But at a final meeting held Tuesday morning this plan was abandoned and the committee decided upon the route down the Santa Fe through the county east and west, whether Canyon joins us or not. A detailed study of the situation convinced the committee that this was the only feasible route and the one that would eventually be put through.

All this is merely set out here to collect the facts developed in the last few weeks and inform our readers of the exact situation.

Surely Canyon cannot afford to develop a lopsided county. Surely the West Texas Teachers College cannot afford to acquiese in a plan which would shut off hundreds of future students from her halls. Surely there is a middle ground that business men can get together on a plan that will be for the good of all.

Let's find it, friends. Let's get ready for the great Plains development rush just around the corner. Let's have the vision and the bigness to look at this thing from a PANHANDLE standpoint and not from a local one. No one community can stand alone. It's time for united action, for the good of all.

Surely Canyon cannot afford to develop a lopsided county. Surely the West Texas Teachers Coilege cannot afford to acquiese in a plan which would shut off hundreds of future students from her halls. Surely there is a middle ground that business men can get together on a plan that will be for the

Let's find it, friends. Let's get ready for the great Plains development rush just around the corner. Let's have the vision and the bigness to look at this thing from a PANHANDLE standpoint and not from a local one. No one community can stand alone. It's time for united action, for the good of all.




