Owens found guilty of murder

In the previous 99 years and 8 months of Deaf Smith County history, no one had ever been acquitted of murder by reason of self defense.

Helen Owens stood at the defense table in the 222nd District Court room at 9:02 p.m. Thursday, her face free of expression, her eyes looking straight ahead, as she heard District Clerk Lola Faye Veazey read the jury's verdict in Mrs. Owens murder trial.

Mrs. Owens was hoping to write a new chapter in the county's history. She did not.

We, the jury, find the defendant, Helen Owens, guilty of murder," Mrs. Veazey read.

Mrs. Owens then dropped her head, but still showed no emotion as

her attorney, Jerry Smith, gave her a light, reinforcing hug.

Smith then asked that the jury be polled to be sure it was the unanimous verdict. Each juror's name was called, and each said, "Yes."

The jurors deliberated for 2 hours, 52 minutes before informing bailiff Mary Cramer at 8:46 p.m. that they had reached a verdict.

Mrs. Owens had been charged with murder in connection with the shooting death of her husband, Charlie, on July 5, 1989 at their home in West Hereford. With the murder conviction, she could be sentenced to the penitentiary for 5 to 99 years, or life, or given up to 10 years probation. With either, she could be fined up to \$10,000.

The jury was to begin hearing testimony and arguments in the

punishment phase of the trial at 10 a.m. today.

The jury could have found Mrs. Owens guilty of the lesser charges of involuntary manslaughter or aggravated assault, or could have found her not guilty, according to the 24-item charge from District Judge David Wesley Gulley.

Earlier on Thursday, the jury heard testimony from both sides during the rebuttal phase of the trial. District Attorney Roland Saul called several character witnesses who were friends and acquaintances of Charlie Owens, and a young girl with whom Helen Owens alleged, during her testimony, that her husband may have sexually molested a short time before her husband was killed.

The father of the young girl, a Bovina resident, told the court that he

and Charlie Owens had been partners on several electrical projects from 1985, when Owens' business closed, and Mr. Owens' death.

He said they worked on several projects in which Mr. Owens drove to Bovina to pick him up. He said Mr. Owens became close to his family, especially with two young daughters.

"He had been like a grandfather to the girls," he said.

The man's father (the girl's grandfather) said Mr. Owens would "read 'em stories, do things for them. He would go around the corner to the laundry and buy 'em a sody pop."

The young girl, now 6 years old, was called to the stand. She said that she had spent the night once with Mr. Owens.

She said that Charlie Owens had

picked her up at the family's Bovina home and brought her to the Owens' home at 541 Westhaven in Hereford. She said he fixed her a bath and gave her a towel before shutting the door. The girl said she dried off, put on some clothes, then she and Mr. Owens went to get pizza.

They brought the pizza back to the Owens' home, where they ate it while watching a movie. After the movie, they went to bed. The girl said she slept in one bed while Mr. Owens slept in another. The girl said the night was uneventful, except she woke twice during the night waiting for a phone call from her father.

"I have talked about this with you and your father has talked about this with you," Saul said. "Did Charlie Owens ever touch you anywhere he shouldn't?"

"No."
"Did he ever do anything bad?"
"No."
"Did you love Charlie Owens?"
"Yes."

On cross examination, Smith asked the girl where Mr. Owens was when she took her bath.

"In the living room watching the news," she said.

Later, Saul read the jury an affidavit from another girl Mrs. Owens alleged her husband had molested. Both sides and Judge Gulley had earlier agreed that the girl's name would not be divulged.

In the affidavit, the girl said she had known Helen and Charlie Owens since she was eight years old and had spent the night in the Owens' house, with Mr. and Mrs. Owens there, one time. The girl said the Owens' three grandchildren were also in the house.

"I have been told that there has been testimony that Charlie Owens sexually molested me," Saul read from the girl's affidavit. "That is not true. Charlie Owens has not touched me or suggested sex in any way. In all of these years I have never been alone with Charlie Owens."

During closing arguments, Smith recounted the testimony the jury had heard about Mrs. Owens' medication and psychiatric treatment. "The Valium she takes is a measure of the stress she endures," he said. "She has been through 35 separate episodes of electric shock therapy, with 175 volts of electricity going through her cranial cavity. Her doctor had reached the end in trying to help Helen."

As Smith began his closing arguments, Mrs. Owens left her seat at the defense table and went to the corner of the courtroom, where she nonchalantly touched up her makeup and cleaned her glasses.

"She may have reached a state of altered awareness where she snapped like a dry twig," Smith told the jurors. "Try to visualize and think of her anxiety, fear and tension of July 4-5."

As he said this, Mrs. Owens was very nervously twitching and balling up her right hand at her side before again folding, unfolding, fold, unfolding an embroidered handkerchief.

"If she wanted to kill her husband, why didn't she just kill him instead of going through the circumstances of this case," Smith said. "Why not earlier? She did not want to kill her husband. She testified to that."

Mrs. Owens then put her hands to her head, and intermittently covered her eyes with her hands. Then, she returned to folding, unfolding, folding, unfolding the handkerchief.

Smith, during his 37-minute long closing argument, presented his theory of the shooting, recounting Mrs. Owens' version of the incident. Smith grabbed the gun, a 338-caliber revolver, and pointed it around the room.

"I think it was like this," he said, "wielding the gun. 'Boom. Boom. Boom. Boom. Boom. I suggest it all happened in a matter of a few seconds, five second, nine seconds."

In the second half of his closing statements (the state can break its closing argument into two sections, going first and last with the defense sandwiched in the middle, because it has the burden of proof), Saul refuted much of Mrs. Owens testimony.

"There has been no evidence presented of Charlie having an affair," Saul reminded the jury. "Helen had a boyfriend. Did Charlie ever have a girlfriend?" He recounted that she had never told the psychiatrist she had been seeing for 25 years about any attacks on her by her husband, or any of the alleged molestation.

"Why did she bring up the sexual molestation?" Saul asked. "I guess to make it easier on herself, to show he needed to be shot. And we've heard about what she has been through for 25 years, but no one knows the torment he went through for 25 years."

Charlie Owens did not deserve to be killed, and Helen Owens had no right to murder him."

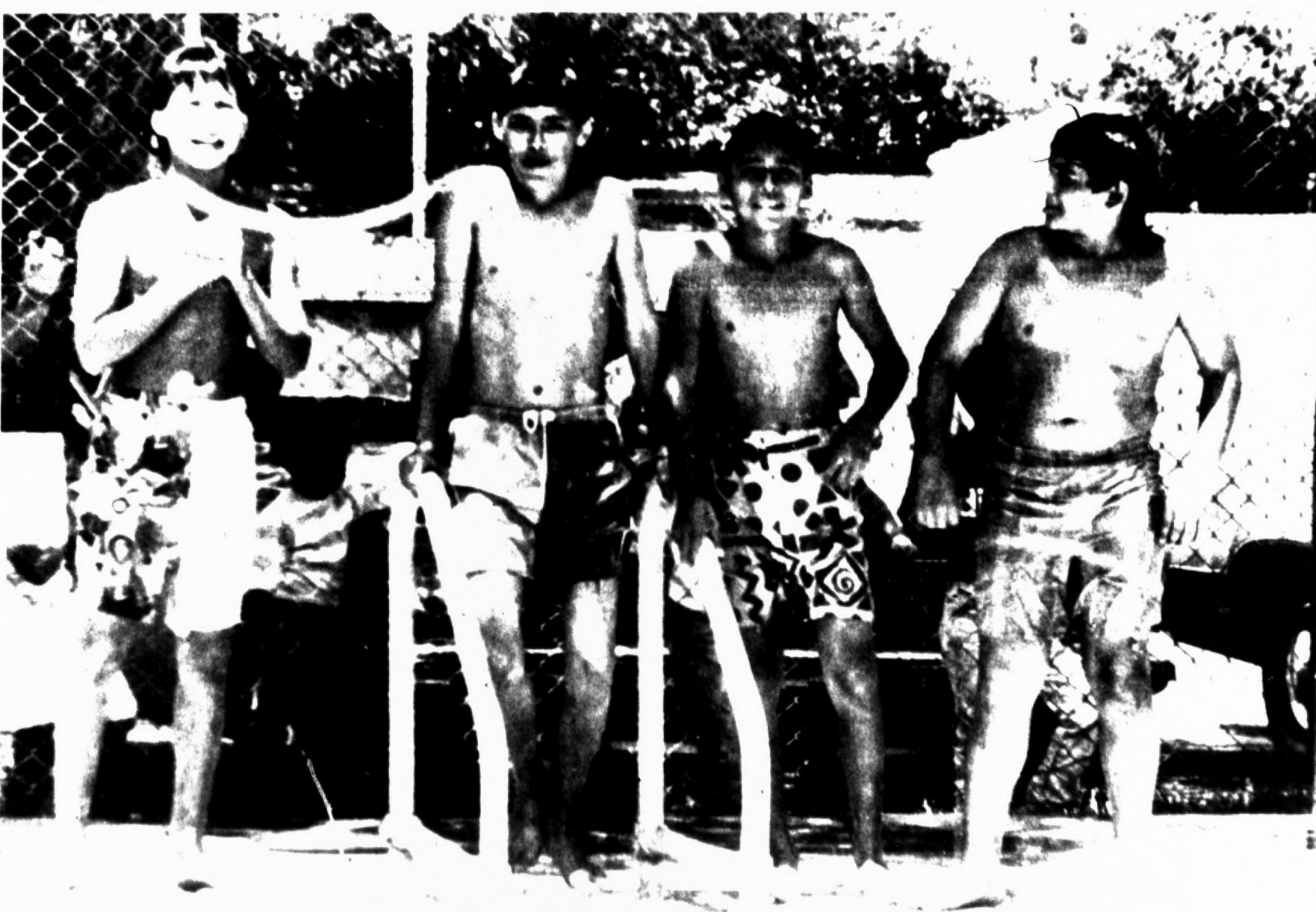

Hereford will always be a special place to Herbert Guthrie, son of a former Brand publisher and editor, B.F. Guthrie. We had the opportunity to visit with Herbert recently at the Black House, where he was looking over the garden and recalling fond memories of being in the Black House while living in Hereford in 1915-17.

Guthrie now lives in Ventura, Cal., and we first met him about a year ago when he came through Hereford. His dad had 12 years of newspaper experience and four sons when the family moved to Hereford in January 1915.

"We came here to make a home among a people who are noted for their hospitality and generous spirit," his father wrote in his first issue of The Brand. "We chose this field deliberately after investigating several others. We saw here a people who believed in schools, churches and all the agencies that assist in developing manhood and womanhood. Among such would we live and raise our boys."

Guthrie built a new Brand office near the corner of Main and 4th streets in 1916, and he purchased a Linotype machine to publish the paper for the first time in practically all machine-set type. Guthrie became gravely ill in the winter of 1916-17 and his wife took over day-to-day operations. The Guthries bowed out of the picture in September, 1917, selling to Earl Gough.

GOP delegates debate abortion, gays

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A fiery debate over abortion and gay and lesbian rights raged among Texas Republicans today as delegates gathered for the party's 1990 convention.

Earlier today, the GOP's temporary Rules and Resolutions Committee adopted an anti-abortion platform that was endorsed by party leaders but was attacked on two fronts.

Some party activists, wanting tougher abortion restrictions, said the proposed plank was too weak while others said the GOP shouldn't interfere with a woman's decision on whether to have an abortion.

The committee also adopted a platform that would not allow a homosexual to adopt or take custody of a child.

Committee member Maurice Angly of Austin said the proposal was an example of "faggot-bashing" but Davis Ford of Hereford said gays should not be allowed to care for children.

"It's obvious these people aren't stable. They're sick," Ford said.

On abortion, the committee met until early today before adopting 14-12 a constitutional ban on abortion

except when the mother's life is endangered.

The platform also outlines a legislative strategy for restricting abortions, although it would still allow most abortions up to five months of pregnancy.

George Whitting said the proposal weakens the 1988 GOP platform that has produced landslide elections for Republicans.

But Rita Palm of Fort Worth said the proposal strengthens the Republican's anti-abortion stand in light of last year's U.S. Supreme Court ruling that opened the door for states to restrict abortions.

The plan has been endorsed by U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who is seeking re-election, GOP gubernatorial nominee Clayton Williams and Republican Party Chairman Fred Meyer.

Despite the differences over abortion, Republicans tried to take the offensive against Democratic gubernatorial nominee Ann Richards.

Ms. Richards was blasted for opposition to a proposal that would require women under 18-years-old to notify their parents before being able to receive an abortion. She was also

criticized for her opposition to the state's sodomy law.

Glenn Smith, a spokesman for Ms. Richards, said the Democrat believed young women and their parents should discuss decisions on abortion,

but that there has been no parental notification proposal made that would not damage the woman.

On the sodomy issue, Smith said Ms. Richards believes a person's right to privacy is important.

Senate reinforces automatic gun ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - Police groups who have campaigned against semiautomatic assault rifles are getting the credit following a narrow vote by the Senate to maintain curbs on nine such weapons in an omnibus anticrime bill.

"Why we won is that law enforcement did a better lobbying job than the National Rifle Association," Sen. Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., said Thursday after the Senate voted 50-48 to maintain the curbs.

Tougher penalties for federal firearms violations, sexual abuse of children and selling the new narcotic drug "ice" also went into the bill as

senators worked past midnight this morning.

The Senate also rejected efforts to drop numerous death penalty provisions in the anticrime bill. It did vote to let Indians decide for themselves whether to impose capital punishment for murders committed on reservations.

Central provisions of the bill call for capital punishment for 30 federal crimes and streamline the appeals process with an eye to ending delays of up to a decade in carrying out executions.

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. - A raging fire engulfed 567 homes and businesses in Santa Barbara County and sent residents fleeing, but cooler temperatures and milder winds helped firefighters contain other Southern California blazes that burned 80 homes.

DETROIT - A city that has been the scene of civil rights triumphs and tragedies sent Nelson Mandela away with profound yet joyous expressions of solidarity. But Miami, where Mandela stopped earlier, was divided.

WASHINGTON - A woman who costarred with Marion Barry in a sting videotape shown at the mayor's drug and perjury trial is under defense attack as a drug addict and liar who cooperated with authorities because, she needed money.

WASHINGTON - A grinding and polishing error in the making of the main mirrors aboard the Hubble Space Telescope is the cause of a focus flaw that has crippled the \$1.5 billion orbiting observatory, an official with the manufacturer confirms.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Willie Nelson didn't always have the IRS on his mind when he rose to music fame in the 1970s and early 1980s.

Nelson will pay \$6.5 million in personal and business taxes and penalties, according to U.S. Tax Court documents made available Thursday.

Among Nelson's best known songs are "You Were Always On My Mind," "On The Road Again," and "My Heroes Have Always Been Cowboys."

Nelson did not return phone messages left at his motel in Powell, Wyo., where he will perform tonight. Nelson's attorney, Charles Meadows Jr. of Dallas, said he would not discuss the case.

Tax Court Judge Mary Ann Cohen approved the settlement June 6.

Nelson's tax trouble began in October 1984 when Internal Revenue Service investigators alleged he owed \$1.6 million in back taxes for 1972

Attendance up at Six Flags

ARLINGTON--Six Flags Over Texas has begun its summer season with attendance figures up substantially despite record spring rains in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Park president Bob Bennett said more than 600,000 persons visited the Arlington theme park during the spring season which began in mid-March.

"Our business was up more than 16 percent over last year," Bennett said, "and the trend has continued since we began daily operations on Memorial Day."

Bennett attributed the spring success to introduction of the massive Texas Giant wooden roller coaster and the celebration of Bugs Bunny's 50th birthday.

"We expected the Giant to be a popular ride, but the public reaction has surprised even us," Bennett commented.

He will be there next Wednesday for his annual Fourth of July picnic, a tradition that grew from a 1971 reunion of Texas musicians and now attracts thousands.

Santa Barbara fire engulfs 567 homes, still rages out of control

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) - A fire that engulfed 567 homes and businesses in Santa Barbara County still raged out of control today. But cooler temperatures and milder winds helped firefighters contain other Southern California blazes that burned more than 90 homes.

Wildfires, most set by arsonists, charred more than 14,000 acres by Thursday in a six-county area north, east and south of Los Angeles. Arson was blamed for the Santa Barbara fire.

Losses could surpass \$500 million, a Santa Barbara County supervisor said.

"You're just lucky to have your life," said Kay O'Brien, who fled her home with her husband carrying only family pictures and a retirement watch. The home and all their possessions were lost.

Elsewhere, firefighters controlled blazes in Utah and at Yellowstone National Park in Montana, but large fires raged in Arizona, Texas and Colorado. In Arizona, where six firefighters died Tuesday, a lightning fire in the Tonto National Forest destroyed a cabin built in the 1920s by Western novelist Zane Grey.

In California, Gov. George

Deukmejian declared states of emergency in the Santa Barbara and Glendale areas. The governor also authorized separate \$50,000 rewards for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the arsonists in both blazes.

No deaths were immediately reported. One person was severely burned in Santa Barbara and three firefighters were seriously injured in Riverside County, authorities said.

Late Thursday, in the suburban community of Claremont, 30 miles east of Los Angeles, an arson-suspected blaze burned out of control along brush-laden hillsides and consumed 400 acres, authorities said. Police blocked several residential streets although no homes were evacuated.

An arson blaze in the Los Angeles suburb of Glendale was contained after destroying or damaging 66 hillside homes Wednesday.

"It's just a disaster. Everything just exploded," said Dennis Gill, a produce wholesaler whose home was destroyed.

Witnesses said they saw one of two young men in a car toss a butane lighter into the brush off the road where the fire started, said Chris Gray, a Glendale Fire Department

battalion chief.

The 4,000-acre arson fire that broke out late Wednesday in a valley between Santa Barbara and the nearby town of Goleta was one of the worst on record here. Damage to homes alone was estimated initially at \$190 million, and the figure was expected to top \$500 million, said county Supervisor Bill Wallace.

No more homes appeared threatened today.

Authorities have said an incendiary device was found at the fire's origin, but they haven't given details.

Fire officials estimated the blaze may be brought under control by Saturday if temperatures do not rise again. Santa Barbara, which posted a record 109 degrees Wednesday, was only 83 degrees midday Thursday. Winds throughout the region also eased.

A U.S. Forest Service helicopter dropping water on flames crashed Thursday afternoon in San Marcos Pass. The pilot suffered only scrapes and bruises.

A controlled burn that got out of hand in Riverside County when winds unexpectedly changed bore down on the city of Corona after destroying 12 homes and charring 2,200 acres, said Corona police Sgt. Rick Bourgault.

By Thursday evening, the fire was 40 percent contained.

A fast-moving San Diego County blaze erupted near Lake Henshaw consumed 75 acres and forced the evacuation of a Boy Scout camp, said California Department of Forestry spokeswoman Audrey Hagen.

Four earlier brush fires in the county blackened about 1,700 acres before firefighters contained the blazes.

An arson blaze in the Carbon Canyon area of San Bernardino County blackened 6,640 acres and destroyed at least 14 homes before it was brought under control, said California Department of Forestry spokeswoman Sharon Sellers.

"To make matters worse, fireworks go on sale today," she said. "We're not happy about that."

A man described as a transient was arrested for investigation of arson in the Carbon Canyon blaze. Authorities said he sparked the blaze while trying to make coffee with two camp fires.

In east-central Arizona, officials said the 24,000-acre Tonto National Forest fire was about 50 percent contained late Thursday. The fire that began with a lightning strike has destroyed about 50 homes and forced the evacuation of more than 1,200 people.

Mets make it 10 straight; ready for shootout with Reds

Both the New York Mets and Cincinnati Reds think their four-game weekend series could be a preview of the National League playoffs.

"I think the Reds will be there in October, and if we play like we're capable of, we will, too," said Darryl Strawberry, who extended his hitting streak to 17 games with his 16th home run in the Mets' 5-4 victory. "The Mets are hot right now (a 10-game winning streak and 19 of 22)." Reds manager Lou Piniella said. "But I think we showed we can battle them."

The Reds have a 9 1/2-game lead over San Francisco in the NL West while the Mets seem about the catch the Pittsburgh Pirates in the NL East. The victory, coupled with Pittsburgh's 5-1 loss to St. Louis, lifted the Mets into second place, one game out and a half-game ahead of Montreal, which lost to Chicago 3-2. In the only other game, it was Houston 2, San Diego 1 in 10 innings. The Mets set a club record with their 20th victory in June, and their winning streak is one short of the club record set in 1969 and equaled in 1986.

Kevin Elster's two-run double and Howard Johnson's RBI double off Jose Rijo (5-3) gave the Mets a 3-0 lead in the second inning. Eric Davis hit a two-run homer off Dwight Gooden (7-5) in the fifth and Strawberry homered leading off the sixth. Gooden singled home what proved to be the winning run later in the sixth for a 5-2 lead. Gooden yielded four runs and 10 hits in 7 1/3 innings. Former Red John Franco worked 1 2/3 innings for his 14th save in 16 chances.

Rijo (5-3), who missed his scheduled start on Wednesday with a tender right shoulder, gave up five runs and six hits in 5 1/3 innings.

The Blue Jays invaded Boston on Monday with a half-game lead in the American League East and a 15-game Fenway winning streak dating back to 1987. They left Thursday night with a four-game losing streak and trail the Red Sox by 3 1/2 games.

"Their streak is over and now we've got one going," said left fielder Mike Greenwell, who drove in two runs with a fifth-inning single and then preserved a one-run lead by throwing a runner out at the plate. "Who knows, maybe we can beat them 15 in a row here."

In other AL games Thursday, it was Cleveland 7, Baltimore 4; New York 3, Milwaukee 2; Seattle 6, Kansas City 4; and Texas 8, Minnesota 6.

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Lendl romps at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) - Ivan Lendl returned to his roots to describe his passion for winning Wimbledon, and gave more signs that the dream may be about to become reality.

Lendl needed just 78 minutes to defeat Jakob Hlasek of Switzerland 6-1, 6-3, 6-0 Thursday to reach the third round. Both winner and loser said Lendl had improved on grass - and Lendl said he could get even better.

"I can definitely make more first serves, I know that," said the top seed, who added his game should improve as the courts get harder and quicker during the two-week tournament.

Unsuccessful in 10 previous trips to Wimbledon, Lendl has devoted his spring to winning this year, skipping the French Open to get more practice on grass courts.

Uncomfortable with English words such as 'obsession or fixation, the world's top tennis player looked to his native language for a proper term to express his desire.

Try "zazrany," he said, offering a word Czechoslovaks use to describe an ingrained yearning. That, he said, is how much he wants to capture the only major title to elude his grasp.

Zazrany, which is pronounced za-zhra'-nee, is based on the verb "zrat" that describes the way an animal devours its food. That pretty

well describes what Lendl did to Hlasek.

Lendl lost just four games, the fewest he has given up in a match in his 11 years at Wimbledon.

"He made me look bad because he played so good," Hlasek said. "I really felt helpless on my serve. The returns came very short and very fast and I was always taken by the speed. I missed a lot because I was just too late."

Martina Navratilova, the women's second seed, also returned to her roots. She made her first appearance of the year on Centre Court, where she has captured a record-tying eight singles crowns.

Navratilova, a Czechoslovak native who has a touch of zazrany in her quest for a coveted ninth title, swept past Anne Smith 6-2, 6-3.

"This is just the second round, you don't want to get too excited," she said. "But at the same time this is the

court that every tennis player dreams of playing on. So you don't want to get too overwhelmed by the occasion."

Seven other seeded players advanced Thursday with Lendl and Navratilova to the third round.

Fourth women's seed Gabriela Sabatini needed a tiebreaker to finish off Anke Huber 6-2, 7-6, while seventh seed Katerina Maleeva lost only five games to Japan's Kimiko Date. Other successful women's seeds were No. 11 Natalia Zvereva and No. 14 Judith Wiesner.

Rosalyn Fairbank of San Diego was the only losing women's seed, falling 6-4, 6-3 to Amy Frazier, a

17-year-old American who took three months off from the tennis tour to graduate from high school.

Among the men, third seed Stefan Edberg defeated Miloslav Mecir 6-2, 6-3, 6-2, but 15th seed Henri Leconte of France fell in five sets to Austria's Alex Antonitsch.

Also advancing were a pair of seeded American teen-agers who achieved similar results Thursday despite their vastly different styles.

Ninth seed Jim Courier, a powerful serve-and-volley player, strolled past Jason Stoltenberg in three sets. Michael Chang, a baseline player ranked 13th, scooted past Jim Pugh, also in straight sets.

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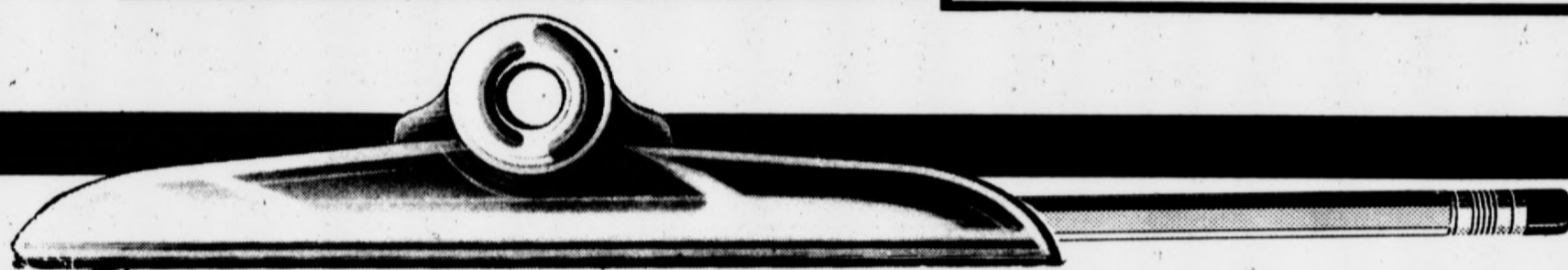

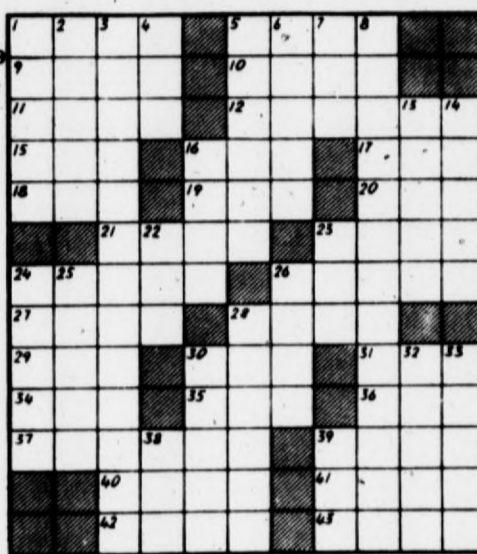

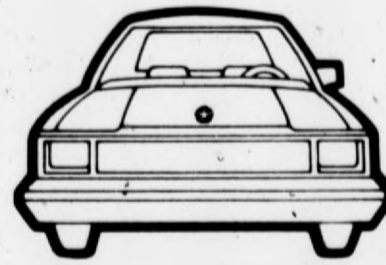
