

Says Oil In Barrel Elevates Gun Shot

Recent experiments of the Bureau of Standards show that an oil coating in the barrel of a gun will effect higher elevation of the shot and that lighter powder charges cause heavier muzzle vibrations, the Department of Commerce announced August 2.

The apparatus used in the experiments consists of a suitable detector, vacuum tube power ampliffer, oscillograph and a special high speed camera on the film of which the record of oscillations is photographed and made available for study.

Mixtures of white arsenic and soda compounds, unless very carefully used, will result in injury to cotton; and are ordinarily not recommended. However, in the present emergency it probably means either use of these materials with injury in some cases or the total loss of the crop by the attack of the insect, and we are giving below formulae which farmers bave themselves used.

Says Oil In Barrel Elevates Gun Shot

Recent experiments of the Bureau of Standards show that an off coating in the barrel of a gun will effect higher elevation of the shot and that lighter powder charges cause heavier muzzle vi-brations, the Department of Com-merce announced August 2.

The apparatus used in the ex-periments consists of a suitable detector, vacuum tube power amplifler, oscillograph and a special high speed camera on the film of which the record of oscillations is photographed and made available




