Deaf Smith County Requests Highway Paving

Deaf Smith and Oldham counties' plea that Highway 51 be paved and that the Harrison Highway be taken over by the state was answered with the promise to take the matter under consideration, the Hereford delegation reported. The group left Friday, presented the county's case Saturday to the State Highway Commission and returned from Austin Sunday.

While there the group were informed that title to Hereford State Park had been turned back to Deaf Smith county. Several weeks ago, the county requested that the state settle the question of title to the park, either by fulfilling its original agreement, or by turning the land back to the county.

Deaf Smith county also has received a refund of \$8,000 on the state road bond assumption program.

With an estimated crowd of 235 persons, the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last night drew a large attendance from Amarillo, Canyon, Dimmitt, Farwell, Pampa, Borger, Dalhart and Panhandle, in addition to over 200 Hereford and nearby residents. The meal was served at the Main Street Showroom of Ireland Motor Co.

The program was opened with the invocation by A. O. Thompson, followed by introduction of the guests by Rev. James Aiken, Jr., toastmaster.

In the annual report of the Chamber of Commerce, E. B. Posey, secretary, stated that Hereford and Deaf Smith county is faced with the serious problem of developing the irrigation resources of this territory. He told of the publicity campaign of the Chamber which has drawn responses and inquiries from many states of the union.

Second report was given by J. B. Stokery, president of the Irrigation Association, who told something of the work of that organization. He was followed by Jim Williams, Farm Security Administration Supervisor for this county. Reporting work of the Hereford Potato Growers Association, he told of plans to build (Continued on Page 12)

Directors Vote To Incorporate Potato Association

That the Hereford Potato Growers Association would incorporate and that a charter would be applied for next week, was announced after a meeting of the Board of Directors Monday night. Meeting with the directors were Henry Wilkinson and R. P. Durrrough of the Regional FSA office, Amarillo, and Jim Williams, local FSA supervisor. After a discussion of articles of incorporation and by-laws, the board decided to incorporate with a capital stock of \$10,000, \$6,000 of which is to be paid in cash.

There will be 100 shares of common stock with a par value of \$25 per share, and 1500 shares of preferred stock with a par value of \$5 per share. Each grower who is a member of the association will be paid in cash. (Continued on Page 12)

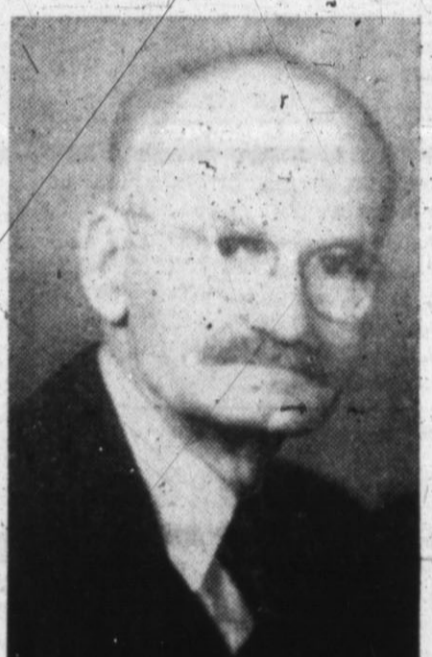
Interment was made yesterday afternoon in a cemetery at Plano, Texas. The body was taken overland yesterday morning, leaving Hereford at 5 o'clock.

shrubs, trees should be placed in groups, not in rows. It is wise to use only shrubs and perennial flowers which are hardy. The Department receives thousands of letters from applicants and recipients and attempts to acknowledge receipt of all of these letters and to give any complaints received attention at the earliest possible date. In addition to letters from applicants and recipients personally, however, the Department receives other thousands of letters written by public officials or other interested persons in behalf of applicants or recipients.

Officials of the Department of Public Welfare wish to make clear that these latter letters in behalf of old persons will receive attention as quickly as possible. The Department, however, finds that it cannot, each time, upon receipt of a letter from a public official or other interested person, acknowledge receipt of the letter to the writer and, at the same time, advise the old person about whom the letter was written that someone had written to the State Office in his behalf.

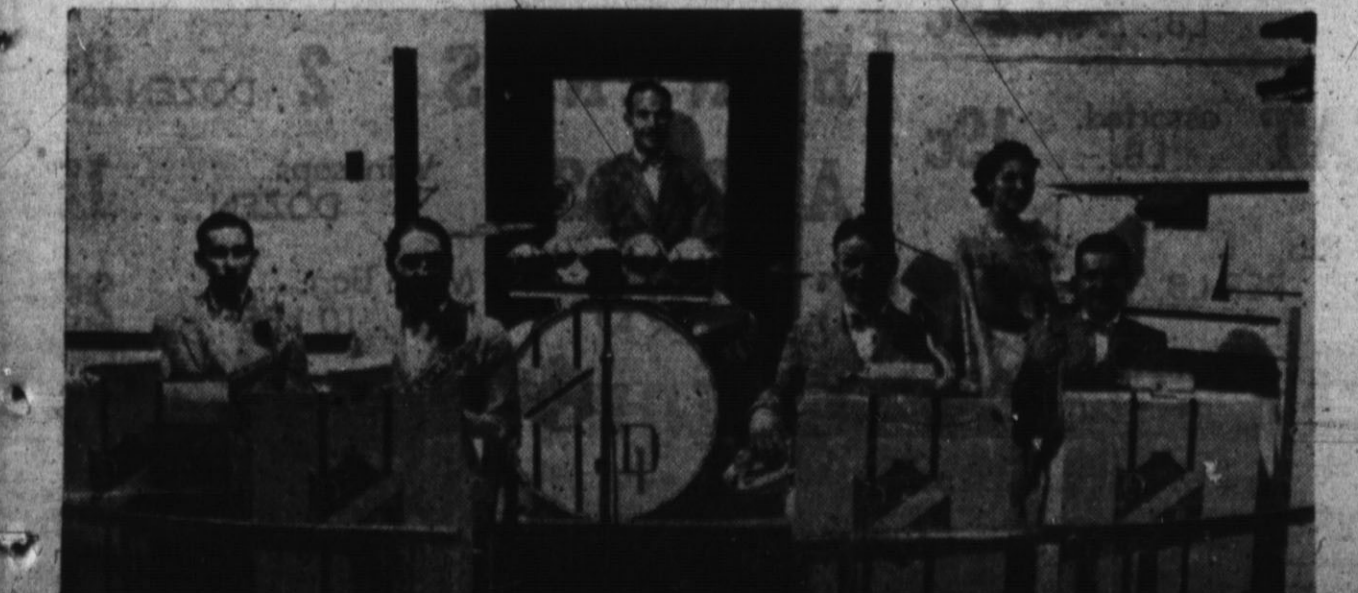

ORDINANCE NO. 294

An ordinance to be known as ordinance No. 294 prohibiting the construction, maintenance or operation of oil and/or gasoline storage tanks, in the City of Hereford, at any place north of the main tracks of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company or north of the main tracks of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company, and to provide a penalty or penalties for violating the same.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Hereford:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any firm, per-

son or corporation to construct, maintain or operate a storage tank for gasoline, kerosene, or any kind of oil, with a capacity of more than 550 gallons, in any part of the City of Hereford lying and being north of the main tracks of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company or north of the main tracks of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Section 2. Any person, firm or corporation, who shall hereafter construct, maintain or operate as owner or employee, a storage tank for gasoline, kerosene, or any kind of oil, of a capacity of more than 550 gallons, in the City of Hereford, at any place north of the main tracks of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or north of the main tracks of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful hereafter for any firm, person or corporation to construct, maintain or operate a storage tank for gasoline, kerosene or any kind of oil, above the surface of the ground, with a capacity of 50 gallons and not exceeding 550 gallons, in the City of Hereford at any place north of the main tracks of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or north of the main tracks of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Section 4. Any person, firm or corporation who shall hereafter construct, maintain or operate as owner or employee, a storage tank for gasoline, kerosene or any kind of oil, above the surface of the ground, with a capacity of as much as 50 gallons and not exceeding 550 gallons, in the City of Hereford at any place north of the main tracks of the Pecos and Northern Texas Railway Company, or north of the main tracks of the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railway Company, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed two hundred dollars.

Section 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed in so far as they are in conflict herewith.

Let's Cook Something

"Let's Cook Something" a source avenue of appetizing foods and how to prepare them, taken from the private cook books of Hereford housewives, well known for their culinary abilities, and reviewed especially for you.

Between geography and the culinary art there exists a close relationship. Baked beans mark the Bostonian and those who live north of the Mason and Dixon line seem to have a yen for foods which are meaningless to southerners. But every now and then even the cleverest cook is stumped for "something different" and no matter where you live or how definitely defined your taste, you couldn't go wrong with Mrs. F. T. Robinson's chicken pie recipe. She has used the recipe for twenty five years and says it is fool proof. Here it is—and its extra good.

CHICKEN PIE

Cook mature chicken until tender salting to taste. While warm remove bones and cut across the muscles with scissors. Place meat about one inch deep in casserole. Cover with sauce made from 5 cups of chicken broth (in which the chicken was cooked) and 2 cups of milk thickened with flour, reserving some for gravy. Make a crust of 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons shortening (butter is best). Mix thoroughly and add to 1 egg, 1 cup sweet milk (beaten together). Drop in teaspoonfuls over top of chicken and bake in moderate oven about 30 minutes or until top is nicely browned.

The sauce which is poured over the chicken should not be too thick as the crust thickens it to some extent. Both the chicken and the sauce should be hot when the crust is added.

1859, and came to Texas in 1872. He was married to Miss Zelida Ann Hodges on September 25, 1879, in Grayson county. They moved to Castro county in 1891 and he was named first county and district clerk of the newly organized Castro county, serving eight years. As clerk he issued the first marriage license in Castro county. That same year he filed on a homestead. As a leader in early business life in Dimmitt he constructed one of the first houses there, which still stands.

In 1900 the Beach family moved to Hereford and in 1902 he was elected county and district clerk of Deaf Smith county, serving two terms. In Hereford he continued his interest in civic and business interests and guid-

ed organization of the First State Bank, serving as its first president. He retired from active business a few years later and since then had been associated from time to time with the C. F. Kerr Hardware Co.

Mr. Beach was converted when a young man, joined the Baptist Church and led an active Christian life. He was church clerk for many years and at one time served as Sunday School Superintendent.

In tribute to a man they all loved and respected, neighbors and friends in great numbers gathered at the church to pay him honor. By his civic spirit and his business enterprise he left a memory which will not be forgotten.
