Christmas will mean something to a large number of small tots in this area, thanks to a toy manufacturing room, established as a subsidary of the WPA sew-ing room, under the direction of Miss Jonnie Estes,

Miss Jonnie Estes.

Five persons, three men and two women, have for the past month been assigned to the toy room, and during that time have turned out more than 100 toys; they expect to swell the number to 150 by Christmas. The toys, despite lack of quality materials and proper tools, are attractive and have a "finished appearance" not usually found in home-made articles.

Included in the toys, many

factured are cradles, doll beds, toy windmills, all kinds of ani-mals of wood and cloth construc-tion, filing cases, foot stools and various other articles of doll furniture,

The workers have exclusively The workers have exclusively used boxes which they procured at stores, old refuse humber at different places and such scraps as they could find around lumber yards. While the men shaped most of the toys, the women have painted, varnished and retouched the toys, giving them the appearance of commercially manufactured toys.
