning lady until she won the lottery. In that book Alvira narrowly survived a stalking killer and she faces many more adventures in these stories. Discovering "The Body in the Closet" is just the beginning. After winning her millions and appearing on the *Donahue Show*, Willy becomes the target of kidnappers, and Alvira must save her hapless hubby. Even while vacationing in Cape Cod the Meehan's find plenty to keep their lives exciting and busy. I think this is a couple you won't want to miss.

Another intense work of forensic detection comes from Ridley Pearson in *No Witnesses*. People are dying throughout Seattle from poisoned foods purchased in local supermarkets. The murderer sends a chilling ransom letter to the police through the fax from a laptop computer over the public phone lines. He retrieves the ransom through automatic teller machines in a hundred different locations around the city. The victims are so scattered in both location and time lapses that it is difficult to determine where a detective should start. How can a criminal be stopped when there is no crime scene to study and no witnesses to question. Police psychologist Daphne Matthews knows there is a motive and she should be able to discover it if she digs deep enough. Detective Lou Boldt knows there must be a forensic trail somewhere but how can it be tracked through the computer networks?

Another tale of murder comes in Francine Mathew's *Death In The Off Season*. Meredith Folger is faced with her first murder case when Rusty Mason, a member of Nantucket's oldest and wealthiest families is found murdered in a flooded cranberry bog. Almost a decade before, Rusty had been indicted for securities fraud and seemingly had disappeared. No one had expected Rusty to show up, except the killer. As Merry digs deeper into the case she finds a number of people

## — YOUR EYES —



### "LAZY EYE"

Amblyopia, or "lazy eye," occurs when one eye does not send as good a "picture" to the brain as the other; in time, the brain ignores the image from that eye and relies more on the good one. It is vital to diagnose this condition and treat it as early as possible.

Here's why. In a young child's developing brain, there are cells that respond to each eye individually and some that need stimuli from both. For the visual system to mature properly, both kinds of cells require continuous input. In time, there can be an actual loss of brain cells serving the amblyopic eye.

The child doesn't know there is another way he or she is supposed to see, so there are rarely any complaints or symptoms. It may be that the family doctor will detect or suspect an abnormality, but a complete optometric examination is recommended. The eye professional is trained to spot amblyopia and its underlying causes and to initiate treatment--often a patch over the good eye to "exercise" the other one.

## Question/Answer

Q. We have two 50-gallon electric water heaters connected in series, but we seldom use large amounts of hot water. If hot water is being dispensed one tank at a time, it seems that the water in the second heater in the series would rarely be dispensed. Could this standing water be a breeding ground for bacteria? How practical is it to turn off one via the breaker switch until large amounts of hot water are needed?

A: Yes, standing water can be a breeding ground for bacteria that are always present in water. However, in a municipal water supply, the bacteria are normally not toxic, but they can cause smelly or rusty water. If your water heaters are connected in series, you won't have standing water. As water is drawn from the first tank, makeup water will flow from the second tank into the first, and from the water supply into the second tank.

Installing the water heaters individually (so each serves a group of fixtures), installing an instantaneous water heater (a small gas or electric water heater adjacent to a tub-shower or sink) or installing a single large water heater. Each installation has advantages and drawbacks, and you should discuss each of these with the contractor who will perform the installation.

## Film tells compelling story of famed Dionne quintuplets



Beau Bridges stars as Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe, the opportunistic country doctor who delivered the world famous Dionne quintuplets on a farm in Ontario, Canada, in 1934 and later became their legal guardian, in *Million Dollar Babies*. It airs in two parts Sunday and Tuesday on CBS.

A well-known tale of fame and exploitation is dramatized in *Million Dollar Babies*, airing in two parts, Sunday and Tuesday, Nov. 20 and 22, on CBS.

The story, beginning with the birth of Canada's Dionne quintuplets 60 years ago, has themes that resonate today.

Oliva and Elzire Dionne (Roy Dupuis and Céline Bonnier) were a French Catholic farm couple living in rural Northern Ontario with their five children. Their small frame house had neither electricity nor running water. The Depression had only worsened their already-poor prospects.

In May 1934, Elzire went into premature labor with her sixth child. In a few hours she gave birth to five daughters: Cecile, Yvonne, Annette, Emilie and Marie – the first surviving quintuplets in recorded history. Soon the world was beating a path to the little farmhouse in Ontario.

In the Pollyanna logic of the time, the girls' survival was seen as an affirmation of family life and of hope in troubled times. Yet their French Catholic parents were considered part of a backward underclass. In the glare of the media spotlight, their poor living conditions – no worse than those of millions across the continent – seemed unworthy of the five celebrity infants.

Recognizing an opportunity for revenue, the government declared their parents unfit and placed the girls in a specially built hospital, under the supervision of Allan Roy Dafoe (Beau Bridges), the English-speaking doctor who had delivered them.

It was something out of a Shirley Temple movie – bright, efficient and antiseptic. As visitors started to arrive for daily peeks at the quintuplets, a carnival midway of opportunists sprang up. Through tourism and prod-

uct endorsements, the quintuplets became Ontario's second largest industry. The girls' emotional development was never considered.

*Million Dollar Babies* tells the story of the Dionnes through age 6, though they were not actually returned to their parents until they were 9. Animatronic babies are used in the agonizing birth scene. (Younger viewers should perhaps miss the first half-hour.) Two sets of triplets portray the girls later.

Though Bridges admits he had never heard of the Dionnes before reading the script, he gives a fine, unaffected performance as the self-avowed "simple country doctor" who formed a real attachment to the girls and believed he was acting in their best interest.

"The mistakes that were made," Bridges says, "I don't think, were mean-spirited."

Kate Nelligan plays Helena Reid, a composite character representing several tabloid-style journalists of the day, always hungry for an "angle."

Even the Dionnes' father, Oliva, came to see his daughters as property. Dupuis gives a sharp portrayal of a young man first shamed in the press then blinded by opportunity.

*Million Dollar Babies* makes it clear whose viewpoint is correct: that of the loving mother, Elzire, and her surrogate, Marie (Monique Spaziani), one of the young nurses. In addition, the producers have made a point of announcing that rights fees were paid to the surviving sisters – Cecile, Annette and Yvonne – for their story.

It is easy enough to deplore the exploitation of the Dionne quintuplets, but there is a message for the present as well: Every celebrity is a fabrication, made to serve someone's purpose. The only question is, whose?
