Because the old rate for trucks and trailers was based on net weight, and the new law sets a gross figure, actual comparisons of legal weights under the old and new set ups are not possible: however, Mr. Baird estimates that the average gross rate formerly ran between 12,000 and 14,000 pounds. The new load limit is 38,000 pounds.

Under the new law, rates start at 40c per 100 for 6,000 pounds. and range upward as follows, with main reductions in loads over 14,000 pounds:
