#### RESTORING DEER, TURKEY

When horsemen riding in north eastern Texas flush a covey of birds they are not surprised if the birds are bobwhites. But if

the birds are long-legged, headed, wild turkeys sailing the tree tops, that's something different. In that part of state it can only happen in River or Bowie counties.

On 6,000 acres under the Texas Game, Fish and Ter Commission there are more than 100 wild turkeys perhaps 50 deer as the result of modest stockings—made about one year ago.

Through the active interest of the landowners, led by Stiles of Annona and the River County Wildlife Plan Board the area was signed and admitted as one of the eurous federal aid for wildlife projects.

These are the first deer this vicinity since 1920 and first turkey since 1915. By the end of the ten year period deer and turkey will be spreading into the woodland of the two counties.

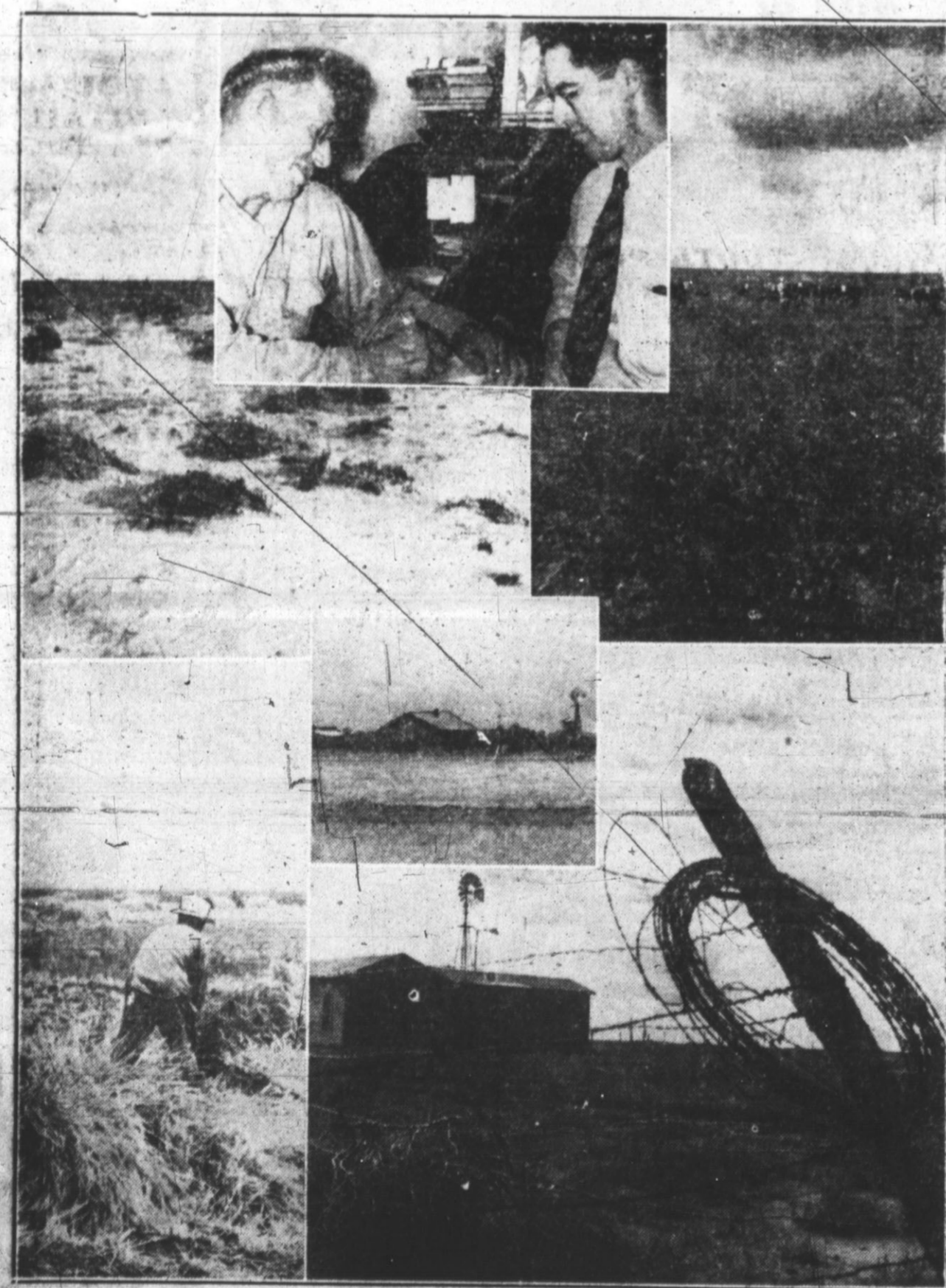

**BREAKS UP DEER-SELLING RING**  
A ring of deer meat sellers which has been operating in South Texas was broken up recently by wardens and a game warden captain of the State Game Department. Five men were convicted of selling deer meat and were fined from \$25 to \$100 each. Several were convicted on more than one count and paid heavy fines.

The Red River deer and turkey project promises to be an outstanding success because the landowners do not expect something for nothing. Their interest in protecting the breeding stock, in the reduction of stray dogs and cats, in the control of wolves, and the erection of signs, has cost them time and money but will mean the ultimate return of good hunting.

The Game Department is giving the area frequent game warden patrol and is paying essential development costs, including food patches for the turkey.

Others actively interested in the success of this project include County Attorney Burrell Waldrop, Annona; Representative W. R. Garland; County Agent Posey at Clarksville; Chamber of Commerce Secretary W. R. Moore; Chairman of Wildlife Planning Board Joe Sibley; and Forest Ranger Bill Leatherwood.

A load of raccoons will arrive soon for the project and another valuable wildlife resource will start its come-back in the vicinity. A few years ago a trapper made \$500 in one season trapping coon and mink on about four miles of the Pecan Bayou which courses through the center of the project. Sustained yields of this value may be realized eventually through proper management of fur animals.

It has been found that the furs from muskrats raised in the South are more desirable than those produced in the northern states and southern pelts are bringing premium prices.

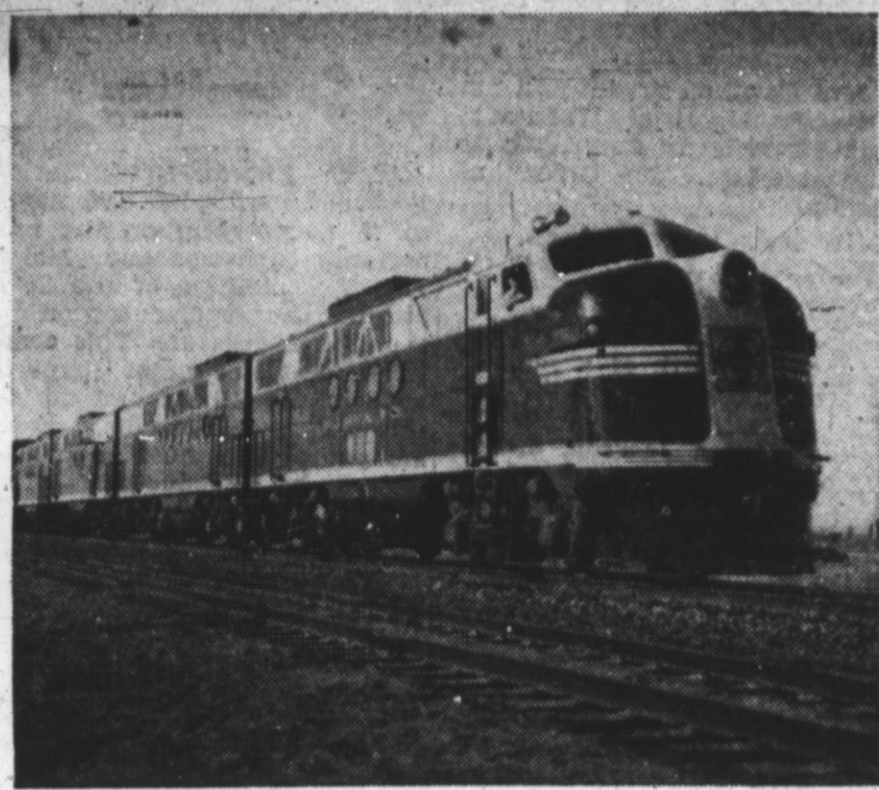

### Economist Says '41 To Be Boom Year For Texas

Austin—As 1941 gets well under way, Texas business is experiencing a boom that, a University of Texas economist predicts, will take it to an all-time peak before many months.

Dr. F. A. Buechel, statistician for the University's Bureau of Business Research, computes the index of general business activity for December at 106.3, or 5.6 point above December a year ago.

This level places business 6.3 points above the average month of 1930.

Factors contributing to this composite index are employment, up 5 points; payrolls, up 6 points; freight carloadings, up 5 point; runs of crude oil to refinery stills, up 14 points; department store sales, down 2 points; elec-

tric power consumption, up 8 points.

Dr. Buechel said rising payrolls and increasing farm cash income were largely responsible for the high business tone, and that coupled with defense expenditure of the federal government in Texas would soon push business activity to a new high level.

Other business factors tabulated by the Bureau revealed 1940 was much more prosperous than 1939:

Charters: 1,282, capitalized at \$25,138,000, compared to 1,419 capitalized \$22,445,000 in 1939.

Failures: 287, with liabilities of \$6,952,000, compared to 299 with liabilities of \$4,675,000.

Building permits: up 10.3 per cent over 1939. For December, permits were up 77.9 per cent over December, 1939.

Postal receipts: up 5.3 per cent over 1939.

Purchases of savings bonds: up 11.5 per cent over 1939.

Electric power consumption: up 2 per cent over 1939.

Cement: production up 1.3 per cent over 1939.

Automobile sales: up 19.7 per cent over 1939.

**TRAPPERS DOING WELL**  
Muskrat trappers in the marshlands of Texas are faring well this year, according to reports of game managers of the Game Commission to the executive secretary. Pelts brought an average of 80 cents last year, but are being sold by the trappers for from \$1.20 to \$1.65 this season. Storms destroyed many of the Louisiana habitats of muskrats last year and the Texas coastal marshes were damaged very little. Thus the increase in prices. The Texas Game Department is co-operating with numerous marshland owners in improving the habitat of muskrats and increases in crops are recorded on many areas this year. Much marsh land which had been drained for various reasons is being thrown back into areas in which muskrats farming is carried on. Several large areas were improved greatly by the throwing up of dams only a foot or two high.

Texas is fifth in the manufacture of cheese and eighth in the total income from the sale of milk.

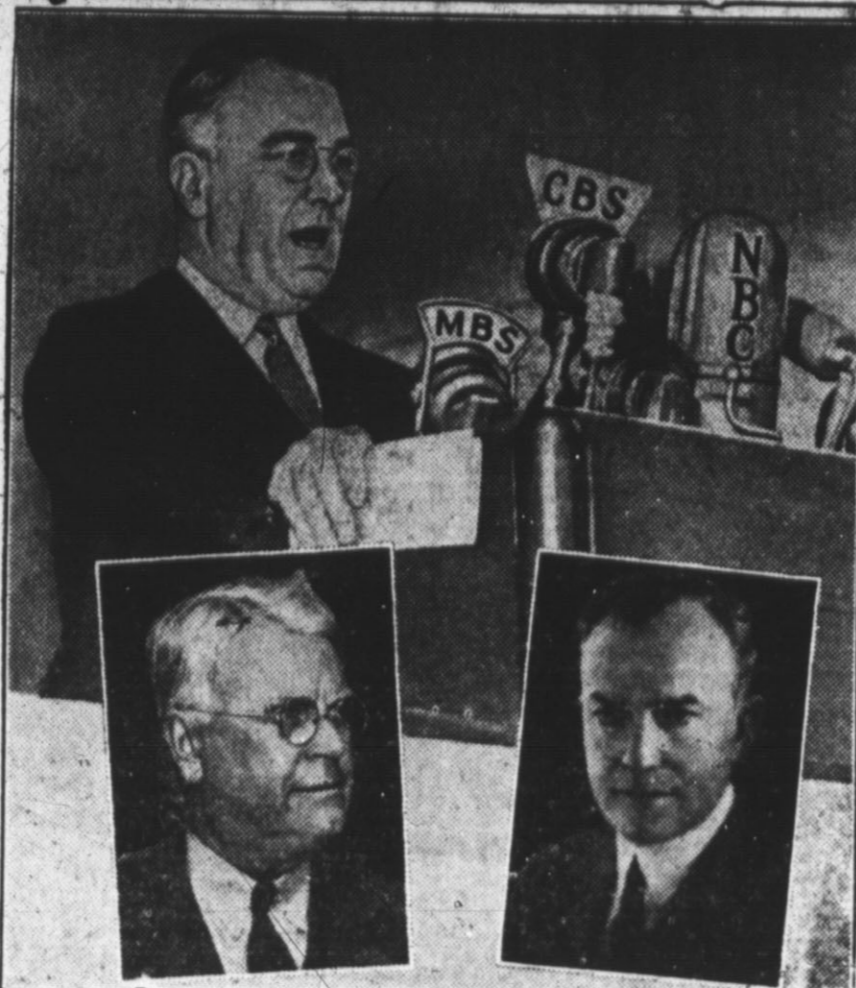
