#### LARGE PART OF MOISTURE IS RETAINED IN SMALL PASTURE FURROWS

Following recommendations of the Hereford SCS offices, contour furrows and ridges have aided in storing millions of gallens of water from recent heavy rains in the range lands of the Southern Great Plains, where the moisture will be available for grass growth next spring.

SCS co-operators in Deaf Smith County were among the first in the nation to start experimenting with pasture furrowing on a large scale and even lyast year, reviews of progress made in this area were given attention in Washington and in regional offices.

around private property. "Red Cross public health nurses made more than 1,000,000 visits to or on behalf of the sick during the past twelve months. They are carrying out their work in communities where nursing and medical ald are not readily available, including isolated islands in the sea. At the same time, these nurses have examined 559,187 school children for possible physical defects that needed correction, and where it was found necessary the proper treatment was arranged.

"Under the Red Cross First Ald and Life Saving services, 295,028 persons have been qualified to stop bleeding, treat for shock, splint fractures and give other emergency treatment following accidents, and 88,149 persons have been trained in life saving and water safety in an effort to bring about drastic reductions in death from drowning.
