## Accords are signed at summit

WASHINGTON (AP) - Mikhail S. Gorbachev's economic squeeze on Lithuania moves across center stage at the summit today even as he and President Bush lock in long-sought limits on nuclear missiles and sign a treaty ceasing production of chemical weapons.

Both presidents offered upbeat assessments after their first day of talks on Thursday, despite concluding they would be unable to resolve the issue of German unification before Gorbachev leaves Washington on Sunday.

"The tone was positive," said Bush. "The enemy image is becoming a thing of the past," was Gorbachev's summation.

All was not heavy diplomatic lifting. Gorbachev put his trademark spontaneous style on display when he ordered his limousine stopped during a brief evening ride from the White House to the Soviet Embassy. Wading into a crowd of pedestrians on the sidewalk, he exulted, "I feel really at home here."

Bush offered a light moment at the end of the day. Toasting Gorbachev at a glittering White House state dinner - Maine lobster was on the menu - he said expectations were at a fever pitch for the events of Day Two. "When Barbara and Raisa go to Wellesley College," he deadpanned. The first ladies were traveling there for commencement ceremonies.

There was anticipation aplenty in Washington. The White House said the two men would sign a treaty ending production of chemical weapons and sharply ridding poison gas stockpiles.

An agreement also was ready for their signatures outlining agreement on major points of a treaty to scale back long-range nuclear weapons. Accompanying it was a pledge to pursue deeper reductions after the first treaty is completed.

The treaty, nearly a decade in negotiations, will eventually reduce stockpiles of long range nuclear missiles, bombers and submarines, by 30 to 35 percent. From the U.S. viewpoint, the key provision will halve the number of Soviet SS-18 missiles capable of reaching the United States.

The pact on chemical weapons would halt production of poison gas and reduce each country's stockpiles to 5,000 tons. The United States currently has about 25,000 tons and the Soviet Union twice that amount. Bush called the pacts "proof that differences can be resolved - even while others remain."

## Ideas for area park announced in Amarillo

Results of a feasibility study for an "old West" theme park in Amarillo were highly encouraging, it was announced Thursday by Pat Kaiser, resource developer for the Area Agency on Aging and a leader for the park development.

Park profits would benefit senior citizens of the Texas Panhandle, through an endowment fund set up by Yesterday's Children Inc., a non-profit organization, said Kaiser.

Results of the study were announced Thursday afternoon at a news conference in the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission office. The conference drew Amarillo leaders, representatives from area senior citizen associations, and news media. Margie Daniels, director of the Hereford Senior Citizens Association, was accompanied by several board members as well as Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher, C of C Manager Mike Carr and Brand publisher O.G. Nieman.

A historical theme village was selected as the basis for the park, which is yet to be named. The theme for the park is the Old West as it was around the turn of the century, and the concept includes gated and non-gated attractions developed along the lines of Silver Dollar City in Branson, Mo.

The proposed gated attraction will replicate a town as it was at the turn of the century with workers in period costumes engaged in the crafts and occupations of the time. Planned for this section are a wide range of crafts,

demonstrations and sales, a steam locomotive with period cars, an open-air theater, and a wide range of entertainment offerings. It would be open in the summer.

The non-gated roadside village is envisioned as operating much like Knott's Berry Farm, where the village is open year around with highway and local market focus. This part of the park will include exhibitions, a large family-style restaurant, a free children's play area, a tourist center to feature area and state attractions, and a store with crafts and merchandise.

Kaiser said at Silver Dollar City, a cottage industry of about 2,000 craftsmen off the park site has developed to support the 35 to 45 craftsmen working on site. She emphasized the regional aspect of the effort.

"If we get them to stay overnight in Amarillo, we may get them to go to Palo Duro State Park, or Caprock Canyons State Park at Quitaque, or the Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Hereford, or some other Panhandle attraction." She also emphasized that the project must be one of "quality."

The study recommended a site east of Amarillo on the north side of Interstate 40. Figures show that an estimated 7.3 million visitors pass through Amarillo each year, with more than 1 million staying overnight.

Don Stewart, a principal partner in the California-based Economic Consulting Services, did the

feasibility study. He has been involved in studies and projects such as Walt Disney World in Orlando, Fla., Worlds of Fun in Kansas City, Mo., the Donald Trump complex in Atlantic City, N.J., and Circus Circus in Las Vegas, Nev.

Stewart estimates 9.6 million people to be the total market available to the park at its planned opening date in 1992. He estimates 1992 attendance at the gated attraction to be 335,000.

The study projects revenues of \$6.7 million in 1992, reaching \$10.5 million by 1996. This potential represents a substantial return on the estimated \$15 million construction cost.

Kaiser said \$5,000 to \$6,000 of the \$16,000 feasibility study must still be raised, and then \$250,000 is need for architectural plan work. Yesterday's Children is sponsoring a public awareness event from noon to 6 p.m. on June 23 to introduce Panhandle residents to regional artists and artisans.

"Thunder on the High Plains" is the name of the event, which will also make people aware of the organization's plans for tourism. It will be held at Sam Houston Park on Western Street, south of 6th Street.

Kaiser said grant requests will be submitted to foundations, corporations and other entities to get needed seed money for the park project. She estimated it might take about \$3 million to get needed financing to start construction of the project.

## Williams airs racial allegations

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican Clayton Williams' campaign says Democratic opponent Ann Richards' media tactics is using "Willie Horton tactics."

But, Williams' camp praised the "Willie Horton" ads used in 1988 by GOP presidential candidate George Bush.

Bush used the case of Horton, a black inmate who attacked a white woman while on furlough from a Massachusetts prison, to say that Democratic presidential candidate Michael Dukakis was weak on crime. Democrats said that ad was racist.

On Thursday, Williams' press spokesman Gordon Hensley said the "Willie Horton" ads were honest and effective.

But he tagged Richards' media consultant, Robert Squire for producing an ad in the Michigan governor's race that had racial overtones.

The Richards campaign said Williams' charge signalled the end of his pledge not to sling mud.

"We regret the fact that his campaign has taken this direction," said Ms. Richards' press secretary, Monte Williams.

The Squire ad in question promotes Blanchard's support of boot camps for young, first-time criminals. The ad shows a white guard yelling at a white inmate and then a black inmate and then shows a group of inmates, most of them black, scrubbing a prison floor.

Several black legislators in Michigan criticized Blanchard for running the ad.

Hensley said that since Blanchard ran the ad in the rural areas, instead of Detroit, "leads one to believe that there was some other agenda."

## Twisters rip in Spearman

SPEARMAN (AP) - The downtown area and a residential section of this Panhandle city were recovering today from three twisters that did \$5.5 million worth of damage in 30 minutes.

The tornadoes struck Spearman between 8:20 p.m. and 8:50 p.m., said Department of Public Safety Trooper Wayne Beigle in Amarillo.

The storms were among 10 tornadoes spotted in the area Thursday night, he said. No injuries were reported, but about 80 percent of the city was blacked out and phone service was spotty.

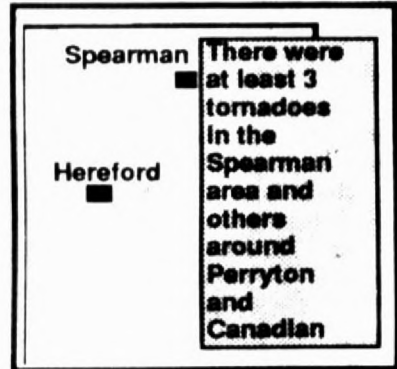
"We were up there until 1 (a.m.), and there were still tornadoes dancing around. They were all over the place," Beigle said. "None touched the ground - they were hovering just above the ground, but that was enough to do the damage."

Ten mobile homes and ten stationery houses were reported destroyed, Beigle said. Spearman Mayor Burl Buchanan said some of the mobile homes were "smoothed off to the ground."

The mayor estimated that 5 percent of the town had property damage. He said early warning that gave people time to take shelter prevented injuries.

"The Lord blessed us. We came through extremely well," he said. "It could have been a lot worse."

The Church of Christ was demolished, while IV's Hungry Cowboy, a barbecue restaurant, was seriously damaged.



"(The storm) blew the porch off and blew it back on top of the building. It just flipped it up and laid it up on top of the roof," Buchanan said.

He said the downtown building housing his business, the Hansford Insurance Agency, and a lawyer's office next door also sustained heavy roof and water damage.

Many homes had damaged windows and roofs, and some power lines were reported down. Buchanan said tree limbs and one mobile home needed to be cleared from streets to make them passable.

Electricity and other utilities were restored by this morning, Buchanan said.

The DPS sent extra troopers to assess the damage and assist local officials. Buchanan said the Red Cross and Salvation Army were set up to aid the city, but that so far, no one had requested shelter. Buchanan said those whose houses sustained heavy damage probably would stay with neighbors or family.

## Judge will issue school fund ruling

AUSTIN (AP) - The Senate Education Committee chairman says some schools could be hurt today when a court-appointed master recommends a "Robin Hood" plan taking state money from wealthier school districts and giving it to poor ones.

"I think they're going to inflict some pain on some school districts ... I think the court's going to tie up \$1 billion of money," said state Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur. That is the amount of state aid scheduled to be distributed this summer to schools.

Court master William Kilgarlin is recommending the plan because the Legislature and Gov. Bill Clements have yet to reform the school finance system as ordered by the Texas Supreme Court. The court said unanimously last year more money must be made available to poor school districts.

"You will be able to tell by that (plan) how much state money is taken away from one school district and how much goes to another," Kilgarlin told The Associated Press.

Kilgarlin said he had no choice but to propose reallocating state money because he lacks the authority to raise taxes. The \$13.5 billion-a-year school system relies on state aid, local property taxes and some federal funds.

Kilgarlin's Friday proposal is a preliminary one. His final plan isn't due to be filed until June 21 with State District Judge Scott McCown, who is overseeing school finance reform.

McCown earlier extended the Supreme Court's May 1 deadline for enacting reforms until today to give legislators and the governor more time to find a solution. They didn't, and their third special session on the subject ended Wednesday without a plan.

Also today, McCown is to consider how the approximately \$1 billion in state aid due to be sent to schools this summer will be distributed - or whether it should be held back until the start of the new school year or Sept. 1. The next state payment is scheduled to go out June 25.

Clements met with House Speaker Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and other legislative leaders at the Governor's Mansion Thursday in another effort to produce a school finance reform compromise.

The attempt to reach an agreement was "the most positive meeting I've been in to date," Parker said. Talks were to continue today.

Negotiators said they were making progress on items such as funding formulas and changing the way the education system operates. But they said they had not yet discussed paying for reform.

The Republican governor killed two previous school finance reform plans approved by the Democrat-controlled Legislature after objecting to a sales tax increase needed to fund them.

Clements has not given a firm starting date for another special session on school finance, but he said he may reconvene the Legislature on Monday. He said he believes lawmakers have until June 21 to devise a reform plan.

Assistant Attorney General Kevin O'Hanlon, representing the state, said the \$1 billion in school payments should go to the state's 1,050 school districts as scheduled this summer.

"Let's not hurt a bunch of kids that are going to get summer programming" by taking money from some districts, he said.

# Hogs, 'Horns squabbling over who won SWC all-sports title

HOUSTON (AP) - The on-the-field sports competition in the Southwest Conference has ended for the 1989-90 school year, but the Texas Longhorns and Arkansas Razorbacks have found something to continue fighting over.

Arkansas, reigning SWC champion in football, basketball and baseball, issued a news release May 21 announcing the university had won the mythical SWC men's all-sports title by one-half point over Texas.

The Longhorns say no way, claiming in their release issued Wednesday that Arkansas officials need to check their arithmetic.

"I wouldn't have sent a release out if Arkansas hadn't claimed this," said Bill Little, Texas' sports information director. "But they're wrong. I called Bo Carter (the SWC's director of publicity) in the conference office to make sure I was right about this and he assured me I was."

Actually, the SWC office wants to remain neutral.

"We have to," Carter said. "This is something the conference doesn't officially recognize."

Arkansas SID Rick Schaeffer doesn't care what UT says.

"We won it," Schaeffer said. "Texas can do or say whatever it

wants, but we won the title. We're putting our name on the trophy for 1990."

Little said Texas won by half a point because Arkansas counted Houston in football, even though the Cougars were on probation and not eligible for the SWC championship.

"Arkansas was figuring in Houston as the second-place finisher in football," Little said. "But that's wrong. If you can't finish first, you can't finish second, either. So instead of finishing fifth the way Arkansas said we did, we actually finished tied for fourth. That's the difference."

Schaeffer disagrees.

The SWC has "always counted the teams that were on probation (in league standings)," Schaeffer said. "We did when SMU was on probation and we did when Texas A&M was on probation. We counted Houston's games this year, so we should count them in this, too."

Houston defeated Texas 47-9 last November.

UH Athletic Director Rudy Davalos agrees with Schaeffer.

"Our football game with Texas counts to a lot of people," Davalos said. "It counts to us. If it doesn't count, why play it?"

Davalos has a solution to the controversy. "They ought to have a trophy for football and basketball, the revenue sports," he said. "Then it would be Arkansas first and Houston second."

The Longhorns and Razorbacks can't even agree on how to add up the points.

Texas uses a system of nine points for first place and one point for ninth place in each sport. Arkansas does it the other way around (one for first and nine for ninth), meaning the lowest point total wins.

No matter how it's figured, the other schools finished way behind Arkansas and Texas. In Arkansas' list, A&M was third, 16 points behind Texas. Houston was fourth, followed by Baylor, TCU, Rice, SMU and Texas Tech.

In Texas' calculation, A&M also was third, 16 points behind Arkansas. But Houston was seventh because the Cougars didn't receive any points for football. TCU was fourth, Baylor fifth and Rice sixth. SMU finished eighth and Tech was last.

Little also points out Arkansas was mistaken about another piece of information.

"Arkansas is claiming to be the only school to win football, basket-

ball and baseball in the same year," Little said. "We've done it seven times and Texas A&M did it in 1986."

For the record, Texas also claimed the mythical all-sports title for women's athletics this year by winning six sports outright and tying with Arkansas for the basketball title.

"Texas dominates women's sports, so they would like to see a combined trophy," Schaeffer said.

"DeLoss Dodds (the UT athletic director) told one of the Arkansas writers that last week. But he didn't deny we won the men's title."

Since the conference doesn't recognize an all-sports winner, the entire subject is somewhat moot.

"We've never done it before because the whole thing is mythical anyway," Little said. "There is no all-sports trophy."

Schaeffer knows better because there is a trophy in Fayetteville.

"We had one made up several years ago," Schaeffer said.

So what do you do when another school wins the title?

"We send out a release saying they won it," Schaeffer said. "But we don't give them our trophy. If Texas wants to go out and buy their own, that's fine. But they aren't getting ours."

# NCAA places Clemson on one-year probation

CLEMSON, S.C. (AP) - The NCAA verdict on Clemson is in: No television sanctions. No bowl sanctions. No recruiting restrictions. No loss of scholarships.

The Tigers received less than the maximum - by a football field or more.

The NCAA, finding what it said were two major violations that involved two players receiving money, sentenced the Clemson football program to one year's probation Thursday.

Did Clemson, which first found out in late August the NCAA was looking into possible rule violations, get off lightly? University president Max Lennon insisted that was not the case.

"Probation is extremely serious, and we take probation at Clemson very seriously," Lennon said during a news conference. "So we are not off the hook."

But Lennon and the other Clemson officials obviously know the penalties could have been much more severe.

"I'm breathing a lot easier," first-year Coach Ken Hatfield said.

In announcing its decision, the NCAA Committee on Infractions said it found that on at least two occasions in the fall of 1985, an athlete received and distributed cash payments of \$50 to \$70 to a teammate.

In the original charge, a coach was alleged to have given the player the money. But in its final report the committee deleted the reference to the coach.

"They were able to determine the player got the money and believed it to be a violation, but they could not determine where the money came from," university spokeswoman Catherine Sams said.

The committee also determined that in the spring of 1987, the athlete got \$50 in cash from an unidentified booster. The school has been instructed by the NCAA to disassociate itself from the booster.

Under NCAA guidelines, Clemson could have been placed on two years' probation and been ruled ineligible for one year to go to a bowl game and be on television. The program could also have faced possible reduction in grant-in-aids and restrictions on off-campus recruiting.

The committee said it did not levy the maximum penalties called for by NCAA policy because there were only two major violations, and they were limited in nature. The committee also found no pattern of violations.

Moreover, the committee found the violations did not occur because of a lack of institutional control and also said the university cooperated with the NCAA in its investigation.

## Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 50-year-old female and I started my change four years ago. My doctor prescribed Premarin and Provera for hot flashes. Last year I was hospitalized and treated for depression for four weeks. I read in your column that Provera can cause depression. I discussed my concern with my doctor and expressed the desire to discontinue the medication because of my continued depression and excessive facial hair growth on my upper lip and cheeks. The facial hair is very distressing to me.

My doctor says it is necessary for me to be on the medication. He said the hair growth could be worse without the medication and it was necessary to prevent osteoporosis later in life.

I still have a period when I discontinue the medication for five days. I wish to discontinue taking the Provera and Premarin for at least a few months to see if my periods have stopped and hopefully my depression will cease. Would you send me a copy of Special Report 97, The Menopause and Beyond?

DEAR READER: There remains a great deal of confusion about the need for, and reason for, prescribing progestins along with estrogen. The main reason for prescribing progestins such as Provera is to protect women from an increased risk of cancer of the endometrium of the uterus. It does offset the increased risk of endometrial cancer from taking estrogen. However, the risk of endometrial cancer is actually small if you look at the statistics. Women who are followed regularly by their doctor are almost always detected soon enough for a complete cure if one does occur.

You probably misunderstood your doctor. Progestins DO NOT prevent osteoporosis later in life. Estrogen DOES. There are estrogen receptors on the bone cells of women that enable new bone to be formed. That is why estrogen is so important in this respect.

Progesterone can cause a depression or make a depression worse. To understand progesterone you need to realize that it is used to form testosterone, the male hormone. It can increase facial hair, raise the cholesterol and may even increase the risk of breast cancer. Estrogen does not, and in general has the opposite action of progesterone. Progesterone's opposite action is how it reduces the risk of endometrial cancer. But at what price?

Review Special Report 97, The Menopause and Beyond, which I am sending you and share it with your doctor. Others who want this report can send \$2 with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to THE HEALTH LETTER/97, P.O. Box 19622, Irvine, CA 92713.

You should not stop your medications without your doctor's agreement. Every patient is an individual case and what is right for one is not for the next. However, my own opinion in view of the continued new information is that many women would do well to use estrogen with careful follow-up by their doctor and avoid progestins until some serious questions have been answered — one of which is the role of progestins in increasing the risk of breast cancer, if it does. Incidentally, even the Physicians' Desk Reference notes that Beagle dogs treated with Provera developed mammary nodules, some of which were malignant. Also with your history of depression, you would need very careful evaluation of that problem if you are to continue Provera along with your estrogen.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My husband and I enjoy a cocktail and a glass of wine with our evening meal. We are both in our early 60s. A friend of mine told me that this was bad for the heart. I had always believed that a little alcohol was good for the heart. I have read it improves your cholesterol.

DEAR READER: In one of the latest reports from the National Institutes of Health ongoing study of the Framing-

ham, Mass., study, doctors have concluded that anyone past 50 would be better off not drinking any alcohol at all — even that evening cocktail or a glass of wine with dinner.

Even small amounts of alcohol increase the size of the heart muscle and cause it to be more susceptible to dangerous heart irregularities. It is particularly dangerous for individuals who already have any evidence of an enlarged heart muscle.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** What affliction is more common than cancer, cerebral palsy, tuberculosis, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy and AIDS combined? What affliction did Hammurabi's Code mention and Hippocrates insist began in the brain and was not caused by supernatural forces? What affliction was shared by Mohammed, Julius Caesar, Dostoyevski and many

other famous and accomplished people? Epilepsy is the hidden disability that society will not accept. The vast majority of epileptics, myself included, are partly to blame for this unfortunate situation. When these people hide their disorder, they accept society's ignorant and fearful proclamation that epileptics are freaks and cannot live normal lives.

I can't sign my name to this letter for fear that I will not get another job. I was fired from a college position after a seizure and was told that I should not be working with the public because I might frighten someone.

The reaction of many people to even a mild seizure is fear and revulsion. Epilepsy can affect anyone from a genius to an idiot and is in no way a sign of mental retardation or emotional illness. In most cases, it can be controlled by medication.

Epileptic seizures (or convulsions) occur when the electrical signals of one group of brain cells overwhelm neighboring parts of the brain. The symptoms vary and include a brief cessation of activity and a blank stare, uncontrollable twitching that spreads

from the fingers to one side of the body, uncharacteristic and sometimes bizarre behavior, a fall as the body stiffens, and then sleep.

If you are with someone who has a seizure, guide that person to a safe place. Remain calm. Remember this is not the movies. He or she is not "going crazy" and will not harm anyone. After the seizure has passed, tell the person what has happened. In most cases, the epileptic will not be aware that anything occurred. Make no references to the seizure on future occasions. Continue to treat that person as you have in the past. - No Name No Place
