

Wash 1 pound of fresh shrimp, place in pan and cover with boiling water, allowing one tablespoon salt to two quarts of water. Cook twenty minutes, drain and remove shells and black vein which runs length of tail portion. Chill and serve with sauce made from tomato catsup and horseradish and lemon juice. This amount serves four to six people.

Baking fish is probably the most popular way of preparing it Here is a recipe that came from Mrs. Wayland's mother-in-law, Mrs. Jon Wayland of Amarillo.

BAKED RED SNAPPER

After fish is thoroughly cleaned, salt and pepper and place on baking platter or pan. Baste every fifteen minutes with butter and a little water. Bake in oven of 400 degrees F. allowing 60 minutes for a five pound fish.

If preferred, a can of peas, a can of tomatoes and a little chopped onion may be cooked in the pan with the fish and it gives the fish a wonderful flavor to baste it with this mixture frequently. Here is another recipe for shrimp that never fails to please.

SHRIMP PONTCHARTRAIN 5 tablespoons butter

1 green pepper

1 cup sliced mushrooms 3 cups freshly cooked shrimp

1 small can tomatoes

Melt the butter in iron skillet, add the sliced onion, the green pepper and mushrooms and allow to simmer until brown. Add the shrimp and boil quite fast for 1 or 2 minutes, then lower flame and add the tomatoes. Season with salt, peppercorns and cayenne. Cook gently five minutes, lower flame and simmer ten minutes. 2 hard-boiled eggs.

Cover codfish with water, bring to a boil and drain, Add the codfish to the white sauce, with chopped eggs and serve with baked potatoes or on buttered toast.
