non-acid fruits and vegetables. The following quotation is from Asa C/Chandler, professor of biology, Rice Institute, and advisory chairman, Houston and Harris County Nutrition Committee:

"-the chances for accident are too great to be worth the risk if a larger number of people undertake to can non-acid vegetables or meats by the boiling water bath method. Outbreaks of botulism will amost certainly occur. It is like having rattlesnakes on your golf course. You may keep your ball on the fairway and treat the rattlesnakes with impunity, but sooner or later somebody a little less careful or accurate will suffer. A poison so powerful that a teaspoonful is enough to kill 40, 000 guinea pigs is not a good thing to take chances with. By comparison rattlesnake venom is only mildly poisonous."

The continued dry weather does not allow the stigma to stay moist long enough for the embryo seed to develop in the tomato, therefore no fruit is set. There is little you can do about it, except to keep the plants in good condition and later

How To Grow Chrysanthemums Another inquiry of gardeners on problems connected with home flower gardens is how to grow chrysanthemums success-

fully. If chrysanthemum plants can be given a bed to themselves or grown on the edge of the vegetable garden, the results will be even better than in a mixed border. Choose preferably a position in full sun with a soil that is light, rich and above all, welldrained. Proper drainage is necessary if the plants are to be left in the ground all winter, and remember to use plenty of manure and give them plenty of water. A good rule to remember in transplanting chrysanthemums is "Divide and transplant your springflowering plants in the fall and your fallflowering plants in the spring.






