





More than 1,000 4-H club boys were enrolled, carrying on demonstrations in livestock feeding and managament, poultry, field crop demonstrations with cotton, wheat, grain sorghums, gardens, training in stock judging, insect identification, wildlife conservation farm engineering. Terrace lines for over 27,000 acres were run by club boys trained by the county agricultural agents.
