The main object of terracing is the conservation of moisture and to prevent erosion of the soil. Records kept by the U. S. Weather Bureau and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations show that eighty-four per cent of the rainfall in the Panhandle section comes in the summer, April, May, June, Auguest, September and October. Out of an average of twenty-one inches per year, twelve inches is available for plant growth. An average of five inches comes in the form of torrential rains, the larger part of which runs off. The result of terracing is to check the loss of run-off water. In response to warnings from the Federal Reserve, banks withdrew on Friday \$25,000,000 of call loans. The idea was to "discourage speculation." That speculation keeps big banks and their gigantic profits aline, but that is another story.

When loans were called the rate moved from 6 to 9 per cent. Banks calling loans sacrificed 6 per cent on \$25,000,000 and made an additional 3 per cent on about four




