WPB Order Restricts Car Part Replacement

Hereford automobile dealers this week reminded car owners that a War Production Board Order now in effect requires the turn-in of old car parts on the purchase of any replacement part. Dealers can no longer sell replacement parts unless the old part is turned in, and the order goes on to state that no new parts whatever shall be sold in cases where the old part can be re-conditioned so as to render service. Hereford automobile dealers have pledged 100 per cent cooperation with the new order and ask the help of car owners in carrying it out. The dealers point out that all car parts use up vital war materials and that conservation of these materials is essential.

Deaf Smith Wheat Allotment Higher In '43

Deaf Smith County's share of the 1943 national wheat acreage allotment has been set at 287,957.9. It was announced this week. This is an increase of 720.5 acres over the 1942 allotment and will make the increase on individual allotments come to 66 hundredths of one per cent. Prison Camp Construction Starts Aug. 1

With two cars of pipe already on hand, it was announced this week that construction of the \$2,000,000 Federal Prison in this area will be started in the immediate future.

Contracts on water and sewerage have already been let and construction of these two phases is scheduled to begin by August 1.

Freeze and Nichols, engineering contractors of Ft. Worth, are reported to have the engineering contract on the camp. Mr. Alwine of this firm arrived here this week to make preliminary investigations. According to present information, eight separate contracts will be let in construction of the \$2,000,000 prison. Further information regarding these contracts is not available at the present time.

Present plans are to locate offices on the grounds immediately to the construction. Arrangements have been made for REA connections adjoining the L. B. Holland house, located four miles south and one mile west of Hereford. It was also in—

No Pied Piper Magic In Rat Poison Drive

More than 200 citizens took part in the county rat poisoning campaign here Tuesday, according to Dewey Kennedy of the rodent control service. Burial At Muenster For John Koelzer

Burial was at Muenster, Tex., Tuesday, for John Koelzer, 82 years old, who died last Thursday at his home in Hereford. A high mass was celebrated Saturday morning at St. Anthony's Catholic Church by Rev. A. J. Milano.

Mr. Koelzer was born in 1860 at St. Benedict in what was then the Kansas territory and remembered much of the conflict which won the state her name of "Bleeding Kansas". Both his father and mother were natives of Germany, members of the generation of immigrants who did much to build up the American mid-west. He was married in St. Benedict on July 28, 1884, to Miss Mary Huls. Mr. Koelzer was buried on the couple's 57th wedding anniversary. They came to Pilot Point, Tex., in 1891 and moved to Muenster about 1897. Mr. Koelzer had lived in Hereford since 1925, and leaves many friends in this territory.

Flow Of Scrap Metal Increases

Since harvest the flow of scrap material into local junk yards has definitely increased, members of the county salvage committee pointed out this week, stating that many farmers of this territory have evidently decided to take a little time for a junk inventory and to get the material into war channels. Farmers who have not yet collected the junk on their premises are asked to get in line with the neighbors and give Deaf Smith County a good record on the drive to help avert a close down of vital steel mill. The shut down order may come—and soon—if scrap material is not collected promptly and in big quantities. Uriah Streu, chairman of the county salvage committee, says that he has heard intimations that some dealers are travelling over the country, asking farmers to donate scrap metal, and telling them that it is illegal to sell such material. This is definitely a confidence scheme, Mr. Streu says, pointing out that government instructions are that the scrap metal be SOLD to authorized—

Make Application Now For Farm Storage Loans

The county ACA office is ready to take applications for farm storage now; although producers are not eligible for the loan until the grain has been in storage 30 days. T. P. McCollister of the county office says that the reason for making applications now is to enable the inspector to make necessary arrangements for getting to each community and making as few trips as possible to get the inspection completed. The county office also announces that bins on different quarter sections will require separate loans.

Navy Enlistment Drive Sets Deaf Smith Quota

Ten men will make up Deaf Smith County's quota in the Navy recruiting drive which will get under way here next month and last through September. Total proposed Navy enlistments for this county during the campaign period will be enough to man a torpedo tube. Sponsoring the campaign to enlist at least 195 men in the 25 Panhandle counties making up this naval district will be the American Legion posts and civic organizations in each county. Navy enlistment ages are from 17 to 50 years. Unskilled men have opportunity to attend Navy trade schools. Qualified skilled men may be enlisted as petty officers with monthly pay ranging from \$76 to \$126. It is necessary that application for enlistment be made before induction into the Army.

"Whether or not you can offer any housing accommodations to construction workers, you are urged to return the questionnaire so we can get some definite idea on what the housing situation here will be," members of the county civilian defense committee say. Any persons who have not received the questionnaire but who might be able to offer rooms, room and board, apartments or other housing facilities to the construction workers are asked to call Mr. Hastings. Degree of congestion will depend on how rapidly the work is pushed through, but it is certain that a housing shortage will occur and the help of all citizens will be needed to meet this crisis.

Clutter Stars In Case Of Unwilling Constable

Politics has sunk to a new low, according to Bill Clutter, when a man tries to do a little quiet electioneering for a friend and finds himself elected to the office of constable. For that is what happened to Clutter in the election Saturday and this week he was still having trouble trying to get his refusal of the nomination accepted by the County Democratic Executive Committee. He has definitely declined the honor of serving as the county constable, but the county committee has not yet acted on his petition. Clutter went out to get votes for W. A. (Doc) Eaton for the constable post, but when the count was made the electioneer was well ahead of his only rivals for the post, Eaton and Ernest Maddox. Constable Clutter has given Deaf Smith County a bona fide case of an unwilling candidate—in fact so unwilling that even the strong expressions of loyalty by his friends could not prevail on him to serve. If he had decided to take the office, Clutter would have made the arrest of his best supporters for first offense.

Secret Of "Golden Horses With Fair Manes" Broken By California Breeder

Santa Barbara, Calif.—Twenty miles out in the verdant Santa Ynez Valley is the elaborate 7,000-acre Rancho Fernando Rey, and on the ranch is a stable so elegant that visitors often mistake it for the main residence.

Palominos are not a special breed, but a coloring that occurs with relative infrequency among horses of several strains—a coloring that sets off more beautifully perhaps than any other the darkness of saddle leather and sparkle of silver mounting—a beauty that has led Palominos to be prized down the ages.

Homer wrote of "the golden horses with fair manes," and Genghis Khan prized them. They flourished in Spain, presumably introduced by the Moors in their Arabian herds, and in Columbus' time were honored as the royal horses and called "the Ysabelas," after the queen.

She sent along a golden stallion and five mares, with the first settlers of Mexico and in a few years golden coats were glistening among the herds that roamed ranges to the north.

It was there, in early California that they picked up their name of Palomino, possibly from some outstanding figure of the era associated with them.

In western frontier days, horses were valued mainly for their serviceability, and men gave little heed to the occasional yellow ones.

The type was in danger of extinction 40 years ago when Dwight Murphy, ailing son of a wealthy railroad equipment manufacturer, came out here to recover his health.

Working as a forest ranger, Murphy learned about Palominos, became intrigued with their beauty and the enigma of their occurrence.

After three years he had to go back east, but in 1925, retired, he returned here, bought the San Fernando Rey Ranch and set out to pierce the mystery of Palominos and to revive the type.

He bought Del Rey, half thoroughbred grandson of Lucky Baldwin's famous Rey El Santa Anita; from Texas got a carload of wild Palomino mares, and started experiments in crossing them.

The results were bewildering. Of three colts, one would be a Palomino, one sorrel and one albino—a freak indicating too much inbreeding.

Then he discovered that, by mating a Palomino with a non-Palomino, such as a sorrel, he eliminated the in-breeding element and the albinos and he got mainly sorrel progeny.

It was patience-trying work. But word of his experiments spread through the horse world. One day a man in Dickinson, Texas, wrote that he had obtained a Palomino from a cross of two non-Palominos. That gave Murphy a clue.

Most Palominos had shown Arabian characteristics, and this new information indicated a latent Palomino strain in Arabian horses—breeding Palominos to selected Arabian horses might bring out this latent strain in the offspring.

Three years ago he took nine Palomino mares whose mothers

also had been Palominos, giving them a strong color inheritance, and bred them to a light sorrel Arabian stallion. Out of the nine foals, seven were Palominos.

Murphy now, after only five generations of selective breeding can produce consistently better than 70% Palomino colts, which he feels is a milestone beyond which developing a pure strain with superior physical characteristics is just a matter of time.

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

"Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49a, requiring all bills

passed by the Legislature on and after January 1, 1945, appropriating money for any purpose, to be sent to the Comptroller of Public Accounts for his approval, and fixing the duties of the Comptroller with reference thereto; authorizing the Legislature to provide for the issuance, sale and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then-current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes."

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945 no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or be sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is, within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation."

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by the General Revenue Fund on September 1, 1943, provided such bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building or buildings; providing for the repayment to the Permanent School Fund; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings, and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three (3) per cent per annum, payable annually; they shall be of such denomination as may be prescribed by law, and shall be payable in not to exceed twenty-five (25) equal installments beginning one (1) year from date of issuance; and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside into a special fund annually at the beginning of each fiscal year until all of said bonds shall have been paid off and discharged, a sufficient amount of the first moneys coming into the Treasury for the use and benefit of the General Revenue Fund not otherwise heretofore obligated to the payment of bonds and interest, a sufficient amount to pay the interest becoming due and the bonds maturing during such fiscal year. From said Fund, the Treasurer shall pay the interest on said bonds as it comes due, to the credit of the Available School Fund; and shall pay off said bonds as they become due and deposit the amounts so paid to the credit of the permanent School Fund. The power hereby granted to issue bonds is expressly limited to the amount stated and to five (5) years from and after the adoption of this grant by the people."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the third day of November, 1942, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Lieut. Col. Martin Moses, Known To Many Local Ranchers, A Jap Prisoner

(Editor's Note: The following news story is reprinted from the Fort Worth Star-Telegram and will be of interest to many people of Hereford who remember Lieut. Col. Martin Moses who was formerly cattle inspector in this territory.)

Belief that his son is a prisoner of the Japanese was strengthened today for Day-on-Moses, assistant district attorney. He had a letter written by Col. Geo. S. Clarke, who escaped from the Philippines and is now in San Francisco.

The letter was written to Mr. Moses' brother, Maj. Gen. Andrew Moses, Washington, regarding Lieut. Col. Martin Moses and the service he rendered in Bataan.

"Martin was in my regiment in the 57th Infantry, prior to the outbreak of war, and I say unhesitatingly that he is one of the finest and most efficient and capable officers that I have ever had serve with me," the colonel's letter said.

CUT OFF AT START

He said that Col. Moses left his regiment in August to go as an instructor with the 12th Regiment of the 11th Division of the Philippine Army.

"His battalion was cut off near Damaritis during the opening phase of the Japanese landing at Lingayan Bay. He proceeded to Baguio and after a heart-breaking 200-mile hike through Cabanatuan, he fought his way back to rejoin his division. He fought all through the horrible retreat from the north into Bataan, and I saw him upon his arrival and where my regiment was preparing for our defense of Abucay.

FOUGHT IN TATTERS

"His uniform was torn to ribbons; he had no insignia, but he was desperately bent upon reorganization of the 12th Infantry which had been assigned to beach defense on the Manila Bay side of Bataan. He was soon made Chief of Staff of the 11th Division, and I still have no words, because there is none on the Efficiency Report, to describe the super-superior services rendered by him from the beginning of the War to the end of the show at Bataan.

Col. Clarke left Bataan on a secret mission for General Wainwright on April 8. He said that he saw Col. Moses about the first of April and since his division was on the left of the line, I do not believe that anything could have happened to him between the first and the day of surrender, since his division was not actually engaged with the enemy."

AT PAMPANGA?

"Of course, his division had to surrender, and he with it," Col. Clarke said.

He called attention to a recent Japanese short wave broadcast stating that 27,000 American prisoners and 44,000 Filipinos are being held at Camp O'Donnell, Pampanga, P. I., and said he presumed that Col. Moses is there.

He said no report of wounds or death was received prior to the surrender.

"Those wonderful men who fought without reserve or help from the U. S. were starved at the time of the surrender," the colonel said. "They had nothing but horse or mule meat for the last 41 days of the show. Hundreds could not walk on account of beri beri."

LOOKED FOR AID

"The prisoners desperately need food, sweets, medicines and smokes and I cannot rest until I have done everything humanly possible to that end. Please remember that no single officer or man ever gave up hope that the largest and richest nation in the world would send them help, and I, for one, do not wish to see their bitterness if we continue to forget them and do nothing about sending them these simple things they so desperately need," the colonel concluded.

In several cities, including Fort Worth, clubs have been formed for the purpose of sending aid to American prisoners in Japanese prison camps. The International Red Cross is helping these clubs get permission from the Japanese Government to send supplies through to the prisoners.

LEGAL NOTICE

S. J. R. No. 20

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men, of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to

draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

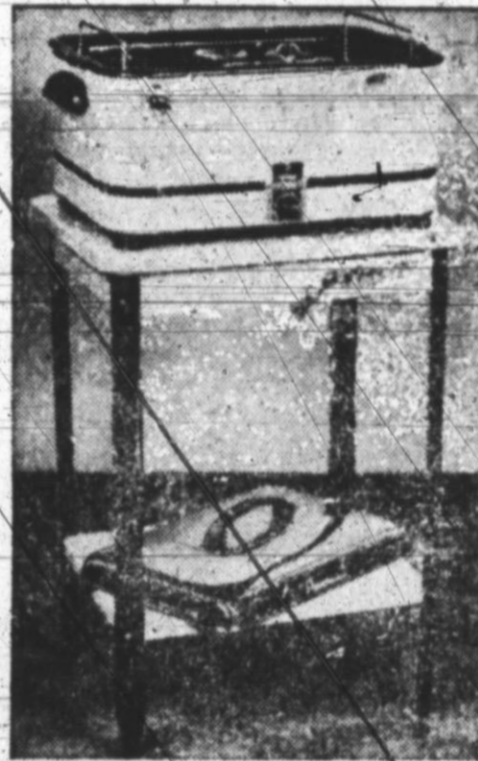

Merchants and businessmen of Hereford are invited to attend a "Ceiling Price Clinic", scheduled for next Wednesday, Aug. 5, at the Red and Gold Room in the Star Hotel, according to Amarillo Chamber of Commerce spokesmen, sponsors of the clinic.

The clinic will be run as a "Modern Ceiling Price Store" and local businessmen, together with officials of the Dallas regional office of the OPA and representatives of the Business and Distributive Education Division will assist in arrangements for the modern store.

Special discussion will be given

on the new regulations concerning controlled prices on consumer services and officials will attempt to answer all questions on the various phases of price control.

Schedule for the clinic is as follows:

10 AM to 12 M—All firms supplying services in connection with a commodity.

1:30 PM to 3 PM—All retailers and wholesalers for demonstration in model store setup, showing records to keep and those to be filed; how maximum prices are established and what merchandise and services are under control now; new regulations relating to apparel and other commodities.

3 PM to 4 PM—Pictures and demonstrations of merchandise posted with ceiling prices.

4 P M to 5 PM—Question and answer period; individual conferences.

Performance Report Work Nearly Done

Measuring and calculating is complete on performance reports on all but 30 farms in Deaf Smith County, F. G. Collier of the County ACA Office announced today.

There is still some checking to do on volunteer acreage and after this is complete all crews will be working on general performance reports. Six crews of performance reporters are now employed by the county office—four field crews and two to stay in the office to do re-checking jobs and to measure land for farmers who will provide transportation for the crew. Many farmers have co-operated by furnishing transportation for the measuring crew and because the transportation shortage has been one of the greatest hindrances to completion of performance reports, this help has been especially appreciated.

As yet, the state office has not been able to get any raise in the pay of performance reporters. The rate, \$5.00 for a reporter who furnishes his own car, and \$3.00 a day for chainmen, cannot compete with current wage scales and it has been difficult to keep full crews of performance reporters. 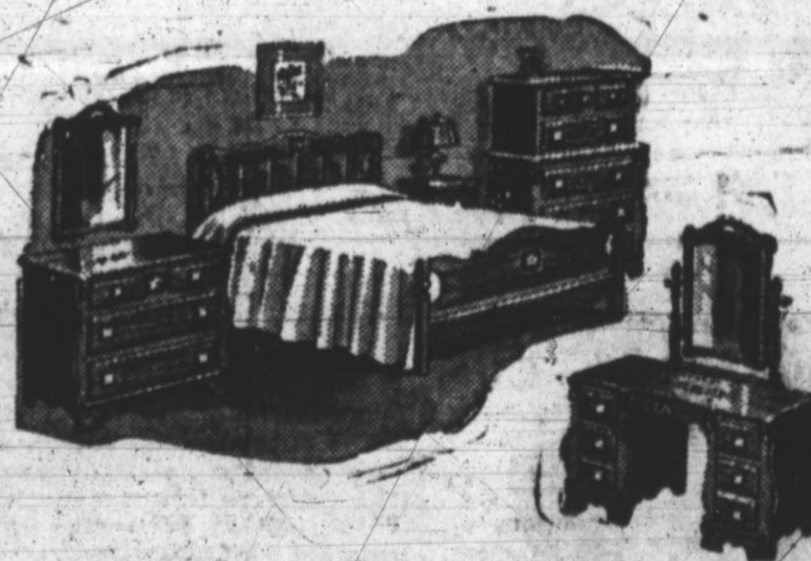
