Mrs. Hinds was a member of the Church of Christ, having obeyed the gospel in 1894. She then humbly and persistently walked the way of Righteousness with her husband and her Savior through the intervening years.

County Schools Reduce Budget For 1940-41

Budget for Deaf Smith county rural schools has been set at \$44,556 for 1940-41, a reduction of \$14,477.77 over the 1939-40 expenses. A. J. Schroeter, county judge and school superintendent has announced.

Expenses for last year included \$177.64 for business administration, \$23,260.47 for salaries and tuition, \$1,039.39 for operation of school plants, \$920.68 for maintenance of school plants, \$16,139.13 for transportation and bus upkeep, \$1,598.10 for insurance, etc., \$11,330.40 for new equipment, and \$4,567.96 paid on debts.

The 1940-41 fiscal year began September 1.

Hereford NFLA To Hold Meeting September 21

Members of the Hereford National Farm Loan Association will hold their annual meeting September 21 at the Court House in Hereford. It is announced by George L. Muse, secretary-treasurer.

The meeting will provide the 410 members with an opportunity to elect directors for the cooperative organization through which farmers obtain long-term land mortgage loans from the Federal Land Bank of Houston.

An interesting program is being arranged for the meeting, which opens at 2 p. m., Mr. Muse reports.

G. A. Woodward, assistant general counsel and Judge S. A. Lindsey, members of the Farm Credit Board of Houston will attend and take part in the program.

Motion pictures showing various phases of Home Demonstration and 4-H club work will be shown. The movies were made by A. C. Williams, president of the bank and include pictures made in farm kitchens which have been improved according to Extension Service standards, others showing the results of other forms of home improvement work, and pictures of the 4-H club boys and girls who have won awards in Statewide competition. Derwood Varner, cadet colonel and valedictorian of the class of 1940, Texas A & M, will give explanations of the films.

Presiding at the meeting will be E. S. Ireland, president of the association. Other members of the board are H. G. Conkright, Wirt Phillips, G. W. Brumley and Troy Womble.

The Hereford National Farm Loan Association was established in 1918 and numbers among its membership farmers in Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer, Oldham and Randall counties.

Capitol Of Texas Moved Often In Hectic Days Of Early Times

Any school boy can tell you Austin's the capital of Texas, but it was a different story 100 years ago, University of Texas records show.

In fact, the capital of the Republic of Texas was moved so frequently there were probably times when even some of the nation's officials couldn't lay their finger on it. In the ten years before it joined the U. S., Texas had eight capitals, and juggled the honor between them eleven times.

It was at San Felipe that the settlers of Texas, under the leadership of Stephen F. Austin, set up their first independent government; and it was there that Sam Houston was made commander-in-chief of the regular army.

At Washington, on the Brazos River, the general convention, March 2, 1836, declared Texas "a free, sovereign and independent Republic." The Alamo fell four days later.

Harrisburg had probably the shortest reign of all, as well as the most hectic. During the month of March it was established as the capital, evacuated and burned by Mexicans who were so close on the heels of the flying government that they dropped cannon balls all around the boat which was carrying David G. Burnett, president of the provisional government, to Galveston.

In May, the government moved from Galveston to Velasco, where the treaties with Santa Anna were signed, and Texas was first recognized formally as an independent nation.

By October, the capital was Columbia, in Brazoria County, and by May of 1837, Houston, which had just been laid out. There it remained until October, 1839, when it was moved to Austin.

When Mexico again invaded Texas, in March, 1842, President Houston moved the capital once again to Houston, and from there again to Washington in November. University library records show. But in 1845 it was returned to Austin permanently.

Roger Corbett, who in the past has always been afraid to even look a potato in the eye is getting interested in the new crop. The other day he stopped me and handed over a clipping, which came from one of those Believe-It-or-Not type cartoons; it read: "Starchy foods must come from either grains of potatoes. An acre of wheat will feed about 7 persons for a year, but an acre of potatoes will feed 70 persons for a year. European farmers must raise the more liberal crop, therefore it's the potato instead of wheat."

What this community should be proud of, however, is the fact that we can raise both crops with success. Personally, I am not looking forward to a diet of potato bread and I don't think that we want an abundance of French-fried wheat.

This fellow, Victor Schoffel-mayer, agricultural editor of the Dallas News, came to Hereford chiefly for the purpose of seeing the potato crop, but from actual observation I should say that he was equally impressed by D. H. McDonald's hybrid corn and feed crops and by Wallace Hill's vast acreage of alfalfa. Spuds are new in Texas and they are going to attract much interest, which they should, but when this country comes into its own it will be noted far and wide because of its diversification. Potatoes will play a large part in development, but it is likely that the spuds shall never overthrow cattle, or wheat, or alfalfa, or hogs.

In the course of the trip Saturday someone said that farming in this territory could be arranged so that the farmer will have some crop coming in the year 'round, either in the form of agriculture or livestock. Undoubtedly, this territory has a brighter future than any other section in the United States. If you don't believe this just ask E. B. Posey, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce.

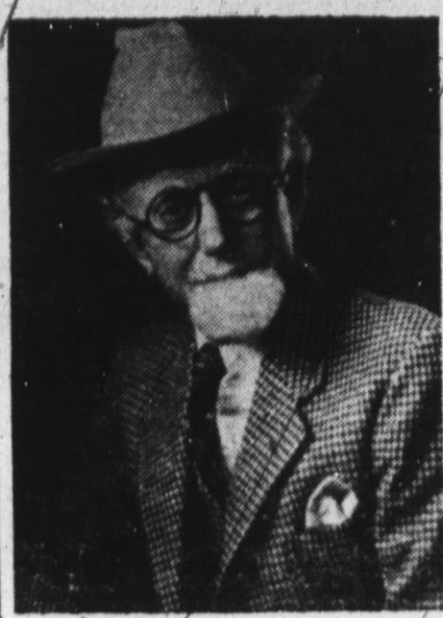

#### FROZEN LEMON PIE

- 3 egg yolks well beaten
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- pinch of salt
- 9 tablespoons sugar
- 3 egg whites whipped stiff
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 3/4 cup crushed vanilla wafers

Combine egg yolks, lemon juice and sugar and cook in double boiler until thick. Add salt and let cool. Fold in the egg whites and stiffly whipped cream. Cover bottom of refrigerator tray with half of the crushed vanilla wafers and pour in the pie mixture. Cover top with remaining vanilla wafers. Place in freezing compartment and let remain over night. Slice like brick cream and serve on chilled plates.

Do not stir and if the pie is not frozen stiff enough to slice, increase the freezing temperature.

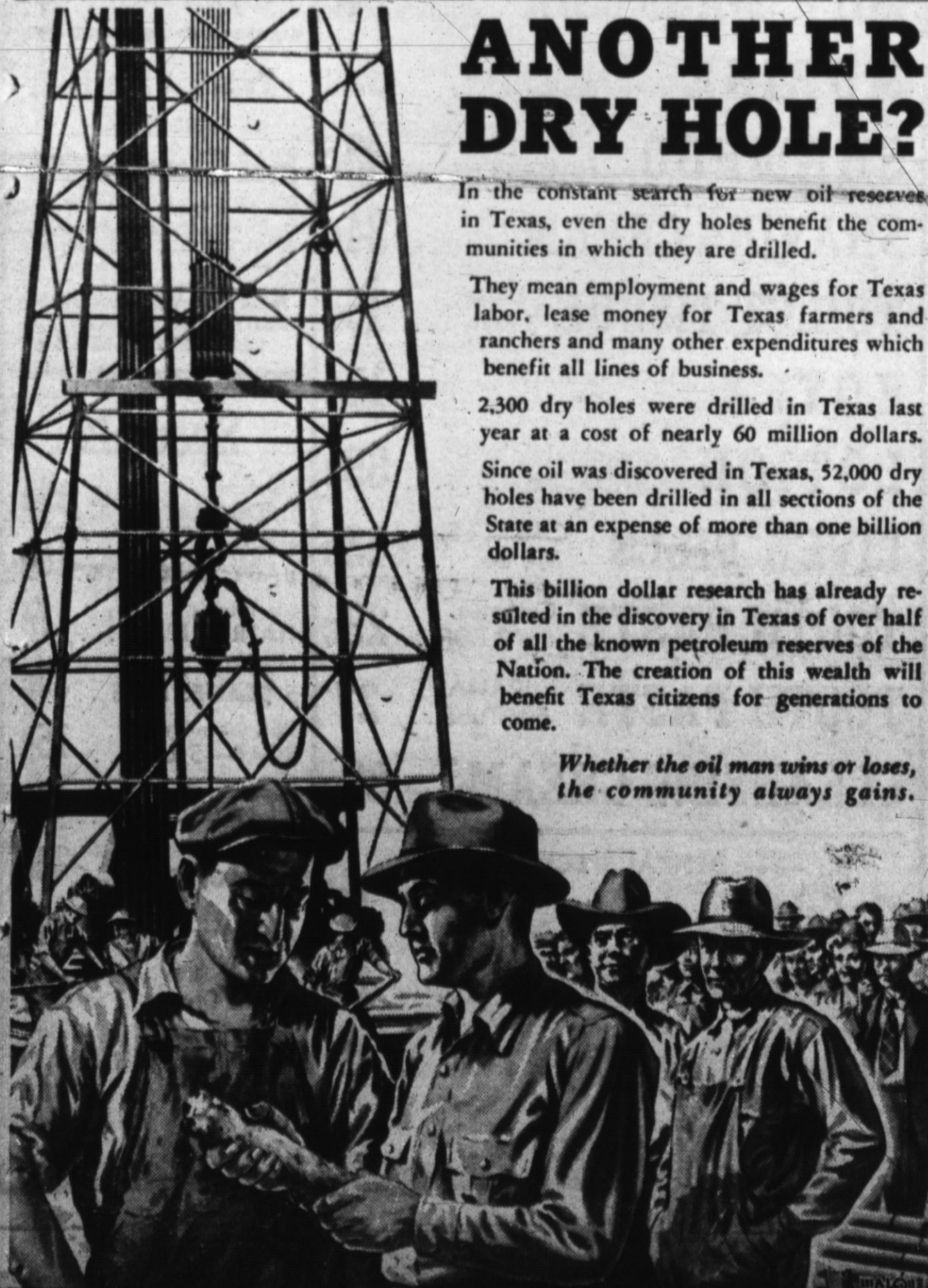

### Employers' Forum To Be Held By C. of C. Here

An employers' forum to be conducted under the sponsorship of the Hereford Chamber of Commerce will be held on Tuesday night, September 24, at 8:00 o'clock in the County Court Room, Hereford, Texas. It was announced today by Mr. E. B. Posey, secretary of that organization, who stated that motion pictures of the Social Security Act in operation, will constitute a portion of the program.

The purpose of the forum, according to Mr. Posey will be to exchange helpful information in respect to the administration of the State unemployment compensation law, employment service, Federal old-age and survivors insurance, and the keeping of records as required by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

All employers of labor in Hereford and adjacent cities are invited to attend the meeting and present their problems pertaining to these programs, and ask any questions they may see fit. The answers will be given by the representatives of the agencies participating.

"Recent changes in the Social Security Act are not as yet fully understood by a large number of employers," Posey said, "and this meeting will afford them an opportunity to secure needed information regarding the requirements and obligations of employers."

Employers who are unable to attend in person are requested to designate a representative to participate in the forum period. "This is an opportunity," said Mr. Posey, "for everyone to obtain accurate and reliable information regarding social security problems and I hope every employer in Hereford will attend or have a representative present."

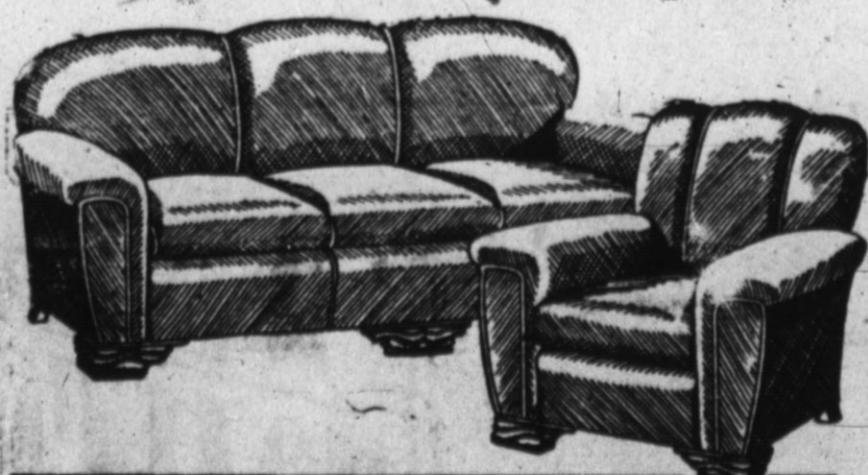
