With the embargo on wheat declared tast week at Houston by all of the railroads serving the city, wheat shipments from Hereford have dropped sharply since Saturday, averaging now only about 15 cars daily, with two to three cars daily being shipped from smaller communities in the territory.

Wheat prices that had been up to \$1.16 to \$1.18 early list week dropped to \$1.07 on Saturday, \$1.03 on Monday, \$1.09 Tuesday and \$1.08 Wednesday.

Band deposits in Hereford have more than doubled since June 200 reaching a total of \$2,222,807.01 for the three banks in the city. During the same period, from June-29 to July 23, inclusive, approximately 27 per cent of the loans carried by all the banks have been

paid off. At the close of business June 29 the reports of the banks showed that there was \$1,081,338.45 on deposit in the three institutions which serve Hereford, The fmcrease in deposits during the 26 the days shows a total of \$1,141,468.56. or approximately 110 per cent.

Loans by all the banks on June 29 totaled \$827,310.69. On July 23 this amount had been reduced by payments of obligations by customers of the banks to \$599,525.64, a reduction of \$227,785.05, or approximately 27 per cent.

Cash and exchange shown by the reports on June 29 totaled, for the three banks \$330,551.60. Om July 23 this had been incres to \$1,629,994.80, a gain of \$1,290,-443.20, or nearly 400 per cent.

#### MY LILLARD PIG.

By Elizabeth Chapman, Simms. On June 15, 1929, I bought a registered Duroc Jersey sow pig from the Lillard Stock Farm, Arlington, Texas. She weighed 65 pounds at this time. She was fed a balanced ration consisting of 50 pounds tankage, 50 pounds shorts, 371/2 pounds cottonseed meal, 25 bounds ground oats, 121/2 pounds bone meal, 25 pounds ground alfalfa, in addition to all the sour milk with ground maize and onefourth teaspoon of salt. She is fed this mixture twice a day. I with one-half pound of supple home Thursday.

The pig has a good sized lot for exercise and was on oat pasture for three weeks, with plenty of fresh water and shade provided. She was bathed with tar soap and greased afterward with equal parts of glycerine, crank case oil and gas. This kept her hair in fine condition, Plenty of grit and green feed were furnished at frequent intervals.

I won a trip year before last to the Farmers Short Course and am trying for the trip to Dallas and also for the gold medal given by the county for the most profitable club member this year.
