Last Rites Are Held For G. W. Cassels

Funeral services for G. W. Cassels, a resident of Hereford for 39 years, were held Sunday afternoon at the First Baptist Church with Minister L. C. Chapin of the Church of Christ conducting. Mr. Cassels died in the hospital here Saturday afternoon at the age of 75 years, 7 months and 28 days. He had been ill about three days.

Mr. Cassels' survivors include one son, Malcolm of the Frio community; three daughters, Mrs. G. H. Womble, Foster, Mo.; Mrs. Bill Anderson of San Antonio; and Mrs. Guy Smith of Memphis. All were present for the services. Other survivors include 17 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Mr. Cassels was born August 29, 1864, in McClellan county near Waco. He came to Hereford from Graham in 1901 and had lived here ever since. He was employed at various jobs during his life here.

As one of the pioneer settlers of Hereford he had a part in the early leadership of the city's growth and contributed in large measure to laying a solid foundation for the new town.

Burial was in West Park Cemetery.

The demonstration will again show use of Wettable Sulphur and Cube on the bull-nosed ox louse, O. G. Babcock, of the Sonora Experiment Station, S. W. Clark, Texas Gulf Sulphur Co., Parker D. Hanna, district agent, and George Barnes, beef cattle specialist from the Extension Service, are expected to attend.

Dipping of 1600 head of cattle belonging to Colby Conkright, H. G. Conkright and Lyle Woodford took place Tuesday and Wednesday at the H. G. Conkright headquarters. Wettable sulphur was used.

Wheat Farmers Anxious For Rain As Dry Weather Prevails

Dry weather continued this week throughout Deaf Smith county and is beginning to take a toll of prospective wheat yields. Amount of damage is undetermined, opinions of farmers and grain men vary considerably, but the consensus is that unless rain comes soon wheat estimates will have to be revised downward.

Opposing those who take a pessimistic view of the situation are others who jokingly remind persons that no wheat crop is ever made here until it is "lost 14 times." Wheat at present is in generally good condition and with moisture and other favorable weather between now and harvest an average or better crop should be made.

Irrigated wheat is up to normal expectations, except in isolated instances where the late freeze nipped the boots.

Conditions in wheat growing regions of the United States are listed below. The reports are from regions served by the Santa Fe Railways and are up to and including April 26.

NORTH, NORTHWEST TEXAS, AND THE PANHANDLE
Wheat in Northwest Texas has been making a good showing. The outlook for yield is about equal to that of a year ago.

WHIPPED CREAM CAKE

Beat until stiff 1 cup sweet cream
Add a little at a time 1½ cup sugar
Then add one at a time 2 unbeaten eggs (beat well after each egg is added)
Sift once and measure 2 1-3 cups flour
Add 2 teaspoons baking powder
Sift flour and baking powder 3 times.
Add flour to cream mixture alternately with 1 cup sweet milk
..... 1 teaspoon vanilla

Be sure to add a small amount at a time and mix after each addition until smooth.

Bake in three 8-in. layer pans in a 375 "F" oven for 30 or 40 minutes.

Put layers together with your favorite filling. That old fashioned seven minute frosting is good topped with fresh coconut. (The coconut can be tinted in various delicate shades for special occasions.)

Advice on Diabetes Given By Texas State Department of Health

Austin.—Diabetes, the price America pays for indiscretions in living, took a toll of 720 lives in Texas last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"While the controllable diseases, such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria, and smallpox, are causing a smaller number of deaths each year in this country, diabetes, which was notably absent in the early pioneer days, is now taking a staggering number of lives," Dr. Cox said.

"Up until the highly mechanized age diabetes was not a health problem, but the disease became noticeable in direct ratio to the encroachment of luxury living, soft eating, soft habits, and general disregard for basic hygienic laws in our daily lives. Diabetes is nature's back-slap at coddling and pampering the body," Dr. Cox pointed out.

"Diabetes is a class disease. It attacks the indoor, sedentary type of person more often than a person whose work is vigorous or who combines work with sufficient exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the development of the disease may be, vocation or economic status are factors, for it is apparent that those persons who cannot indulge in luxurious living and whose occupation calls for physical effort are not frequently affected.

"There would be fewer victims or ravishing diabetes," Dr. Cox added, "if those who are indulging in unnatural living would realize the folly of their ways. Persons of middle age and those beyond that age should exercise particular attention to avoiding diabetes. Simple living, annual physical examinations, and if already showing the results of indulgences, obtaining and abiding by the advice of the family physician, could drastically cut down the power of diabetes and its threat to an alarming proportion of adult America."

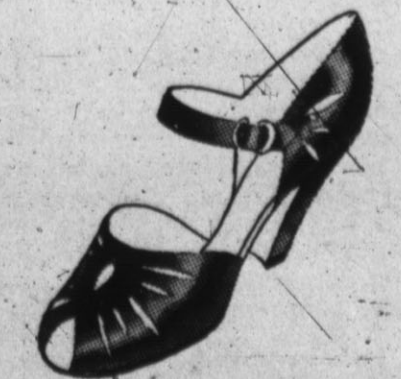

Opening of Fishing Season Yesterday Sends Rodmen to Streams and Lakes

Austin.—The pageant ardent fishermen enact began on countless lakes and streams in Texas yesterday, May 1, the date which signalized the opening of the season on bass and crappie after those species of game fish have been protected by law for two months. The season opened throughout the state with the exception of ten Hill Country counties in which a special law maintains the closed season until June 1.

At the break of dawn May 1, thousands of anglers wet their hooks. Excellent rains throughout most of the state have put the majority of lakes and many streams in excellent condition, the executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has announced.

Many lakes and streams were low, but were brought up by rains and as a result the chief aquatic biologist of the Game Department and his assistants have found the waters of the state are producing an abundance of plankton (microscopic plants and animals) upon which fish feed.

The lakes and streams of the state from its hatcheries last year. With an abundance of food available, fish are expected to fare far better than usual. The planting of more than 5 million fish last year represents an increase of nearly 2,000,000 of the total of fingerlings used to stock the waters of Texas in 1938.

Anglers who use artificial lure are being warned by the Game Department they must procure the \$1.10 fishing license before traveling to their favorite lake or stream. There are no exceptions under this law.

The ten counties in which fishermen will be unable to pursue their favorite sport until June 1, due to the enactment of a special law by the last state legislature, are Bandera (except waters of Medina Lake, which lie partly in Bandera County), Kerr, Edwards, Real, Sutton, Medina, Menard, Blasco, Kendall, and Gillespie.

Sportsmen are being reminded that the size limits are: black and white bass eleven inches and crappie (white perch) seven inches. It is unlawful to take in

any one day more than fifteen bass, fifteen crappie, thirty-five bream or goggle-eye, or an aggregate of more than fifty of these species. It is also illegal to possess at any one time more than thirty bass, thirty crappie, or seventy bream or goggle-eye.

However, the executive secretary of the Game Department points out that practically every county in the state has one or more special laws governing fishing and that anglers should consult their game warden or study the complex laws governing fishing in the various counties.

A group of counties have the universal license law in effect and it is unlawful to fish in them without first purchasing a 55 cent license. However, persons under seventeen years of age, persons fishing on land they own or on land on which they reside or persons holding an artificial lure license are exempt. Those counties are: Crockett, Sutton, Kimble, Real, Edwards, Blanco, Llano, Kendall, Gillespie, El Paso, Hudspeth, Cuijerson, Val Verde, Kinney, Medina, Terrell, Brewster, Mason, Kerr, Schleicher, and Mehard.

Legal methods of taking game fish in Texas are by ordinary artificial bait and seines or net, pole and line, setline, trotline, or not less than three inches square mesh, except a seine or net made of wire or other metallic substance or fish traps. Minnow seines not more than twenty feet in length for the purpose of taking minnows for bait are permitted.

A poultry expert will be at the training school meeting May 18. This meeting will be held at the West Texas Feed and Seed Company at 2:30 p. m. All club delegates and club members are urged to be present and to bring any sick chickens they wish to have examined, diagnosed, and posted.

Mrs. Cocanougher, chairman of the Expansion Committee, has asked each club to send her a list of its visitors for this year 1940. Mrs. Ott, chairman of the Exhibit Committee, suggested that a fair, exhibiting home products, canned and fresh fruits and vegetables be held in connection with the pie and cake show. Mrs. Tannahill of the Finance Committee stated that a profit of \$9.73 was made during the Interscholastic League Meet by the sale of ice cream, pop, and sandwiches.

Mrs. Cocanougher and Mrs. Ott gave very interesting reports of the District Meeting held in Amarillo, April 16. Outstanding features of this meeting were reports from each county of the number of years it has had home demonstration work, the number of women's clubs, girls' clubs, and any special work or project carried out.

A number of club women are still interested in mattress making and this demonstration will be held, as soon as there are enough women who want a mattress to justify ordering a bale of cotton.

The Home Demonstration Clubs and Council members are proud of the beautiful things they have made to put into the hope chest which will be on display in a down town show window from June 1 to June 15. Chances are to be sold on this chest and someone will get a lovely gift. The proceeds go to the Council to pay expenses of the Short Course delegates.

Deaf Smith County's Home Demonstration club women are asked to put on a radio program May 25. The main topic will be meat preservation.

Several worthwhile features were brought out in the reports of interesting events in clubs:

(1) Mrs. Maurice Tannahill of Westway told about the three-act play the club women of that community presented. Besides having lots of fun and success from the dramatic standpoint, \$15 was added to their treasury.

(2) Wyche had a variety of reports. Mrs. Cocanougher is a lover of trees, and stated that her family had put out 33 trees including 19 fruit trees, 3 pecan trees and one English Walnut tree. Mrs. Nollie Elliston has given strawberry plants to 70 families and still has a few more to give. Mrs. Ira Ott told about the Wyche 4-H girls pie supper. These girls arranged their own program, and had a very interesting one. The pies were delicious and sold at good prices. Mrs. Louie Olson is the sponsor of this club.

(3) Mrs. J. W. Adrian of Bippus gave a report somewhat different but very commendable. Their community raised \$250.00 for a sick man that he might go away for treatment.

(4) Mrs. C. G. Robbins of North Hereford, said each member of their club was making one or more articles to sell to raise club funds. Some of these were aprons, bonnets, pillow tops, and cakes most of which have been bought by other club members. Mrs. G. A. Frye has put out 14 grape vines and 16 fruit and shade trees.

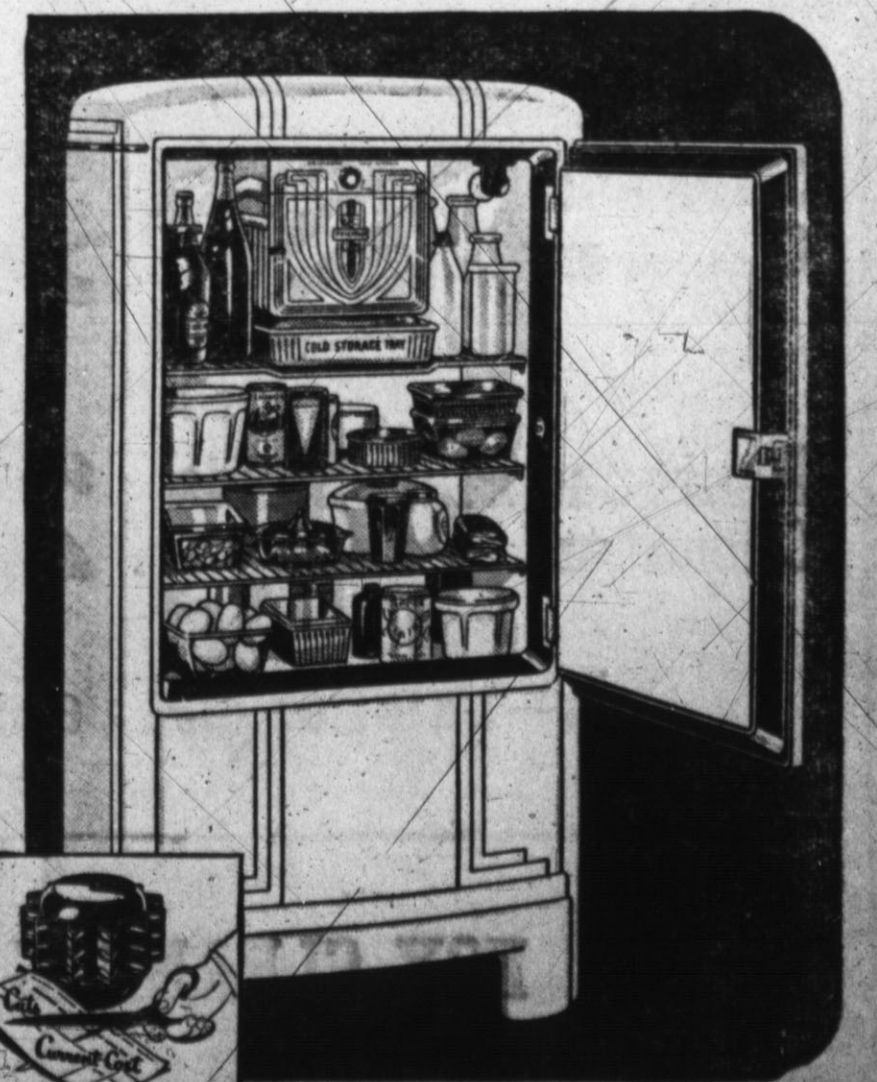

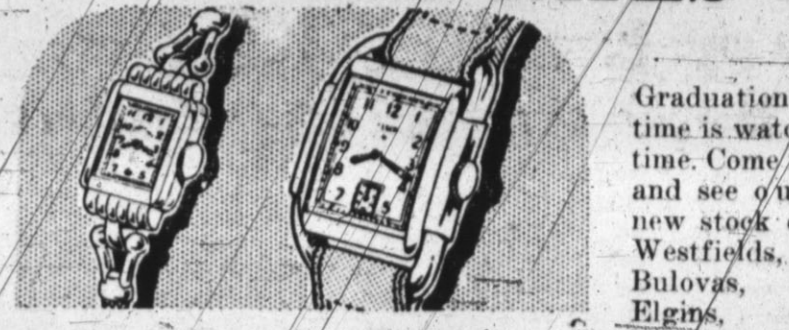

BIG SPRING—Its opening only two weeks distant, the program for the 22nd annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in Big Springs, was rapidly taking form this mid-week. Two general convention assemblies will be held, the first devoted to the problems of Texas raw materials producers: oil, cotton and livestock. There will be a conference and open meeting especially devoted to the broad problem of transportation, with accent on equality in freight rates, a major campaign by the WTCC. There will be three luncheons by directors of the regional chamber for consideration of resolutions presented by its important convention work committee.

From the resolutions the WTCC's work program for the coming year is evolved. Quoting officials of the chamber, "the policies the directors have had a mandate to the officers and staff constitute a Magna citizenship."

DUGOUT BROODER A half-dugout brooder house for baby chicks has been used at the Elmar Womble ranch with remarkable success. 295 chicks are living of the 300 purchased to be grown fryer size. They are now "chicken pie" size.

Soil under the brooder house was removed to a depth of about three feet. A coal oil brooder is used. Less fuel is needed to heat such a brooder than one located above the ground. An electric light enables the chicks to eat earlier and later than they could otherwise. Green feed will be provided by grain planted in the large fenced run to which they will soon have access.

HOME IMPROVEMENTS Home improvements made at the home of Mrs. Alta Wily at Messenger by her two sons, Porter and James, ages 20 and 19 years, are evident even in the distance.

The house has had two coats of white paint, and the roof is green. A wind-charger has been

ected, and electric lights installed.

An overhead tank and water tower have made it possible to have running water in the kitchen.

BENSON'S IMPROVE KITCHEN A butane cooled refrigerator is one of the newest home improvements at the Hardy Benson home at Ford. In the kitchen a storage closet on the west wall was built by Mr. Benson. He also made the upper part of an old kitchen cabinet into a wall cabinet. GARDEN VEGETABLES Seedlings of early vegetables are growing in the garden of Mrs. N. B. Ellison at Wyche. These rows are irrigated from a surface tank thru the earth wall of which there is run a 4 inch pipe with a cut off. A screen on the end inside of the tank keeps fish from coming thru.

What cool season vegetables may be planted early? J. F. Rosborough, Extension Service Horticulturalist suggests: Spring cabbage, from plants, Onion plants, Lettuce, English peas, Carrots, Beets, Irish potatoes, Tendergreen, Sweet corn, Spinach, Radish, Turnips and other greens.

Warmer weather is needed for beans, okra, pepper plants, tomato plants, and eggplants.

Tomato and pepper plants should be covered with muslin until the temperature reaches 60 degrees F. Above that temperature the cover should be removed. Plants coming from cold frames so handled grow right off when planted in the field and are not injured by outside weather conditions in the field.

The Fairview Home Demonstration Club asked Mrs. Leo Moore to grow a supply of Bishop tomato plants and King of the North Pepper plants for their club members.
