Rites Held Here For R. J. Kibbe, Hereford Pioneer

Funeral services for R. J. Kibbe, 82-year-old father of Harry Kibbe of Hereford, were held from the First Christian Church here Wednesday afternoon.

Mr. Kibbe died last Tuesday at the home of his son, Dr. C. T. Kibbe, at Elida, New Mexico, while visiting there.

Mr. Kibbe had been a resident of Texas since 1891. Over half a century ago, Mr. Kibbe settled near the present location of Hereford. A true pioneer, he served in many ways to help build the community.

Mr. Kibbe moved with his family to Deaf Smith County, Texas in March, 1891, where he has since lived until his death.

He played a great part in the development of this country being among the first to recognize the value of registered Hereford Cattle, which have since become one of the leading industries of this country.

He helped organize the First National Bank and was a director until failing health forced him to resign.

Mr. Kibbe was county Commissioner at the time the present Court House was built and for ten years thereafter.

Dove Season To Open September 1

Deaf Smith county dove hunters who are eagerly awaiting the opening of the hunting season at 7 a. m. Friday, September 1, have been warned that a number of rules have been set down by the game department pertaining to dove hunting.

Most important among the rules to be observed are these: Neither species, mourning or white winged, may be shot with a weapon other than a shotgun, and these must not be larger than a 10-gauge.

Repeating or automatic shotguns must be permanently plugged to a three-shell capacity. Baiting doves is prohibited.

The daily bag limit is 15 in the aggregate of both species, and the possession limit is the same number.

Shooting hours are from 7 a. m. to sunset. It is illegal to shoot from a moving vehicle.

It is unlawful to hunt outside of your own county without a license. It is unlawful to shoot any gun or fire arms in, on, along or across any public road in this state.

Reports from reliable sources state that hunters can expect one of the most bountiful seasons this year that have been witnessed in several years.

The season will close on October 31.

The foundation planting is planned to give the most modern effect of broken lines rather than the brushy massed effect too often seen. The County Home Demonstration Council is sponsoring a food sale on Saturday, September 2, at the Bellah Grocery Store. Baked products and dressed chickens will be featured.

The Style Show concludes the years work in clothing for the 4-H club girls will be held in the District Court Room at 2:30 p. m., Saturday, September 2. Each girl will present a written account of work done, her well equipped sewing box, and one item from each of these four groups: 1. Work Clothes: Pot holder, cup or hand towel, kitchen apron, smock, culotte, slacks, shorts with halter or shirt. 2. Sleeping and Lounging Garments: as: Gowns, pajamas, housecoat, robe, etc. 3. Underclothing: Slips, panties, brassieres. 4. Dresses: School, sport, afternoon or party. Club girls who complete a years work may be awarded sterling silver 4-H Club pins.

"Starring Tomatoes" has been mailed to all home demonstration club members. This folder, C-147 contains recipes for canning tomatoes and tomato juice to conserve vitamin C content. "This health giving vitamin is not lost if the cut tomatoes and juice are exposed to the air as little as possible, if there is no delay between the steps of preparing, precooking, processing, and cooling after processing." Mrs. J. E. Dyer of Ford expects a bumper crop of tomatoes and plans to purchase a Sepsol for quick preparation of tomato juice.

Everbearing strawberries planted in September begin bearing in early spring while plants set in the spring may not produce berries until fall. Everbearing Gem plants secured from Mrs. Nolle Elliston produced all summer in several gardens in the county. Those were set out in spring.

Mastodon Everbearing plants produce more than other varieties in the J. A. Buehler garden. "I plan to destroy these plants" Mrs. Carl Wimberley says of a variety which grows well but produces only one crop of fruit each year. Plant costs ranged from 25c per 100 to \$2.00 per thousand in lots of 30,000 bought cooperatively by the Cass County Home Demonstration Council in 1939.

Mrs. T. J. Straufuss says that her Bison tomato plants will produce ripe fruits about two weeks before Break-O-Day. The total production of the two varieties at present would seem to be about the same. The Improved Porters are also loaded with green fruit. Endive, which should be grown and served as lettuce has been planted in the fall garden along with a variety of "greens."

Three-fourths of the farm land of the country now has been photographed from the air government officials report. By 1940 they plan to have a map of every farm in the nation. The combined maps, if fitted together, would make a map as large as the states of Connecticut and Rhode Island combined.

The new dormitories will have 1310 rooms and house 2620 of the students expected to attend the college this year. For the first time in several years there will be space enough to care for the entire student body in the halls or in the several project houses on the campus.

## SEEDS of ADVICE

Numerous requests from farmers for peach borer control information are being answered with recommendations for use of ethylene bi-chloride emulsion instead of the old stand-by, paradichlorobenzene, according to R. R. Reppert, entomologist of the Texas A. and M. College extension service.

The new treatment has been developed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Reppert lists the advantage of the emulsion over the P. C. B. system as follows; It is safer to use, especially in the case of young trees, less soil preparation is needed, mounding is unnecessary and the cost is less.

The insecticide is made by emulsifying ethylene chloride with potash, fish oil and water to form a stock, or concentrated, emulsion containing 50 per cent of ethylene chloride. For use this is diluted with water, the strength depending on the age and size of the peach tree to which the application is made. A dilution of 25 per cent of ethylene chloride is recommended for average size trees 6 years old or older, and 7 1/2 per cent for year old trees, and intermediate dilution for trees between these limits. Specific information can be obtained from the County Agriculture and Home Demonstration agents.

The entomologist emphasizes that the ethylene chloride treatment applies only to the peach borer—the worm that causes damage to the base of the trunk just below the ground line. It is not recommended for control of the shot hole and the other borers that work in the branches and trunk of the tree above the ground.

## Westway H-D Club Meets Thursday

"Foods containing vitamin A should be eaten every day to promote growth in children and to supply the healing substance in adults," stated Miss Sadye Lee Oliver, CHDA at the meeting held last Thursday afternoon at the home of Mrs. A. C. Pierce. Again Miss Oliver stressed the importance of eating some green or yellow vegetables once every day, and then entered into the discussion of food varieties of vegetables to grow in the fall garden.

Chinese Rose, Black Spanish, and Strasburg are good radish varieties. Only a few seeds should be sown at a time as they will make in three weeks and by sowing oftener tender, fresh radishes can be kept on hand. They can be wrapped in waxed paper and put in school lunches during the winter thus adding zest to the usual lunch fare.

If head lettuce is desired, a variety of head lettuce should be planted. It should be planted in cool weather, in a very rich soil, and get lost of water.

The Japanese Shogoin turnip is a good variety. It is often catalogued as louse-proof as the leaves grow up and the bugs have no place to hide. The leaves do not contain as much sulphur as some varieties and the root is good.

Detroit Dark Red beets is an excellent variety to choose. It is very red. Beet seeds should be soaked in water all night to soften the woody coat which contains two or three seeds.

"Savoy" means in vegetables what seersucker does in cloth. So savoy cabbage means crinkled leaf cabbage. Cornell savoy cabbage has much of the sulphur bred out of it. This with Tender-green Chinese Cabbage, Shogoin turnips, and Chinese cabbage can be used like mustard at any age.

Swiss chard, after freezing down, can be mulched and provide very early greens. Kohl-rabi also makes good greens.

Acme Rotenone Garden Guard is a good insecticide for must-

ard and Chinese cabbage. Arsenic is always poisonous, but rotenone will lose its poisonous qualities in two or three days. This insecticide can be obtained from the West Texas Feed and Seed at Hereford for 35 cents per can.

At the close of the discussion Miss Oliver explained the Texas Hospital's Low Cost Plan for Hospital Care.

After the business session Mrs. Pierce served canned peach pie made by the recipe given at a recent council meeting. The recipe given was as follows:

**CANNED PEACH PIE**  
Use pre-baked fluted pastry shell. Cover bottom of shell 1/4 inch deep with fruit glaze. Arrange canned, sliced peaches attractively. Cover with hot glaze, cool and serve.

**FRUIT GLAZE**  
This fruit glaze gives a clear bodied pie:  
Juice from can of peaches, plus water to make 1 cup, 4 teaspoons cornstarch 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar (depending upon whether a sugar syrup is used in canning) Yellow coloring if desired.

Add cornstarch to 1/4 of juice. Bring rest of juice and water to boil. Pour in cornstarch and cook just until the starch clears (about one minute.) Add sugar and bring back to boil stirring continuously. Use while hot.

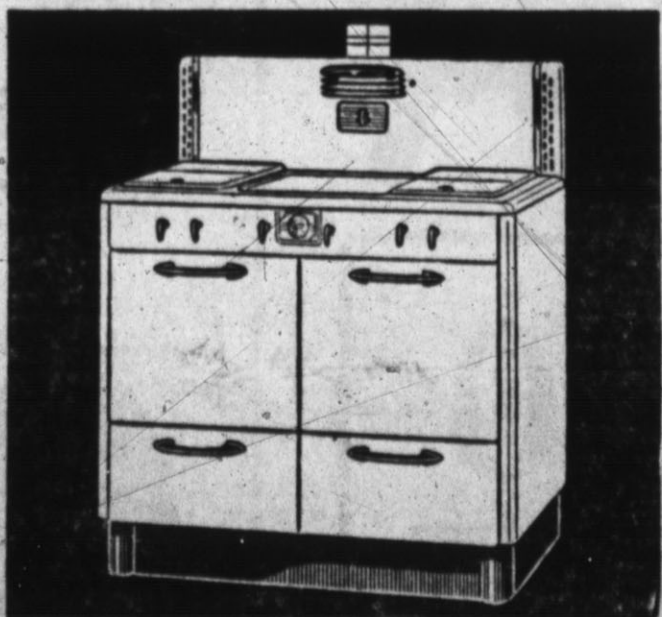

McDonald Observatory, built by the University of Texas and operated jointly with the University of Chicago has been described by testing engineers as the most perfect astronomical laboratory in the world.

(Continued from Page 1) mortgage insurance was \$11.92 per month. To this would be added one twelfth of the fire and other hazard insurance. The above figure is based on the maximum term of 25 years. FHA loans for building homes may be made for any amount up to 90 per cent of the FHA valuation. Mr. Sikes stressed the fact that the Federal Housing Administration does not lend any money, but that all loans are made by banks, mortgage companies, building and loan associations and other lending institutions holding a contract of insurance with the Administration and they are insured against loss on all eligible loans. He said, "The FHA pays particular attention to the location of the building site, and requires sound construction and a plan calling for good design and a convenient floor plan arrangement. At least three inspections are made during the period of construction to determine if the plans and specifications are being followed. It is not necessary that an architect be employed to prepare plans, but their services should be used wherever possible." He stated that complete information concerning FHA loans for new construction as well as modernization loans had been given dealers in Hereford who will be glad to advise with those interested in any phase of the modernization or building program.
