Motor Plates Provided for 1457 Vehicles

When the deadline arrived for paying motor car license fees, 1217 car registrations and 200 truck fees had been recorded, according to Jowell Murchison, deputy tax collector.

Referring back to the total registration for last year up to June 15, there are several hundred vehicles on the delinquent list. Up to June 15, 1690 cars and 383 trucks had been licensed.

NewSchedule Water Rates Now In Effect

The next water bills will be figured on a different basis to that prevailing here for the past year or more. Where the minimum rate has been \$2.00 a month for the one-inch meter or under it, is now only \$1.50, effective January 20, and will be used in the calculations for statemens to be mailed

The minimum charge of \$1.50 for water also includes the sanitary sewer connection for one outlet. It applies, however, as does the complete schedule for city users, only to those living within new schedule has been made up for consumers of municipal water being made. The defense, through months, with no penalty attached, outside the city limits, making the cost slightly higher for such residents.

The flat rate, where no meter is used, has a minimum rate of residence, and an extra charge of 50 cents a month is made for each flush tank toilet. Hotels, stores, barber shops, cafes are covered in separate specifications. City Rates.




