The Congress of the United States of America having designated "November 11 of each year" a National Legal Holiday, "dedicated to the cause of world peace"; and

I, as Mayor of Hereford, take pleasure in proclaiming Friday, November 11, 1938, a holiday in and for the City of Hereford, and further ask that all business firms observe the occasion by closing their doors in honor of the occasion and in tribute of the men who served our country loyally and faithfully; and since

While those attending the m ings felt that regulations sooner or later be placed on the use of shallow-water far irriga-tion, they generally opposed the proposed bill, which in brief pro-

Would Tax Farmers To provide for the placing of control of all underground water in the hands of the State Board of Water Engineers, the levying of fixed charges including \$5 for presentation of desire to use grou water, \$5 for filing application to appropriate such water and \$1.50 for filing each necessary docume such as plat or map; also levying of the following fees-five cents an acre each gear on all irrigable land, a two-tenths of a mill for each thousand gallons of water used by municipalities and threetenths of a mill for each thousand gallons used industrially.

The board would also have the power to grant or deny applications for the drilling of new wells or the change of equipment in existing wells. 


