Milk Ordinance Passed By City Commission

An ordinance passed by the city commission Tuesday, and proclaimed effective at once, provides for an examination, and test for Bangs Disease of all cows producing milk to be sold or given away in Hereford, and prohibits sale of milk from cows having Bangs disease under a possible fine of not more than \$100.

The ordinance stated that a physical examination and Bangs Disease tests of all cows shall be made before any milk is sold or given away in the city limits. Cows shall be tested at least once every 12 months by a veterinarian approved by the city health officer or by the state.

Danger to public health made it necessary to suspend the rule requiring an ordinance to be read three times before becoming effective.

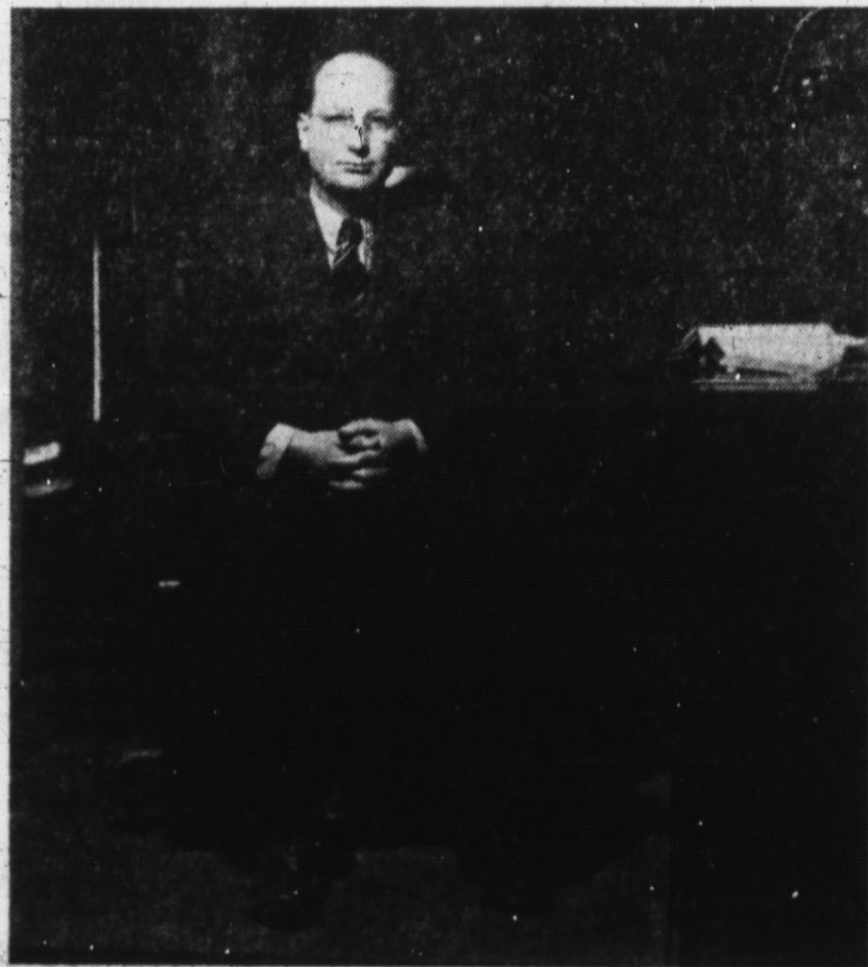

No Danger Of Race Suicide Here As Births Out-Number Deaths In 1939

There is absolutely no danger of race suicide in Deaf Smith county, judging by records of births and deaths for 1939 kept by G. M. Suggs, Justice of the Peace. On the contrary births outnumbered deaths nearly 2-to-1. Records show that while there were 56 deaths in the county in 1939, there were also 140 births.

A considerable number of bachelors may be expected among the boys born this year, that is, if they pick their brides from Deaf Smith-born girls, because 84 boys came into the world in 1939 as compared with 56 girls. On the other hand, the girls couldn't find leap-year proposals necessary. Compared with 1938 there was a loss in number of births and a gain in the number of deaths in 1939. One hundred and fifty-two—86 boys and 66 girls were born in 1938 and there were only

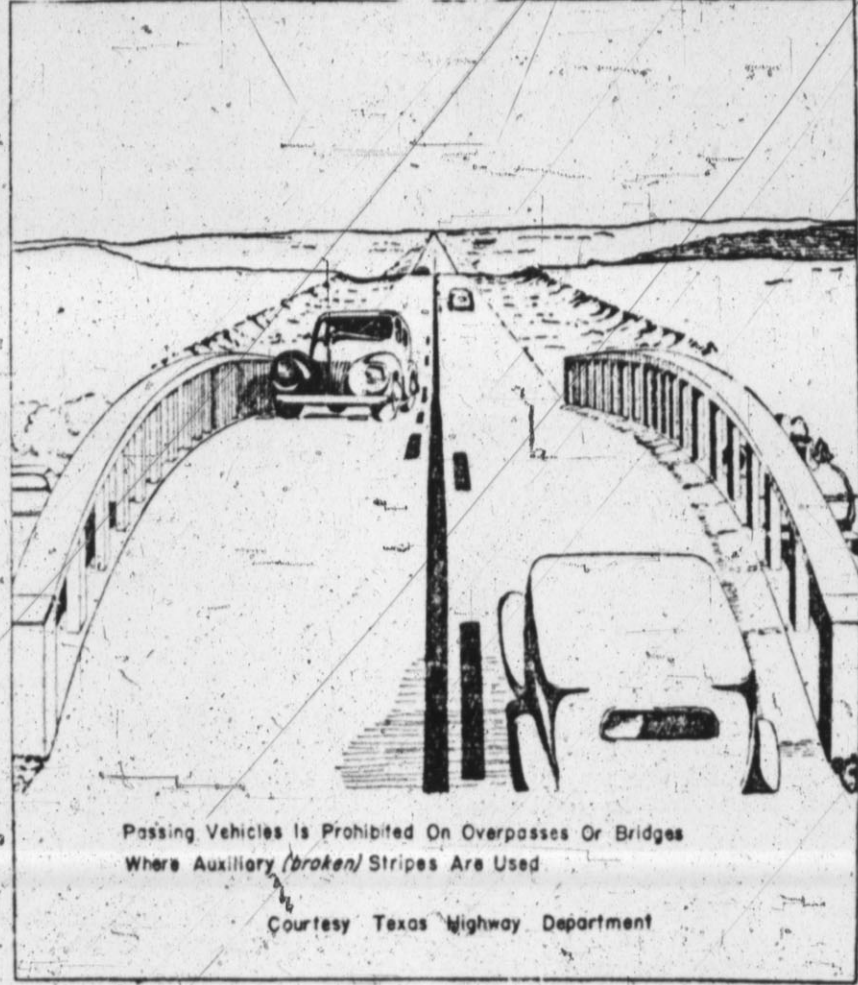

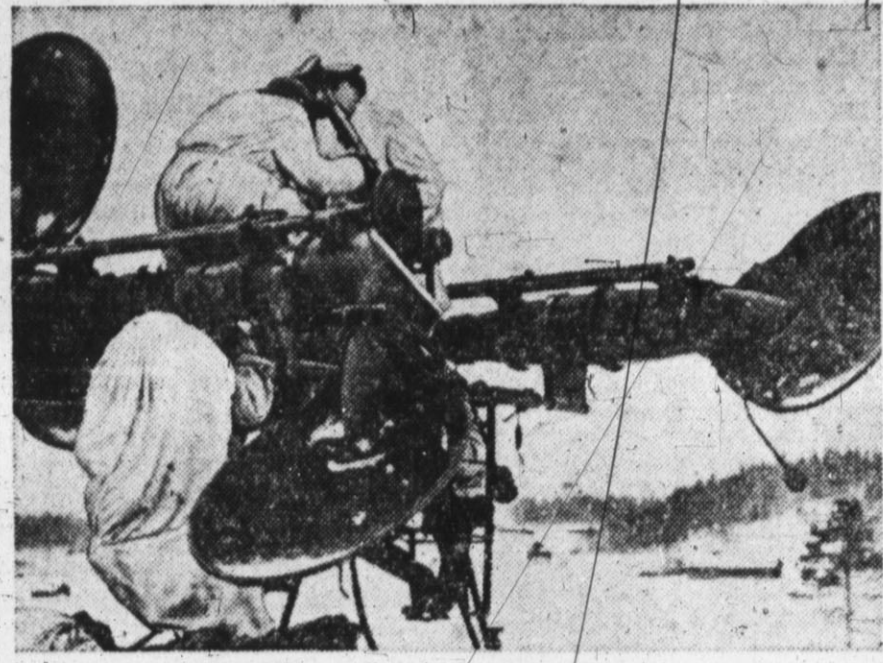

First Term Of District Court Held At Old La Plata Almost 50 Years Ago

ORIGINAL ORDER PRESERVED IN COUNTY RECORDS

November 24, 1890! Excitement rippled through the little prairie town that morning and the hitch-rails in front of a small wooden building were crowded with horses. The street was left almost deserted as men in little groups and alone began trickling into that structure, small, but still the most imposing in the village. History was made that day in La Plata.

For on the fourth Monday in November, almost 50 years ago, the first term of District Court ever held in Deaf Smith County convened at La Plata. The first district clerk was C. G. Wither- spoon, Judge W. B. Plemons, Amarillo, presided.

On January 29, 1940, nearly 50 years later, district court again convened, this time at Hereford, with Vern Wither- spoon, brother of C. G. Wither- spoon, on the Grand Jury and Jas. W. Wither- spoon, a distant relative of the first district clerk on the Judge's bench.

The first term of court had no cases on its docket before the day it convened. In fact, there was no Grand Jury. G. R. Jewell, Louis Bradley and J. J. Stovall were appointed Jury Commissioners and they selected a Grand Jury. The Grand Jury returned five bills of indictment, all for illegal voting, and the court ordered warrants for the arrest of the alleged law-breakers. At the end of the four-day session, Walter Colton, H. T. Thorp and J. C. Cox were summoned to serve as jury commissioners and delivered a sealed envelope containing the names of petit jurors to serve at the next term of court. Then court adjourned "sine die."

The court which opened Monday already had over 20 cases on its docket before the Grand Jury even met. And as much time is allotted for the Grand Jury this week as the first court convened in its entire session.

Preserved in the records of the District Court in the office of County and District Clerk R. L. Thompson is the original handwritten copy of Judge Plemons' order to hold the first district court. It reads:

The State of Texas
47th Judicial District
In Chambers at Amarillo, Texas,
November 14, 1890

By virtue of the authority in me vested by law, I W. B. Plemons, Judge of the 47th Judicial District of Texas, being fully advised that the County of Deaf Smith is now an organized county, and that no term of the district court has been fixed by law in said county, do hereby fix the terms of the district court in said county to be held at the Town of Grenada, at the following times, to wit: On the 4th Monday in November and May of each year, and it is hereby ordered that the District Clerk of said County spread this order on the minutes of the District Court. Said Courts to continue in session one week.

Given under my official hand at Amarillo, the day and date written above.

W. B. Plemons, Judge 47th Judicial District.

The first county seat of Deaf Smith County went first by the name of Grenada, then the name was changed to La Plata. It was called first one name and then the other for several years after the change, even in the court records. It took many residents half a day or more to make the trip to court whereas half an hour is all that a majority need today. Travel was by horseback, wagon, hack, or buggy then. Court day found many horses tied to the hitch-rails, nowadays parked cars crowd the streets around the courthouse.

Whether by coincidence or not Deaf Smith county's first courthouse, a small wooden structure, today stands across the street from the modern building of fine Georgia marble and standing four stories high. The old courthouse was bought and remodeled into St. Anthony's Church after it was moved from La Plata to Hereford.

Officers of the county officially present at the first session of District court 50 years ago were F. C. Highsmith, acting district attorney; J. M. Cook, sheriff; and C. G. Wither- spoon, District Clerk. H. L. Flesher and D. J. McNamara were named bailiffs. Grand Jurors selected were Walter Colton, foreman; J. C. Cox, H. R. Cox, J. H. Parrish, W. J. Freeman, F. B. Fuller, B. How, G. F. Brown, H. T. Thorp, J. M. Dickey, J. McD. Campbell, and A. J. Lipscomb.

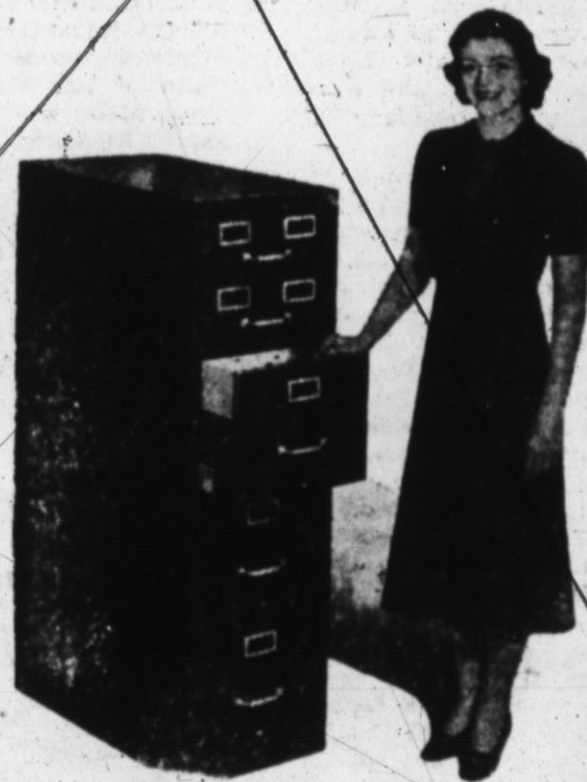

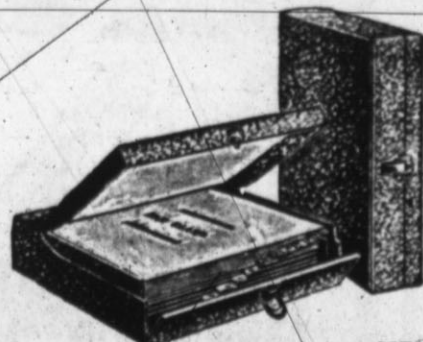

Security Board To Contact Eligible Beneficiaries

Steps are being taken by the Social Security Board to contact 528,575 account holders, who may be eligible to retirement benefits in 1940, and to inform them of their rights under the amended law, Dewey Reed, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Board field office, announced today.

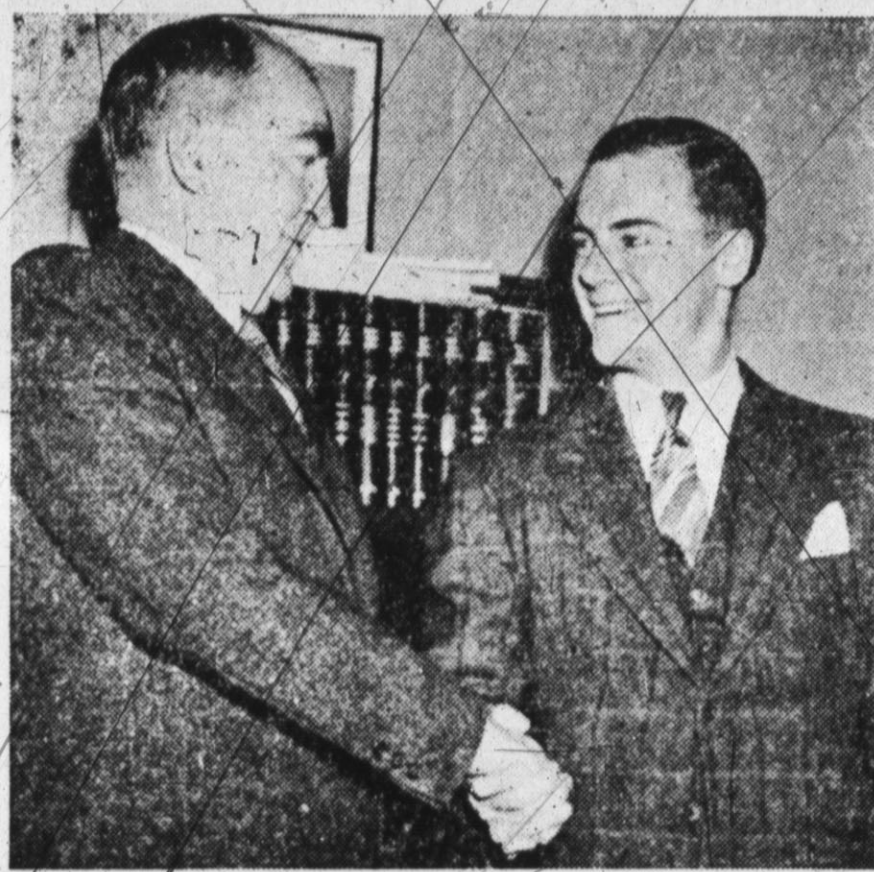
"Data is currently being prepared to inform three groups of their eligibility under the retirement provisions," said Reed. "First are those who have received lump-sum payment under the original Social Security Act. A total of 178,575 persons received \$9,930,751.83 in such payments up to August 10, 1939, when the act was amended and lump-sum payments ceased.

"Many in this group are now eligible for monthly benefits. Letters have been sent to each beneficiary informing him or her of the changes in the act and of the person's possible rights as a result of the amendments. These are people who expected no further benefits and to whom the monthly benefits will come as a windfall.

"They must, however, show six quarters of covered employment to establish their claim. They must make formal application and the future monthly payments will be in lieu of the lump-sum payment they have previously received. Monthly payments will not begin until the amount of that lump sum has been deducted."

Illustrating this deduction of earlier lump-sum payments, Reed cited the case of a worker who had received a lump-sum payment of \$125 ten months ago when he attained the age of 65. If he and his family apply

for monthly benefits and are entitled to \$50 each month, they would receive no check for January, no check for February, only \$25 for March, and thereafter they would receive the full \$50 each month. The \$125 would be deducted under the law to cover the previous \$125 lump-sum payment.

"The second group now being contacted by the Bureau of account holders who have reached the age of 65 in 1937, 1938, or 1939, but who have never filed claims for benefits," Reed continued. "This group numbers about 175,000 persons. Eligible workers and dependents in this group will al-

so be entitled to monthly benefits immediately upon their retirement.

"The third group is made up of those who will reach the age of 65 in the year 1940 and who will become eligible for benefits immediately upon their retirement. This group also numbers approximately 175,000, bringing the total for whom claims data are now being prepared to 528,575."

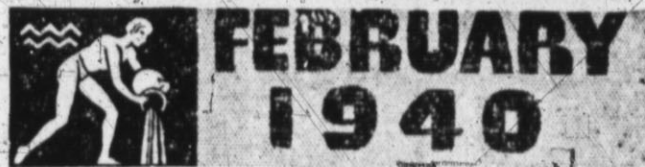

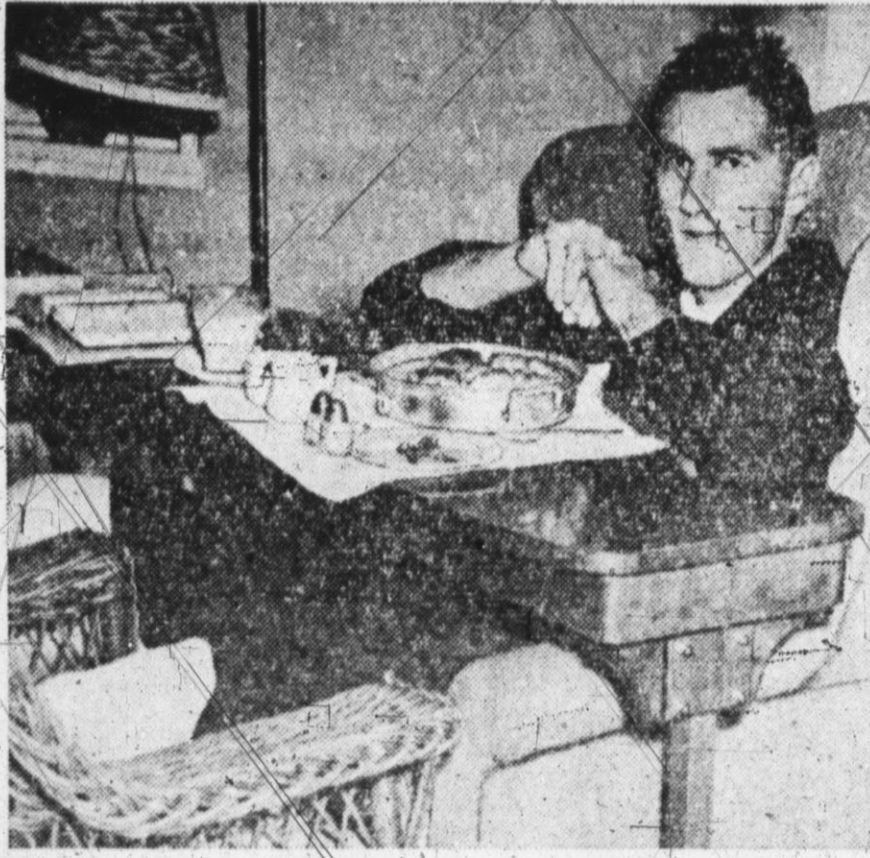

Flu Reported On Increase Over State

Reports from widely separated parts of Texas to the State Health Department indicate that influenza is on the increase. Recent snows and markedly colder weather account for the upswing in influenza prevalence, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Influenza is believed transmissible from person to person through mucous discharges from the nose and throat. To protect yourself and others from contracting influenza or colds, here are precautions to be followed: Influenza is highly infectious. Practically everyone is susceptible to it. No matter how many times you may have had it, you may contract it again. Therefore, keep away from people who are sneezing, coughing or sniffing, or who are actively ill with colds, influenza or pneumonia.

Keep away from crowded places.

Never use towels, glasses, or personal articles other than your own to which the cold germ might adhere, and always wash your hands before eating.

Keep yourself as fit as possible. Drink plenty of water, eat simple nourishing food, exercise out of doors every day, dress according to the weather, and get plenty of sleep in a well ventilated room.

If you feel an attack of flu, or even what you may think is an ordinary cold, coming on, go to bed. If the cold becomes worse, send for your physician and follow his directions. A cold can too easily develop into a fatal mistake.

of various procedures in potato growing led by authorities on the subject.

Need of an organization to insure a uniform pack and standard grade on all potatoes raised in this territory was stressed. The suggestion was made that the Hillside Hatchery building could be leased as a central warehouse and storage space if growers decided on a co-operative system of storing and marketing.

Mr. Bainer suggested that growers should concentrate on two or three varieties and a quality product which will make a reputation for Hereford spuds. Need for a federal inspector to pass on grades and pack was emphasized in his talk, especially after it became necessary to ship in carload lots to such markets as Chicago.

Mr. Hawkins, speaking from the standpoint of the trucker, said that he would much rather buy from an association where he could drive to a central warehouse and load up, knowing that he was getting a standard grade and pack, than to make a deal with an individual farmer "out in the field."

Mr. Golding stated that when this section had the potatoes to ship, the railroad would set a rate which would be equitable.

The motion was made and seconded that potato growers of this territory organize. The motion carried unanimously. The meeting then adjourned.
