Brand Observes Thirty-Third Birthday With This Issue

With this issue The Brand embarks upon its thirty-fourth year of service in Hereford. The paper first saw the light of day on February 23, 1901. It was then the Hereford Reporter and was operated by F. L. Vanderburg. In 1903 the name was changed to The Brand.

J. Ray, prominent Amarillo business man and holder of extensive properties here, was the next owner. Following Mr. Ray as editor was A. C. Elhott, then B. F. Guthrie. In 1917 the late Seth B. Holman and Earl Gough acquired The Brand. After a few months Mr. Gough went to the World War and Mr. Holman became sole owner.

In 1925 W. R. Steckman became a partner in the business, remaining thus for a year when Mr. Holman again became sole owner. The Nunn-Warren Publishing Company bought the paper in 1929, Mr. Holman retiring because of ill health.

Mr. Holman took the paper over again in 1932, but was not active in its management between that time and his death last July, Mrs. Holman directing the business as she now is and intends to continue doing.

What Panhandle Papers Say

When one considers the number of peanuts roasted in Portales the past season it is enough to drive one nerts. Averaging the number of peanuts to the pound, this makes 71,750,000 peanuts, or 148,000,000 kernels. 


