## Big Saving Seen In NFLA Loans

Farmers and ranchmen of this territory served by the Hereford National Farm Loan Association will save approximately \$74,004 during the next 2 years through continued low interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans. Mr. Geo. L. Muse, Secretary-Treasurer of the association, reported Wednesday.

The saving, Mr. Muse explained, results from legislation recently passed by Congress, which continues through June 30, 1944, the 3 1-2 per cent interest rate on long-term Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans.

This Hereford National Farm Loan Association has approximately \$2,388,000 in loans outstanding.

## Maintenance Jobs For Skilled Men

## Slight Change In War Time Reading Habits

Before the war started, librarians all over the country were distributed over the fact that people were reading 75 to 80 percent light fiction—mystery stories and westerns. With the coming of the war, however, things have changed. At least they are different in the Deaf Smith County Library, according to Clara McLean, librarian. The people are now reading 90 to 95 per cent light fiction.

Zane Grey Popular  
"Zane Grey is still the most popular of all," Mrs. McLean stated. "On day this week we had out as many Zane Grey books as all of the others combined. Detective mysteries run a close second and most of the other

books are in the light fiction class."

Non-fiction books, especially those by war correspondents, have seen a slight upward trend. Right now, "Assignment to Berlin," by Harry W. Planners is the most sought-after book in this class. It picks up where "Berlin Diary" ended and carries on the story. "Flight to Arras" by E. J. Conroy is another popular volume. This book records the story of an aviator as he faced special duty, anti-aircraft fire and his own emotional changes.

An interest was also reported in technical books. Most popular in this division is "Shields' Air Pilot Training"; this book has sections on navigation, flying

types of planes, etc. Books on mathematics, meteorology, navigation and other technical fields are demanding interest from persons, who are presumably interested in training for examinations and specific jobs.

Dog training is still a popular subject with readers in this territory, and in the light fiction field, H. I. Phillips' new "Private Purkey" series is getting a run.

A large shipment of new books arrived this week and has been placed on the shelves. The shipment includes a new edition of the "Shipman's Handbook," which is in demand—and justly so. It has found a score or more Zane Grey reprints.

## Health Certificates Should Be Shown By Strangers Seeking Living Quarters

Pointing out that there will likely be a great influx of workmen in connection with construction of the Federal Prison Project here, City of Hereford officials today warned residents to take steps toward protecting the health of the community.

"In many other points where defense projects are under construction there have been epidemics, especially of venereal diseases," city officials said. "For this reason, we recommend that any persons taking in a stranger, or a strange family, require that all persons present health certificates from a local doctor. These certificates should be up to date."

City officials said that they certainly want to take every step possible to eliminate any epidemic in Hereford, and that they felt the people of the community are entitled to this protection, especially where the same bathroom and sewerage facilities are used. Cooperation on the part of home owners in demanding health certificates, they believe will eliminate the risk of such diseases.

## School Term To Open Here September 7

Announcing that Hereford Public Schools will open Monday, September 7, Knox Kinard, superintendent, today said that the starting hours have not yet been announced by the school board.

High school enrollment, as usual, will begin prior to the opening of school. Seniors will enroll Monday, Aug. 24; Juniors, Tuesday, Aug. 25; sophomores, Wednesday, Aug. 26; and freshmen, Thursday, Aug. 27.

Unless they are swelled by families who come here for work on the Federal Prison Camp, Hereford Schools will be able to take care of the normal enrollment next year, Mr. Kinard said. Last year the high school enrolled 343 students and he believes that 300 additional students can be accommodated without undue alarm. Possible trouble, if any, along this line will occur in Central School, where 687 students were enrolled last year. At one-time during the year, Central School was filled to capacity; however, when school closed approximately 100 additional students might have been cared for under crowded conditions.

Five new teachers were this week listed by Mr. Kinard, who said several others would be announced, probably next week.

Central School Principal C. M. Stewart has been named succeeding Glenn Allison, who is now in the armed forces. Mr. Stewart comes here with high recommendations, having taught in several schools in Colorado and Texas. He is a graduate of Texas Tech, Lubbock, with a MA degree. He is also a former superintendent of the Friona Public Schools.

## Red Cross Nutrition Course To Offer Local People Valuable Information

The first of a series of ten lessons in the Red Cross Nutrition Course now being conducted by Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, was held at the court house Monday night, in cooperation with the National Defense Program.

Instead of 20 one hour lessons, 10 two hour sessions will be held in order to ease transportation facilities. The next lesson will be conducted next Monday night at 8 o'clock at the court house and thereafter lessons will be conducted each Monday and Thursday night until the course is completed.

Emphasis will be on adequate diet for maintaining good health. No special diet for the sick will be studied and Miss Oliver pointed out that the course calls for twenty students and that one lesson can be missed and the student still qualify for the Red Cross certificate. Only nine registered for the course Monday night and those interested are urged to attend the meeting next Monday. The only expense will be thirty five cents for the text book.

Miss Oliver also pointed out that this course is a pre-requisite for the Red Cross Cancer Course and those interested in cancer work should avail themselves of the opportunity this course affords. Men are also eligible for the course and will be welcomed as students.

Day Lilies which flowered in June have yellowed (ripe) foliage now. This indicates a dormant state, the best time for transplanting.

Oriental Poppies from Mrs. Essie Cardwell's garden were moved last season and flowered freely this spring. They can be increased by root cuttings.

After the first "norther" in August the gardener will find this work more pleasant.

"Strawberries are also well adapted to this region. They are the first fruit to ripen, are of fine flavor, and are highest in vitamin C content of any fruits that can be grown in this region. Even when frozen, strawberries keep their high vitamin C content for many months. Therefore, strawberries should be a part of almost every garden."

In the spring of 1941 Mrs. Liston Wilson planted one hundred strawberry plants. The season's yield was surprisingly large and some of the surplus was frozen

# State To Rent Jacks, Stallions To Texas Farmers

Austin—In order to help meet the growing demand for saddle and draft horses and mules, Texas farmers and stockmen who need a stallion or jack should make application immediately to the Jack and Stallion Division of the State Department of Agriculture, Austin.

The department issued that statement today with the announcement that there are now several of the state-owned jacks and stallions available. The stallions include Belgian, percheron and saddle types.

The animals may be leased by stockmen or farmers for \$30 yearly, with the remuneration to be derived from breeding fees. The fee limit is \$10. The animals will be delivered to the leaser free of charge by the department.

Curtailment of supplies of rubber and gasoline is expected to bring about a greater demand for horses and mules, and thereby increase the demand for the services of the state-owned jacks and stallions. It is estimated that the state animals have already increased the wealth of the state about \$3,000,000, although since its creation in 1934, the Jack and Stallion Division has never cost the people of the state a penny for its upkeep and administration.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto, immediately after Section 49, a section to be known as Section 49a, to read as follows:

"Section 49a. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of Public Accounts in advance of each Regular Session of the Legislature to prepare and submit to the Governor and to the Legislature upon its convening a statement under oath showing fully the financial condition of the State Treasury at the close of the last fiscal period and an estimate of the probable receipts and disbursements for the then current fiscal year. There shall also be contained in said statement an itemized estimate of the anticipated revenue based on the laws then in effect that will be received by and for the State from all sources showing the fund accounts to be credited during the succeeding biennium and said statement shall contain such other information as may be required by law. Supplemental statements shall be submitted at any Special Session of the Legislature and at such other times as may be necessary to show probable changes.

"From and after January 1, 1945, save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each House, no appropriation in excess of the cash and anticipated revenue of the funds from which such appropriation is to be made shall be valid. From and after January 1, 1945, no bill containing an appropriation shall be considered as passed or sent to the Governor for consideration until and unless the Comptroller of Public Accounts endorses his certificate thereon showing that the amount appropriated is within the amount estimated to be available in the affected funds. When the Comptroller finds an appropriation bill exceeds the estimated revenue he shall endorse such finding thereon and return to the House in which same originated. Such information shall be immediately made known to both the House of Representatives and the Senate and the necessary steps shall be taken to bring such appropriation to within the revenue, either by providing additional revenue or reducing the appropriation.

"For the purpose of financing the outstanding obligations of the General Revenue Fund of the State and placing its current accounts on a cash basis the Legislature of the State of Texas is hereby authorized to provide for the issuance, sale, and retirement of serial bonds, equal in principal to the total outstanding, valid, and approved obligations owing by said fund on September 1, 1943, provided such

bonds shall not draw interest in excess of two (2) per cent per annum and shall mature within twenty (20) years from date."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, being November 3, 1942, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots, the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, requiring appropriation bills passed by the Legislature to be presented to and certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts as to available funds for payment thereof, limiting appropriations to the total of such available funds, providing for issuance of bonds to pay off State obligations outstanding September 1, 1943, and fixing the duties of the Legislature and Comptroller of Public Accounts with reference thereto."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the lending of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund for the construction of a State office building or buildings; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and providing for the necessary proclamation and expense of publication.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may provide by law for the issuance of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas to the Permanent School Fund for the construction in the City of Austin of a State office building or buildings, and the State Board of Education is hereby directed to invest not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund therein. Such bonds shall be executed on behalf of the State of Texas by the Governor and Comptroller, and shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three (3) per cent per annum, payable annually; they shall be of such denomination as may be prescribed by law, and shall be payable in not to exceed twenty-five (25) equal installments beginning one (1) year from date of issuance; and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to set aside into a special fund annually at the beginning of each fiscal year until all of said bonds shall have been paid off and discharged, a sufficient amount of the

first moneys coming into the Treasury for the use and benefit of the General Revenue Fund not otherwise heretofore obligated to the payment of bonds and interest, a sufficient amount to pay the interest becoming due and the bonds maturing during such fiscal year. "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Those voters opposing said Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the investment of not more than Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) of the Permanent School Fund in bonds of the State of Texas to be issued for the construction of a State office building or buildings and providing for the repayment of the said sum of money to the Permanent School Fund."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any fund in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

### H. J. R. No. 24

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Texas by providing that the Legislature shall have the power by local or general law, in counties having a population in excess of two hundred thousand (200,000) inhabitants to create other courts having exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters; fixing the time for an election hereof; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for a proclamation of such election and the advertisement thereof; and making an appropriation therefor.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1942, at which time all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

Those voters opposed to such Amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution, providing that the Legislature may in certain counties create other courts having either exclusive jurisdiction or concurrent jurisdiction with the county court in civil, criminal or probate matters."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast is in favor of the Amendment, the

same shall become part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have it published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, nor to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the third day of November, 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are

assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

"Against the Constitutional Amendment permitting the accounting officers of this State to draw and pay warrants for salaries to officers of the United States Army or Navy who are assigned to duties in State Institutions of higher education."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballots, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State, and the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated from any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of printing said proclamation and of holding said election.

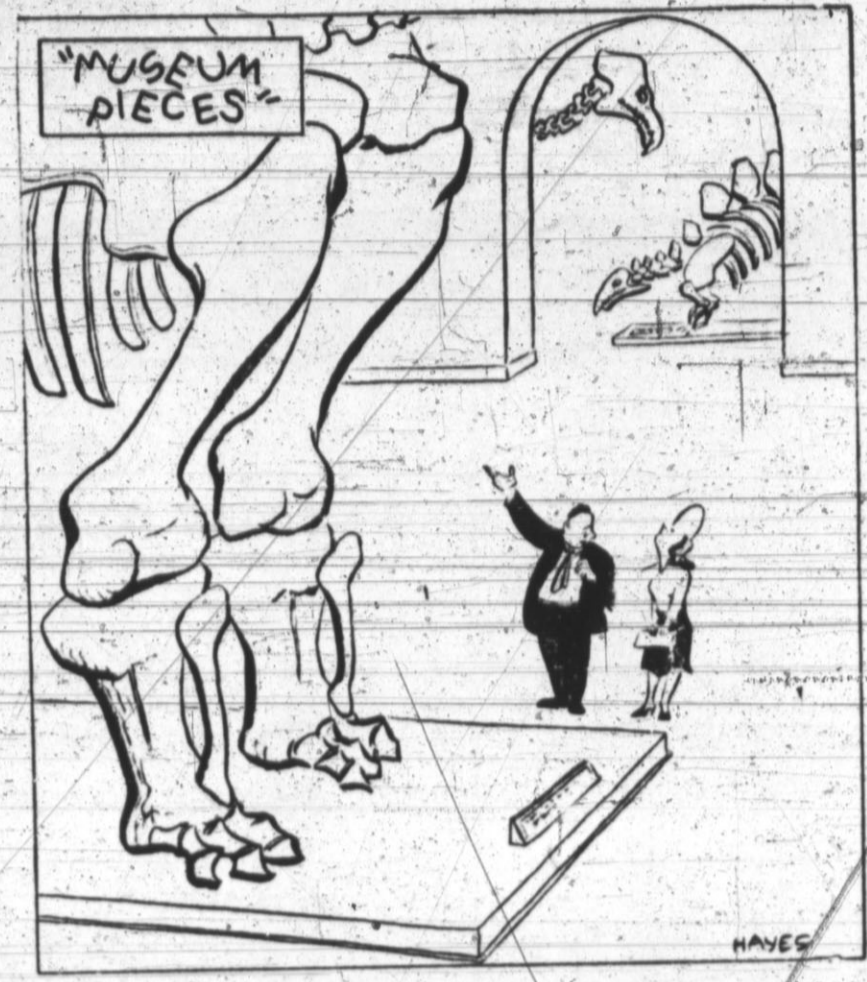

## Fewer Tires To Be Released As Shortage Grows

A general curb in allocation of tire purchases was this week announced through the Deaf Smith County War Price and Rationing Board. Ezra Norton, chairman, made the announcement, which also includes rulings on passenger cars, and warns merchants to comply with price regulation postings before August 10.

**FEWER TIRE RELEASES**  
It was also announced today that new rationing restrictions have tightened the list of eligibles for new tires, tubes and recapping. "This revision was an obvious necessity," he said, "and it will help to relieve the critical rubber tire situation."

The new amendment to the tire rationing regulations, Mr. Norton said, makes it plain that only vehicles engaged in service essential directly to the war effort or to the public health and safety are to be eligible. This will cut off from eligibility for tires on all privately operated trucks carrying alcoholic beverages, soft drinks and similar beverages, tobacco products, confections, candy, flowers, toys, novelties, jewelry, furs, radios, phonographs, musical instruments or other luxury goods, unless the transportation of such things is only incidental to the main service performed by the vehicle. Automobile tire and tube sellers have been granted an extension of time from July 25 to August 1, in which to file with the local board an inventory of all tires and tubes, both new and used, that were on hand as of June

30. "This is the second extension of time granted for this report, Mr. Norton explained, "because of the late arrival of the necessary forms."

**NEW AUTOMOBILES**  
An automobile dealer who has an eligible customer ready to buy certain type automobiles that the dealer cannot deliver because they are caught in a government "pool" may now be able to get the car released.

"Release of automobiles from the government reserve pool in exchange for others of lower price or greater passenger capacity is provided in an amendment to the new passenger car rationing regulations," Mr. Norton explained.

**RETAIL PRICE LISTS**  
All retail merchants in Deaf Smith County were reminded today by War Price and Rationing Board, that they must file with the local board by August 10 a list showing cost-of-living articles and their ceiling prices which the merchant has added to his stock since July 1.

"The filing of such lists by the tenth of each month is made mandatory by General Maximum Price Regulation No. 1," Mr. Norton pointed out.

He also called attention to the fact that many retail merchants still have not filed the initial listing of cost-of-living articles and their ceiling prices, which should have been in the hands of the board not later than July 1.
