City Requests Hogs Be Penned Outside Limits

Calling attention to a city statute forbidding the keeping of hogs in pens within the city limits, City Marshal Ed Curtisinger today requested that persons keeping swine in violation of the statute move their hogs without the city limits. The law applies to that part of the city limits north of the railroad tracks.

Congressional Race Thrown In Turmoil

Up until this morning, entrance of Marvin Jones had not led to definite withdrawal of any candidates from the race for U. S. Congress.

Three candidates who are still in, Deskins Wells of Wellington, Tom Elzey of Perryton and Lew Fields of Amarillo, said they would step out as soon as it was definitely learned that Jones is in.

Six candidates said they were in to say regardless: Dennis Zimmerman of Tulia, E. T. (Dusty) Miller of Amarillo, Eugene Worley of Shamrock, James O. Cade of Amarillo, Allen Harp of Childress and Lee McConnell of Pampa.

Lewis Goodrich of Shamrock indicated that he would make a statement soon.

Two other candidates, Judge Henry Bishop of Amarillo and R. V. Converse of Spearman had not been reached for statements.

Deskins Wells recalled that he said some time ago that if Marvin Jones reconsidered and entered the race he would withdraw. "I do not want to run for office bad enough to go back on any statement I have made.

The fact that I have spent my time and hard-earned money is no excuse for me to fail to keep a promise. If Mr. Jones runs, I am out of the race, but before I get out, I want to know for certain that he is in."

Red Cross Drive Gets In High Gear As Contributions Mount

Aided by a corps of volunteer workers, the Deaf Smith Chapter of American Red Cross swung into action this week as new calls of relief for war victims doubled this county's quota of \$240. New quota is set at \$480 in a nation-wide drive to raise \$20,000,000.

Total amount raised by this morning was \$149.52. Names of volunteer workers as of last night include A. J. Schroeter, H. A. Close, H. E. Henslee, Alton Fuller, D. H. Alexander, Grant Fuller and John Patton.

Contributions may be made to any volunteer worker, left at either of the banks, handed to John Olson, or E. C. Eubanks, or brought to the Red office. Money raised in this drive is to be used for war relief only. None of it will be used to carry on regular activities of the Red Cross.

For the first time since the European war started, this county has been assigned a quota of clothing which is to be collected or made before September 1.

Miss Murray, field representative of the Red Cross, visited in Hereford last week in connection with the present drive.

A letter to John H. Olson, county chairman, from Norman Davis, national chairman, said he hoped that if quotas could be reached, or over-subscribed in this drive, that it would be unnecessary to ask for more funds this year.

War relief posters have been posted in Hereford. Clubs and organizations are being urged to canvas their memberships.

Funeral Held Sunday For Clyde Foster And Joyce Foster

Funerals for Joyce Laverne Foster, six-year-old victim of an accidental shooting, and James Clyde Foster, 38, suicide victim, were held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. Marvin B. Norwood, assisted by Rev. Ollie Apple of Petersburg and Rev. W. E. Barnes, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

The little girl and Mr. Foster, her uncle were on a fishing and hunting excursion late Friday evening about one mile west of Hereford when the tragic accident occurred. The shot struck her in the back of the head. Mr. Foster carried her to the highway where W. A. Smith brought them to the hospital. She was dead on arrival.

Clyde Foster died in the hospital about 11 o'clock that same night. After an inquest the next day, Justice of the Peace, G. M. Suggs, filed a verdict of accidental death, and suicide by drinking carbolic acid.

Joyce was the daughter of Otis Foster. She is survived by her father, her grandparents, and three brothers, S. B. Leroy, and Duane, and other relatives.

Clyde Foster is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Foster of Hereford, seven brothers, Roy, B. B., and E. E. of Petersburg, C. A. of Salem, Ore., Otis of Hereford, Robert L. of Ropesville, and W. W. of Fort Worth; one sister, Mrs. J. E. Roberson of Slaton, and other relatives.

Joyce Laverne Foster was born January 6, 1934. Her mother died shortly after the child's birth.

James Clyde Foster was born October 29, 1901 in Bosque county.

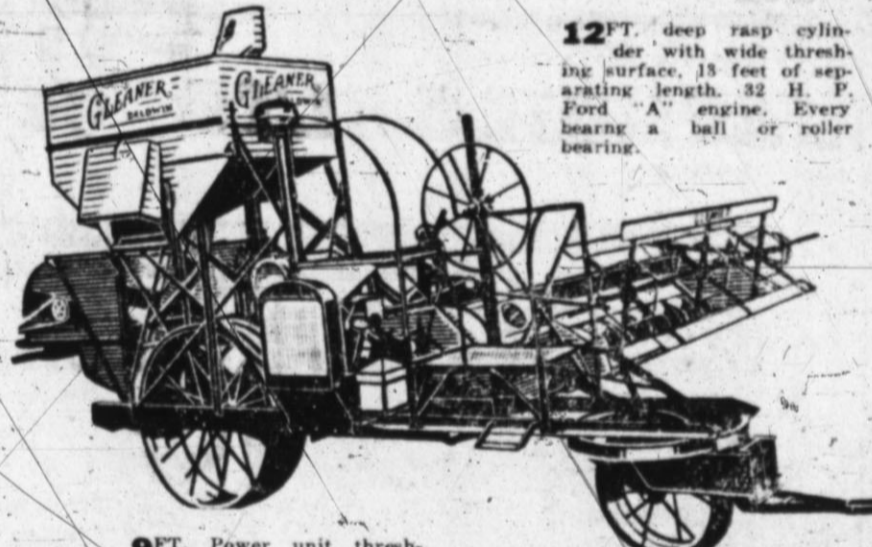

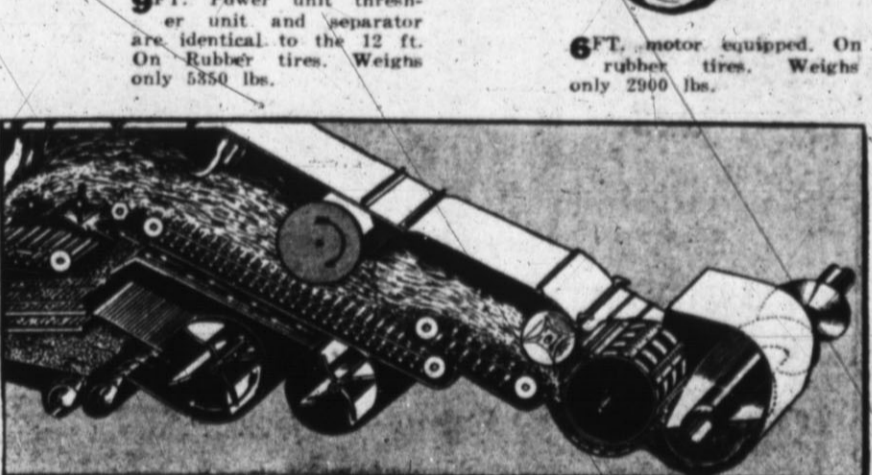

Rub 3/4 pound of butter into one pound of sifted flour until mixture is like cornmeal. Mix thoroughly with 1 pound of granulated sugar. Add 1 table spoon cinnamon. Combine this mixture with 3 well beaten eggs. Roll into a sheet, not too thin, and cut with small round cutter. Bake in quick oven for just a few minutes. The dough should be very stiff and the cakes should not spread in baking. These cookies are especially appetizing when served with coffee.

PATIENCE COOKIES

Mrs. Broadwell says she calls these cookies "Patience Cookies" because they cannot be hurried in cooking. They are really oatmeal cookies and the recipe is original with her.

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 egg (beaten)
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 2 tablespoons boiling water
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 cups rolled oats
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Blend sugar and shortening. Add well beaten egg. Add soda which has been dissolved in the boiling water. Mix with the flour to which has been added the baking powder and salt, and add the oats and vanilla. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet and bake slowly. Remove from oven before brown. If baked too long the cookies will crumble.

Most people like raisins. If you do, add 1 cup of raisins and 1/2 cup nuts to these cookies just before baking. They are delicious. Some summer afternoon when friends drop in try serving these dainty confections with an iced drink. That lovely custom is so hospitable.

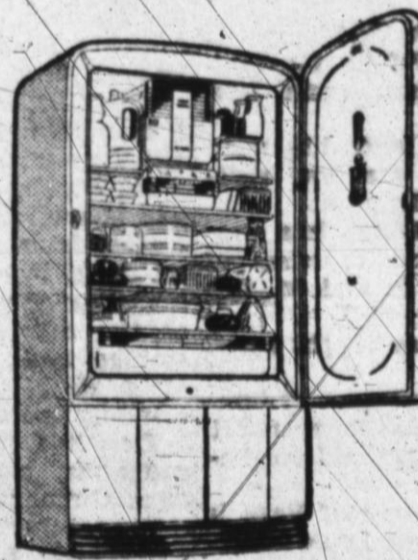

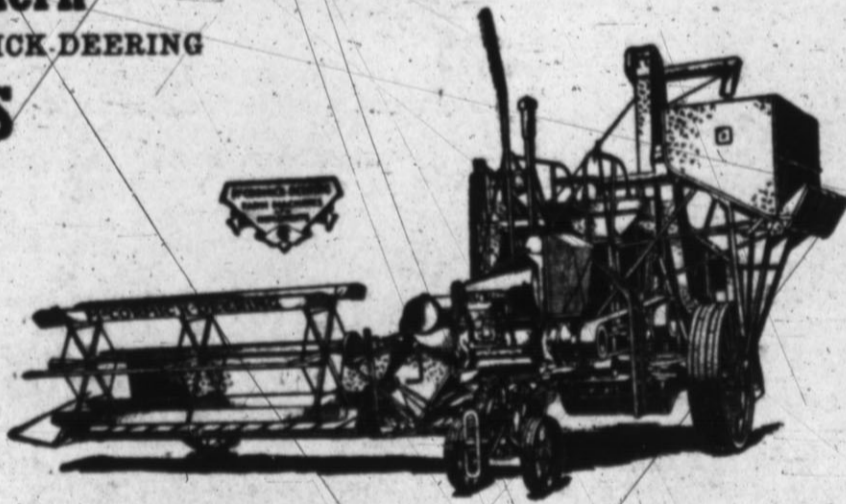

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FARMER FINDS A FRIEND

Should armadillos be destroyed?
The Game Warden for the Lamesa district reports that a farmer near Gall, in Borden county, is thoroughly opposed to harming a single one of the clumsy creatures.

In fact, the farmer imported over a dozen armadillos from East Texas and released them on his South Plains farm, hoping that they would thrive and multiply and assist him in controlling insects that damaged his crops.

It is a matter of record that the diet of an armadillo is made up of 94 per cent insects, such as cut worms, beetles and ants. Ants especially are heavily devoured. Since ants are one of the greatest enemies to quail and turkeys, because they destroy the young birds at pipping time, the armadillo, in addition to being the farmer's friend, is also the friend of the sportsmen because of his services in destroying quail predators.

The armadillo is not native to the plains region of Texas. One of the armadillos the farmer imported to Borden county was killed by a sportsman near Gall and this gave rise to the erroneous impression that these animals belonged to the South Plains as well as to the more eastern portions of Texas.

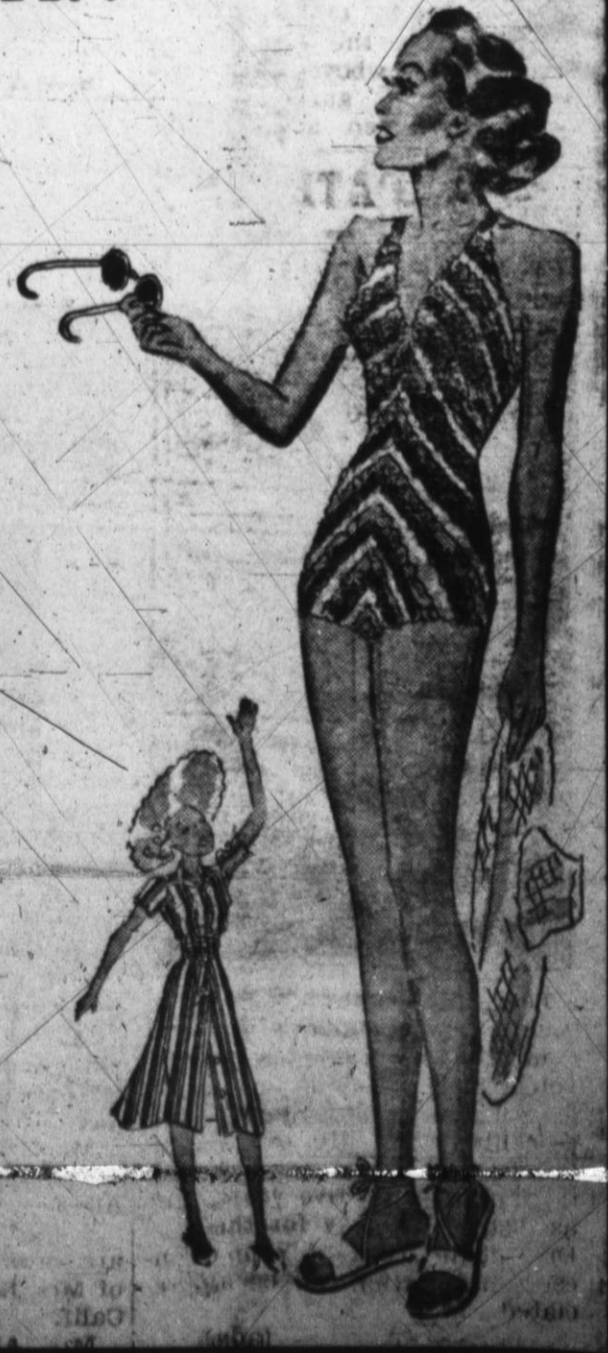

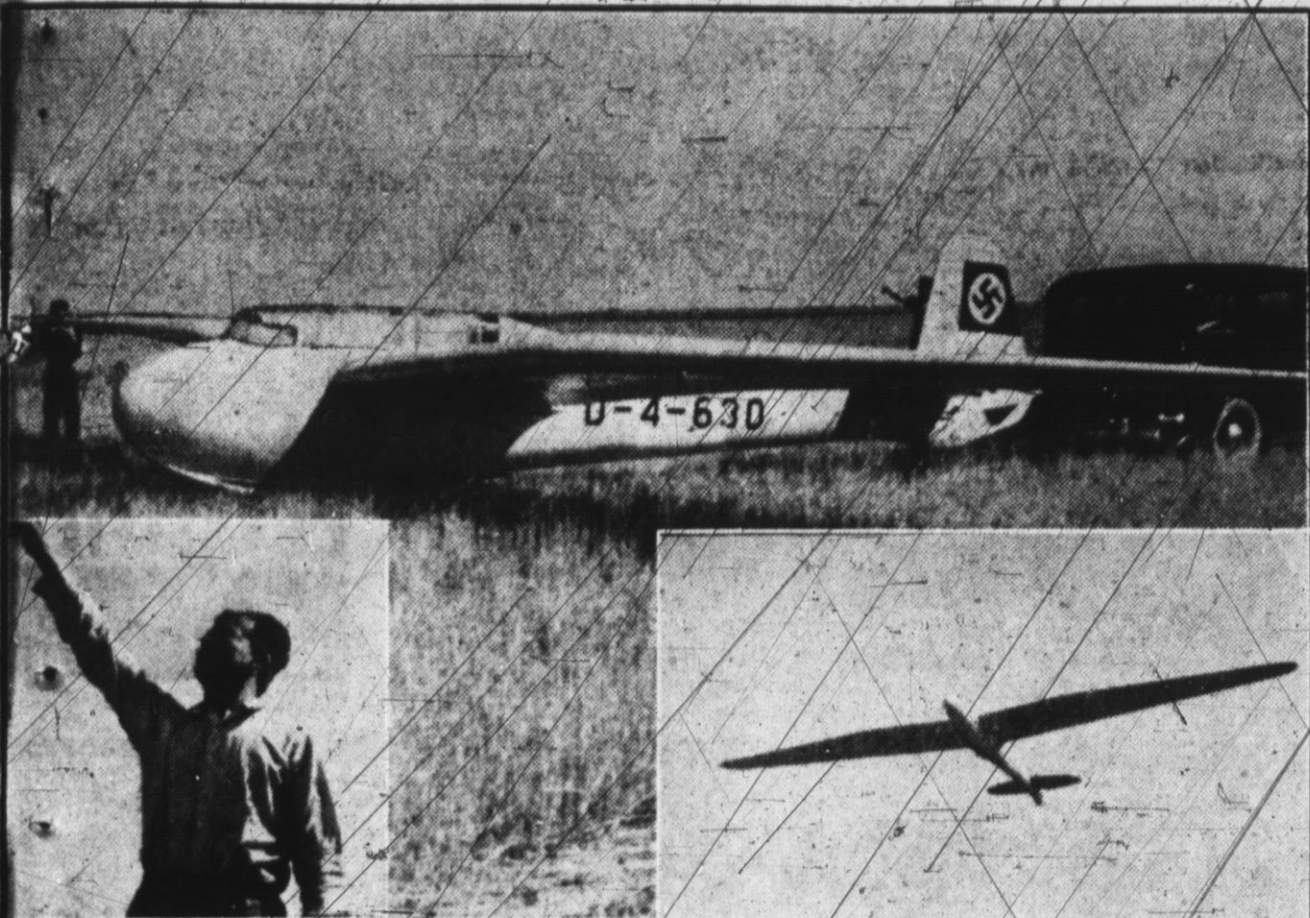

Frame Gardens Play Large Part In Aiding FSA Clients to Live at Home

Playing a prominent part in the "Live At Home" Program of the Farm Security Administration among its clients this spring is the frame garden.

And this doesn't mean to just barely exist, according to Mrs. Ozora C. Matthews, home management supervisor, but to live at home amply.

Stressing a year round food supply, approximately 30 families in the county this spring built and planted one or more frame gardens each, and most of them now have more green vegetables than their families can eat.

Simplicity and cheapness plus the large quantity of food stuff which can be grown in small space are talking points for the frame garden. Scrap lumber picked up around the farm were used by most persons in building their gardens. Net wire, pallings, or old gunny sacks sewed together can be used for the covering.

The frame garden is not a hot bed, Mrs. Matthews emphasized.

One of the latest gardens to be planted is that of Mr. and Mrs. Berry Orr where vegetables are just now beginning to show above the ground. This garden will supply late summer food-stuffs.

Also emphasized in the Live-At-Home program are chickens, turkeys, cows and hogs. Use of a cold storage locker is encouraged. Mrs. W. B. Harris, for example, has 60 dressed fryers in the locker here.

Where it is possible to plant vantage farm families of this and for a considerable time in adjoining counties are putting in beds of asparagus and rhubarb and are setting out strawberries. Sixteen families, Mrs. Ma-

thews said, have set out approximately 4,000 strawberry plants this spring, most of which were secured from Mr. and Mrs. N. G. Elliston. Three asparagus and six rhubarb beds have been started. Six families are using the cold storage lockers.

U. S. Marine Corp Seeks Men

According to word received today by Postmaster J. R. Lipscomb an authorized increase of 9,000 men for the U. S. Marine Corps has been approved by Congress, bringing the strength of the Corps up to 34,000. These 9,000 men will be used, in addition to bringing the present regiments up to peace time allowance, for the following: one Infantry Regiment, two Defense Battalions, and 1,500 men to increase the guards at Navy Yards.

The Defense Battalions are a new type of unit intended for the temporary defense of a small base, an island base for example. They provide an antiaircraft defense, having 12 3-inch guns, 48 50-caliber antiaircraft ma-

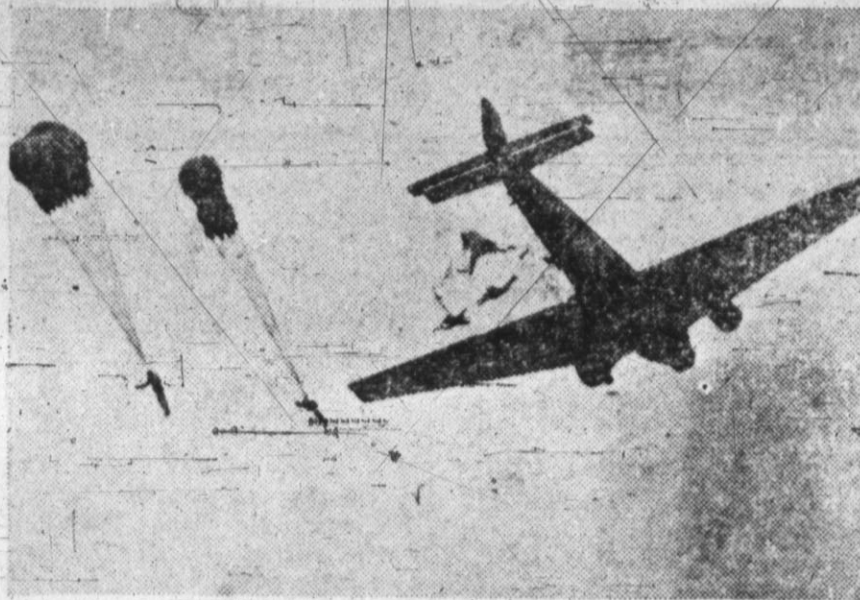
chine guns; 48 30-caliber machine guns, and 6 5-inch guns for use against surface vessels. Only 750 men are used in such a battalion. It is a most powerful unit.

Young men between 18 and 30 years of age, white, single and without dependents, not less 64 nor more than 74 inches tall, have had one year high school, and of good moral character are eligible for enlistment. Those under 21 years of age must have the consent of parents or guardians.

Tom Ellzey of Perryton said he had contacted many friends over the district and that they said it looked like a frame-up. He added that if "Marvin Jones will agree to get in there and fight for us until Jan. 1, 1943, then I am for him."

E. T. Miller yesterday made public a telegram he had sent to Marvin Jones: "To my sorrow I have learned that the very minute I was talking to you yesterday afternoon, a statement had already gone out concerning your announcement. Low Fields said that in his announcement he stated that he would withdraw if Marvin Jones should stand for re-election. "That statement still stands," he said.

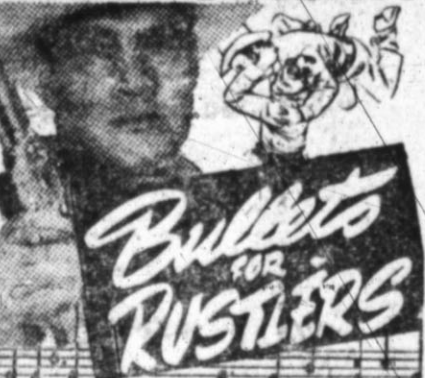
