

Artho family lives with near-tragedy Presentation marks latest chapter in 14-year drama

 Nearly 14 years ago, Hereford held its breath as rescue workers labored at the mouth of a 20-inch abandoned well to free a 4-year-old boy who could not jump far enough. Jared Artho, who would not turn 5 for another month, was trapped more than 100 feet below the soil of his grandfather's farm. Chapter 1 of the drama climaxed two hours later when a dirty Jared was pulled from the well on a rope to

which he hung for dear life. Last week, the latest chapter in the drama hit another climax when Jared -- who graduated two weeks ago from Hereford High School -- renewed his ties with the firemen who saved his life so long ago. The firefighters, all volunteers with the Hereford Fire Department, presented Jared with a \$250 college scholarship and a special gift, a section of the rope with which he was saved.

The background to the presentation begins on a sunny July morning in rural Deaf Smith County. On the day of the accident -- July 10, 1981 -- Jared and his brothers, Jeremy, then 6, and Matthew, then 2, were staying at the home of their grandfather, Elroy Artho, while mom Virginia Artho was in the hospital. The day before, all three of the boys became big brothers with the birth of Sarah, their only sister. The family knew there was an abandoned well on the property northwest of Hereford, but Mrs. Artho said her husband, Eddie, had checked it the day before and confirmed the well was covered. The morning of July 10, however, an uncle of the boys uncovered the well and began working to fill it, a project that had already reduced the depth of the well from about 260 feet to about 133 feet. There was one eyewitness to the accident -- Jeremy Artho. He said he and Jared were riding their uncle's front-end loader as he drove from the well to a pile of sand. They would then run back, racing the load to the hole. "We did that about two or three times, then I had the idea of jumping over the thing," Jeremy said. He said he didn't realize until he was flying over the hole in the ground -- it was wider than the 20-inch well, then sloped to the actual beginning of the shaft -- that it was much deeper than he had thought. Jeremy fell short of the other side of the hole, but caught himself at the edge, pulled himself up on the edge and turned around to warn Jared not to jump. Instead he saw his little brother disappear into the well. Moments later the fire department was on its way to the farm located 12-1/2 miles north and nine miles east of town. Rookie Carey Black and fire marshal Jay Spain were in the first truck to respond to the call. "It seemed like it took forever to get out there," Black recalled recently. Records show the call came in at 10:19 a.m. and Jared was freed from the hole at 12:09 p.m. Firemen threw down a section of rope that had been donated to the department by Hereford Grain after

Clinton calls for tough laws on underage DWI

 WASHINGTON (AP) - Hoping to discourage underage drinking, President Clinton said today that every state should have a "zero tolerance" law that penalizes young adults who drive after consuming even one drink. In his weekly radio address, Clinton urged Congress to enact legislation encouraging states to adopt harsher statutes for drinking drivers below the legal age of 21. Aides said the president wants the federal government to push states in that direction with sanctions or incentives or other voluntary means. "A blood alcohol content of 0.02 percent - the equivalent of one beer, one wine cooler or one shot of alcohol - should be enough to trigger the drunk driving penalties for people under 21," Clinton said. "After all, if it's illegal for people under 21 to drink at all, it should certainly be illegal for them to drink and drive. That's a no-brainer." Clinton's latest attack on underage drinking comes as politicians in both parties are trying to claim high moral ground on issues such as family values and sex and violence in Hollywood films. Currently, 24 states and the District of Columbia have "zero tolerance" laws, and similar legislation is awaiting the governor's signature in Rhode Island and Connecticut. Eight states have adopted less-stringent laws to discourage underage drinking among drivers. Under zero tolerance laws, young people with a blood alcohol level of 0.02 percent or more are subjected to the same penalties that their states impose on adults who are considered legally drunk. The level at which people are considered drunk varies from 0.08 percent to 0.10 percent among the states. Penalties for drunken driving also vary from state to state, but all result in license revocation for at least three months. Clinton said zero tolerance laws have been proven to save lives, reducing alcohol-related crashes by 10 percent to 20 percent. In Maine and New Mexico, he said, fatal crashes at night dropped by one-third among young people. Transportation Secretary Federico Pena echoed Clinton in a written statement. "We have saved 14,000 lives since 1984 by raising the drinking age to 21," Pena said. "It is time to take another important step to save the lives of our young people, and I hope Congress will work with the president to assure that all states adopt zero tolerance." Officials at the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said Clinton wants such groups to work with Congress to come up with legislation that would push all states to endorse zero tolerance. They said states that now have such laws include: Arizona, Arkansas, California, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Illinois, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, Ohio, Oregon, Tennessee, Utah, Virginia, Washington.

Resident dies in gas leak
 Longtime Hereford resident Joe H. Pitts, 86, died Friday night in his home after a natural gas leak in the building. Police and fire crews were called to Pitts' home at 317 Avenue H at about 6:47 p.m., where his body was discovered in the kitchen. Officers at the scene noticed a strong smell of natural gas, and Fire Marshal Jay Spain determined that there were toxic amounts of carbon monoxide in the home. Justice of the Peace Johnnie Turrentine was called to the scene and pronounced Pitts dead at about 7:05 p.m. She ruled the death accidental. Funeral arrangements for Pitts are being handled by Gilliland-Watson Funeral Home.

Now hear this about Deaf Smith

Deaf Smith didn't single-handedly win the Texas Revolution. But he triggered the Battle of San Jacinto, 30 smoking minutes on April 21, 1836, that won Texas independence from Mexico. On April 18, Gen. Sam Houston's chief spy, Deaf (nearly blind) Smith, led a party of scouts from the ranks of the Texas army, or what was left after the Alamo and Goliad defenses. The scouts swam their horses across the Rio Grande, rode a dozen miles to the Mexican camp and spotted three mounted Mexicans. They were ordered to capture them. One was Mexican Capt. Miguel Bacheiler, a courier from Mexico City whose saddlebags were packed with gold. The other two were a deaf man and his command. The saddlebags were his with dispatches to General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna, Mexican commander. They were signed by the governor of Texas in Mexico City and various Mexican commanders in Texas.

it was removed from an elevator there.

The heavy rope had a loop tied in it. Black said firemen worked to make sure the loop was too small to go around Jared's neck, but they hoped he would slide his foot through it.

Black said rescuers also tried to line up special microphones and video cameras that could be lowered into the hole to try and spot the boy.

A number of plans were considered to get the lad out of the hole. Big T Pump Co. was called to give assistance, and rescue workers lowered an oxygen tube and flashlight down the hole.

Unfortunately, the Arthos said, rescuers over-estimated the depth of the hole, dumping an estimated 300 feet of rope and oxygen tubing on top of Jared.

Jared said he pulled the flashlight from the mess of rope and oxygen tubing under his body and flashed it up the hole.

Jared said he does not remember the fall to the bottom, although others have said he slid down the shaft a little at a time.

His mother said one theory offered for his suffering very minor injuries -- scrapes, bruises and a sprained ankle -- was that an air cushion developed under Jared as he fell, and that the sand at the bottom of the well softened the drop.

Jared said there were holes along the sides of the well that he used to try and climb back out. As he climbed, though, he would lose his grip and fall to the bottom.

"I wasn't really scared. The pictures show I was crying when I came out. It didn't really bother me," Jared said. "I remember I kept falling asleep and

waking up."

After nearly two hours, rescue workers grew alarmed because they could not see Jared at the bottom of the hole and they could not hear anything.

Gary Whitfill volunteered to have a rope tied around his ankles and be lowered into the hole, but the idea with overruled.

Instead, Spain said, the decision was made to pull out the heavy rope and lower a remote-control camera down in its place.

That became unnecessary, however. Rescue workers were shocked when a small head appeared out of the darkness of the hole as Jared clung to the rope on its tip out of the ground.

But instead of being pulled out feet first as planned, Jared was simply clinging to the rope with his bare hands.

"I don't remember going up at all on the rope," Jared said. "There was a rope right in front of me. It kept itching on my face."

Both Black and Spain acknowledge that they played a relatively small role in the rescue.

"I say to this day we didn't get him out. He sure wanted to get out and he had a lot of help higher than the ground level," Black said.

Spain concurred. The Lubbock *Avalanche-Journal* in its July 11 edition quoted Spain as saying, "The Man Upstairs was working this morning ... He was there. Had to be there."

Mike Watts, who was assistant chief at the time, agreed. "That kid helped save himself," he said.

Once out of the ground, Jared was rushed into an ambulance and hustled to Deaf Smith General Hospital, where, at the time, he parents sat not knowing anything about the near-tragedy.

Eddie Artho said he joined his wife in her hospital room that morning and they spent a couple of hours discussing family bills.

At noon, they turned on the television to catch the news and heard

"a little boy fell into a well at the Elroy Artho farm" north of Hereford.

That was the first mention either one had heard of the accident.

Eddie called his father, who said Jared had been removed safely and was en route to the hospital.

For Virginia Artho, hearing the news report was one of the hardest moments of her life.

A month earlier, a boy in Italy had fallen into a well and died, his body preserved with liquid nitrogen and recovered 30 days later -- just about the time of Jared's accident.

"Having followed that and knowing we had such a deep well out there, something inside me died," Mrs. Artho said. "I just knew whoever it was, we had lost him."

The couple raced -- Eddie on foot, Virginia in a wheelchair -- to the emergency room, where Eddie caught Jared coming out of the ambulance.

"I just grabbed him from them," Eddie recalled.

Jared, though battered, bruised and dirty, was fine. "I got to push the sirens and everything" on the drive to town, he said.

After X-rays showed no injuries, Eddie took Jared to Virginia's room and bathed him, then let the boy take a much-needed nap in a cot in his mother's room.

Both older Arthos praised hospital personnel for their concern for the family at the time.

They let Jared rest in his mother's room and screen telephone calls for them.

After Dr. Gerald Payne checked him out a couple of times, Jared left with his dad to go home -- much to the chagrin of his mother.

"They kept me prisoner while they let Eddie take Jared home," she said with a laugh. The next morning, mom and Sarah joined the rest of the family at home.

Not long thereafter Jared was invited back to the fire department and made a lifetime member of the department -- one of only two people

so honored.

He was given a real fire captain's hat and a department license plate to hang on his bicycle, although Virginia said she vetoed their suggestion that having the plate gave him license to run red lights.

The story of Jared's ordeal has continued to be a part of the Artho family over the intervening years.

Stories about the rescue appeared in newspapers across the country, and the family was interviewed by such papers as the *New York Post*, *Amarillo Globe-News*, *Lubbock Avalanche-Journal*, *Dallas Times-Herald* and others.

The Associated Press in Dallas transmitted the story to Italy and *Stars and Stripes* carried it in Europe.

Jared's ordeal again resurfaced a few years ago when a small girl fell into a well in Midland.

For years, Mrs. Artho said, the story was recounted by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock as a reminder to fill old wells. But she asked them to stop because of the pain of the memories.

Eddie Artho knew the fire department was planning to present his son with a scholarship last week.

Nobody, however, knew they were going to give him a 50-foot section of the rope.

"That was a real tear-jerker," Mrs. Artho said. "It really touched Jared that they kept the rope."

Mrs. Artho said the ceremony also helped her quite a bit.

"Talking about this doesn't bother anyone in the family but me," she said. "Thinking that you almost lost a child is hard to come to grips with. ... The firemen really gave me a gift last (Tuesday) night. It was a healing experience ... a good experience to overshadow the feelings that were hard to live with."

of a nonprofit group called Self Help for hard of Hearing People (yes, SHHH).

Pictured in Painting

SHHH's Marilyn Horton of Coppell wrote me last week that she'd just noticed Deaf Smith in a famous crowded painting by William Huddle.

You know the one. Defeated Santa Anna in muddy white pants stands before victorious Gen. Sam Houston after the Battle of San Jacinto. Houston, an ankle shattered by a musket ball, lies beneath the Treaty Oak with Texans gathered about.

The SHHH spokeswoman, who wears a hearing aid, wrote, "Deaf Smith was in the crowd, sitting near General Houston. He was cupping his hand behind his ear big as life. His hearing loss certainly did not hold him back. He's a fine example of success in spite of a hearing impairment. Would you write about him?"

Shown in the 1886 Huddle canvas--The Surrender of Santa Anna--are the likes of Mirabeau Lamar, Thomas Rusk, Edward Burleson and other Texas heroes who left their names on Texas counties. Non-Texans may not know about Deaf Smith County in West Texas, named after the scout's death.

Erastus Smith (1787-1837) was a New Yorker who came to Texas as a young man by way of Mississippi. He married a Texas widow with three kids in San Antonio and wanted peace with Mexico. He told Texas Gen. Stephen F. Austin as much.

But after his head was bloodied by saber in a personal dust-up with several soldiers of Mexican Gen. Martin Perfecto de Cos, "El Sordo" (The Deaf One) sought out Gen. Austin again and volunteered for the Texas cause.

From that point on, it was a grudge match with Gen. Cos, who offered a thousand-peso reward for El Sordo. The rusty-haired scout responded with his own 500-peso reward for Gen. Cos. "That's all he's worth," spat Deaf Smith.

Happily, the scout was in on the capture after the boyish Gen. Cos fled the battlefield at San Jacinto. To his credit, the scout didn't harm the hapless general.

Deaf Smith wasn't totally deaf. He could manage one-to-one conversations, barely. His comrades insisted his disability was a blessing. He couldn't hear the whine of the bullets. Lots of quiet bullets passed his way.

He fought at Concepcion and in the Grass Fight,

preliminaries to the Texas troops' storming of San Antonio. He was wounded in the same exchange that killed Ben Milam, who'd led the Texans into the town.

Deaf Smith's most famous exploit remains controversial. Just before the Battle of San Jacinto, he destroyed a strategic bridge. It had provided the fastest route through the rain-flooded countryside for reinforcements to reach embattled Santa Anna. With the bridge down, Deaf Smith galloped back into the battle, waving his ax.

Some historians say Vince's Bridge over unimpressive Vince's Bayou wasn't of tactical importance. The bayou could have been skirted easily. Others say it wasn't Vince's Bridge over Vince's Bayou at all. It was Vince's Bridge over sizable Sims Bayou. See, four Vince brothers had farms in the area, one on Sims Bayou.

It gets worse. Nearly a century ago, TCU founder Randolph Clark, who'd lived in the area as a boy, told a TCU graduating class that Vince's Bridge and its destruction by Deaf Smith were "myths" of Texas history.

I'm pretty sure he was confused. Director J.C. Martin at the San Jacinto Museum referred me to an expert, Jeff Dunn of the Harris County historical marker review committee.

A Bellaire lawyer and historian, Mr. Dunn said that, at the turn of the century, members of the Daughters of the American Revolution toured the San Jacinto site with old veterans of the battle. Together they marked locations of specific actions. One was the spot where a granite monument now honors Deaf Smith's timely destruction of the bridge. Any remains of the chopped and burned cedar span are long gone.

"The marker's where it should be," Mr. Dunn assured me.

Deaf Smith won a last battle with Mexican troops after San Jacinto, a skirmish with a Mexican patrol near Laredo.

The Smith family settled down in Richmond (Fort Bend County), but Erastus soon succumbed to what some old-timers diagnosed as "consumption." Others said, at age 50, he just wore out.

He was affectionately buried by dozens of mourners who didn't immediately bother with a tombstone. Today there's a stone in a Richmond cemetery, but Deaf Smith isn't under it. The grave's lost.

Training for concealed gun law will be available Sept. 1

AUSTIN -- Texans interested in obtaining a license to carry a concealed handgun will be able to start the required firearms training program as soon as the law goes into effect on Sept. 1, said James R. Wilson, director of the Department of Public Safety.

"We have an internal task force up and running to do what needs to be done to make this new law work," Wilson said. "We anticipate that we will start training firearms instructors this summer and our goal is to have these instructors licensed and able to start training interested citizens after Sept. 1."

Wilson said the department is currently developing forms,

procedures and rules in order to begin accepting applications for concealed handgun licenses on Sept. 1.

"Texans need to remember that the current weapons laws remain in effect until Jan. 1, 1996," Wilson said. "In the meantime we ask the public's patience as we get this program set up. We will make an announcement to the public when our training classes have been set, with instructions on how to enroll. But the Department is not currently accepting fees or application requests for instructors or licenses."

Wilson cautioned that no firearms instructors or training facilities have been approved by the department at the time.

HJH students taking part in engineering program

A group of Hereford junior high school students are among 100 kids from throughout the Panhandle who are spending time this summer getting a jump on college.

The 13 students are participating in the 1995 Texas Prefreshman Engineering Program (TexPREP) at Amarillo College.

It is an eight-week program that runs through July 28. It is designed to identify students in grades seven through 10 with potential to become scientists and engineers and give them academic reinforcement toward that goal.

Amarillo College is one of 11 sites in Texas where TexPREP is held.

The students leave Hereford each morning at 7:45 a.m. and return at 4 p.m.

In between, they participate in a variety of courses, including: "Logic and its Applications to Mathematics," "Algebraic Structures," "Introduction to Engineering," "Topics in Problem Solving (Seminar)," "Introduction to Computer Science" and "Career Opportunities Awareness."

In order to be selected for

TexPREP, students must carry a B or better average in all academic courses and in mathematics courses for the current school year.

In addition, recommendations from two teachers -- including a mathematics teacher and a counselor or science teacher -- are required and interested students must write a 100-200-word essay presenting the

reasons for wanting to attend TexPREP.

New CT Scanner installed at hospital

Installation of a newly-purchased CT Scanner has been completed at Hereford Regional Medical Center, providing a more efficient, in-house unit. The hospital formerly used a mobile unit outside the hospital. The new equipment cost \$390,000.

Hospital makes room for newly-purchased scanner

Installation of the newly-purchased CT scanner at Hereford Regional Medical Center has caused several departments at the hospital to be shifted.

The high-tech General Electric Sytec 3000 CT scanner now occupies space that was formerly used by the nuclear medicine department, according to Claudia Smith, RT, head of diagnostic imaging at the hospital.

"We're excited about this change, because before the move our patients who needed a CT scan had to go outside the hospital to a mobile unit," said Smith. "This was very inconvenient for patients, but now we have a newer unit housed right here in the hospital."

whole body--the brain, extremities, the abdominal cavity, or the chest. "Our physicians can quickly see fractures of the bones, or brain tumors, detect strokes, or locate masses in the abdominal area," explained Smith.

She added that the new scanner provides a faster scan time and has a higher resolution, making it easier for the radiologist to read the study. Radiologists from High Plains Radiology in Amarillo read all x-rays and CT scans.

"We also have Teleradiology, which allows us to transmit films directly to another hospital or to the radiologist," Ms. Smith said.

The new equipment, which was purchased as part of the hospital's 1995 capital budget, replaces an older CT which was sold. The new scanner cost \$390,000.

With the new CT scanner taking over nuclear medicine, that department moved to the space formerly occupied by the admission office.

Nuclear medicine tests are done by using a Siemens Orbiter Camera, explained Ms. Smith. "That high-tech diagnostic equipment is used by physicians to diagnose diseases of internal organs and bone. With this camera, doctors can locate blood clots in the lungs, spot a non-functioning gall bladder, and diagnose other problems."

There are five technicians in the radiology department and all are either trained or in the process of being trained to perform the CT scans, said Ms. Smith. Other technicians include Carrie Shirley, Michelle Zamora, Cori Watts and John Butts.



Journalists more trusted than national leaders

WASHINGTON (AP) - Call it the cynicism gap: Americans at large are said to be more mistrustful of their national leaders than are journalists who cover them up close.

While the pollsters who made that finding didn't explain it, there may be reasons in issues ranging from Bosnia to Hollywood to political infighting over an anti-terrorist bill.

In each of those controversies, there are explanations that make at least some sense inside the Beltway, a measure of understanding that doesn't mean acceptance. But it is a different lens.

So, for example, on President Clinton's conflicted course on the U.S. role in Bosnia. He ventured the possibility of deepened American involvement, then retreated to about where he began before the Bosnian Serbs stirred crisis by seizing U.N. peacekeepers as hostages.

The administration position now is to offer air and technical support for U.N. forces deployed by NATO allies, while saying that American troops would be used there only in the event of an emergency withdrawal, a situation Clinton called remote and highly unlikely.

He'd said last Wednesday that Americans might be used were there to be a need for reconfiguration and strengthening of the U.N. peacekeeping mission.

No change, the White House said, although there clearly has been.

At a distance, only confusion and indecision could explain all that. At closer hand, it seemed the message was mixed because it was going two ways - to the French, British and other NATO allies with troops in Bosnia, and also to the American public, and to Congress, where there is little if any support for increased involvement.

So Clinton's spokesman, Mike McCurry, summed up this way on Monday:

"The president's policy on Bosnia, the fundamentals of it, have not changed ... really for over two years

... Not entering that war on behalf of the Bosnian government, the Bosnian Muslims and two, no ground troops as part of the continuing U.N. peacekeeping mission there.

"That said, strong support for the NATO efforts ... and a commitment to our allies to do those things that help them remain and participate" McCurry described those as "the broad parameters of a policy that has not changed."

That prompted skeptical questioning, and there will be more in Congress as administration witnesses seek support for Clinton policy. Skepticism close at hand may translate to cynicism on Main Street, where plainer language is the rule.

The same attitude may apply to Sen. Bob Dole's slap at Hollywood and the entertainment business over portrayals of violence and sex he said are debasing America.


The Senate Republican leader singled out Time Warner Inc. for criticism, but he has said since that he won't be returning its campaign donations. It's not a lot of money, \$21,000 since 1987. Keeping it, he said in an NBC appearance on Sunday, "demonstrates that they didn't buy anything" with the contributions.

In everyday terms, returning it would fit the message Dole said he wants to send. But campaigns are expensive, Dole is running for president and to renounce past support could write off future contributions.

Again, that is more understandable close up than at a distance.

So, too, the hassle over anti-terrorist legislation that was supposed to get top-speed handling after the Oklahoma City bombing on April 19. Clinton wanted it passed by Memorial Day; now the Fourth of July is a goal. Dole threatened to shelve it because of Democratic amendments. Clinton earlier had accused Republicans of delaying it.

The president said Monday that both parties should "curb politics" and pass it without delay.

Some years ago, a learned treatise called "Why Johnny Can't Read" sent shudders through parents and educators. The author was a man named Rudolf Flesch and he probably made a fortune on that little booklet.

I submit that if the question is posed today, the answer would be so simple, it defies imagination.

A generation of couch potatoes is on. Instead of reading to children, too many parents and caretakers put a video in the VCR and go about their business while kids get their stories in living color.

Back to Flesch, for the life of me, I can't remember the reasons he gave for American children being unable to read. But the book at the time made such an impression on me that I lived in terror that my children, if, indeed, I ever married and had kids, would be unable to read.

The other day, my daughter asked in all innocence, "Mother, how did you keep us occupied without a VCR and videos?" and I couldn't answer. You see, it's been so long ago, I couldn't remember. (My boss says the mind is the first thing to go.)

All grandparents have to bite their tongues sometimes, to keep from meddling. I never was very good at it, anyhow. But on this occasion, I reminded that playing dolls or coloring on paper were acceptable to children of her generation.

Before I sound too holier-than-thou, I must admit that my kids watched television. But to this day they claim they were deprived because I wouldn't let them watch *The Three Stooges* or *Soupy Sales*.

Reading aloud to children is not only acceptable but heartily endorsed by educators who say it is the first step in teaching them to read.

With all due modesty, my daughters picked up some interest in reading from their mother.

My older daughter began her education career in The Bronx, N.Y., attending P.S. 81 in first grade (after a stop at another P.S., for kindergarten.) I agonized over the approach the educational system used to teach reading.

My daughter never brought home a book of any kind, reader or supplemental reader. She never offered to read the children's books we had, even when encouraged. I worried. Needlessly, as it turned out. Soon after she finished her first grade year, the family piled in the car and made a hurried trip to Texas because of illness in the family.

As we traveled along the highways, it came to my attention that my daughter was reading billboards, scarcely missing a word.

Well, then, I decided, if she can read billboards as we speed down the highway, she can read anything.

On the other hand, my younger daughter, a highly competitive six-year-old, was enrolled in a private school for first grade, in Texas. Early on, the teacher announced that the student who read the most books during the year would receive a special prize.

From Day One, this kid had her sights set on the prize. When the year ended, she had read every book on the shelves appropriate for her age group. More than 250, as I recall. A couple other pupils accomplished the same feat, but she did it first. Toward the end of the school year, she wouldn't admit to being sick because she was afraid someone would get ahead of her.

To this day, she and her sister are inveterate readers. We share books with each other, passing them around. They know if they want to make me really happy, they can buy a hardback copy of a book I especially want to read.

Anyway, it's my hope that they instill this love in my grandchildren. Sometimes, when life at home is hectic, plopping a kid down to watch a video is acceptable. Or, when the weather precludes outdoor activities, there's no harm in watching a movie on video. Don't adults do it all the time?

There's a certain pride in me, though, when I hear my grandchildren ask for a story to be read to them. I'm happy to oblige. (And, so are their parents.)

Five percent of high school seniors did not pass TAAS

AUSTIN (AP) - An estimated 95 percent of Texas seniors passed all sections of the test required for public high school graduation, leaving 5 percent without their diplomas, state officials announced Friday.

This spring's final exit-level Texas Assessment of Academic Skills was given May 2-4 to 13,814 seniors. Students have eight chances to pass the test, beginning in the spring of their sophomore year.

The 9,169 who failed one or more

sections of the reading, writing and math test in their latest try represent 5 percent of this year's senior class enrollment of 183,737.


They can continue taking the exam until they pass, with the next administration July 11-13 at selected sites around the state.

The 95 percent of seniors who passed the exam represents the highest percentage since students have had to meet a 70 passing standard, said state Education Commissioner Mike Moses.

"This is yet another sign that our schools are continuing to improve and are providing our boys and girls the skills they need to be successful," Moses said.

"I congratulate the students, their teachers, principals, superintendents, parents, and our communities across the state for enabling us to reach this milestone."

The passing rate was 95 percent in 1992, but students that year had to correctly answer only 60 percent of the test items to pass, Moses said.

Electric company drops El Paso bid

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - Central and South West Corp. on Friday dropped plans to bring El Paso Electric Co. out of bankruptcy with a \$2.2 billion merger, leaving the utility to find another solution to its financial morass.

El Paso Electric, which had long seen the agreement as its best hope for emerging from more than three years of Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection, responded by filing a lawsuit alleging breach of contract.

The lawsuit, filed late Friday in state district court in El Paso, cites El Paso Electric's duty to recover the money it believes Central owes the utility, its shareholders and creditors. The suit seeks unspecified damages.

"Termination of the agreement by CSW has left us with no other alternative but to pursue this action," El Paso Electric Chief Executive David Wiggs said in a news release.

He added that El Paso Electric would immediately begin working on a new reorganization plan.

Central and South West officials had no immediate comment, although the official who had been in charge of the transition had said earlier in the day that Central had incurred no liabilities by terminating the agreement.

Transition executive John Saenz had even hinted that his company may not be out of the deal entirely.

When pressed by reporters at a news conference, Saenz said Central is "open to any discussion that may involve us in the future regarding the ownership of El Paso Electric."

Wiggs had also expressed a willingness to work with Central, although after the legal filing he said, "CSW's actions are wrongful and have caused great damage to our company."

"It is bitterly disappointing to have our merger partner abandon us without just cause," said Wiggs, who is also the utility's board chairman.

El Paso Electric became the second major investor-owned utility to fail since the Great Depression when it filed for protection from creditors on Jan. 8, 1992. For years it had been struggling with its stake in the Palo Verde Nuclear Generating

Station near Phoenix and other poor investments in real estate and thrifts.

Solvency seemed to be within its grasp in May 1993 when Central, a Dallas-based public utility holding company, announced it would purchase the El Paso utility.

Last year, however, the merger began to show signs of collapsing as Central first alleged it had found serious problems that threatened to cut El Paso's value and later accused El Paso of breaching the deal.

Those problems led Central executives to cut loose from an agreement that already has cost the company \$40 million. They rejected El Paso's request to extend the merger agreement's Thursday deadline until Dec. 8.

"We have used our best efforts to complete the merger, investing many thousands of hours and millions of dollars," said E.R. Brooks, Central's chairman.

Central and South West's stock fell 12.5 cents Friday to \$25.25 on the New York Stock Exchange. The stock has fallen from a recent high of \$26.67-1/2 on Tuesday.

Under the agreement, Central was permitted to terminate the merger because conditions for completing the deal were not satisfied by the deadline. Among the outstanding issues were a lack of approvals from state and federal regulators.


Further, it said, El Paso Electric has not addressed the alleged breaches, including the threat of losing its customers in Las Cruces, N.M., where city officials are fighting aggressively to break away from the El Paso utility.

An analyst who has tracked Central and the merger said reviving the deal in some form doesn't seem out of the question.

"The strategic value of El Paso to Central and South West is still there, it would fit well into the Central and South West system, but not at that original price," said Dan Rudakas of Kemper Securities Inc. in Chicago.

At least part of Central's incentive to buy the utility was the access it would allow to lucrative markets in Mexico and the Southwestern United States. And in the early days, the company pushed hard for the deal.

Dave Hopper, a self-proclaimed "high handicapper" golfer, hit a 4-iron "as hard as I could" and it rolled in the cup on the par-3, approximately 165-yard hole.

Minutes later, Ed Wright of Amarillo lofted a 7-iron to the same green and it rolled into the hole. One foursome of players separated the two teams that had players with aces.

It was the first hole-in-one for both players. There was a nearest-to-the-pin contest on the hole, and Wright figured he had it won--until he got to the pin and discovered Hopper's name down for a hole-in-one.

"That's a heck of a note," said Wright, "when you have to make a hole-in-one to tie a guy on the hole."

Rockets roll on road, take 2-0 lead in finals

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - This Houston road show is getting so ridiculously successful you'd expect Bob Hope and Bing Crosby to show up in Rocket red.

The playoff edition of the Rockets, vastly improved from the regular-season version, made its debut in Salt Lake City, ironed out some wrinkles in Phoenix, stepped up the pace in San Antonio and delivered its crowning performance in Orlando.

Houston used some sleight of hand to escape with a 120-118 overtime victory over the Orlando Magic in Game 1 of the NBA Finals. But Friday night in Game 2, it was an old-fashioned 117-106 whipping.

Orlando, that marvelously talented group of youngsters so obviously headed for greatness, hadn't lost two in a row at home all season, until Rudy Tomjanovich brought his team to town.

"I'm very stunned," the Magic's Anfernee Hardaway said.

It will take an unprecedented rally to prevent Houston from claiming its second consecutive championship.

Only Phoenix in 1993 lost the first two games of the finals at home. Two teams have come back from 0-2 deficits -- Portland in 1977 and Boston in 1969 -- but they lost those games on the road.

"I like our position," Houston's Hakeem Olajuwon said.

The next three games, if that many are necessary, are scheduled in Houston beginning Sunday night. Normally, that would be a good thing, but the Rockets have won seven in a row on the road and nine overall away from home in the playoffs, both NBA records. At home, they're only 4-4.

"We're going to say The Summit is the O-Rena," Houston's Sam Cassell said.

Olajuwon, Cassell and Robert Horry were the big contributors as the Rockets took a 22-point lead by halftime.

"It almost seemed like we had never played together before the way we played in the first half," Orlando coach Brian Hill said. "We were definitely tight. They jumped out on us and I think we started to press. And once we got down, we tried to get it all back at once."

Houston played loose and smooth. Orlando played as if it was a pre-season game. Some old-time Magic players, if any franchise this young can have old-timers, were honored at halftime.

In keeping with the spirit, the current Magic played like those Orlando losers of old.

"I think from the start today we played like robots," the Magic's Nick Anderson said. "We didn't play any

of the basketball that got us to the finals. It seemed like we were running in mud. I look at Houston, and they played so relaxed, no pressure. They're out there having fun."

Olajuwon scored 22 of his 33 points in the first half. Cassell, coming off the bench to replace starting point guard Kenny Smith, scored 16 in the second quarter and tied his playoff career high with 31 points.

Smith, who scored 23 points and made a finals-record seven 3-pointers in Game 1, was scoreless but that was of no consequence.

"The sign of a great team is that different people step up and have a big game," Tomjanovich said. "In Game 1 it was Kenny Smith. Tonight it was Sam Cassell."

Shaquille O'Neal had 23 of his 33 points in the second half and Anfernee Hardaway added 32, but they didn't get much help. The team that led the league in scoring during the regular season simply got too far behind to catch up.

Clyde Drexler overcame early foul trouble to score 23 points for Houston. Horry had 11 points and 10 rebounds, and he set a finals record with seven steals while playing 48 minutes.

Anderson and Dennis Scott both were ineffective for Orlando.

Anderson may have been suffering from an emotional hangover after missing four free throws, any one of which would have clinched the victory, in the final 10.5 seconds of regulation in Game 1. He was 4-for-13. Scott was 3-for-10.

Orlando got within nine several times in the fourth quarter but that was as close as it got.

It was a terrific end to a day that hadn't started so well for the Rockets. Tomjanovich didn't like his players' attitude at the shootaround Friday and let them know about it afterward.

"I thought we had happy feet at the shootaround and it began to concern me," he said. "I told the guys we had to get a take-care-of-business attitude and the killer instinct by 9 o'clock tonight."

"And they responded big-time."

In a 1990 game against Eastern Washington, David Klingler of Houston passed for 11 touchdowns, an NCAA record.





Padre pitcher's 1st-ever hit starts rally vs. Mets

Joey Hamilton's first major league hit in 58 at-bats started a go-ahead rally and led to his first pitching victory of the season. It also led to champagne and blue-carpet treatment from his teammates.

The San Diego right-hander was 0-for-57 for his career when he stepped to the plate in the third inning with the Padres trailing New York 2-1. With center fielder Brett Butler playing shallow with the weak-hitting Hamilton at the plate against Pete Harnisch, he lofted a double over Butler's head, then scored the tying run in San Diego's 8-4 victory over the Mets on Friday night.

Hamilton (1-2) earned his first win in nine starts this year, allowing five hits and four runs in seven innings.

Hamilton, now batting .017 for his career, said that if "Butler would have been playing his regular depth, it would have been a routine fly ball. But he wasn't, so I got a hit."

After the game, a path of blue towels led to Hamilton's locker. Several teammates signed a ball with personal messages, and fellow start Andy Ashby left a baseball that had been burned in half.

"I knew he didn't have a hit," Butler said. "I was playing shallow and to the right. The ball got up and probably landed about 10 feet from the warning track. I thought I had a good jump, but I wasn't even close."

Hamilton went 0-for-40 as a rookie last year and 0-for-17 this year. Although no records exist, it's believed to be the worst slump at the

beginning of a player's career.

"That's probably more important than anything, actually, getting on base and being able to score," Hamilton said. "We were behind at that point. It might have shook Pete up a little bit, because I know he wasn't expecting me to get a hit, much less a double."

Hamilton had one of San Diego's season-high six doubles, and Jody Reed hit a three-run homer, his first of the season. Harnisch allowed 10 hits, seven for extra bases, and eight runs in 4 2-3 innings.

Traveling DB takes services to Carolina

FORT WORTH, Texas - The last time the world saw Tim McKeever, national television had picked a very proud man in a most unflattering light.

Actually, the lifeless figure being dragged from the field at Three Rivers Stadium after the Pittsburgh Steelers' shocking 17-13 loss to the San Diego Chargers on Jan. 15 in the AFC Championship Game was only the shell of a man. There could be no mistaking that ghost in pads for the garrulous defensive back who entered and exited every stop on his winding NFL tour with gung-ho blaz.

But the name and number on the back of the jersey confirmed the unlikely: The man being carried to the Steelers' locker room after succumbing to not injury but to numb humiliation was McKeever, who was burned by Chargers receiver Tony Martin for a 43-yard touchdown - the winning one - with 5:13 to play in the game.

"I was just drained, just devastated," said McKeever, the final legacy of UT-Arlington's defunct football program and the designated starting left cornerback for the expansion Carolina Panthers. "All my career, I made that play. For the first time, I didn't make it. And it kind of hurt. That's all it was. I play with my heart."

He also speaks from there - often unchecked by forethought - and that is the root of the problems that McKeever has encountered in his well-traveled NFL career. If he were a basketball player, McKeever would surely be Dennis Rodman, his penchant for controversy surpassed only by his ability to rebound.

"There's always been highs and lows in my career," said McKeever, who calls Arlington home and owns a business in Bedford. "You're a hero or a goat. You try to be a hero as much as you can. But it comes with the job."

San Francisco, Miami, Atlanta, Detroit, Pittsburgh. All were at once captured and puzzled by McKeever, who was called more often than he left voluntarily.

That does not apply, of course, to his current employer, which is only midway through its first 10-day minicamp.

"I haven't been to camp in a long time," said McKeever, who has spent the past two summers sweating out unemployment before being signed late in the preseason by Detroit in 1993 and the Steelers last year. "It feels good. I'm not in limbo."

McKeever began his pro career in San Francisco in 1986, quickly earning the favor of coach Bill Walsh. "Tim played very well, very effectively, especially as a rookie," said Walsh, who retired after winning the Super Bowl in January 1989, McKeever's third of four seasons in San Francisco.

However, McKeever's 49ers tour soon turned sour.

"I think he got caught up in a lot of the attention he received," Walsh said. "He got caught up in the hype of playing professional football. He had joined a great organization, and took full advantage of it."

"I think, on occasion, he just talked too much. Maybe he started a lot of things that other people were feeling but didn't state," Walsh said. "He was too open. He didn't use real good judgment on occasions with teammates."

McKeever's account differs: "I wasn't afraid to get up in Jerry Rice's face and challenge him," McKeever said. "As a matter of fact, I recall one day in practice, Jerry went out for a ball. I was all over him, knocked the ball down and ran through Jerry in the process. And Walsh said, 'Will you control him?' And I said, 'I'm just trying to get better.'"

McKeever could no sooner avoid

headlines than he could avoid speaking his mind, and the two, for better or worse, have gone hand in hand.

"He was even more vociferous than Deion (Sanders) or Andre Rison without being able to back that up on the field," said Tim Green, one of the Falcons' defensive ends during McKeever's two years in Atlanta. "He talked the talk of Deion and Andre, but he couldn't quite walk that walk. He was never hesitant or shy about criticizing his own teammates. Never."

Nevertheless, Green said he found himself admiring McKeever's outspokenness, a form of ambivalence not uncommon among those who have known McKeever.

"There were times in my own career when I felt I was not being used properly and wanted to be traded," Green said. "They said no, and I kind of walked away with my hat in my hands. Tim McKeever would have never accepted that. He would have demanded to be traded. He realized his own worth, and had the guts to be his own advocate."

McKeever's fortitude, however, has caused him to wrestle with an uncertain future in the NFL, despite his 29 career interceptions, 14th-best among active players.

"You don't quite understand that, as hard as good corners are to find, and you're not signed," said McKeever, who held out of two training camps in San Francisco and missed the past two (with Pittsburgh and Detroit) because he wasn't picked up until just before the season began.

"It blows your mind," McKeever said. "It's got to be someone at the top, and it was told that. Why wouldn't you want a Tim McKeever? Everywhere he goes, he's contributed. He's not a barroom brawler. He does what he's paid to do. Why wouldn't you want him on your team?"

McKeever's crowning moment in his battle with authority, according to

himself, pitted him against one of the game's most revered names: Don Shula, the NFL's all-time leader in coaching victories.

"I said, 'He's a king, and he expected everybody to be servants,'" McKeever said. "That's probably the worst thing I said."

The timing of that statement, depending on whether you side with McKeever's or Shula's recollection of it, came either just before or just after the Dolphins traded McKeever to Atlanta after the 1990 season.

"I was disappointed in that quote when I read it," Shula said, attempting to piece together the source of the rift across the span of five years. "The only problem that I thought that I had with him ... we had some injuries to wide receivers and he came by the office one day and said, 'Hey, coach, I'll play wide receiver.' I said, 'Oh, sure, Tim. We've got to stop them, too, you know.'"

"So I brushed it off that way," Shula said. "And then later on, he used that as one of the things - he ignored him when he volunteered to play wide receiver. ... That's the only thing I can remember where we had any kind of conflict at all. ... I told the people that asked me about that, that I didn't cut this guy or I didn't blackball him. I traded the guy. I got him another job."

For all the fires McKeever has ignited, there remains a begrudging respect around the league for a man who has refused to compromise his principles.

"One of the things about Tim is, Tim just wants to win," said Eagles head coach Ray Rhodes, formerly McKeever's position coach in San Francisco. "When teams are not accustomed to winning, and not accustomed to a guy that's been there and had a chance to be in a winning situation, they don't understand Tim McKeever. He's a hell of a guy."

Carolina doesn't fit the profile of a team needing a veteran cornerback for a playoff push, but head coach Dom Capers scooped up his former pupil in the sixth round of the expansion draft. Capers, Pittsburgh's defensive coordinator last season, knows McKeever well.

"It's hard to find corners in this league," said Capers, explaining his decision. "I respect (McKeever) as a person. If I didn't think that Tim could come in and be the type of team guy and help us get off the ground

encouraged to make noise, he said. The objective is to always to be heard above the crowd. So when Orlando is playing well and the crowd is into the game, the volume is adjusted accordingly.

"A lot of what we do is by trial and error. When we find something people like and respond to, we keep it going," said Porter.

"Still there are a lot of people who are offended by it, and I understand that. A lot of people are basketball junkies who don't want to see anything but the game. No cheerleaders, no music, no sound effects, no halftime shows. Just throw up the basketball and let them play."

Without referring to specific complaints raised about Orlando, NBA officials have said they intend to review noise levels at arenas and some of the things teams are doing to entertain fans.

"The game is the show. You don't need that for an NBA Finals," Walton said. "It's the game that makes it for the fans. They're not coming for a sideshow."

Williams, however, isn't contemplating any changes.

"It isn't like this is new. A lot of teams are doing some of the same things," Williams said. "But we have taken it to another level."

Some would say a level that's unacceptable.

"No, we haven't found that yet," the general manager added. "We do anything we can to make the game fun. It's a total package. We want people entertained the entire time they're here. And if it helps us win, that's good, too. That's the way it should be."

Texas offers several uncrowded state parks

Summer vacation time is camping time at 78 state parks scattered from Denison to El Paso, from Amarillo to Brownsville.

June and July are among the most popular Texas camping months. In 1994, June and July accounted for about 700,000 of the 2.5 million overnight visitors to state parks.

One-third of the 26 million total state park visitations last year occurred between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Particularly on holidays and weekends, state parks can seem almost as crowded as the cities that we visit.

If you want to reserve a weekend campsite at Garner State Park this summer, you're out of luck. With 204,000 campers last year, the scenic Hill Country Park west of Kerrville is the most popular camping destination in Texas.

Within the sizable state park system, however, are hidden jewels still waiting to be discovered by the masses.

About 50 miles from Garner, the South Llano River State Park offers much of the same ambiance, yet drew

only 10 percent of the campers last year.

It's the same with Atlanta State Park in East Texas. Reader's Digest recently called Atlanta State Park one of the best-kept secrets in Texas. While nearby Caddo Lake State Park was attracting 31,000 campers last year, Atlanta State Park drew about 10,000.

Here are four diverse state parks in four directions from Dallas that receive lighter than normal use. Never plan any state park camping trip without first making a reservation.

Texas Parks and Wildlife now has a central reservation number for state parks. The number is 512-389-8900. If your first choice campground is full, operators can refer you to parks that offer similar experiences.

NORTH

Caprock Canyons State Park is in Brio County near Quitaque, about a two-hour drive from Hereford. This 14,000-acre park remains in the shadow of Palo Duro Canyon State Park, just to its north.

"Out here, there's room to roam and get away from the crowds," said

Acting park manager Mike Knezek said the developed campgrounds are full about 30 percent of weekends, but there has never been a crowded situation in the Caprock Canyon's tent camping areas.

This is a scenic park for hikers, mountain bikers and equestrians who like getting off the beaten path and enjoy getting a glimpse of the old west.

Twenty-two miles of a new trailways system have opened up in the past two years. This was once a railway line that's been converted to a hiking trail. It features a gentle, 1 percent grade and includes trestles across steep canyons and through one tunnel.

Wildlife is plentiful. Hikers are liable to see mule deer, pronghorn antelope, and aoudad sheep (native to north Africa).

Caprock Canyons is one of the few state parks that caters to equestrians. An equestrian camping area includes corrals for the horses. For additional information, call (806) 455-1492.

WEST

South Llano River State Park, five miles south of Junction, gets more

popular each year, but it is still a far cry from the summer crowds at Garner State Park.

The attraction here is 2.5 miles of the South Llano River, a delightful clear-water stream that cuts through jagged limestone.

"The river is where you find most visitors during the summer," said park manager Wayne Haley. "They do a lot of tubing inside the park boundaries. It takes about two hours to float the whole thing."

"The South Llano is also a good river for novice canoeists. It's got some current but it's not real dangerous. We've got two local outfitters who rent canoes and arrange shuttle services for launching and take-out."

The park covers 2,700 acres and is a combination park and wildlife management area. White-tailed deer and turkey are abundant. Twenty miles of hiking and biking trails wind through the rocky terrain.

Haley said the park sponsors regular interpretive programs during summer months. The clear Hill Country air makes this a good spot for stargazing. For more information, call 915-446-3994.

PA man draws criticism

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) - Music blares at a deafening level above the public address announcer whips another sellout crowd into a frenzy with his familiar call to "stand and cheer yooooooooo Orlandooooooo Magicccccccc."

The scoreboard urges fans to send a noise-o-meter gauge soaring and a technician in a booth high above the floor at Orlando Arena pumps sound effects and thematic excerpts of popular songs like the Commodores' "Brickhouse" through the thunderous sound system when players on opposing teams make mistakes or go to the foul line.

The 16,010-seat arena is transformed into a giant echo chamber after one of Shaquille O'Neal's monstrous dunks, and everybody has to strain to hear the person next to them when the music is turned up an extra notch during timeouts and crucial stretches of the game.

Basketball purists snarl and opposing coaches grumble. But from their vantage point at the NBA Finals, Orlando general manager Pat Williams couldn't be happier about the noise the Magic is making these days.

"This is part of what has made us what we are. We've been doing it since Day 1," Williams said. "It would never go over in Boston. But they love it here in Looney Tunes town."

The man at the center of the biggest controversy of the playoffs is Paul Porter, the veteran p.a. announcer who has been with the Magic since the team's inception six seasons ago.

"I've never heard anything like this," broadcaster Marv Albert said. "I attribute my throat problem to the fact that the arenas have been so loud and the audio mix is tough to handle."

"I'm tempted to add the p.a. announcer as part of our broadcast crew."

Indiana coach Larry Brown has been one of the most outspoken critics of Porter's act, which he and others have complained is as much about embarrassing opposing teams as it is getting the crowd excited about the home team.

Brown said the atmosphere during the Eastern Conference finals reminded him of M-TV, adding, "Sometimes I just wish we could play basketball" without all the glitz and glitter that teams are using to promote the game.

Williams finds the attention Porter is receiving amusing.

"I think it's the first time in the history of the playoffs that the biggest topic of debate is the p.a. announcer," said Williams, who has also worked with the Philadelphia 76ers and Chicago Bulls during his 32 years in professional sports. "Paul Porter is getting as much ink as Shaq."

And Williams is loving every moment of it.

Saler Association hosts feedlot tour/carcass seminar

If you ever forget just how big the cattle industry is in Deaf Smith county, just take a look around at area feedlots. You'll soon come to realize what a big and important part of our agricultural community it really is.

The Saler association, held a "Partners in Progress" tour this past Thursday and Friday, which consisted of a tour of four of the counties feedlots and a panel discussion on Thursday. A special tour of the IBP processing plant in Amarillo and also the Excel plant in Friona, concluded the tour and seminar on Saturday.

The Texas and the American Saler Associations sponsored the tour, and local representative John Perrin, coordinated the event.

The Feedlot tour and carcass seminar began Thursday with registration and breakfast at the Hereford Community Center. It was sponsored by AzTx Cattle Co.

Mayor and president of AzTx, Bob Josseland spoke to the group of 45 guests. He emphasized the importance of producing a quality product for the consumer at the least cost to the producer.

"We need to change if we are going to produce a viable protein and have an efficient product that people will enjoy," he said.

"As protein demand changes and the third world comes up with more money; which they will, people will look to the United States to see how we will convert it to their (world) particular need," he said. "To survive, the meat producer needs to know what he is selling."

After the breakfast session the group was given a tour of the corporate offices of AzTx.

Hereford Feedyard, which is owned by AzTx, was the first feedlot stop of the tour.

Wade Lewis, manager, gave an informative talk to the guests as the bus toured the alleys to view the cattle.

He spoke on the importance of a good vaccination program for calves before they are brought to the lot.

"It is very important to vaccinate your calves and have it done at least 50 to 60 days before they are brought into the yard," he said. "It cuts down on the amount of illness in the new calves," he said. "The cattle really need about 30 days to develop immunity."

The next stop on the tour was at the Mc6 Cattle Feeders north of town. Dan McWhorter, owner and general manager, conducted the tour. Lunch, which was prepared by the employees of Mc6, was then served to the guests.

McWhorter gave a general background of the facility and discussed the way in which Mc6 mixes their feed on the truck before feeding.

Mc6 is the newest feedyard in the Texas Panhandle and has a 21,000 head facility. The facility also offers

Perryton to build new pork complex

PERRYTON—Texas Farm, a subsidiary of Nippon Meat Packers, will build a complete pork production complex on seven sites in the county, it was announced Thursday by Don Clift, general affairs manager.

When completed in 1999, the total operation will house 27,000 farrow to finish hogs in 352 barns over nine sections of land. The company will employ 220 with an annual payroll of \$4.4 million.

The investment in land and buildings is budgeted at \$85 million," Clift said. "When the market value of the animals is included, the total investment is more than \$100 million."

Processing was originally planned at an IBP plant in the midwest, but the company is now negotiating with Seaboard Corp. to use its plant in Guymon, Ok.

The majority of the production value, estimated at \$55 million a year, will go to the Japanese market. Clift said four factors led the company to select Ochiltree County for the new operation—environmental considerations, distance from other pork production units, availability of feed grain and available workforce.

NMP, with \$7 billion in annual sales, is the leading meat producer in Japan. NMP has pork and poultry production and processing plants in Japan and also have beef feeding and packing operations in Australia.

The feedyard's slogan is "We sure aren't the biggest but we may be the best."

After the group had lunch they boarded the bus and traveled back to town and then west to Sugarland Feedyard where owner/manager, Jan McElhane gave the tour.

The Sugarland yard was started in 1964 and has over 50 years combined experience in the feeding industry and a capacity of 25,000 head.

McElhane pointed out the Saler cross cattle that he recently received into the yard and also talked about the Mexican cattle that have been coming into the country recently.

"You would be surprised at the weight gain that is possible with the Mexican Cattle," he said. "So far, we have had good luck with them."

The next stop was east of town to Southwest Feedyards, which is part of Cactus Feeders, where manager George Keenan talked with the tour participants about the feeding industry.

Miquel Achaval, vice president for customer relations for Cactus Feeders, also gave an informal talk

on the "integrity of yesterday, the efficiency of today and the technology of tomorrow for greater returns in the feedyard and the packing house."

Achaval, a native of Argentina, spoke on the importance of giving the customer what he/she wants. He also talked on the importance of the producers getting paid for the quality of their cattle.

The bus then returned the guests to their personal vehicles.

The seminar resumed at the Hereford Country Club with dinner, sponsored by Pfizer Animal Health and the Texas Salers Association, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

After dinner a panel discussion moderated by Burt Rutherford, associate of Texas Cattle Feeders, was presented.

On the panel were Minnie Lou Bradley of B3R Cattle Company, Dr. Mark Miller, a meat specialist with Texas Tech University, and Buck Wehrbein the manager of special projects and quality assurance for Friona Industries.

Rutherford started the meeting with a welcome to all of those present and commented on the fact that Hereford

is "slap in the middle of the cattle feeding industry." "You are in Cattle feeding country," he said.

He then opened the discussion by posing a question to the three panel members.

"Assume a feeder received a set of cattle, genetically similar in composition and grade. What factors are going to contribute to difference in these cattle?" he asked.

Wehrbein, of Friona Industries, answered that health was the main difference that will be seen in the cattle.

"Keeping a set of cattle healthy is a big sorting factor in the feeding industry," he said. "Some that get sick never catch up with the rest of the set." "Another factor is that some cattle sort (eat), differently, so they will gain differently," he said.

One other difference in those cattle, he pointed out, would be the pecking order in that pen. The stronger cattle will come to the front in gain and in conformation.

Dr. Miller, of Texas Tech, said that he felt that there would be very little difference because that set of cattle would be bought on the average.

"A producer will not be paid for

any superior animal," he said. "A producer will not be able to tell a difference between animals until he is paid individually for his superior and inferior animals and not on an average basis."

He went on to echo the need for a producer to know what the consumer wants.

First, he said, a cattle man needs to apply what percent choice will be in that pen and then not get caught up in the "lean" thing.

"Today, with the quality system being based on marbling, quality grade and yield grade will be determined by marbling," he said. "We (cattle industry) have to worry about our cattle being too fat or too heavy."

The reason for marbling, according to Miller, is that it insures a more palatable steak.

"Cooking has a lot to do with the palatability of the meat," he said.

"Choice is more insurable to the producer."

Although the demand is moving toward leanness, the producer has to consider the different ways in which the product will be cooked.

"When the trend moves to above 50 percent lean, it will be up to the producer to produce a leaner type cattle," he said.

Mrs. Bradley, of B3R Cattle Company, answered the question as she stated "different from the boys".

"First," she said. "If the set of cattle are 300 pounds different coming in, they will be 500 pounds different going out. The whole set will not feed the same. There is no way the cattle will be the same without tracing the cattle back to the cow/calf operation."

According to Bradley, the way to start with uniformity and to insure a consistent product, is to start with the cow/calf man.

"Uniformity starts with management and genetics," she said. "The way to identify superior and inferior animals is by narrowing it down to genetics."

"Cattle that will gain and hang a good carcass, will be those that are managed well," she said. "Good cattle will be those without bruises, injection sites and dart cutter sites."

All of these factors contribute to the value of the carcass for the packer, according to Bradley.

"No one likes to cut out part of a round due to an injection site scar, and it surely isn't pleasant for a packer to get a call from the retailer, complaining of a broken needle found in his/her beef," she said.

"Management is the main tool to insure uniformity and a quality product," Bradley said. "We have to become cattlemen again, and start doing a better job in the cattle industry."

After the panel finished their responses, the discussion was opened to guests.

During the question and answer

phase of the meeting, many of the guests and feedlot managers were able to pose questions to the panel and also input some of their ideas to the group.

Miller, Bradley and Wehrbein, all agreed that the grading process of beef is not a very objective process.

"There is such a variety in grade between packing houses," said Wehrbein. "We need value based marketing."

Of course uniformity in product may cure some of this problem but according to Miller competition can be a good and a bad thing.

"Variation is a salvation and a Pandora's box all in one," he said.

Bradley said that too many people and associations are "chasing that little blue ribbon instead of making a good product."

She feels that the industry should,

as a whole, concentrate on value of the product.

"We need to produce the kind of beef we want to eat," she said.

The feedlot and carcass seminar ended on Friday with a morning presentation by Rick Lacey of the Western Beef Alliance. The breakfast was sponsored by Southwest Feedyards.

The seminar then concluded with a visit to the IBP plant in Amarillo and the Excel plant in Friona.

The seminar attracted various individuals from Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Texas, New Mexico, Missouri, and Saler, France.

The Saler Association promotes the Saler breed of cattle, which originated in the remote village of Saler, 250 miles south of Paris. The cattle were brought to the United States, originally for show purposes.



Overseas demand for fruit, vegetables strong

WASHINGTON (AP) - Stronger overseas demand for U.S. horticultural products has prompted government economists to increase their forecast for fiscal 1995 exports of fruits, vegetables and other produce.

U.S. horticultural exports totaled \$4.7 billion during the first six months of the fiscal year, which began Oct. 1, a 21 percent increase from the same period in the previous year, the Agriculture Department says.

USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service now forecasts total horticultural exports for the year at \$9.4 billion, up from \$8.9 projected earlier.

The latest figures available are for March, when exports in this category totaled \$750.2 million, 9 percent

more than in March 1994.

The annual forecast was revised upward based on the higher than expected shipments so far this year, and on the stronger U.S. position because of a weak dollar in Japan and some European Union markets, the agency said.

Of the five major markets for U.S. horticultural products, exports so far this year are ahead of the same 1994 period in Canada, the European Union, Japan and Hong Kong. Mexico is the only country that is

lagging last year's pace.

The most notable increases this year have been in fresh vegetables and fruit. The most dramatic increase in value has been in wine and beer, where shipments are 52 percent higher than last year.

Diversity is the key to success in farming

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - The old maxim about not putting all your eggs in one basket may have particular significance to small-scale farmers - and not just those raising chickens.

A new handbook says diversity - in everything from growing to marketing - is one of the keys to financial success for farmers with just a few acres of vegetables or a small herd of livestock.

The 166-page "Small Farm Handbook," by the Small Farm Center at the University of California, Davis, emphasizes finding and growing crops for specialized markets, such as minorities or the health-conscious.

"Small-scale farmers ... provide most of the specialty products that so many of us have come to expect - organic produce, ethnic produce, unusual and heirloom varieties," says the handbook's introduction.

"Their greatest successes are in locating niche markets and developing new products to satisfy them."

Among the "requirements of successful farming" are being committed, developing necessary knowledge and skills, and finding a good location. One of the "keys to

success" is diversity.

"To be viable, a small farmer must diversify in one or more ways, such as by direct marketing, or by producing numerous crops or animals or by using an alternative production or marketing system," the book says.

Throughout the handbook, the data is interspersed with testimonials by or about farmers who have tried the techniques described and ways they have improved or could improve their operations.

San Diego County vegetable grower Stephanie Caughlin says she learned that quality translates into income.

"Consumers may be willing to pay more for high-quality products," she says. "The produce doesn't have to be picture-perfect, but it's got to be at the peak of its flavor, and it's got to look good when you present it."

Former construction worker Mike Adams of Lake County, Calif., explains why he switched careers and took up farming.

"The single most important factor in the quality of life I was seeking was a closeness with my family," Adams says. "In construction I had to be constantly on the run and away from my family. On the farm, I work where I live and can be with my wife

and kids."

The book covers everything from the basics - such as the need to have good land and enough water - to marketing and "the need to identify consumer needs and desires" rather than focusing entirely on how to sell more of a crop already being grown.

The handbook says niche marketing involves "finding out what customers need or want and providing it, not just presenting what you have and hoping they buy."

Another chapter touches on alternative agriculture - a favorite theme of the Small Farm Center and many of its members who grow organically or with as few chemicals as possible through integrated pest management.

This chapter emphasizes that the important thing "is not the conventional practices it rejects but the innovative practices it includes."

The main portion of the handbook concludes with advice to plan ahead.

Wild rumors swirl around drug task force at Ft. Bliss

Militia sympathizers claim feds have secret base

FORT BLISS, Texas (AP) - Sinister conspiracy theories twist and swirl around a mundane yellow building tucked into a remote corner of Biggs Army Airfield.

It's here, the rumors and innuendos say, that the U.S. government coordinated clandestine training for federal agents in anticipation of an assault on citizens' militia groups. Even a U.S. congressman has said so.

Cross the threshold of the Joint Task Force Six headquarters, however, and the staff will insist there's nothing furtive about this

place. For that matter, they say, there's nothing here that's even all that interesting.

"Nobody knows what we do and it's not because we're highly secretive," said Brig. Gen. Kevin P. Byrnes, the task force commander. He adds bluntly: "It's dull."

Created in November 1989 at the direction of the secretary of defense, JTF Six is intended to provide military forces to assist drug interdiction efforts by federal, state and local law-enforcement agencies nationwide.

But contrary to illusions that may

be created by the recent furor over the alleged anti-militia raids, the task force doesn't do that by mobilizing camouflaged commandos and tanks to blast away at drug dealers.

Most of the work done behind the walls of the yellow stuccoed JTF Six headquarters, a former prison, involves computers and telephones. Not guns and grenades.

"This headquarters doesn't deploy anyone," said Byrnes, sitting in a meeting room covered by maps pinpointing current missions and priority areas. "We don't have helmets, weapons, vehicles. We have no wartime mission here."

The task force acts when a law enforcement agency submits a formal proposal for assistance in a drug operation. The support can include anything from military training to backup from a reconnaissance unit or an engineering corps.

The request is screened by the task force's legal department and officers to determine if it fits within JTF Six's narrow mandate that it only operate in non-confrontational missions involving drug interdiction.

If the mission is approved, JTF Six finds a unit somewhere within the Army, Navy, Air Force or Marines whose wartime mission incorporates the requested specialties and asks unit commanders if they will participate.

Once deployed, the troops will assist in a predetermined manner, but will never become involved in actual searches, seizures or arrests, said Byrnes.

The federal Posse Comitatus Act, which Byrnes makes a point of mentioning frequently in discussing his tasks, prohibits the U.S. military from performing civilian law enforcement functions.

And, said JTF Six spokeswoman Maureen Bossch, "We never violate Posse Comitatus."

The Oklahoma City bombing and the focus it has put on citizens' militias and the government's 1993 raid on the Branch Davidians in Waco is bringing new scrutiny of allegations that JTF Six has overstepped its bonds.

In a March 22 letter to U.S. Attorney General Janet Reno, Texas Congressman Steve Stockman, R-Friendswood, alleged the task force was involved in training for an anti-militia raid.

"While information is scarce," Stockman's letter says, "it is known that Joint Task Force Six ... is co-ordinating the training, including the use of tanks and other armored vehicles, for certain federal law enforcement agencies in possible violation of the Posse Comitatus Law...."

"Ridiculous," is Byrnes' response. "That allegation is absolutely, totally unfounded."

If that training was done, he said, "We knew nothing of it. We don't know where that was."

Some also are speculating about JTF Six's involvement in the Waco raid, which resulted in the deaths of four agents from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and ultimately led to the fiery demise of more than 80 members of the Davidian sect.

Soldier of Fortune magazine has delved into the raid in articles that, among other things, question the legality of JTF Six's involvement because of the lack of a proven drug connection. The magazine has also reported the military had a presence at the Davidians' compound during the raid.

James L. Pate, who wrote the articles focusing primarily on the ATF, said his research into JTF Six has left him with the impression agency officials are "looking for more ways to spread military influence in civilian law enforcement."

"It's a difficult genie to put back in the bottle once you accept the premise that it's OK for our standing Army to patrol our streets and enforce our laws," he said. "Where do you go from there?"

Pate's answer is: An unhealthy climate of military intervention that violates the intent of the Constitution.

He's not alone in his concern. Larry Pratt, executive director of Gun Owners of America, a pro-gun lobby, is familiar with Pate's work and said such allegations must be examined by Congress.

Byrnes confirmed the ATF requested JTF Six assistance because of early suspicions there was a methamphetamine lab at the Waco compound. Drugs were never found and the accusations eventually faded.

But he said JTF Six limited its involvement to finding units to provide the ATF agents with training in marksmanship, communications and trauma care. JTF Six also helped the ATF gain access to an urban warfare training site at Fort Hood where agents could practice.

"JTF Six did not participate" in the raid, said Byrnes, who joined the task force after the raid.

He said much of the suspicion results from the inaccurate views of some observers who want to believe JTF Six is "some ultra-secret type organization."

Those who know JTF Six are complimentary of the agency's mission and actions.

"We've always had good response from JTF Six. They've always been real good about our needs," said

Tommy LaNier, a law enforcement official at the Cleveland National Forest in California.

LaNier said he's requested JTF Six support several times over the years, primarily for reconnaissance of potential drug-trafficking routes running through the 600,000-acre forest and for assistance in locating marijuana fields.

Military commanders also give JTF Six high marks for putting their troops in real-life situations that provide training beyond what could be accomplished by simulation.

"It's more challenging," said 1st Lt. Craig D. Morrow, squadron adjutant for an Apache attack helicopter unit based at Fort Hood.

The unit recently conducted a surveillance mission in conjunction with the U.S. Border Patrol along the

Arizona-Mexico border. Morrow said the operation did a good job of putting the unit through its wartime paces.

"There are a lot of parallels," he said, "although obviously in wartime we would be engaging targets rather than just identifying them."

But they cannot engage, as Byrnes pointed out repeatedly. He believes violations would immediately be spotted.

"If we were to do something wrong on the border... I would think that would be front-page information," said Byrnes.

So what spawns the wild conspiracy theories?

"You have to go to the veracity of the source," he said. "Some of these folks have never visited. They don't have a clue."

-Headquarters: Biggs Army Airfield, Fort Bliss, Texas.

Gingrich makes non-campaign trip to New Hampshire

MANCHESTER, N.H. (AP) - House Speaker Newt Gingrich stormed into New Hampshire on Friday insisting he was looking for moose - not presidential support - yet said with a smile he was available if President Clinton wanted to sit down and talk issues.

"I'm not here running for president; I'm here as speaker of the House," Gingrich said as he opened a hectic four-day stay in the state with the first presidential primary. But when offered an opportunity to rule himself out of the 1996 contest, Gingrich demurred.

"I am not closing the door on being a candidate, but I am not here as a candidate," he told reporters at the Manchester airport. The oddness of the trip was clear from the beginning: The speaker's host was GOP Rep. Bill Zeff, the chairman of Bob Dole's presidential campaign here.

Gingrich cracked a joke about that, predicting Zeff would keep the Senate majority leader well informed on his travels around the state.

And then he added a little more to his flirtation with the 1996 race, saying he was eager to accept Clinton's offer of a joint get-together with New Hampshire voters.

There was no immediate comment from the White House.

On Thursday, Clinton said he'd like to take Gingrich to some of the places he visited as a 1992 presidential candidate and "let citizens ask us questions."

Gingrich had barely climbed out of a helicopter at the airport when he accepted, saying he had time Sunday - when Clinton will also be in the state to deliver a college commencement address. Gingrich offered to share with Clinton an offer he has to appear on a New Hampshire public television program.

Gingrich said it would not be a debate, because "this is not the campaign year and I am not a candidate." But he said it would give New Hampshire voters a chance to hear from the Democratic president and the Republican congressional leadership on an array of issues, from the budget to welfare to Medicare.

Engagement Grant for math project at HISD has been awarded to WTAMU

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Campbell, of Hereford, are proud to announce the engagement and approaching marriage of their daughter Toni Michelle Campbell to Todd Eric Culp.

The bride-elect is a 1989 graduate of Hereford High School and has attended Amarillo College and West Texas A&M University. She completed her License Vocational Nursing Program at Amarillo college. She plans to continue her nursing studies at the University of New Mexico.

Culp is a 1988 Hereford High School graduate and is currently a senior at WTAMU. He served in the U.S. Army for six years in active duty and reserve service. He plans to continue his education at the University of N.M.

West Texas A&M University has been awarded a grant totaling \$66,174 for a "Mathematics Project for Teachers in Grades 4-6." The WTAMU grant proposal, written in cooperation with the Hereford Independent School District (HISD) and the Texas Engineering Experiment Station Regional Division, will be funded by the Texas Eisenhower Mathematics and Science Program.

"Several of the teachers from HISD have attended previous Eisenhower-funded workshops," Judy Kelley, associate director of the Texas Engineering Experiment Station Regional Division, said. "They felt the program was beneficial and approached their administrators about the possibility of a program for other HISD teachers. Hereford administrators contacted me, and I worked with them to secure the grant for this program."

The Eisenhower program targets

teachers of students traditionally underrepresented in science and math. The grant will provide a year-long program for 30 teachers in Hereford schools including Bluebonnet Elementary School, West Central Elementary School, Shirley Elementary School and the Nazarene Christian Academy.

The project will include a workshop June 5-23 in the Classroom Center on the WTAMU campus. The program will continue with a year-long intensive project. Teachers will be trained in using number sense, problem solving and manipulatives to enhance the understanding of mathematics concepts. The teachers will continue to meet six hours per month during the 1995-96 academic year.

"This program is a wonderful opportunity for our teachers to sharpen their own math skills and transfer their newly found expertise

to the classroom," Nena Veazey, HISD assistant superintendent of professional services, said. "Through the program, we hope to see increased self-confidence in our teachers' abilities to teach mathematics and as a result, increased student performance in their classrooms."

Teachers in the program will be provided tuition and fees, teacher stipends, travel and day-care allowances, all instruction texts and more than \$250 in classroom materials through grant funding.

All 30 spaces for teachers are filled. The program is sponsored by the Texas Engineering Experiment Station Regional Division and WTAMU. Authorization for the grant is through the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Are you truly Texan? Can you read this?
Ja eat yit?
Naw, jew?
Yont to?
Aw ite.

Made from scratch, yet quick and easy. These are the kind of recipes I like, as you are probably beginning to observe.

I grew up eating foods that were prepared from scratch, not from a packaged mix. And I still prefer it that way, so I look for recipes that are quick and easy because, like most working mothers, the time I have to spend in the kitchen is at a minimum.

Preparation for the following recipe is about as simple as it gets yet the results always get compliments.

PINEAPPLE SOGGY CAKE

2 c. flour
2 c. sugar
2 eggs
1 (No. 2) can crushed pineapple
1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. vanilla
Mix all ingredients. Bake in a 9 X 13 pan for 30 minutes at 375 degrees.
Topping:
2/3 c. evaporated milk
1/2 c. margarine
1 c. sugar
Mix ingredients in a saucepan. Cook

over medium heat until boiling. Boil for 2 minutes, then pour over cake while hot. (Note: This topping will soak into the cake, thus it becomes a soggy cake. The cake is best if prepared the day before you plan to serve it.)

DEAR READERS: Would you believe that the greatest under-reported injury of our time is hand cuts from slicing bagels?

The authority for this is Mark Smith, head of George Washington Hospital's Department of Emergency Medicine in the nation's capital. Dr. Smith has an explanation for all those folks who come in, often in their pajamas, with blood dripping from their wounds. He says, "The bagel is inherently unstable because it is round. GLAUCOMA

Glaucoma is often called the "silent killer of eyesight." That's because so many people with the condition are not even aware that they have it. The progressive damage it causes to the optic nerve results in the loss of peripheral vision. But the loss is subtle and gradual, especially in the most common primary or open-angle glaucoma.

Four selections named as All-American roses

PHOENIX (AP) - Color is very much in style this year for roses, judging by the four newest All-America Rose Selections.

Fragrance and easy care helps, too. A kaleidoscope of constant color is likely to be what will be most remembered about the 1996 winners: St. Patrick, Mt. Hood, Livin' Easy and Carefree Delight.

St. Patrick is especially novel. The only hybrid tea selected, it offers 5-inch, yellow-gold flowers with shades of green. The buds unfurl slowly, rare among yellow roses, and the long, upright stems make it a delight for indoor bouquets.

It was hybridized by Frank Strickland, one of the few amateurs ever to win an AARS award, and is being introduced by Weeks Roses. Fragrance is slight.

Weeks also is introducing Livin' Easy, a constant-blooming, glossy-leaf floribunda with apricot-orange, 4-inch flowers and stems suitable for cutting. Fragrance is mild.

Mt. Hood is the first white to win in seven years. An upright grandiflora, it was hybridized by New Zealand's Sam McGredy, giving him eight AARS winners. Certified Roses is the introducer. Fragrance is medium old rose.

Carefree Delight is a free-branching, landscape shrub hybridized by France's House of Meiland and being introduced by Conard-Pyle. Fragrance is slight.

Each All-American is evaluated in test gardens across the country for

two years. It takes about eight years from propagation until designation by AARS, a nonprofit organization whose members produce most of the nation's roses.

Announcements are not made until two years after selection to give growers time to produce sufficient plants for public sale. So the 1996 winners will be available by next spring in most of the country and somewhat earlier in warmer areas.

Originated in 1938, the competition is designed to improve the vitality, strength and beauty of roses. In 1951 there was no winner. Some years only one is selected. Scoring is based on bud and flower form, vigor, hardiness, growth habit, disease resistance, foliage and fragrance.

"There's a rose for every home gardener in this year's group of winners," says Larry Burks, AARS president. "We're pleased to introduce such a unique collection and we are confident each rose will find a special place in gardens and landscape plantings across the country."

France's House of Meiland also hybridized Peace, one of the most popular roses in history. This year marks the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II and the Peace rose's introduction.

Carefree Delight blooms profusely on upright, arching canes that spread up to 5 feet. Clusters of up to 10 buds open to show five-petal, 2-inch pink flowers with creamy centers. Foliage is dark green, dense and glossy.

June 6 was the first activity day for the Summer Reading Club, with 254 children in attendance. They heard stories, book talks and created a scratch art picture of their own to take home. If you have not come in to register your children you are not too late, but don't wait too long. Next Tuesday, Mr. Joe Weaver will be presenting a program on exploring our world, and the children will be painting "Zing Wing Gliders" so wear old clothes.

Monday and Thursday 10 a.m.-9 p.m.; Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday 10 a.m.-6 p.m.; Saturday 10 a.m.-1 p.m. If you cannot remember, the hours are painted on the front doors in English and Spanish. Remember to look for "Summer Hours".

Have you started your summer reading? There are new books available each week on a variety of subjects such as remodeling,

gardening, Troy Aikman, romance, and murder.

Among those on the new book list this week you will find Stitches in Time by Barbara Michaels. Rachel Grant works in a vintage clothing store and is there when an antique bridal quilt mysteriously appears one day. Rachel is drawn to this beautiful mesmerizing and fascinating quilt as through it was made for her. Rachel's research into the woman's crafts had created a love for finely crafted textiles, and made her aware of legends of protective magic being woven into fabrics used for special occasions such as births, marriages and deaths; however, it never occurred to Rachel that the stories might be true, or that the power to protect could be used to harm. As much as Rachel's rational mind wanted to deny the quilt's affect, it seemed to be influencing her thoughts and actions and threatening the people she loves.

Belva Plain's The Carousel is the tale of an American dynasty shattered by secrets, greed and revenge. Dan and Sally take their troubled 5-year-old daughter to the doctor for help. The diagnosis is made but the parents claim the child is too well guarded to allow her to be molested. That isn't all that Dan must deal with. Patriarch, Oliver Grey, has retired and left the family business to his sons Ian, Clive and Dan, the orphaned nephew that

Oliver raised as one of his own sons. Threatened by dissent from within, the family business is tottering on the brink of collapse. Ian wants to sell the business to the highest bidder and hopes to pay his debts and save his marriage. Clive has given his life to the business, but has recently met a woman and would agree to selling the business for the right price. Amanda, Dan's sister has the knowledge, power, and motive to destroy the three brothers; it's the secret that links Amanda to the 5-year-old girl and a silver carousel.

Between by Tananarive Due is a "brilliantly written novel of the supernatural" that announces a new author. A young boy Hilton is saved from drowning by his grandmother, sacrificing her own life for his. Thirty years later Hilton is a dedicated social worker, whose wife is the only elected African-American judge in Dade County, Florida, and the mother of two. At the age of 39, Hilton wonders if his "borrowed time" is up when his wife begins to receive hate mail from a man she once prosecuted, but the threats include the whole family. Obsessed with protecting his family Hilton's nightmares become more horrible than any he has ever experienced. Could the dreams be a message?


Standoff by Chuck Hogan is another first novel that promises to get your full attention on the first page and keep

it to the very last. The local sheriff is mistakenly ordered to serve an eviction notice to the town recluse Glenn Ables. Ables is a notorious federal fugitive wanted for illegal arms trafficking. A routine Monday morning soon becomes filled with grief and horror. Ables responds to the notice by shooting two lawmen and barricading and arming his family inside his cabin on Paradise Ridge. Local officers, Montana State Troopers, National Guard, U.S. Marshals Special Operations Group, and the FBI's Hostage Rescue Team, become involved before the show down is over. "The children's safety is our primary concern...That is why we cannot go in and get him. That is why we must make him come out to us." The crisis calls for John T. Banish, a brilliant but "unstable" negotiator. The next nine days is a contest of wit and wills.





MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

POSITIONING FOR PROFIT

A few months ago I asked a mid-western hardware store owner how much his average customer spent each year in his store. "I don't know," he replied.

More recently I consulted with a successful business woman who was struggling to compete with a new off-price competitor. When I asked what the amount of the average sale was for her store, she reported that she had no idea.

Last week, I asked the owner of a very profitable, growth-oriented appliance store how much gross profit his top 20 customers produced for him. "I don't know. We've never figured it," he answered. Then after a brief pause he added, "But, I'd like to know. I'll find out."

Though most business owners and managers are reluctant to admit it, there are many areas where information shortages exist. Most businesses track sales, expenses, income and taxes, and base decisions on these numbers. This isn't necessarily bad, but it may not be the best strategy.

You may be ignoring the most vital element in positioning your business for future profit if you only look at your numbers. Your numbers are your history. Your customers are your future. Numbers won't keep you in business, customers can.

Customer focus

The first step in positioning your business is to develop a true customer focus. Who are you serving now? Why are they buying your products or services? What do they like most about doing business with you? What really irritates them about your company? What percentage of your customers produce most of your gross profit?

What needs do they have that no one is serving very well? Are these needs compelling? (That is, will the customer pay more and not quibble over price?) Could you fill any these compelling needs?

Accurate, timely answers to questions such as these, will help you focus on your customers and establish direction for your firm. Knowing what your customers want is the first step.

To satisfy customer's needs and wants you may have to change your business and you might end up in an entirely different business. This can be desirable if the new niche is profitable, and if the transition is well planned and orderly.

Notice a niche

Potential business niches are areas of products or services where no one is satisfying customer needs and wants very

well. You can carve out a niche by customer type, product or service provided, pricing strategies and levels of service. The best market position is one where you can give your customers a unique benefit or advantage. Keep your eyes open and try to see these needs.

Even service businesses can position themselves for profits. A small mid-western bank carved out a legendary niche by providing an unheard of level of service with a personal touch. They are attracting new customers and profits are up.

A southern bank positioned itself as the "small business bank." While some larger banks spurn small businesses, this bank put together a team to attract them. They offer very targeted services aimed at growing small businesses into larger ones. Deposits are increasing and profits are up.

A small gun store owner who was getting beat up on price by the discounters saved his store by liquidating much of his hard lines inventory and offering specialized services. One well-wisher wrote, "Get well soon, Superdude." Another wrote, "Come see us here in Metropolis when you get better."

The card will be sent to Reeve after the 17th annual Superman Celebration ends Sunday.

NEW YORK (AP) - Michelle Pfeiffer, Robert DeNiro, Harry Belafonte and Mercedes Ruehl are just some of the celebrities asking President Clinton to free 150 Haitian children being held at Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

"Relatives of these children and resettlement agencies based in the U.S. have already been contacted and are ready and willing to accept for the detained group of minors at Guantanamo," said the letter, dated Friday.

Robbins, Susan Sarandon, Mary Steenburgen, U2's Bono and Jonathan Demme.

Thousands of Haitians began fleeing their homeland after a 1991 military coup.

A report released by an attorneys' group last month said some Haitian children at the U.S. naval base have tried to hang themselves. The United Nations High Commissioner of Refugees denied the findings.

MARTINEZ, Calif. (AP) - What's a few million bucks to the Jacksons? The Jackson family lost an effort this week to overturn a \$4 million judgment against them for allegedly failing to perform in Korea in 1989.

The Jacksons and two promoters asked the Segye Times Inc. of South Korea, a major newspaper in Seoul, to invest \$5.5 million for a series of Jackson family concerts. But the Jacksons were no-shows and never returned the money, plaintiffs' attorney Christopher Kerosky said.

The 1990 lawsuit named Michael Jackson, his brother Jermaine, their parents, Joseph and Katherine Jackson, and promoters Kenneth and Mi Rae Choi. The judgment does not affect Michael Jackson, who settled separately out of court in 1992.

A jury awarded the newspaper \$2 million each in compensatory and punitive damages, which a judge upheld.

Rescues in the High Sierras provide ideas for new show

The stories in *High Sierra Search and Rescue* may seem like fiction to viewers, but for a California emergency team, they are real.

The new NBC dramatic series, which premieres Sunday, June 11, before moving into its regular time slot beginning Wednesday, June 14, takes its story lines from actual rescues by a volunteer group.

"It's about the people in the town of Bear Valley who live in the High Sierras. It's about the common man as a hero," says actor Robert Conrad, who stars as Griffin "Tooter" Campbell, a local helicopter pilot.

Conrad, who lives in the Bear Valley area and was a volunteer with the rescue team from 1970 to 1975, knows firsthand about the dedication and effort on the part of the volunteer group. He believes the show will pay tribute to community members while raising awareness.

"(The series) is not about a superhuman pilot or a superhuman woman who is Joan of Arc. It's about your neighbors — yours and mine — who, when called upon, do extraordinary things and they do it as volunteers," Conrad comments.

The story ideas are taken from actual rescues and stay close to the truth, yet Conrad says sometimes endings may be changed to make the show more positive.

"One boy, two years ago ... disappeared and died," Conrad says. "We do a similar story, but he doesn't die. We had a choice — play the death or play the other option. We chose to go with the positive story."

The series is realistic, though, and not every story will have a happy ending.

While the series, which evolved from a two-hour movie in March 1994,

focuses on the physical demands of the job, it also examines the emotional and personal obstacles faced by the volunteers.

"They are all members of the community," Conrad says. "The people who run the general store; the people who run the gas station. They are who these search-and-rescue people are."

Some of the actors from the television movie reunite with Conrad in the new series.

Dee Wallace-Stone reprises her role as Morgan Duffy, a general store owner. LaVelda Fann returns as Lisa Peterson, a service station owner. Ramon Franco also returns in his role as school teacher Enrique Cruz.

The rest of the characters in the search-and-rescue team are new additions.

"We added three new people," Conrad says. "There's the Mel Gibson of the '90s. His name is Alistair MacDougall and he's from Australia."

"And then there's Jason Lewis. If you think (Brad Pitt) is the sexiest man alive, *People* magazine, check out Jason Lewis. I had a 12-year-old and a 50-year-old both faint."

"For those of us who have no interest in hunks, there is Brittney Powell. Aside from being striking, Brittney is talented. Twenty years ago, 30 years ago, I probably would have tripped over myself to introduce myself to Brittney Powell."

For Conrad, the show is mainly a tribute to the rescue squad and the community. Understandably, though, the actor hopes *High Sierra Search and Rescue* is as successful as his previous hits, *The Wild Wild West* and *Black Sheep Squadron*.

Airing against reruns, *High Sierra* aims to scale the ratings heights.

Colorado Symphony makes mark as unusual orchestra

EDITOR'S NOTE - Here's a symphony orchestra that is well-liked by its bank, as well as its patrons. Unlike many other orchestras around the country, the Colorado Symphony Orchestra manages to pay its bills on time, even if it doesn't pay its musicians very much. It learned valuable lessons from a disastrous bankruptcy.

DENVER (AP) - It's not your typical symphony orchestra.

The musicians only make \$26,000, they seek out donors, and they mingle with grade-school kids when they aren't rehearsing. When revenues are down, they give up part of their pay.

Moreover, the Colorado Symphony Orchestra, which arose from the ashes of the Denver Symphony when it was brought down by debt in 1989, operates on a unique financial footing.

It never borrows money - not for advertising, artists' fees, equipment, music, salaries. Never. The proceeds from ticket sales even are escrowed until the baton drops on concert night.

"This is a new mission with no debt," says Lee Yeingst, a musician and vice chairman of the Colorado Symphony. "We have not borrowed (and) that was a benchmark for the orchestra."

Musicians do more than just work on their parts. They participate in ad campaigns, pursue donations and help

recruit a new generation of lovers of classical music who may become potential supporters.

"This organization operates as if it were employee owned and operated," says Richard Davis, general manager.

Each year, musicians participate in school artist-in-residence programs, master mentor programs and other events that bring them in contact with 65,000 students.

"Sometimes our visit may be a student's only chance in his or her lifetime to experience live orchestral music," says Eric Bertoluzzi, the Colorado Symphony education director.

Many orchestras have similar projects with schoolchildren. All hope their young listeners get hooked and make it a first experience with live orchestral music, but not the only one.

The Colorado Symphony also is expanding its repertoire in an effort to divest itself of the stuffy image symphonies have. Last year it worked with the Moody Blues, John Tesh and Tammy Wynette. This year, it is scheduling appearances with superstar cellist Yo-Yo Ma and the Canadian Brass.

The orchestra advertises on radio sports talk shows and recently had a television ad touting its refusal to use "replacement players" - a dig at the baseball strike.

It now performs more than 200 times each year, and people buying a subscription can pick which concerts to attend.

The big improvement has been in the Colorado Symphony's balance sheet, which showed recent operating surpluses of up to \$503,000, even after musicians were paid bonuses.

Its financial creed - "no debt, no annual deficits, escrowed subscription monies, cash-basis accounting" - was adopted to prevent the group from "digging itself into the deep financial holes so common among American orchestras today," according to its annual report.

"We understood we would not repeat the mistakes of the past," Yeingst says. "We decided there would be no debt tolerated. And now as we're planning our sixth season with this group, we have kept that promise."

The concern over debt was prompted by the \$4 million debt that grew until in the late 1980s it killed the original Denver Symphony, which included many of the musicians now with the Colorado Symphony.

Debt problems are common among American orchestras, according to a study done for the American Symphony Orchestra League. It showed the industry deficit for U.S. orchestras at \$23.2 million in 1991, compared with \$2.8 million 20 years earlier. The study estimated the

deficits will nearly triple within a few years.

At the same time, contributions from the public sector have dropped 4.3 percent over the past 10 years, and orchestras' share of philanthropic arts dollars has dropped one-third.

So the Colorado Symphony established a new model. Musicians and managers participate in all decision-making and debt is prohibited.

The budget is about \$7 million, with \$3.5 million coming from ticket sales, \$2.5 million from other income and \$1 million from government sources, such as the Denver area's cultural arts district sales tax.

When costs come in under budget, the staff and musicians get a bonus at year's end. When the revenues fall below projections, sometimes they forfeit part of their pay to bring the budget back into balance, says Sandy Lusky, marketing director.

One of the Colorado Symphony's goals is to develop an endowment that could bring in more revenue for special occasions - for the huge fees obtained by stars and new compositions, among other things.

"Twice a month I get calls from troubled groups" wanting to copy the Denver model, says Davis, who adds that a change of attitude is an essential ingredient.

"You have to go through bankruptcy, you have to live through that," he says.

"I'm a people-oriented leader, and I think they can relate to me," Sargent said. "That's why I'm here, to take this company and make it grow again."

Sargent said he hopes TM Century will be profitable in the fourth fiscal quarter, but has "no question" it will be profitable in the first quarter of fiscal 1996.

His priorities include improving customer relations, reorganizing internal operations to increase efficiency, and developing new products and new market for current products.

"I think it's an extremely creative company that has kind of hit a plateau and is looking for where it's going to go next, and I think we can focus our energies and creative talent very quickly on where we're going to go next," he said.

"I've trained my whole life for this."



Van Ark may be wishing Dark Man is a bad dream

It's every TV actor's nightmare: waking up from a hit show to find that a couple of years later the only offers are from cable channels with worn-out ideas for schlocky TV movies.

For Joan Van Ark, the nightmare has come true. Van Ark, who played Valene Ewing on *Knots Landing* for 13 seasons, stars in the thriller *When the Dark Man Calls*, premiering on USA Network, Wednesday, June 14.

A more apt title might have been *Play a Lullaby for Me, Frasier Crane*. Van Ark's character, Dr. Julie Kaiser, is a radio psychologist in Ithaca, N.Y. For reasons viewers must take on faith, she is divorcing her hometown-sweet-heart husband, Max (Barry Flatman, whose hooks scream "Mr. Wrong"), and hoping to land a job in Gotham.

Unfortunately she's also got some repressed memories from her childhood to deal with. Poor Julie was the key witness in her parents' murder trial. She convinced the court a hired hand (Geoffrey Lewis) had stabbed her mom and dad to death.

He got 25 years-to-life and is back on the street, looking for Julie and vengeance. Just don't ask how he got her married name, address or the location of her daughter's schoolyard. (The screenwriter gave them to him.) First thing he does, though, he calls Julie's show and threatens her life.

Julie's loving brother, Lloyd (Chris Sarandon), takes her to the police to ask for protection. Julie is a gal in a tight skirt and a tight spot, and there's only one logical TV movie thing to do: undress. As the script would have it, the detective (James Read) assigned to her case is an old flame. The trail of their discarded clothing up the stairs in her apartment provides a moment of unintended comic relief.

Before long, bad guys and bogyemen are everywhere. Max keeps insisting he has always "been there" for Julie, but before he can explain, Lloyd knocks him out cold.

Dark Man is the sort of horror story viewers are supposed to identify with, but there's no reason to worry. It could only happen to the former star of a hit series. Van Ark's agent, however, should be afraid, very afraid.
