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**Sugar beet officials at meeting**

Quality growers named at sugar beet business meet

Top growers were recognized and speakers discussed sugar beet research and legislative issues when the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association held its annual business meeting Friday at Hereford Community Center.

Directors were also reelected at the meeting. The annual Sugar Beet Banquet was to be held Saturday night at the Bull Barn.

Bill Cleavinger of Wildorado, president of TSBGA and a director of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association (ASGA), presided at Friday's all-day session. Don Steinbeisser, president of ASGA, missed the session because of fog at the Amarillo airport. He was to

appear at the banquet Saturday night. Bob Atwood, Imperial Holly vice president of sales, told producers that excess sugar in the market will make partnerships a key part of sugar sales in the future. He added that the plant in Hereford was "beautifully located" for shipping sugar in all forms by truck or rail.

Other speakers included Alan Lebsack, comptroller of Holly Corporation; Annette Clauson, USDA, and Dave Thompson, chairman of the Joint Research Committee of TSBGA and Holly.

Research on sugar beet weed and root disease control, and cultural practices and fertility were discussed by various speakers representing the

Texas A&M Research and Extension Center. Terry Anvik and Stan McCabe of Holly discussed agriculture information service.

Dennis Printz, local Holly ag manager, presented top grower "Quality Awards," based on tons per acre and percentage of sugar. The top growers were named for each area. They were:

Astronauts praise \$23 million toilet, conduct experiments

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) - Endeavour's five astronauts awakened Saturday to a John Denver song and got in a few more words of praise for their new \$23 million toilet.

The shuttle crew's wake-up call was the song "The Eagle and the Hawk," which NASA spokesman Kyle Herring said is a favorite of Endeavour pilot Don McMonagle.

"Right on. I was sure dreaming in the heavens last night," McMonagle said.

The astronauts said again how pleased they were with the new toilet, which Endeavour's crew is the first to test in space.

Mission Control's Jay Apt asked the crew to check why a urinal fan had been left running after use. Shuttle commander John Casper said the crew would be more attentive to the fan, which he said probably continued to run because an automatic shutoff switch seemed slightly out of adjustment.

"One of the things we really like about this WCS (toilet) is the fans are so quiet compared to the old WCS. They really are very silent, you can hardly hear it running, which is probably why we haven't noticed the fan on," Casper said.

On Friday, the mission's third day, the astronauts dunked a Nerf basketball, sent a car speeding inside a track and played with windup toys at the bidding of students back on Earth.

Children from four elementary schools - the astronauts' alma maters - offered playtime suggestions via a live television hookup. The 50-minute lesson was intended to teach the students about the physics behind their favorite toys.

"We would like to find out if you can do a slam dunk," said Danielle Seabeck, a fifth-grader at Thomas A. Edison School in Willoughby, Ohio, astronaut Gregory B. Burchard's alma mater.

"I think I can try to accommodate you here," Burchard said, flipping

and dunking twice. "There you go, Danielle. I can slam it from the bottom and I can slam it from the top."

Mario Runco Jr., a former state trooper, used a toy police car and circular track to demonstrate physics principles to children at Sacred Heart School in New York City's Bronx borough.

And Susan Helms wound up a toy fish and frog and sent them flapping through the cabin for pupils at Shaver Elementary School in Portland, Ore. "Will a frog go in circles or in a straight line?" fifth-grader Scott Smythe asked.

Helms wound up the frog and released it. Its legs fluttered back and forth as the toy flipped and flopped in no particular direction. "I'd say that frog is a little helpless. He doesn't seem to be able to swim too well," Helms said, explaining that the frog's flippers do not work as well in air.

Also Friday, the astronauts conducted a fire experiment intended to improve spacecraft safety. They ignited small pieces of Plexiglas inside a sealed chamber.

Ground controllers, meanwhile, fixed both detectors on an X-ray spectrometer that shut down while scanning space Thursday.

Endeavour is scheduled to land Tuesday, six days after liftoff, at Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

Iraq defiant; allies threaten more raidsBy **MARTIN MARRIS**

Baghdad has grudgingly said U.N. weapons inspection flights can resume, but under terms that the United Nations says are unacceptable. The United States says the allies may mount another air raid unless Iraq gives in.

The U.N. hopes to resume its flights this weekend.

Iraq's refusal to let a team of chemical warfare inspectors into Iraq on U.N. planes was one of the issues that provoked a U.S.-led bombing raid on Wednesday.

In the latest episode of Iraq-U.S. brinkmanship, President Bush on Friday ordered Saddam Hussein to grant the U.N. inspectors flight clearance within four hours. Just before the deadline, Iraq gave its approval. But it failed to guarantee the flights' safety, and said they could only be made through Monday.

The U.N. Special Commission that is enforcing the terms of the Gulf War cease-fire said Iraq's concession was inadequate. It asked Iraq to guarantee the safety of its flights, giving Baghdad time to reconsider its position.

Since the end of the Gulf War in 1991, the Special Commission has been in charge of monitoring and destroying Iraq's weapons of mass destruction. The commission is more interested in continuing its work than it is in punishing Iraq, commission spokesman Tim Trevan indicated Friday.

"We want to get in and do our job," he told reporters at the United Nations. "Each day that goes by means that our opportunity to destroy chemical weapons is not operating."

The United Nations did not set a new deadline Friday, but Trevan said

he hoped to receive guarantees in time to have a flight in the air by Sunday morning.

Officials at the White House, Pentagon and State Department said the administration considered Iraq's response unsatisfactory. A senior Pentagon official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the United States reserved the right to strike without notice.

The aircraft carrier USS Kitty Hawk remains poised in the Persian Gulf. Aircraft from the Kitty Hawk took to the skies Wednesday to bomb the air defense network in southern Iraq.

Iraq says 19 people were killed - 17 military personnel and two civilians - and 15 were wounded, civilians and military.

Wednesday's raids followed threatening deployments of anti-aircraft weapons in a "no-fly zone" in

southern Iraq, repeated border incursions into Kuwait, and continued Iraqi defiance of the U.N. resolutions that ended fighting in the Gulf War after Iraq was forced to reverse its invasion of Kuwait.

As a condition of the cease-fire, Iraq agreed to surrender its weapons of mass destruction under U.N. supervision.

Baghdad began to ease off on its latest showdown with the West on Thursday, when it promised to would stop forays into Kuwait to retrieve weapons abandoned when Iraqi troops retreated.

But Iraq has held fast to its refusal to move anti-aircraft missiles from zones the allies set up to shield dissident Kurds and Shiite Muslims from Iraqi air attacks.

And it continues harassment of allied flights patrolling over the no-fly zones in its northern and southern regions.

Hereford man killed, suspect is arrested

A 19-year-old Hereford man was shot and killed during an altercation shortly after midnight Saturday at US-385 and Fuller Street. A suspect was arrested a short time later, and Hereford Police Department is still investigating the fatal shooting.

Santos Rincon III was the victim in the shooting incident. Capt. Pat Michael said witnesses at the scene told police that two men approached Rincon and several members of his family and instigated a fight with them. After a brief struggle, one suspect opened fire with a small caliber firearm.

Police spotted the suspect a short time later and took him into custody on outstanding violation of parole warrants. Murder charges were then filed against Esequiel Mendoza, 21, of Hereford.

Police said a second suspect turned himself in at police headquarters a few hours after the incident. He gave officers a voluntary statement on the incident and has not been charged with any offense at this time.

Morales unveils crime plan for tough sentences, victim rights

HOUSTON (AP) - Attorney General Dan Morales on Friday unveiled a six-point legislative package which he said would make punishment for criminals tougher and quicker, beef up state efforts to fight drug money laundering and enhance victims' rights.

Morales, at a Houston news conference, said the recent settlement of the Ruiz lawsuit, ending federal court supervision of the state's prison system, would allow the Legislature to move ahead with his criminal justice reform package.

"What this aims to do is simply get our state statutes in conformity

with the new flexibility that we now have under the settlement agreement," he said. "Now that our prisons are finally free from control of federal courts, I think we can really begin to close the revolving door to Texas prisons."

Specifically, he wants to cut the time it takes to put convicted killers to death, saying 10 years and longer is too long. He would limit the number of appeals and "slap a time limit for appeals."

His package also would set up a new Victim Trust Fund so income made by inmates while serving time would go to victims.

In addition, he wants greater flexibility to allow the state to use tents or abandoned military bases for housing of prisoners; laws to enforce the sentences so terms handed out by juries are fully served; changes in laws to allow the attorney general's office greater access to financial records to track down drug money laundering operations; and a more than doubling of the death benefits the state pays to the families of law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty.

"I'm confident (this) will make life worse for professional criminals and better for everyone else," Morales said. "In Texas, punishment

Legislature eyes top four issues

AUSTIN (AP) - Four issues - the state budget, school finance, criminal justice and boll weevil eradication - will have "emergency" status in the 1993 Legislature.

Friday's designation by Gov. Ann Richards means lawmakers can vote on bills on those topics immediately, rather than waiting until later into the 140-day session.

The state budget looms as a challenge, with a \$3 billion gap between the money expected to come in and the amount agencies say is needed to continue current services.

Weak front may bring some rainBy **The Associated Press**

A weak high-pressure ridge Saturday brought fog and clouds to parts of Texas, while forecasters said cooler temperatures could bring rain.

Patchy fog developed in South and West Texas including areas around San Antonio, Corpus Christi and Abilene, the National Weather Service said. It issued an advisory for travel in the regions.

Mostly cloudy skies covered North Texas under the influence of the high-pressure ridge centered in eastern Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Early-morning temperatures ranged from the mid-20s to the 50s. Highs should range from the upper 30s to the 70s, with overnight lows from the 20s to 50s.

Increasing cloudiness was expected Sunday, with cooler temperatures in western and central sections and a chance of rain by Sunday night.

Showers were possible in far West Texas and the Big Bend, with snow flurries or freezing drizzle over the Panhandle.

6 Somalia gunmen shot

MOGADISHU, Somalia (AP) - U.S. Army troops shot and killed six Somali gunmen in a clash that began only hours after leaders of 14 Somali factions signed a cease-fire agreement, U.S. military spokesmen reported Saturday.

Marine Chief Warrant Officer Eric Carlson, a spokesman for the U.S. military command in Somalia, said initially that five Somalis were killed and seven wounded in the gunbattle Friday night that caused no American casualties. United Nations spokesman Farouk Mawlawi said another wounded Somali died later.

Clan violence also continued Friday. Members of one clan captured a rival clan member, tied his hands behind his back and shot him in the head.

A Somali crowd kept journalists from approaching the site of Friday's killing and refused to identify the two clans.

In the cease-fire agreement signed in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, clan leaders promised to stop fighting and turn over their heavy weapons to the U.S.-led multinational force.

The six Somalis were killed after a four-vehicle Army convoy returning from Beli Dogle to Mogadishu came under sniper fire, Carlson said.

The Somalis fired first and the U.S. soldiers shot back as the convoy moved on, following military procedure in Somalia. Military police later found five Somali dead and seven wounded, Carlson said. The wounded were taken to the U.S. 86th Evacuation Hospital at Mogadishu Airport.

The soldiers in the incident were from the 10th Mountain Division, Carlson said.

Meanwhile, the International Committee of the Red Cross announced at its headquarters in Geneva on Friday that it was temporarily shutting down some operations in Somalia because of the slaying of one of its staff members. Kurt Lustenburger, 32, a Red Cross administrator from Lucerne, was killed Thursday in Bardera.

Local Genealogy Society donates books to library

Deaf Smith County Genealogy Society begins a new year with a meeting at 7 p.m. Monday at the Hereford Community Center. The public is invited to attend.

Monday evening's program will concern reading microfilm and how to decipher the "old" handwriting.

The society members have recently purchased and presented Deaf Smith County Library with 25 books. Another four memorial books have also been donated. These books cover areas of Tennessee, Virginia,

North Carolina, South Carolina and the four-volume set, *Pension Roll of 1835*.

Texas in 1848 deals with German immigration and is published by German-Texan Heritage Society. There are other books in the genealogy collection dealing with German research as well as books on Spanish records research in Texas.

Two of the new books deal with Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma under the titles of *Obituaries, Socials and Other Solicitations and Murders and*

Other Tribulations. These are items taken from newspapers of the area in the early settlement days. Two books are on Indian research and another is *Pioneers of Chickasaw Nation, Indian Territory*. Published information on early Oklahoma has been difficult to find.

The Deaf Smith County Genealogy Society has completed the microfilm set of *Index to Texas Death Records* by obtaining the last series, 1941-1973. The first series, 1903-1940, was obtained earlier.

Lubbock hopes voters okay sales-tax hike to help lure military finance center

Associated Press Writer LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Mayor David Langston made a ninth-inning pitch Friday for a sales-tax hike that may help lure a military finance center and 4,000 jobs to Lubbock.

"The ballgame is over" if voters reject the 1/2-cent sales tax hike Saturday, Langston said. "If it doesn't pass ... we're out of it. There's no way for us to finance our package."

Backers want the city to join 75 others in the state that levy up to a 1/2-cent in additional sales tax for local economic development.

Voters in Jacksonville, Texas City, Red Oak, McKinney, Sugar Land and a handful of other cities will also consider such a tax.

"It is an extra tool in the tool chest for economic development purposes," said Cathy Bonner, director of the Texas Department of Commerce.

"It's getting very, very competitive to attract new industry," Baylor economist Ray Perryman said.

"Sometimes it comes down to being able to provide a bigger sewer line, a bigger water line, a piece of infrastructure that will meet the needs of a specific industry."

Lubbock voters last year defeated a tax for economic development. But the community has a goal in sight this time - becoming one of the two to four places in the country to be home of the Defense Department's accounting centers.

It is the only Texas city on the list of 20 nationwide that are being considered. It has offered a \$67 million incentive package topped by a 850,000-square-foot office complex that would include a health clinic, fitness center and child care areas.

Private groups sweetened the pot with offers of special university programs, utilities packages and up to \$3 million in job training funds from the Texas Department of Commerce.

The South Plains Area Residents Taxpayers Action Network opposed the generic economic development tax last year but endorsed Saturday's measure after Langston promised to lead a rollback petition drive if the Pentagon snubs the city.

"His promise is politically and morally binding," said Mikel Ward, chairwoman of the group, known as SPARTAN. "I've told him I'll have his clipboard ready."

A heavy turnout "will send a message to Washington that Lubbock and the entire West Texas region is unified," Langston said.

Lubbock would become one of the largest Texas cities with such a tax. But the state law allowing the additional tax was aimed at boosting the competitiveness of smaller

communities that are seeking new business.

Jacksonville would reap an estimated \$500,000 per year from the added 1/2-cent tax, which would then be managed by an appointed council. The East Texas town is surrounded by others that have an economic development tax.

Lotto claim wrong, Leander woman wins

AUSTIN (AP) - Sue Turkington of Leander didn't have to travel far to collect her \$7 million Lotto Texas jackpot Friday.

Ms. Turkington, 32, quit her manufacturing job and cruised down the highway about 25 miles to Austin to collect her first installment of a \$7,200,855 jackpot she won after picking the six winning numbers from Wednesday's drawing.

Ms. Turkington says she wants to buy property in Leander and start raising dogs.

"I am going to buy some land, get a house, take a couple trips and buy

me a new Lexus," she said. "I want to start breeding dogs. I have always wanted to do that."

Ms. Turkington received her first installment of \$259,837 dollars from Texas Comptroller John Sharp and will receive \$259,200 every Jan. 15 for the next 19 years.

Laura Minter, a school cleaning lady and mother of three from Athens, earlier said she had the winning ticket. But Sharp says the woman was wrong.

"There was not a winner in Athens," Sharp said. "There was only one winner and she is right here."

"I was watching the news earlier today and heard some cleaning lady had said she won it," Ms. Turkington said. "And I am going, 'No, they told me there was only one winner. I've got this ticket.'"

The Circle K in Leander will collect \$72,000 for selling Ms. Turkington the winning ticket.

Turkington says she randomly chose the winning numbers: 45, 41, 26, 13, 21 and 5. She said she had only played the lotto game three or four times, spending about \$10 each time.

"I kept looking at the numbers over and over and over again," she said. "I never thought I would know anyone who would win the lottery. Now it's me. I can't believe it."

The school winners, including Moudy, will now take a written test. Up to 100 of the top scorers in each state and territory will be eligible to compete in their

state bee April 2. The National Geographic Society with its co-sponsors will provide an all-expenses-paid trip to Washington, D.C. for state champions and their teacher escorts to participate in the National Bee scheduled May 25-26. The first place winner there will receive a \$25,000 college scholarship; second-place winner, a \$15,000 college scholarship; and third-place winner, a \$10,000 scholarship.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy", will moderate the national finals which will air as a prime-time special on the Public Broadcasting Service at 8 p.m. May 26.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S., ages 18-24, the youngest group surveyed, knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries in the survey.

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Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Would you please explain Mongolian birthmarks? They are supposed to be small dark marks above the tailbone of children of mixed race. Do they look like moles? Why do they appear? How many generations later do they occur, one-fourth or one-eighth mixed race?

DEAR READER: They are blue or slate-gray spots usually above the sacrum over the spine, but may occur over the back of the thighs, legs, back and shoulders. There may be just one spot or several.

They are caused by a cluster of melanin cells that are normally in the deeper skin and provide pigment to the skin. They are seen in 80 percent of black, oriental and East Indian infants. They also occur in 10 percent of white infants. So they do not indicate a mixed-race birth. They have no medical significance and usually disappear in infancy or early childhood.

They are not the same thing as moles or hemangioma-type birthmarks and require no treatment. Occasionally, multiple spots or spots

in unusual locations will persist.

It's becoming more apparent that a "healthy" body weight is very important for long-term well-being especially for athletes. While most people in Texas would do well to lose some weight, many need to gain weight.

Healthy people who can't keep weight on, some older individuals, certain athletes and people recuperating from serious illnesses, fall into the weight-gain category.

Some athletes, such as football players, need to gain weight and strength for competition, adding muscle mass, not fat. This can and should be achieved—without using steroids—by eating foods that meet all their nutrient needs and that add extra calories, as well as by maintaining a

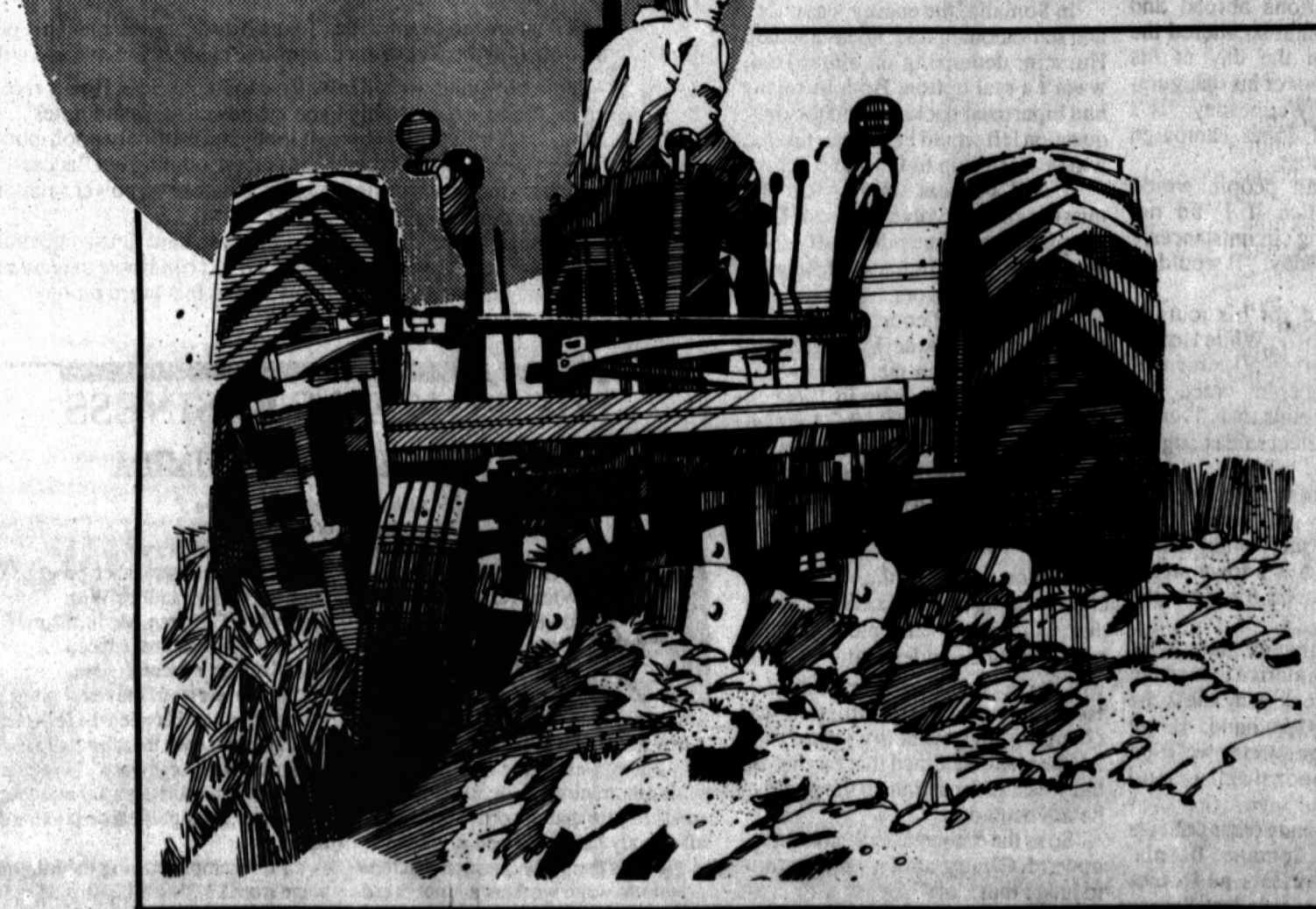
carefully executed exercise regimen. If you are such an athlete, check with a physician or dietitian for a plan that meets your special needs. These tips can help you make wise choices about your diet:

-Eat a balanced, varied diet with less than 30 percent of calories from fat, about 15 percent of calories from protein and the remaining calories from fruit, vegetables, whole-grain cereals and whole grains that provide complex carbohydrates.

-Choose larger serving sizes and snacks frequently throughout the day to boost your calorie intake. Remember to select foods from the basic food groups which are low in fat.

-A diet that is balanced and included variety and provides enough calories will, in most cases, give you all the protein you need to build muscle mass.

Texans love their cars but few people realize what it costs them to drive that favorite vehicle.

According to a study by the

Federal Highway Administration, if you drive a moderately priced, mid-sized car from the time it is new until it gives out, it will cost you \$42,000.

That's 33.4 cents a mile. A subcompact costs 28.9 cents and a full-size van costs 44.8 cent a mile.

The findings are based on a study conducted last year in the Baltimore area and based on driving a \$14,000 model(1991) over 12 years and 128,500 miles. That is the total cost of depreciation, interest, insurance, gasoline and oil, maintenance, tires, parking, tolls, and Maryland tax, title and license.

Clinton elected with mandate for change

WASHINGTON (AP) - Bill Clinton is coming to power with a mandate for change - and an agenda altered by changes not of his making.

In 77 days as the president in waiting, Clinton has seen, and supported, the use of U.S. forces on two foreign fronts. At the same time, the economy that was his chief campaign cause seemed to be mending, while the deficits that will burden his new administration only worsened.

No modern president-elect had dealt with operations abroad and changes at home that so altered the situation between the day of his election and the hour of his inauguration, at noon on Wednesday. He's already modified some campaign positions in response.

"The American people would think I was foolish if I did not respond to changing circumstances," Clinton said Thursday. "It would be irresponsible."

As he prepared for his journey from Little Rock to the White House, Clinton said more than 60 percent of the American people voted for change, and he intends to deliver it.

The president-elect said changing circumstances and missions abroad will not distract him from the urgency of dealing with the home front problems that were his central issues, and that he'd always known world events would demand his time and attention, too.

"The point I always made was, you can't expect America to lead the world if we're weak at home," he said. "On the other hand, if we withdraw from the world, we'll be weakened economically and socially."

He said he will have clear policies to deal with Iraq, Somalia, Bosnia, Haiti, trade agreements and other foreign policy concerns lest "these things ... flare up and consume all of our time because we haven't tried to manage them."

Still, the flareups so far, particularly the two foreign military operations President Bush ordered during his last weeks, are going to require a broadening of the laser-like focus Clinton had said he meant to devote to economic issues.

The burst of action came at the parting of a president who often had been passive in a campaign year when domestic concerns were paramount to both governing and politics. In December, he ordered U.S. intervention to get food to the starving in Somalia and on Wednesday, one week before yielding office, the air raids to punish Iraq for breaching United Nations sanctions.

It will be left to the Clinton administration to decide how and

when to end both operations.

Clinton was consulted on both operations and backed both, saying he might order further action against Iraq if necessary. The White House made a point of noting that the decisions were Bush's alone.

As a practical matter, supporting the two operations was the only choice open to the incoming Democratic president. He'd said from the start that the nation had only one president with foreign policy "solely in his hands" and that no one should doubt U.S. resolve during the transition.

In Somalia, the enemy was chaos and starvation; in Iraq, it was Saddam Hussein; demurring on either front wasn't a real option. Both missions had bipartisan backing, and the only question left would have been timing, which wasn't up to Clinton.

It will be next time, when the mission could involve the use of U.S. warplanes to enforce the no-fly zone against Serbian flights over Bosnia, a step Clinton favors.

There have, of course, been prior transitions with American forces in action overseas, in the Korean War in 1953, and in Vietnam in 1969. In 1981, the Iran hostage crisis loomed over the presidential transition; it ended as Ronald Reagan was inaugurated, with the hostages freed on terms negotiated for Jimmy Carter.

Clinton began the transition concentrating on the economic issues that were key to his election. His major public undertaking was a two-day economic conference in Little Rock. Even then, the situation was changing, the economy improving, and he was concerned that might ease the pressure for action on the program he advocated.

So as the economic indicators turned upward, Clinton said it was too soon to judge that real recovery was under way or that everything was hunky dory.

The deficit certainly wasn't; two weeks before the inauguration, the Bush administration issued sharply increased projections for deficits over the next five years.

Clinton said that prospect was forcing him to reconsider parts of his plan, including the promise of a tax cut for the middle class. His timetable already had been rewritten; the economic package that was going to be ready on the first day of his presidency will come several weeks later.

He said his program will be ready faster than Reagan's was when the Republicans took over 12 years ago. "The last time there was this kind of change of party and philosophy was in the 1980 election, and he didn't give a State of the Union address until mid-March," Clinton said. "I think we'll be ready before then."

The Valley Morning Star on Clinton's cabinet:

It may not be surprising that, in this day of affirmative-this and diversity-that, activists for women and minority groups would start counting Bill Clinton's Cabinet by race and gender even before all the returns were in. Clinton himself encouraged it when he said he'd have a Cabinet that looks more like America. ...

Still, Clinton had good reason to snap at the women's groups who have been complaining about his appointments. They are, as he said, playing math games and quota games - "bean counters" talking about how Clinton has to prove himself by appointing more women than the three now serving in the Bush Cabinet. Three, said Eleanor Smeal, head of the Fund for a Feminist Majority, is a "glass ceiling" that must be broken.

That in itself is a silly demand to achieve something that means absolutely nothing. Will any four do? How about four Phyllis Schlaflys or Marilyn Quayles? ...

El Paso Herald-Post on Clinton's decision to replace Carla Hills:

Committed as Bill Clinton was to naming members of various out-groups to his Cabinet, it's a shame he didn't think to hold onto Carla Hills.

She could have been much more than a token Republican in his entourage, and an extra woman to boot. After three years as U.S. trade representative, she is one of the few people who will leave the Bush administration with her reputation enhanced.

Instead, by choosing his old friend Mickey Kantor to succeed Mrs. Hills, Clinton lends credence to the fear that he has no serious policy on trade. ...

Moreover, Clinton's choice for another front-line trade job - Ron Brown as secretary of commerce - sends the same indistinct signal as to substance. ...

We complain a lot in this space about special-interest lobbyists and how their money influences the legislative process.

We've taken an especially dim view of the tobacco lobby and how it frustrates efforts to counter the threat tobacco poses to the public health. ...

Here are some excerpts from Phillip Morris USA internal memos, apparently from 1989, as published in the current issue of Common Cause magazine:

"We will continue to cater to the (Texas House) speaker and his pet projects, as well as to the five or six committee chairs that have and will help us ... Where profitable we will also give to Republican House races because those types are more likely to be 'no new taxes' candidates ..."

"Disgusting, isn't it? Special-interest lobbyists routinely pooh-pooh reform efforts by claiming their money buys them nothing but "access." Judging from these memo excerpts, access translates into power to block bills the lobbyists don't like. ...

What's sad is that public-interest lobbyists have a hard time competing with industry lobbyists because they generally don't contribute to political campaigns. Money talks, and the bad guys have lots more money.

THE MALEVOLENT MINIMUM

WASHINGTON — Whatever small benefit lower income workers derive from a higher minimum wage is more than offset by loss of public assistance that is invariably reduced when a claimant's income goes up.

There was never any doubt that raising the minimum wage destroys thousands of jobs and opportunities. Study after study has confirmed it.

Not is there any question that most minimum wage workers are not breadwinners. They are either teenagers earning walk-around money, or part-timers seeking merely to supplement a family's income.

Still, minimum wage defenders insist regular increases in it are necessary to improve the quality of life for many workers on the bottom of the economic ladder.

However, a recent study by economist Carlos Bonilla, funded by the Employment Policies Institute, sheds new light on the issue. Bonilla concluded that even the alleged beneficiaries of a higher minimum wage end up worse off than before. "Predicated on the assumption that higher earnings translate into higher household resources," Bonilla said, "the minimum wage doctrine is totally at odds with the economic forces that define life for the lowest income segment of the working poor."

Bonilla points out that beneficiaries of a higher minimum wage not only have to pay higher taxes, but also lose

access to public assistance programs — such as Aid to Families With Dependent Children, Medicaid and food stamps — which are reduced as a claimant's income rises.

Since most antipoverty programs are partnerships between the federal and state governments, the impact of a higher minimum wage can vary. However, if the data from California are an accurate barometer, the significance is extraordinary.

For example, raising the minimum wage from \$3.35 to \$4.25 would reduce annual resources for a single parent of one child in California by \$1,800. A single parent with two or three children would lose \$1 in income, a small loss, but a loss nonetheless.

Further, the data suggest additional hikes in the minimum wage would continue to erode the economic position of affected workers. Even at a minimum wage of \$5 an hour, a single parent of one child in California by \$1,800. A single parent with two or three children would lose \$30 in annual income.

The only beneficiaries of a higher minimum wage are the social service agencies, that have to pay out less in benefits, and labor unions whose contracts have built-in escalators based upon the minimum wage. This may be why the bureaucrats and unions are so outspoken in their demands for ever more hikes in the minimum wage. It cannot be because such increases help the poor — because they clearly do not.

The Houston Post on census and federal aid:

Texas, Florida and other states, mainly in the Sun Belt, will apparently be rooked for at least another decade in the distribution of federal aid. An undercount in the 1990 federal census is the culprit. ...

The Census Bureau has decided against statistically adjusting the latest census to compensate for the undercount. The bureau rejected repeated pleas for the adjustment from top officials in Texas and other states. These states would have benefited from more federal aid through formulas based on population. ...

Former Texas Comptroller Bob Bullock and current Comptroller John Sharp estimated ... the latest deficit count would cost Texas about \$1 billion during the 1990s, most of it in Medicaid money.

The Census Bureau and the Reagan-Bush administrations have been derelict in not developing a fair way to adjust the census. Congress should have forced them to do so.

And if no accurate count or adjustment is made in 2000, some bureaucratic heads should roll.

The Dallas Morning News on education money crunch:

Mention education, and state lawmakers immediately think "public school financing," a topic that will be high on the agenda when the Texas Legislature convenes in regular session on Jan. 12. But higher education in the state deserves some attention, too. Legislative leaders already are predicting that holding down spending in the upcoming session is going to be particularly painful for higher education. ...

This scrimping is coming, unfortunately, at a time when Texas is building high-technology industries, sitting on the cusp of increased world trade, and continuing to fight for economic recovery. It must have an educated work force. ...

(T)he Legislature must come to grips with whether the state is providing its share for higher education, given its handcuffed position. Eighty-four percent of the state budget currently is either constitutionally dedicated or mandated. Of the remaining 16 percent, 63 percent goes to higher education. There simply is not enough discretionary money. That suggests that the Legislature needs to re-examine some of its currently dedicated funds, or get serious about restructuring state taxes.

Our future may depend on it.

Beef prices are 27 percent lower today than they were in 1980, when adjusted for inflation. And beef spending is up more than \$5 billion higher than it was five years ago.

Cattlemen are doing their part to boost the economy. The beef industry is responsible for nearly two million U.S. jobs and generates more than \$220 billion in economic activity.

Notes on the Law

Under Lemon v. Kurtzman, an activity connected with a governmental entity will be found to be unconstitutional unless:

1. There is a legitimate secular, non-religious purpose for the activity;
2. The primary effect of the activity neither advances nor hinders religious belief or practice, and
3. The activity does not foster excessive entanglement between the governmental entity and religious concerns."

Some courts, which have recently addressed the scope of the Establishment Clause under the United States Constitution, include two other tests. Thus, an activity will be found unconstitutional if it fails any of the three tests set out above or if it fails one of the additional tests below:

1. If a reasonable observer of the activity would believe that his or her particular religious beliefs are being disapproved, then the activity is unconstitutional.
2. If the government directs a formal religious exercise in a way that obliges unwilling participation by a person, then the activity is unconstitutional.

It is interesting that prayers included in the graduation exercises in the Clear Creek Texas Independent School District have been found by the United States Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals to pass all five of the above tests. In Clear Creek, the school district has a resolution which allows the graduating senior class to vote on whether to include a prayer in the graduation exercise or not. The court used this fact to conclude there was no unwilling participation by any person.

All people who attend a graduation, other than the graduating class,

do so voluntarily. Since the graduating class itself decided whether to include a prayer or not, then the court found that none of the seniors could be classified as "unwilling participants." The Clear Creek approach also insures that the prayers are nondenominational and calls for one of the graduating seniors to offer the prayer.

This approach is distinguishable from the approach in Lee v. Weisman in which the United States Supreme Court held the Providence Rhode Island school system could not include prayers at graduations under the system it had utilized for many years. One of the primary differences is that the school principal was given the discretion to include a prayer under the Providence Rhode Island system. Since the principal is a governmental official, his decision was necessarily a governmental decision, whereas the seniors in Clear Creek are not governmental officials.

The historic references to religion in our society are constantly under attack. A case in Illinois is making its way through the courts and, if considered by the United States Supreme Court, the case will rule on whether "In God We Trust" must be removed from the United States currency. Monuments of the Ten Commandments and Christmas manger scenes are systematically being challenged across the country, and even the postal practices of the Nazareth, Texas post office have come under attack.

The people of Clear Creek were willing to stand up against the challenge.

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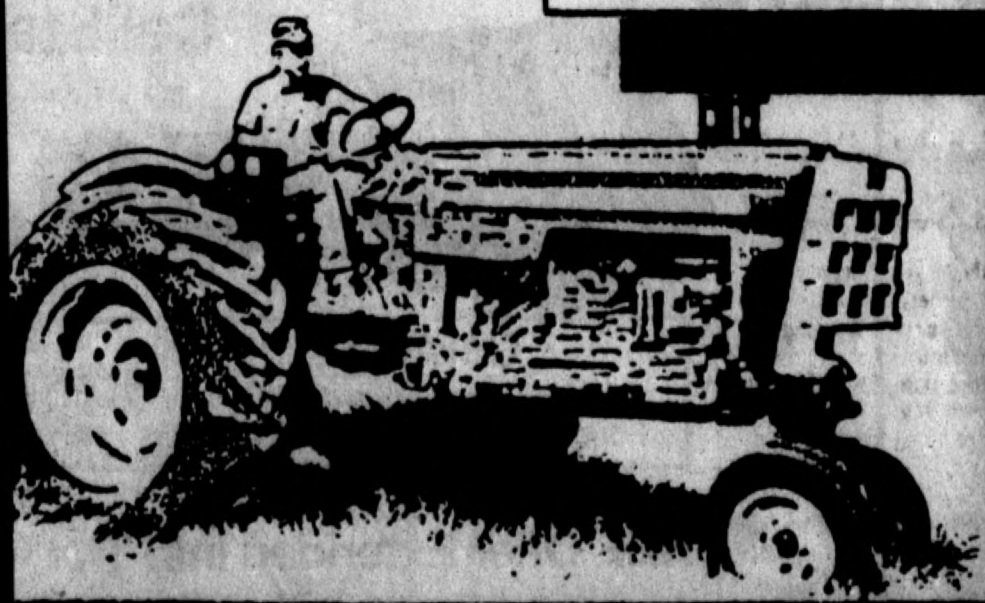
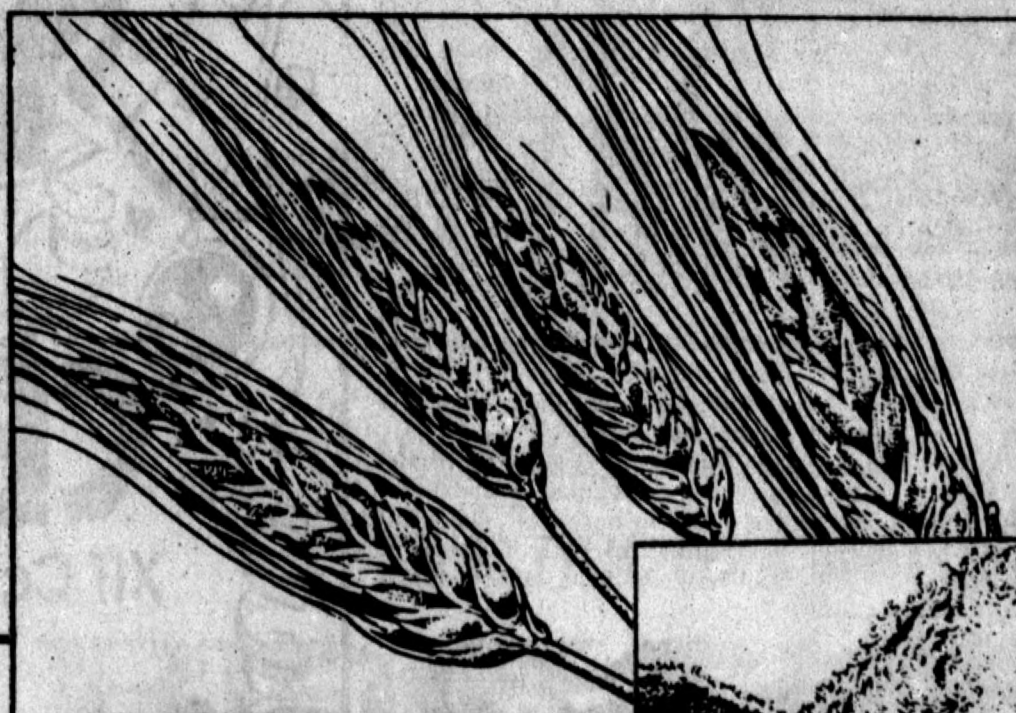

Lady Whitefaces falter in final minutes

"They had two guys we had to guard and we didn't guard them," Herd coach Joe Main said. Borger's Alife Gillum and Ryan McNellis had 17 and 16 points in the first half and 26 and 20 points in the game.

"We came back in the second half

when we decided we could play with them, and we did so," Main said. "We shot so poorly in the first half; that's what cause most of this. We didn't come out intense and boy, they were pumped. They played so well so early. We settled down and played but by then it was too late."

Hereford is now 6-13 overall and on a six-game losing streak. Eric Sims led the team with 16 points, and Kyle Hansen scored 12.

The other Hereford boys' teams lost squeakers in Borger. The junior varsity lost 59-55, and the sophomores lost 56-55. Results of the girls' JV game were not available.

In other 1-4A games, the Caprock boys beat Randall 81-73, and the Pampa boys beat Dumas 87-53. The Pampa girls beat Dumas 45-31, and the Randall girls beat Caprock 55-39 in a matchup of 2-0 teams.

Coaching great Iba dies of heart failure

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) - Hank Iba began playing basketball on dirt courts in rural Missouri, wearing uniforms sewn by his mother. He became one of the great coaches in history, a man whose influence is still felt amid the glitz of today's multi-million dollar game.

Iba died of heart failure early Friday. He was 88. He had been hospitalized since Wednesday.

"Of all the shadows that cast over the game of basketball, his was the biggest," Indiana coach Bob Knight said in a statement.

Knight was one of the many coaches Iba influenced with his preachings of sound defense and a patient, ball-control offense. Iba won 767 games in 41 years, second most in history, and led Oklahoma State - then called Oklahoma A&M - to national championships in 1945 and '46.

Iba coached the U.S. Olympic team three times. His teams won gold medals in 1964 and '68, then lost to the Soviet Union in 1972 in one of the most controversial games ever.

It was ironic that Iba, one of the game's great winners, came to be so closely tied to a loss. The United States appeared to have won the game in regulation. But the clock was reset twice, giving the Soviets three chances to score the game-winning basket.

"We won the game, no question about it," Iba said in an interview with The Associated Press in February 1990. "That thing was over."

The loss was so bitter, no members of the U.S. team accepted their silver medals.

Knight was especially close to Iba. In 1984, when he coached the Olympic team, Knight asked Iba to serve as a special assistant coach and speak to the team each day at practice. After winning the gold medal, the players honored Iba by carrying him on their shoulders around the court.

"There weren't many of us who knew what was going on that didn't have tears in our eyes," said Bill Wall, former executive director of USA Basketball, the sport's national

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NFC title game recalls memories of The Catch

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — For the Dallas Cowboys, it is a chance to bury the past. For the San Francisco 49ers, it is a chance to relive it.

For both, it will bring back memories of "The Catch."

Sunday's NFC championship game marks the first postseason meeting of the teams since the 1981 title game decided by Dwight Clark's leaping, fingertip catch in the end zone in the final minute for a 28-27 San Francisco victory.

Former Dallas defensive back Everson Walls was right beside Clark but didn't go up with him after the ball, thinking Joe Montana's pass was uncatchable. He looked on in quiet disbelief as Clark jumped, snagged the ball with his fingertips and then controlled it for The Catch.

"I thought the ball was going out of the end zone," said Walls, now a member of the Cleveland Browns. "I couldn't believe it when he went up and caught it. I've seen the film a number of times and the more I see it, the more I believe it was just meant to be."

Clark's 6-yard scoring catch with 51 seconds left marked the game's sixth lead change and capped a struggle that would set the course for the two teams over the next decade.

San Francisco went on to win four Super Bowls in the '80s while Dallas lost its identity as "America's Team" and fell from the ranks of the NFL's elite.

This Sunday, the roles will be reversed from 11 years ago. San Francisco is the established NFL power trying to keep its place and Dallas, transformed by a new owner and coach, is the younger upstart trying to push its way back to the top.

Montana, now a backup to Steve Young, is the only player left on either team who played in the 1981 game.

And for the most part, the other players view it with detachment, a cold piece of history with no bearing on the present.

Yet, the image and the memories of The Catch stand out as a reference point, a part of the past that gnaws on the present because of its sheer improbability.

"It was just one play that kind of demonstrated what had gone on that entire season," said Clark, now the 49ers' coordinator of football operations and player personnel. "It was such a surprise for us to be there, and it was a surprise for us to drive that far against the Cowboys. And it was a surprise, I think, for us to come up with that play."

"That was just one play of a lot of plays that season. It was 30 years of planning and work by Bill Walsh and he finally got to that one point. That was maybe the most memorable play of a season that people had worked a long time to get to."

The Cowboys had a history of having their way with the 49ers. In three straight seasons, from 1970 to 1972, Dallas knocked the 49ers out of the playoffs, twice in NFC championships and once in a first-round playoff in which Roger Staubach orchestrated a two-touchdown comeback in the final 90 seconds.

The 1972 playoff defeat had been the 49ers' last playoff appearance prior to 1981. They finished an NFL-best 13-3 in Walsh's third season, just two seasons removed from a 2-14 finish.

One of Walsh's assistants in '81

was secondary coach George Seifert, who succeeded Walsh as head coach in 1989.

And 1989 was also a watershed year for the Cowboys, who were purchased by Jerry Jones.

Tom Landry, the Cowboys coach since their inception in 1960, was fired and Jones hired his friend, Jimmy Johnson as his replacement. 60 began the Dallas revival.

The seed for that turn of events was played out on the soggy Candlestick Park turf in the 1981 title game, played on Jan. 10, 1982.

San Francisco, a 45-14 winner over Dallas in the regular season, committed six turnovers in the game. The fifth led to Danny White's 21-yard TD pass to Doug Cosbie, giving the Cowboys a 27-21 lead with 11:41 remaining.

The ensuing 49ers series ended in Montana's third interception and the second of the day by Walls, a rookie that season who led the league with 11 interceptions.

"We thought we had the game wrapped up," former Dallas receiver Drew Pearson said.

When the 49ers did get the ball back, there was 4:54 left and they were pinned at their own 11-yard line.

"I'm a little bit of a pessimist, so when we went out on the field with 89 yards to go against America's Team, I didn't know if that was possible," Clark said.

But the 49ers began making headway against Dallas' Doomsday defense. Walsh crossed up the Cowboys with running plays - Lenvil Elliott carried four times for 31 yards on the 13-play drive and wide receiver Freddie Solomon picked up 14 on a reverse.

Montana completed a 10-yard pass to Clark, then a 12-yard pass to Solomon before Elliott's 7-yard sweep set up a third-and-3 at the Dallas 6. Walsh then called for a sprint right

option, the same play that had worked for the game's first touchdown, an 8-yard pass to Solomon.

But Solomon, again the primary receiver, slipped. He got up but couldn't shake cornerback Dennis Thurman.

Clark ran a "fishhook" route, curling toward the middle of the end zone, then drifting across the backline toward the right corner.

Montana was rolling to his right, desperately trying to buy more time as Cowboys defenders Larry Bethea, D.D. Lewis and Ed "Too Tall" Jones closed in.

Montana was almost out of real estate when he pulled up and, throwing off his wrong foot, lofted the ball over the leaping Jones. The pass seemingly was out of everyone's reach but Clark somehow reached up and pulled the ball back down to earth.

Clark spiked the ball (which he still has and displays in his Redwood City restaurant) and there was bedlam in the stands. Ray Wersching's extra point put the 49ers up by one.

"I thought at the time I had caught it cleanly until I saw some pictures of it," Clark said. "Apparently, I just knocked it down and caught it on the way down, which makes me nervous just to think about it."

He knows the play could very easily have ended differently.

"I have some friends at home that, when I seem to get a little bit cocky, they say, 'You know, that could have been 'The Drop.' I'm very thankful. The more you get removed from playing, you get forgotten pretty quick. At least I have that one play," Clark said.

The 49ers had to sweat out the final 51 seconds as the stunned Cowboys regrouped for a last-ditch comeback.

On the first play of the ensuing series, Danny White completed a pass

to the streaking Pearson, who gained 31 yards to the San Francisco 44 before cornerback Eric Wright made a touchdown-saving tackle when he grabbed him by the jersey. Another completion and the Cowboys probably would have been in field-goal range.

But on the next play, Lawrence Pillers sacked White, who fumbled, and Jim Stuckey recovered to preserve the win and ensure the place of The Catch in football history.

"What can you say? It was a great play, not by one but by two players, Joe Montana and Clark," Landry

said. "I thought we had it defended but Montana didn't give up when he was in trouble and neither did Clark. I'd feel worse about it if we hadn't done everything we could to stop it."

In the Super Bowl two weeks later, San Francisco beat Cincinnati 26-21 to claim its first NFL championship.

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"Mr. Iba was not a great recruiter," Kurland said. "He felt he was a teacher. If people wanted to play the game of basketball, they would come to him. And they did."

Those sentiments were shared by Jack Hartman, who played for Iba and went on to win 436 games at Kansas State.

"I realize it takes talent to coach skilled kids," he said. "But Mr. Iba could take a lot of Oklahoma country boys and take them as far as they could possibly go, and make them compete with the very best."

Iba did it through hard work. If he didn't like what he saw during an afternoon practice session, he was likely to bring his players back that night to work more.

"I remember three practices on Christmas Day," Hartman said.

He was from a family of coaches. One brother, Clarence, coached at Tulsa in the 1950s. His other brothers, Earl and Howard, coached high school programs in Oregon and Missouri, respectively.

Hank Iba's son, Moe, coaches at Texas Christian, and his nephew, Gene, coached at Baylor until last season.

Iba's opinions were cherished by present coaches. Many of his proteges invited him each year to watch a few days of practice and give a critique.

"I always got something out of it

because at the end I recall he'd come down and tell me what he thought about each and every player and I don't recall him ever being wrong," Texas-El Paso coach Don Haskins said.

Rob Evans, in his first year as coach at Mississippi, said Iba was at practice nearly every day during the two years Evans was an assistant at Oklahoma State.

"He had a cane and he would tap it on the table and then he'd tell me, 'You're doing it right. You will be a tremendous coach,'" Evans said. "That gives you a lot of confidence."

Iba was revered in Stillwater and around the state, where he was known simply as "Mr. Iba." He could have had any seat in Gallagher-Iba Arena, but preferred a spot several rows up in the corner because it allowed him to see the whole court.

He insisted on relentless man-to-man defense and a controlled offense, and his reasons were simple.

"If I've got the ball enough, I've got a chance to win," he said in 1990. "If they get the ball more than I do, I'm liable to get beat. I've got to have that rock."

"In my own mind, I'm convinced that if I can't stop 'em, I ought to get beat. That's the name of the game. I don't care if you and I are having a bicycle race. If you can't win, you're no good. You're second."

Pat Hale, and Lois Wales, a TCPB board member, will discuss the ethanol question and how the corn-produced fuel has potential to become a major market for corn farmers.



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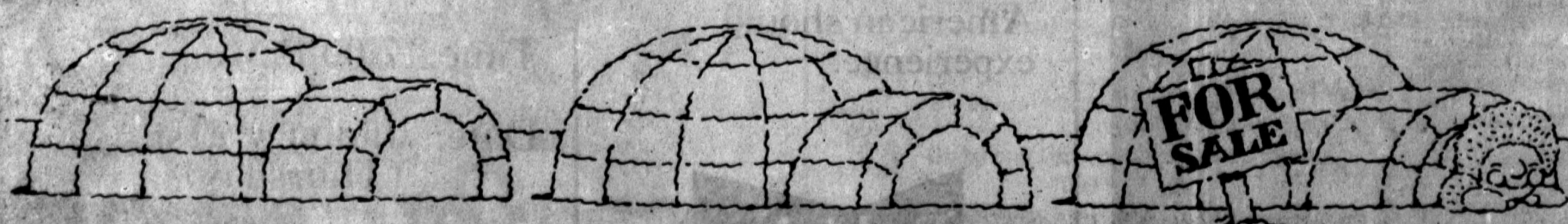

Scientists find better nutrition for potato bugs

WASHINGTON (AP) - In an effort to wipe out potato beetles, scientists have developed a healthy diet for them.

Crazy? Not really. "A major problem in trying to develop a biological control for this insect is raising enough beetles for research purposes," explains John Domek, an entomologist with the Agricultural Research Service.

"Using this diet, we have been able to rear the beetle from egg to adult," he said. Not surprisingly, the favorite dinner of the so-called Colorado potato beetle is potato plants. Beetles now used in research projects are reared on potato plants grown in carefully controlled greenhouses. But that's an expensive diet.

So Domek and his colleagues whipped up a casserole of protein, sugar, vegetable oil, amino acids, vitamins, minerals and cholesterol.

The beetles went for it. "The diet has all the elements necessary for the beetle's growth and all the ingredients are commercially available and relatively inexpensive," says an ARS report on the research.

"The food looks like a piece of cheese and has a similar texture, but it is a lot more nutritious for the beetle."

Another important advantage of the artificial diet, Domek said, is its uniform nutritional content, resulting in uniform growth of beetles reared on it.

The beetle now is controlled with insecticides which are becoming less effective as beetles develop resistance, Domek said.

Colorado potato beetles are the major pest of potatoes in North American and Europe. "It was against the Colorado beetle that the first effective chemical warfare against insects was waged about 127 years ago," the ARS said. "Paris green, a mixture of copper and arsenic, was developed in 1865 specifically to fight the ravages of the Colorado potato beetle."

The beetle is found in much of the United States. In addition to potatoes, it also feeds on eggplant, peppers, tomatoes, flowering tobacco and petunias.

Public land grazing fee to drop in '93

WASHINGTON (AP) - The grazing fee for Western public lands will drop by 6 cents this year.

The new fee is \$1.86 per animal unit month, down from the current level of \$1.92, the Agriculture Department said this week. An animal unit month is the amount of forage needed to sustain one cow and her calf, one horse or five sheep or goats for a month.

The fee applies to national forests and Bureau of Land Management land in Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Utah, Washington and Wyoming. It also applies to national grasslands in California, Idaho and Oregon.

The department also announced the 1993 grazing fee for national grasslands in Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas and Wyoming. That fee is dropping 21 cents to \$2.04 per animal unit month.

Higher livestock production costs and lower beef cattle prices triggered the decline under a formula set by Congress in 1978. Some 31,000 ranchers graze livestock on federal lands, according to the Public Lands Council, an industry group whose members include cattle and sheep ranchers.

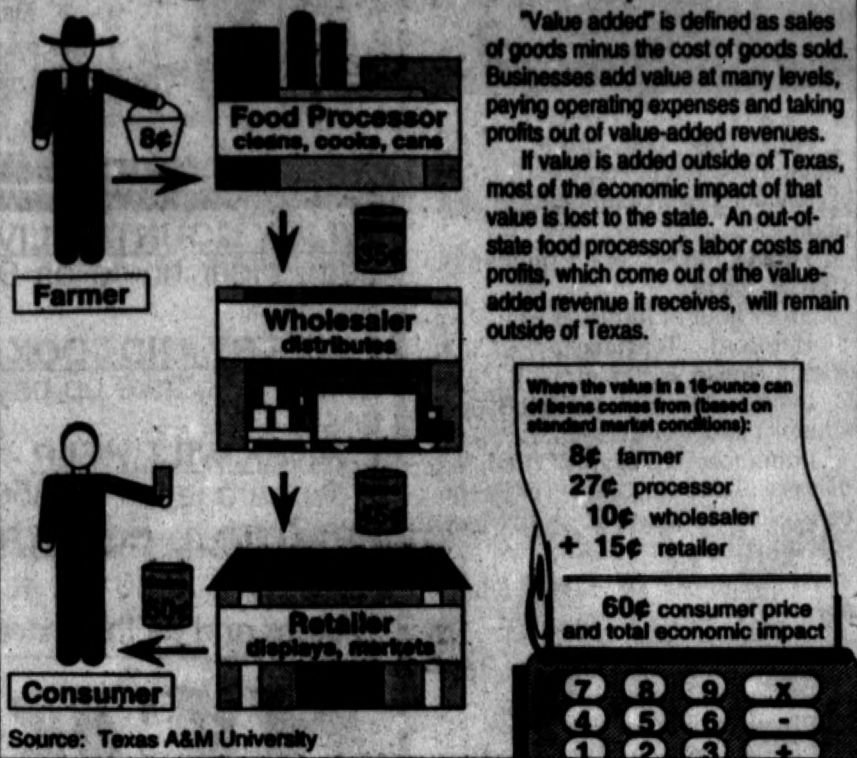
ORAIBI, Ariz. (AP) - This little place on the Hopi Indian Reservation may be the oldest continuously occupied settlement in the United States.

USDA predicts sweet year for cane sugar

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department forecasts U.S. cane sugar production during fiscal 1993 will hit 3.40 million tons, second only to last year's record of 3.44 million.

The second-highest-ever production estimate comes despite losses stemming from Hurricane Andrew in Louisiana and Hurricane Iniki on Hawaii's island of Kauai, the department's Economic Research Service noted in a recent report.

"Barring a significant freeze this winter, Florida is expected to produce a cane sugar crop totaling 1.76 million tons - the third crop in a row to approach or exceed 1.8 million tons," the report said.

Estimated Louisiana cane sugar production of 840,000 tons for the fiscal year was up 10 percent from last year, but well below the record 1.0 million tons foreseen prior to Hurricane Andrew, the report said.

The estimate for Hawaii's cane sugar production in fiscal 1993 was

675,000 tons, the smallest since 1922-23.

"Excessively wet weather adversely affected production in recent years, particularly on the Hamakua coast of the island of Hawaii," the report said. "Hurricane Iniki hit Kauai where about one-quarter of production usually occurs. These problems and a continuing decline in sugarcane acreage reduced the production potential for 1992-93."

In Texas, the report said, "sugar production last season was 109,000 tons and this season's near-record forecast of 125,000 tons is in sharp contrast to the annual average of 89,000 tons during the 1980s."

Looking at the world situation, the report said global production is forecast to exceed consumption for the fourth straight year in 1992-93. However, it said, the expected difference of 1.6 million metric tons is only about half of last season's.

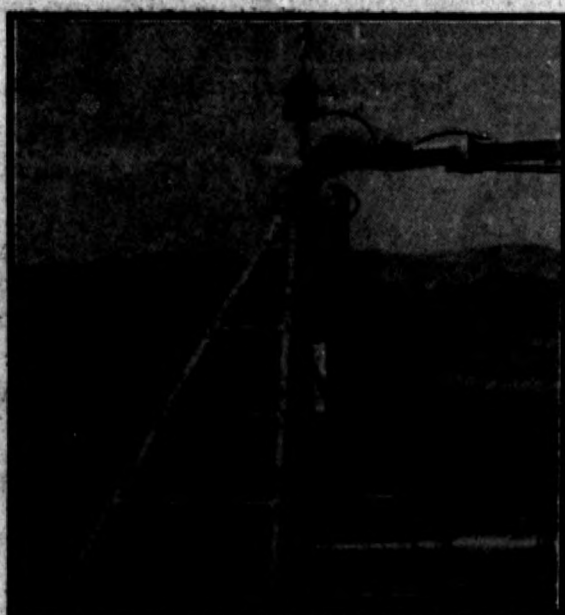

Oregon declared brucellosis-free

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Agriculture Department has declared Oregon free of bovine brucellosis.

"We appreciate the efforts of Oregon officials and producers in achieving Class-free status for brucellosis," said Billy G. Johnson, deputy administrator for veterinary services in the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

"This is significant progress in meeting our goal of being a brucellosis-free country by 1998."

Oregon joins 31 other states that have eradicated the costly disease.

Also called Bang's disease, it is an infectious and contagious bacterial disease that causes abortion, reduced fertility and lower milk yields in cattle and bison. Humans can get the disease by drinking unpasteurized milk from infected animals or handling infected animals.

A state is declared Class-free when

no cattle or bison are found infected with brucellosis for 12 consecutive months. Certain restrictions on interstate movement of cattle and bison are lifted once a state is disease-free.

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Recent study profiles stutterers' fears

Are you afraid to speak on the telephone? Would you be afraid to tell a waiter he brought you the wrong order? If you are an adult who stutters, the answer is probably yes according to a recent study.

"Everyone feels fear in some situations," explains Jane Fraser, president of the Stuttering Foundation of America, a 46-year-old non-profit organization. "But those who stutter have a greater problem with fear, in fact, to such a degree that it may be the fear, not the stuttering, which becomes the worse handicap."

A recent study of adults indicates that making a formal presentation rates the highest in situations that make them feel the most uncomfortable. The study also identified speaking with an authority figure, arguing with a stranger and talking on the telephone as fear provoking.

The research was conducted by Dr. Jennifer B. Watson, Texas Christian University; Dr. Hugo H. Gregory, Northwestern University; and Dr. Doris J. Kistler, University of Wisconsin. They measured and evaluated 107 clinically diagnosed adult stutterers' attitudes toward various communication situations.

According to the survey, the second most difficult predicament for persons who stutter is an argument with a stranger.

"Arguing with a salesperson or waiter is an unfortunate but normal part of life," says Dr. Jennifer Watson, a researcher for the study. "The problem for adults who stutter is that these conflicts have unanticipated outcomes, and this adds pressure to the stutterer who is trying to speak."

Another situation adults who stutter always find stressful is using the telephone. "During face to face conversation, there are non-verbal cues

which indicate the pace of the conversation to the listener," notes Dr. Watson. "Over the phone, those cues are lost. Often, the listener doesn't understand the silences at the other end of the line, and he may even hang up on the person who stutters. Speech timing may also be altered if the stutterer is hurried or interrupted, creating an extremely frustrating experience."

"Those who stutter are not alone in their avoidances, anxieties and fears of certain situations," concludes Dr. Watson. "Everyone is fearful to a certain extent and that is normal. Acceptance of this fear as normal may be the first step toward overcoming it."

Size is not an issue here. Each of us has a comfort level regarding the space around us. We have a tendency to react defensively, negatively and sometimes violently when someone

intrudes into our space.

I take the position that no one has the right to sit on my lap without my permission. You missed a fine opportunity to tell your readers that it is perfectly good manners to say to a seatmate on a plane, on a bus or in a private car, "I am being crushed. Please get off me."--Cynthia in Wasilla, Alaska

DEAR ALASKA: Your point is a valid one, but your language could

use a bit of refinement. For example, how about this? "Would you mind moving over just a bit? These seats are really too small for two people."

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Four years ago, you printed several moving letters from American GIs who had been prisoners of war in Moosburg, Germany, during World War II. The letters described the feelings of the GIs as Gen. George Patton's Third Army tanks made their way to the main gate of that prison camp.

One of the letters was from an American security officer who was at the front gate "when that skinny GI climbed up the flagpole, tore down the ugly German swastika and replaced it with the beautiful Stars and Stripes." Well, Ann, that skinny GI was me.

I was the pilot of a B-26 bomber

shot down over North Africa in January of 1943. Before I was sent to Moosburg, I was in another POW camp, Stalag Luft III. In 1944, a large American flag was smuggled into the camp and brought to me for hiding. (I was a security officer.) We were supposed to put the flag on the ground in case the planes that we prayed would one day come to liberate us had trouble identifying the camp. I sewed the flag between two old German blankets and slept under it for the next year.

In early 1945, we were ordered to start walking east. Before we left camp, I grabbed my precious blankets and a small transmitter which had also been slipped into camp. Twenty thousand of us walked for nearly six days in the snow to Moosburg. It was

rough, but I'm sure the Bataan death march was worse.

When Gen. Patton liberated us, my roommate and I went up to the German flag tower, took down their flag and proudly replaced it with the beautiful American flag I had kept hidden for so many months.

Sorry it took me so long to write, but I've been thinking about this for four years and decided it was time I let you know.--Dr. Martin Allain, Shreveport, La.

DEAR DR. ALLAIN: Can you believe that was 48 years ago? Thanks for the memories, which reminds me - Bob Hope will be 90 years old in May.

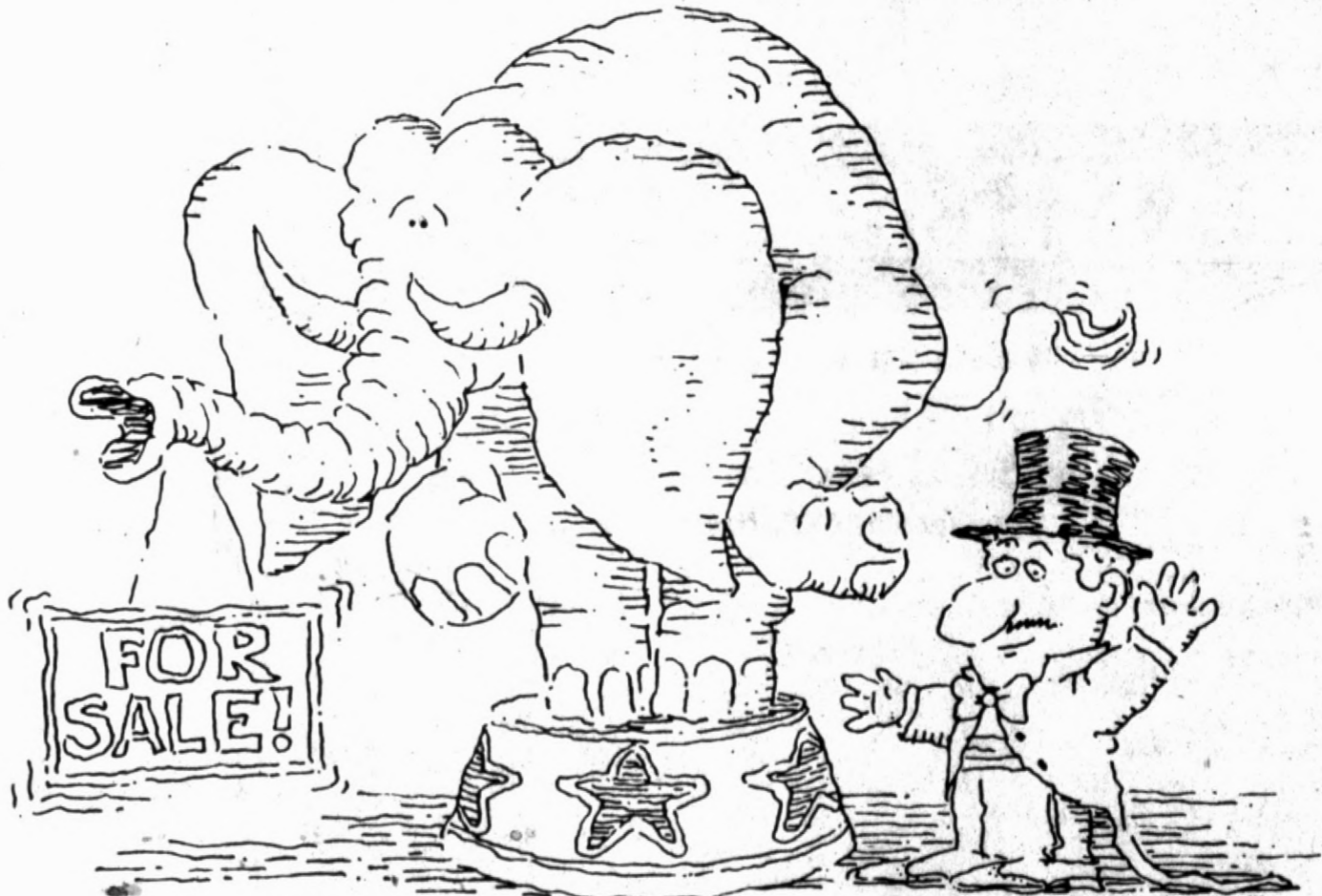

Bulimia can be treated

The cultural image that "thin is beautiful" controls the life of a person suffering from the eating disorder bulimia.

"People with bulimia have psychological vulnerabilities that make them buy into the cultural pressures about being thin," said Dr. Mariame Aviles, assistant professor of psychiatry at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Bulimia, which affects 4 to 10 percent of female high school and college students, is characterized by binge eating followed immediately by attempts to prevent weight gain: vomiting, laxative and diuretic abuse, fasting and strenuous exercise.

"The typical bulimic is a female who is average weight or 5 to 10 pounds overweight. They see the purging as a way to eat all they want and still control their weight," Aviles said.

"If a person feels insecure, inadequate and confused and has no sense of self, it is going to be a big challenge to make all of the life choices between age 15 and 25," she said.

Bulimics resort to worrying about eating, weight gain and their bodies as a way to avoid dealing with the developmental changes they are facing, Aviles said.

To be classified as bulimia, the binging and purging cycle must occur

at least two times a week for at least three months.

"Since there is no dramatic change in appearance, family and friends are often unaware of the problem," Aviles said.

Medical complications follow the disease.

"The parotid glands enlarge giving the face a chipmunk appearance, menstruation usually ceases, digestion gets sluggish and often the person will have alternating bouts of diarrhea and constipation," Aviles said.

Aviles warns that frequent vomiting can lead to an electrolyte imbalance.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

NO SERVICE, NO SALE

We've all seen the signs near the entries of business establishments that say, "no shirt, no shoes, no service." Based on some of the stories I've heard these past few days, I believe it is time for a new sign. When we enter a store as a customer, we should wear a large sign around our necks that says "no service, no sale."

The intent of this sign is to remind the business owner that if we don't receive good service, we'll take our business elsewhere. Of course, that is exactly what we do anyway. The sign might help those who want our business remember what happens when customers don't receive good service.

Over the years, there have been hundreds of books

written on the subject of customer service. Thousands of articles have been published and we have even written a few *Minding Your Own Business* columns on the topic. Yet, it is still one of the most neglected areas of small business management.

The following true experiences were all related to me in the last few weeks. They are good examples of no service, no sale.

Taken to the cleaners
Recently, a dry cleaning establishment re-opened with new management in an area convenient to Larry's daily travels. The manager was enthusiastic and invited Larry to give them a try.

Since the store was nearby, Larry dropped off two suits for dry-cleaning and some shirts for laundering. A few days later, he picked up the items on his way to the airport. He was flying to a nearby state to give an important presentation.

When Larry began to dress for his presentation the following day, he found that the suit he planned to wear was not clean. The other suit was clean, but not pressed. Obviously, he was not a happy camper.

When Larry returned home, he explained the problem to the manager. The manager took his phone number and promised to have the owner call. "There was never an apology nor an offer to do the job right," Larry said. "I wasn't asked to bring the clothes in again, nor was I offered a refund. Two weeks have passed and I've had no telephone call." Larry has found a new cleaners. No service, no sale. More non-service

Sue picked out an expensive bridal gift from the bridal

registry of a national department store. The store is upscale and pricey. She expected good service there.

Later, when she received no "thank you" note from the bride, Sue inquired of the bride's family. The gift was never delivered. When Sue returned to the store, a clerk informed her flatly and rudely that the computer said the bride had received the gift and computers do not lie. Sue hasn't darkened their door since. No service, no sale.

Sandra wanted some remodeling done in her home. She called a contractor friend who promised to come out and look at the job "within the next two weeks." After three weeks passed, Sandra called again. "Within the week," the contractor promised.

Two more weeks passed and Sandra phoned again. Her friend made several excuses and again promised to come look at the job "in the next couple of weeks." Finally, Sandra saw another contractor's ad in her newspaper and called. This contractor came out the next evening and took detailed notes on the work Sandra wanted. He returned the following day with a detailed written bid and references. Sandra checked the references, then authorized the work.

"My new room is beautiful," she said, "However, I don't really know what to tell my contractor friend when he calls." I guess Sandra could say, "No service, no sale."

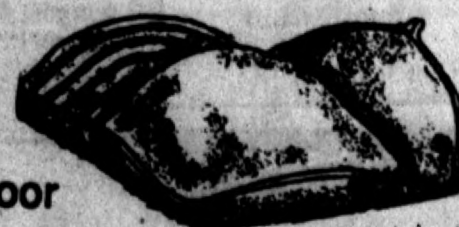

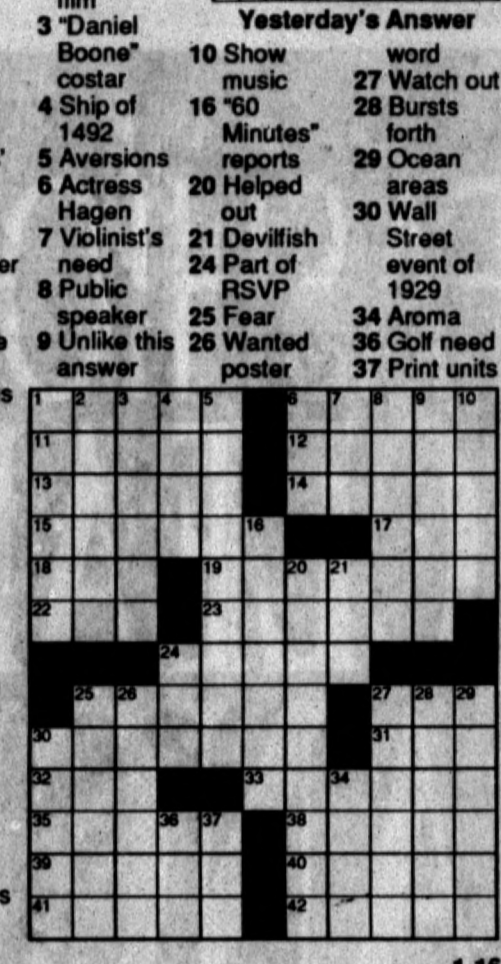

Quality, nutrition provided at hospital

Hospital food has come a long way from the days when bland was better. Today's food service must respond to nutritional needs of many different types of patients while still offering meals that are appealing. The dietary department at Deaf Smith General Hospital must prepare more than 2,000 nutritionally correct meals a month for four different types of diets. National Food Service Employee Week is an excellent time to recognize the quality of their service.

Charlotte Clark, who has been with the hospital for 15 years, is both a Registered Dietitian (a national registration) and a Licensed Dietitian (a state registration), and she has a Master of Science Degree.

"Charlotte became head of the department last year, and at that time, we established several goals for the department," Ron Rives, hospital administrator, said. "Our number one goal was for the food to look good, taste good; and be good for the patient."

Another important goal of the department was to re-establish food service for employees. "It was not possible for the clinical employees to leave the hospital for a meal," Ms. Clark said. "Sometimes the nurses on the floor barely had time to eat anything."

Good planning and hard work allowed the department to realize both of these goals. Members of the

department are Martha Rincon, a certified dietary manager, has been at DSGH for 17 years. She is also the department manager. JoNell Satterfield, a 12-year employee of DSGH is one of the cooks.

Silvia Martinez, at DSGH for seven years, was trained through the Panhandle Regional Training Program, which gave her on-the-job training. She was hired at DSGH when she completed her six-month training.

Juanita del Toro, who has been at DSGH for five years, also was trained on the job. Patra (Pat) Esqueda, cook and cook helper has been with the department for 10 months and Jennifer Hubbard started as a cook learner this month.

Ms. Clark is responsible for planning the 21-day cycle of menus. She must plan for a general menu and three modified menus which include a bland or soft menu, a diabetic menu, and a low-sodium menu. Working with the physicians, she visits patients for nutritional screening and assessment. If the patient is at high nutritional risk, she will develop special nutritional program. She dispenses diet instructions and family counselling on nutrition, especially important for newly-diagnosed diabetics.

Quality assurance is another aspect of the program. Ms. Clark monitors and reviews the food, the service, and the results of the special diets.

Scholarships given to Herrera, Hicks

Each year the College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University awards over \$100,000 in scholarships to worthy young men and women who wish to prepare for exciting careers.

Glorja Herrera has been awarded the W.B. Rushing Family Scholarship for 1992-93. She is a freshman fashion design major and is the daughter of Israel and Hope Herrera.

The recipient of the Clara McPherson Scholarship is Jennifer Hicks. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mark Hicks and is a freshman general home economics major.

Awards range from \$200 to \$1,000 for each recipient. Majors represented include: merchandising, family financial planning, family studies, fashion design, interior design, early childhood education, teaching young

children, human development, dietetics, home economics teacher certification, restaurant, hotel and institutional management (RHIM) and graduate degree programs.

Fall 1992 enrollment figures for the College of Home Economics were 1,864 undergraduates and 170 graduate students. The college is among the fourth largest in the nation in undergraduate enrollment.

Hereford area prospective students interested in studying in the college are encouraged to apply for a scholarship. Applications may be requested from the Office of the Dean, College of Home Economics, Texas Tech University, P.O. Box 41162, Lubbock, Texas 79049-1162. Applications are due Feb. 15.


Here are a couple of things to try. Put the tablecloth over the shower curtain rod. Turn on the hot water and keep the bathroom door shut so that steam will build up.

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Fox joins Tuesday-night battle with 'Class of '96,' 'Key West'

Pair of ensemble dramas takes network into big leagues

On Tuesday, Jan. 19, Fox television becomes, at least in principle, a seven-night-a-week network. The victory for the upstart broadcaster is not really complete, however; for the last 18 months, Fox has regularly offered its Monday-night movie slot back to local affiliates.

Originally, Fox planned to launch the Tuesday lineup in late October of last year, but those plans were scuttled early in the season. The result is that the network's two new ensemble dramas are considerably better than they promised to be during preview screenings last July.

The two-hour block begins with *Class of '96*, a series about college life that compares more than favorably to *Freshman Dorm*, CBS' late-summer no-brainer. Jason Gedrick stars as David Morrissey, the first member of his working-class family to attend college.

Morrissey's new friends at fictional Havenhurst College are an enterprising roommate (Gale Hansen of *Dead Poets Society*), a preppy (*Ferris Bueller's* Brandon Douglas) suffering from too much family tradition and his level-headed roommate (Perry Moore, the only black cast member), and three young women who room together — a dancer (Megan Ward) from a show business family, a flirt (Kari Wuhrer) and a young woman (Lisa Dean Ryan of *Doogie Howser, M.D.*) who'd prefer not to be labeled by her father's wealth.

Series consultant Peter Horton (*thirtysomething*) occasionally guest stars as a professor of literature. Also appearing in the pilot are David Clennon (*thirtysomething's* Miles Drentell), Mason Adams and Madolyn Smith Osborne.

The reworked pilot places more emphasis on the academic side of college life, and executive producer Leonard Goldberg succeeds for the most part in

capturing the rites of passage, both small and large, associated with a young person's first home away from home.

Following *Class of '96* is *Key West*, an ensemble drama for an older crowd. Set in the bohemian Florida island community, the series will appeal to those who find *Northern Exposure* a little too bookish. The pilot in particular has a strong Fox "sensitivity," with bikini-clad women on the beach, at a local watering hole and even in an alligator's fantasy. There are also plenty of witty one-liners.

Fisher Stevens stars as Jersey-born lottery winner Seamus O'Reilly, who moves himself to the island to walk in the shadow of his idol, Ernest Hemingway, and to test his own muse.

Fortunately, the surrounding cast easily outshines Stevens' tepid portrayal. Ivory Ocean (also seen as the blacksmith on CBS' *Dr. Quinn, Medicine Woman*) is delightful as the blind newspaper editor, King Cole. T.C. Carson, in waist-length dreadlocks, is an intriguing Rastafarian, while Jennifer Tilly makes an indelible impression as Savannah, *Key West's* lady-of-the-evening *deluxe*.

'Ernest Green' tells important tale of civil rights struggle

Disney's cast excels in story of 'Little Rock Nine'

"Somewhere along the way," says Ernest Green, recalling the school year of 1957-58, "we figured out that this was going to be a bigger drama than even we thought it was going to be."

In 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled the nation's schools had to be racially integrated. Three years later, the decision faced its most dramatic test in Little Rock, Ark. That's when 17-year-old Green and eight of his classmates at the city's all-black Horace Mann High School transferred to well-funded, academically superior Central High. With that move, the courageous youths known as the "Little Rock Nine" also took their place in the rolls of history.

Green's turbulent senior year and the powerful moment it represents are skillfully recounted in *The Ernest Green Story*, premiering Sunday, Jan. 17, on The Disney Channel.

On the first day of school, Green and his friends were shocked to see Arkansas National Guardsmen barring Central's doors. They were called into ser-

vice by Gov. Orval Faubus, yielding to racist pressure. President Dwight Eisenhower then called out his own troops, who escorted the nine into the building.

More battles lay ahead. A physics teacher, for instance, publicly ridiculed Green's plans for college, and his friends endured repeated pummelings while school officials turned a blind eye.

Green says now that one thing enabled the youths to get through that troubled time: "... the support we received from our parents and families ... and each other."

Morris Chestnut (*Boyz n the Hood*, *Out All Night*) stars as Green. Ossie Davis shines as Green's colorful grandfather, and Tina Lifford delivers a strong portrayal of the boy's imperturbable mother. Ruby Dee and Avery Brooks lend fine cameos, respectively, as a fearful neighbor and an inspirational pastor. Jason Pratt makes the most of his small role as Green's angry, impatient younger brother.

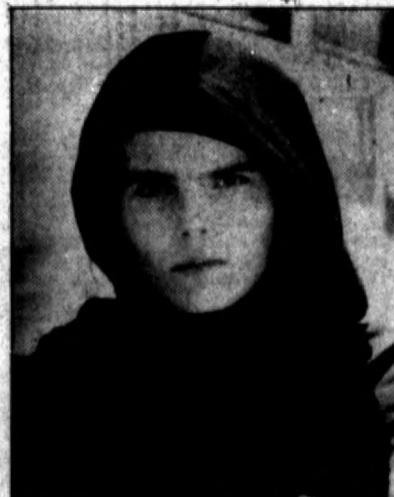

Justin Deas (ex-Tom, *ATWT*, and ex-Keith, *Santa Barbara*) is returning to daytime as *Guiding Light*'s Frank Sr., the shifty father of Harley and Frank Jr., who was believed to have been killed in the Vietnam War.

Another familiar face returns to *One Life to Live* in January when John Loprieno brings the character Cord Roberts back from the dead.

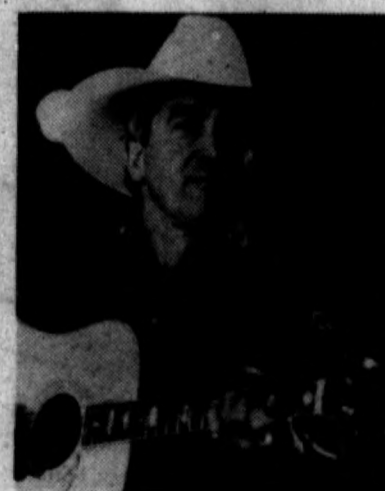

Ali has long resume for teen; 'Combat' lost to Vietnam War

Q: On the show *The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air*, I believe an actress named Tatyana Ali plays a character named Ashley. Can you tell me something about her, how old she is and where I can write to her? --Roshell Williams, Eatonton, Ga.

A: Ali indeed plays Ashley Banks, perhaps the most mature and level-headed member of the entire Banks clan including her high-spirited cousin (played by series star Will Smith). Ali was 13 years old when the show began the new season this past fall, but it is unclear in her press materials if she has celebrated another birthday since then. Though barely a teenager, she has built an impressive list of credits, including work on *Sesame Street*, *The Cosby Show*, *Hawk*, *All My Children* and *Star Search*, where she was a two-time singing champ. She still lives in her birthplace of Long Island, N.Y., with her parents and two sisters, Kimberly and Anastasia. (The latter works as a model.) Q: Lately I have been watching the old war program *Combat*. I also really enjoyed it in the '60s, especially the realistic battle scenes and actors Vic Morrow and Rick Jason. Please give me any information about these two actors and the series that you can. --Joann Wooten, Benton, Ark.

A: *Combat* first aired during the Kennedy administration, when American advisory forces were predicting a quick and painless solution to the conflict in Vietnam. In the show's heyday in the mid-'60s, audiences watched in droves as series stars Morrow and Jason crawled through forests, fields and mud (and plenty of it) to glorious victory in World War II. Not surprisingly, when the war in Vietnam got ugly, the show's audience dwindled. Viewers could get their fill of real combat on the six o'clock news, and the series was canceled in 1967.

Morrow was killed in 1983 on the set of director John Landis' film *Twilight Zone - The Movie*, when a helicopter hovering above him and two juvenile actors suddenly crashed.

Jason, now 66, made his Broadway debut in 1949's *Now I Lay Me Down to Sleep*. He starred in a number of movies

and even a series, *The Case of the Dangerous Robin*, before *Combat*, but his work after the show was rather limited. In 1979, he appeared in the two-part television movie *The Best Place to Be*. The dud *Partners* followed in 1982. Jason's last screen appearance was in the 1988 Rob Lowe vehicle *Illegally Yours*.

Q: I'm trying to find out the name of a movie I've only seen once. All I can remember is that a young woman meets a man when catching a ride on a train. At first he wants to steal her money, but as they travel together, they fall in love. I think Michael Parks is in the movie. --Ray, Jeannette, Pa.

A: I'm sure the movie you describe is *The Wild Seed*, released in 1965. In this film, Parks targets a runaway (Celia Kaye), who's on her way to California, as a robbery victim. By the time they reach the sunny coast, love replaces larceny on his agenda.

Q: I would like to know the name of the last film John Wayne made and what year he and Katharine Hepburn starred in Rooster Cogburn. --Mary Erlewine, Long Bottom, Ohio.

A: Wayne's last picture, 1976's *The Shootist*, was a highly personal and prophetic film about a gunslinger dying of cancer. It co-starred Lauren Bacall, James Stewart and Ron Howard. *Rooster Cogburn*, a sequel to *True Grit*, was released in 1975.

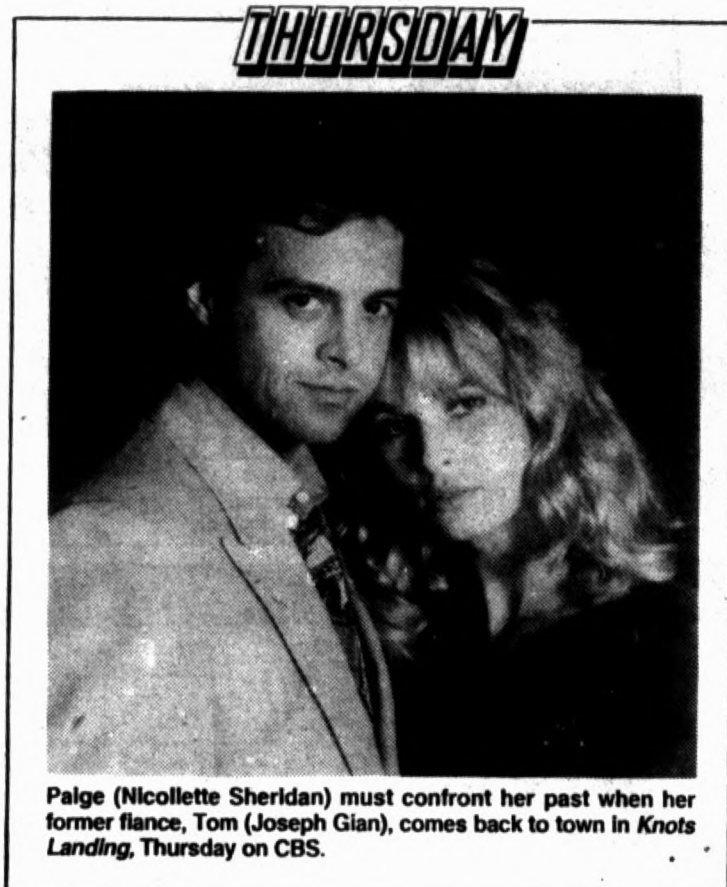
