egg yolks well beaten 1/4 oup lemon juice pinch of salt tablespoons sugar egg whites whipped stiff

1 cup heavy cream 34 cup crushed vanilla wafers Combine egg yolks, lemon juice and sugar and cook in double boiler until thick. Add salt and let cool. Fold in the egg whites and stiffly whipped cream. Cover bottom of refrigerator tray with half of the crushed vanilla wafers and pour in the pie mixture. Cover top with remaining vanilla wafers. Place in freezing compartment and let remain over night. Slice like brick cream and serve on

Do not stir and if the pie is not frozen stiff enough to slice, increase the freezing temperature.




