### Final Call for Home Nursing Classes

Issuing a final call for registration of Deaf Smith County women for Red Cross home nursing courses, Mrs. Bob Wilson, chapter chairman for home nursing, stated that the classrooms in the courthouse will be dismantled and the equipment removed unless greater interest is shown.

As yet there has not been sufficient registration to justify a class to start on Nov. 5, Mrs. Wilson says. However, if there is sufficient interest shown, several classes will be offered during the month of November.

Mrs. Marie Carroll, registered nurse, teaches the course, which consists of one two-hour class every day for six days. Classes will be offered both afternoon and night if the registration justifies the schedule.

One teen-age youth is in jail—and about one-third of the \$300 taken from the Hereford Bus Station Sunday in a daylight robbery has been recovered, Sheriff J. O. Entry was gained after the removal of a pane of glass from the window at the back of the shop and men's clothing—suits, slacks and jackets—were the only items taken, Owen said. None of the clothing has been recovered.

### War Fund Drive To Be Extended Thru November

Because of the fact that Texas raised only 62 per cent of its National War Fund quota in October, the period for the drive has been extended through the month of November, according to Urlin Streu, chairman, who says that the additional time should enable Deaf Smith County to complete the job of raising \$3,600 for the fund.

Governor Coke R. Stevenson, in announcing the extension of the War Fund Drive, stated: "November . . . will settle the question of Texas' leadership in two patriotic investment enterprises, namely, in War Gifts and War Bonds. Both aid our fighting men. Both are needed to conclude the war job successfully. However, neither should interfere with the other and it is unthinkable that Texas should put over the bond campaign and fall in the War Fund effort."

### Jr. Red Cross Drive to Start In Local Schools

The drive for membership in the Junior Red Cross will get underway this week in public schools of Hereford and Deaf Smith County, and with a record school enrollment, Junior Red Cross membership also is expected to show an increase.

In announcing the membership campaign, Mrs. Clyde Cave, Junior Red Cross chairman, also outlined the use to which membership fees are put, pointing out that much of the money collected remains in the county to finance local Junior Red Cross activities.

Funds paid in to the National organization amount to 50 cents for each room in the elementary school. Mrs. Cave said. All money over this amount is placed in two funds.

Money in the Local Service Fund is used here to pay for the Christmas tree, given each year by the Junior Chapter to the enlisted men at the P. O. W. camp. Other money is used for local expenses and to buy materials used by the children in their production work for Red Cross service clubs, hospitals, etc.

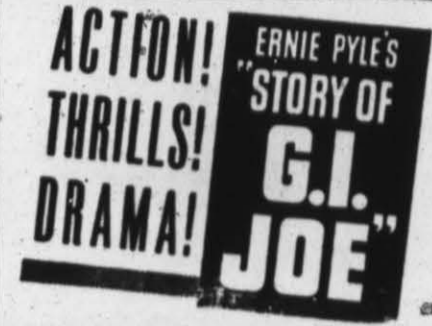

From National headquarters comes an appeal for USO scrapbooks. We have written for information and details for compiling them. Soon we hope to have this work as an added feature to our handwork.

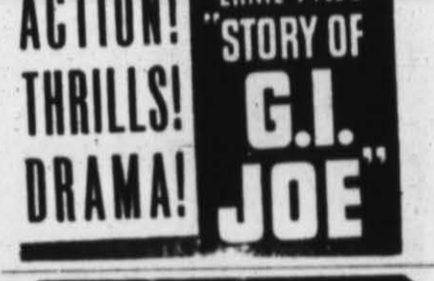

### AAA Committee To Name Practices OK for Payment

A list of conservation practices and rates of payment for the 1946 farm year have been received at the Deaf Smith County AAA office. F. G. Collier announced this week, adding that complete details of the 1946 program will be announced following a meeting of county and community committeemen and representatives of various farm agencies to be held within the next week or ten days.

The set up for conservation payments under the 1946 program will be somewhat different, Collier said. This year a specific amount will be allotted to each county for conservation payments, and the practices for the county will be selected by the committeemen and agricultural agency representatives on the basis of past records and the opinions of local farm leaders as to what practices are most useful in this particular territory.

Because the total expenditure is budgeted, and because the farm group will allot money from the budget to the various practices approved, it will be necessary for all farmers complying with the program to get approval of the committee for practices which they plan to carry out, prior to starting the actual work. Otherwise, some practices might be completed and the budget might not be able to meet the payments.

The new system is in line with the policy of turning more administrative duties over to local county and community committees and is expected also to be more economical in the use of money for the conservation program.

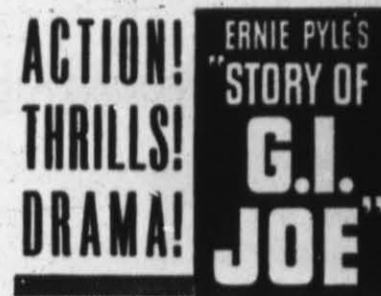

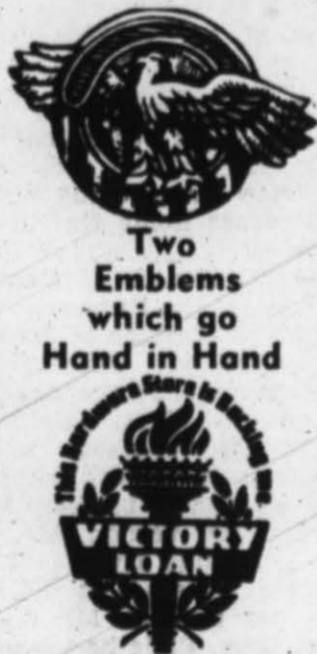

# SONS In the Service

**Dig a Hole in a Hill, —and Stay There—** is Olson's Advice on Typhoons. Stating that he was "tired, hungry and wet—but stood the storm O. K.," George L. Olson, SKD 2-c, wrote his mother Mrs. Louie Olson, a graphic account of the recent typhoon which swept Okinawa. And though Olson feels that he was lucky to escape so lightly in this storm, he states positively that the next typhoon is going to find him digging a hole in the side of the nearest hill—and staying there.

For typhoons are regular occurrences on Okinawa, Olson says, and other storms may be expected. Although his hut was often lifted off the ground at the front and raised a few inches then scooted along the ground to end up about five feet from where it was located when the storm started, this was a minor case; Olson declares, adding "A two by four snapped, but we caught it and spliced it . . . and despite the leaks we managed to keep our sacks and gear fairly dry."

Other buildings were not so fortunate—the chow hall, warehouses and ship's service building were literally flattened, while the pastoffice and Red Cross buildings were moved to a location where they were tottering on the edge of a cliff. As for the tents, though they were located in a ravine where they were somewhat protected from the wind, the water got so high that the entire tent ground was flooded and very few tents were left standing.

The moral to the whole story, according to Olson, is that temporary type construction, such as that used on Okinawa, is strictly out or order and there will have to be some big changes made if a military base is to be maintained there.

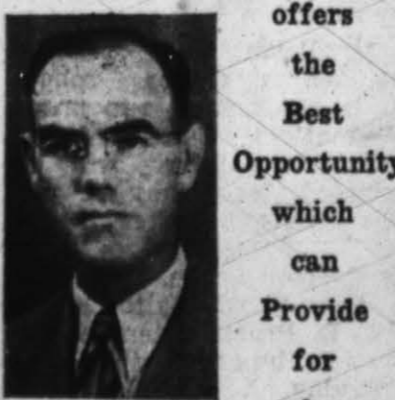

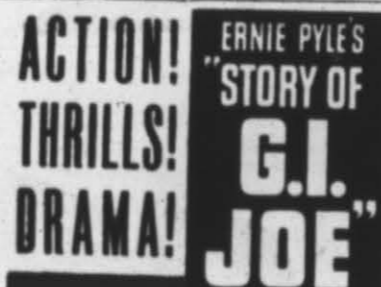

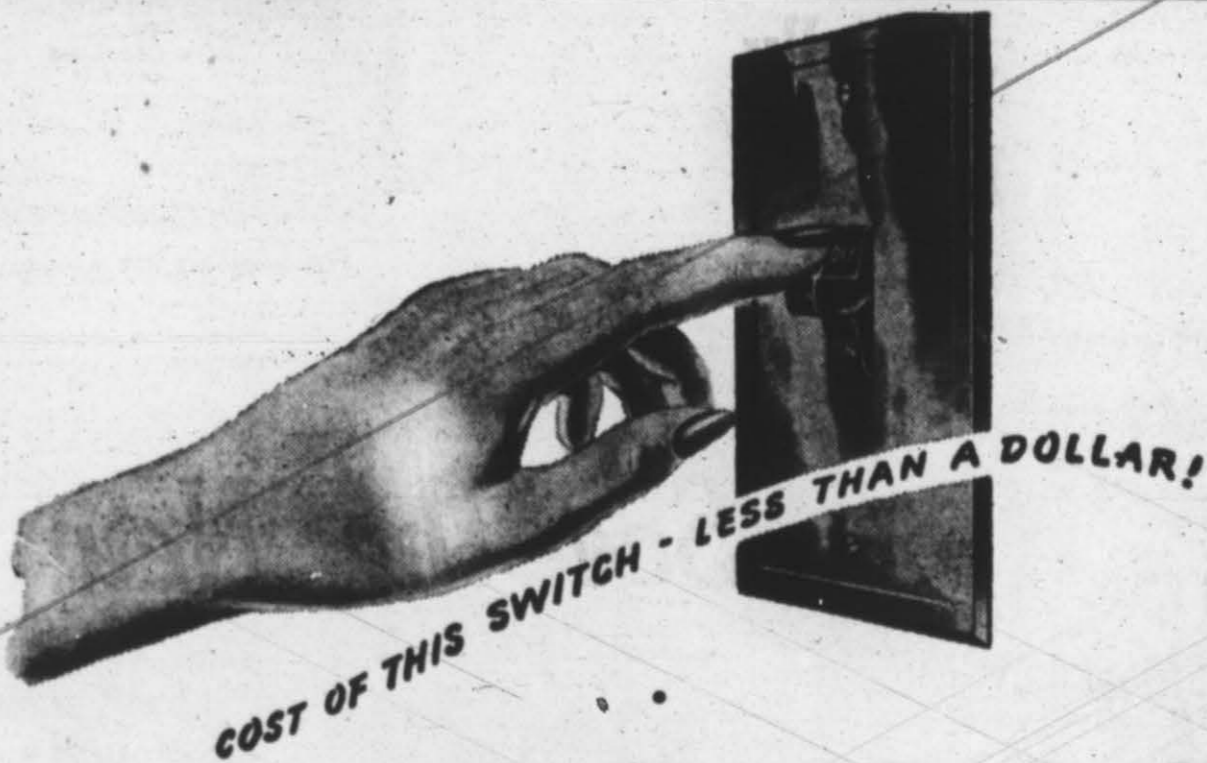

sioned Bill Moore, expert welder, to set up a shop for the exclusive production of the Kirby Digger. The production end of the business will be under the supervision of Jim Kirby.

**Drills A Hole in 18 Seconds**  
That, briefly, is the history. As for what the machine will do, a demonstration out at Bill Kerr's place northeast of Hereford Monday morning proved that the whirring drill, attached to a tractor motor, will drill a 24 inch hole in about 18 seconds, which adds up to lots of post holes in one day's time.

Asked how this compared with the rate of digging by a man on the business end of an old fashioned posthole digger, Doc Kirby implied that the question right now is to find a man—any man—who is willing to operate a post hole digger. "Why, the farmers and ranchers are afraid to even mention the job," he said, and cited instances of whole crews quitting

a job when post-hole digging was on schedule.

**Will Save Money**  
The price of the digger is going to be \$165, F. O. B. Hereford, but when this cost is compared with the saving made with a digger which makes five or six hundred holes a day (figured at the old rate at 10 cents a hole) the machine will pay for itself on any fairly large job of hole digging. And the price is actually lower than that of any other digger on the market.

Incorporating a number of exclusive features, the Kirby digger has a decided advantage in the fact that it can be operated by one man instead of the two-or-three man team needed by most other diggers.

**Operates On Pulley**  
The operator stays on his tractor seat; and after the holes have been laid off, simply drives down the row, stopping at each hole and setting the drill on the desired location. The digger operates off a pulley from the tractor motor and is mounted at the side of the tractor.

Both the pulley and side mount are new features, the manufacturers state, pointing out that other diggers operate on a complicated gear system and are mounted either on the front or rear of the tractor. The side mount permits better visibility for the operator and also prevents packing of the loose dirt around the hole by the tractor as it moves on down the fence line.

Models have been made for John Deere tractors (interchangeable on Models A and G) for International, (Models M and H), Allis Chalmers (W. C.) and Minneapolis-Moline, model UTU.

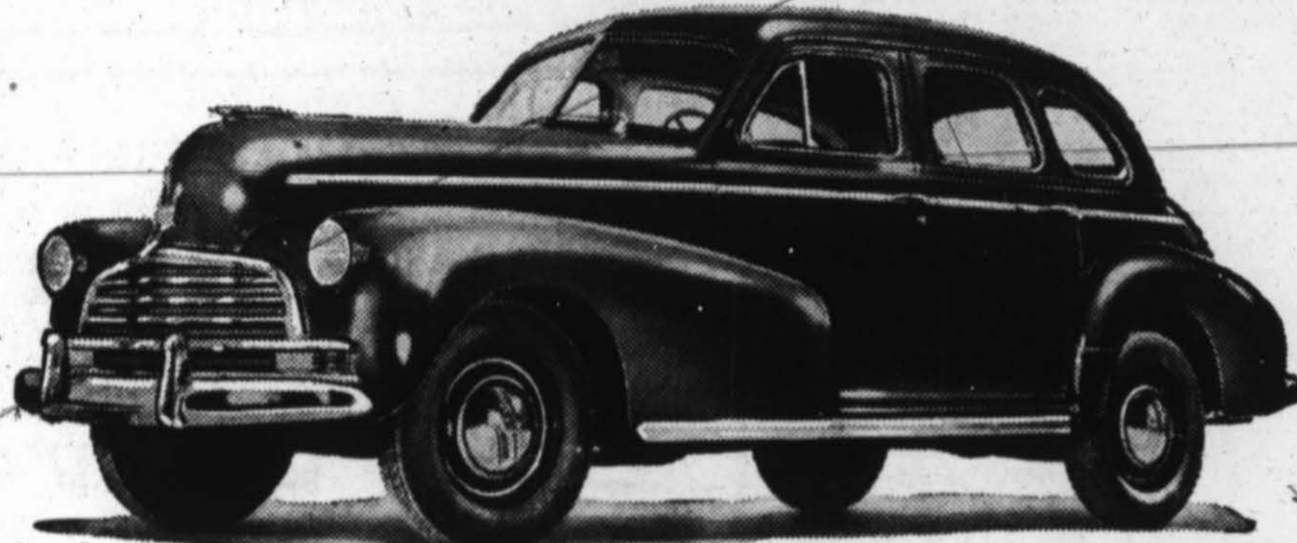

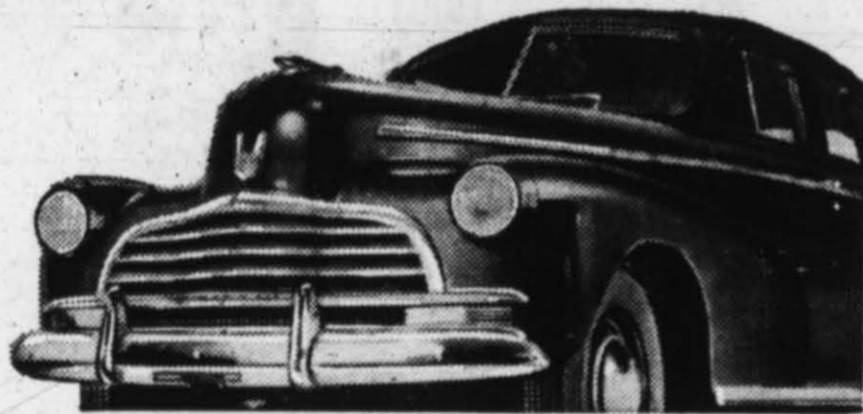
