



Rains of from .87 to 3 inches this week fell in Deaf Smith County, assuring the harvest of about 100,000 acres of wheat and giving farmers a splendid opportunity to go forward with border strip planting.

This week's rains, according to County Agent A. R. Bateman, provide the needed moisture for sowing of blown-out wheat acreage to grain sorghums and other crops.

The moisture will save thousands of dollars to potato farmers, who generally figure a cost of a dollar an acre for irrigation. An estimated 5,000 acres is planted with potatoes in this county this year.

County Agent Bateman figires that perhaps 200,000 acres of wheat have already blown out, but emphasizes that this acreage may still be sown tograin sorghums, not only valuable as a row crop but which will prevent much blowing on the and. "Erosion conditions this year," says Mr. Bateman, should show the need for a system of strip farming."

## Demonstration

Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, CHDA reports a very informative and interesting meeting of representatives of the different home demonstration clubs recently

The subject studied was the making of Neufchatel Cheese, a cheese especially well adapted to use in salad and sandwich

At the meeting were Mrs. C. F. Ricketts and Mrs. P. B. Sowell of Westway; Mrs. J. L. Rogers, Mrs. L. B. Boyd, Mrs. G. M. Hamm, Mrs. C. E. Robinson, and Mrs. S. E. Niblo of Hereford, and Mrs. Earl DeHart and Mrs. O. T. Bailey of the North Hereford club.

For benefit of club members and other interested persons, Miss Oliver has given directions for making of Neufchatel Cheese.

1. Adjust the temperature of one gallon of fresh clean flavored whole milk to 78 degrees F. by placing the container of whole milk in a larger vessel of water. The temperature of water will depend upon whether the milk is to be warmed or cool-

2. Add 1-2 cup of cultured buttermilk or clabber milk free of gas holes and off-flavors. Stir the milk thoroughly so that the cultured buttermilk or clabber is well distributed.

3. Add 1 to 2 drops of liquid rennet or 1-8 to 1-4 junket tablet. Either must be mixed with 1-2 cup of cold water before adding to the milk. Neufchatel cheese may be made without the use of rennet or junket tablets; however, the use of rennet is preferred since it helps present the loss of fat during the draining process.

4. Hold the milk at a temperature of 78 degrees for 12 to 14 hours. At this time 1-4 inch of clear sour whey should show on top of the milk or just under the cream line. The lack of the clear sour kney formation indicates insufficient acid development and the curd is not ready to drain.

5. Transser the curd to a muslin sack or cloth to drain. If the curd is extremely sour at the time of draining, mix salt with the curd. This will retard further development of acidity. Add one tablespoon of salt or more depending upon sourness.





#### Age Insurance Claims Should Be Filed Early

Persons 65 years of age or wer who may be entitled eo Federal old-age insurance should mmediately communicate with nearest Social Security Board office when they are separated from their jobs, Dewey ed, manager of the Amarillo office of the Board, said today. "Otherwise," the statement continued "they may lose benefits merely because of their delay in filing a claim. This applies to all persons who have been working in employment covered by the Social Security Act for a sufficient period of time to qualify for benefits."

It was explained that old-age insurance payments are not retroactive; payment cannot begin prior to the month in which a claim is filed. For instance, a person aged 65 or older who was separated from Work on January 1, 1941, but who files his claim in March, will receive benefits beginning with the month of March. He loses the benefits he would have received in Janwary and February had he filed his claim in January.

"It should be noted that the survivors of a deceased wage earner have three months in which to file their claims.
