# Recognized As **Big Hog Buyer**

Not many people of Hereford or Deaf Smith county realize the importance of the hog industry to the Plains country, or that in G.



W. Brumley Texas has the State's foremost hog buyer and shipper. The following item from the "Chuck Wagon," a column in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram devoted to the lpterest of Texas stock growers, shows how Mr. Brumley's efforts are appreciated elsewhere:

G. W. Brumley of Hereford was

in Fort Worth Monday. He probably handles more hogs than any other man in Texas, but only a small portion of his hogs come to the Fort Worth market. Last year he shipped about 500 cars of hogs About 20 years ago he began to buy hogs at Hereford. He has his own pens and loading chutes and in addition to buying the hogs that are brought to his pens he buys hogs in other places and brings them to Hereford and sorts them up for shipment. - Fourteen years ago he began to send hogs to California, and has sent more hogs to that state than any other man in Texas, Most of his hogs are marketed in California, only the heavy hogs being sent to the Fort Worth number of friends pleasantly market. He ships to four differsurprised Mrs. Lewis Dyer Fri- ent packing plants in California, day morning, the occasion being and each of them requires a hog of a different weight. He shipped fornia a few years ago. Most of his hogs now go in double decks. For the past nine years he has least one shipment a week to one Dixon, Walter Easter, Green, Hogs are a little scarce in the territory surrounding Hereford due to a feed shortage last year from dry weather. Brumley reported. Brumley says that he sold hogs last year for less money than ever before, but recalls that in 1902 be bought some hogs at \$2.50, and by the time they were ready for market they were selling at \$6. During the past few weeks Brumley has sold and shipped about 20 cars of hogs to old Mexico-most of them beavy hogs. Brumley and his son, recently sold 650 culves they bought in New Mexico, They were sold for shipment to a feedlot in Nebruska. ### **Bone-Setters Honored**

by Surgeons of Note The practice of manipulative surgery, as bone-setting is now called, was known to the ancients. An interesting treatise on dislocation was written by no less a doctor than Hippocrates. There are said to have been successful bone-setters under the Roman Republic. Conservative surgery owes bone-setters a past debt. When it was beginning to establish itself they were the only orthopedic surgeons. Apparently they were recognized as legitimate exponents of their branch of therapeutics. William Cheselden, a noted surgeon of the middle of the Eighteenth century, sent fractures to the bone-setters, admitting that they were more competent than be to treat them.

A century later Sir James Paget urged his professional brethren, through the British Medical Journal, to "learn what was good in the methods of the bone-setter and eschew what was harmful." Still focussing of eyes toward a smartlater, Wharton Hood, another Eng-lish doctor, who greatly admired £1 note protruding from her shoe. # Known to Greek Ladies

For many years archeologists have been searching for "psymith-ton." They have uncovered the ruins of ancient cities, and excavated tombs full of gold and other treasures, all in vain. Nowhere did they find so much as a thimbleful of "psymithion,"

Aristophanes, Pliny and other writers referred to this substance; and from their writings it appeared that it must be some kind of cosmetic. And this plainly appeared from an old Hellenic poem warning the reader "never by the use of psymithion can you make a Helen out of a Hecuba." But this merely excited the curiosity of the archeologists and caused them to dig deeper into the earth, and at last they found what they were looking

Prof. T. # Valuable Right of Way

Less than half a mile of railroad track used by a western gold mine recently yielded over \$5,000 in pay dirt in one month after a weighmaster noticed that the right of way was literally paved with gold. Before the ore was sent through the various processes, each car was weighed, and this was done by pushing it on the scales, then giving it a shove to send it coasting down the track to the mill, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, The weighmaster observed that each time a car was bumped in switch-

ing, a quantity of dust sifted out. A lease was obtained on the threeeighth-mile track and men began as to the method in which they can cleaning it up. Ore valued at \$175,-000 a car has been shipped to this mill, and it has been estimated that the residue dump slone contains unclaimed gold worth \$3,000,000.

### Convenient Oxygen

In Germany "oxygen bricks" are put out in glass jars, designated for use in aquariums. A brick sells for the equivalent of 15 cents. The oxygen is "chemically bound" together, though the name of the binder is not mentioned. It is claimed that these bricks yield 350 times their volume of the life-supporting gas. The bricks may be safely sent by mail. The oxygen substance is not preserved under pressure, hence there is no danger of explosion. The osprey, or fishhawk, as its name implies, lives entirely on fish. It is an expert at hovering above the surface of the water until a fish is seen near the surface, when the osprey dives in a swift, powerful rush which often carries it a foot and a half beneath the surface, but which seldom fails to land its prey. Unfortunately, in areas frequented by eagles, the osprey is often robbed of its catch by the larger bird which seizes the fish while the osprey is in flight away.
