"The Town Without a Tooth-ache," which appears on the newsstands tomorrow.

included in the display are a picture panel from the cham-ber of commerce; wheat, oats, barley and rye, bundled; 'milk; whole kernel wheat in glass containers; water; series of wheat root pictures; onions, potatoes, cultures, lettuce, carrots, turnips; large cut of beef; Hereford pennant; papers, maga-zines, etc.; on the panel board a picture of D. L. McDonald, pioneer of irrigated farming in Deaf Smith County, and of Dr. G. W. Heard, discoverer of the unusual tooth decay rate.

The Collier's article, by J. D Ratcliff, pays tribute to Dr. Heard as a hard-working country dentist who noticed, and brought to national attention, a phenomenon which may event-ually lead to the elimination of tooth decay.

The Ratcliff article, like other which have been written on the subject, points out that the flourides, the calcium and phosphorous in Deaf Smith County products are believed to be in just the right combination to produce dental health; but much more research will be needed before any evaluation can be made on the part played by each ele-
