A new lease on life for the 1928 wheat crop was seen as this temporary relief continued unabated during the entire force

A drouth of several weeks duration was broken last week as light rains and the year's first snow fell. By noon Thursday the total snowfall of the year was estimated at an average of three inches.

CAUSES FOR REJOICING.

The Plains country has many causes for optimism and thanks giving. The recent uncertainty concerning crop prospects has been largely discipated through a series of light drizzles and repeated small snows, including a lot of cloudy and windless days, all of which has put the much needed moisture in the top of the ground, enabled farmers to get to work, and means a good wheat crop, if not a bumper one. Well posted wheat men state that fields that were properly tilled and planted are in good shape and have stood the dry weather of the past few menths wonderfully well. Another cause for rejoicing has been the satisfactory cattle prices of the past fall, from a range standpoint, as well as from the standpoint of the registered industry. 




