



Following Rogers' death, Mrs. Rogers gave the steer to the Salvation Army, and he was in turn auctioned to his present owners. He is said to be the largest Hereford steer in the world, and has been exhibited at various points over the na-tion, including the Texas Cen-tennial at Dallas.

The famous steer was calved in Nov., 1930, at the Hill ranch five miles north of Bootleg in this county: Earl Porter, who was then tending the ranch, picked him up out of the first snow and carried him to the ranch house. The steer's mother was a large cow and had pre-




