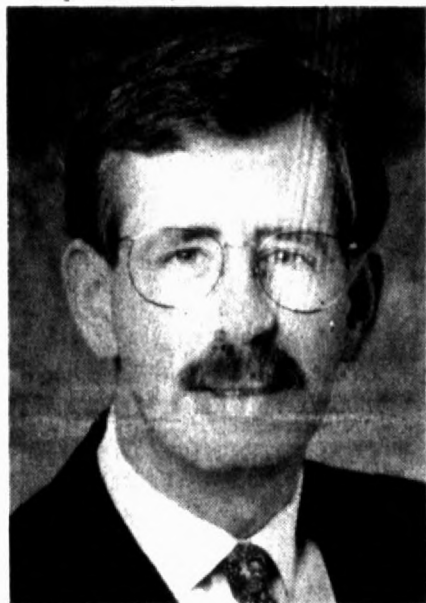
Bivins plans meeting here Wednesday

Americans fired upon in Somalia

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) - Somali gunmen fired on Marines on the road from Baidoa, where a food riot left one person dead, a child maimed and several other people injured.

The difficulty of the U.S.-led mission in Somalia becomes more apparent the further the troops penetrate the country. Today, an armored convoy of Italian troops went north to seize the town of Gailalassi.

Capt. Joe Davis, an air force officer briefing reporters in Mogadishu today, said a Somali man riding with at least seven others in a pickup truck opened fire with an AK-47 assault rifle on a Marine convoy of 12 vehicles returning to Mogadishu from Baidoa on Christmas.

Marines in the lead vehicle returned fire at the approaching pickup, hit at least three of its occupants and saw it veer off the road as the convoy sped by, Davis said. No Marines were hurt.

Davis said the attack took place a half mile south of Afgoi, about 35 miles west of the capital. None of the Marines was hurt.

Meanwhile, a Somali woman was killed and a number of other people, including children, were badly hurt in the riot in Baidoa on Christmas, Cynthia Osterman of CARE International reported.

Osterman, a spokeswoman for the charity in Mogadishu, said CARE employees in the central Somalia town reported by radio that the disturbance erupted after Marines delivered a truckload of food to an aid center.

She said about 20 bags of grain were left on the truck when the Marines left and dozens of people in a large crowd waiting for the food began fighting for it with sticks and clubs.

1992 was a pretty boring year--NOT!

Think of Columbus, queasy and shaken as he stumbled onto this continent 500 years ago, looking for someplace else. That's what America felt like in 1992.

From one end of the country to the other, race riots and hurricanes left thousands of lives in ruins. So much else we counted on went wrong. Even Columbus was damned.

In quaking California, they joke grimly about the Big One. But it was a human cataclysm that struck and thundered through the nation on April 29.

That day, a jury in remote Simi Valley cleared four white Los Angeles police officers of most charges in the beating of Rodney King, who is black. The verdicts seemed senseless to most who saw King bashed the year before - and it was hard not to, thanks to a guy with a loaded videocamera.

And that perceived injustice - and the legacy of hundreds of years of racism - exploded in a bloody riot that burned Los Angeles for three days and nights. Angry echoes rattled San Francisco, Seattle, Atlanta, Toledo, Ohio.

"People, I want to say ... can we all get along?" Rodney King pleaded.

When the fury was spent, 53 lives had perished and calculable damage approached \$1 billion. Much more than that was wasted.

Then in August, Hurricane Andrew's 200 mph battering ram splintered south Florida and coastal Louisiana, flattening whole towns. Life roared into a rancid, steamy hell. Ice seemed more precious than gold.

The storm-tossed cried out to Washington: Why have you forsaken us? Days later, troops arrived and acres of tents sprang up like for refugees from the most expensive weather disaster in U.S. history. The cost: \$21.5 billion, 55 dead, tens of thousands of homes and jobs lost.

All many had left was heart. "We thought we were going to die, so we just kept yelling that we

loved each other," said John Fulton, buried with nine relatives under the rubble of a Florida home more than five hours.

Then, a few weeks later, a rerun: Hurricane Iniki swept Hawaii, killing three people and destroying \$1 billion in property.

This year should have been fun. It should have been a party for the New World and the New World Order. No way, Columbus.

Can you remember where you were on Columbus Day? Face it, the Columbus anniversary was a washout. American Indians reminded Columbus carousers there were people here long before 1492, and many have suffered unhappily ever after.

These were 365 days so contrary they gave currency to a new retort - Not! - a sarcastic punchline for life meaning nothing is sure, as in: A judge said a 12-year-old boy couldn't divorce his terrible parents. Not!

The earth stood still in trembling California. Not! Not! a thousand times (including one 7.5 jolt on June 28) Not!

George Bush, well-mannered Republican president, was able to refrain from throwing up on the prime minister of Japan. Not!

Learning, Lena and Lotto topped Texas news

DALLAS (AP) - It's the eve of 1993, but in the Texas Legislature it might as well be 1992.

Or 1991.
Or 1990.
Lawmakers enter a new year facing the same old problem: school finance.

The school funding puzzle, baffling for lawmakers since 1989, dominated a year that also featured an unpredictable presidential election and a Railroad Commission race that disgraced a rising political star.

Personalities in 1992 ranged from a Dallas billionaire who would be president to a retired Schulenburg woman who struck it rich with a \$1 lottery ticket and from a former pastor accused of trying to kill his wife to a paroled death row inmate accused of killing again.

But nothing raised the ire of Texans more than the school finance mess, which now threatens to stop state funding altogether by summer break if the Legislature can't unravel it.

The state Supreme Court rang in 1992 on Jan. 30 by shooting down the nine-month-old reform bill, dubbed the "Robin Hood" plan because it shifted millions of property tax dollars from wealthier to poorer school districts.

In addition to finding the system unconstitutional, the court issued a June 1, 1993 deadline for coming up with an acceptable one.

However, the court deferred the ruling's effect so that it would not interfere with the collection of 1991 and 1992 property taxes.

The year's Top 10 stories, according to a poll of Texas newspaper and broadcast editors:

1. School Finance. 'Nuf said.
2. Railroad Commission Race. Lena Guerrero was a rising star, until it was learned she didn't graduate from UT.
3. Lottery. The lottery finally comes to Texas with a millionaire-a-week through the summer and big-money Lotto games in the fall.
4. Election. Texas was a key battleground for the presidential race.
5. Ross Perot. The Dallas billionaire put a new spin on politics.
6. The criminal justice system. There was great concern over the state's parole system.
7. Violent Crime. Several separate cases stood out from the mass of death.
8. Free Trade. After years of talk, the North American Free Trade Agreement is close to fruition. But debate remains about whether the deal will be bad or good for Texas.
9. Prisons. Several Texas communities sought prosperity through the prisons, either private or public.
10. Walker Railey. The former Dallas minister of the nation's largest Methodist church is indicted on charges he tried to kill his wife.

U.S. District Judge James Nowlin of Austin ruled on May 1 agreed that continued collection of the unlawful tax was unconstitutional. But he refused to issue an injunction, saying such an order could have a "disastrous effect" on school children.

Five days later, a federal lawsuit was filed challenging the decision to allow tax collections under the plan to continue. The lawsuit, filed on behalf of retired naval captain Coleman H. Smith of Lakeway, said the action denied taxpayers' due process.

A 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel on Aug. 3 sent the case back to Nowlin with instructions he dismiss it, adding that it couldn't yet be decided by federal courts.

Richards called the Legislature into special session after the November elections to grapple with the problem again.

"The threat of the courts closing the public schools of Texas on June 1 of next year is a very real threat," said Richards, who with Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock and lame-duck House Speaker Gib Lewis advanced a plan that included shifting about \$400 million in local tax property tax money from rich to poor districts.

Lawmakers again were unable to compromise and the question remains for them to answer starting next month.

Ross Perot, the short Texas computer magnate with a tall ego, barged onto the national political scene in May during an appearance

on "Larry King Live." Perot said he "could consider a run for the White House if he were placed on the ballot in all 50 states."

The nation had never before seen such a response. Almost overnight, legions of faithful followers lined up behind the folksy Texarkana native who promised to "get under the hood" and work on the nation's economy.

Perot then opened his ample bank account, fueling a rise in political polls that had him leading President Bush and Democrat Bill Clinton by early summer.

But in mid-July, just as he was nearing his goal of getting on all 50 ballots, Perot abruptly yanked the plug on his campaign, citing concern about the election being thrown into the House of Representatives.

His "United We Stand" grassroots movement continued to work, however, and in October, just 33 days before the Nov. 3 vote, he re-launched himself in earnest.

The cornerstone of Perot's furious 11th-hour push was a series of simple 30-minute network ads that drew more viewers than the National League Championship Series. He also poured money into shorter television and radio spots, spending \$60 million before election day.

Perhaps only a judgment error, his decision to air unproven conspiracy charges just a week before the election, kept him from taking more than the 19 percent of the popular vote he received.

Still, Perot did better than any other third-party candidate since Theodore

Roosevelt got almost 30 percent in 1912, and he has not ruled out another try at the presidency.

President Bush also was a loser on election day despite carrying his adopted home state by a slim 200,000 votes. In his concession speech at a Houston hotel, Bush encouraged the

Carjacking boomed and blasted a hole in suburban security. Now it's

a federal crime, a case for the FBI.

On the one hand, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld a woman's right to an abortion, but on the other hand it affirmed the right of states to restrict it.

Vice President Dan Quayle denounced a fictional unwed TV anchorwoman "Murphy Brown" for having a baby.

Americans continued to lose interest in real sex but paid \$50 for "Sex," a picture book of Madonna's interior life. Critics panned it as soft porn and, worse, cliched.

The politics of homosexuality turned ugly. Oregon voters were asked to declare homosexuality perverse. They refused. But Colorado law now states homosexuals don't deserve explicit protection from bias. Homosexuality marched out of the military closet and some people threatened to quit if the rules change, as President-elect Clinton has promised.

'92 election was cutthroat

WASHINGTON (AP) - The American people opted to oust their president in 1992, a course that seemed nearly inconceivable when the political year began and nearly inevitable when it ended.

Along the way, they flirted mightily with the idea of choosing as chief executive a shoot-from-the-hip gadfly businessman who had never held public office. They replaced 110 congressmen and rewrote law wherever they could to limit how long politicians may keep their offices.

The election returns reflected what seemed to be the nation's overriding sense of itself in 1992: a worried country that had lost its self-confidence.

Bill Clinton, a skilled politician but little known outside his native Arkansas at the start of the year, seized upon the nation's economic malaise, promised change and stuck doggedly to that message.

Of the nine presidents who have served since World War II, George

Bush became the third to be turned out of office. The victim, to some extent, of his own successes, he had presided over the demise of a foreign threat that had overshadowed all other concerns for 45 years, allowing himself to be judged - and found short - on his domestic record. He couldn't shake the perception that he lacked interest in issues close to home.

And, after 12 years of Republican scorn for government as the enemy of the people, the pendulum swung. One party rarely retains office even that long.

Clinton, an activist-centrist who shunned the liberal symbols that tripped up his Democratic forerunners, won on his promise to deliver jobs, college training and health care for all.

Foreign affairs didn't matter. Neither did last year's Persian Gulf showdown that had demonstrated Bush's diplomatic skills and won him enough popularity to chase off most potential Democratic challengers, leaving a field that Clinton could dominate.

Four years ago, Bush won the presidency with unexpected ease in a dirty, substanceless contest against a Democrat who ran what was called "the worst campaign of the century."

Now the same is being said about Bush's re-election effort. Slow to start and unfocused, he ignored worries about the economy and failed to sense the country's mood shift.

Unhelpful was a right-wing challenge from commentator Patrick Buchanan that showed Bush's vulnerabilities; unhelpful, too, was a GOP convention with a harshly exclusionary drumbeat.

At Christmastime 1991, with the country dogged by a recession more persistent than any since the Great Depression, Bush had reached for symbolism. He bought socks at J.C. Penney's. But he offered no cohesive program for economic recovery until midway into the campaign, then he barely mentioned it again.

He was hobbled by his broken "no new taxes" pledge. He tried to make Clinton's character the issue - citing

his rival's youthful maneuvering to avoid the Vietnam draft and suggesting that a student trip to Moscow had a sinister purpose - but the public was unexcited.

Bush wound up denouncing his opponents as "bozos." It didn't sell.

What gave the election special character throughout was the on-and-off-and-on candidacy of billionaire Ross Perot, who said that if the people wanted him he would serve and then spent \$60 million from his own pocket to persuade them that they wanted him.

The deficit was his issue. He offered a disciplined, painful textbook remedy. But his appeal lay beyond that, in his image as a pragmatic, hardnosed businessman who would shut out lobbyists and take instructions from the people, conveyed through electronic town halls.

Perot mystified. He hired, but ignored, professional advisers; dropped out of the race in July but continued to finance the drive to get on every ballot. Then he got back in, saying he had quit because of a Republican plot to humiliate his daughter and disrupt her wedding.

For a time, it even looked like he could win. He led both Bush and Clinton in the polls, giving voice to the country's dismay with its usual politicians and politics as usual.

In the end, Perot won 19 percent of the vote, the best showing by an independent since Theodore Roosevelt's 27 percent in 1912. But he won no electoral votes, although he finished second in Utah (behind Bush) and in Maine (behind Clinton).

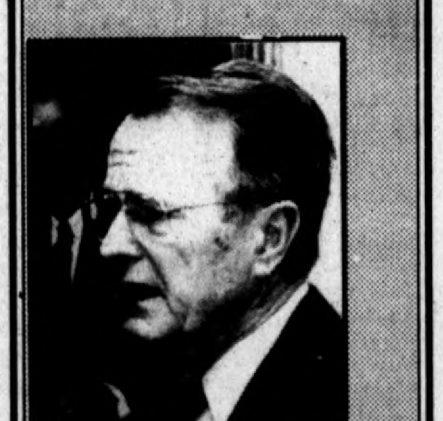
But Perot didn't really matter. Analysts said that he took votes about evenly from Bush and Clinton, so Clinton still would have won in a two-man race. As it was, Clinton got 43 percent of the popular vote and 69 percent of the electoral vote.

Some analysts now think that, given the nation's frame of mind and the economy, Bush's loss was all-but-inevitable.

World saw new hope, new despair in '92

New year, new life, new hope. But not 1992. For much of the world, it was a year for dying.

They died silently, by the thousands, in the dust of starving Somalia. Invisibly, in midnight massacres, in Bosnia's "cleansed" towns. Uselessly in the blood feuds of a crumbled Soviet Union. Namelessly, slipping beneath the waves, in the sea off Haiti. Senselessly in chaotic Liberia.

The world swung out of the Cold War's shadow in 1992 and into a promising dawn of new nations. Warriors made peace, the voiceless at last voted, foes joined as friends. The new day worked minor wonders in unlikely places: Albanians got their first beauty parlor. The Chinese raced horses again after four decades. In gray old Romania, a prancing Michael Jackson thrilled 'em. But next door, or down the road, or around the world in lands brought home through the window of television, neighbors were falling to slaughtering each other, for reasons rooted in dimly recalled history. Old "friends" were proving unreal, old wounds unhealed.

"What has become of the rising hope shared by so many?" grieved Nobel Peace Prize winner Elie Wiesel.

From a century of memories, Sulejman Galicic offered an answer. "Without harmony, there is no peace," the 99-year-old Bosnian Muslim told AP reporter George Jahn in bloody Sarajevo, besieged by the hated Serbs. "And there never will be either in Bosnia."

No harmony, no peace. No hope? Through a year of indecision, some did hope that the United States, the surviving superpower, would show the way to the new world order. But America seemed unready, distracted by its own democratic exercise.

The inertia proved costly. In Somalia, where civil conflict and drought conspired to starve a nation, aid workers warned in late 1991 of a human catastrophe. It arrived on schedule. By late 1992, at least 300,000 had died in that sorrowful East African land.

Finally, in late November, the U.N. Security Council took up Bush's offer to land thousands of U.S. troops in Somalia to restore order and deliver food. Slowly, tentatively, the community of nations was working together. But the map overflowed with jobs even tougher than Somalia.

In Cambodia, a U.N. deal ending 13 years of civil war was unraveling as the diehard communist Khmer Rouge guerrillas balked.

In Liberia, a dormant civil war erupted anew, the blood flowed, and a ragtag rebel army pinned down a

multinational African peacekeeping force.

Further south in Africa, in Angola, the results of U.N.-sponsored elections disappointed the guerrilla leader who lost. His insurgents took up arms again, encore of a 16-year-old war.

Militant separatists in Sri Lanka and India waged terror wars against the "others" - those who look different, speak differently, and hold power. Such ethnic crusades unreel in kaleidoscopic confusion in the former Soviet Union, where Armenians battled Azerbaijanis, Georgians fought South Ossetians and Abkhazians, North Ossetians fought Ingush, Moldovans stared down Russians, and Tajik clan took on Tajik clan. In Germany, ominously, it was neo-Nazis who attacked the "others."

But through it all, 1992's toughest challenge lay in the blood-soaked valleys of a disintegrated Yugoslavia.

In the latest act of a Balkan tragedy, the republic of Bosnia-Herzegovina, a patchwork of peoples, broke away from Yugoslavia. Ferocious ethnic warfare followed.

The well-armed Serbian minority drove Bosnia's majority Muslims from countless towns, killing thousands. "Ethnic cleansing," they called it. They were not alone: Loyalist Muslims and Croats could also be brutal.

The Muslim president of Bosnia-Herzegovina, in battered Sarajevo, appealed for American help. "Let them bomb those who are bombing us," he pleaded. He still waits.

For some around the world, the new year did mean new hope.

Peace - or something close to it - settled over the civil wars in El Salvador, Mozambique and Afghanistan, allowing their war-sick people to at last ponder a future. The Arabs and Israelis talked on and on about peace - no breakthroughs, but talk itself remained astonishing. In South Africa, whites and the black majority inched painfully toward multiracial democracy.

Country by country in 1992, as never before, the people spoke in the language of the ballot box. From

Albania, to the Congo, to the coconut islands of the Seychelles, they voted their choices.

But democracy's progress was not always smooth. In Peru, for example, the president shut down the congress and courts, complaining of corruption. Polls said his people agreed with him. "Democracy just doesn't work in Peru," concluded a young law student.

In Haiti, the soldiers who ousted an elected president in 1991 still resisted international pressure, and poor Haitians still took to boats for the desperate, dangerous sail toward America.

The world did find diversions, both titillating and terrifying, in 1992:

Everyone's favorite dysfunctional family, the British royals, went through what Queen Elizabeth II dubbed an "annus horribilis" - a harrowing year of marital woe that at least kept tabloid readers reading.

A Russian named Chikatilo, worst mass murderer of modern times, was sentenced to death for the cannibalistic sex killings of 52 children and women.

Pablo Escobar, lord of druglords, escaped from his plush prison in Colombia, plunging that luckless land into another deadly round of cocaine chaos.

But these were just sidelights to 1992's headline story - the accelera-

tion of change, the "resumption of history," as George Bush put it, a messy, uncertain history that makes itself up as it goes along.

Leaders of this teeming planet's 179 nations weren't wearing "We Are The World" T-shirts yet. But they did help history along by drawing closer together.

At a historic summit in Rio de Janeiro, they jointly vowed to fight global warming. In Europe, a squabbling old continent flinched but didn't turn back from 1993 and the age of the open market. And everywhere leaders looked for ways to bring nuclear arms under stricter control.

Scientists drew together, too - to

lay strategy for the offensive against AIDS, which now infects at least 10 million people worldwide, and to look beyond the horizon, to other worlds.

On Sept. 25, the United States launched its first Mars mission in 17 years. After the orbiter reaches Mars, it will work in tandem with Russian spacecraft landing on the surface, opening an era of unprecedented space teamwork.

By Jan. 1, this bit of human ingenuity, the Mars Observer, will be 130 million miles from Earth, that battered speck of blue and green that will have managed to make it to another new year - of new life (144 million babies, by U.N. estimate) and uncountable new hopes.

"It's hard to imagine what kind of a campaign strategy you'd engage in to overcome constant bad news and constant bad interpretations of mildly good news," said political scientist Charles Jones of the University of Wisconsin. "It's the economy that usually does it to an incumbent president. ... The outcome was that the people didn't want George Bush to be president anymore."

The voters also knocked off five incumbent senators - three Democrats, two Republicans. They put 47 women, 38 blacks and 17 Hispanics in the House and brought to six the number of women in the Senate - all record numbers.

One of the new senators is a black woman, Carol Moseley Braun of Illinois, a first. Another is an American Indian, Ben Nighthorse Campbell of Colorado. California sent two women to the Senate, another first.

Democrats retained control of both houses and 93 percent of House incumbents who sought re-election won, but that figure is misleading because of record numbers of retirements and large numbers of defeats in primaries. All told, 110 of the 435 members of the House were replaced, the highest number in four decades.

In the 14 states where term limitations were on the ballot they carried - an additional indicator of dismay with the status quo, a reinforcement of the election's dual message: that new faces were preferable to old faces and that the people expected more from their government than they had been getting.

Let's be thankful for these dedicated professionals who are willing to get up an hour or more early and spend long, sometimes treacherous hours on the road to come to Hereford to give our children the quality education to which they are entitled. Let's appreciate an administration and school board who are equally dedicated to filling all positions as quickly as possible with the best qualified teachers. For many, diversity means them

WASHINGTON (AP) - The problem in promising to choose a Cabinet that looks like America is that so many people think that means them - or ought to.

That's behind the protests of activist women who obviously are irking President-elect Clinton, who says he is organizing the most diverse Cabinet and administration in history but isn't going to deal in quotas.

Ironically, the dispute flared Monday as he appointed the second woman, and third black, to the Cabinet lineup he hopes to complete before Christmas. Clinton said pointedly that he didn't get her name from the activists who had been complaining.

Clinton said he recruited Hazel O'Leary, a Minnesota utility executive, because he was convinced that there had to be women with the qualifications and experience to become secretary of energy.

"I did not receive her name from a single women's group, or a single minority group," he said. But he did get a lot of very public advice, and chiding, from both, and he obviously didn't like it.

He said it was astonishing, amazing, that there were complaints from women's groups that seemed to diminish the significance of his choice of women to head the Environmental Protection Agency and the Council of Economic Advisers.

"They're playing quota games and math games," Clinton said. "They would have been counting those

positions against our administration, those bean counters who are doing that, if I had appointed white men to those positions."

There already had been a more direct, public complaint from Eleanor Smear, president of the Fund for a Feminist Majority. She wrote Clinton on Friday that "to make a real change from the past" there should be no fewer than six women among the 14 Cabinet members.

She later said that wasn't a quota, although she also noted that women make up 44 percent of the work force. Ireland said women are 53 percent of the population and should have a commensurate role in the new administration as a whole.

"There are more than numbers at stake here," Clinton said. "This counting of the Cabinet issue has been amazing to me, the way they do it."

He said the roles, influence and impact of women, Hispanics, African Americans and other minorities are a vital concern, whatever their numbers. Clinton said the female and minority officials in his government will be far more powerful than in any before.

"I think I owe the American people a White House staff, a Cabinet and appointments that look like America, but that meet high standards of excellence, and that's what I'll do," he pledged.

Campaign promises about Cabinet choices have haunted candidates and sometimes presidents before. Richard Nixon's vice presidential nominee in 1960, Henry Cabot Lodge, said during that campaign that if the

Republican ticket won, there would be a black Cabinet member. Nixon tempered that by saying his choices would be based on qualifications, not race. Since he lost, it was moot. The first black Cabinet member, Robert Weaver at Housing and Urban Development, was appointed by Lyndon B. Johnson in 1965.

When he ran and won in 1968, Nixon said he would have Democrats in his Cabinet, but couldn't recruit the men he wanted.

In his 1976 campaign, Jimmy Carter

said his Cabinet wouldn't be made up of insiders who had been "wandering through Washington's quiet corridors of power or strolling along the plush green fairways of privilege."

But he needed some seasoned Washington hands in the administration, and he got some criticism for it. Clinton has too.

But as Clinton said, he's the president, and he has to worry about getting the job done.

That, after all, is the test that counts.

Notes on the Law

"This case raises one primary question: under the Uniform Commercial Code as adopted in Texas, is the interest of an unpaid cash seller in (cattle) already delivered to a buyer superior or subordinate to the interest of a holder of a perfected security interest in those same (cattle)? *In re Samuels*, 526 F2d 1238 (US 5th Cir. 1976). In other words, if you take a check or draft for cattle, deliver the cattle to the buyer, whose bank has a security interest in the buyer's after-acquired property, and then the buyer's check or draft is dishonored, what interest can you assert against the cattle. A similar analysis would apply if the cattle were re-sold to a good faith purchaser.

Prior to enactment of the Uniform Commercial Code, no right, title, interest or power to transfer passed to the original buyer until the check or draft was honored. If the check or draft was dishonored, then, generally, the original seller could still claim ownership of the cattle and recover the cattle. When the Uniform Commercial Code was drafted, one of its goals was to accommodate the free flow of commerce. Thus, the Uniform Commercial Code separately treats the original buyer's "right to transfer" from his legal "power" to transfer.

Today, if the original buyer's check or draft is dishonored, then he has not paid for the cattle and he has no legal right to transfer or mortgage the cattle. This affects the relationship between the original buyer and the original seller only. If the original buyer still has possession of the cattle and if the cattle have not become subject to a security interest under a future acquired interest clause, then the original seller could maintain a claim to recover the cattle.

However, even though the original buyer has no legal right to transfer the cattle, the original buyer may have the "power" to do so. In other words, if the original buyer turns around and re-sells the cattle to a second buyer and the second buyer is acting in good faith, then ownership of the cattle will pass to the second buyer. The Uniform Commercial Code does not provide the original seller with any claim against a second buyer acting in good faith. The original seller's only claims are against the original buyer who also no longer has any claim against the cattle.

Texas politics in '92: business as unusual

AUSTIN (AP) - The political year in Texas ended as it began - with a campaign on the horizon.

When 1992 opened, politicians were preparing for a big election year in which votes would be cast for president, 30 congressmen and all 181 state legislators.

When 1992 ended, politicians were preparing for another big but unexpected election, the 1993 choosing of a replacement for U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

President-elect Clinton's choice of Bentsen, Texas' senior senator, to head the Treasury Department left a vacancy. Both Republicans and Democrats were hoping to claim the seat and finish the term.

"We now have a great, spirited campaign that may in fact change the landscape of Texas politics significantly," said Karen Hughes, executive director of the Texas GOP. Her Democratic counterpart, Ed Martin, said Democrats will wage a vigorous campaign to retain the seat. "They know it's important to have a Democrat in the U.S. Senate," he said.

Gov. Ann Richards was mulling over an interim successor to appoint until the special election, which her aides said likely would be held in May.

That open primary could draw numerous candidates, with the winner

servicing out the remainder of Bentsen's term, which runs through 1994. The last time this happened, in 1961, 71 candidates sought the seat.

As for the election just past, two Texans ran for president. A guy from Arkansas won. And for the first time since statehood, a Democrat won the White House without carrying Texas.

President Bush, who calls Houston home, was sent home by the nation's voters, although he carried Texas by just over 200,000 votes.

As the year ended, he and the first lady were looking at house plans and visiting Texas A&M University, where his presidential library will be built.

Tycoon Ross Perot, who calls Dallas home, was rejected as well. But Perot's independent bid garnered 1,350,000 votes in Texas and his economic message helped shape the presidential debate.

Lena Guerrero, the governor's once-high flying protege, crashed in flames after admitting that she lacked the honors college degree she had claimed for 12 years.

While Republicans lost the White House, they did establish a 20th Century high-water mark in the Texas Senate by capturing 13 of the 31 seats. Their previous total had been nine.

Thanks to those Senate victories, due in part to a redistricting map drawn by a three-member panel of Republican-appointed federal judges, the GOP now holds more than one-third of the seats in both the state House and Senate.

That margin will make Republican votes essential for such legislative business as proposing constitutional amendments and confirming gubernatorial appointees to boards and commissions.

The Republican Party held onto its four seats on the Texas Supreme Court, too. While one GOP incumbent, Justice Eugene Cook, was defeated, Republican candidate Craig Enoch knocked off veteran Democrat Oscar Mauzy.

Texans also picked 30 congressmen this year - the most ever - with Democrats retaining their edge in the U.S. House. Next year, the Texas delegation will include 21 Democrats and nine Republicans.

And politicos of all persuasions were encouraged by another bit of 1992 news: the turnout.

More than 6 million Texans cast ballots in the presidential election. That was 72 percent of those registered, the highest percentage

turnout in 20 years.

Secretary of State John Hannah said the state's extended "no excuses" early voting period and efforts to "sell" voters in venues

such as shopping malls contributed to the big numbers.

"I would like to think our early voting and retail voting helped turn out more voters," he said.

nation go support President-elect Clinton.

"There is important work to be done and America must always come first," he said. "So we will get behind this new president and wish him well."

After leaving office next month, Bush said he plans "to get very active in the grandchild business and in finding ways to help others."

He and first lady Barbara Bush spent the last part of the year planning for a post-White House life in Houston.

Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero had similarly dismal fate in the elections after simple political research revealed that her resume falsely claimed she was a University of Texas honors graduate. On the contrary, Guerrero wasn't a graduate at all and had failed several classes.

"I brought these difficulties upon myself," she said while announcing her resignation. "I know that I have no one else to blame. I am angry at myself. I am embarrassed. And I am terribly sorry. I have learned a very hard lesson."

Guerrero remained in the race, asking voters for another chance and "a clean slate." But it was Republican challenger Barry Williamson who emerged with the state's biggest electoral prize of the year.

It was a better 1992 for Texans who hit it big in the lottery, which kicked off in May with a scratch-off game and weekly million-dollar drawings through the summer.

A pick-six Lotto began in the fall, and the first super-jackpot winner was Janie Kallus, a 65-year-old retired nurse from Schulenburg who collected \$22 million.

Ms. Kallus said she didn't think the money would change her life much.

"I'm going to build my dog a house - no," she laughed. "I have a mother that's 94 and she's in a nursing home. So I can pay for her care. I also have an old aunt that's widowed and has no children. I will help her, too."

As for herself, "I don't think I'll change my lifestyle much."

Tragedy struck scores of families victimized by violent crime this year. Throughout Texas, from Pecos to Austin to Richardson, shocking crimes jarred communities.

In Somerville, six members of a family were killed and their house set afire to cover the crime. A relative was charged in the crime. On Thanksgiving eve, a sporting goods

store in Richardson was robbed and two employees were murdered, their throats slashed. A third survived. There were several arrests including that of a former store employee.

The state also was shocked by the arrest of a paroled death row inmate on charges he raped and killed several North Texas women. The case of Kenneth Allen McDuff forced officials to look long and hard at the parole system.

Police finally acted against former Walker Railey, the former First United Methodist Church of Dallas pastor accused of attempting to strangle his wife in 1987. Railey, who had moved to California, was extradited and charged with

attempted murder. He is scheduled to stand trial in 1993.

During the summer, President Bush met the leaders of Canada and Mexico in San Antonio to initial the North American Free Trade Agreement.

Many Texans hope to benefit from the looming pact, which still must be ratified by Congress, but others say the deal is deficient on safeguards to protect American jobs and the environment.

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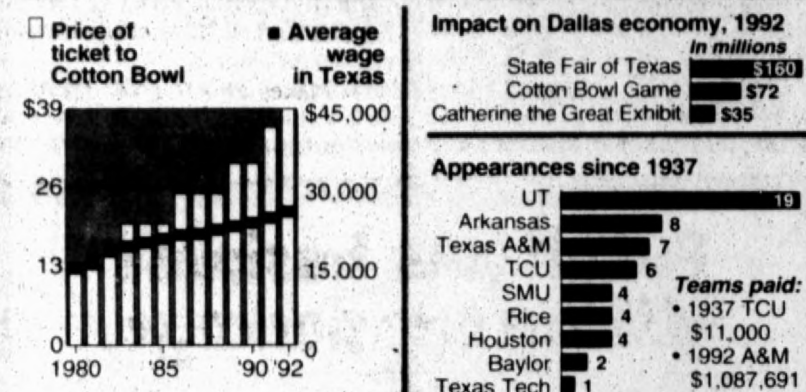

'Canes too much for Tide; Aggies will surprise Irish

Alabama fans, take heart. Sure, Miami is No. 1, has a 29-game winning streak and is gunning for its second straight national championship, third in four years and fifth in the last decade.

But remember this: The last four times No. 1 has played No. 2 in a bowl game, No. 2 has won. And the trend started when No. 2 Alabama beat No. 1 Penn State 14-7 in the 1979 Sugar Bowl.

Yes, the same Sugar Bowl and same Superdome where No. 2 Alabama (12-0) will play No. 1 Miami (11-0) on New Year's night. In 1979, Alabama needed an incredible goal-line stand in the fourth quarter to beat Penn State. The Crimson Tide will need another tremendous defensive effort to defeat Miami, which is trying to become the first team to win consecutive championships since Alabama in 1978-79.

Both teams have great defenses, so it should be a low-scoring game. "Both defenses have great talent, but they use different systems," said Miami quarterback Gino Torretta, who is trying to become the first Heisman Trophy winner since Pittsburgh's Tony Dorsett in 1976 to also win the national championship. "They do more guessing than we do."

The guess here is that Miami will wear down Alabama, score three touchdowns and complete the greatest 10-year run in college football history.

The Hurricanes have a mediocre ground game, but average 316 yards through the air. And Torretta's short, quick throws will negate the powerful pass rush of Alabama's All-American defensive ends, Eric Curry and John Copeland.

Alabama's offensive strength is running the ball, but the Tide won't be able to do it consistently against Miami. That will force them to pass more than usual, playing into the hands of Miami's talented linebackers and secondary.

There will be no such miracle

against the Hurricanes, who are 8-point favorites ... MIAMI 21-10.

Flemons is key to Tech's success

WICHITA FALLS (AP) - When Will Flemons arrived at Texas Tech four years ago, he'd didn't know how to lose.

Understandably, the big kid from Paducah didn't have a lot of experience at it. In his four high school seasons, Flemons' teams were 129-7 and won two Class A state championships.

"That first year we were 5-22 and I wasn't handling things very well. Losing like that makes you sick inside. You know you have talent, but you can't put it together and win," Flemons said in a telephone interview last week.

"I'd call home after every game and mom would say 'you've got to take the bad with the good.' She told me things would come back around and to just keep playing hard. But it took me a couple of years to see it."

The Red Raiders ended that season with 18 straight losses, but Flemons was only a freshman. Next year would surely be different.

"The only thing to motivate you is thinking you can come back next year and turn the season around," he said.

But the second season wasn't better. It was worse.

The Red Raiders went 8-23 and Flemons played in only 12 games. He broke his right foot before the season started and then broke the same foot later in the year.

Flemons, a self-proclaimed "mama's boy," had to be wondering if mama really knew what she was talking about.

Last year, he found out she did. In his junior season, the 6-7 Flemons was the Southwest Conference "player of the year." He averaged 19.6 points and 9.8 rebounds per game.

"I told myself that third year that I was going to play hard and contribute anything I could to the team. If that means scoring points or getting rebounds or taking a charge or diving on the floor for a ball, anything - I would do anything."

Flemons' hustle paid off in not only individual honors, but also team wins.

Tech went 15-14, the Red Raiders' first winning season in five years.

OK, it's not a Paducah-type record, but when you lose 45 games in two years, 15-14 can look Duke-like to a college junior.

A healthy Flemons was one of the big reasons for the Tech turnaround. The other was a coaching change. James Dickey replaced long-time Red Raider coach Gerald Myers on the bench and he also replaced Myers' slow, deliberate style of offense with a more wide-open game plan.

"I have all the respect in the world for Coach Myers, but as basketball changed, he didn't quite change with the time," Flemons said. "The new system that Coach Dickey brought in is what basketball is all about now. We have a very healthy atmosphere and our team plays with a lot of confidence."

With his senior year upcoming, Flemons had everything going for him. NCAA Preview Magazine had tabbed him the eighth best power forward in the country. A big year could not only mean more wins for Tech but maybe even an NBA contract for Big Will.

He couldn't have been happier. But his happiness turned into tragedy last summer.

Flemons' half-brother and former Paducah teammate Chris Hurd was paralyzed in a car accident. Flemons said Chris had fallen asleep at the wheel while driving to Berger to visit his family. The car crashed into a tree. Chris' neck was broken and one lung was punctured.

"When I first heard it happened, I just couldn't go see him," Flemons said. "I remembered him as an outgoing athlete who played every

sport, and to hear he was never going to play any sport again. I called him, but I couldn't go see him. When I finally did, he had tears in his eyes. Now, I've learned to adjust."

The other brother who played on those 1988 and 1989 state championship teams in Paducah - Alan Hurd - is now in the Army. Flemons said Alan served in Desert Storm.

And the other member of that Paducah starting lineup, Brian Barnes, is a backup player at Texas-El Paso.

Flemons and Barnes were reunited on Dec. 9 when Tech played UTEP. The Miners beat the Red Raiders, 73-65. Flemons was Tech's top scorer with 18 points and top rebounder with eight.

Barnes only played a couple of minutes and had nothing but zeroes in the box score.

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1992 brought changes to world of sports

It was time for a change in sports, too.

The Larry Bird-Magic Johnson era came to an end, Fay Vincent was ousted as baseball commissioner, John Ziegler stepped down as NHL president, Riddick Bowe replaced Evander Holyfield as the heavyweight champion and pro athletes came to the Olympics.

It was also another year when the story was often not about competition. Mike Tyson was convicted on a rape charge and sent to prison, the NFL lost an antitrust suit, NHL players went on strike a week before the Stanley Cup playoffs, Reds owners Marge Schott was accused of making racial remarks and the Philippines was stripped of the Little League championship for using ineligible players.

It was also a year when people in sports and fans had to come to grips with the AIDS issue.

Some things did stay the same as the Pittsburgh Penguins, Chicago Bulls and Duke Blue Devils repeated as champions. The Miami Hurricanes, meanwhile, dominated college football again by finishing No. 1 in The AP poll and staying there this season. For individuals, it was another great year for Fred Couples, Monica Seles, Jim Courier, Barry Bonds, Carl Lewis and Alberto Tomba.

But more than anything in 1992, there was a sense sports was undergoing some type of metamorphosis. TV ratings for several sports - particularly baseball - were down as the public seemingly grew weary of high-priced players carrying on high-decibel whining during a period of tough economic times.

America's solution to a bad economy was to change the president. The fans' answer to problems in sports may be to stay away from the games or change the channel to the Home Shopping Network until the players appear to sell their autographs.

The Atlanta Braves and Toronto Blue Jays put on a pretty good show, but the TV ratings were the second lowest in prime time for a World Series. When Dave Winfield's two-run double put the Blue Jays ahead in the top of the 11th inning, most of the United States and much of Canada was sleeping.

Game 6 of the World Series in Atlanta didn't start until 8:50 p.m. because Ross Perot purchased the pregame show. By the time the Blue Jays were champions it was nearly 1

a.m. Much of the United States was already in dreamland by then and didn't hear the result until Sunday morning on the radio along with the late hockey scores.

Game 7 of the NL playoffs was also a classic as Francisco Cabrera delivered a two-out, two-run single in the bottom of the ninth inning to give Atlanta a stunning 3-2 victory over Pittsburgh. This one ended at 11:53 p.m.

When the baseball season finally ended the owners cried poverty, claiming things would change now that Vincent was gone. They didn't. During the winter meetings more than \$260 million was doled out, including a record \$43.75 million to Bonds by the San Francisco Giants.

Heading into 1993, baseball owners are faced with the prospects of negotiating a new contract with the players after reopening the current one, declining revenue from network TV in the next deal, and possible loss of the antitrust exemption. It's not a pretty picture.

Some good things happened on the diamond, though. Robin Yount and George Brett each reached 3,000 hits, Nolan Ryan kept striking out batters and Bonds captured his second MVP in three years.

The NFL also spent much of the year dealing with off-field matters. Eight NFL players challenged the legality of Plan B, a free agency system implemented by the league in February 1989 that allows each team to retain 37 players after each season.

An eight-woman jury found that the NFL was liable in the cases of all eight players, but awarded compensation to only four of them. Although the jury agreed that Plan B helped maintain competitive balance, it found it was too restrictive. All this is leading to a change in free agency and the NFL draft.

One thing that didn't change in the NFL was another NFC rout in the Super Bowl. Washington crushed Buffalo 37-24 in a game that wasn't as close as the score suggested. Redskins quarterback Mark Rypien was the Super Bowl MVP, completing 18 of 33 passes for 292 yards and two touchdowns.

In the NHL, there was a changing of the guard as Mario Lemieux took over the lead superstar role from Wayne Gretzky. Next in line: Eric Lindros. Because of the strike the Penguins almost didn't get a chance to repeat. But once things were settled, Pittsburgh finished off the NHL's 75th anniversary season by winning 11 straight games in the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The Bulls had little difficulty in winning their second straight NBA

title. Led by Michael Jordan, Chicago won 67 regular-season games and then beat Portland in six to win the title.

Jordan didn't stop there, though. He hooked up with Magic, Bird, Charles Barkley, Patrick Ewing, David Robinson, Karl Malone, Scottie Pippen, Chris Mullin, Clyde Drexler, John Stockton and Christian Laettner to form the "Dream Team" in the Summer Olympics.

On its way to the gold medal, the United States averaged 117.3 points in the 40-minute games and the average margin of victory was 43.8 points. Things got a bit tight in the gold medal game as the United States edged Croatia only 117-85.

Instead of nationalism, the Olympic focus was more on individuals. Individuals like Carl Lewis, Gail Devers (100 meters), Jackie Joyner-Kersey (heptathlon), Mike Conley (triple jump), Heike Drechsler (long jump), Vitaly Scherbo (gymnast, six golds), Trent Dimas (gymnast) and Jennifer Capriati (tennis).

Lewis again emerged as the star of the Olympics with a stunning performance in the 4x100-meter relay and a surprising victory over arch-rival Mike Powell in the long jump.

In women's golf, two familiar names remained ahead of the field as Patty Sheehan won the U.S. Women's Open and Betsy King captured the LPGA championship. Dottie Mochrie, the Dinah Shore winner, led the LPGA with a 70.80 average.

There was a change in generations in auto racing as Al Unser won the closest Indianapolis 500 ever (.043 of a second over Scott Goodyear) and Davey Allison joined his father as a Daytona 500 winner. Superstar drivers Richard Petty and Rick Mears said goodbye.

The 31-year-old Lewis closed the final 100 meters of the relay in 8.8 seconds. He didn't even qualify for the 100 meters at the U.S. trials, finishing sixth.

The big disappointments at Barcelona were Dave Johnson's performance in the decathlon, Sergei Bubka's failure in the pole vault and Michael Johnson's miss in the 200 meters. Of course the flop of the year was Dan O'Brien, who didn't even qualify for the U.S. team.

The U.S. stars at Albertville came on the ice as Kristi Yamaguchi won the women's figure skating gold medal and speedskater Bonnie Blair took home gold in the 500 and 1,000 meters. It was another Olympic disaster, however, for Dan Jansen and an Olympic bust for pairs skaters Calla Urbanski and Rocky Marvel.

The Winter Games also made stars of sultry ice dancers Marina Klimova and her husband, Sergei Ponomarenko, of the Unified Team.

On the slopes of Val d'Isere, Tomba became the first Alpine skier to win the same event at two Winter Olympics when he captured the gold medal in the giant slalom.

About the time the Winter Games were ending, March Madness was just heating up. Duke survived to become the first team since UCLA in 1972-73 to win consecutive NCAA titles.

The Blue Devils, guided by coach Mike Krzyzewski, trounced Michigan's fabulous freshmen 71-51 in the championship game after beating Indiana 81-78 in the semifinals.

The college basketball game of the year, however, didn't come in the Final Four. It was Duke's 104-103 victory against Kentucky in the East Regional final as Laettner played the perfect game, going 10 for 10 from the field and free throw line. He made the winning basket with 2.1 seconds left in the game.

Couples never quite found that kind of perfection on the golf course, but he came close. Couples won The Masters, led all golfers with a 69.38 average and topped the 1992 money leaders with earnings of \$1,344,188.

Rose is glaring omission from Hall of Fame ballot

Pete Rose shouldn't need any more help to get into Cooperstown, but he's getting it anyway. The latest assist came from the mailman, who dropped off a letter last week labeled "1993 Hall of Fame Ballot."

Here are some of the names of the first-year eligibles on it: Rick Burleson, Bill Campbell, Cecil Cooper, Doug DeCinces, Davey Lopes, Garry Matthews, Darrell Porter, Andre Thornton.

And here are some of the names of the holdovers: Vida Blue, Curt Flood, Minnie Minoso, Thurman Munson, Luis Tiant.

Combined, that's a strong Rotisserie League entry, definitely. An impressive roster for a card show, probably. Decent guys all, maybe. And the Hall?

Not. There are enough other things happening in sports at the moment to nudge justice for Pete Rose toward the bottom of the list marked "Things to Do Today."

But the game he played with such dogged determination needs some good news very badly right now. Who knows, doing something because it is the right thing, while still a novel idea among baseball's current owners and players, might just become habit-forming. And besides, Rose's omission from the ballot can only become more, not less, glaring with each passing year.

This year there were a few worthy distractions - first-timers Reggie Jackson and Phil Niekro; holdovers Orlando Cepeda and Tony Perez. And

each of the next two years offers names that could be bronzed without apology: Steve Carlton and Don Sutton in 1994; Mike Schmidt, Jim Rice and Tommy John in 1995. But 1996 will feature almost-bookends Bill Buckner and Keith Hernandez, and it figures to go downhill from there.

Bill Deane, the senior researcher for the National Baseball Library at Cooperstown, has looked at the balloting down through the years and he concluded, "There have been some peaks, but overall, the quality has gone down from the beginning."

"When the Hall began in 1936, there was 70 years of baseball to take into account and every year, there might have been 50 to 75 future Hall of Famers parked there. It took a long time before all the generals were cleared off the shelf and we began reaching the next level..."

"Now, you no longer have a situation where guys who are clearly deserving - Juan Marichal, say, or Eddie Matthews - has to wait 10 or 15 years for his turn."

Because of the ever-improving caliber of competition, there are going to be fewer and fewer players dominating their respective eras. Without recounting Rose's statistics, it is enough to say that he is baseball's all-time leading hitter and he collected them all in what we will look back on as one of baseball's golden ages.

Rose hosts a two-hour radio show nightly from West Palm Beach, Fla., but he hasn't climbed on a soapbox (See HALL OF FAME, Page 8A)

On the horse track, Lil E. Tee won in Louisville to give Pat Day his first Kentucky Derby victory in 10 tries, Pine Bluff was the Preakness winner and A.P. Indy captured the Belmont and \$3 million Breeders' Cup Classic. The bust of the year: Arazi.

The year in sports was chock-full of great performances and controversy, ending with another one as the WBC stripped Bowe of his belt and gave it to Lennox Lewis.

It was also a year when Magic was supposed to return and didn't. Magic Johnson retired in November 1991 after learning he had the virus that causes AIDS. He came back to be named MVP in the 1992 NBA All-Star game (25 points and nine assists) and helped the United States win the gold medal at Barcelona.

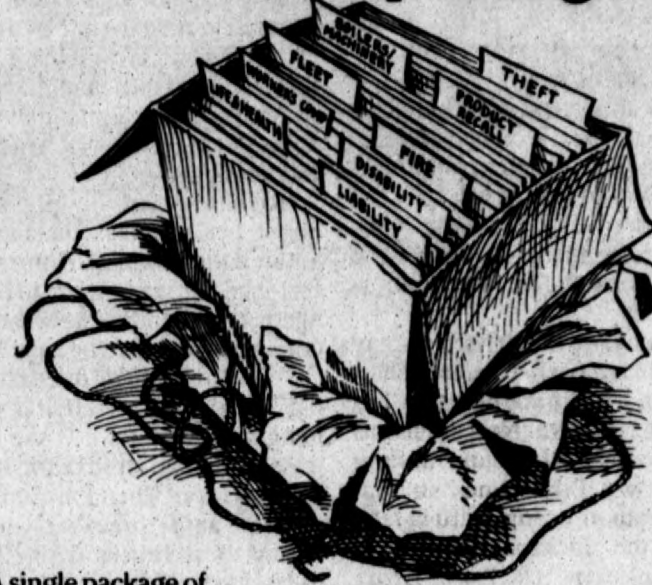
Magic was ready to make a comeback with the Lakers in 1992 when a few players in the league, including Utah's Karl Malone, expressed fears about playing against him. Magic decided the game wasn't going to be fun and re-retired.

The world also found out in 1992 that former Wimbledon champion Arthur Ashe had full-blown AIDS and at least 40 male figure skaters and coaches have died in recent years of AIDS-related diseases.

The fatalities include three-time Canadian champion Brian Pockar, 1988 Olympic dance bronze medalist Rob McCall and former world junior champion Dennis Coi.

It makes all the other problems sports had in 1992 seem rather insignificant.

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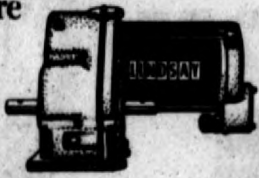
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65-year-old woman switches habit to running

FORT WORTH (AP) - It was difficult for Jan Richards to break old habits when she began running 10 years ago. Rather than gobble down pasta the night before a run, for example, she usually would smoke a few cigarettes and gulp down a shot or two of whiskey.

But that was back when she was a young 55 and didn't know any better. They were lifestyle habits left over from her nightclubbing days.

Now at 65, the white-haired runner from Arlington gives a thumbs down to cigarettes, will drink only an occasional beer and knows all about carbohydrates and fats as she follows a healthy diet.

She has become, in an understatement, serious about running.

Despite her late start in the sport, Richards runs fast and often, has filled shelves and boxes with trophies and is breaking records along the way.

She set two national 65-69 age group records this year, one in the 5K (3.1 miles) and the other in the half-marathon (13.1 miles) within a month of each other.

But it's not surprising that she's becoming the best woman runner at her age. She is addicted to running as she once was to cigarettes.

"Oh, I don't enjoy running. I just enjoy crossing the finish line," she says with a laugh. Her peers know she's joking.

While many women her age may be content to sit back in an easy chair and entertain the grandkids (she has three) and great-grandkids (she has two), Richards can be found running up and down Pike's Peak in that annual marathon, or around Bachman Lake in the Jackson Five-O (a 50-miler) or the 48-hour ultramarathon where runners see how many miles (she has a 60-64 age division record of 127) they can log

in a two-day time period around a track, or at just about any weekend race. In fact, she competed in the 8-mile Turkey Trot in Dallas on Thanksgiving before beginning the 48-hour event on the same cold day.

The highlight of her running career, though, came when she clocked a 22:37 in the Susan G. Komen Race for The Cure in October to beat the old national 65-69 age group record for a 5K by seven seconds, and then clocked a 1:42:15 in the White Rock Half Marathon in November to eclipse the old standard by more than three minutes.

The records came after she had undergone a foot operation in June that sidelined her for six weeks, which was followed a couple of weeks later by dental surgery that prevented her from running for two more weeks.

"I had never been through anything like that and didn't know how long it would be until I got my speed back," Richards said. "I started back with a job at one of the Trinity 5,000 races late in the summer, ran a relay and two other 5K races in about 25 minutes. Then I ran the Trail Draggin' Summer Scorch in Arlington (in September) and ran a 23:43 (5K) and was real happy. I felt I was back."

Richards was feeling so good about her progress that when she entered the Susan G. Komen race in October, she was aiming to break the age group record. The weather was cool, and proved to be a perfect ally.

"I went through the first mile at 6:53, and told myself if I can just hang on, I can get it," she said. "I missed the two-mile mark, and kept waiting for it. Then I looked up, and we were at the street we were going to turn on to finish. With 100 yards to go, I knew I had it."

Richards grew up in Akron, Ohio, lettered in gymnastics and was a member of a local swim team, which helped her win swimming events (along with running) in the annual Senior Games at UT-Arlington. But she didn't run.

"I loved the water. When I was 45, I taught myself how to waterski and I taught my three children," she said.

After graduating from Kenmore High School, she briefly attended college at Kent State but dropped out after getting married and then pregnant.

"And I had really wanted to be a gym teacher," she said.

Richards moved to Arlington in 1981, and her new husband-to-be, Jim, was a recreational runner. It wasn't long before Richards began jogging to join Jim at races and would do laps around her sister's house.

"I looked so bad in shorts that I didn't want anyone to see me," she said.

Eventually, she ventured away from the house and ran her first race, a two-miler. She finished in about 22 minutes, certainly no omen of things to come. She entered her first 10K in 1983 but still was smoking and drinking.

"I was just a recreation runner," she said. "I was really slow. I think I ran about 69 minutes that first 10K. But I went to a few runs and there usually was no one else there my age, so I'd win a trophy. I thought that was great. And what really made me feel good is that I was beating some of the younger runners, too."

She cut a minute off that time in the Cowtown 10K, and "I thought that was great."

"It wasn't long after that that I ran a 10K in 62 minutes," she said.

And her competitive nature was growing.

Richards eclipsed the 50-minute mark at the Turtle Creek Run in Dallas in 1986, and other runners told her that if she could break 50, then she could get down in the mid-40s.

She also had sworn off smoking and finally drinking in "about 1987" when she was visiting her daughter, Janis, in Akron.

"I was drinking a shot of whiskey and smoking, and was planning to run in the morning. My daughter looked at me and asked 'you're going to drink and smoke and then run?'"

"I then told myself that was pretty stupid. So, I dumped the whiskey down the drain and quit smoking. I think I still drank a little after that, but I quit smoking. I told myself that I didn't need them because I wanted to be a runner."

"It wasn't long after that that I started getting careful about food. For one thing, I used to put a lot of Oleo on everything - vegetables, potatoes, rolls, just everything. Now, I might just use a little on a roll."

She noticed as the calories went down, so did her weight. And so did her running times.

In fact, she contends that getting faster is what probably led to her last divorce in 1988, because she started beating her husband, Jim, and he became jealous.

"Well, that's what I tell people. I don't know for sure," she said with a laugh.

It wasn't only her husband she was beating as she kept lowering her times.

Her personal bests include a 22:15 in a 5K, a 45:25 in a 10K, 1 hour, 11 minutes in a 15K, 1:40:19 in a marathon. All but the marathon times were clocked when she was 63. Her marathon time came a year earlier.

"I'm not really very good in a marathon. I'm just happy to be under four hours," she said.

But that doesn't mean she doesn't like the longer runs. Richards said she has competed in about 27 marathons, sometimes with just a week's rest in between races. Three years ago, she ran in the Bossier City (La.) Marathon and then did Cowtown the next week, completing the hilly 26.2 miles in 4:01.

If that's not enough, she also ran in the Houston Marathon one week and came back the next to compete in the Jackson Five-O, the 50 mile run around Bachman Lake in Dallas. She also has completed the trip up and down Pike's Peak four times and has run at Boston. After setting the record at White Rock, she ran the Mid-Cities Badder Half (a 14-miler) the next day.

And she does all this despite holding down a full-time job in the receiving department at K Mart in Euless.

Richards hasn't let injuries deter her, either. She ran the ultra run in Dallas one year and "limped 50 miles with a chipped bone in my left foot."

But she didn't see a doctor until after she ran a marathon the next week.

"The dumbest thing I ever did, though, was doing the Double Decker Challenge (22.2-mile trail run outside of Austin) last year," she said. "I was taking blood pressure medicine and another medicine for pain caused by a bone spur in my foot. I had slept in the car going down there with another runner, and we got there about 15 minutes before the start of the race. I took my medicine real fast."

She didn't realize that instead of the one pill dose of her blood pressure medicine, she had taken two other pills.

"About two miles into the race, my feet started itching and burning. And then my palms started itching and burning. My tongue then became swollen and I couldn't talk. If it had

swollen just a little bit more, I wouldn't have been able to breathe."

But she didn't stop running. "I didn't even have the sense to stop a monitor and ask for help. I thought I could keep working it out," she said.

When she finished, she finally was examined, and a doctor told her it probably was a good thing she had continued to run. It helped get the medicine out of her system.

But nothing has been able to get running out of her system. She's like most runners, though. She believes she could be better.

"Her main complaint is that she can't devote as much time as she would like to because of her job,"

said Mary Ann Miller, one of her close friends and running competitor. "She is dedicated to running, though. And she's still improving. She used to beat me in the short races, and I always beat her in anything longer than a 10K. Now she is beating me in the half marathons. She beat me by 30 seconds in the White Rock Half Marathon."

"When she first got competitive, Jan's goal was to catch Mary Ann Cotten (of Dallas). She didn't think she ever would, but now she's faster than Mary Ann, who just turned 60."

Cotten is just joining a long list of runners getting used to seeing the backside of Richards, who's now just smoking her competitors.

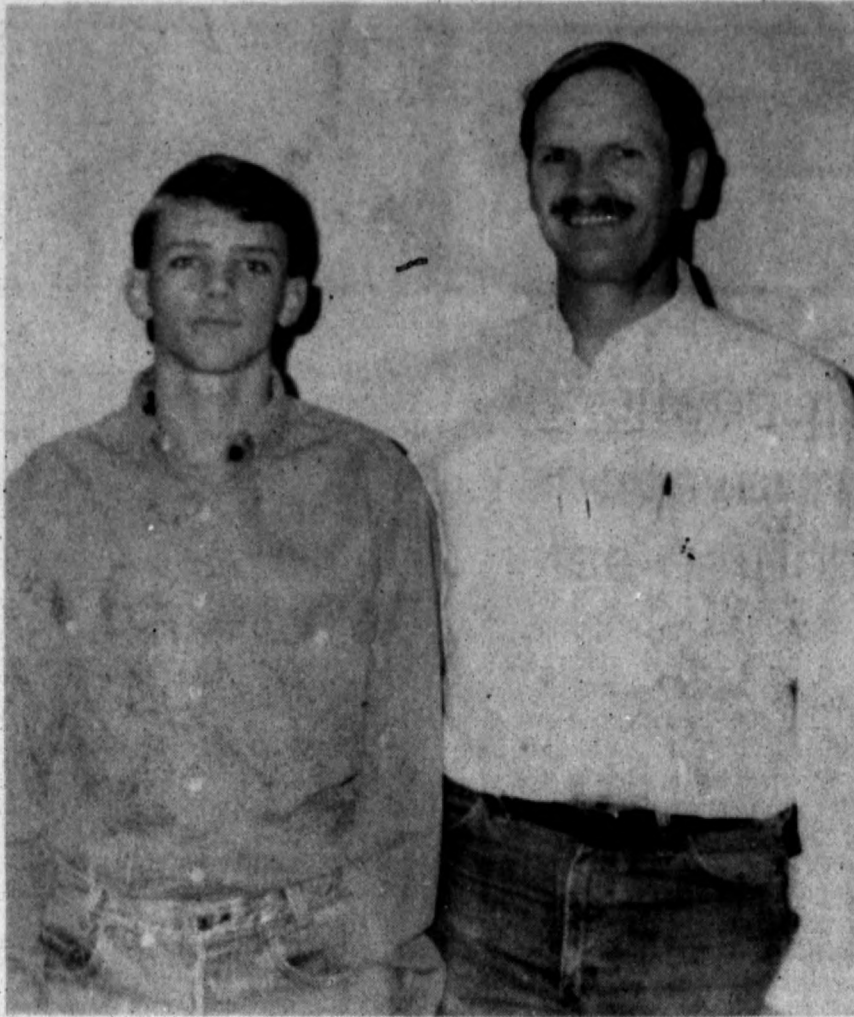

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Between the Covers

So another year is ending, and if you are average you have little of material value to show, and you probably strain even to remember some of the highlights of 1992. How many times have you resolved to start some sort of diary so you would have a record of your accomplishments, your failures, your aspirations? If I had a nickel for all those times I made such a resolution, I could hire somebody to do it for me, carefully eliminating all the dumb and embarrassing moments, and spicing it up where it drags.

Oh, well...What goes on at the library is rarely exciting, but at least we keep a record of it, and since this year will soon be gone, I'll share with you a little of what we have accomplished, and what our future plans are. (Note: the library year actually ends in September. These numbers, therefore, are approximations, but accurate enough for you to get the picture.)

Deaf Smith County heads into '93 with over 70,000 barcoded items. That includes nearly 66,000 books and magazines, 3,500 paperbacks, 540 audio materials, close to 100 videos, and a smattering of A-V equipment. 167 periodicals are currently received. We were open to the public for 2,800 hours last year, and there were a fraction less than 85,000 transactions, with no accurate way to count those who come in just to read the paper or use the copier. Over 16,500 persons attended programs and presentations of the library in fiscal '92. Non-resident borrowers, from "sister" libraries, amounted to just over 2,000.

As far as accomplishments this year, I claim three major ones. Last fall, rather than ask the community to come to us, we went to them with a "living history" program on Columbus. We went to every school but one, and several clubs. The goal was to educate and inform through an unusual and entertaining medium, and the project was a success. The

second major accomplishment was the beginning of the video collection. Thanks to the Friends of the Library and the financial commitment of local businessmen, we have a good start.

We have attempted to fill a niche that is missed by the local video stores by offering more educational instructional material. We are continuing to build our collection, and would appreciate your input (and contributions).

I may be jumping the gun a little on the third accomplishment, but we're going to claim it anyway - better attendance at family films. I don't know whether this is due to increased promotion, better quality films, the sale of popcorn, or some combination of the three. We're not looking gift horses in the mouth - we'll take the increase for whatever reason!

Looking ahead to '93, we want to improve in those areas, but we hope to expand, too. One goal we have is the acquisitions of a video projector. We have already had an occasion or two to use one, and this seems to be the direction things are moving. This has been taken on as a project by the Friends of the Library and you will be hearing more about it after the first of the year.

Here at year's end, we need to express our gratitude to those who help us throughout the year, and unfortunately, space restricts the list. Certainly we are grateful to you, our patrons - our reason for being. We also offer sincere thanks to the Friends of the Library and the directors. Thanks too, to the County Commission. Determining priorities on a budget is a tough job, and I appreciate their support of the library. And I would be remiss if I failed to mention KPAN and The Hereford Brand for all the publicity they give. I know I have left out some I should have mentioned, but our gratitude is not diminished. I, Rebecca, Annie, Betty, LaJuan, Alex, and Veronica wish for you a successful and happy 1993!

Rules needed for safe turkey

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) warns that improperly thawed turkeys and careless food storage are two hazards cooks should avoid during the holiday season.

Each year during the holidays, several food poisoning outbreaks occur in Texas. They usually are traced to turkey spoilage.

Barbara Keir, director of the Public Health Nutrition program at TDH, said that turkey should be thawed in the refrigerator, or under running water at 70 degrees or below.

"A recurrent mistake is thawing the turkey at room temperature, which allows the surface to warm before the inside meat can thaw. That allows dangerous bacteria to reproduce and cause food poisoning," Keir said.

She added that thawing in a microwave oven is safe only if the food will be immediately cooked. After thawing, the turkey should be rinsed thoroughly and dried, inside and out.

Leftover meat should be cut off the bone and refrigerated. A safety rule is to freeze any portions to be kept beyond two days. Stuffing should be stored separately.

Keir added the following tips for avoiding salmonella poisoning, perhaps the most common form of food poisoning in the home.

-Prepare turkey stuffing immediately before cooking. Dry ingredients can be mixed in advance, but eggs, oysters, butter or other moist ingredients should not be added until cooking time.

-Cook the stuffing separately, or stuff the bird right before cooking--not the night before.

-When fully cooked, dense portions of the turkey, such as the thighs, should have reached at least 180 degrees Fahrenheit, measured with a meat thermometer. The stuffing should

reach at least 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

-Never leave a turkey, the stuffing, or gravy unrefrigerated for more than two hours.

-If the cook uses a microwave oven, the turkey should be rotated to ensure uniform cooking.

-Cooks should wash hands, cooking surfaces, utensils and all foods thoroughly and often during food preparations.

Extension News

Some of the most popular ideas about what makes people happy are incorrect.

Studies by psychologists have measured little difference in happiness between teenagers, males and females, the middle-aged and the elderly. Knowing whether someone is rich or poor, black or white, healthy or handicapped, does not make it possible to predict how happy that person is likely to be.

Generally, people are as happy today as their parents were 30 years ago. Researchers say that external circumstances have little effect on psychological well-being. They agree that the following four inner traits foster happiness:

-Self-esteem--Those who are happy like themselves. They protect themselves from anxiety and depression by feeling good about themselves. Those who believe positive things about themselves suffer less from ulcers and insomnia and are less likely to abuse drugs. They tend to be more resistant to pressures to conform and are more persistent at difficult tasks.

-Personal Control--Americans who have a strong sense that they control their own lives and feel satisfied with themselves are twice as likely to be very happy as the national average. Those who agree with statements like what happens to me is my own doing or the average person can influence government decisions typically do better in school, cope better with stress and live more happily than those who lack the sense of personal control. Those given little control over their environment such as prisoners or even people in nursing homes suffer from lower morale, greater stress and worse health.

-Optimism--Optimistic people tend to be healthier as well as happier. They suffer less from illness and tend to recover better. Positive thinkers get positive results, succeeding better in business than pessimists. However, unrealistic optimism can make people believe they are invulnerable and stop them from taking sensible steps to avoid danger.

-Socializing--Those who are more sociable and outgoing tend to be happier and more satisfied with life than introverts. Extroverts are cheerful and high-spirited people who like themselves. They meet strangers, they are confident the strangers will like them as well.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

The fashion-conscious child will appreciate a stocking filled with materials for creative clothing expressions, such as sneakers and caps.

Stockings filled with items that encourage kids' imaginations will keep children entertained and busy throughout the holidays and for months beyond.

PROTECTING IDEAS AND INVENTIONS

We are frequently asked about protecting inventions and ideas. Inventions can be protected by patents, but secrecy may be the best hedge for your ideas.

A patent is a property right granted by the government to an inventor to prevent individuals or companies for manufacturing, using or selling the covered invention. Only the original inventor may obtain a patent, and all patents are granted for a period of 17 years, except design patents which have a term of 14 years.

Patents cover the invention or discovery of any new and useful machine, process or material, or any new and useful improvements thereof. "New" and "useful" are the key words. If, at the time an invention or process was created, it had already been used, offered for sale, or had been described in writing, it cannot be patented.

Most questions about patents are answered in a Patent and Trademark Office publication titled, "General Information Concerning Patents," available for \$2.25 from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Send a check and request stock no. 003-004-00659-5, or call (202) 783-3238 and charge the booklet to your Visa or Mastercard. This publication includes patent application forms.

Do It Yourself?

Because of the technical nature of the process, many choose to hire a professional to file their application even though the costs are higher. An individual or small business can file for \$355 if you do your own work. The cost for a patent agent or attorney will usually be in the \$4,000-6,000 range. A list of patent attorneys and agents who are registered to practice before the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office is available at most large libraries.

Another noteworthy item concerning patents is that you can file an inexpensive disclosure document to record the date of record for your invention. For information on filing a disclosure document, as well as patents in general, call the Patent and Trademark Office hotline at (703) 557-3158.

Some confusion exists as to whether or not an individual must do a patent search prior to filing an application for a patent. The answer is "no" The Patent Office does not require an individual to do a search prior to filing. The patent officer assigned to you will do a search as part of the process. Conflicting or overlapping technology must be found in order for the Patent Office to deny you claim.

Conducting a search yourself in a patent depository library can have certain advantages. You can see what claims have been made for

similar inventions and how those claims are written.

Can I patent my idea?

Please note that you cannot patent ideas, business methods or printed material. While ideas and methods have little protection other than secrecy, printed material can be protected by copyrights.

Copyright is a form of protection granted to authors of original works including literature, drama, music, art and certain intellectual works. The protection covers published and unpublished material.

Formal registration with the Copyright Office is not necessary to secure copyright protection. If the work is original and your creation, it is automatically protected by copyright law.

There are advantages to formal registration, however, which are detailed in a brochure titled, "Copyright Basics -- Circular #1." To obtain information on copyrights, write to the Copyright Office, LM455, Library of Congress, Washington, D.C. 20559, or call the Copyright Office hotline at (202) 707-3000.

One final thought on patents. Be wary of companies that want to help you turn your idea into big money. If they want your money first, it may be a scam. The old adage of "looking before you leap" certainly applies to protecting ideas and inventions.

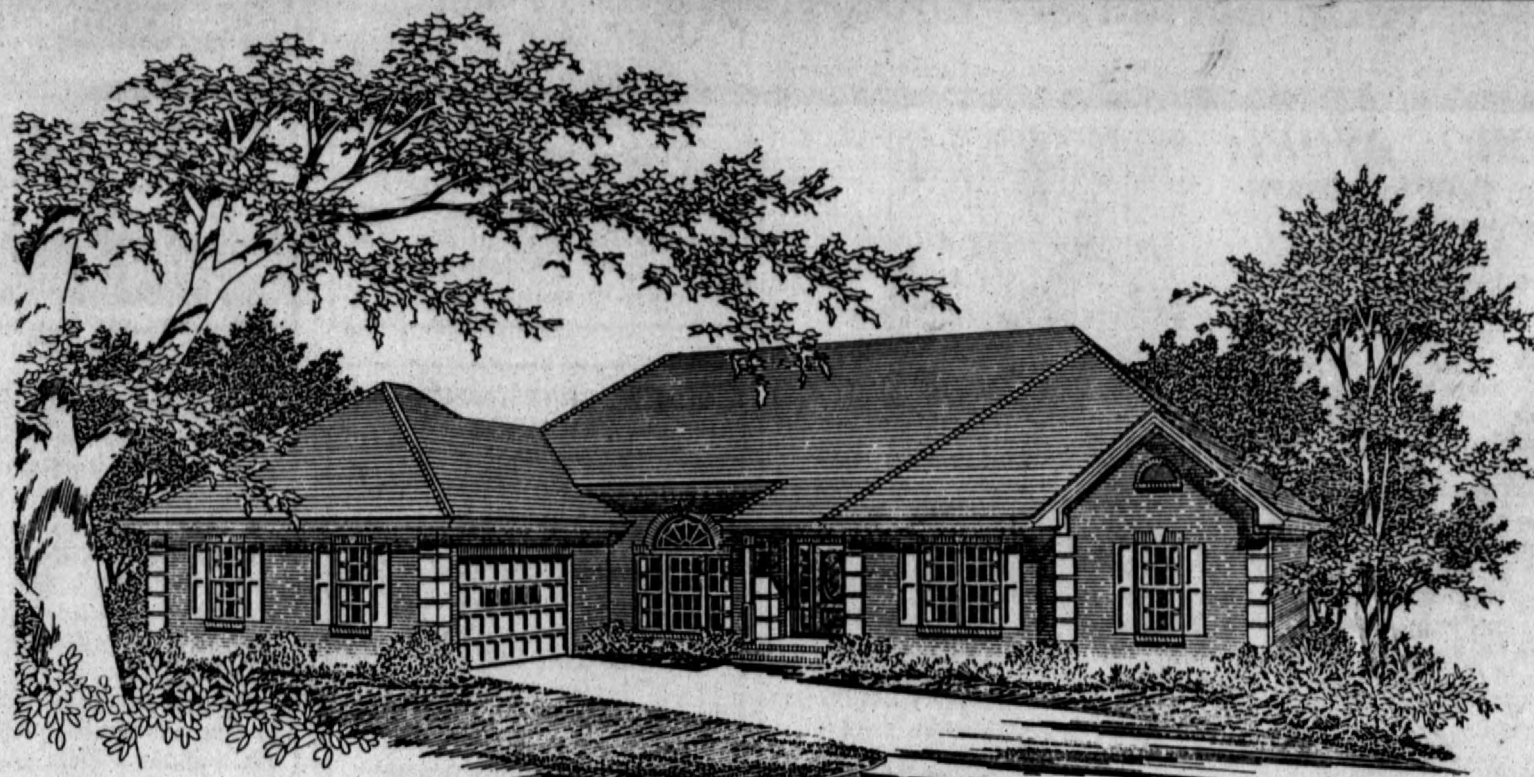

A covered stoop leads to the recessed private foyer that allows traffic flow to the great room, dining room or bedroom wing of this plan.

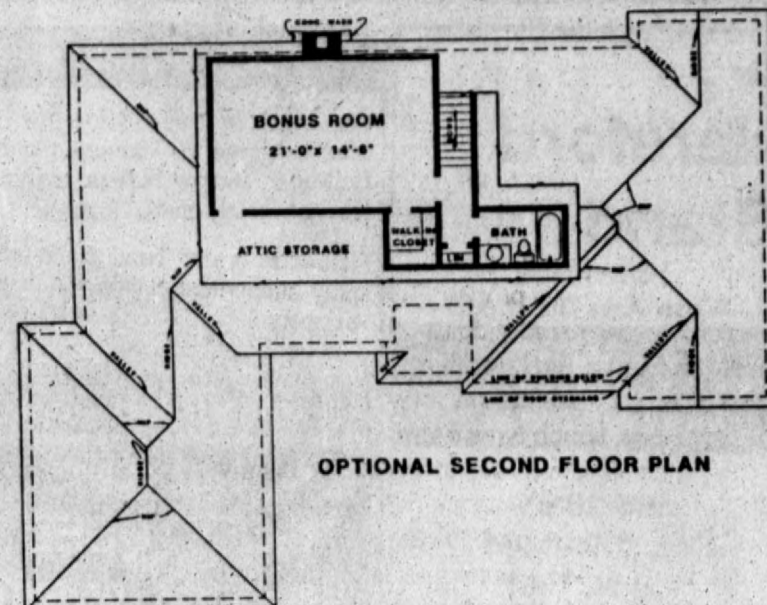

Q. What are the benefits of having a fresh air intake on a gas fired forced air furnace? I'm especially interested in the health benefits. We live in a tight house in a very cold region.

A. If the house is very tight, and there is minimal outside air infiltration, a fresh air intake is necessary to ensure the gas furnace works at peak efficiency. Specifically, a fresh air intake helps ensure complete combustion of the gas. It also reduces the chance that carbon monoxide from the furnace will re-enter the house, a phenomenon in tight houses known as back drafting.

A fresh air intake is still a good idea in houses that are not very tight. In this case, the air intake conserves energy by ensuring that combustion in the furnace does not rely on the air in the house, which has already been heated.

The cycle works this way. There is generally a negative pressure in a house. When heated air is used in the combustion process, it goes up the chimney as waste gas. This increases the negative pressure since the air in the house is being used to burn the gas. In a house that's not very tight, this causes more cold air infiltration. This cold air must be heated, which uses up more energy. An air intake uses unheated air to ensure combustion. Also, the negative pressure in the house does not increase because the air inside it is not used for combustion.

For most homeowners, health problems resulting from indoor air contaminants are minimal. The typical American house built within the past 30 years has an average infiltration rate of .4 to 1 air changes per hour. The air exchange rate for the living areas of the house should be .35 air changes per hour.

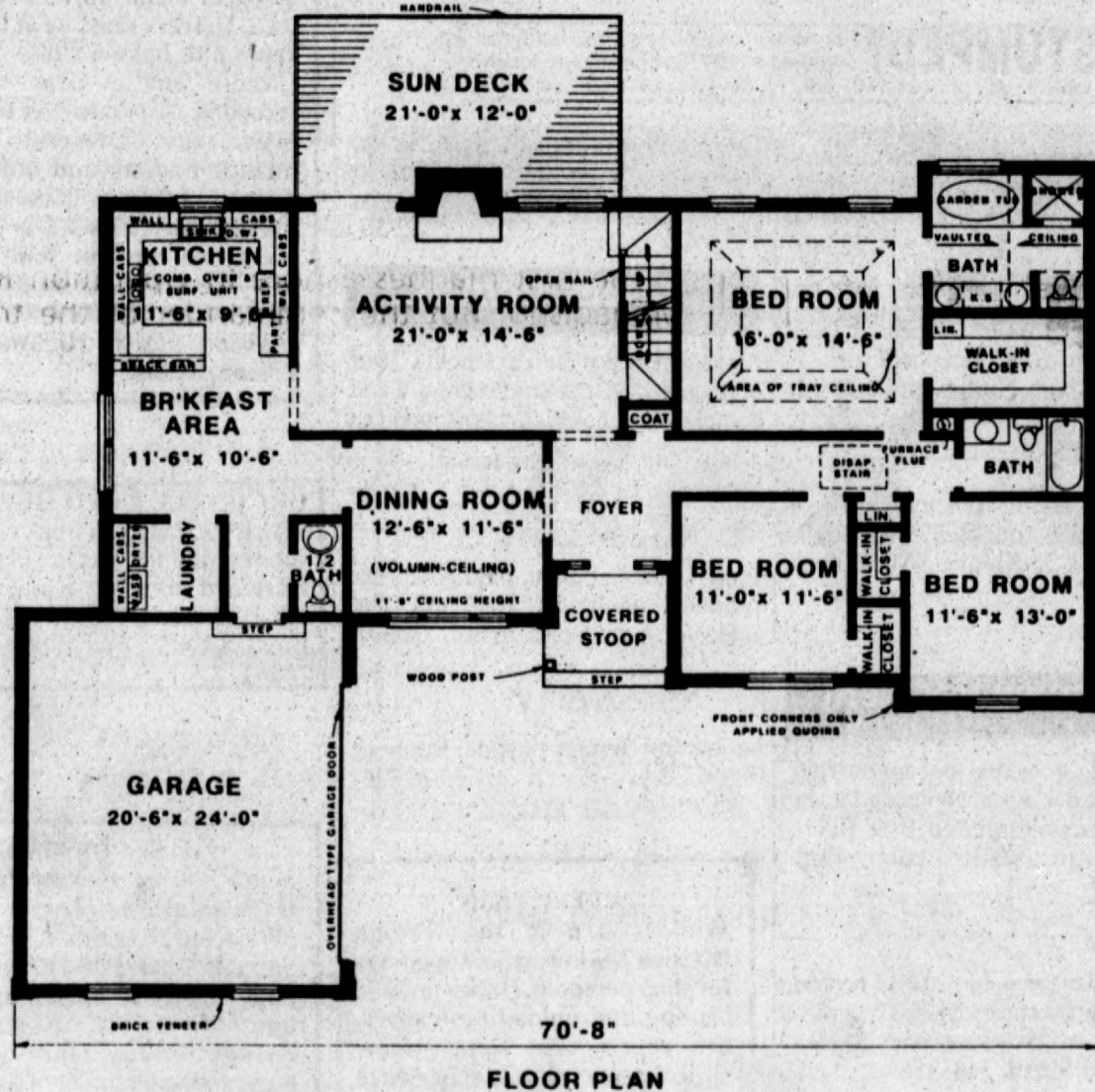
However, some of the newer, tighter, houses have an air exchange rate of .1 air changes per hour. Without ventilation, this could result in stagnant indoor air with more than the usual amount of pollutants and bacteria. To prevent this, you must increase the ventilation.

Low Desert to High Desert

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) - An aerial tramway here whisks 80 passengers at a time nearly 6,000 feet up Mount San Jacinto, with a 50-degree lower temperature at the mountaintop.

Tramway users go from 95 degree heat at the base to temperatures in the chilly 40s at the peak.

The cable-operated tramway, opened in 1963, uses five support towers and takes about 14 minutes to climb to a height of 8,516 feet.

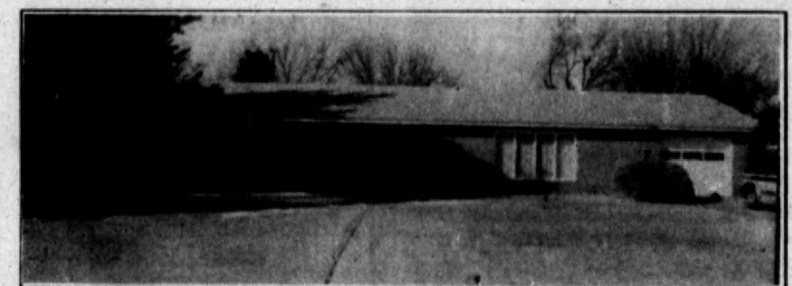

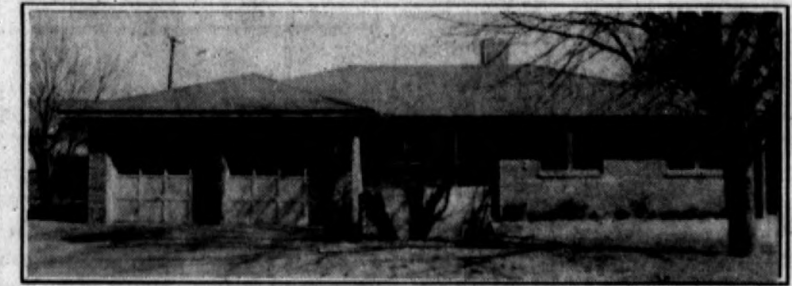

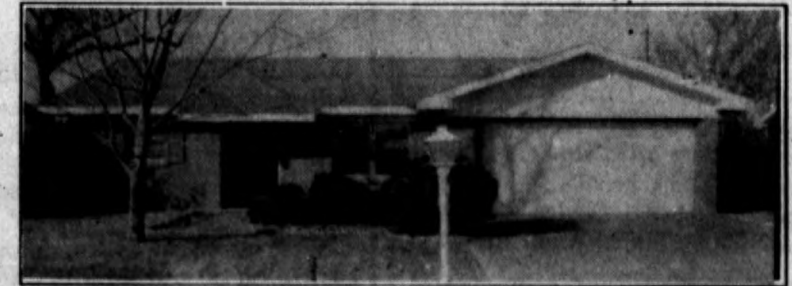

Another television year has flashed before our eyes



Remembering the good, bad, notorious of 1992

By Suzanne Gill

1992 will be remembered as a year of transition in television. For NBC, it was the year the network lost Johnny Carson, Bill Cosby and, not coincidentally, its grip on the No. 1 spot in the ratings. NBC's decision to jettison *The Golden Girls*, *Matlock* and *In the Heat of the Night* in favor of shows aimed at an audience of young adults has stalled the peacock out at No. 3.

Currently, the network is on the brink of canceling the Emmy-winning series *I'll Fly Away* and losing Emmy-winning late-night host David Letterman. New *Tonight Show* host Jay Leno is locked in a ratings duel with syndicated challenger Arsenio Hall. Bright spots include a long-term deal with comic Dana Carvey that even George Bush would call prudent.

Meanwhile, a resurgent CBS caught fire with the Winter Olympics and continues to occupy the No. 1 spot despite the fact that its spring season netted duds (*One CBS executive quipped that the network should have a Pet Cemetery retrospective weekend featuring the late Scorch, Tequila and Bonetti and Fish Police.*) and the fall slate has failed to produce a new top-10 series.

1992 had its highs and lows for viewers, too, though some, like Howard Stern's interview series on E! Entertainment Television, can only be judged in the eye of the beholder.

Prominent in the plus column was the appearance in July of TV's first disabled game-show contestant, Rebecka Sessions, who competed on Nickelodeon's *Family Double Dare*. The network saddened fans, however, by firing *Ren & Stimpy* creator John Kricfalusi and disbanding his team of merrily demented animators. With fewer than 10 completed episodes on celluloid, the series will probably

become a collector's item.

The wide world of cable found new frontiers in The Sci-Fi Channel and The Cartoon Network, while HBO made room for *The Larry Sanders Show*, Garry Shandling's canny send-up of desk-and-couch talk shows. The Learning Channel came to the aid of educators with *Teacher TV*, and MTV brought us *Real World*, a soap opera *verite*.

The age of live television returned this year on Fox's Super Bowl Sunday *In Living Color Halftime Show* and the series *Roc*. The fourth-place network is No. 1 in animation, too, with the hand-drawn hit *Batman* joining *The Simpsons* in prime time.

On PBS, *Sesame Street* planned an episode dealing with divorce but found breaking up too hard to do and shelved the project. On Main Street, Vice President Dan Quayle spent some quality time blasting *Murphy Brown*, CBS' ace fictional journalist, for having a baby without a husband. But for family values, there's nothing like the team of Roseanne and Tom Arnold, whose heavyweight clout convinced ABC to move No. 4-rated

The Learning Channel gets preschoolers ready to learn

Commercial-free block costly, but worth it

In its report "Ready to Learn: A Mandate for the Nation" the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Learning revealed that 35 percent of America's children are not ready to learn when they begin school. The report stressed that better pre-school preparation would make use of television as a teacher.

In direct response to the Carnegie report, cable's The Learning Channel has created *Ready, Set, Learn!*, a commercial-free block of weekday programming geared to give preschoolers a head start on reading and social interaction. *Ready, Set, Learn!* commences on Monday, Dec. 28.

The block of six half-hour series has as its host children's singer/songwriter Rory. The cornerstone of the block is *The Magic Box*, a reading program designed by education pioneer Wendy Pie that uses "whole language" techniques as well as a rap-singing Alphabet Soup Woman to hook 2- to 5-year-olds on the ladder to literacy. *Bookmice* reinforces the desire to

read with its cast of puppets and people in a library setting. The fun of learning is the focus of *Iris, the Happy Professor*. The birdlike puppet *Iris* covers such subjects as the four seasons and the ocean with song and humor. The puppet players of *Kitty Cats* attend to problem solving and honing interpersonal skills, while the multicultural adults of *Join In!* encourage their young viewers to share activities with them, learning social lessons along the way. Finally, there's an old favorite, *Zoobilee Zoo*, offering animal-costumed actors who employ song, dance and magic to foster imagination in viewers.

The Learning Channel, with a subscriber base of 18 million in the U.S., hopes to pick up some foundation funding for *Ready, Set, Learn!*, just as similar public-television programs do. The revenues lost from the exclusion of commercials from the block will be substantial, but TLC's aggressive promotion of *Ready, Set, Learn!* to parents' groups and day-care centers is likely to attract new viewers to its regular slate of commercially sponsored programming.

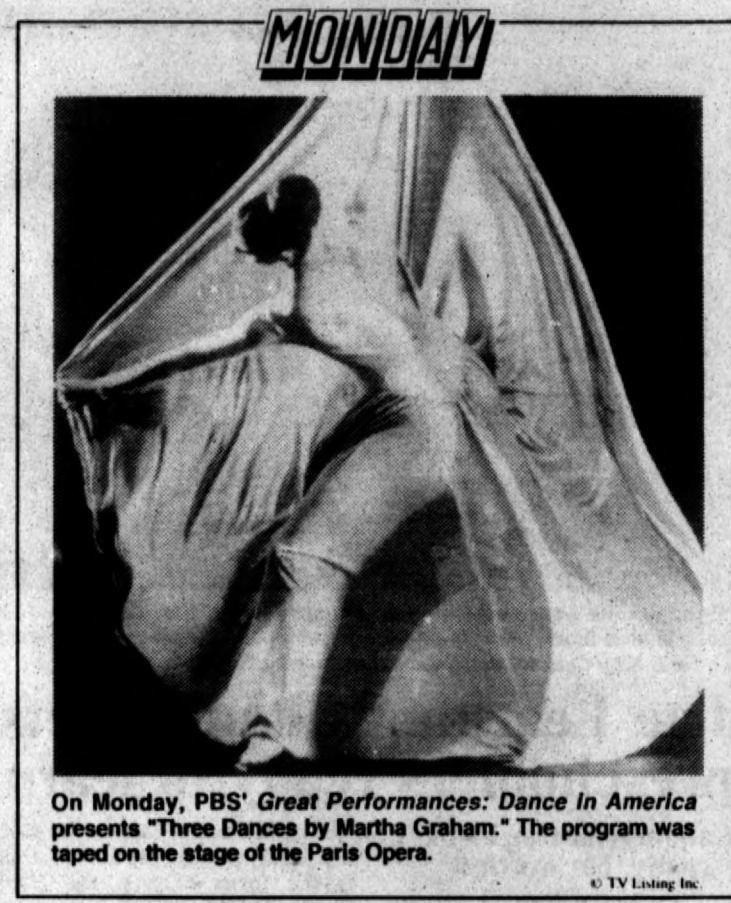

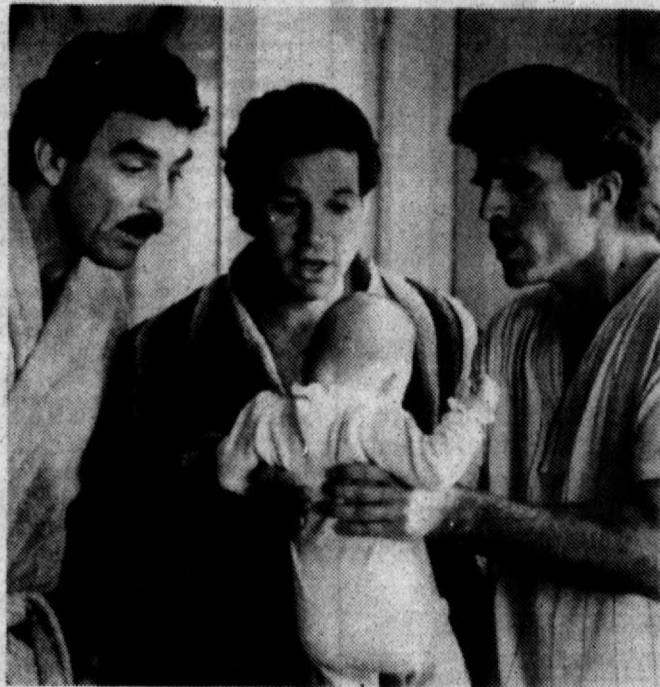

College football wraps up another season this week with a flurry of bowl games that includes an outright battle for the national championship.

ESPN begins a bowl marathon with Washington State against Utah in the Copper Bowl on Tues., Dec. 29, while Hawaii and Illinois face off in the Holiday Bowl on Wednesday, Dec. 30. New Year's Eve features a doubleheader of patriotic proportions as Wake Forest faces Oregon in the Independence Bowl and Air Force meets Mississippi in the Liberty Bowl.

On CBS, Arizona meets Baylor in the John Hancock Bowl Thursday, Dec. 31, and Penn State takes on Stanford in the Blockbuster Bowl the following day.

The annual controversy over who's No. 1 should be at least partially silenced this year when top-ranked Miami faces No. 2 Alabama in the Sugar Bowl New Year's Day on ABC.

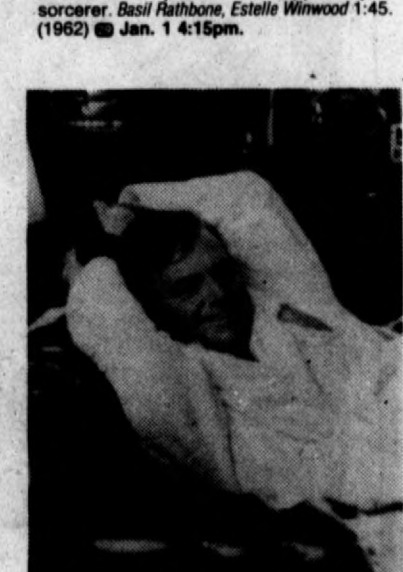

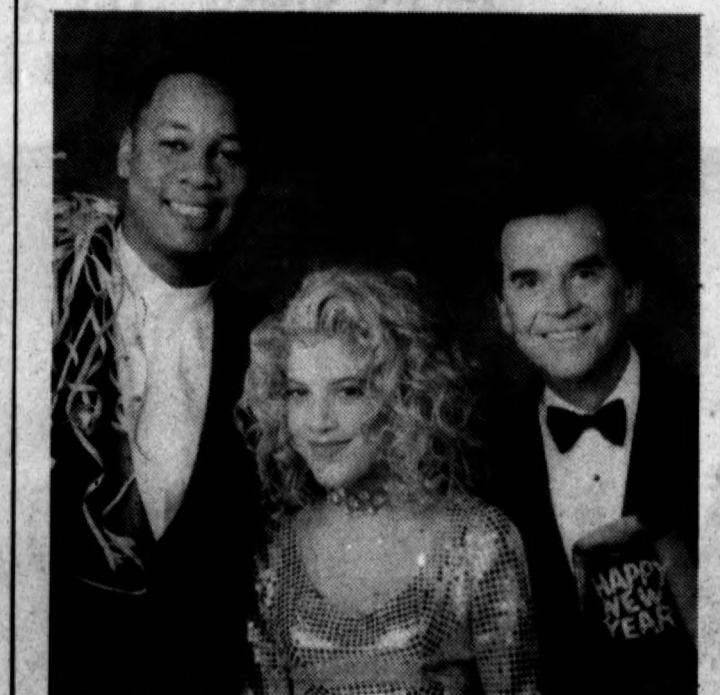

LET'S TALK

Orbach started on stage; many a 'Madame X'

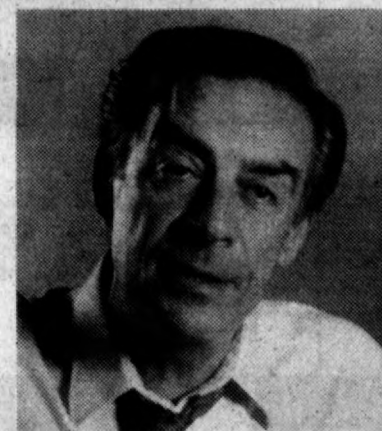

Q: I am interested in knowing a little about actor Jerry Orbach and an address where I can write to him. —C. Foulsham, Newport, N.H.

A: Orbach, who replaced Paul Sorvino on NBC's *Law & Order* earlier this season, was born on Oct. 20, 1935, in Bronx, N.Y., but grew up in Waukegan, Ill., the son of a restaurant manager. He gravitated to acting while at Northwestern University and figured to make it big in New York upon graduation. His rise wasn't immediate, but after a break as an understudy on Broadway in 1955's *The Threepenny Opera*, stage work began to come with more frequency. He was nominated for a Tony award for *Chicago* and finally won the prize in 1968 as the star of *Promises, Promises*. In the late 1980s, he appeared on television's *Murder, She Wrote* as Harry McGraw, which led to a brief spin-off titled *The Law and Harry McGraw*. Among his more prominent films are *Prince of the City*, *F/X*, *Someone to Watch Over Me*, *Dirty Dancing*, and *Crimes and Misdemeanors*. Q: Please assist me in finding the title of a movie I saw long ago. It's about a woman who is either accused of murder, is an alcoholic or both. At the end of the movie, she is defended in court by a man she does not recognize as her son. I've been trying to identify this movie for over two years. —Chip Kinney, High Point, N.C.

A: The plot you describe is a story written by Alexandre Bisson that was made into a 1929 movie directed by Lionel Barrymore titled *Madame X*. This picture was actually a refilming of earlier efforts in 1906, 1916 and 1920, which would also be remade in 1937, 1966 and in a television movie in 1981. As you can see, there are quite a few versions of this story (the 1929 version even appeared on television as *Absinthe*), and only you know which one you originally saw. All concern the plight of a wife and mother who is cast out of the family to fend for herself on the streets by the cruel father. Years later, a vagrant, she is defended on a murder charge by a hotshot attorney—her son, who grew up believing she was

dead and never realizes she is his mother. I'm betting you saw the 1966 version with Lana Turner in the pivotal role. It also starred John Forsythe, Constance Bennett and Burgess Meredith. Ring any bells?

Q: During World War II, a film was made regarding a Sullivan family with several boys in the Navy. A younger teenage son wanted to join but couldn't without his parents' permission, which was finally given. All the brothers were on the same ship, which went down and claimed their lives. I believe the film was based on truth. Can you tell me the name of the film, who played in it and if it's available on video? —Florence Sullivan, Jacksonville, Mo.

A: That film is 1944's *The Sullivans*, also released as *The Fighting Sullivans*. The story was based on actual events, and the movie effectively conveys the heroic, tragic story.

Five Sullivan sons from Waterloo, Iowa, were quick to join the Navy after the attack on Pearl Harbor, and all eventually wound up on the same ship stationed off the Solomon Islands. In an instant, their ship was sunk, claiming all five. The Navy went on to name a ship after them and made a policy change unconsidered before the tragedy: Siblings were no longer allowed to serve on the same vessel at the same time. The picture stars Anne Baxter, Thomas Mitchell, Selena Royle and Edward Ryan. It is available on video.

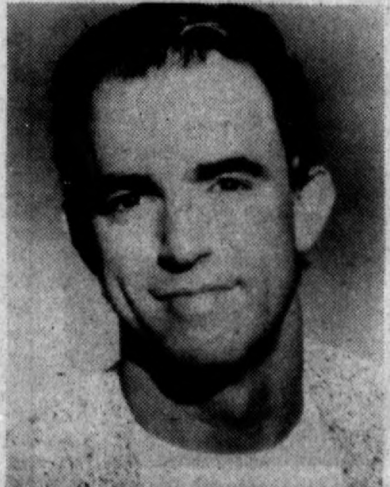

Savage is smuggled behind the Iron Curtain by the CIA only to find himself abandoned and ultimately hunted by them. The movie starts off well but bogs down in murky and hard to follow sequences.
